	Called Nancy DenleaSummary of the Call:After resolving confusion over an incorrect telephone number, I
	successfully reached Nancy Denlea today in Los Angeles (her correct number is 310-836-1416). She confirmed
	that her father left no collection anywhere of professional papers, and also said she has no papers or
	documents of any kind which would relate in any way to President Kennedy's treatment or wounds as
	observed at Parkland hospital, or to President Kennedy's autopsy at Bethesda, or to her father's observations,
	or opinions about the cause of death. She elaborated that her father left the few papers he had at her brother
	Richard's house in Colorado, where he thought he would spend the rest of his days; when that arrangement
	did not quite work out as well as expected, she said her father came to Los Angeles to live with her, and ended
	up spending the last year of his life with her instead, but left his few papers at Richard's house. She confirmed
	that she was the executor of her father's estate. She did have two recollections regarding the assassination.
	First, she recalled that her father was asked by the Warren Commission to prepare a written statement, which
	she believes he did, but has never seen. She said her father told her that he was very upset the Warren
	Commission never called him to testify. She also said that her father had once shown her photographs of the
	President's brain, and proudly said that it was her father who had ensured that the brain was saved. (She
	asked whether anyone had found the missing brain, and I said that it had not been found.) Other than these
	two recollections, she could not remember any other statements made, or opinions expressed, by her father
	about the assassination. I asked her if she was aware that her father had spoken with the HSCA, and she was
	not, but was very interested in knowing what he had told them. Since Ms. Denlea did not have a working FAX
	machine at home, and did not have access to one, I next read to her on the phone the Richard Sprague memo
	for file of March 18, 1977, in which he recounts Attorney William F. Illig's claim that Admiral Burkley had
	information indicating that others besides Oswald must have participated in the assassination (HSCA file
	number 000988, record number 180-10086-10295). I asked whether she would be willing to sign a document
	(to be prepared by the Review Board) which would indicate she had no objection to release of attorney-client
	information from Mr. Illig's files relating to this subject, and she said that she would have no problem with
