#### PART D: Derivative Classification Decisions

NASA's numbers of derivative classification (DC) decisions has been reduced from previous years. Through continued performance of the Agency-level Integrated Security Functional Review Program, expanded involvement of the NASA Information Assurance/Industrial Security Program Manager and Center Information Security Specialists, and enhanced training at centers, NASA centers are doing a better job reviewing and reporting documents for discrepancies. NASA Centers have a better understanding of what to report and no longer account for derivative classification decisions made by other organizations.

#### PART F: Mandatory Declassification Review Decisions in Pages

Totals for mandatory declassification for this reporting period declined significantly from the previous year due to the special project being completed in 2014. The Internal Mandatory Declassification Review request in 2014 of 94 boxes of material added significantly to the reported numbers for 2014. NASA has placed significant emphasis in bolstering its training to meet the demands of automatic declassification standards and help reduce NASA's inventories in the coming years.
