(4) With regard to expenses:


a. Travel costs of the exchangees from the Soviet Union to the United States and return would be borne by the CYO and from the United States to the Soviet Union and return by the USNSA.

b. All expenses of the Russian students in the United States including tuition, room and board, necessary books and a monthly allowance for incidentals of about \$50 would be borne by the USNSA and the CYO would agree to cover reciprocal costs for the United States students in the Soviet Union.

c. The host organizations would be responsible for assisting their guests in arranging special programs for vacations. These programs would be worked out by the exchangees with their host organizations and would reflect as much as possible the individual exchangee's own wishes for a program. Depending on the resources available, the expenses would be borne either by the host organizations or by the students themselves.

We hope that this proposal will provide a useful basis for further discussion between our two organizations. We would suggest that it would be most helpful in our planning if the CYO could indicate as soon as possible whether the general terms of the exchange are acceptable even though it may wish to negotiate further on particular points. In this way, if the CYO decision is favorable, which we should hope it will be, we can begin to receive applications from United States students and make necessary arrangements for receiving Russian students in this country.
