Houghton Sept. 6, 1960 - (at least through mid 1963)There were also several assistant naval attaches if you want those names.Note: The first dates are the dates they were assigned to the job, not the dates they reported in to the Embassy. It would not be unusual for there to be a 6 month or so gap between the date assigned and the date they actually reported on station.Note #2: According to my father, a former naval attache, neither he nor any of the other attaches kept "personal" files. Everything went into the official files maintained at the Embassy which were passed down from a departing attache to an arriving attache. In his opinion, "personal" files would not have been sent back to the States because: 1) they would not be wanted, 2) they would take up valuable room in the diplomatic pouch, and 3) they would be classified and the individual--moving to another assignment--would have no place to keep them.I hope any of this helps. Good luck.
