Remarks by St. Louis County Supervisor Lawrence K. Roos
Before National Convention of Former FBI Agents
Khorassan Room, Chase-Park Plaza Hotel

It is a real pleasure for me to greet you in behalf of the people and government of St. Louis County.

Ever since its founding in 1928 under its present Director J. Edgar Hoover, the FBI has been an indispensable tool in our nationwide war on crime.

As an official of local government, I am especially appreciative of the vital contributions which the FBI makes to local as well as national and international law enforcement. The FBI Uniform Crime Reporting service has enabled all local units to accurately compare crime rates with similar areas throughout the Nation. The Identification Division assists local and State police officials in the quick capture of suspects accused of major crimes. The National FBI Training Academy from which seven of our County Police Department officers have graduated provides extremely valuable training for top police officials in the latest techniques and procedures in law enforcement.

The tremendous personal sacrifice which you gentlemen have made during your careers as special agents for the FBI cannot be measured. By placing your lives daily on the firing line to protect our national security and our personal safety you have served your Nation well. Your continued interest in the FBI through participation in this convention indicates that you are still interested in the

improvement of our law enforcement capabilities.

This continued involvement by you is especially important as our population continues to grow and major crimes soar at an alarming rate. Last year, as you may know, there were nearly 12 major crimes committed per 1000 people in our Nation. In St. Louis County alone some 7.5 crimes per 1000 persons were committed. Full cooperation between the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the State Highway Patrol, the County Police Department, and the municipal departments within the County is absolutely essential if we are to reduce these shocking statistics and if we are to win our war against crime.

And so, in welcoming this great convention to the St. Louis area, I would like to congratulate you on your interest in law enforcement and to urge us all to rededicate ourselves to a coordinated and concerted attack upon crime and lawlessness throughout our community and Nation.

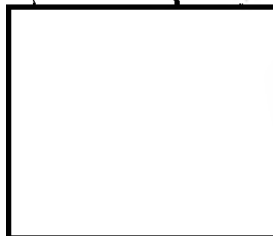

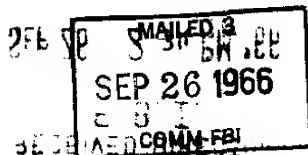

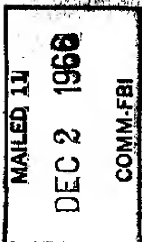

BACKGROUND:

The 1967 Convention of the Society of Former Special Agents of the FBI will be held this September at the Shoreham Hotel in Washington, D. C. Last July, former SA Charles M. Noone (EOD as SA in [redacted] and resigned in [redacted] services satisfactory) contacted Mr. DeLoach to advise that the Society of Former SAs would like to have the Director speak at the 1967 Convention. Noone, who has displayed a most friendly attitude toward the Bureau and the Director, advised that the luncheon meeting on September 28, 1967, would be the outstanding session of the Convention and that it would be attended by 2,000 persons. He hoped that the Director might be able to address that luncheon meeting; however, by memorandum dated July 12, 1966, it was recommended and approved that the Director not accept the invitation to speak at the Society's 1967 Convention.

Previous memoranda have advised of the scheduled 1967 convention of captioned society, to be held at the Shoreham Hotel in Washington, September 27-30, 1967. This will be the largest convention ever held by this society and is considered to be a "Homecoming" affair.

Charles Noone, a good friend of the Bureau, who served as an agent most satisfactorily from [redacted] and is now secretary in charge of the convention, recently visited you and furnished the attached copy of a letter to be sent out to reputable members of this society, detailing plans for the Washington convention, which is expected to bring together some 2,000 former agents.

Mr. Noone wished to keep us advised of developments and wanted to stress that this is a businesslike, "working" convention, with a minimum of social activities, which will include seminars on legal matters, legislation, banking and finance and security investigations, fields in which many of the members currently have important responsibilities. Mr. Noone also wished to emphasize that this Washington homecoming convention will be made up of stalwart Bureau supporters and that there will be no [redacted] or others of their ilk at this convention. Only those who have demonstrated friendship and loyalty to the Director and the Bureau are being invited to attend.

Mr. Noone again mentioned the urgent desire by society members and the Board of Directors that the Director and Mr. Tolson briefly appear for just a few minutes at the Thursday noon luncheon honoring the Director, to permit acceptance of a plaque recognizing the Director's outstanding leadership. He said the Director would not be expected to speak and that just his presence would be a great thing. He was told that the Director had already checked to ascertain if he could accept, but unfortunately his schedule would not permit his being there.

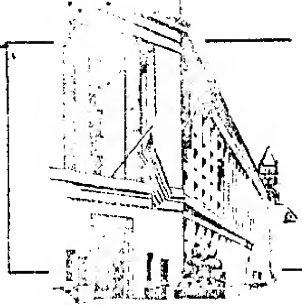

By a warmly cordial letter dated May 5, 1967, Mr. Charles M. Noone, Chairman of the 1967 Convention of the Society of Former Special Agents of the FBI, expresses his deep gratitude for the Director's thoughtfulness in permitting former Agents and their families attending this Convention to tour FBI Headquarters facilities.

Mr. Noone comments forcefully in his letter on his unequivocal determination to insure that this Convention reflects nothing but the highest regard and respect for the Director and the FBI. He clearly asserts that there will be none but 100 per cent loyal ex-Agents taking part in the Convention and that meticulous care is being taken to insure the absence of those well-known chameleons who have proven unworthy of their past trust.

In commenting on how much the tour privileges will mean to those taking part in this "homecoming" Convention, Mr. Noone respectfully inquires if there would be any possibility of small groups of his Society members visiting the Bureau's Quantico facilities especially to see the new ranges and the site of the new academy so they can observe firsthand the great advances the Director has pioneered in the field of training. Although he admits his reluctance to request this additional privilege, he observes that this would represent the first opportunity many members have had to see the new Quantico facilities and fully grasp the great forward strides made in recent years in FBI training.

Mr. Noone advised that Friday, September 29, would be the day reserved for some 100 to 150 former Special Agents, their wives and children, to visit Quantico during regular working hours. He stated that the ex-Agents

Society would charter Capital Transit buses to transport these guests to the old Academy building and from there to the new ranges and the site of the new Academy. Arrangements for lunch for these individuals can be worked out through available facilities at no cost to the Government or the Bureau. This visit would not cause any disruption of the normal firearms schedule and there would be no need for additional Bureau personnel.

See that everything is done to facilitate this.

Mr. Noone's letter clearly reflects the great admiration he has repeatedly evidenced for the Director and the Bureau. He again mentions the plans of his Society to pay tribute at a luncheon on September 28th to the Director in acknowledgment of the great personal debt they recognize they owe to the Director. They consider this luncheon in the Director's honor to be the principal event of the Convention and, while they recognize that the Director's commitments have made it necessary for him to previously indicate his unavailability to attend this noon luncheon on Thursday, September 28th at the Shoreham Hotel, they would consider the entire "homecoming" Convention to be an outstanding success if the Director could just drop by for a few minutes to accept their pledge of respect and loyalty. Mr. Noone sincerely requests the Director's favorable consideration of this final request.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. In view of the obviously very warm regard with which Mr. Noone and his Committee hold the Director, and in recognition of the assurances that only Society members of proven loyalty to the Director will be in attendance, it is recommended that favorable consideration be given to the request to permit small groups of members and their families to observe the fine new Quantico training facilities and that the Director accede to Mr. Noone's respectful request that he drop by for a few minutes at the September 28th, noon luncheon to be held by the Society in his honor at the Shoreham Hotel.

2. The attached letter be sent Mr. Noone advising him in conformity with the previous recommendation.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

I join my many associates in the Society of Former Special Agents in expressing deep appreciation to you personally for the very excellent tour arrangements that have been set up in connection with the forthcoming Convention of this Society in Washington, D. C., September 27 - 30, 1967. The opportunity to visit FBI Headquarters and particularly the privilege to have their wives and children visit the FBI will not only afford considerable pleasant memories but additionally offer inspiration to a group that constantly stands for the best interests of the FBI.

As Convention Chairman, I want you to know of my personal appreciation for your allowing tours of FBI Headquarters. More than this, however, I want to personally assure you that no step will be taken in connection with this Convention unless it is in the highest dignity and principle for which you and the Bureau have always stood. Under no circumstances would I be a party to embarrass you or the FBI at any time. I realize of course that prohibition has been placed on such visits for logical and necessary reasons. 

BACKGROUND:

The Director has approved visits to Quantico for the members of the Ex-Agents Society and in this connection has instructed, "See that everything is done to facilitate this. H." Mr. Hoover has also approved special tours of Headquarters, and the purpose of this memorandum is to indicate the arrangements being proposed for the handling of this group. Suggested procedures for scheduling Bureau tours are also being indicated.

C. M. Noone, chairman of the 1967 convention, has on several occasions expressed deepest appreciation for the Director's kindness in making possible these visits. He has indicated that the response from the 2,000 members expected in Washington during the convention has been unparalleled. Noone has advised that a total of about 400 people consisting of ^{ex-}Agents and their families had already signified the intention of availing themselves of the trip to Quantico. Noone noted that he and the other officers of the Society would be governed exclusively by any arrangements or schedule convenient to the Bureau that we wish to draw up. They, of course, at their own expense, will provide for all transportation and other incidental expenses in connection with the Quantico trip.

Following luncheon it is proposed that the group be given the opportunity to view the site of our new academy and to hear a description of the new facilities. Thereafter, special firearms demonstrations including the practical pistol course, running man target, dueling course, skeet shooting as well as a defensive tactics demonstration and novelty shooting will be put on for the members of the group. It is expected that the special firearms program should be finished by about 3:30 p. m. thus enabling the buses to return to Washington in time to avoid the heavy evening traffic.

Soft drinks, at the ex-Agents' expense, will be available during the afternoon, as well as restroom facilities for the ladies. We also plan to have one of the nurses from our Health Service accompany the group to Quantico to be readily available if her services should become necessary. The female clerical staff from the Academy will also be on hand for whatever assistance they might be should the need arise.

SPECIAL BUREAU TOURS:

We have been advised that a large number of children are expected to be with their parents at this homecoming convention, all of whom are thrilled and excited about the prospect of taking the FBI tour. Other special activities are being planned for these young people, and Mr. Noone has indicated that some 250 to 300 would like to visit the FBI on Thursday, September 28, 1967. Again, they will be governed by our wishes in scheduling, and arrangements will be made to specially handle these groups at various times during the course of the day. The children will be divided into small manageable groups and will be conducted on tours of our facilities by top clerical tour leaders. We will also be certain that they receive booklets, targets, and brass as souvenirs of their visit to the FBI.

In addition to the children, hundreds of ex-Agents are also anxious to come down to the Bureau for visits but since this will be a working convention and will include numerous seminars the scheduling of these visits will be contingent upon what free time they have. In order to facilitate these arrangements, it is proposed that we assign one of our tour representatives to the hotel on Thursday and Friday, September 28 and 29, to coordinate scheduling with the Tour Room. You will recall that several years ago with the Director's approval, such a procedure was initiated during the American Bar Association Convention with marked success. Our representative was allocated space at the convention desk, and was able to answer questions on the spot and schedule tours of the Bureau with a minimum of delay. Mr. Noone has indicated that he would be most pleased to provide our representative with every assistance at the hotel.

Chairman Noone, Luncheon Chairman Kane, Society President Regan, Society President-elect H. Bemis Lawrence, and possibly by several past Society Presidents such as Emmett C. McGaughey, Frank J. Holmes, Robert L. Floyd and Francis X. Plant. At 12:30 p.m. the Head Table guests will proceed to the Head Table in the Regency Room of the Shoreham Hotel. The luncheon will then be started by an invocation by former Agent Reverend Oliver D. Collier, which will last approximately one minute. Collier will have been introduced by Toastmaster Coyne. It is anticipated that the actual lunch will require about 40 minutes. At the conclusion of the lunch, Toastmaster Coyne will welcome the guests and make some introductions from the floor. A Day of Commemoration

Western Kentucky Dedicates New 10-Story Lawrence Hall

Western Kentucky University at Bowling Green extended high honors to Society President H Bemis Lawrence on October 14 when a new men's dormitory, the Bemis Lawrence Hall, was officially dedicated.

The dedication was part of a "Day of Commemoration and Dedication" held on the Western Kentucky campus when eight other new buildings recently erected also were dedicated. Lawrence, a graduate of Western Kentucky in 1936, served as vice chairman of the university's Board of Regents from 1955 to 1966.

Bemis, along with the other honorees, was fêted at a luncheon in the ballroom of the Paul L. Garrett Student Center on the campus at which Kentucky Governor Edward T. Breathitt was the principal speaker.

Bemis Lawrence Hall is one of the many new high rise structures erected on the campus to house the expanding enrollment at Western Kentucky which now totals 10,149. Construction of the four-winged structure began in 1965. The residence hall is fully air-conditioned, has self-service elevators, a spacious waiting room and lobby, Centrex telephone system, and apartments for the hall director and his assistant. Each room accommodates two students in a pleasant environment. Cost of Bemis Lawrence Hall was \$1,500,000.

Following the dedication exercises, Western Kentucky defeated Tennessee Tech at football by a 56 to 0 score. Later an open house was held at the various new buildings. Society President Lawrence was born December 1, 1914 at Tompkinsville, Kentucky, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hebron Lawrence. After he graduated from Western Kentucky in 1936, he earned his Bachelor of Laws

degree in 1940 at the University of Louisville Jefferson School of Law.

During his six years as a Special Agent of the FBI from 1940 to 1946, he served for three years as administrative assistant to Director J. Edgar Hoover. He began the practice of law in Louisville in 1946 where he has made notable contributions as a civic leader to his city, county and state. He is County Commissioner of Jefferson County Fiscal Court, president-elect of the Louisville Bar Association and teaches real estate law in evening classes at the University of Louisville.

Bemis and his wife, the former Mildred W. Ward of Williamsburg, Kentucky, have two children, William W., 24, and Anne Marie, 21.

The Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Pa. awarded him the George Washington Honor Medal for an outstanding public address given during 1964.

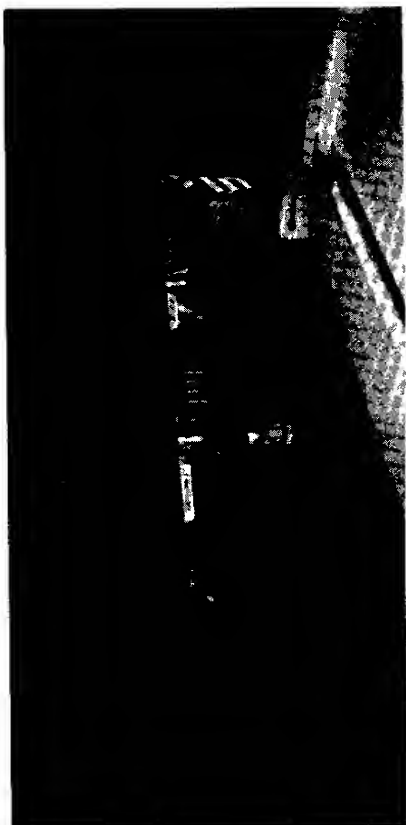

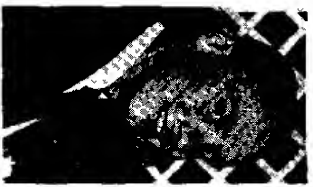

Sons of St. Louis X-Agents Achieve Highest Scout Rank

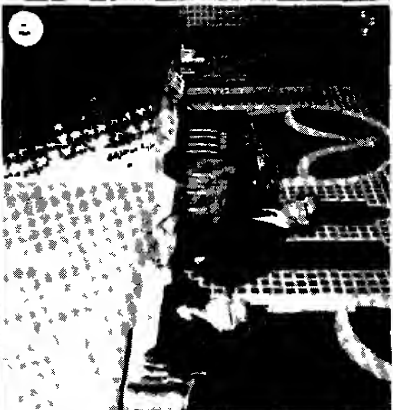
Sons of two St. Louis Chapter members have achieved high honors for outstanding achievements in their Boy Scout Troop.

He will "guide and direct the committee in its activities and approach to the problem of crime in our community," said Bagley.

A native of Mobile, Alabama, he received his bachelor's degree at Spring Hill College there and won his law degree from Georgetown University in 1935.

Police Science Study Report Is Compiled by Prof. Lankes

Professor George A. Lankes (1942-66), head of the Department of Police Science at the Erie County Technical Institute, Buffalo, New York, directed a study on how to improve the teaching police science which was recently completed.

The study comprises five bound books totalling 600 pages and was financed by a grant under the Federal Vocational Education Act of 1963.

Professor Lankes, formerly training officer of the FBI in Buffalo, began college-level training of police officers in the Technical Institute's Evening Division in 1959, and expanded the program to enroll high school graduates full time in the day college in 1966.

The basic book is entitled "College

Education for Police Cadets." Working with Lankes in compiling the report were several police superintendents in New York State and several college professors.

The books offer a number of recommendations, police science curriculums, a history of police cadet systems, audio-visual aids on crime prevention and public safety, safety hints, and a bibliography of available films and printed material on police science.

Copies of the books will be distributed in 25 states which have police science training programs. "The books are not copyrighted," Lankes reports, "and we expect that copies will be made. We have done the spade work and are confident that others will carry on the communications."

contribute to this Society charity project.

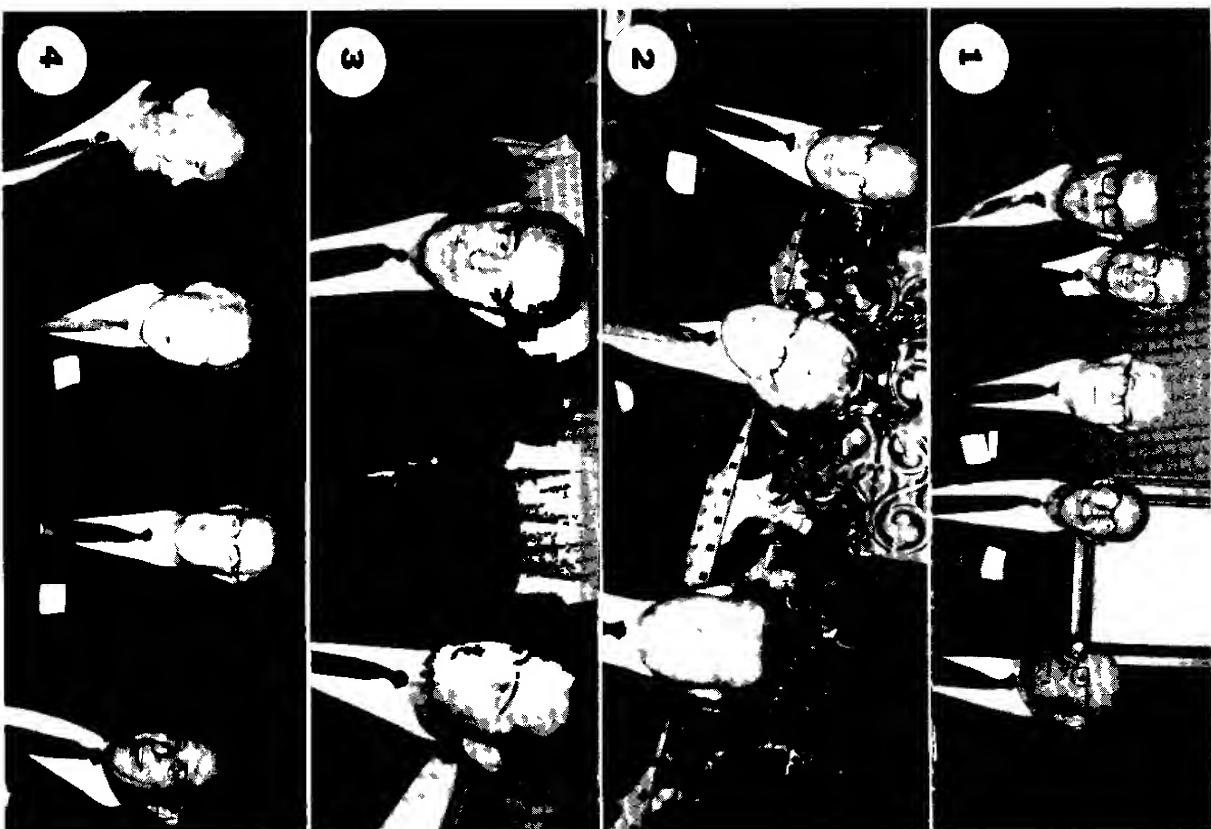

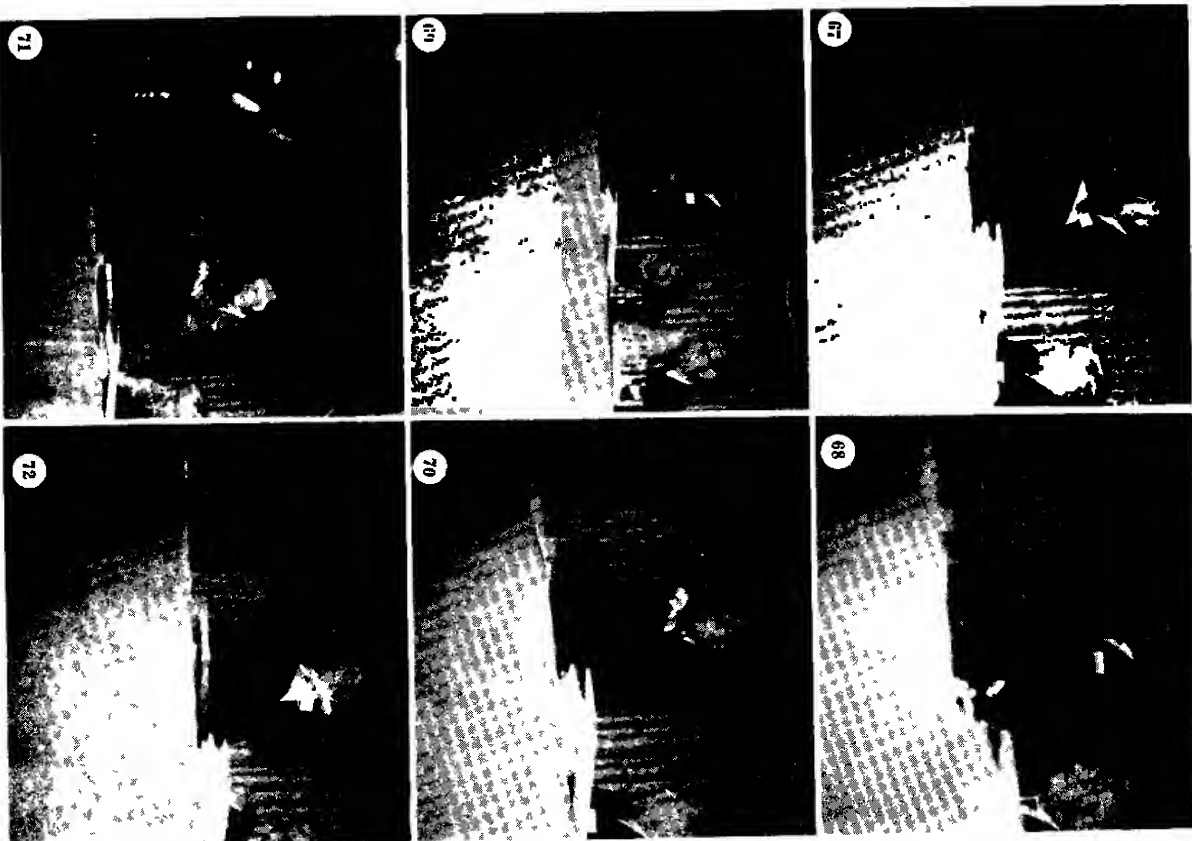

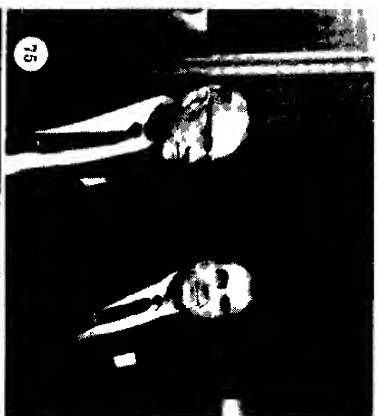

Jack Creeden Now Security Director , For Chain of Drug Stores in Texas

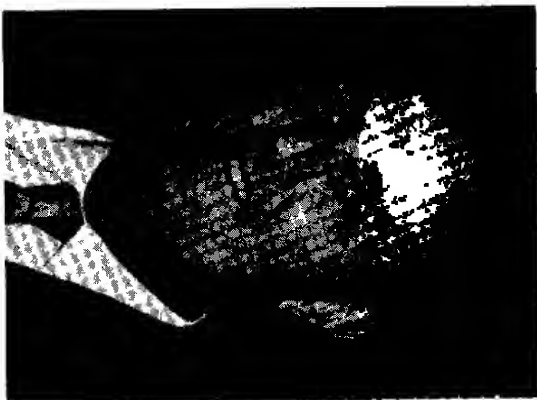

He based his assertions on his study of the Senate Sub-committee report on Criminal Procedure.

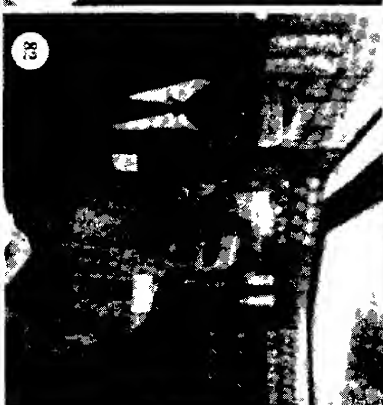

Dear Former Associate In The F.B.I.:

I wanted to begin the spade work for a possible effort on the part of the Society of Former Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to initiate what I believe would be an excellent contribution to law enforcement in the United States.

My proposed resolution would be that there be set up a Department on the Cabinet level of a Secretary of Law Enforcement for the purpose of the coordination of all federal law enforcement agencies under a "Secretary of Law Enforcement." It would result in the effecting of economies, elimination of duplications, and more important, instill in the national image and in the administrative practice of federal law enforcement the Fidelity, Bravery and Integrity which I think is so essential to success and effectiveness of law enforcement. Although the nomination for a Secretary of Law Enforcement would not be in our hands, I believe that we would be remiss if we did not make a suggestion which I believe would win nationwide approval, that J. Edgar Hoover be strongly considered by the President of the United States for the nomination as Secretary of Law Enforcement. I hope that Mr. Hoover would be willing to devote a few years at least, I hope five, to the establishment of the Department of Law Enforcement on the Cabinet level to attain a status where it would be on a parallel with the Department of Defense for external security and would constitute the Department of Law Enforcement, a defense in internal security, crime and law enforcement generally. I don't even want to complicate the recommendations with the question of whether or not there is an integrity gap in our federal law enforcement image. I can think of no greater contribution to the general welfare of the United States than that of the establishment of a Department of Law Enforcement on a Cabinet level and the recommendation of the appointment of J. Edgar Hoover as its initial Secretary of Law Enforcement.

Would you kindly consider the matter seriously and in your Executive Committee meetings, at the Chapter level, and at the officer level, at least submit this for serious discussions as to the feasibility and practicality of such a suggestion, and the implementation of the results of your august deliberations.
