MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Due to the lack of uniformity in regard to writeups of Thite Slave cases, both in Weekly Report and Interesting Case form, it is suggested that the following rules be adopted relative to writing up this particular class of cases:

1. The word "yictim" shall never be used in the olvil title or body of either Weekly Report Cases or Interesting Cases.





- (3) In cases where the victim or victims have actually been indicted for violation of the White Slave Traffic Act, their names may, in the discretion of the Special Agent in Charge, be used in both the title and body of the releases.

It is the further desire of the Bureau that the Special Agent in Charge, in giving out press releases, refrain from expressing an opinion as to the innocence or guilt of the subject prior to conviction, as to the flagrancy of the violation and as to the length of sentence merited.
