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Discussion Setsman Chairman Khrushchev and Mr. Dron Pearson re Lee Harvey Counld

1. This will amplify my telephonic remarks to you on 25 May, during which I informed you that Mr. and Mrs. Draw Tearson had had a MS-minute conversation in Gairs on 2M May with Chairson Mhrushchev.

2. The CIA Chief of Station in Cairo has reported a conversation which he end his wife held with Mr. and Mrs. Drew Fearson in Cairo on 2h and 25 May.

quoted below should be construed as obvioting any desirability the Commission may feel about securing testimony directly from Mr. and Mrs. Pearson. We are forwarding it to you solely for the purpose of placing in your bends at the earliest moment the information which has been provided to us in this privileged fashion.

3. The massage from our Chief of Station in Cairo reads as follows:

"Mrs. Dres Pearson provided on the evening of 2h May the first information on the Cawald portion of the conversation with Chairman and Mrs. Marashchev. Mrs. Marashchev opened the conversation by inquiring about Mrs. Mennedy and expressing concern about and affection for her. Mrs. Pearson reassured her, saying that Mrs. Mennedy had borne up remarkably well and was in good health. (Most of this conversation was in English which Mrs. Marashchev speaks fairly well, with some assistance from Marashchev interpreter, who had served in the past as interpreter for the Pearsons and who helpsd arrange the mesting.) This led into-Mrs. Marashchev' inquiry about their mutual friend, the wife of Chief Justice Warren, and thence into

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memblan of the Warren Casmission. Chalaman Tagashahay then joined the conversation, expressing sorror at the assessimution and also inquired about Mrs. Kennedy. Thereupon he asked his fearson, "What really happened?" fir. Pearson said in effect that the whole effair had taken place just as had been reported in the newspapers and procumply by the Soviet Anhancedor in Machington. Chairman Curushelms was vitorily incredulous and his attitude was characterized by hro. Reareon as being archotypical for every European I have ever talked to on this subject'. That is, that there was some kind of compared to assessinate President Tennedy and then murder the ascausin with the Dallas Police Department being an accessory. Wrs. Pearson got the impression that Chairman Chrushchev had some dark thoughts about the American Right Wing being behind this conspiracy although Chairson Chrushcher did not articulate this in any clear fashion. Hre. Fearson was a bit vague on this point in distinguishing between what Chairman Murushoher said and what she thought he believed. When Mr. Morran said then we Americans are posuliar people, it understandable that foreigners had difficulty comprehending this fantactic cylecie, but in fact Osmid was med, bad acted on his own, ditto halv, Chairman Mrusichev said Clarily that he did not believe this. He said he did rus believe that the American security services were this inept. Ir. Pearson equin said he agreed this was herd to believe but the facts were as they appeared. Mrs. Thrushohev also expressed disballef and reitereted her affection for Mrs. Memody. Mrs. Pearson repeated tint the reaction of Chairson Cornsicher and his wife was one of flat disbelief and archotypical of the universal furopoun balles that there was some kind of American conspiracy behind the assassination of Fredident formedy and the murder of Carald. Chairman and live. Thrushchov could not believe that the affeir had happened as it apparently did and Hr. Hearson made no headway whatever in trying to change their ballef that something was not on the level. Chairman Aurusbehar greated hr. and hre. Pearson's efforts with a tolerant smile. The conversation then drifted into Chairman Enresheder' friendly comments elect President Johnson.

"On the morning of 25 May, Mr. Posseon referred en passant to the Damald portion of the convergation,

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saying that Casiman Thrushchev was completely convinced that the true story of the Econody associantion has not come out. Mr. Teerson said accombat resfully, "I couldn't bake a mickel with Mhrushchev on this one." He gave the impression that Chairson Khrushchev' attitude was one of complete skepticies as to the public version rather than being one of bolding concrete ideas so to exactly that happened.

"On the evening of 25 May, Mr. and Mrs. Pearson, in discussing the Murushehev talk, made another passing reference to the fact that Chairman and Mrs. Murushehev are convinced that the public version of the affair is not true and that nothing they could say altered this belief."
