Dear Er. Fitch:

This is in reply to your comments on the last grading cheet regarding the above captioned individual. I appreciate your passing along those contents.

came in to see me today and feels that he would like to continue on in the mechanical drafting as well as in the basic preliminary work which he has been taking in drawing. There are some things which I would like to pass along to you of which you may not be aware.

Up until a year ego wan a severe epileptic and had many scizures. At that time, he had a cranval operation which has helped him considerably. Note recently in the last eight menths, he states that he has had il scizures, one of which was in your class. This is liable to happen on occasion, but not very frequently; and, of course, if the class knows it and you are aware of it, there is no scusen to be disturbed by it. Note serious is probably the fact that he is under medication — barbiturates of one kind or another — under prescription of a doctor to prevent his free having scizures, and this tends to make his operate clowly and, of course, to be drewsy. However, he states that he has never fallen asleep in the class.

Previous to time, he had taken one year of electrical engineering in Havara. He is very serious about learning machine design and is interested in this area. He states that he has never copied a single drawing and has done everything on his own. I also questioned him as to whether he understeed your icctures and what you put on the blackboard, and he states that he does but that he works slowly. I thought that if he could apply more time, that he probably would be able to keep up capier being one who works slowly and drafting being a course based primarily on the amount of time applied. He said that he thought that he could come in about 15 minutes early and do a little work before the class started, but that he could not work at home for lack of instruments and that the room was closed to him except for this 15 minute period.

I appreciate your suggestion about architectural drafting. I feel that if his lighted is a grables, that he will not probably do any botter there than he would in your class. The tate given at the University of Missis, which were given both in in high and in Spanish, indicated that fir, Hernesdez had aptitude for mechanical or architectural drafting, advertising layout work, pattern making, designing, etching, engraving and various beach and craft work. Also, on the Revised Beta Exceptation he secred a rating of 93 which is average to aligntly sub-average. It is felt that his ability and skills are held back considerably by his disability and that otherwise, he would be perhaps above average.

If it is necessary to drop him from the class, of course, this is accepting which is up to you, but we think that he should be given every opportunity considering his interest in the work and his trying to make g go at this.
