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#### Digest of Current Communist Activities

A veteran fronter has been elected president of the National Council of the Churches of Christ. The triennial general assembly of the National Council, meeting in St. Louis, yesterday chose the Rev. Edwin Ta Dahlberg to head the organization for the next three years.

Mr. Dahlberg, a St. Louis Baptist pastor, was formerly president of the American Baptist Convention. His support of Communist causes extends over a period of 15 years.

In April 1942, Mr. Dahlberg was affiliated with the Citizens // Committee to Free Earl Browder, an organization cited as "Communist" and subversive" by the Attorney General of the United States. Earl Browder, general secretary of the Communist Party, USA, was then serving a prison sentence for perjury in connection with his possession of a false passport.

Under date of April 22, 1943, Mr. Dahlberg joined a group of Communist fronters in signing an open letter to President Roosevelt protesting an order for the deportation of Harry Bridges as an alien Communist.

According to a letterhead of the organization dated March 26, 1946, Edwin T. Dahlberg was a sponsor of the National Committee to Combat Anti-Semitism. Various Jewish groups warned that the National Committee to Combat Anti-Semitism was a Communist-front organization.

A few years ago, while the Yugoslav Community and Tito was still a satellite of the Soviet Union, a group of American clergymen was invited to that country with all expenses paid by the Communist government. At least five of the seven clergymen who

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comprised the delegation which visited Yugoslavia were known members of the Communist Party or veteran collaborators with Communism in the United States. They were: Claude Williams, William Howard Melish, Guy Emery Shipler, Emory Bucke, and Phillips Packer Elliott. Claude Williams and William Howard Melish were members of the Communist Party. The delegation brought back a report which was a complete whitewash of the Tito Communist regime. This report was printed and distributed under the sponsorship of a group of Protestant clergymen which included Edwin T. Dahlberg.

According to the Communist Party newspaper, The Worker, July 24, 1949, Edwin T. Dahlberg was one of the organizers of the Washington Conference on Peaceful Alternatives to the Atlantic Pact. This gathering launched the Communist-front organization which was known as the Committee for Peaceful Alternatives to the Atlantic Pact.

Under date of Jamuary 19, 1951, an open letter was addressed to Congress by the National Committee to Repeal the McCarran Act. Mr. Dahlberg was listed as an initiating sponsor of this organization. The McCarran Act whose repeal was sought by this Communist-front organization was the Internal Security Act of 1950. According to the Daily Worker, July 9, 1952, Mr. Dahlberg signed an open letter to the Republican and Democratic parties under the auspices of the National Committee to Repeal the McCarran Act. Again, according to the Daily Worker, July 27, 1953, Mr. Dahlberg signed an open letter to President Eisenhower under the auspices of the National Committee to Repeal the McCarran Acts. It should be noted that the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952 was added to the Internal Security Act of 1950 as one of the measures whose repeal was sought in an

extensive propaganda campaign of the Communist Party and this particular front organization.

The most active Communist-front organization of the present is known as the Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell.

According to this organization's publication of August 1957,

Edwin T. Dahlberg was a signer of an appeal on behalf of the

Communist espionage agent, Morton Sobell, who is now serving a 30
year prison term in Alcatraz for his part in the Rosenberg espionage case.

Mr. Dahlberg's record of collaboration with the Communist apparatus places him among the leading Communist fronters who are clergymen. In choosing Mr. Dahlberg to head the organization for the next three years, the National Council of Churches has followed the precedents of the old Federal Council of Churches which numbered among its presidents such well known Communist fronters as the late Bishop Francis J. McConnell and Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam.

### GUT FOR PUBLICATION, DISTRIBUTION, OR RELEASE WORK Papens-3

Local, state, national and international political and sociological programs of the National Council of Churches and World Council of Churches seem to enceed other denominational efforts during 1957.

For that reason it is important to emphasize that leadership people of the National Council of Churches and leaders of NAACP are closely interlocked and are both using local churches, denominational programs, Sunday school papers, and other church literature for propaganda purposes. Martin luther king was one of the four principal speakers scheduled at the current Tri-annual Meeting of the National Council of Churches.

Of the 162 names connected with the 1957 letterhead of NAACP (front und back), 83 are names of individuals with Communist affiliations.

The Committee of 100 of NAACP has 89 members. 70 of these 89. including Methodist Teaders, have records of Communist affiliation.

We are not discussing sociology, we are talking only about subversion and the exploitation of church facilities. During 1957 the greatest effort in subversion in the United States is in the race field with the religious explolitation feature as the glaringly outstanding phenomenon.

# Church Council Elects C. P. Taft

Charles P. Taft of Cincinnati was elected in St. Louis thursday as one of eight vice presidents-at-large of the National Council of Churches. The Episcopal layman, and until recently Cincinnati's mayor, formerly was president of the National Council's predecessor, the Federal Council of Churches.

Elected to the presidency of the NCC for three years was Dr. Edwin T. Dahlberg. 64, pastor of Delmar Baptist Church, St. Louis, a congregation affiliated with both the American (Northern) and Southern Baptist Conventions. Formerly head of the northern Baptist body, he is the first Baptist ever to head the co-operative organization of 30 Protestant and Orthodox denominations.

Circuit Riders is an organization of Methodist laymen whose purpose is to combat communist infiltration among members of the clergy Lowman has been in frequent contact with the Bureau since 1983 during which time he has furnished voluminous material concerning communism. (62-99405)

### The Author

Edgar C. Bundy is a former Air Force officer who lectures extensively before church and patriotic groups. His lectures deal mainly with communism and he has been consistently critical of the Federal Council of Churches. In 1956, he was a consultant to the Anti-Subversive Commission of the American Logien and in that year he also testified before the Senate Subcommittee on Internal Security. In 1954, Bundy deliberately misled the Bureau in attempting to obtain a Bureau speaker for a purely political meeting and the Chicago Office was instructed to be most circumspect in future contacts with him.

The basic theme of the book is that "Marxian Socialists, under the guise of Christianity, took over the machinery of the major Protestant churches in this country lock, stock, and barrel." Bundy also claims that the National Council of Churches (which, he claims, evolved from the Federal Council of Churches) has developed into an "ecclesiastical octupus" and has become, in effect, "literally a political party operating within the framework of whatever legitimate political party happens to be in power." Bundy asserts that the National Council of Churches claims to speak for all Prostestants on a variety of social, political, and economic issues, both national and international, but never submits these issues to the "men and women in the pows" to determine their views.

Bundy also claims that the National Council of Churches "has captured strategic posts within the United States government." He offers as proof of this claim the fact that Secretary of State Dulles; Harold Stassen, former Special Assistant to the President; Arthur Flamming former Director, Office of Defense Mobilisation, and Alger Hiss have all held high positions in the Federal or National Council of Churches. In Bundy's view, the culmination of this "impregnable interlock" between the United States Government and the National Council of Churches was the success of the Council in "ensuaring" President Elsenhower into attending a meeting of the World Council of Churches at Evanston, Illinois, in 1954, which was also attended by ministers from Czechoslovskia and Hungary. (pp. 63, 64, 231)

Bundy claims that successful communist infiltration into seminaries and theological schools "furnished the Soviet apparatus with a machine which was used as a religious cover for the overall Communist operation ranging from immediate demands to actually furnishing aid in espionage and outright treason." However, the only proof he offers for this sweeping allegation is to cite the communist front affiliations of Dr. Marry Ward, well-known Soviet apologist; Bishop G. Bromley Omam, and various other officials of the Federal and National Council of Churches. This information is documented by Bundy entirely from public source material. (pp. 128-138)

Bundy mentions the Bureau on page 135, describing it as "the private detective agency of the Department of Justice." The Director is mentioned on page 137 as supporting Bundy's view that the communist movement still enjoys considerable support in the United States. Bufile 100-50869 reflects some derogatory information concerning the Federal and National Council of Churches, much of which was received from rival church groups. Investigation, confined to contacts with informants of the New York Office, developed no indication of communist domination. The Bureau followed activities at the meeting of the World Council of Churches. Evanston, Illinois, in 1954.

### OBSERVATIONS:

Bundy's opposition to the Federal and National Council of Churches appears motivated by the fact that the views of these organizations on various issues of national and international interest are at variance with his own. Even Circuit Riders, which is distributing 100 copies of his book, felt it necessary to point out that while the statements in Bundy's book pertaining to the communist front affiliations of the individuals mentioned therein are "correct, in so far as they go... we are not disposed to, nor do we feel qualified to, comment authoritatively upon some of the other phases of this work." Since all of Bundy's information is derived from public sources, it is not felt that any further action is required by the Bureau.







# Action Taken On Lutheran Merger Plan

CHICAGO, March 22 (AP) — in Representatives of four Lutheran Church bodies took steps here to broaden their merger plans to include all Lutheran groups in the United States.

The 46-man Lutheran Unity Commission extended an invitation to the other 12 Lutheran groups to join a "more comprehensive organic union."

Represented in the commission P are the United Lutheran Church in America, the Augustana Lutheran Church, the Finnish Evangelical Lutheran Church and the American Evangelical Lutheran S Church.

Proposals similar to that suggested here were rejected recently when the National Lutheran council met in Atlantic City, N.J. The majority of Lutheran groups are council members, and three of them outside the present discussions are expected to complete their own organic union by 1960.


During its three-day meeting, the commission approved plans for the church's proposed theological seminaries, and decided to ban pastors from belonging to secret orders. These actions removed major merger obstacles commission spokesmen said.


The four-way merger would create a single three-million member church.

The commission plans to reconvene in Chicago Nov. 6-8.

### Poland to get LWR aid

Seven years ago Lutheran World Relief halted shipments of food and clothing to Poland. The Red regime had prevented free distribution of such supplies by the land's churches, relief officials said.

This month Bernard A. Confer, LWR executive secretary, announced that a "more relaxed attitude" on the part of the Polish government made it possible for the agency to resume aid to Poland's Lutherans. An estimated 200,000 Lutherans remain in Poland, he said, a decrease of one million since 1939. Their numbers continue to dwindle, but 400 congregations are still served by 106 pastors.

A shipment of 25 tons of clothing will be made in the near future, Mr. Confer revealed. Distribution will be made through the Polish Ecumenical Council, co-operative organization of Protestant and Old Catholic churches.

Announcement of the resumption of Polish relief followed the annual meeting of the inter-Lutheran agency's board of directors. Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, president of the United Lutheran Church and of the Lutheran World Federation, was re-elected LWR president.

### Help for South Africans

Another Lutheran arm extended in a different direction this month. Dr. Carl E. Lund-Quist, executive secretary of the Lutheran World Federation, said funds for pastors and building programs had

been pledged to Lutheran groups in the Union of South Africa.

The aid will be used to establish English and Afrikaans-speaking congregations. The first pastor will be sent to Welkom in the Free State this month. Other congregations are planned later for Durban and Johannesburg, Dr. Lund-Quist said. Pastors will be sent from Germany, Norway or Sweden, but plans include future training for clergy at a South African seminary, he said.


### Second plea sent to Hungary


Primates of the four Scandinavian Lutheran State churches (Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Finland) had in January sent a joint letter to Janos Horvath, president of Hungary's State Office for Church Affairs. In it they expressed concern over restrictions on Hungary's Lutheran Church, especially the ousting of Bishop Zoltan Turoczy in its northern district and the demotion of Bishop Lajos Ordass, who had been head of the church. State appointee Lajos Veto had replaced Bishop Turoczy and had been recognized by the state as the leader of the entire church.

In reply, Mr. Horvath had called church affairs an internal concern of Hungary, but expressed the opinion that conditions had "in recent weeks" improved.

On Feb. 21 the northern churchmen sent a second letter to the Hungarian official. Unity of the church demanded that they speak out when basic Christian

treatment," the statement said. "They are especially in need of pastoral care and the divine love which the church can bring to them." Alcoholism is a serious threat to health and happiness as well as a source of instability in families and communities, the pronouncement said.

Although 175 members attended the meeting, the vote on the statement was 75 for, two against, and three abstaining.

### Clean bargaining urged

"Both employers and employees" have the right to organize for collective bargaining, the board's labor pronouncement said. It reported that "employer-employee collusion in matters of prices and trade practices" has brought about abuses in labor-management relations and urged both groups to show a "compelling sense of responsibility for the public interest." Faithful observance of agreements and peaceful settlement of differences were asked.

Another resolution strongly supported U.S. economic aid and reciprocal foreign trade policies "in the light of our Chris-

tian obligation to care for our neighbors throughout the world."


### Africa's doors may close

The chance for expansion of Christian work in Africa may soon come to an end, Dr. Roy G. Ross, NCC general secretary, told the board. Observations during his recent tour of Africa revealed that growing nationalism made African nations eager to terminate their dependence on western missions and missionaries, he said. They still wanted help in their educational and literacy programs, he added.

Splinter divisions of Christianity in Africa were a "cause for apprehension," Dr. Ross continued. He said that in South Africa alone more than 1,000 separate groups call themselves Christian. With literacy programs enabling millions of African natives to read, he urged the churches to strengthen their educational and evangelistic work while the opportunity still remained.

The board decided to advance the date of the next General Assembly to Dec. 4-9, 1960, to avoid a conflict with

the meeting of the World Council of Churches now scheduled for December, 1961. Most of the NCC's member churches also belong to the World Council. The NCC Assembly will be held in San Francisco.

### Says Lutherans are changing

The Lutheran Church in America is "in a state of ferment" and is "bristling with new ideas with which to adorn an unchanging faith," an article in Look by Hartzell Spence declares.

Citing current Lutheran mergers and referring to the intensive evangelism program carried on during the past few years, Mr. Spence continues, "The entire denomination has come alive, as though it suddenly decided to make good President Theodore Roosevelt's 53-year-old prophecy that Lutheranism is destined to become one of the two or three greatest churches in the United States."

The article, in the April 1 issue of the

magazine, includes pictures of Dr. Fry and of the historic Trappe Church, near Philadelphia. Unswerving emphasis on the "New Testament Gospel and on the thesis that man is naturally sinful, constantly in need of God's forgiving grace" plus brisk up-to-the-minute methods of evangelism have been responsible for U.S. Lutheranism's gain of 1,716,592 members between 1946 and 1956, Mr. Spence says.


### Merger documents revised


Conventions of the three churches planning to unite in 1960 into the American Lutheran Church will this year be required to act on 250 additions, deletions and amendments to the constitution, by-laws and articles of union of the new church. The American, Evangelical and United Evangelical churches will be asked to rubberstamp the changes, since further alterations would require more action by the other bodies.

that body's Manpower Commission suggested at a Chicago meeting. Noting that the shortage of pastors is likely to get worse before it gets better, the commission asked district presidents to study the proposal. It noted also that an increasing number of pastors is being called into general work, adding to the shortage in congregational pulpits.

A "definite need" for general and specialized training of laymen to fill new positions for full-time church work was stressed by the commission. It recommended that the church's seminaries provide "opportunities for lay training in addition to the present program of theological training."

"If the shortage of pastors makes us utilize our lay people, history may interpret this shortage as providential," said Dr. A. C. Schumacher of Madison, Wisconsin, commission chairman.

Atom scientist to be pastor

A nuclear scientist who once paid little heed to religion will become a Lutheran pastor in June. Dr. Harold R. Lohr, former research specialist for the Atomic Energy Commission, will be ordained by the Augustana Church at Jamestown, N. Y., on June 22 after graduation from the seminary at Rock Island, Illinois.

The 38-year-old scientist "wasn't much concerned about any church relationship" in 1950 when an evangelism visitor from Grace Lutheran Church, La Grange, Illinois, called at his home. The visitor was a Ph.D. in chemistry. His approach appealed to the Lohrs, who joined the church one year later. Dr. Lohr became a Sunday school teacher, usher, and a member of the church council.


Asked to address the congregation one Sunday on how Christ can change a man's life, Dr. Lohr used as an illustration the experience of Dr. O. V. Anderson, nuclear physicist at Oak Ridge who became an Episcopal priest. "I saw the parallel in my own situation," he said. "I learned that a man could use his mind in religion and that there was room in the church for one who asks questions."


### Church asks Cuban peace

The Cuban regime of Dictator Fulgencio Batista has been disrupted by a rebel group led by Fidel Castro which holds the eastern end of the island. Beside intermittent fighting which has disrupted the island's economy, the rebels have recently filtered into the capital city of Havana. They have showed their power by kidnapping the favored driver in a popular auto race, destroying the checks in the reserve bank, burning of sugar warehouses and similar pranks.

Early this month the Roman Catholic

hierarchy on the island called for free elections and establishment of a "government of national union." The declaration caught the Batista regime by surprise and foiled a later presidential order that it be not printed or broadcast.

Spokesmen for the Castro rebels said they did not want any "ecclesiastical interference" in Cuban politics. Batista declared that he would remain in office regardless of any elections. However, the Revolutionary Directorate (one of the groups aiding rebel activity), civic and labor organizations heartily endorsed Cardinal Arteaga's views. Only Batista's resignation could bring about a peaceful solution, the Directorate said, adding, "Our fervent desire is that God and Jesus Christ will illumine the despot and make him understand that only by this path can a new spilling of Cuban blood be prevented."

### Tolerance seen gaining

Tolerance is growing in the world to-day, both toward specific religions and toward agnostics and atheists. A United Nations commission believes. A Study on Discrimination in the Matter of Religious Rights and Practices has been issued by a subcommittee of the UN Commission on Human Rights. The study, prepared by Arcot Krishnaswami of India, a Hindu, noted that state interference in the observance of religion is the greatest source of discrimination today. Avowed purpose of the commission is to eradicate religious discrimination throughout the world.

The report, based on information gathered from 30 nations, urges five freedomin religion—to maintain religion, to change religion, to manifest religion, to disseminate religion, and to associate with

symbol visible in the center background


fellow-believers. Instances of discrimination noted include treatment of conscientious objectors to war, lack of legal recognition for some religious marriage ceremonies, religious processions on public highways, and taxation of religious property, among many others. No religion or country is specifically named.


Only major objection to the study came from the Soviet Union's committee member, who opposed the clause that "certain philosophies of new ruling classes in certain countries of the world affect the religious freedom not only of the minority but also of the majority."

### And so forth

Enrollment in Roman Catholic parochial schools in the District of Columbia doubled in the last ten years. Total for January, 1958, was 46,868 compared with 22,762 at the same time in 1948.

LWA funds are used to provide for the international emergency programs of the National Lutheran Council and Lutheran World Federation. Included are service to refugees, help for younger churches in mission areas, service to military personnel, and various relief programs.

### Hungary Reds reward church

With Communist - approved leaders again in high church posts, relations between Hungary's Lutheran Church and the regime of Premier Janos Kadar have been "normalized," Janos Horvath, head of the State Office for Church Affairs, said last month. As a sign of this "normalcy" Presiding Bishop Lajos Veto, who had been put into office by the Reds in December, pledged that the church would recognize "the divinely ordained supreme authority" of the state. The government thereupon agreed not to put into effect a threatened 25 per cent cut in the church's funds.

Similar fund cuts for Roman Catholic, Reformed and Jewish churches had also been revoked when they promised to support the Red regime. The Lutheran Church, Hungary's third largest with 500,000 members, was last to fall into line.

Veto pledges loyalty

The pledge said, "The church recognizes the revolutionary workers' and peasants' government and its divinely ordained supreme authority and will educate believers in a spirit of obedience toward the state's supremacy." It assured support of efforts to "build socialism" and

urged "peaceful co-existence" between the church and the Communist regime. It also condemned "all efforts, both within and without, to disturb the country's inner peace."

Signers were Bishop Veto; Erno Mihalyfi, government-appointed general inspector of the church, and Horvath. Notably missing from the document was the name of Bishop Lajos Ordass, who still heads the church's southern district.

In Vienna, Lutheran spokesmen for the Austrian Church scoffed at the document as a "deal imposed on the church and signed by the Communist collaborators." They said it "does not express the views of the Lutheran faithful in Hungary."

Veto, presiding bishop of the church during the Stalinist regime of Matyas Rakosi, was put back into office by the Red regime in December. He replaced Bishop Zoltan Turoczy, a former Red prisoner, who had three times been elected to office by church conventions. The Hungarian government also chose to recognize Veto as presiding bishop in place of Bishop Ordass.

### Ordass faces new attack

Pressure against Bishop Ordass appeared to be building up as his activities continued under close government scrutiny. Further changes in the leadership of the southern diocese might be needed for a "good relationship between church and state," the Jan. 19 issue of Evangelikus Elet, Hungarian church paper, reported. The paper announced that requests from the church had led the government to withdraw special commissioner Karoly Grenak from the northern diocese of Bishop Veto, but that he would continue to supervise the work of Bishop Ordass in the southern diocese,

A Budapest daily last month charged Bishop Ordass with making "anti-Com-

munist addresses after his return from a visit to the United States." Bishop Ordass had been keynote speaker at the Lutheran World Federation Assembly in Minneapolis. He was elected vice president of the LWF, a post he had also held in 1948 prior to his eight years of imprisonment and house arrest under previous Hungarian Communist regimes.

### Churches aid UN program

It may never have happened before. A Protestant church organization has loaned a government agency \$100,000.

Church World Service, relief agency of the National Council of Churches, made the advance last month to the United Nations Refugee Fund. The money will be used to help resettle some of the White Russians who had been bottled up in Communist China or Manchuria since the Red revolution 40 years ago. About 1,200 will be resettled immediately in Australia or Brazil. group now stranded in.


More than 10,000 of the Russians have been resettled through the efforts of religious or intergovernmental agencies during recent years. —Heard a plan for "roving service pastors" to minister to isolated military units in outpost positions.



#### New address in Philadelphia

After a week of moving and getting settled, most United Lutheran Church boards and agencies in Philadelphia were comfortably quartered this month in the new building constructed by the Board of Publication at 2900 Queen Lane, in the Germantown section. It will be known as the Muhlenberg Building—the same name as that of the former headquarters at 1228 Spruce Street in Philadelphia's center city.

Dedication ceremonies took place on Monday, March 10, in the chapel of the new structure. Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, ULC president, preached. The service was conducted by Dr. F. Eppling Reinartz, ULC secretary. Dr. H. Torrey Walker, executive secretary of the Publication Board, read the lessons.

Carillon music played as the dedicatory procession moved across the large circle in front of the main entrance. At the door, keys to the building were presented to Fred Konemann of Washington, Publication Board president.

#### A "radial hemicycle"

The new Muhlenberg Building is arcshaped with four extending wings—architecturally a "radial hemicycle." It contains 160,000 square feet of office and storage space—approximately twice that of the former building. It is situated on a 16-acre plot. About 350 staff members and employees of the boards and agencies will be working in the building, which is

owned and will be operated by the Board of Publication.

Beside the Board of Publication, offices now in the building include those of the boards of Parish Education and Deaconess Work, United Lutheran Church Women, Luther League of America, and the Ministerium of Pennsylvania, as well as the editorial offices of The Lutheran. The Board of Pensions will move its offices to the Queen Lane address in late spring.


#### NCC warns on alcohol


Policy statements on collective bargaining, economic aid to foreign lands, and problems of alcoholism were adopted by the 250-member General Board, policymaking arm of the National Council of Churches, as it met in New York on Feb. 26. Presiding was Dr. Edwin Dahlberg of St. Louis, who had been elected president at the NCC General Assembly last fall. Charles C. Parlin, Methodist layman and New York attorney, was chosen vice chairman of the General Board.


The pronouncement on "The Churches and Alcohol" resulted from a two-year study by a 15-member committee chaired by Dr. Harold C. Letts, United Lutheran churchman. The statement acknowledged differences of conviction on the use of alcoholic beverages among the NCC's 34 member communions. Council tables Reinartz plea

The president's report at the annual meetings of the National Lutheran Council usually doesn't get much attention. Commissioners at this month's Atlantic City session felt that Dr. F. Eppling Reinartz's plea for all-Lutheran union was an exception that demanded some reply. They set a precedent in naming a special committee to study it.

With seven of the eight member bodies well advanced on two separate roads to merger, commissioners were in no mood to "sabotage" these efforts. With little dissent, they approved the committee's decision that the Reinartz proposal was "constitutionally outside the competence" of the council. The committee recommended that the president's suggestion should be "received and spread on the minutes as an expression of conscientious convictions to which we have listened with respect and attention."

#### All-Lutheran meeting planned

Though organic union may be distant, world conditions make it urgent for Lutherans to strengthen their co-operative efforts, Dr. Paul C. Empie, executive director, told the commissioners. The council adopted his proposal to call a meeting of representatives of all 16 U.S. Lutheran bodies to discuss present and future programs "in the light of contemporary ecclesiastical and international developments."

This kind of discussion can be carried on without compromise of doctrinal prin-

ciples, Dr. Empie declared. He called the church's "visible disunity paraded before the world" a major hindrance to its effective witness. The meeting would consider whether the pattern of Lutheran co-operation in the U.S. provides "an adequate means for meeting to the utmost our responsibilities in witnessing to the Gospel," he said. The "changing picture" because of mergers, the increasing role of the Lutheran World Federation, and the need for effective co-ordination with other Protestant churches could also be considered, he suggested.

Largest group outside the council is the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, which works with the council in ministry to military personnel, overseas relief and refugee projects.


Colleges called pagan


"A new era of pagan religiosity" is arising among college students, according to Dr. Donald R. Heiges, head of the council's Division of College and University Work.

Students are no longer "searching for the answers to ultimate questions," he asserted. "Crowding our campuses now are hundreds of thousands of students who have no questions, or whose questions move only on the plane of a lucrative career and comfortable family life." To meet this pagan challenge, Christian witness by students, professors and administrators is increasingly necessary, he claimed.

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
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
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COVER PICTURE. Students stream out of chapel at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota March 5, 1958

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

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
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

#### Ordass misses meeting

The first vice president was absent as officers of the Lutheran World Federation met last month at Frankfurt, Germany. Bishop Lajos Ordass of Hungary, who was recently deposed from his position as head of the Hungarian Lutheran Church by a decree of the Communist government, did not attend. Bishop Ordass was reported to have retained his place as head of the church's Southern District, although Bishop Zoltan Turoczy of the Northern District was replaced by Bishop Lajos Veto, a supporter of the Red regime. The government recognizes Bishop Veto as head of the entire church.

LWF officers and West German newspapers expressed fears that the Communist government had prevented the bishop from leaving Hungary. The Budapest radio took notice of the reports, saying that Bishop Ordass had never applied for an exit visa and that "anxiety about his whereabouts expressed at Frankfurt was unfounded."

Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, United Lutheran president and also head of the LWF, presided at the Frankfurt meeting.

#### Peter gets high state post

Dr. Janos Peter, ousted former bishop of the Hungarian Reformed Church, has been named first deputy foreign minister of Hungary, the Budapest radio reported. A controversial figure in Hungary's church life since he was placed in office by the Reds in 1949, Dr. Peter was a delegate to the United Nations last year.

In 1956 the Reformed Church demanded Peter's resignation as bishop. He was called the "worst kind of Stalinist" and accused of being a Red agent and an "informer" against his fellow clergymen in Hungary. During his hectic seven-year tenure as bishop, Dr. Peter had represented Hungary's churches at meetings of the World Council of Churches and at Communist-sponsored gatherings in Europe and Asia.

#### **Emperor thanks American churches**

A U.S. churchman had an unusual hour-long audience with Emperor Hiro-hito of Japan last month. The emperor received Dr. R. Norris Wilson, executive director of Church World Service, the relief agency of the National Council of Churches, in order to express his thanks to the American churches for aid given Japan since the end of World War II.


The Japanese ruler also praised American church efforts to aid Japanese emigrants who have settled in Brazil. He commended such people-to-people contacts as the "surest hope" for promoting understanding among the nations.


Japan's Health and Welfare Minister Kenso Horiki also expressed gratitude for the aid given by American churches. "I feel confident that Christianity is an essential factor in the relief of human needs," he was quoted as saying.

#### Russians accept bid

Representatives of the Russian Orthodox Church will meet with officials of the World Council of Churches in Denmark this summer, Dr. Franklin Clark Fry announced to the WCC's executive committee in London this month. Dr. Fry is chairman of the executive committee and also of the Central Committee, governing body of the WCC.

The meeting will be "in the nature of a first exploratory consultation to exchange information and get acquainted," the United Lutheran president explained. "We have looked forward for two years to this new opportunity to discover ways in which fellowship in Christ may be shared by those who profess him even in the midst of drastically differing historical situations."

#### Co-operation sought

No momentous decisions could be expected from the Denmark meeting, Dr. Fry added. Discussion would center on "ways in which the churches can cooperate and help one another more effectively to witness to Christ and serve freedom, justice and peace in the world."

The Orthodox Church and other Russian church bodies are not members of the world body. Conversations between WCC leaders and officials of the Moscow Patriarchate had been scheduled for Paris in January, 1957, but were delayed at the Russians' request. Contact with Russian churches was established several years ago when a delegation from the

National Council of Churches of the U.S.A. visited the Soviet Union. The visit was later returned by a Russian group.

#### Reds harass churches


Protestant churches in eastern Europe are finding the going "more and more difficult," Dr. W. A. Visser 't Hooft, general secretary of the WCC, told the London meeting. In East Germany the situation was "very discouraging," he reported. Red officials have cut off contact between the zone's churchmen and those outside, he said. Political accusations have jailed several pastors who have refused to give wholehearted support to Communist programs.


being subjected to increasing pressure at the hands of a Communist government, Dr. Visser 't Hooft continued. He stressed especially the plight of Bishop Lajos Ordass, vice president of the Lutheran World Federation and a onetime member of the WCC Central Committee, who had been forced to give up his office as presiding bishop of the church. Dr. Ordass reportedly had been permitted to continue as bishop of the church's southern district, however.

Assembly may be postponed

Actions of the executive committee included a recommendation to the Central Committee which will meet in Denmark in August that the next regular WCC Assembly be postponed until Christmas,

1961. It is now scheduled for Ceylon in 1960. The delay would allow more time for completion of merger plans with the International Missionary Council.


The committee also voiced concern over the "tragically inadequate response" of governments in support of United Nations Relief and Works Agency programs. The failure would lead to "human suffering" and "disastrous political repercussions," the committee warned.

#### Hungarian says things are better

Concern over Hungarian Communist pressure upon the Lutheran Church and especially upon its leader, Bishop Ordass, led the Lutheran primates of Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Finland to address a protest to the Hungarian government. Although speaking for the world's Lutherans, the message was signed by the Scandinavian leaders since they would be most likely to get a reply. Signers were Bishop Yngve Brilioth of Stockholm, Bishop Johannes Smemo of Oslo, Bishop Hans Fugelsang-Damgaard of Copenhagen, and Archbishop Ilmari Johannes Salomies of Turku.

In reply, Janos Horvath, head of the State Office for Church Affairs in Hungary, said relations between the Red government and the Lutheran church have "considerably improved" in the last few weeks. Failure of "certain leaders" to "conform" to an agreement between the church and the government had caused

the situation to "deteriorate temporarily," Mr. Horvath said. He failed to make any mention of Bishop Ordass, whose deposition from the top spot in the Hungarian church followed his reported reluctance to okay all government policies.

The Communist official characterized the Scandinavians' letter as "interference," saying that "anything that happens within the Lutheran Church of Hungary is the internal affair of the church and of our country."

German opposition stiffens

Communist Party members in East Germany should sever their connections with the church and prevent their children from taking part in religious ceremonies, the Red organ Neuer Weg demanded last month. At the same time, the central committee of the East German Communist party urged a close check on all clergymen to make sure they were supporting the government's "peace policy." Party members were told to report promptly any "deviations" from Red ideology noticed at church services or other religious gatherings.

Protests continued against the harsh

sentence meted out to the Rev. Siegfried Schmutzler, Protestant chaplain at Leipzig University, who got a five-year jail term for alleged "counter-revolutionary activities." Student groups and church councils asked East German President Wilhelm Pieck to re-examine the case. Meanwhile, Pastor Schmutzler was reported being held in isolation at the jail for political prisoners at Torgau.

Seven Protestant students at Weimar University, charged with collaborating with Student Pastor Martin Giersch who is now serving a 14-month sentence for "slander" against the East German government, were this month given prison term of from seven to nine months.

#### Mixed marriages reported

Six per cent of the married couples in the United States have different religious faiths, the Census Bureau estimated as the result of its sampling last year of U.S. religious affiliation. The test revealed that 96 per cent of all Americans consider themselves associated with some religion. About 79 million are Protestant, 30 million Roman Catholic, and four million Jews (see chart).



A careful study of the individuals involved in present-day pacifist activity in the United States reveals an extensive interlocking and overlapping of personnel between: 1) the leadership of of the Federal-National Council of Churches, 2) the non-Communist pacifist leaders, 3) the Communist "peace" organizations, and 4) the Communist-front apparatus generally.

A chart of 25 clergymen (picked arbitrarily) and their past and present affiliations with the Federal-National Council of Churches, with the non-Communist pacifist groups, and with the Communist-front apparatus will graphically portray the interlocking and overlapping of the personnel of these groups 12 3

In the chart which follows, an "X" in @5 Pmeans that the Individual has been officially connected with the Federal or National Equncil of Churches. An "X" in column (2) means public affiliation with the Church Peace Mission. An "X" in column (3) means that the individual is or has been recently affiliated with the Fellowship of Reconciliation. An "X" in column (4) means that the clergyman is

affiliated at the present time with one of the organizations now operating under the name of Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, branches of which have been set up in a number of cities. An "X" in column (5) means that the clergyman was affiliated with the Communist organization which was known as the Mid-Century Conference for Peace. An "X" in column (6) indicates affiliation with the Committee for Peaceful Alternatives to the Atlantic Pact. An "X" in column (7) means that the clergyman has been affiliated with pro-Communist projects or fronts other than those of columns (5) and (6).

To take a single example, it is indicated on the chart that the Rev. Dr. Edwin T. Dahlberg, currently the president of the National Council of Churches, has public affiliations with the Church Peace Mission, the Fellowship of Reconciliation, the Committee for Peaceful Alternatives to the Atlantic Pact, and with sundry other Communist projects and fronts.

The chart shows that 20 of the 25 clergymen whose records are indicated have been officially connected with the Federal-National Council of Churches. Twenty-three have been affiliated with the Church Peace Mission. Fourteen are officially connected with the Fellowship of Reconciliation, the largest non-Communist pacifist organization in the United States. Nine of the 25 are currently affiliated with the Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy (column 4). Thirteen of the 25 were sponsors of the Communist outfit known as the Mid-Century Conference for Peace, according to column (5). Thirteen of the 25 clergymen were affiliated with the Committee for Peaceful Alternatives to the Atlantic Pact (column 6). And all of the 25 have had affiliations with Communist organizations or projects other than those which are represented by columns (5) and (6).



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#### **FOREWORD**

719 of the officers whose names appear on the rolls of The National Council of Churches—Federal Council of Churches, have records of Communist affiliation. The names of many of these persons have appeared more than 100 times each in public support of pro-Communist or Communist projects, fronts and publications.

An even 50% of the names on the December, 1957 list of secretaries of local and state Councils of Churches affiliated with The National Council of Churches have public records of supporting pro-Communist projects, fronts and publications.

Until 1950 The National Council of Churches was known as Federal Council of Churches. Criticism of the socialistic, pro-Communistic, collectivist and other un-American activities of the Federal Council of Churches over a prolonged period had caused a loss of financial and moral support . . . a similar reputation has been earned under the new name.

Ownership-control of the copyright title to the Revised Standard Version of the Bible by The National Council of Churches, has reportedly provided a fabulous royalty income to The National Council of Churches. This income makes the small management and leadership group free and independent of millions of Protestants in the local churches, who would not support a national and international political-economic emphasis in any association of churches. The conduct of a small leadership group which claims to speak for Protestantism has become repugnant and offensive to a vast number of Christian laymen and ministers.

# REVISED ST DARD VERSION OF THE BIBLE—

### NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

In a brochure issued by the National Council of Churches, the story of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible is set forth.

Included in this story are the names of 95 men who have been officially connected with the project. Thirty of these men have been affiliated with Communist and pro-Communist fronts, projects, publications, and enterprises. This represents a very high degree of pro-Communist activity on the part of the men who have given us the revised Bible.

These thirty men who have been Communist fellow travelers in one form or another have been affiliated with 90 different Communist and pro-Communist projects, fronts, and publications. They date from the early 1930's up to 1958.

Merely to list the Communist affiliations of these thirty men, together with a brief sketch of the nature and significance of each affiliation, would require a substantial booklet.

Included among these thirty fellow travelers are some veteran supporters of Communist causes; for example, W. Russell Bowie has been affiliated with 29 different Communist enterprises, Leroy Waterman with 25, Fleming James with 22, Henry J. Cadbury with 13, George Dahl with 13, William Y. Bell with 10, Frederick C. Grant with 8, Luther A. Weigle with 6, and Millar Burrows with 5. The remaining individuals have had fewer than five such affiliations each.

In a recent brochure, the Division of Christian Education of the National Council of Churches has summarized the story of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible which for the past six years has outsold all so-called best selling books.

In its brochure, the National Council of Churches has listed the names of the Revision Committee and the Advisory Board. The following members of the committee and board have been affiliated with fronts, publications and other enterprises which have aided and abetted the cause of Communism in the United States:

The foregoing list of members of the Revision Committee and Advisory Board represents a high degree of Communist infiltration into the apparatus of the National Council of Churches which presided over the Revised Standard Version of the Bible. In the pages which follow, the name of the Communist front or other Communist enterprise is underlined, and the names of the Bible Revision Committee and Advisory Board are given together with a brief statement of the Communist character of some organizations or enterprises with which they were connected.

American Committee for Democracy and Intellectual Freedom. Established on Lincoln's birthday in 1939, the announced purpose of this organization was the "preservation and extension of democracy and intellectual freedom." The Daily Worker of February 13, 1939, featured the event with a front-page display. Franz Boas, chairman of the American Committee for Democracy and Intellectual Freedom, had a record of affiliation with Communist enterprises which clearly marked him as a conscious collaborator with the Communist conspiracy. George Dahl and Leroy Waterman were among the supporters of this Communist enterprise.

American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born. The ACPFB is the oldest unit of the Communist apparatus still in existence in the United States. It was originally organized in the early part of 1924 at the explicit direction of the second national convention of the Workers (Communist) Party of America. In the early years of its existence, the ACPFB was known as the National Council for Protection of Foreign Born Workers, with local councils in large cities where there was a concentration of the foreign born. Walter Russell Bowie, Arlo Ayres Brown, and Leroy Waterman, were among the supporters of this Communist organization.

American Committee to Save Refugees. In a letter dated October 27, 1941, calling for an emergency relief conference, the American Committee to Save Refugees announced its cooperation with the Exiled Writers Committee and the United American Spanish Aid Committee. The House Committee on Un-American Activities cited the American Committee to Save Refugees as one of a "series of Communist enterprises which have dealt with Spain and the Spanish Civil War." W. Russell Bowie and Leroy Waterman were supporters of this Communist organization.

American Committee for Yugoslav Relief. This organization was cited as "subversive and Communist" by Attorney General Tom Clark. The House Committee on Un-American Activities described the organization as a Communist front whose "collection of funds for 'relief' was only incidental to and a cover for its propaganda activities in behalf of the Communist regime in Yugoslavia." According to the Daily Worker of April 26, 1947, Millar Burrows was an endorser of the American Committee for Yugoslav Relief.

American Committee for Non-Participation in Iapanese Aggression. This Communist organization was closely allied with the American Friends of the Chinese People, cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities and the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee. The House Committee on Un-American Activities reported as follows: "It is clear that the American Committee for Non-Participation in Japanese Aggression was closely interlocked and interrelated with the American Friends of the Chinese People, the China Aid Council, and the Washington Committee for on completely parallel lines and in full cooperation." W. Russell Bowie was a sponsor of this Communist organization.

American Friends of Spanish Democracy. In a special report of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, it is stated that "in 1937-38, the Communist Party threw itself wholeheartedly into the campaign for the support of the Spanish Loyalist cause, recruiting men and organizing multifarious so-called relief organizations... such as Professor George Dahl was a signer of a letter of this organization, petitioning Congress to lift the embargo on arms shipments to the Spanish loyal-

American Rescue Ship Mission. This organization was cited as Communist and "a project of the United American Spanish Aid Committee" by Attorney General Tom Clark. The House Committee on Un-American Activities said, in its annual report of 1946, that the American Rescue Claims as to the amount of money necessary to charter a ship to bring Spanish refugees from the Bible Revision Committee, was a sponsor of this Communist enterprise.

American Round Table on India. This was a Communist propaganda organization which functioned in 1941. Its secretary was Robert Norton, a well-known member of the Communist Party. Its chairman was Guy Emery Shipler, prominent fellow traveler, who has been called "the Red Dean of America." Sidney A. Weston, of the Bible Revision Advisory Council, was a member of the American Round Table on India

Appeal for Amnesty for Eleven Communist Party Leaders. The title of this Communist project is self-explanatory. Eleven top Communists were convicted for conspiring to advocate the overthrow of the United States government by force and violence and sentenced to prison terms of five years. Fleming James, of the Bible Revision Committee, was a signer of the amnesty appeal for these Communist Party leaders.

Brief Amici Curiae for the Communist Party. In September, 1955, a brief amici curiae was filed on behalf of the Communist Party with the U. S. Supreme Court, in the Party's appeal against the decision of the Subversive Activities Control Board. Three hundred and sixty Communists and fellow travelers signed this brief. Among them was Professor Leroy Waterman of the Bible Revision Committee. It would require several pages merely to enterprises with which Professor Waterman has been affiliated.

Brief Amici Curiae for Morton Sobell. Professor Leroy Waterman, of the Bible Revision Committee, signed this brief which was filed with the U. S. Supreme Court on behalf of Morton Sobell who is now serving a 30-year prison term for Communist espionage, in Alcatraz. Sobell was convicted in the trial of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

Citizens Committee to Free Earl Browder. While he was general secretary of the Communist Party, U. S. A., Earl Browder was convicted for perjury in connection with a false passport which he had used. The Communist Party organized one of its biggest propaganda drives during World War II to secure Browder's release from the federal penitantiary in Atlanta. The vehicle of this propaganda was the Citizens Committee to Free Earl Browder, by the Attorney General of the United States and ties, Two of the men officially connected with the

Bible Revision Committee, William Y. Bell and W. Russell Bowie, were supporters of this Communist enterprise to free Browder.

Committee for Peaceful Alternatives to the Atlantic Pact. In a special report on the Communist "peace" offensive, the House Committee on Un-American Activities named this organization as one of the important units of the international "peace" offensive of the Kremlin. Four of the men officially connected with the Bible Revision Committee were affiliated with this committee; namely, George Dahl, E. G. Hoff, Fleming James, and George V. Schick.

Melish Brief Amici Curiae. One of the stormiest episodes in American church history has centered in the person and Communist activities of William Howard Melish, pro-Communist clergyman of Brooklyn, N. Y. On January 11, 1951, a brief amici curiae on behalf of Melish was filed with the U. S. Supreme Court. Among the signers of this brief were W. Russell Bowie, George Dahl, Frederick C. Grant, and Fleming James, all of whom have been officially connected with the Bible Revision Committee. Bowie and Grant were also signers of 1958 brief on behalf of Melish.

The Protestant. Known in its beginning (1938) as the Protestant Digest, this magazine was the personal propaganda medium of the pro-Communist clergymen who followed the Kremlin line under the editorial leadership of one Kenneth Leslie. In his book entitled Apostles of Discord, Ralph Lord Roy (a left-wing clergyman from Union Theological Seminary) correctly observed that The Protestant "carried a strong hint as to its future policy" in its first issue in which Kenneth Leslie wrote as follows: "Is it not possible for both Christians and Communists, instead of condemning each other in their mutual weakness, to contribute the best they have and work for the common good?" That should have been sufficient warning to non-Communist and anti-Communist clergymen to give Leslie's magazine a wide berth. Nevertheless and notwithstanding, this Communist-line monthly magazine was able, at the peak of its influence, to claim the support of several thousand clergymen, including the following men who have been officially connected with the Revised Standard Version of the Bible of the National Council of Churches: John W. Beardslee, Jr., William Y. Bell, W. Russell Bowie, James Moffatt, and Luther A. Weigle.

Fellowship of Reconciliation. This so-called pacifist organization has been characterized by a socialist orientation throughout its history. Approximately three-fourths of its currently listed personnel have been supporters of the Communist-front apparatus. The Fellowship of Reconciliation in the United States is an affiliate of the International Fellowship of Reconciliation which is officially on record as urging its members in the national affiliates to join "political movements which aim at the replacement of private capitalism by a system of collective ownership." William E. Berry, Arlo Ayres Brown, and Henry J. Cadbury have been affiliated with the FOR.

Churchman Associates. This group represents leftwing and pro-Communist clergymen who follow the leadership of the Rev. Guy Emery Shipler, a Protestant Episcopal clergyman whom the New Leader has described as "the Red Dean of America." The Churchman Associates is organized to support Shipler's magazine The Churchman, a monthly magazine which has been a vehicle for the Kremlin line for many years. The following clergymen who have been officially connected with the Revised Standard Version of the Bible have been affiliated with the Churchman Associates: John W. Beardslee, Jr., W. Russell Bowie, Frederick C. Grant, Robert M. Hopkins, and Paul C. Payne.

National Federation for Constitutional Liberties. This Communist organization was launched at a conference held in Washington, D. C., in June 1940. For some years, it was one of the most important of the units in the Communist-front apparatus. The House Committee on Un-American Activities has the following to say about the NFCL: "There can be no reasonable doubt about the fact that the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties-regardless of its high-sounding name—is one of the viciously subversive organizations of the Communist Party." Attorney General Francis Biddle described the NFCL in the following language: "Part of what Lenin called the solar system of organizations, ostensibly having no connection with the Communist Party, by which Communists attempt to create sympathizers and supporters of their program." The following clergymen connected with the Revised Standard Version of the Bible had affiliations with the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties: William Y. Bell, W. Russell Bowie, Henry J. Cadbury, George Dahl, Frederick C. Grant, and Leroy Waterman.





### REPORT ON THE CAMPAIGNS TO DESTROY THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES

With the convening of the First Session of the 86th Congress on January 7, 1959, certain subversive and left-wing organizations in the United States are expected to launch vicious attacks against the House Committee on Un-American Activities (HUAC) for the avowed purpose of terminating the Committee's existence. Activities of several of these groups which have been mentioned in previous issues of the <u>Firing Line</u>, while strikingly similar in purpose, do not all reflect origin from a common source.

One of the major organizations initiating an abolition campaign is the left-wing American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) and its Southern California affiliate. Foundation for the latest ACLU attack against the HUAC was actually laid on February 19, 1958, when the ACLU's national organization petitioned the Supreme Court of the United States "to rule conclusively that the House Un-American Activities Committee has no right to inquire into a person's political beliefs and associations." The ACLU statement was in support of LLOYD BARENBLATT, a former Vassar College psychology instructor, who appealed a contempt of Congress conviction. BARENBLATT was cited for contempt following his appearance before the HUAC on June 28, 1954, based upon his refusal to answer numerous questions regarding alleged membership and activities in the Communist Party. (See ACLU, "Civil Liberties," March 1958, page 1.)

Following his conviction, BARENBLATT appealed to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia. When the Court of Appeals upheld BARENBLATT's conviction in January 1957, he promptly took his case to the Supreme Court. On the basis of the Court's decision in the JOHN T. WATKINS case, the Supreme Court remanded the BARENBLATT case to the Court of Appeals for reconsideration on June 24, 1957. For a second time, the Court of Appeals on January 16, 1958, upheld BARENBLATT's conviction. Shortly after the ruling, the ACLU joined in a second appeal to the Supreme Court on which there has been no decision to date. (See HUAC, Annual Report, 1957, page 10; "The New York Times," 3-31-58, page 16; and "The Washington Daily News," 11-18-58, page 14.)

According to the ACLU, "the significance of the Union's petition (in the BARENBLATT case) lies in its request that the high court rule that its decision last June (17, 1957) in the WATKINS case specifically prohibits inquiry by the Un-American Activities Committee into political beliefs and associations. The WATKINS decision, in a case also supported by the ACLU, reversed a contempt conviction because the witness was not informed of the nature of the inquiry and the 'pertinency' of the questions concerning Communist associations. However, it also criticized the Committee's 'exposure'

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of persons accused of Communist ties and the vagueness of the term 'un-American'." In announcing the ACLU had "assumed primary responsibility" for the BARENBLATT case in February 1958, ACLU Executive Director PATRICK MURPHY MALIN "said the Union hoped the Supreme Court would 'finally determine the unconstitutionality of the Committee's (HUAC) mandate'." (See ACLU, "Civil Liberties," March 1958, page 1.)

On July 31, 1956, MALIN stated the ACLU "believes that the letter and spirit of the First Amendment make the mandate of the HUAC unconstitutional or unwise, or both. That has been the Union's belief ever since the Committee was established in the late Nineteen Thirties...So this is the time to urge that no Committee with such a mandate should be appointed when the new Congress convenes next January (1957.") An ACLU brief filed with the Supreme Court on September 6, 1958, on behalf of BARENBLATT directly challenged the authority of the HUAC. The ACLU brief asserted that the HUAC "lacks authority to conduct any investigation or to compel testimony...(and) that the Committee violates due process and unconstitutionally tries to restrain freedom of belief, expression and association protected by the First Amendment." (See "The New York Times," 10-27-58, page C-29.)

#### ENTER ACLU OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

Supplementing the national ACLU's spearheading attack against the HUAC is the probing flank movements of its Southern California affiliate. The September 1958 issue of The Open Forum, a monthly organ of the Southern California ACLU stated it had filed a \$20,000 damage suit in the Ninth United States District Court charging that the HUAC "is an illegal Committee of Congress." The suit was on behalf of DONALD WHEELDIN and ADMIRAL GEORGE DAWSON, who had been subpoenaed by the HUAC to appear before Committee hearings scheduled to commence on September 2, 1958. The complaint asked the Court to "quash the subpoenas issued to WHEELDIN and DAWSON pending a hearing on the legality" of the HUAC.

According to The Open Forum, WHEELDIN and DAWSON "claim they would be 'publicly accused of disloyalty, adjudged guilty without a hearing, and rendered unemployable' if forced to appear before the Committee. WHEELDIN left the Communist Party because of 'fundamental differences with it,' but would not be a 'cooperative' witness before the Committee. DAWSON also would not be a cooperative witness." It is noteworthy that the September 1, 1958 edition of the National Guardian reflected WHEELDIN was a former employee of the People's World, "the official organ of the Communist Party on the west coast." (See HUAC, Guide To Subversive Organizations and Publications, 1957, page 100.)

The Southern California ACLU, at its Legislative Action Conference held at Baces Hall, 1528 North Vermont, Los Angeles on November 15, 1958, launched a month-long petition campaign urging 17 California Congressmen "to offer at the opening of the 86th Congress a resolution to eliminate the Committee on Un-American Activities from the list of Standing Committee's of the House of Representatives." On the basis of the Southern California ACLU's total membership of 4,000, every member was asked to secure 25 signatures to meet the petition campaign goal of 100,000. ALAN BARTH, who has been an ACLU National Committeeman since 1952, was the keynoter at the aforementioned Conference. Currently on leave as a "chief editorial writer" for the Washington Post and Times Herald, BARTH was identified in the March 15, 1954 Firing Line as a severe critic of the FBI. In addition to "mailing out

petitions to its own members," the National Guardian of November 24, 1958, page 1, reported the Southern California ACLU "has asked other organizations and individuals to do the same." The Los Angeles edition of the People's World, dated November 15, 1958, page 3, stated "one organization to announce immediate support and assistance was the Los Angeles Committee to Preserve American Freedoms (accurately known as the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms), whose central aim has been the outlawing of the Un-American Committee and similar state inquisitorial Committees." MRS. DOROTHY MARSHALL is the Citizens Committee's Chairman and FRANK WILKINSON is the group's Executive Secretary. (See "The Open Forum," November 1958, page 1.)

Both MRS. MARSHALL and WILKINSON described the Southern California ACLU "petition campaign as 'the most important development in the country' in the move to end the 20-year reign of the un-Americans (HUAC.") Accompanied by a letter, MRS. MARSHALL reportedly mailed ACLU petitions to "5,000 homes" in that State. In its report entitled, "Operation Abolition," dated November 8, 1957, the HUAC stated the "major adjunct of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee (ECLC) in the California area is an organization designating itself as the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms." Full disclosures concerning the activities of the ECLC, an identified Communist-front, have appeared in recent issues of the Firing Line. (See HUAC, Guide To Subversive Organizations and Publications, 1957, page 38.)

On August 13, 1958, the House of Representatives cited WILKINSON for contempt of Congress and forwarded his case to the Department of Justice for possible prosecution. This action stemmed from WILKINSON's uncooperative appearance before an HUAC hearing in Atlanta, Georgia, on July 30, 1958. WILKINSON has been identified as a member of the Communist Party. HUAC Chairman FRANCIS E. WALTER stated on August 8, 1958, the HUAC "had information that WILKINSON is 'the guiding light' of the ECLC, and had been designated by the Communist Party to manipulate that Committee and some of its affiliated organizations." According to an ECLC mimeographed letterhead, dated August 12, 1958, WILKINSON "amicably" left the employ of the ECLC prior to August 1, 1958, however, "remains a member" of the ECLC's National Council. (See "The Evening Star," /Washington, D. C./ 8-14-58, page A-21.)

During September 1958, the Southern California ACLU inserted "political advertisements" in five Los Angeles newspapers attacking the HUAC for conducting hearings in that city. The ACLU statement was signed by 98 individuals who urged that letters of protest be sent to Members of Congress. In addition to the ACLU sponsored petitions and letter writing campaigns, the Communist Party and its 600 fronts are obviously very actively engaged in similar projects to attempt to abolish the HUAC during the 86th Congress. It is reliably reported the Communist Party, "making use of their fellow travelers and dupes, plus their 'united front tactic, '...can have 50,000 letters on any issue sent to Capitol Hill or the White House inside of 72 hours." As a Legionnaire or as another patriotic American who has wholeheartedly endorsed the effective anti-subversive efforts of the House Committee on Un-American Activities - What are you going to do to counteract these intensified abolition campaigns?

#### ON THE RELIGIOUS FRONT

Several pronouncements of the Fifth World Order Study Conference held in Cleveland, Ohio, in November 1958 have been strongly repudiated by certain Protestant clergy, laymen and other God-fearing, thinking Americans.

Sponsored by the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., 500 delegates to the World Order Study Conference unanimously urged that Communist China be granted diplomatic recognition by the United States and admitted to the United Nations. Other statements adopted by the Conference called for "stronger efforts should be made to break through the present stale-mate and to find ways of living with the Communist nations. Sometimes this is called 'co-existence,' but we are concerned with something more than the minimum meaning of the word. Our relationship with the Communist nations should combine competition between ways of life with cooperation for limited objectives, our resistance to Communist expansion goes with recognition of the fact that Communist nations as nations, have their own legitimate interests and their own reasonable fears. We should avoid the posture of general hostility to them and cease the practice of continual moral lectures to them by our leaders."

These statements were part of a 5,000-word document entitled, "Message to the Churches." It is interesting to note that the entire statement was prepared by a 23-member Conference Committee "headed" by the REV. DR. JOHN COLEMAN BENNETT, Dean of the Faculty of the undenominational Union Theological Seminary of New York City. Readers will recall that certain views of DR. BENNETT appearing in the August 15, 1953 Firing Line are seemingly similar in vein to some of the aforementioned pronouncements adopted by the World Order Study Conference. At the close of the Conference, REV. DR. EDWIN THEODORE DAHLBERG, President of the National Council of Churches, stated: "It is to be hoped that our Government and the United Nations will take to heart the message and findings of this Conference." A report on DR. DAHLBERG's background was contained in the January 15, 1958 Firing Line. (See "The Evening Star," /Washington, D. C. 7, 11-22-58, page B-13; "The New York Times," 11-22-58, page C-8; and "Firing Line," 12-1-58.)

On November 22, 1958, both REV. DR. DANIEL A. POLING and REV. DR. NORMAN VINCENT PEALE issued strongly worded statements repudiating the Conference pronouncements regarding Communist China. DR. POLING said he believed "that this action misrepresents my Protestant faith. With every influence that I have, I repudiate it...I maintain that this resolution represents only the men who endorsed it and not the Protestant community of the United States ... Certainly the National Council of Churches...must accept full responsibility for this action." DR. PEALE declared he was "one minister who is completely opposed to recognition of Communist China and the admission of that ruthlessly totalitarian government to the councils of nations." According to DR. PEALE, "were this government to recognize Red China, the millions living under Communist tyranny would feel completely abandoned and in despair would give up all hope of resistance. Communist power would sweep over the entire Far East and creep nearer to us across the Pacific." (See "The New York Times," 11-24-58, page C-32; and "The Sunday Star," /Washington, D. C./ 11-23-58, page A-10.)

Speaking before the Conference prior to the adoption of the controversial pronouncements, Methodist Bishop G. BROMLEY OXNAM claimed "too much of our policy is based on fear of Communism rather than faith in freedom - 'let the hysterical stay under the beds as they search for the Communists...'" On December 3, 1958, the General Board of the National Council of Churches disclaimed responsibility for the Conference's resolution in Communist China. (See "Cleveland Plain Dealer," 11-19-58; and "The New York Times," 12-4-58, page C-19.)

I regret, therefore, that I am unable to comply with your request for information.

I am sure you will understand the necessity for this policy and will not infer from my inability to be of assistance that we do or do not have in our files the information you desire.

The FBI does not maintain a list of organizations such as you have mentioned in your letter. The Internal Security Division of the Department of Justice, however, does maintain a list of organizations which have been designated by the Attorney General pursuant to Executive Order 10450 (the Federal Employees Security Order). It is suggested that you may desire to obtain this list of organizations by submitting your request to the Subversive Organizations Section, Internal Security Division, United States Department of Justice, Washington 25, D. C.

Bufiles reflect certain derogatory information concerning the Federal Council of Churches, later incorporated into the National Council of Churches of Christ in America. However, much of the information came from rival church groups. Investigation limited to contacts with informants in New York City in 1950 reflected no information indicating any communist or subversive influence on the part of any persons affiliated with the group. (100-50869)

Edgar C. Bundy is a lecturer who tours the country speaking on communism before church and patriotic groups. He claims to have formerly been an Air Force intelligence officer.

The Bureau receives numerous inquines concerning his current activities. His book "Collectivism in the Churches" has been previously brought to the Bureau's attention. It contains numerous allegations that the National Council of Churches was heavily infiltrated by communists and other un-American groups. (62-104576)

#### NOTE ON YELLOW:

Council of Churches who are members of communist front organizations and a list of ministers in church seminaries who are also members of communist front organizations. She also requests the Director comment concerning the above book by Bundy. Correspondent implies there is some question in her mind as to the authenticit of "listings from the F.B.I." It is not clear from her letter whether is referring to the Attorney General's list or some listing in Bundy's book and, if the latter, she does not indicate to what portion of the book she refers. The book contains no list identified as "from the F.B.I."

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

#### NOTE ON YELLOW:

Correspondent discusses a controversy in her church over the recent dismissal of the pastor. She claims she can get no information from the presbytery as to the reasons he was fired. She also refers to literature issued by the American Council of Churches which alleges the National Council of Churches is infiltrated with communists. She requests to be advised whether this allegation is true, whether many leaders of the National Council of Churches belong to Red fronts, whether the American Council of Churches is infiltrated with Reds, how her group can help fight against it and whether she and her friends should pull out of the Enderain Council of Churches. She also mentions that they are considering establishing a separate church.

Although we have not investigated either the National Council of Churches or the American Council of Churches, it is not believed we should so advise the correspondent due to the controversial nature of the National Council of Churches and many allegations that some of its officers have had CP front associations. The Bureau should not become involved in this local church controversy and it is believed a files confidential reply will best serve the Bureau's interest in this matter since the correspondent will probably use the Bureau's letter in the local controversy.





### AN ACT OF FORGIVENESS

Leader: The enemies of our nation and our religion.

Response: O God, forgive those who have offended us.

Leader: The thoughtles no have unconsciously hurt us and indifferent who have ignored us.

Response: O God, we forgive all these who have wronged us and we ask thee to forgive them too. Help us to blot these offenses out of our memories.

### A Unison Prayer:

Almighty and eternal God, we ask thee, also, to forgive us our sins. As we have forgiven those who have hurt us, so we ask thee to forgive the hurt that we have caused others. Forgive us especially for the duties we have shirked and the good we have left undone. Forgive us for the unkind words we have spoken and the unworthy thoughts we have welcomed. Forgive the resentment we have felt at deserved rebuke, and forgive the excuses we have made for ourselves but have been unwilling to allow for others. We ask thee to honor the honesty of our sorrow for our sins. Amen."(4)

#### COMMENT

(These excerpts emphasize and encourage widening of any gulf which may exist between parents and youths, or may promote or suggest the idea that a gulf exists when none actually does. If there is any merit in these teachings they should be directed to parents and not to youths.)

"......We seem to feel that we cannot trust God with our personal lives; yet we continue to scheme to 'get to the top'. 'God helps those who help themselves' we say; but this may be just the opposite of the truth."

"We cannot trust God in international affairs it seems. We are lost we think unless we have more atom bombs, and longer range guns, and more soldiers than anybody else in the world. Actually this is the thing that makes everybody afraid of us and brings the threat of war nearer." (1)

"We live in stirring days. Choices made today may determine your own future, and the future of our nation and the world. Will we have a secure economic order, or some rich and many very, very poor?" (1)

"Nations as well as individuals have to face the consequences of their sins. If a nation is far more interested in getting rich than it is in the faat that people are suffering all over the world; if a nation supports policies of discrimination which deny the aspirations for freedom that people have; if it treats other people as inferior and boasts of its own achievements; if it exploits the natural resources of the world, paying low wages and getting rich at other peoples expense, then it has only itself to blame if it loses the friendship of the peoples of the world."

"The troubles that come to us nationally are the direct result of our national wrongdoing, just as the troubles that come to us individually are often the result of our personal wrongdoing. It is in this sense that the prophets said that God judges and punishes people."

"When we honestly try to obey God as we understand him, there is hope that our society will grow toward security and stability. No

society without religion has ever endured for very long. Nations must have SPIRITUAL defenses. So often we tend to the cof defense only in terms of the ability to mihilate other peoples." (1)

"ONE OF THE REST DEFENSES OF A NATION IS FRIENDS" We do not make friends by trying to force others to be military allies and refusing to help them unless they are. But we could build friendship by sympathizing with the problems of other peoples and helping them.

Lifting the economic level of the world's poor makes friends."

"First we must recognize when we start looking for God's hand in world history, that God cares absolutely nothing about national pride. It makes no difference to him that our pride is humiliated by Russian prowess. It is not a foregone conclusion in God's mind that we are always right."

. . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . .

"The Hebrews were God's chosen people, but that did not mean they always got their way, or that God invariably favored them. God's purposes go very much deeper than any nationalistic ends."

"If we want to think God's thoughts after him in regard to human affairs, then we may have to think in other than conventionally 'patriotic'terms." We may have to probe deeper to find God's purposes in terms of basic human welfare, in terms of the aspirations of hitherto oppressed peoples, in terms of the little peoples instead of the big ones, and of peace rather than the arts of war."

"GOD IS CONCERNED ENOUGH ABOUT HUMAN AFFAIRS TO BE ABLE TO WAIT. He does not save us from the consequences of our wrongdoing. He does not force his way upon us, but he expects us, finally, to learn."

"When we see our country going blindly down the road to mass preparation for war, blustering and threatening on the assumption that if we make ourselves sound terrible enough, everybody will get out of our way, we want to cry out, 'Stop, stop!" Don't you see what you are doing? Don't you see that by making everybody afraid of you you make everybody hate you? Some day we may have to make good these threats. "O God", we want to cry out 'save us from ourselves!" But God doesN't. We have to make our wan mistakes and learn our own lessons. Having put all our eggs in the military basket, the time will come when we shall have to take some of them out again, and recognize the importance of such things as economic aid."

".....As long as the way of selfishness guides our pol. call thinking God lets us do so."

"Therefore, because we are Christian young people, let us dare to think and act differently in regard to world affairs from those who think in purely pagan terms. God cannot have his better world unless there those who are willing to put themselves into his hands, to think differently and live differently, FOR HIM."

".....Some of us Americans are so proud of ourselves that we won't trust many other nations in the world. And we may find ourselves out on a limb some day because of it." (2)

COMMENT

(All of these statements and insinuations are false and grossly treasonable. No nation in the world is more desirous of peace and world disarmament, nor has been more generous in giving economic aid to underprivileged nations than has the United States of America.)

"Finally, there is the question of fellowship. We know the fellowship of common interest in our school's athletic prowess, or in rapture over a popular movie star. But suppose we were really gripped by the character, ideals, and purposes of Jesus and our M Y F set out to make a contribution to the coming of Jesus' spirit into our community life. Suppose it did come to seem to us a matter of <a href="Life">Life</a> or death that in some area of our community life, where the principles of Jesus do not reign, they should begin to reign."

"To a Christian group which would embark on such an adventure, there would come a fellowship that would be deeper than any fellowship of our lives. Beside this your concern for football or the gang's hangout would seem insipid. Sharing in a flaming Christian crusade is an unforgetable experience of close fellowship."

"This also is true. The church will only achieve the consciousness that God is working through it--not hovering on the outskirts of it-- when it becomes a committed Christian fellowship. It must take positive Christian positions on the major issues of the day. It must be convinced that there is a way of Christ for America, and must dedicate itself to discovering that way. When Christ is alive in our mids we have power. When we disregard him we are powerless. "

"It is difficult to say or do what you feel you must when you know that others will disagree with you, or that <u>dire consequences</u> may result. That's the job which devoted Christmans have <u>today</u>.

If sex instruction has a place in church literature it should be in adult literature instructing the parents in correct ways of teaching the child. The National Council of Churches is weakening home ties by advocating the usurpation of prerogatives of the home and demanding too much of the youths' time which is needed in the home for good parent-child relationships. There are exceptions (and these cases should be treated individually) but most homes supply these relationships.

Churches should cherish, help preserve, and build family ties-not weaken them.)

".....I've started reading about Solomon(and his many wives!!).

"A church youth group spent several weeks of research and discussion on this question, 'How does the Bible help us discover what is right and what is wrong to do?"

"The chief conclusion of the group was that the Bible emphasizes moral conduct based on a point of view about life, rather than a set of specific do's and don'ts. The point of view includes the belief that this is God's world and that he is working in it toward certain divine purposes. Anything the individual does that contributes to these divine purposes is morally right, and anything he does that interferes with these purposes is morally wrong. These young people worked out this statement to summarize their thinking: (COMMENT: the end justifies the means.)

"There are at least two things that have eternal value--personality and fellowship between persons. Anything I do that helps personality--my own and others'--become better and more Christian, is right, and anything I do that strengthens Christian fellowship between persons including fellowship with God, is good; and anything I do that weakens fellowship is evil."

"The group also worked out some questions to help them apply these basio principles to specific situations like those reported earlier in this chapter. They felt it might help a young person come to a decision about the rightness or wrongness of a given act if he asked the following questions:

Will doing this help me become a better person, or will it interfere with my becoming a better person?

Will doing this help the other person or persons involved become a better person or persons? Will it interfere?

Will doing this help people I may not know, but who will be indirectly affected by this act become better persons? Will it interfere?

Will doing this help forward God's purpose in the world? Will it work against God's purpose?

Will doing this improve my relationships with other persons? Will it worsen my relationships?

Will doing this strengthen my sense of God's presence and my feeling of fellowship with God?

"This approach to deciding right and wrong conduct is a long way from the rigid set of rules some people try to find in the Bible. In the Old Testament there are some important conduct codes. The Ten Commandments is one of these, that at first glance, look like a set of specific do's and don'ts. When you look more closely you discover they are statements of universal principles phrased to make it easy to apply the principles to the demands of life in a given culture."

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

# Cleveland Conference Asks U. S. to Move Toward Recognition of Communist China

MORE than 600 clergymen and lay church members, organized as the Fifth World Order Study Conference, met in Cleveland, Ohio, November 18, and three days later landed in the headlines of the press of the nation by advocating unanimously that the government of the United States reconsider its China policy and take steps "toward the inclusion of the People's Republic of China in the UN and for its recognition by our government."

The conference convened at the call

of the Department of International Affairs of the National Council of Churches, but members emphasized that the group spoke for itself alone and not for the council. Press releases, however, went out on National Council of Churches stationery, and editors across the nation were understandably confused.

A strongly-wortled message containing the China recommendation was written by the conference and unanimously adopted after several attempts at amendment failed. It will be submitted to the

### he Cart Before the Horse?

CONFERENCE at Cleveland of 600 churchmen (see story page 5) has urged unanimously that "steps should be taken toward the inclusion of the People's Republic of China in the UN and for its recognition by our government."

To us this appears to be putting the cart before the horse in the interests of an expedient internationalism. The prior questions, for which no convincing answers have

yet been given the American people, are these:

(1) Is de facto control of territory the principle requisite for the recognition of a government (as the British have long contended), or is the manner of coming to power and the subsequent use of this power also a concern of the recognizing nation?

(2) Is responsible conduct in the family of nations a requisite for admission to the United Nations, or can a nation which is currently firing its guns (the Formosa Straits) and which still stands in unrepentant defiance (the Korean invasion) of the United Nations be admitted simply on the strength of its size and the size of its friends?

(3) Why should the China situation be resolved as a special case apart from other de facto governments which are not recognized by the U.S. (East Germany, for instance) or seated in the United Nations while other less noisy but more law abiding governments

stand outside in the cold and wait?

The conference-which met at the call of the Department of International Affairs of the National Council of Churches-did not speak for the council or its constituent denominations, but individuals representing denominations appeared ready to answer the above questions in the light of a specific situation relating to the People's Republic of China. We believe that the questions ought to be answered on their own merits first, and the China problem dealt with in sequence in the light of their ultimate resolution.

We can stand a great deal more American diplomacy based on consistent principle

and a lot less fashioned out of emotional expediency.


### NOTE ON YELLOW:

Correspondent's letter 3-14-59 requested to be advised if the National Council of Churches was ever considered a communist front, the identity of the men in the organization who have totalitarian views, the "factual findings" on the organization and information as to the Director's "personal convictions." Bulet 3-23-59 advised him the Bureau could not evaluate or comment upon the integrity or character of any individual, organization or publication and information in the files of the FBI is confidential.

Correspondent now writes that he realizes his first letter has raised questions in a way which made it impossible for the Bureau to answer. He now requests to be advised whether the Federal Council of Churches or any one of its members, or the National Council of Churches and any of its present members have ever been publicly indicted or convicted of subversive activities.

The Federal Council of Churches was later incorporated into the National Council of Churches. In recent years we have received numerous inquiries concerning communist connections of the group, and the organization has become an extremely controversial matter among various church groups. We have not investigated this organization; however, we did make some inquiries of informants in New York City in 1950 which did not reveal any communist or subversive influences on the part of persons affiliated with the organization at that time.

Due to the extremely broad nature of correspondent's inquiries and the controversial nature of the National Council of Churches, it is believed desirable to reiterate the confidential nature of Bufiles.

In scanning the Congressional Record for Wednesday, May 6, 1959, the following item contained therein pertaining to the FBI has been marked for your attention.

Pages 6798-6801, Congressman Williams, (D) Mississippi, pointed out that "Circuit Riders, Inc., has performed a great public service by analyzing the left-wing front affiliations of those in attendance at the Fifth World Order Study Conference held in Cleveland, Ohio, November 18-21, 1958, under the auspices of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States of America." Mr. Williams went on to state "Because many innocent persons are quite often taken in by organizations with high-sounding labels and purportedly lofty purposes, I think it appropriate to incorporate in the Record the Circuit Riders' analysis of the aforementioned group. Perhaps it will serve to enlighten Americans to the true purpose of organizations such as the one discused therein." It is stated in this analysis "Among the thousands of Protestant clergymen who have joined or otherwise supported the long list of Communist peace fronts during the past 40 years, one name stands out above all the others; namely. A. J. Muste. - - - Two years ago, A. J. Muste got up a delegation for the purpose of observing the procedures of the Communist Party's 16th national convention. February 9-12, 1957. The press was barred from the deliberations of the leading Communists, but Muste and his fellow observers were cordially welcomed. - - The work of the Muste delegation drew the following comment from Mr. J. Edgar Hoover: 'The Communists boasted of having impartial observers cover the convention. However, most of these so-called impartial observers were handpicked before the convention started and were reportedly headed by A. J. Muste who has long fronted for Communists. 



The American Council of Churches has not been investigated by the Bureau. Bufiles reveal that we have had cordial relations with this organization in the past and considerable correspondence of a cordial nature with its various officers. (94-37557)

Bufiles reveal certain derogatory information concerning the Federal Council of Churches, later incorporated into the National Council of Churches of Christ in America. However, much of the information came from rival church groups. Investigation limited to contacts with informants in New York City in 1950 revealed no information indicating any communist or subversive influence on the part of any persons affiliated with the group. #### NOTE ON YELLOW:

Correspondent advises that her church is in the process of getting a new minister. They have been receiving literature which criticizes the National Council of Churches for undermining the American way of life. Much of this literature is coming from the American Council of Churches, other church organizations and the American Legion publication, the "Firing Line." She and other members of the church are confused and are looking to the Bureau for assistance.
