Attached to the hardcopy of this E-mail is a 1982 letter to Cong. Peter Rodino from the City of Miami Chief of Police. The Chief references tapes/audiocassettes which the HSCA wanted to listen to but didn't because they were lost and presumed gone at the time of the HSCA's investigation. The Police Department subsequently found them and offered to hand them over to Congress; it appears from the reply sent to Miami that his offer -- coming long after the HSCA shut its doors -- was rebuffed. The generic description of the tapes suggest the Milteer conversations, which are already in the JFK Collection, but perhaps the Chief is referring to something else? I know Anne had been in touch with the Miami Police Dept., but I don't know whether this issue ever arose. It might be worthwhile to send a copy of this letter to the Dept. and ask them if they still have the tapes? It's your call, gentlemen!
