Here are the things to search for the experts conference:"experts conference" or "experts" or "expert conference" or "expert conf" or whatever other variation the computer will do.You should probably not search individual names Blakey, Slawson, Hoch, Lesar, Newman, Garrow, and Lifton for reasons stated below.I have asked everyone to search their personal paper files on this issue and they have, I presume, diligently done so. Any documents you find on the personal directories are likely to be exempt from the FOIA, but I think you should double-check, just so that we are diligent in our compliance with the statute.When you search names like Lesar, Newman, Lifton, Blakey, etc..., you are going to come up with a zillion non-experts conference documents, because we use their books ALL the time. I don't think it makes sense to do that.What I am most concerned about is the e-mails on the issue - there were a lot of e-mails with ideas for conversation topics for the conference, who should come, etc... Most of these will be exempt from FOIA disclosure, but we definitely have to look at them to find out. Moreover, we should print those and stick them in an "Experts Conference" Subject File so that we can show how we searched for the documents.Finally, there is a document called xpert.not that Kevin and I created and worked on - we already have a hard copy of that, so you don't need to worry about it. I also have Jeremy's file.
