Arens stated the comment in Newsweek magazine was in error and that to his knowledge neither the FBI nor CIA had voiced any objection or opposition to return to the U.S., nor had anyone that he knew of anywhere in Government made any protest. Arens stated that he wished to suggest that it would not be inappropriate for the FBI to protest this item to Newsweek magazine. Arens was informed that we would make a check into the situation and would let him know, although it was not our policy to voice any protest to any other department of Government whose responsibility it was to make the decision as to whether or not entrance into the U.S. should be granted.

Arens stated he was making a protest to Ralph de Toledano of the Newsweek Washington staff. Upon termination of the conversation, Ralph de Toledano was calling in on another line and advised Mr. McGuire that Dick Arens had just called him protesting the above-referred to item in Newsweek and de Toledano stated on a strictly personal basis that he was highly suspicious of Arens since Arens had told him what he considered a direct lie, namely that had been fighting the communists for the past 5 years and since he had told him what he knows to be an untruth he was suspicious of anything else Arens had stated.

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

# McCarthy Asks CIA-type Group for Congress

Rep. Eugene McCarthy (D., Minn.) said Friday he will seek Legislation which would establish a joint congressional committee on intelligence and information, early this month.

The St. Paul congressman will fly to Washington Monday for the opening of the second session of the 85th congress Tuesday.

"Such a committee would operate in much the same way as the joint committee on atomic energy," he said. "It would have knowledge of procedures and operation of the central intelligence agency (CIA) and other intelligence agencies.

"Then congress would come into possession of such advance information which the administration had, but idid not use—as the coming launching of the Russian Sputnik."

Reference is made to the attached article appearing allowing in the "Washington Post" on today's date entitled "Ike Asks | Maps, Arrows To Clarify CIA Reports." The article infers that the President was reportedly annoyed with Allen Dulles, Director of CIA, at a recent National Security Council meeting because of Dulles' allegation that the policy makers within the administration ignored intelligence findings. The article reports that Dulles was directed to shorten his reports since they were entirely too long and should be written in much briefer text. When It is believed that this item refers to the Killian Committee's criticism in the past of all the foreign intelligence agencies, State, CIA and the military services, each publishing a daily current intelligence summary. The Killian Committee was critical that none of these bulletins were coordinated with the other agencies and, as a result, some would conflict with others in evaluating the same piece of intelligence. As a result, this matter has been considered at the Intelligence Advisory Committee on a number of occasions in the past few months and because of a final agreement among the agencies involved, CIA, since January 14, 1958, has been publishing a daily intelligence bulletin on an "all source" basis. CIA has set up quite a staff in order to produce this item and where at all possible all items are coordinated with the appropriate interested agencu.

The Bureau has been receiving copies of these CIA daily bulletins and they are reviewed; daily for items of interest to the Bureau.

The Bureau's translation unit which handles about 30 foreign languages including Russian, Hebrew, Japanese, Chinese and Korean operates on an annual salary budget of \$65,000. The article continues that last year 6,447 books were purchased, of which 50% to 60%, or about 3, 200, were of a technical nature. Translations of Soviet scientific literature made by CIA during fiscal 1957 totaled 32,667 pages. In other words, 3, 200 books plus an unknown number of periodicals produced in round figures only 32,000 pages of translation for an average of less than 10 pages of translation per book. The suggestion is made that about half of the product is scientific. If this inference is true, the cost per page of translation is approximately \$8.00 as opposed to the Bureau's expenditure during the first half of fiscal year 1958 of \$2.00 per page. At 1:45 PM, March 14, 1958, Ralph A. Patterson, secretary to Congressman Stuyvesant Wainwright (R-New York), telephoned and talked to Wick. We have had pleasant dealings with Patterson in the past and he has always been friendly. Mr. Patterson said the Congressman has learned from responsible constituents in Bridgehampton and East Hampton, New York, that the two brothers, Samuel and Joseph Liss, are very active in and around that immediate area. It is believed that they were in the past and may be now connected with the Communist Party (CP) or if not, they are certainly "left-wingers." The Congressman asked whether someone from the FBI could come up and talk to him about these two individuals. Wick told Patterson he would see what we could do on this matter although it was not believed we could be of much help.

#### SAMUEL LISS - Bufile 121-4259:

Samuel Liss is the subject of a Loyalty of Government Employees investigation conducted by this Bureau in 1948 at which time Liss was employed as an agricultural economist with the Farmers Home Administration in the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Reports were forwarded to the Civil Service Commission and as of August 31, 1949, we were advised that Samuel Liss was eligible on loyalty. Our investigation reflected that Samuel Liss was born August 22, 1906, in Odessa, Russia, obtained derivative U. S. citizenship February 27, 1920, Bronx, New York. He received a B.S. degree in 1930, City College of New York, and a M. A. degree in 1932 from Columbia University. He taught economics at City College of New York, 1930 to 1935, came to Washington, D. C., in 1935 as a WPA Statistician, later transferred to Department of Agriculture and was inducted into the Army in 1943. He was honorably discharged in October, 1945. He was reinstated in the Department of Agriculture January, 1946.

Subsequent to notification that Samuel Liss eligible on loyalty, he was noted by surveilling Agents of FBI in company of CP member and this fact reported to interested agency. Department of Agriculture advised us January 8, 1953, that hearing was held on charges preferred against Samuel Liss during which activities of his brother, Joseph, were brought out. By letter dated May 18, 1953, the Civil Service Commission advised that Samuel Liss had resigned or otherwise separated prior to a decision on his loyalty.

#### JOSEPH LISS - Bufile 100-1027:

Following investigation of Samuel Liss, the New York Office was requested to initiate a security investigation of Joseph Liss in 1951. We had, however, prior to that as far back as 1940, received information concerning the questionable character of Joseph Liss. Joseph Liss was born in Odessa, Russia, on September 2, 1911. He entered this country at the age of two and received American citizenship by naturalization of his father in February, 1920, at U. S. District Court, Bronx, New York. He attended City College of New York from 1929 to 1935 and was married to his wife, Mildred, June 27, 1944. From 1939 to 1940, he was employed by the Columbia Broadcasting System. From October 1, 1942, to June 27, 1944, he was employed by OWI Domestic Radio Bureau, New York City. When OWI's functions were transferred to State, he went along and among references was listed Archibald MacLeish. He was employed from October, 1941, to September, 1942, as a script writer for the program "Report to the Nation" with offices in Washington, D. C. He terminated his Government services with the State Department on August 14, 1944, but immediately thereafter on September 19, 1944, he was reappointed Principal Radio Officer, Office of the Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs, Radio Division, Historical Section, New York City. Shortly thereafter he severed his connection with State and became employed by the Columbia Broadcasting System. As of August, 1953, he was a TV script writer and working as a free-lancer.

#### Memorandum to Mr. Tolson:

Whittaker Chambers advised that Joseph Liss was a member of the CP as was his wife. Other informants have stated Joseph Liss was a member of the CP while employed at OWI in 1942 and up at least through 1947. He registered with the American Labor Party in 1950 in New York. During an interview in 1954 with FBI Agents, Joseph Liss denied membership in the CP and he claimed that he was not now sympathetic with communism although he had at one time thought it had something to offer.

#### **OBSERVATION:**

It is evident that it will not be possible to assist Congressman Wainwright to the extent of supplying him with public source data on both Samuel and Joseph Liss for the reason we have no such data in Bureau files. The majority of information, both in the loyalty case and the Security Matter - C case stems from reliable confidential sources, the identity of which cannot be disclosed.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

That I personally call upon Congressman Wainwright informing him for his confidential and personal information that we have investigated both Samuel and Joseph Liss both before and after they were employed by the Federal Government. The Congressman can be informed it will not be possible to discuss and disclose the results of our investigation into their activities. He could be told, however, he ought to be most cautious in any dealings with them; beyond this we cannot go and it might be suggested to him he check with both State Department and the Department of Agriculture for anything those two agencies might have on Joseph Liss and Samuel Liss respectively.

Our relations with Congressman Wainwright have been satisfactory. He confidentially advised Inspector DeLoach March 5, 1957, that this is his last term in Congress and he plans to resume law practice thereafter. He had asked that someone from the Bureau call upon him to discuss in general the

DeLoach set him straight on this. The Congressman then "took off" on CIA and its inefficiencies and particularly those of Allen Dulles. Because he had furnished the above information to us in confidence, we were in no position to protest to CIA. We did, however, tell him the charges were so serious we believed we should protest to CIA. The Congressman refused to release us from the seal of confidence, however, since he believed to do so would jeapardize his position.

He went on to state "The Congress cannot afford to play politics with the CIA, and must give to it all the help it needs. Allen Dulles' background and reputation highly commends him for the post he holds, irrespective of the party in power." It is stated in the article "By statute, the agency's operations " are secret. Its size, its budget, the character of its operations-all the facts that other agencies must report in detail-are known to only an elite handful within the Government. In this secret atmosphere a pervasive cynicismizabout CIA has been cultivated in Washington. There are such stories as the news account in a Washington paper some months back of a free-for-all in a downtown restaurant between CIA and FBI men. Each group, the paper reported, had mistaken the other for Communist agents. In casual conversation one is told

Successor's Notation! vaguely that CIA crawls with incompetents and poseurs, that it is inefficient and bungling, that it is not heeded by the policymakers. Few well-informed criticsincluding men who are severe critics-support these charges."

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

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Reference is made to my memorandum dated January 17, 1958, captioned as above, wherein I described an arrangement which was worked out whereby other United States agencies including the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) and the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) would furnish us pertinent data in their files concerning diplomats and representatives of international organizations who receive visas to enter the United States. Under the existing arrangement, INS transmits form (I-57) to interested agencies. Each agency then is required to review its files and transmit pertinent data to us and we, in turn, disseminate the information to the Attorney General for any action deemed advisable by the Department. In the referenced memorandum, I reported that CIA allegedly was looking for a means of excluding itself from any responsibilities in the name checking program which has been in existence for years. An INS representative confidentially advised that CIA was planning to direct a communication to the Attorney General on this matter. By memorandum dated January 21, 1958, from you to Ur. Boardman, the value of the program to the Bureau was described in some detail. We had not been contacted by CIA but the Liaison Agent has been on the alert for any developments.

On April 21, 1958, CIA, confidentially advised that a letter was in preparation In the Office of the Legal Counsel of CIA, which communication was to be directed to the Attorney General. In this proposed letter, CIA is asking to be excluded from name checking responsibilities Junder the captioned program. Council Intelligence Directive - 2 which provides that Central

Intelligence Agency (CIA) may approach non-Governmental U. S.

citizens and aliens in order to exploit their foreign intelligence potential. CIA may contact citizens without instituting a name check provided CIA does not propose to discuss classified information. Prior to contacting an alien, CIA must submit a name check. If it is determined that either a citizen or an alien is being investigated by the Bireau, arrangements for operating the individual will be mutually agreed upon.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the provisions of National Security Council Intelligence Directive: -2 be incorporated into the Manual of Instructions, Section 102 (Coordination with Other Government Agencies). Attached for approval are changes in the Manual of Instructions.

SECTION 102

#### Page 25 E. DOMESTIC EXPLOITATION OF NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS

Pursuant to the provisions contained in National Security Council Intelligence Directive - 2, approved by the President on April 21, 1976, the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) mays.

1. Approach non-Covernmental U.S. eitigens without conducting a security check in order to determine their foreign intelligence potential or for the purpose of bristing or debricting them on an unalgestifed basis. If CIA proposes to discuss classified information with a U.S. sitisen, it must first submit a name check request through proper channels. If it is determined that the PBI has operational interest in a U.S. citizen, tiA will operationate with us prior to further contact. CIA is authorized, in an emergency, to discuss classified information up to Confidential with a U.S. citizen without obtaining a prior record check.

2. Contact aliens to exploit foreign intelligence potential.

However, prior to this contact CIA will subsit a name check to the FRI. If it is determined that we have an operational interest in an alien. CIA will be notified that its exploitation of the alien would interfere with our operations. Then this situation arises, a resolution will be effected between the bureau and CIA.

By letter dated April 28, 1958, the <u>Central</u> Intelligence Agency (CIA) advised that it was interested in receiving on a continuing basis any reports evincing Soviet interest in U.S. travelers upon their return to this country from the USSR, as well as any inquiries regarding such persons made by

Inasmuch as such a request was of an unusual and possibly unreasonable nature, the Liaison Agent has checked with CIA in order to ascertain the purpose of the request. If we complied with the request, we would be placed in the position of furnishing CIA information on matters of a sensitive nature such as double agent operations.

On April 30, 1958, CIA, advised that as far as she knew the purpose of the communication was to inform the Bureau that CIA desired to be cognizant of Soviet interest in CIA personnel or sources who have traveled to Russia. She stated that she would further check into this matter in order to ascertain if there was any other reason for the CIA request.

On May 6, 1958, advised the Liaison Agent that the CIA communication of April 28, 1958, was actually poorly worded in that CIA only wanted to be informed of manifestation of Soviet interest in CIA personnel or sources. The Liaison Agent explained that if our investigations revealed that the Soviets were interested in a CIA representative, we would be in contact with that Agency. The Liaison Agent pointed out that we normally check with CIA. concerning individuals who have traveled abroad and such a check would bring out the fact that the person was employed or connected with CIA. In other words, we already have adequate machinery to handle CIA's concern. agreed that this was true and stated it was not necessary to give her agency any kind of written reply on this matter.

During the discussion in the House of Representatives on the appropriations bill for the Departments of State and Justice and Judiciary, there were several comments made by unidentified Representatives regarding the need to examine the activities of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) to determine if they are performing their functions properly. This was provoked by a discussion on the floor of the House today regarding the difficulty experienced by Vice President Nixon on his good-will tour of South America. One Congressman stated that he confidentially ascertained the amount of funds that were available to the CIA and that he was amazed by the amount. No figures were furnished. Several Congressmen wanted to know why the Vice President was not forewarned of the presence of Communist agitation in the South Amerlican countries prior to his trip. One Congressman defended the activities, of the CIA and he stated that undoubtedly the President and the Vice President had detailed information as to the Communist stronghold in the various South American countries. Further, irrespective of the situation in these countries, the Vice President would have gone anyway because his trip was to promote good will.

Congressman Sikes of Florida (D) introduced an amendment to this Bill to cut \$342,000 from funds allotted for Civil Rights Division of Justice. His amendment was rejected. The Bill provides \$490,000 for civil rights matters which includes 29 lawyers and 30 nonprofessional employees.

Pages 7961-7964, Congressman Frelinghuysen, (R) New Jersey, spoke concerning Vice President Nixon's reception in South America. It is directly responsible to the Attorney General, whose Justice Department must answer to the Congressional Judiciary and Appropriations Committees. Moreover, the FBI's

Included among CIA's responsibilities is the training of personnel to institute sabotage operations in the event of hostilities. CIA also has devoted some time to limited training of foreigners who might be utilized in such work. In addition to the training of personnel, CIA allegedly has spent time on research devoted to the construction and use of numerous types of sabotage devices.

engaged in the training program, has advised the Liaison Agent that CIA is holding a demonstration of sabotage devices and techniques at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, during the period July 28, to August 1, 1958. Present as observers will be representatives of all military agencies. They will be officers who are considered to be experts or specialists in this field. stated that he was officially inviting the Bureau to send observers, if we so desired. He explained that two days of the program will be devoted to the demonstration of "peculiar items" which, for the most part, would deal with large-scale explosions. One day will be devoted to demonstrations of sabotage in the water and from the air. Two days will be used for field improvisation. This will deal with the construction of sabotage devices in an emergency situation where materials will be scarce. referred to this phase as the "do-it-yourself" type of sabotage.

This matter has been discussed with the Laboratory. It is believed that it would be to the Bureau's advantage to have a Laboratory representative attend the demonstrations as an observer. This will give us an opportunity to evaluate CIA's research and activity in the sabotage field and any knowledge gained will, of course, be of assistance to us in the handling of sabotage investigations. Our observer will also have the opportunity to meet with the military specialists in this field. Contacts developed could be of use to us in the Juture.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that a representative of the Laboratory attend the demonstrations....If approved, CIA will be advised via Liaison channels that a Bureau representative will be present.
