Senator Kefauver called and was transferred to my office 9-2-59. He stated he has a new home located on Lookout Mountain, Chattanooga, Tennessee. His brother-in-law, Paul McQuiddy, received a telephone call Sunday night from an anonymous caller. The caller stated "When Estes comes back there will be sticks of dynamite under his house --- that's for sure." The Senator stated he was somewhat concerned and his wife was very much worried. I asked him if he had notified the Lookout Mountain or Chattanooga Police Department. He at first stated that his family had not done this. He then corrected himself and stated this had been done.

The Senator went on to state that Chattanooga representatives of the FBI had told his family that the FBI would enter this case if the Senator made a personal request of the Director in Washington. I asked the Senator if he had any specifics which might place the case within our jurisdiction. He had nothing other than the above bare facts. I, therefore, told the Senator this appeared to be a matter not within the jurisdiction of the FBI but that we, of course, would keep careful liaison with the police and in the event something came up which indicated FBI jurisdiction we would, of course, act accordingly.

Senator Kefauver desired advice as to whether he should go home over the Labor Day week end or not. I told him this was a decision that he would have to make himself, that from the very minor facts at hand there was no way in which we could tell him one way or another. He agreed with this fact and stated that in the event we received any information concerning this matter he would appreciate very much being advised.

There is attached a teletype from the Knoxville Office dated 9-2-59 which I saw following the conversation with Senator Kefauver. The police have been advised. The Knoxville Office indicates that no action is being taken unless advised to the contrary by the Bureau. It is, therefore, apparent that the Senator is in error indicating that we would enter this case upon his request.

Senator KEFAUVER made the main address at the banquet held during the annual convention of the Tennessee Law Enforcement Officers Association on 8/28/59. Although the above information is attributed to Senator KEFAUVER as having been made during his talk, it was noted that his talk was very brief and did not include any information concerning his plans to introduce a bill to establish a National Crime Commission. The information in the newspaper apparently came from a prepared speech which the Senator did not follow.

Keef Seeks U.S. Compensation for Local Officers

Senator Tells Enforcement Group of Crime Costs

Sen. Estes Kefauver said he plans to introduce measures in Congress that will benefit local law enforcement officers.

Speaking last night to Tennessee Law Enforcement Association at Andrew Johnson Hotel, Sen. Kefauver said one bill he will introduce would extend the provisions of the Federal Employees Compensation Act to cover state and local law enforcement officers.

Under this bill, state and local officers killed or injured while enforcing any Federal law will receive compensation under the terms of the former act.

"With solid and persistent citizens backing, your job will be immeasurably aided—physically, financially and psychologically," he said.

Crime Commission Pushed

Sen. Kefauver said he plans to introduce again in the Senate a bill to establish a National Crime Commission. This organization would act as a clearing house for the various Federal agencies and anti-crime organizations over the country, he said.

"It would study the manner and extent to which organized crime uses the facilities of interstate commerce and evaluate the adequacy of Federal laws dealing with problem," he explained.

"Crime is a cancer that destroys the minds and the souls of its practitioners and extorts severe penalties from all of us," he said.

Cites Cost of Crime

He noted that 3,000,000 crimes will be committed in the U. S. this year, and that \$22,000,000,000 will be spent by local and Federal law enforcement agents to meet this menace. "That's more than half the amount that this nation will spend this year for our national defense," he said.

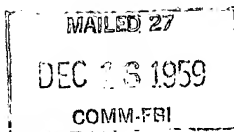

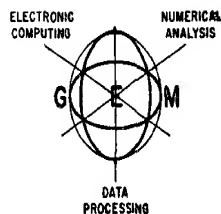

He advised that Senator KEFAUVER is scheduled to speak at a BRT dinner to be held at the Statler-Hilton Hotel on the evening of Monday, February 1, 1960.

Mr. SCHOOOR stated that Senator KEFAUVER is scheduled to arrive at Cleveland-Hopkins Airport at 6:18 PM on February 1, 1960, on Capital Airlines flight #207. He will be given a police escort to the hotel where he is to speak that evening.

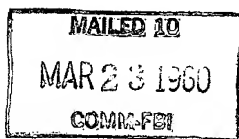

On June 23, 1960, Mrs. O'Donoghue, a secretary in Senator Kefauver's Office called and said that in the Senator's home state there was some talk going around that he was soft on the subject of communism whereas in fact the Senator was anticommunist. She advised that between 1950 and 1954 the Senator had received several letters from the Director concerning the "Communist Control Act" but that they could not find them in their files. She wanted to know if copies could be secured from Bureau files.

Kemper, of course, told her that matters such as this are filed according to subject matter and it might be very difficult to secure copies of the letters without having more details.

A check of the files on Senator Kefauver with regard to correspondence reflects the attached telegrams dated October 7, 1950. This material reflects that Brainard Cooper, Editor of the Chattanooga News-Free Press, telegraphed the Bureau on October 7 and said that Kefauver had voted against the McCarran anticommunist bill on advice of J. Edgar Hoover who said the bill would "disrupt the FBI system of keeping tab on communists."

The Director replied in a telegram to the newspaper that the Director had clearly set forth his position in testimony before the Senate Committee on Appropriations on September 7, 1950, wherein the Director expressed no opinion on the wisdom of having communists register as it was a legislative matter and not a function on which the FBI could comment.

There are approximately 900 references to Kefauver in file and it was necessary to make an extensive check in order to make certain that we did not have any correspondence along these lines. We have now located a letter over the signature of former Assistant to the Director Nichols which covers this subject. The yellow of the letter is attached. This letter points out that the United Press

ticker for March 27, 1952, carried a story out of Omaha that in answer to statements criticizing Kefauver for voting against the McCarron Act, Kefauver had stated that Mr. Hoover had also opposed the bill. The letter states that Mr. Hoover had refused to make any comment one way or the other concerning this legislation.

Dear Estes:

Your letter of July 6, 1960, concerning your stand in connection with the McCarran Act has been received. As you know, as Director of the FBI I have, through the years, maintained a firm policy of avoiding the making of recommendations as to legislation. I have always felt that the FBI, being an investigative agency, should defer matters of legislation to the Department for recommendations and consideration.

In regard to legislation which would affect the Communist Party, it is noted that in testimony on September 7, 1950, before the Senate Subcommittee on Appropriations I was asked a specific question as to what my opinion was regarding the wisdom of requiring the communists to register. I answered specifically that I had expressed no opinion because it was not the function of the Director of the FBI to make any statement regarding pending legislation. I pointed out that this was the function of the Attorney General and the President and that whatever bill Congress passed the FBI would do its best to enforce it.

Going back even further it is noted that on March 26, 1947, I appeared before the Committee on Un-American Activities of the House of Representatives and again I was asked the specific question as to my opinion on outlawing communism. At this time I deferred to the Attorney General pointing out that such recommendations were the function of the Attorney General. I did, however, point out that before any such action was taken it should be given very serious consideration because I felt the communists did not deserve the category of martyrs. I indicated to the Subcommittee that I

As you remember, I voted against the McCarran Act in 1950 on the grounds some divisions of it would make martyrs of communists, and it was not the way you and the Department of Justice thought the matter should be handled. The act was vetoed by President Truman and then in 1954 Senator Hubert Humphrey offered an amendment to the communist controlled bill making it a crime to be a communist even through there was no overt act in connection therewith. I cast the lone vote against this amendment and later on it was accepted by the House-Senate Conference. President Eisenhower, as I recall, and the Department of Justice said this would upset the whole security system and was a violation of our precept of freedom of thought and speech.

I am now engaged in the race for reelection to the United States Senate and my opposition is claiming that I have "coddled" the communists on account of these two votes. I do not, of course, want to bring you into the local campaign. I know you made an expression at the time through the Attorney General and I would appreciate any expression that you can send to me now or any statement by you for or for you through the Attorney General at the time. By letter dated July 6, 1960, from his campaign headquarters, Kefauver stated that he had voted against the McCarran Act in 1950 because it would make martyrs of the communists and because it was the way he thought the Director and the Department of Justice thought it should be handled. He pointed out that the Act was vetoed by President Truman and then in 1954 he voted against an amendment to the Communist Control Bill which would have provided that it would be a crime to be a communist even though there was no overt act. He stated that he cast a lone vote against this amendment and recalled that the Department of Justice said that it would upset the whole security system and was a violation of our precept of thought and speech.

Kefauver continues by stating he is up for re-election and his opposition claims he has coddled the communists. He stated he knew the Director had made an expression at the time through the Attorney General and would appreciate a statement in this regard. He states, "I do not, of course, want to bring you into the local campaign."

A similar request was received on June 23, 1960, from Mrs. O'Donoghue, a secretary in Senator Kefauver's Office. She called the Bureau and wanted copies of letters written to the Senator by the Director between 1950 and 1954 concerning what she termed "the Communist Control Act." She stated she could not find them in their files.

An exhaustive file review failed to reflect any such letters, however, did reflect a letter dated April 1, 1952, over the signature of former Assistant to the Director Nichols which states that "throughout the entire period of discussion concerning the McCarran legislation Mr. Hoover refused to make any comment one way or the other." This letter was a result of a statement on the International News Service ticker that Kefauver stated the Director was opposed to the McCarran Act.

BACKGROUND OF DIRECTOR'S TESTIMONY:

The McCarran Act (Internal Security Act of 1950) was passed over Presidential veto on September 23, 1950. In the period immediately preceding the passage of the Act, the Director consistently adhered to his policy of expressing no opinion. On September 7, 1950, the Director testified before the Senate Subcommittee on Appropriations. Senator Hill asked the Director his opinion on the wisdom of requiring communists to register and if the Director thought it would drive them underground. In response, the Director expressed no opinion because he said it was not his function but the function of the Attorney General. He said if a bill was passed the FBI would do its best to enforce it.

Prior to this time, on March 26, 1947, the Director appeared before the House Committee on Un-American Activities at which time he was asked about laws outlawing communism and whether he favored the legislation. The Director deferred the question to the Department of Justice and stated, "I do think that before any such action is taken it ought to be given very, very serious consideration and study, because I would hate to see a group that does not deserve to be in the category of martyrs have the self-pity that they would at once invoke if they were made martyrs..."

Senator Kefauver may be ^{all}uding to the testimony given on February 5, 1948, by former Attorney General Tom Clark when, in testifying before the House Committee on Un-American Activities, he said as follows; "

"In this connection, I agree with Director Hoover that from a security standpoint it would be best not to outlaw the Party by statute. Let me say here that we should not run the risk of turning radicals into martyrs. It should be our effort at all times to expose to the light of public examination the activities of such individuals rather than by means of restrictive legislation to afford them an opportunity to operate underground."

It is noted that the oral request of the Senator's Office and the Senator's letter are on the same general subject matter but are not exactly the same. It is noted that in connection with the verbal request from the Senator's Office, Kemper called on Mrs. O'Donoghue and advised her that no letters have been located and offered her a copy of Mr. Nichols' letter. She stated that they did not desire a copy of Mr. Nichols' letter and expressed appreciation for our help in the matter.

While Mr. Kefauver states he does not desire to draw the Bureau into the campaign he does, however, ask for the Director's stand in connection with the McCarran Act. 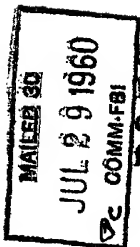

In 1954 legislation was before the United States Senate dealing with the Communist Party in the United States. It is our understanding that the Democrats decided to embarrass the Republicans by making the bill so tough it would be ridiculous, and then daring the Republicans to vote against it.

On the amendment introduced by the Democrats making individuals subject to criminal prosecution if they were members of the Communist Party, as you may recall, Senator Kefauver cast the lone negative vote.

We understand that you subsequently agreed with Senator Kefauver that the amendment would help the Communists instead of hurting them. We also understand the amendment was stricken in a Senate-House conference and that the bill passed in its original form, with Senator Kefauver voting for it.

Senator Kefauver is currently engaged in a campaign seeking to be re-elected to his seat in the Senate. Despite the fact that he has already been re-elected once after casting the vote as outlined above, certain smear-type campaign tactics are being used against him as a result of this matter.

Without becoming involved in any way in the Democratic Primary race now under way in Tennessee, we would appreciate your writing a short letter to us explaining why you opposed the amendment making individual members of the Communist Party subject to criminal prosecution and also why it was stricken in the Senate-House conference.

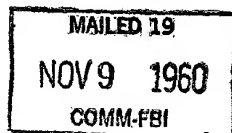

The Memphis Division has forwarded to the Bureau a letter dated February 7, 1961, from Senator Estes Kefauver. In his letter, Senator Kefauver mentioned that he had a number of inquiries from constituents in Memphis and Shelby County about Federal jobs. In this connection he said it would be helpful if he would be furnished a resume of the organization of our Memphis Division, including the number of persons employed and the grade and classification of each.

As of February 10, 1961, we had 49 agents and 28 clerical employees assigned to the Memphis Division. Ordinarily, we would not disclose to an outside individual the organization of a field office and the grade and classification of each employee there because of administrative changes affecting the number of employees employed and the positions filled.

Memphis has recently only requested authority to hire a former Bureau clerk as a replacement for a clerk who has resigned. This reinstatement is being sent through today for appointment to Memphis.

As Senator Kefauver's inquiry is primarily directed at determining what positions are available for his constituents in our Memphis Division, it is believed that he should be advised that our Memphis Division is basically an investigative branch of the FBI and as such, most of its personnel consist of Special Agents. However, we do have a small number of clerical employees in clerical, typing and stenographic positions. In addition, that as a matter of policy, higher clerical or secretarial positions are filled as a matter of promotion by the trained, experienced personnel in each office. It is therefore recommended:

Mr. Malone furnished a telephone report this afternoon of pertinent activities for the first day of the NDAA Mid-Winter Conference. He said that no problems or controversial issues had arisen.

The Conference today consisted only of the permanent committee meetings. Mr. Malone stated that the Liaison Committee, which is the one he has been most closely associated with, has been reappointed by NDAA President Pat Brennan and he has retained Leonard Kardy, State's Attorney, Montgomery County, Maryland, as Chairman. Mr. Malone is well acquainted with Kardy and is able to work very effectively with him. Mr. Malone stated that all members of the Liaison Committee are known to him and no problem exists with any of them. Mr. Malone had reported in an earlier memorandum of 2/27/61 that President Brennan had told him in Atlantic City recently prior thereto that he did not plan to appoint a formal Liaison Committee while he was President of the organization because he felt that Leonard Kardy and Malone were in such ^{close} contact with each other that a committee would be unnecessary. Mr. Malone said that at today's meeting Brennan was informed that he is required under the by-laws to appoint such a committee; hence, he had no choice but to do so.

The only other item of interest reported by Mr. Malone was the fact that Senator Estes Kefauver is scheduled to be the principal speaker at the wind-up banquet set for Saturday night, March 11, 1961. It is not known what subject Kefauver will talk about. Mr. Malone reported, however, that the Executive Committee of the NDAA is considerably irked because they had expected that Kefauver would not require any monetary fee for speaking but now they learned that they are going to have to pay him a \$250 fee which has them all "steamed up."

Reference is made to my memorandum of 3/8/61 reporting some information Mr. Malone had picked up at Tucson to the effect that Senator Kefauver has incurred the disfavor of the Executive Committee of the National District Attorneys Association (NDAA) because they are going to have to pay him a \$250 fee for being a principal speaker at their banquet Saturday evening, March 11, 1961. The Director inquired "Is this in addition to travel expenses."

On 3/10/61, Mr. Malone reported that he has been able to confidentially ascertain the following additional information from [redacted]

[redacted] said that when the Committee invited Kefauver to speak they didn't expect that he would charge anything in the way of a fee. It was not until after they had signed him up that they learned that his bill would be \$500 plus expenses. The Committee decided that they would offer him no more than from \$200 to a maximum of \$250 plus travel expenses. They have not yet heard as to whether he will accept that. [redacted] stated that in any event, they are committed and will have to have him as the speaker, but [redacted] further stated that they do not, under any circumstances, intend to pay him more than \$250 plus travel expenses.

Mr. Malone stated that he tried to find out what Kefauver's speech topic would be, but learned that the Committee was not able to pin him down to a topic. They are comparatively certain, however, that it will be on the subject of Organized Crime.

Mr. Malone is, of course, attending the banquet and will cover this speech.

Pages 7529-7535. Senator Keating, (R) New York, have printed in the Record a series of articles written by Harry Singer and Gerald Duncan entitled "Cancer of Crime" and published in the New York Mirror. Mr. Keating stated "This series highlights in a powerful way the techniques by which modern crime is outwitting obsolete law enforcement. It contains a strong plea for advancing the tools for fighting crime out of the horse and buggy age." One article states "Most law-enforcement people cry: Give us a clearing house of information. But other law-enforcement people say many criminal files contain only rumor and hearsay—that such information can't be made available willy-nilly to other law-enforcement people. 'We can't turn over our raw files,' said Robert Wick, deputy director of the FBI." The last article comments on Federal crime commissions stating "Milton R. Wessel, who in 1958-59 headed the short-lived U. S. Attorney General's Special Group on Organized Crime, told the police panel: 'I submit that statistics showing steady increase in major crimes are incontestable proof that the situation is beyond the control of local police.' In Washington, J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, composed a rebuttal: 'America's compact network of State and local law enforcement agencies traditionally has been the Nation's first line of defense against crime.'" The following was stated in connection with legislation on organized crime: "On February 27 Senator Kefauver said: 'We are still trying to work out something that will satisfy Mr. Hoover.' Last week, Richard B. Ogilvie, who was in charge of Wessel's midwestern office, said in Chicago: 'Hoover was very cool to the whole idea of the Attorney General's special group. He ordered that the FBI files, containing the very information we needed on organized crime, were to be closed to us. Criticizing Hoover is a dangerous thing for anyone to do. But honesty compels me to say that some of Hoover's ideas are sadly behind the times. The FBI is still organized to fight a crime pattern of the twenties and thirties. It is not set up to do battle with the criminal syndicate—the organized conspiracy that drains \$22 billion a year from the United States.'" Original filed in: 66-1431-1762

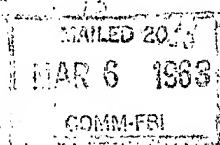

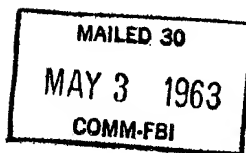

Pages 5237-5239. Congressman Rhodes, (D) Pennsylvania, extended his remarks to include several newspaper articles and editorials paying tribute to former Senator Kefauver from Tennessee. Included in this material was an article written by Jack Anderson entitled "The Fall Man From Tennessee" and published in the Washington Post on August 14th. Anderson, in commenting on legislation introduced in 1954 to outlaw the Communist Party, stated "The Republicans accepted the challenge and lined up unanimously with the Democrats for the bill. Only Kefauver, refusing to play politics, stood against it. - - - But the final rollcall was 81 to 1; Kefauver was the lone dissenter. (Later, the bill was pigeonholed after FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover joined Kefauver in warning that it not only would be unconstitutional but would drive the Communists underground.)"
