The magazine reflects that the executive and editorial offices for this concern are located at 11 East 44th Street, New York City, N.Y., and that this magazine is published bi-monthly.

The February issue of this magazine contained an article entitled "Philadelphia Sink of Crime, Corruption of American Cities", apparently written by one DENNIS SPRAGUE, Special Investigator for "Crime Detective."

This particular article relates information concerning the recent death of four persons in the Holmesburg County Prison at Philadelphia, which received a great deal of publicity. Several individual officials of the prison are presently under indictment for having caused the death of these persons by live steam as a means of punishment. The article further refers to Philadelphia as follows: "No city in America has contributed as much to graft, to scandal, to plain thievery, to the enrichment of scoundrels and buccaneers as the so-called City of Brotherly Love."

It further states "All of these cheap chiselers, grafters, murderers, drug peddlers and lamistering bookies, pay tribute to the beases and the bosses protect them. On election day they're available for all manner of plain and fancy ballot stuffing, strong arm work and thuggery in return for which the police are required to smile at them when they pass."

The article further goes on with specific reference to the tie-up between various members of the so-called underworld and City and State officials.

The article very prominently displays photographs of former Governor George Earle of the State of Pennsylvania and Mike Duffy, these pictures appearing side by side and bear the caption "City Leaders." It might be interesting to note that MIKE DUFFY has been dead for several years.

On other pages of the article there are displayed photographs of other city officials, including the Honorable S. Davis Wilson, Mayor, intermingled with photographs of other well known members of the criminal element of this city.

Mr. GLEASON stated that in his opinion this article was of an obscene nature and came within the purview of the Statute prohibiting the interstate transportation of obscene matter, viz: Title 18, Section 396.

Mr. CLEASON requested that an investigation be conducted as to the manner in which these magazines came into this city, after which he would make further decision as to prosecution.

Accordingly it was ascertained by the writer that the particular magazine delivered by Mr. GLEASON to the Philadelphia Office was purchased by Mr. JOHN F. RABOLD of 314 South 15th Street, who is an employee in the office of Mr. JAMES F. MASTERSON, local attorney-at-law.

It appears that Mr. MASTERSON is attorney for former George EARLE.

The magazine was purchased by Mr. RABOLD at the news stand located at the Southeast corner of the rand Street Pennsyl vania Railroad Station and was purchased on T usay, December 3, 1938. This magazine has been appropriate by arked for identification and is being retained in the Philadeslpha Office fil.

The writer ascertained from the attendant at the above news-stand that instant magazine was dielived to his stand by the Central News Company. The stand, itself, is operated by the Union News Company which, secondary to the attendant, whose name is JOSEPH FREEMAN, 7253 Clinton Road, Under Darby, Pennsylvania, is a subsidiary of the Central News Company, whose local office is located at 614 Locust Street. According to Mr. FREEMAN the Central News Company is the distributing agency for the magazines, which are sold on the stands of the Union. News Company. He also advised that the Central News Company is a subsidiary in turn of the American News Company with headquarters in New York City.

At the Central News Company, the writer interviewed Mr. JOSEPH MAC AREE, Superintendent, who advised from a search of his records the instant magazine was one of three thousand copies of this particular issue, which were received by his company on 12-8-38. He stated they were received from the headquarters office of the American News Company at 131 Varick Street, New York City, and were delivered to Philadelphia by the Miller Transport Company with offices at 22nd and Spring Garden Sts., this city, which transport company is used by the American News Company to deliver its various magazines to Philadelphia.

The above information was submitted to Mr. GLEASON and discussed with him along with Mr. MASTERSON, who was also present at Mr. Gleason's request. Mr. GLEASON requested that the American News Company also be considered a subject in this case because if

prosecution is authorized it might be necessary to charge that company along with the publishers of the instant magazine with violation of the Interstate Transportation of Obscene Matter Statute.

Mr. GLEASON requested that an investigation be conducted as expeditionsly as possible concerning the set-up of the publishing company, and the American News Company; that upon the completion of this investigation he would again take this matter under consideration as to prosecution,

NEW YORK OFFICE will secure complete and detailed information as to the identity of the HILLMAN PERIODICALS, INC. at 11 East 44th Street, and its officials. Will also ascertain information concerning DENNIS SPRAGUE, who purportedly wrote the article in the body of this report. Will secure information as to where the instant magazine is published.

The New York Office at the American News Company, 131 Varick Street, will secure complete and detailed information concerning the identity of the said company and its officers. Will ascertain the relationship of this company to the HILLMAN PERIODICALS, INC. and the manner in which the instant magazine is delivered to the offices of the AMERICAN NEWS COMPANY.

PHILADELPHIA OFFICE will ascertain if the MILLER TRANSPORT COMPANY, this city, is a common carrier. Will upon receipt of the results of the requested investigation by the Newark and New York Offices again discuss this matter with Assistant U.S. Attorney G.A. GLEASON as to his decision as to prosecution.

With reference to the attached report and personal and confidential letter written by the Philadelphia Office concerning the above entitled matter, I called Agent Wellos at Philadelphia and instructed him to send to the Bureau a copy of the Crime Detective Magazine which is alleged to be obscene. I told Mr. Welles that no further investigation should be conducted in the case until an expression of opinion is received from the Department, explaining that this will be referred to the Department for its decision as to whether investigation should proceed.

I stated that although we have been investigating this since December 15, nevertheless, the Philadelphia Office should request each auxiliary office to hold all leads in abeyance until it is determined whether this is actually a Federal violation or merely a political affair inspired by the Assistant United States Attorney. Mr. Welles stated that he would advise the other interested offices by wire.

There is transmitted herewith the February issue of "Crime Detective" magazine, apparently published by the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., at Dunellen, New Jersey.

You will note from a perusal of this magazine that on page 40 there is contained an article entitled "Philadelphia - Sink of Crises" Corruption of American Cities, apparently written by one Dennis Sprague, Special Investigator for "Crime Detective."

This particular article relates to information concerning the recent death of four persons in the Holmesburg County Prison at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, which received a great deal of publicity. Several officials of the rison are presently under indictment for having caused the death of these persons by live steam as a means of punishment. The article further refers to Philadelphia as follows:





Please be advised that the Bureau is in receipt of a memorandum from the Criminal Division of the Department in response to its request for an expression of opinion as to whether the article referred to in the February, 1939, issue of Grime Detective Magazine entitled "Philadelphia - Sink of Crime, Corruption of American Cities", comes within the purview of Title 18, Section 396, indicating that after careful consideration of the article mentioned it is of the opinion that same does not disclose a violation of the obscene statute as it apparently is an attempt to expose political corruption.

The Criminal Division of the Department, however, advised in this memorandum that it appears this publication is new being investigated at the special instance of the United States Attorney at Philadelphia, as he contends that because of other articles, steries and advertisements contained in this magazine, its transportation in interstate commerce is a violation of the statute hereinbefore referred to. In view of this, the Criminal Division advises it concurs in the conclusion of the United States Attorney.

I would like to advise that I endeavored to secure copies of the magazine referred to but was informed locally that the magazine has been banned and withdrawn.

Shile talking to John Shuttleworth in New York, he stated that he had copies of some of the issues of this magazine in his files but not the ones in question. Later he called and stated he tried to get copies in New York and found they had been banned but he would send down a copy of the June issue which contains some lewd and highly suggestive articles.

I think we might well give consideration if this magazine persists and if future copies are transported in making a test case under the Interstate Transportation of lewd and lascivious literature Statutes.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. HOOVER, DIRECTOR, FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION.

This refers to your memorandum of June 9, 1939, transmitting a story entitled VI Sell Girls" published in an issue of OrCrime Detective" magazine, and the June, 1939 issue of said magazine, in which you request an expression from this Division as to whether or not interstate transportation of the magazine containing the story above referred to and the June publication is in violation of Section 396, Title 18, United States Code.

You are advised that on April 28, 1939, the Post Office Department submitted the March, April and May, 1939 issues of "Crime Detective" magazine, which issues had been ruled unmailable by the Solicitor of its Department, and requests advice as to whether or not the facts regarding these issues should be presented to the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, with a view to having criminal proceedings instituted in that district.

On May 19, 1939, this Department advised the Chief Inspector of the Post Office Department to the effect that the facts regarding the issues of said magazine should be presented to the United States Attorney with a view of having criminal proceedings instituted.

The story above referred to, "I Sell Girls", does not disclose in what issue of the magazine the same was published. However, it is believed that this story was published in one of the three magazines heretofore referred to. A full report dated June 5, 1939 was submitted to the United States Attorney at New York, for consideration H. E. Alford of the Post Office Department.

The stories appearing/the June, 1939 edition PRESERVE BUREAU INVESTIGATION OFIES DESTROYFY 85 AUG 15 Detective" magazine appear to be of the same tenor as those previously appearing in magazines submitted to this Division for considerat it is believed that the interstate transportation of said comes within the purview of the obscene statute and within Air jurisdiction of the Bureau. In this connection, reference is made to

our memorandum of March 17, 1939, concerning the transportation in interstate cormerce of the February, 1939 edition of the same magazine, in which this Division concurs in the conclusion of the United States Attorney at Philadelphia to the effect that the interstate transportation of this magazine is a violation of the statute hereinbefore referred to.

DETAILS:

At the office of Dun and Bradstreet, the files on the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., magazine publishers, 7 East 44th Street, New York City, were examined. The files reflected that the Hillman Company consisted of ALEAANDER HILLMAN, President, HAROLD N. BRASS, Secretary, MORRIS B. LEVINE, Treasurer. This company was incorporated 4/29/38 at New York City.

ALEXANDER HILIMAN was described as being 36 years of age in 1938, nativity, Chicago. In 1929, he was resident and Treasurer of the Heron Press which position he discontinued in 1930. In 1930, he was Manager of the Raridy Press, New York City and in 1931, he resigned and organized William Godwin, Inc., New York City. He is still president and Treasurer of this corporation which is located at the same address. He is also President and Treasurer of Hillman Curl, Inc., incorporation date, 4/1/35, also at the same address. For a time he was President of the Hillman Bookshop, Inc., which he sold in 1932.

HAROLD N. BRASS was employed for a number of years by the Van Neet Bookbinding Company, as General Manager and is believed to have only a small interest in the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., MORRIS B. LEVINE, is a CPA and attorney and is employed by the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., as a bookkeeper and Assistant General Manager.

This corporation publishes the magazines "Crime Detective" which has a 130,000 per month circulation, the "Mystery Novel of the Month" which has 65,000 per month circulation and is now also publishing "Crime Confessions". The magazines are reported to cost 25¢ per copy and are not sold on subscription basis. The company has no printing plant and all printing is done on special printing contract basis and they only furnish the paper and cuts. There are approximately 17 employees in the Hillman Company and the company possesses a fair printing record although they are slow in paying their obligations. Hillman refused to make a financial statement but it was believed that the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., are worth about \$20,000 and Willian Godwin, Inc., about \$25,000.

The files of Dun and Bradstreet reflect that the American News Company is a Deleware Corporation engaged

in "Wholesale newspaper periodicals, stationery and sundry supplies." They have their office located at 131 Variok Street, New York Cityand a notation was contained in the files to the effect that this corporation with its subsidiaries ranked as the largest organization of its kind in the world.

HAROLD GOULD is President of the Corporation and the credit of the company is good.

This company came active in 1934 when it took over the assets and liabilities of the American News Company, a New York Corporation. At present, the American News Company acts as a holding company for six subsidiaries including the American News Company, Delaware Corporation, the Union News Company, the American News Company, Ltd., American Lending Library, Inc., International News Company, Ltd., and the Post Office News Company with business in the United States, Canada, Cuba, and England. This company is reported to be making excellent profits and besides MR. GOULD, the officers are MICHAEL A. MORRISEY, HERBERT GREEN-WOOD, WILLIAM A. EICHBORN, MATHEW McCRADDAN. The Board of Directors is comprised of an exceptionally reputable list of business men and this company commenced business with a surplus of \$125,000,000 and is reported to operate on a reputable and substantial business basis.

This company sells all kinds of printed matter, news magazines, periodicals, gift cards, and novels and its subsidiary, the Union News Company operates lunch rooms, etc.

It is believed that this company purchases the periodicals from Hillman Periodicals, Inc., outright and distributes them, not as agents.

DETAILS:

HELEN KLEINERT, Stenographer in the Office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., 671 Broad Street, Newark, New Jersey advised that there was no information on file for Hillman Periodicals, Inc., Dunellen, New Jersey.

A. R. ADELMAN, Manager, Associated Credit Reporting Agency for New Jersey, Plainfield, New Jersey advised that there was no credit information in their files for either Hillman Periodicals, Inc., Dunellen, New Jersey for for DENNIS SPRAGUE, Dunellen, New Jersey.

EDWARD J. HANNON, Postmaster, Duneller, New Jersey advised that there was no such company as Hillman Periodicals, Inc. in Dunellen, New Jersey. He stated that he believed that the Art Color Printing Company was the only printing company in Dunellen, New Jersey. He advised that DONALD J. LUTHER, Clerk in the Post Office, who had charge of the second-class mail was out of the building at the time but would return within a few hours and that LUTHER would check his records to determine whether or not the Art Color Printing Company had sent any copies of "Crime Detective" Magazine through the Dunellen, New Jersey Post Office.

HANNON stated that J. SHEPHERD was Business Manager of the Art Color Printing Company and believed that he would be willing to furnish Agent with whatever information he desired regarding "Crime Detective."

A check of the files of the post office revealed that there was no record of a DENNIS SPRAGUE in Duneller, New Jersey.

JOSEPH V. SHEPHERD, residence, 614 North Washington Avenue, Dunellen, New Jersey and Assistant Secretary and Business Manager of the Art Color Printing Company advised that this company prints the issues of "Crime Detective" Magazine. He went on to say that the Art Color Printing Company was a subsidiary of the W. F. Hall Printing Company in Chicago, Illinois and he believed that none of the officials of the Art Color Printing Company or of the W. F. Hall Printing Company was in any way connected with the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., except in the capacity of a buyer and seller. He stated that all the printing for the Hillman Company was done on a contract basis, either sixty days or ninety days. He further advised that the Art Color Printing Company had nothing to do with the editing of the "Crime Detective" Magazine but merely did the printing for the Hillman Periodicals. Inc.

MR. SHEPHERD advised that the officers of the Art Color Print Company are as follows:

advised that on July 21, 1938 the Art Color Printing Company applied for second-class entry with the Post Office Department for mailing the October, 1938 issue of "Crime Detective." He stated, however, that this request was refused on August 15, 1938 by the Acting Solicitor of the Post Office Department who declared that this issue of the magazine was unmailable under Section 598, Postal Laws and Regulations. The letter addressed to the Dunellen Post Office was signed by RAMSEY S. BLACK, Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Classification.

MR. LUTHER advised that none of the February, 1939 issues of "Crime Detective" was mailed through the Post Office Department at Dunellen, New Jersey as he was informed when he was in Washington sometime ago that all of the magazines from the October, 1938 issue until the August, 1939 issue were declared unmailable. He further advised that the Art Color Printing Company made application on July 5, 1939 for the August, 1939 issue, which application was granted on August 28, 1939 by RAMSEY S. BLACK, Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Classification, Washington, D. C.

THOMAS H. WARWICK, President of the Warco Service Company, 437 Somerset Street, Plainfield, New Jersey advised that all shipping done for the Art Color Printing Company is done under contract.

A check of a copy of the "Daily Shipping Record", which form is made up by the Art Color Printing Company, Dunellen, New Jersey, the original of which is retained by the Art Color Printing Company and a copy furnished the Warco Service Company reveals the following shipments of the February, 1939 issue of "Crime Detective" Magazine made by Warco Service Company to the American News Company, New York City:

The second copy goes to the customer; the third copy is the Art Color Printing Company copy, and the fourth copy is retained by the Warco Service Company. WARWICK added that the above "Daily Shipping Record" is a compilation of the aforementioned receipts.

#### THE ARTICLE:

"What is Behind the Smear Against FBI?" appears on pages three through ten as the lead article in the August 27, 1952, issue of "People Today." The article bears no by-line. This issue has the Director's picture on its cover.

The article states that the TBI has been the subject of increasingly more criticism in recent years and says "The Federal Bureau of Investigation is the victim of its own publicity." According to the article, a few years ago the public considered FBI Agents to be "Supermen", but FBI failure to lecate missing Communist leaders, subjects of two kidnaping cases, and the subjects of the Brinks, as well as criticisms of the Bureau by Judge Ryan (Coplon Case), Max Lowenthal, and John Crosby, have destroyed public reverence of the FBI. The article concludes that FBI publicity depicting the Bureau as infallible created a false picture. It infers that the Bureau is doing an outstanding job, but that the Bureau also makes mistakes.

REGARDING HILLMAN PERIODICALS, INC., PUBLISHERS OF "PEOPLE TODAY":

On September 20, 1943, J. J. Storke submitted a memorandum to you indicating that Alex L. Hillman is the owner of Hillman Periodicals, Inc. He stated that that corporation publishes magazines of various types, most of them being of a sensational nature.

In 1939 and 1940 the Bureau conducted an investigation concerning Hillman Periodicals, Inc. upon a complaint that certain issues of "Crime Detective" magazine contained obscene matter and had been transported in intenstate commerce. The United States Attorney at Philadelphia pelined prosecution in this matter.

Hillman had an interest in "Tab" magazine which published in its August 28, 1942, edition an article concerning the Director. Although this article was not derogatory, it was unauthorized.

A confidential informant of the New York Office advised under the date August 29, 1942, that Hillman resided at 1070 Park Avenue, New York City, and was a successful publisher who had made much maney from various enterprises, many of which were barely on the legitimate side. Hillman was stated to hide behind dummy corporations which made large sums of money by putting out smutty books disguised as classics. According to the informant, Hillman used national adverticing to promote "spicy" literature which, when received, contained nothing more shocking than the word "love."

The New York informant further reported that Hillman had made considerable money through a racket of subsidizing books. This involved his publishing books provided the authors pay cash for the publication of the books, a procedure which is considered highly unethical. According to the informant, Hillman maintains a respectable standing in his private life.

At the conclusion of Starke's memorandum to you was a recommendation which stated, in part, "Hillman has an unsavory reputation....It is recommended....that the Bureau steer clear of any relations whatever with Hillman Periodicals, Inc." (94-3-4-1199)

Since September, 1943, no additional information of pertinence regarding the Hillman Periodicals, Inc. has come to the attention of the Bureau.

#### REGARDING "PEOPLE TODAY":

In March, 1951, the Director received a letter from M. J. Clement of "People Today" enclosing an advanced copy of a feature article on the New York City Anti-Crime Committee, which appeared in the March 28, 1951, issue of that magazine. This article mentioned that Tom Donegan, "FBI Ace instrumental in the Hiss conviction," would direct the committee of investigators in New York City.

The September 12, 1951, edition of "People Today" contained an article entitled, "Who Is Mr. Big?", dealing with the man behind crime in New York City. "Mr. Big" was identified as William J. McCormack of New York City by the New York Office. This article in "People Today" received considerable comment.

On April 29, 1952, you wrote a memorandum to Mr. Tolson stating that Sam Shaeffer of "Newsweek" magazine had advised Mr. McGuire that "People Today," formerly owned by "Newsweek" and which had been sold to Hillman Publication, had requested Shaeffer to do a brief two-page biography on the Director. You said that Shaeffer had stated that he had a good deal of background from "Newsweek" from the time they ran the Director's picture on the cover. There were a few items regarding the Director's background which he did not have. You stated that Mr. McGuire furnished that information to Shaeffer.

Notations at the bottom of this memorandum indicate that "People Today" had been checked from the latter part of April, 1952, through the middle of July, 1952, and no article regarding the Director had appeared. (94-43468)

#### RECONVENDATION:

Since Hillman bears a bad business reputation, and since publications of Hillman Periodicals, Inc., have gained a reputation for use of smutty, "spicy", and indecent pictures and articles, it is recommended that the New York and Newark Offices be directed to discreetly ascertain the names of all publications and business enterprises in which Hillman has an interest so that these publications can be closely reviewed for the purpose of gathering evidence for possible prosecution under the interstate transportation of indecent literature statute or for possible rescinding of mailing privileges of Hillman publications.

Photographs and "copy" in the August 27, 1952, issue of "People Today" indicate that this magazine follows the smutty character attributed to other Hillman publications.

William J. Spillane NEW YORK, April 7 (NAY News) - William & J. INTERSTATE TRANSPORTATION OF OBSCENE MATTER

It will be noted that a review of the files of the NYO reflect that in the case "ALEX L. HILLMAN, was. - FUGITIVE, ET AL, NATIONAL BANKRUPTCY ACT, Los Angeles origin, Los Angeles file 49-99, N.Y. file 49-415, it appeared that HILLMAN was indicted on 12/24/27 charged with conspiracy to defraud a bankrupt estate. A fugitive warrant was issued for HILLMAN on 5/24/29. HILLMAN was arrested by agents of this office on 5/24/29 and refused removal to Los Angeles, whereupon he was released on a \$1,000 bend for his appearance in Los Angeles on 10/1/29. United States Attorney in Los Angeles finally dismissed the indictment on the authority of the Attorney General on 3/8/30.

The files further reflect that the Bureau requested the NYO to conduct an inquiry in the case of "GLOBE PHOTOS, INC. PUBLISHERS, TAB MAGAZINE; INFORMATION CONCERNING, Bufile 65-40261, N.Y. file 62-6986. In this case a report of Confidential Informant ROBERT M. concerning HILLMAN identified him and described his character which report was furnished to the Bureau on 9/2/42, and in which report the informant advised that HILLMAN was a successful publisher, who made a lot of money by both legitimate and shady means. The informant stated that HILLMAN specialized in the publication of spicy and rather smutty magazines. Other informants also stated that Hillman Periodicals ran a "cheap outfit with a lot of cheap magazines".

In the case of "HILLMAN PERIODICALS, INC., AMERICAN NEWS COMPANY, INTERSTATE TRANSPORTATION OF OBSCENE MATTER", in which Philadelphia was the office of origin under their file 71-167, N.Y. file 71-332, the subject was investigated as the publisher of "Crime Detective Magazine" in 1939, which contained an article entitled "Philadelphia Sink of Crime", which article flayed public officials of the City of Philadelphia and alleged an alliance between them and the crime element in the city.

CSNY 1 furnished the following information concerning the subject and his company: RECORDED.

Hillman Periodicals, Inc., Magazine Publishers, are located at 535 5th Avenue, New York 17, New York. ALEXANDER L. HILLMAN is president, MORRIS B. LEVINE, secretary and treasurer, PHILIP KEENAN, vice-president, and FRANKLIN FORSBERG, vice-president.

It will be noted at this point that a member of the board of directors of Hillman Periodicals, Inc. is Senator STYLES BRIDGES.

CSNY 1 advised further that ALEXANDER L. HILLMAN, residing at 1070 Park Avenue, NYC, was born in 1900 in Chicago and is married, his wife's name being RITA HILLMAN. He attended the University of Chicago School of Commerce, and Law School at the same University. He completed his studies in 1923. gained editorial and publishing experience as an employee and later as an executive of China Press, Shanghai, China from 1928 to 1929. He was an officer in Hillman-Bird, Ltd., book publishers, New York City, from 1929 to 1930. He was secretary and treasurer of Heron Press, Inc. in 1930. Also in 1930 he organized and became president of the Exotica Club, Inc., which name was changed by a charter amendment on 4/23/31 to the Rarity Press, Inc. This company was liquidated in 1931. From 1931 to 1941 he was president of William Godwin, Inc., book publishers. meantime, in 1935 he organized and became an officer in Hillman-Curl, Inc., book publishers, which was dissolved in 1941. During 1938 he organized and became president and treasurer of Hillman Periodicals, Inc., and in 1946 relinquished the title of treasurer HILLMAN currently holds 100% of the outstanding capital stock and is active in all phases of the business.

MORRIS B. LEVINE, Secretary and Treasurer of the corporation, was born in 1912 and is married. He has been associated with ALEX-HILLMAN since 1931 and he graduated from Brooklyn Law School in 1936, having previously obtained a BDA Degree from the City College of New York. He was admitted to the Bar in New York State in 1936, but has been associated with this corporation most of his commercial life. He was elected to the office of secretary in 1938 and in 1946 was elected to the office

of treasurer in addition to his other office. From 1943 to 1946 he served in the armed forces and is presently the active general manager of the corporation.

PHILIP KEENAN, Vice-President of the company, was born in 1897 and is married. He was for many years employed by the McFadden Publications, NYC. He joined the present corporation in 1940 and shortly thereafter he was elected a vice-president and director. He is circulation manager at the present time.

PRANKLIN FORSBERG, Vice-President of the company, was elected to this office in 1950. He is reported to have had many years of publishing experience, having been associated with Street and Smith Publications in New York City, and during World War II was associated with the United States Army publication "Yank".

At this point it will be noted that the board of directors of Hillman Periodicals, Inc. is composed of the above officers and in addition thereto Senator STYLES BRIDGES from New Hampshire, who was elected to the board of directors in June, 1950.

CSNY I further advised that the Hillman Company was incorporated under the laws of the State of New York on 4/29/38. It was incorporated with an authorized capital stock of 500,000 common shares at \$1.00 a share. This amount was reduced subsequently by charter and amendment on 5/21/50 to 320,000 at \$1.00 a share.

It is noted that in 1948 the Federal Trade Commission under Order No. 5440, dated 4/21/48, against the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., ordered them to cease and desist from misrepresentation in the sale of reprints of books as original and unabridged editions, when in fact they were actually abridged and incomplete editions. A petition for a review was denied by the Federal Trade Commission on 5/31/51.

CSNY 1 lists the following as publications being published by Hillman at this time: Pageant Crime Detective Headquarters Detective Real Detective Western Novel Classic People Today Fighting Western Novel Gunfire Western Novel Screen Guide 9. 10. Real Clue Crime Stories 11. Real Romances 12. Movieland Pageant is a digest size monthly magazine carrying no advertising and devoted almost entirely to original material. and photograph stories. This company handles its own distribution, selling to jobbers located throughout the United States on a 100% returnable basis. The amount of subscription business done is The company has no plant of its own, the printing and binding done by contractors. The company's executive offices are located at 535 5th Avenue, New York City. At 636 1st Avenue, New York City, they maintain a place of business which handles their addressographing. They also maintain an advertising office in Chicago, Illinois. An editorial office for publication of the magazines "Movieland" and "Screen Guide" is also maintained in Los Angeles, California. In all, the corporation employs about 130 persons in the company including the subsidiaries, which are numbered about 13, all of which are usually named under the name of the particular magazine. This list was not

listed by CSNY 1. The company owns all these subsidiaries wholly and directly. These companies are formed each time for a new magazine, mostly of the "one shot" variety.

The financial situation of the company is as follows:

CSNY I states that the tangible net worth in 1950 was approximately \$1,600,000. In May, 1951 it had a net worth of about \$1,000,000. In 1952 the volume is still holding and the net worth is in excess of \$1,000,000. The company is highly regarded in all banking quarters.

Mr. EDWARD MILES, former Special Agent of this Bureau, and presently advertising manager for True Magazine", a man's magazine published by the Fawcett Publications, Inc., 67 West 44 Street, NYC, advised that he knew in a general way that Hillman and his company had a rather bad reputation in the magazine publishing field. He stated that his reputation did not do the field any good, and that they were active in publishing very cheap types of magazines. Mr. MILES obtained, through Mr. ALLAN ADAMS, vice-president of the Fawcett Company from Greenwich, Connecticut and in charge of distribution, a copy of each of the publications of the Hillman Periodicals, Inc., which are presently being published. They are being forwarded to the Bureau for their perusal and are enclosed herewith.

Mr. MILES also advised that he had learned from Mr. ADAMS that the Hillman Company discontinued the following publications:

Western Novel Classic Fighting Western Gun Fire Screen Guide

Mr. MILES also stated that Mr. ALLAN ADAMS, who is vice-president of Fawcett Company in charge of distribution, and located in the Fawcett Building, Greenwich, Connecticut, had advised him that he knows HILLMAN and knows considerably about his background and his operations. His telephone number is GReenwich 8-4680.

Consideration may be given by the Bureau to having the New Haven Office interview Mr. ADAMS at Greenwich, Connecticut. An extra copy of this letter is being forwarded to the Bureau for the use of the New Haven Office in the event the Bureau desires to have New Haven interview Mr. ADAMS.

The enclosed magazines were reviewed by the writer as well as a representative number of back issues of some of these magazines, and it is felt that these magazines should be reviewed by the Bureau.

No further investigation will be conducted by this office UACB.
