Subject: Papers of Marguerite Oswald  
Summary of the Call: After receiving an e-mail message from a member of the public regarding these papers and whether or not "the ARRB is doing anything to get into these papers," I called the TCU library. I spoke with Roger Rainwater, who works with TCU library's special collections. He confirmed that the library does have papers donated by Marguerite Oswald (through her son Robert.) The papers are available to the public and he receives frequent requests to see them. There are several boxes (I could not get an exact count) and they contain some letters and cards from people who were "empathetic to her situation," books and magazines related to the Kennedys and the assassination, her copy of the Warren Commission report, and one entire box of newspaper clippings. Mr. Rainwater explained that anything she had of any historical or monetary value was sold, and she donated the remaining items. He is mailing an inventory list. NOTE: He said that he would be happy to "get rid of them" and that at one time wanted to give the collection to the Sixth Floor Museum, but the university's chancellor would not allow it.
