11/27/96 Summary of the Meeting Ms. Carr was interviewed this date at her offices in Ballston, Virginia by Phil
Golrick, in the presence of Doug Horne and Dave Montague. The interview commenced at 10:00 A.M., and
was completed at 11:15 A.M. Mrs. Carr said she worked for NARA from 1963-1970, and said that initially she
was an assistant to the Deputy Archivist (Dr. Rhoads), and later followed him when he became Archivist of the
United States, serving him in that capacity as Programs Assistant to the Archivist. She independently
remembered being present at the November 1, 1966 inventory of President Kennedy's autopsy photos and x-
rays, and that it was held in Room 200-A at the National Archives in the afternoon, and that the meeting
lasted about 2 hours. She also stated that she remembered taking stenographer's notes, in shorthand, on
green stenographer's paper, and that following the meeting she had placed her notes in a brown safe in the
Archivist's office. She had no recollection of photographic images on photographs which were examined, since
she said she made a point of not looking at the photographs during the inventory process, and of focusing
instead on only taking notes. She independently recalled that there may have been x-rays examined, and that
the photographs were probably 8" X 10" format, but could not remember whether the photographs were
color or black-and-white. She could remember that there were some doctors present, and had the impression
that they were not employees of the government. When asked, she could not remember whether or not Dr.
Rhoads was present, and could not specifically recall whether Marion Johnson was present, but said that he
"may have" been there, meaning that it would have made sense to her if he had been, since he was NARA's
custodian of the Warren Commission exhibits. She could remember no specifics or details whatsoever of any
of the conversation held during the meeting, nor could she remember anything she had written down. Her
general recollection of the meeting was not that it was an inventory, but rather that it was convened to see
whether the photographs supported the findings of the Warren Commission. She could not remember
whether or not any representative of the Justice Department was present. She could not remember who
convened the meeting, meaning she did not know which agency or individual had requested the meeting take
place. Document examination:-MD 12 (draft inventory of JFK autopsy photos and x-rays---6 pages, typed-but
unsigned): She said she did not specifically recall seeing this document before, but that the typeface was
identical to that used by her and by those in her office. Her feeling was that it was entirely possible she had
