Dear David: Thanks for writing. A consent release is a document that is released by an agency without the document having to come before the Board. The reason it does not have to come before the Board is that it is being released in full based on previous Board decisions. So while past Board decisions have directly affected the status of the document, it does not have to be voted on by the Board. The "Califano Collection" is being released in stages, as there is a lot of material. We will advise all interested parties as they become available at the National Archives. The first batch should be available at the end of this month, and you will be able to receive a select sampling from us. I hope this answers your questions. Eileen

Hi Eileen: From your latest advisory (11/6/97, the one just sent); QUOTE ON: Army and Joint Chiefs of Staff Consent Releases
For the first time, as a result of Review Board initiatives, Army documents and records from the Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS) will be available by consent release. Twenty-one Army documents from the papers of Joseph Califano will be open in full, in addition to 116 JCS documents covering the 1961-1964 period. QUOTE OFF
My questions: 1. You state that JCS material "will be available by consent release". What does that mean? (Must a researcher like myself apply for a "consent release"? Or has ARRB already done that, and what you mean is that they will soon be publicly available?) 2. Re the Califano documents---exactly *when* will they be available, and approximately how many pages are they? Will the ARRB be making copies for the press? (Can I get such a set?) But aside from any press kit material, when will the whole Califano collection be available at the Archives---on what day can one actually show up, look at this stuff, and copy it? I ask because Jeremy sent me an email alluding to this material, and I'd like to know when it will be available for inspection (and copying) at the Archives.
