the CIA in February 1967 the National Student Association has shifted its attention to domestic problems. It has practically eliminated its participation in international student politics. In the year ending in February 1968 not one staff member had traveled abroad. NSA has been characterized as having an "established tradition of oral radicalism and physical lethargy". According to a survey made by NSA just under 39,000 students took part in 221
