This is our final response to your, 27 February 2017 Freedom of Information Act request for the Agency Security Classification Management Program Data SF-311 Forms filled out by our agency for the last three years.

The Air Force Security and Special Programs (SAF/AAZ) reviewed the attached documents and determined that certain information should be withheld under Title 5 U.S.C. § 552 (b)(6) of the FOIA.

Exemption (b)(6) permits the government to withhold all information about individuals contained in a Privacy Act System of records that would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of privacy. Information in personnel and medical files, as well as similar personal information in other files, that, if disclosed to a requester, other than the person about whom the information is about, would result in a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy. Release of information about an individual contained in a Privacy Act System of records is prohibited, and could subject the releaser to civil and criminal penalties. SAF/AAZ is the denial authority in this instance.

Should you decide that an appeal to these decisions is necessary, you must write to the Secretary of the Air Force, Thru: SAF/AAII (FOIA), 1000 Air Force Pentagon, Washington DC 20330-1000 within 90 calendar days from the date of this letter. Include in the appeal, your reasons for reconsideration, and attach a copy of this letter.

- Block 45, # of pages reviewed for discretionary declassification: the increase from 8,500 in 2013 to 43,700 in 2014 can be attributed to Air Force Historical Research Agency (AFRA) gaining more manpower.
- Block 46, # of page declassified under discretionary declassification: the increase from 5,000 in 2013 to 9,699 in 2014 can be attributed to AFRA gaining more manpower.
- Block 47, # of self-inspections conducted: significantly decreased from 19,037 in 2013 to 7,933 in 2014 because Air Force Inspection System policy mandated the reduction of inspections. In 2013 the requirement was to conduct 2 self-inspections per year plus a program review. In 2014 the requirement was reduced to 1 self-inspection per year and the program review could be used to satisfy the self-inspection requirement.



PART B: Officials with Original Classification Authority: We reduced the number of original classification authorities by 8 from FY14. The reduction occurred as a result of a reorganization and a few determined they no longer require this authority during the annual revalidation. A new delegation letter is forthcoming.

PART C: Original Classification Decisions. The number of original classification decisions is approximately 200 less from FY 14. We codified ISOO criteria for counting original classification decisions from FY 14 SF 311 data call. This helped OCAs accurately track their decisions.

PART D: Derivative Classification Decisions. In previous FY reporting, a derivative classifier was defined as any person with access to classified national security information. During 2015 we published our Air Force instruction to implement DoDM 5200.01, DoD Information Security Program. We established a definition that better reflects the derivative classifier population: any person with access to a classified information system or specifically designated by a commander. The definition significantly reduced the population of derivative classifiers, resulting in more accurate reporting.

PART E: Mandatory Declassification Review Requests and Appeals and PART F: Mandatory Declassification Review Decisions in Pages. This year we capture all reporting from our Mandatory Declassification Review (MDR) Office only. In FY 14 data was captured from all major commands and MDR office and we found this to result in duplication of counting of MDR cases, pages, and appeals.

PART G: Automatic, Systematic, and Discretionary Declassification Reviews. This year we captured all reporting from our Air Force Declassification Office staff. These numbers are going to ebb and flow based on volume and number of trained personnel available to conduct the review.

PART J: EXPLANATORY COMMENTS

Items 13, 14, 16, 17 and 18: The decrease in the number of original classification decisions is due to the reduction of security classification guides. Currently, all AF security classification guides are under review as part of the FY17 Fundamental Classification Guidance Review.

Items 20 and 22: The increase in the number of derivative classification decisions was caused by an increase in classified missions, projects, contracts, and source selections from last year. In addition, the new mandated training requirements we codified in late 2015 and this year is the first for using a process that is consistent in tracking derivative classification decisions.

Items 37 and 38: Numbers from the previous years were not properly reported. AF issued a correction to FY15 report to report these numbers correctly as automatic declassification.
