Call: I called DiEugenio on Monday evening June 12, 1995 to follow-up on our May interviews concerning
additional sources of assassination records in New Orleans. He suggested I call Bill Davy and Peter Via who are
working on a project about Garrison. They were in New Orleans quite recently. He suggested we call Romney
Stubbs (home - 504/891-1814), a New Orleans based researcher who has information about the Hale Boggs
papers at Tulane. He suggested we call Art Carpenter, the Loyola Archivist, who has good knowledge about
small records groups in New Orleans area libraries. Carpenter's number is 504/865-3186. He suggested we
contact the Royal New Orleans Collection, located in the 500 block of Royal Street in the French Quarter, for
the files of Information Council of the Americas (INCA). He thinks Clay Shaw's attorney's, the Wegmann
brothers, had ties to the CIA. He thinks Alan Campbell who was a Guy Banister confidant is currently connected
to the CIA through his work for a subsidiary of the Agency for International Development. Campbell moved to
the west coast several months ago. DiEugenio said he is still trying to contact Campbell to arrange an interview
with him. He thinks the Metropolitan Crime Commission (MCC) has records from its 1967-1969 investigation of
Jim Garrison, which was headed by Aaron Cohn. He thinks the files contain Cohn's correspondence with J.
Edgar Hoover, among other items that could be considered assassination records. Robert Buras, the former
HSCA investigator, is now an attorney in Baton Rouge. (I checked this with the Louisiana State Bar Association,
504/566-1600. His correct address is 709 St. Ann Street, New Orleans, LA 70116, 504/522-6327.) (Carlos
Quiroga told me he gave his FPCC brochures and application, the ones he received from LHO in the summer of
1963, to Buras and has not seen them since. Steve Tilley checked with the HSCA artifacts collection, the
brochures are not in the HSCA collection.) Ross Yawkey, a former reporter for the "Louisiana State's Item"
newspaper and a friend of the Garrison investigation may have records from the investigation, if he is still
alive. Hunter Leake was the CIA COS in New Orleans. According to DiEugenio, Clay Shaw reported directly to
Leake. Lloyd Ray, another CIA operative in N.O. had contacts with Guy Banister. DiEugenio urged the Review
Board to push hard to get the New Orleans District Attorney's grand jury minutes from the Garrison case
because a number of witnesses who were called to the grand jury were never called as trial witnesses and
their grand jury testimony is the ONLY record of their statements known to be in existence. Richard Billings
journal at Georgetowne, in the form of an unpublished manuscript, contains a reference to Dr. Silva as one of
