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

MEMORANDUM FOR

Srout In connection with the summary on /CIG, on Page 2, Section B, Paragraph 2, is pointed out that the functions of the Director of Central Intelligence and the Agency are not enumer-ated in the bill presently being considered. In a recent conversation with a Congressman I was informed that the phraseology calling for the transfer of the functions of the Central Intelligence Group to the new combined National Defense Department is so worded as to give the Executive Order of January 22 the effect of legislative enactment and the Act by calling for the transfer of the functions and duties of CIG without any restrictive language would probably be the most undesirable thing that could happen.

My only suggestion in connection with the memorandum is that this point be made clear. Otherwise, as I know the situation, the memorandum appears to me to be quite complete. G. i. 👔

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

In the June 24, 1947, issue of the newspaper "Excelsior" there appeared an article bearing a New York U.F. dateline, which reflected information to the effect that world-wide intelligence mattors in the future would be handled by the Central Intelligence This article further pointed out that the intelligence in-Group. formation was formerly handled by the Army, Navy and State Departmont, and of recont years in South America investigations were assisted by the Federal Eureau of Investigation. b7D

The above article was, according to Source discussed thoroughly at the headquarters of the Communist Party in Mexico by BLAS MANAIQUE, Secretary General of the Communist Party for the Federal District, and FERNANDO CORTES, a member of the Contral Committee of the Communist Farty, and it was concluded that this article should not be reprinted either in the Party's bulletin or the official organ of the Party "La Voz de Mexico", in view of the fact that it was not believed advisable at this time because the major part of the members of the Party are in fear of being arrested or detained by the government on a charge of subversive activities. MANRIQUE stated that proof of this is the fact that many of the members who attend meatings of the various cells or at the Party's headquarters, upon leaving same deposit their Communist carnets of identification at the particular cell or Party headquarters prior to leaving, so if arrested or detained they will not have it in their possession.

RIGINAL FILED. It was further stated by NAMIGUE that some of the members, because of fear, have abandoned the Party, while a great numbor have become inactive. It was the belief of MANRIQUE that should this article be called to the attention of the various manbors, numerous others might resign membership in the Party, as oll as a larger group becoming inactive. 12-80750-471

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
MANNIQUE further suggested that in view of the Anti-Soviet campaign, the members should be careful of all documents, papers and carnets in their possession, as well as conversations with persons unknown to them. MANNIQUE stated that many of the members had been constantly surveilled upon their departure from the headquarters of the Party or of a particular coll, and that they must use procaution with all foreign enemies, particularly individuals in the Intelligence Service of the United States.

MANRIQUE advised that the heads of the various cells, as well as the Central Committee, should be thoroughly acquainted with the fact that the investigations of activities by Intelligence agents of the United States are no longer being conducted by Military groups, but by this new intelligence organization known as Central Intelligence Group.

CAPITOL STUFF

By JOHN O'DONNELL

ITHIN the next week, Congress must step in and settle a furious behind-the-scenes battle which deeply involves the safety of the nation when and if the undeclared, push-button World War III breaks without warning upon the United States.

And this is actually a behind the scenes battle by its very-naturebecause the individuals and the exact nature of their work cannot be revealed: Involved are the trained, technical secret agents, the workers in Army and Navy Intelligence, the FBI and the State department whose job it is to gather information about potential enemies, nervous neutrals and even our supposedly ever-loving Allies.

These groups are fighting to preserve their existence as experts in espionage and counterespionage against what they see as the grasp for over-all power by the Central Intelligence Agency.

Already the Central Intelligence Agency has snapped away from the War department the world-wide secret intelligence network, painfully, secretly and efficiently built up since the last years of the war. The same group has brusquely taken away the elaborate, expensive and functioning organization which J. Edgar Hoover established in South America.

NOW comes the show down.

The battle pivots on the final form in which the power and functions of the Central Intelligence Agency will be defined in the legislation designed "to co-ordinate but not to merge" the armed forces.

If the present measure goes through as written in the Senate, and without change in the House, the veteran intelligence experts assert that the nation will set up a "super-duper gestapo—OSS cloak and dagger organization" which will direct the gathering of all the now independent groups—Army, Navy, State department and FBI. And on the performance record to date this has already been done by the Central Intelligence Group.

What the opponents now plead for is that the central office be held by Congress to the intent of the directive of President Truman which created the office back in January, 1946.

THIS original intent was that the Central Agency should recieve all the information gathered by Army and Navy intelligence, State department, FBL, etc., weigh its importance—in. technical jargon, "evaluate it"—and then disseminate the intelligence to the Government departments concerned and of course pass on its final judgment and data to the President and the joint chiefs of staffs.

But instead of following out this program, Central Intelligence to the dismay and over the objections of the veteran workers in the esplonage fields, has proceeded to set up its own spy servicetrying to foist 1,200 of its recruits on the State department for example—and given orders (improperly, say the opponents) which have destroyed or weakened some of the most valuable and secret sation.

The following memorandum has been recieved from the Director:

"In view of the newspaper reports, particularly the article by John O'Donnell appearing in the Washington Times Herald concerning the forthcoming Hearings before the House Committee on Expenditures looking into the merger of the War and Navy Departments, and with particular reference to the setting up of a Central Intelligence Group, I would like to have prepared for me an appropriate memorandum which I might use if called to testify before this Committee as now seems to be inevitable." I would like to have set forth the various objections to the Central Intelligence Group as it now functions with instances of difficulties already experienced as well as a brief reference to the preliminaries leading up to the present establishment of the Central Intelligence Group and emphasis upon the fallacy of endeavoring to divorce domestic from foreign intelligence.

Several points made in O'Donnell's column in objecting to a Central Intelligence Group with operating powers are well founded and should be considered in the preparation of this memorandum."

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INTRODUCTION

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, I realize that you gentlemen of the House Expenditures Committee are charged with the responsibility of seeing that our Government is operated on the most economical basis possible. I know too that you are all deeply concorned with the welfare of our country. Accordingly, in this brief statement I intend to comment on the necessity of protecting our country with an adequate world-wide intelligence organization and to make known to you my views on how such an organization can be most efficiently and most economically set up and operated. We of the Federal Eureau of Investigation have given this problem considerable thought and study, and we have had the additional advantage of operating an intelligence service in this Hemisphere during the past war. Consequently, we have come to appreciate by actual experience the complex problems involved.

NECESSITY FOR A PERMANENT, PEACE-TIME, MORLD-VIDE INTELLIGENCE OFGANIZATION

I feel strongly that a permanent, peace-time, world-wide intelligence organization is absolutely necessary in order to protect our country and to provide our officials with adequate data to enable them properly to guide this Nation in international affairs. To my way of thinking, establishment of such an organization is the soundest investment we could make. Certainly none of us want to see repeated or magnified the horrors of the recent war with attendant ruinous expense and tragic loss of life. To avoid such a repetition we must be guided intelligently and adequately along the sonetimes treacherous road to permenent world peace. We had no such guidance between the last two wars. I do not mean to claim that if we had, such an organization World War II would not have occurred. But you will agree I am sure that we would certainly not have been caught so woofully unprepared, and the cost to us in lives, money and labor would surely have been substantially reduced.

The point has been made many times, and I agree with it, that expenditure for intelligence coverage, however substantial, would be as nothing if through it wars are avoided or accurately predicted so as to permit of proper preparation.

PIAN FOR WORLD-WIDE INTELLIGENCE COVERAGE

Requisitos

As for the actual operation of a world-wide intelligence organization, in my juigmont, the prime requisites are trained personnel, simplicity of structure, flexibility of operations and secrecy.

Personnel.

Intelligence work is a highly specialized task. Effective agents are not developed overnight. But there are trained men in this country in sufficient. numbers to form the nucleus of an efficient organization. These men received their training in the several intelligence agencies which functioned during the last war.

Organization .

I feel that no one agency should be entrusted with the whole task of accumulating the many types of intelligence data - military, naval, economic, political, scientific, counterespionage - and then correlating and evaluating that data. I say this because of the natural human tendency to cover up failures, slant information and concentrate on one particular type of coverage for which the particular agency is most suited to the detriment of the whole. Then too, if several distinct agencies were operating, each compartmentalized in its particular field, we would not suffer such a disastrous blow if one of them should be disabled or rendered ineffective through infiltration or through uncovering of certain of its personnel. Rather I feel that the Army should handle

military espioners, the Navy should have an organization to rather naval data and a third agency should handle what might loosely he termed the civilian phases. These agencies, of course, should cooperate closely, both in the field and at headquarters, to guard against overlapping and to insure complete coverage. I believe that there are already functioning agencies capable of providing this coverage and frankly I see no need to create additional ones. Finally, there should be a separate and independent evaluation and analysis unit to which the three agencies mentioned would funnel all facts gathered. This latter unit would not need and chould not have an intelligence gathering agency of its own.

Secrecy

Gandy

I mentioned that secrecy of operation is essential. This is so because one of the most important assignments of every intelligence agency is to uncover and render ineffective espionage agents of unfriendly countries. To publicize one's organization, methods and personnel is to render the opponent's task ridiculously simple and one's own tremendously more difficult, if not impossible, of accomplishment. In this country, of course, legislative enactments are public records and discussions prior to those enactments necessarily come to the attention of the public. This is well and good and I would not desire it otherwise. This matter of setting up intelligence deverage, however, is in its very nature a special case and I feel that it is to the country's benefit to avoid any une necessary publication. If the plan to use existing agencies presently authorized by Congress, horely permitting them to expand as necessary, should be adopted, it is my opinion that the desired secrecy might be preserved. Oreating a new intelligence

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FALLACY OF SEPARATING DOMESTIC FROM FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE

Another point I should like to make here is that, in my opinion, foreign and domostic intelligence coverage are inseparable and constitute one field of operation. The German-American Bund and the Italian Fascist organizations in the United States originated and were directed from abroad. The Communist movement originated in Russia but operates in the United States. To follow such organizations access must be had to their origin and headquarters in foreign countries, as well as to their activities in the United States. Rearly every major explorage service of foreign countries has operated on a world-wide basis. In order to cope with the activities of various subversive agents in the United States with speed and dispatch, it is entirely evident that their activities must be followed throughout the various countries by one intelligence agency of the United States Government. Valuable time, as well as efficiency and effectiveness, is lost if one agency covers their activities in Europe, another in Latin America and another in the United States.

A PLAN FOR U. S. SECRET WORLD-WIDE INTELLIGENCE COVERAGE

Secret world-wide intelligence coverage for the benefit of the United States Government must have as its primary objectives the providing to the executive branches of the Government basic data on a world-wide scale upon which plans may be formulated and action taken, and the insuring of internal security from the threat of infiltrating foreign agents, ideologies, and military conquest.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has in operation in the Western Hemisphere an intelligence plan based on simplicity of structure and flexibility of operations which has functioned efficiently, secretly, and economically since prior to Pearl Harbor, and has proved its adaptability to world-wide coverage by the effectiveness of its operation in the Western Hemisphere field.

It is proposed that the time-proved program in operation in the Western Hemisphere be extended on a world-wide basis with certain modifications.

The FBI Plan

The FBI plan provides for the joint operation in every country of the world of the Office of Military Intelligence, the Office of Naval Intelligence and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, each as a specialist in its own field and able to operate without a duplication of effort but closely correlating their operations to insure complete coverage.

There would be continued in operation the same operational committee as originally set up by the President composed of the Directors of Military Intelligence, Naval Intelligence and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, with the addition of an Assistant Secretary of State. A committee to control basic policy would be composed of the Secretaries of State, War and Navy and the Attorney General.

A unit for evaluation and analysis would be established in the State Department to which the three operating agencies would furnish intelligence data for appropriate review, analysis, and utilization in international matters. The Office of Strategic Services would no longer be necessary and their functions would be discontinued except insofar as the State Department would take over the evaluation and analysis functions.

Facility of Operation

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The program proposed as already in operation in the Western Hemisphere has proved its effectiveness, requires no elaborate superstructure and the interested agencies have available trained personnel and operating facilities for recruiting, training, and dispatching additional personnel. The plan, consequently, can be placed in operation by the President's merely extending the authority heretofore given to the Directors of Military and Naval Intelligence and the Federal Bureau of Investigation for operation in the Western Hemisphere to operate on a world-wide basis.

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This plan has produced in the Western Hemisphere a maximum amount of information with a minimum of operating personnel and expense, and has not resulted in any embarrassment whatsoever to the United States Government. Its secrecy is assured through the dissemination of the operations among the already existing Government agencies which have previously operated successfully for a long period in their respective fields.

Points for Consideration

Foreign and domestic civil intelligence are inseparable and constitute one field of operation. The German-American Bund and the Italian Fascist organizations in the United States originated and were directed from abroad. The Conmunist movement originated in Russia but operates in the United States. To follow these organizations access must be had to their origin and headquarters in foreign countries, as well as to their activities in the United States. Every major espionage service has operated on a world-wide basis except that of Britain, which has had a separate organization for domestic and foreign intelligence, but Britain is in the process at present of consolidating the two services based on their exporiences through the war period. In order to cope with the activities of various subversive agents in the United States with speed and dispatch, it is entirely evident that their activities must be followed throughout the various countries by one intelligence agency of the United States Government. Valuable time, as. well as efficiency and effectiveness, is lost if one agency covers their activities in Europe, another in Latin America and another in the United States.

The theory that police work and intelligence coverage cannot be conbined has been entirely dispelled. Police arrests under modern police practice is only one of the important functions of a police agency. In fact, all police work specifically involves the gathering of information in the nature of intelligence. Extensive intelligence coverage must necessarily precede the arrest of the enemy agent in the United States and it is not possible to separate the gathering of intelligence from police functions in view of the numerous criminal statutes, such as those relating to espionage and sabotage, which must be enforced by police action although directly concerned with intelligence. One of the major factors in the control of subversive activities in the Western Hemisphere during the war was the coordination of efforts of the various police organizations throughout the United States and Latin America through the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

A hazard in intelligence operation is the possibility of a charge being made that the organization is a "Gestapo." Also, a police agency which engages in intelligence operation may be called a "political police." Both charges are obnoxious to American citizens. The Federal Bureau of Investigation throughout the war has engaged in both police and intelligence activities and its record of protecting civil liberties has been highly praised, even by the American Civil Liberties Union.

Roger Baldwin, Director of the American Civil Liberties Union, in October, 1941, after a trip around the country checking on investigations by the FBI of the flood of subversive complaints then being received, commented to Director Hoover of the FBI, "I have attempted to find out as I have come across the country just what complaints there are concerning those very difficult investigations of what are regarded subversive opinions and activities. I find that your local agents are keenly aware of the delicacy of these inquiries and faithfully reflect the Bureau's policies."

Norris Ernst, Counsel for the Union, stated in a letter, "I am writing to you to let you know that I have yet to hear of a single proven case of violation of the civil liberties (by the FBI). This is close to a miracle."

Peacetime operations of a foreign intelligence service will involve many delicate problems requiring tact, finesse and diplomacy as contrasted to wartime operations which may be on a more or less open and forceful basis. Personnel for such peacetime operations is already available in the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which emphasizes the qualities needed in these operations.



Rees is a leading advocate of strong action against "disloyal" employees in government service, to be based on FBI investigations.

The fight in the Central Intelligence Group shows that the Administration cannot or will not clean house by any other methods, Rees is understood to believe,

The House Un-American Activities Committee has been looking into the backgrounds of some of those involved in the current unpleasantness in U.S. intelligence, it is reported.

The trouble in the foreign broadcast intelligence branch apparently began with a fight between two unions within the organization. RIVAL UNIONS INVOLVED

More conservative employees belong to an AFL union for civil servants, and more liberal employ-ees to a CIO local, affiliated with the United Public Workers of America.



WHEREAS, the UPWA adopted at the same convention a policy which sanctioned strikes against the government and encouraged troop withdrawals from countries occupied by the United States but rejected proposals to withdraw Soviet troops anywhere; and

WHEREAS, the UPWA withdrew its policy to sanction strikes against the nation's duly elected and sovereign power only after Congress in its wrath attached special no-pay riders to appropriations bills aimed at all who asserted this illegal right to strike; and

WHEREAS, by far the majority of Federal employees suffer mental agony and loss of morale when they are assigned to perform their duties in concert with persons so lacking in a sense of responsibility to the high calling of public service that they remained members of this union after its adoption of said policy and officers indicating adherence to the Communist Line; and




