1. The attached newspaper clippings deal with public statements and reactions of two prominent university administrators in our area to the recent disclosure of this Agency's relationship with the National Student Association (NSA) and the funding of other campus-associated activities.

2. Chancellor William Pearson Tolley, of Syracuse University

... effective fund raiser for the university and a person who commands respect of his board of trustees. This latter body recently allowed him to remain on in his present office until he reaches the age of 70. It normally exercises a mandatory retirement clause on its faculty and staff when they attain the age of 67. Two or three years ago, Chancellor Tolley made national headlines when he "censured" several student anti-Vietnam demonstrators, "protest types" who tried to disrupt the annual President's ROTC dress review ceremonies held on his campus. As these protesters moved on to the field to break up this event, the Chancellor stepped out of his reviewing position and came at several of them with his cane, establishing contact in one reported instance.
