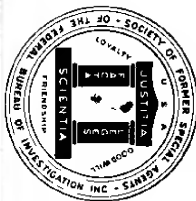

Yitalo Goes to Paraguay

Society Member is Sworn In as Ambassador to Asuncion; Foreign Service Career Has Covered 23 Years

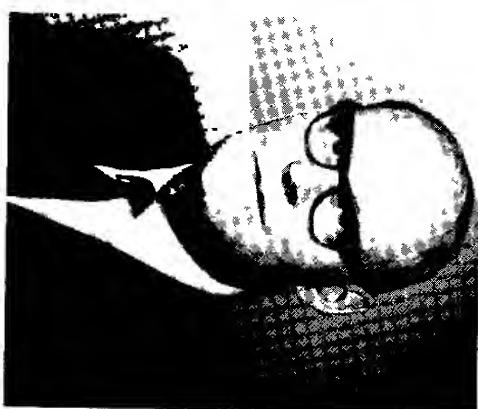
John Raymond Yitalo (1941-46), a career United States Foreign Service officer, was sworn in as United States Ambassador to Paraguay at ceremonies at the State Department in Washington, D.C. on July 28. The oath of office was administered by Deputy Chief of Protocol Clement E. Conger, and Under Secretary of State Elliott L. Richardson took part in the exercises.

Yitalo, prior to his current assignment, had been American Consulate General at Tijuana, Mexico. In Asuncion, he succeeds Ambassador Benigno C. Hernandez.

Born on December 25, 1916 in Floodwood, Minnesota, Yitalo lists Mobridge, South Dakota as his place of residence, although he has maintained a Washington, D.C. residence during tours of duty in the nation's capital. He attended Suomi College, Hancock, Michigan, and received his B.A. degree from St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, in 1937. Northwestern University awarded him an M.B.A. degree in 1938. He served as an instructor in economics in the School of Commerce and Business Administration at the University of Alabama from 1938 to 1941 and left that post to accept appointment as a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. When he resigned from the Bureau in 1946 he entered the U.S. Foreign Service.

Yitalo's overseas assignments have included those of Chief of the Political Section at Helsinki (1946-50), Deputy Principal Officer, Munich (1954-58), Consul General and Counselor of Embassy for Consular Affairs, Manila (1960-62). Segal is Convention Speaker

New President of American Bar Association To Address Legal Seminar at Chicago on Thursday, October 9

Bernard G. Segal of Philadelphia, new president of the American Bar Association, will address the Legal Seminar at the Chicago Convention of the Society of Former Special Agents of the FBI on Thursday morning, October 9, at 10 a.m. at the Palmer House Hotel.

The Legal Seminar is the only one to be held that morning in order to permit the largest number of Convention delegates to hear this distinguished member of the bar.

He will be introduced by Society Past President H. Bennis Lawrence, one of the best known law practitioners in Kentucky.

Segal was installed as president of the American Bar Association at its annual meeting in Dallas, Texas last month when more than 5,000 attorneys were present.

A native of New York City, he was raised in Philadelphia and has practiced there for the past 34 years. At 24 he was the youngest deputy state attorney general in Pennsylvania's history, and at 44 the youngest chancellor in the history of the Philadelphia Bar Association. He is a former president of the American College of Trial Lawyers, and this year was elected vice president of the American Law Institute. He is a former board chairman of the American Judicature Society, a life fellow of the American Bar Foundation and a fellow of the Institute of Judicial Administration.

HONORED BY THREE PRESIDENTS

President Segal has been a member of the ABA House of Delegates since 1952 and was chairman of the Committee on the Federal Judiciary from 1956 to 1962. During that time the Association's role in assisting the Justice Department and the White House in assessing the qualifications of prospective appointees to the Federal bench became firmly established.

Presidents Eisenhower, Kennedy and Johnson named him to important government commissions and committees. The Pennsylvania Bar Association conferred on Segal its Service Award, and other honors included the Federal Bar Association Dedication Day Award and the Cardozo Memorial Award of Tau Epsilon Rho law fraternity.

Segal is a life trustee of the University of Pennsylvania and a member of the lay board of trustees of Villanova University, and vice president and board member of Dropsie College.

Stone to Speak at Luncheon

Noted Chicago Insurance Executive and Writer to Tell Convention About Positive Mental Attitude System

W Clement Stone, multi-millionaire Chicago insurance executive and philanthropist, will be the featured speaker at the main luncheon on October 9 during the Mid-America Convention to be held at Chicago's Palmer House Hotel.

A true Horatio Alger type, Stone began his business career as an insurance salesman during Summer vacations from high school. He dropped out of school to become a full-time salesman, and at age 20 in 1922, set up his own insurance agency. His pattern for success was established when he sold 54 policies his first day in his own venture. From his initial working capital of \$100, he has amassed over \$400,000,000. He is today the president of the Combined Insurance Company of America, and also heads subsidiary insurance companies in Massachusetts, Wisconsin and Texas. In addition, he is active in a number of publishing enterprises and other business ventures.

AINS YOUTH GROUPS

Stone is widely known for generously sharing his time and the fruits of his accomplishments with deserving charities and foundations at the present time, he is affiliated with over 65 organizations concerned with youth activities, education, religion, health and mental health, research, foreign and migrant aid, and civic and cultural activities. These affiliations and activities have resulted in his receiving numerous special awards, particularly from religious organizations. Although a Presbyterian, Stone has been honored by a wide variety of religious groups. Perhaps his widest public recognition has come as the result of his work with the Boys' Clubs of America and other youth groups.

In addition to sharing his resources, Stone genuinely delights in spreading

the word about his secret of success. He is editor and publisher of "Success Unlimited" magazine, and he has authored books entitled "The Success System that Never Fails" and "Success Through a Positive Mental Attitude." Through these works and in his speeches, he deals with the concept that has worked so eminently well for him. He calls his success secret PMA — Positive Mental Attitude — which he conveys to others in hopes that they, too, will achieve success.

INSPIRED NIXON

One of the people to whom he imparted PMA was Richard M. Nixon, just after he had lost the California gubernatorial election in 1962.

As an indication of his enthusiasm for PMA, Stone was quoted in a recent Chicago newspaper article as having said, "My ambitions are very humble, all I want to do is change the world."

John T. Hisbos

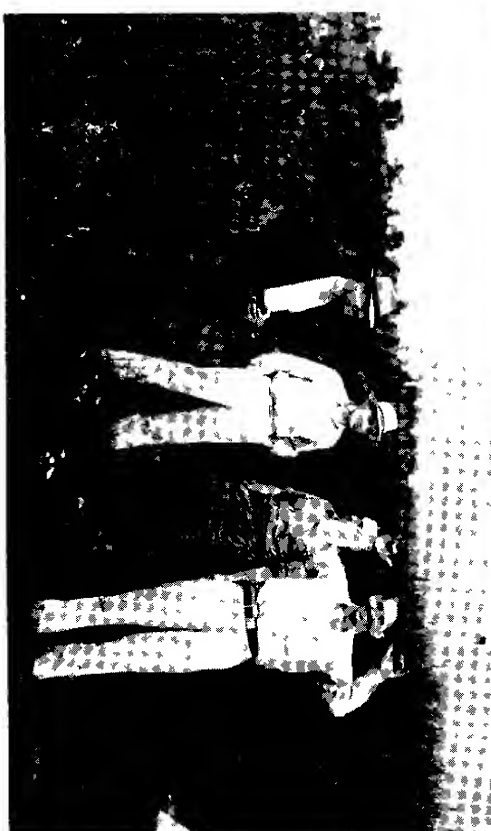

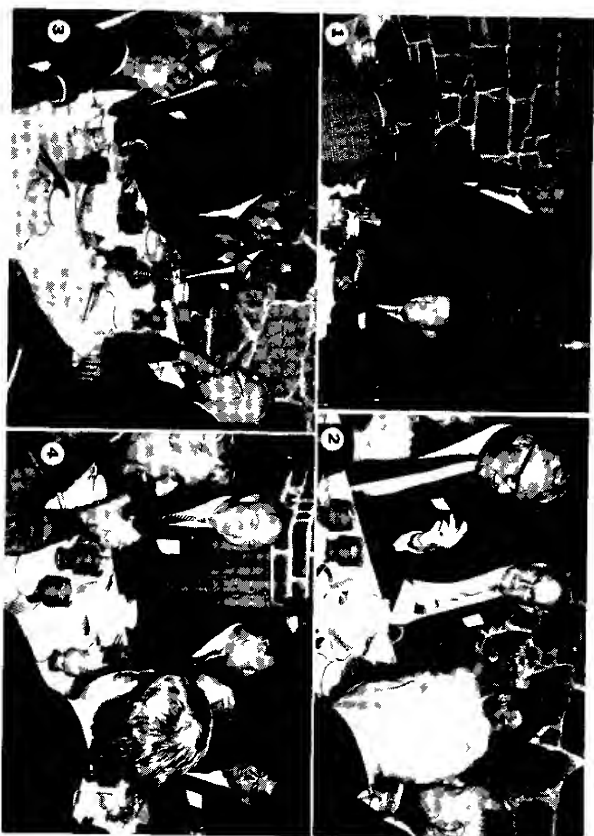

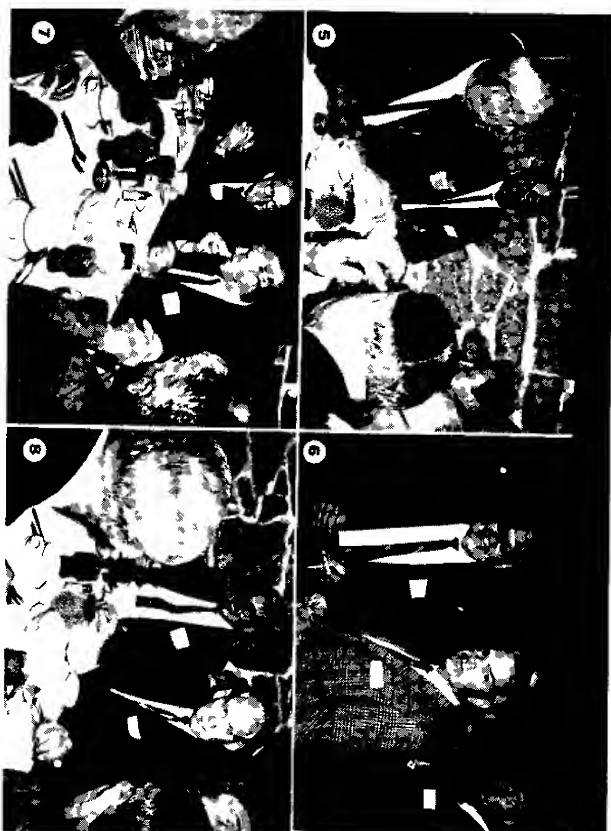
McDavitt is Appointed Manager of New Protection Department of Merrill Lynch

Tennis, golf, and tennis preceded cocktails and a picnic buffet supper, after which members held a brief business session for the election of officers.

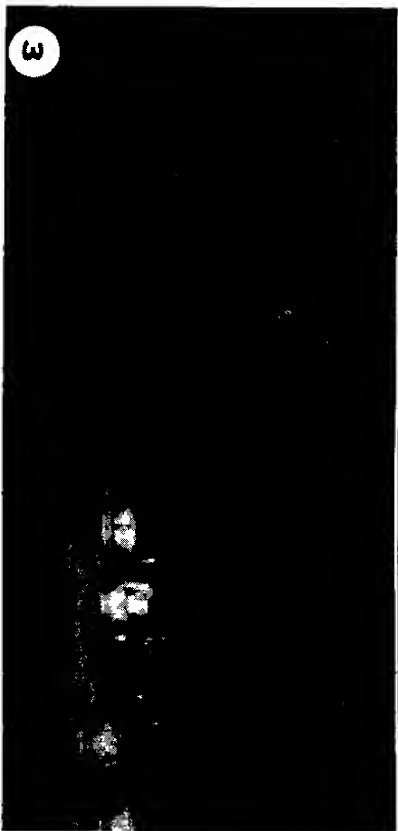
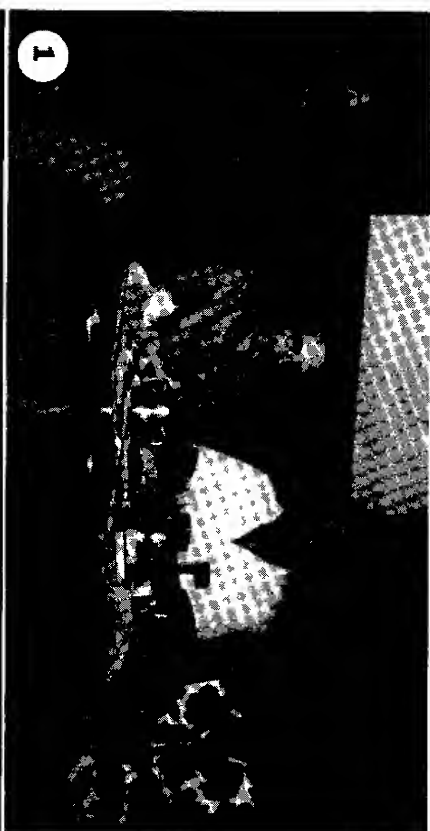

Gunn Heads New Drug Unit

Named Chief of Division of Laboratory Operations Of Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs

John W. Gunn Jr. (1954-62), has been appointed chief of the Division of Laboratory Operations in the Department of Justice's Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs. Bureau Director John E. Ingersoll made the announcement as five regional laboratories and a special research and testing facility in Washington, D. C. were officially opened.

The laboratories will analyze drugs submitted by agents of the Bureau and will offer advice and assistance to state and local law enforcement agencies whose laboratory facilities are not equipped adequately to analyze drugs seized in illicit traffic. Gunn also heads a staff which acts as technical adviser to the Bureau's field offices, and frequently serves as consultant to state and local forensic scientists.

Gunn was born in Lynn, Massachusetts, where he attended parochial schools. After service in the U. S. Navy he earned a degree in chemistry at Boston College. He did graduate work in Washington, D. C. at Georgetown University in biochemistry and at American University in management.

Gunn worked as a chemist in private industry before becoming a Special Agent with the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He served in FBI field offices in San Francisco, Detroit and Marquette, Michigan, be-

fore transferring to Washington, D. C. headquarters where he worked in the physics and chemistry section. He left the FBI to supervise a laboratory for a large drug manufacturer and left that position to become a senior staff member at Johns Hopkins applied physics laboratory in Silver Spring, Maryland.

Wickman in Top Track Post

Succeeds Laughlin as Agent in Charge in New York For Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau Operations

Clifford W. Wickman (1949-51), of North Bellmore, Long Island, is now Agent in Charge of the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau operations at the three tracks operated by the New York Racing Association. These are Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga. Wickman's development as a race track protective agent was outlined in Herb Goldstein's column in the New York Morning Telegraph recently. A native of Brooklyn, he was graduated from the Kings Point Merchant Marine Academy in 1944 with an ensign's commission. He was a lieutenant (jg) when he was discharged from World War II service and went to Fordham from which he graduated in 1948. He then became a Special Agent in the FBI and served in Washington, Omaha and Detroit.

He was chief of loyalty investigations for the City of Detroit during the administration of Mayor Albert Cobo, an assignment that lasted six years. Following Cobo's death, Wickman resigned and returned to New York City to a job with the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau. His first assignments were at Monmouth and Atlantic City tracks in New

Jersey, Golden Gate Fields and Bay Meadows in California, Assinobia Downs in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and Green Mountain at Fownal, Vermont. Last Fall TRPB president Spencer Drayton called Wickman back to New York to succeed the retiring Society member Robert H. Laughlin (1934-45), at the New York tracks. Wickman took over the top spot last Spring.

"This is a much bigger job than any other assignment in the TRPB," says Wickman. "We have a big staff, including many undercover personnel working in many areas. We have the usual assignment of booking and ejecting pickpockets, bookmakers and other undesirable people. On top of that, this office conducts all investigations for the stewards in all matters, including all new people coming into the sport. It keeps us busy."

Williams Doing Great Job as Assessor Of California's Lush San Diego County

Elton C. (Chuck) Williams (1940-45-1946-65), in his fourth year as Assessor of San Diego County, California. He was retired from the FBI in 1965 after 25 years of service, including Special Agent in Charge of FBI offices in San Antonio, Milwaukee, and San Diego, and numerous other assignments throughout the United States and Washington, D. C.

Williams was appointed Assessor in December, 1965, shortly after a grand jury created a number of vacancies in that office in the well-publicized California Assessors' scandals that year, and was elected to a four-year term in June, 1966. The office is elective, but non-partisan.

The Assessor's office is responsible for locating, identifying, and appraising all assessable property in the 4,200 square miles of Southwest U.S.A. — San Diego County. The Assessor's offices in the City of San Diego house almost a half-million accounts and some 300 people who process them. The market value of assessable property in San Diego County totaled over \$10 billion on July 1, 1969.

"Chuck" has served the State Association of Assessors on the Executive and Legislative Committees, and last year was president of the Southern Regional group, representing about 50 percent of the value in California. "Chuck" is active in

Kiwanis, chairman of that club's "Pillars of Freedom" Series last year, active in Boy Scouts, chairman of the Organization and Extension Committee, and member of the County Executive Council. He also is active in weekend inspection of several of the 70 golf courses in the county.

After 18 moves in 25 years with the FBI Williams and his wife, Alere, and daughter, Charla, have firmly planted roots in San Diego and won't even discuss moving. San Diego is really a pleasant place to live, they assert.

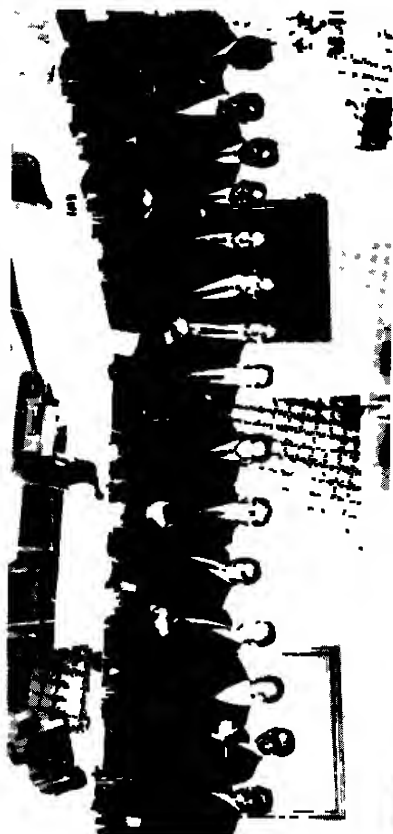

SEPTEMBER 28, 1967

Toastmaster Coyne, Mr. Hoover, President Regan, officials and friends of the FBI, it is a thrilling experience to be with you today. (Laughter) Oh, I'm not going to read anything, but I think better with my glasses on. (Laughter)

I had intended to tell Mr. Hoover earlier, but hadn't the appropriate opportunity, that the President asked me to express today... as he has himself on so many occasions... his great admiration for his friend of many, many years... his neighbor for many, many years... his colleague in the Government of the United States... Director John Edgar Hoover. Unfortunately, he is traveling to view the ravages of hurricane and flood in the Rio Grande Valley, but is with you and with Mr. Hoover in spirit at this time.

To the former Agents here, I would like to say that you are alumni of an illustrious institution... an institution unsurpassed in government... in the excellence of its performance; one that reminds us at a time when it is so important that we be reminded that we have faith that big Government, which is essential to a mighty Nation of two hundred million people, can perform to institutions with effectiveness... with efficiency... and with fairness.

I hope that each of you will also always feel that he is an alumnus not only of the FBI but of the Department of Justice as well... which feels so close to the Bureau, to its members, which works constantly in a common mission. Of all the institutions of Government, there is none in our time... in this hour of great concern about crime... in which we are so fortunate to have such excellence.

Of all the agencies it could have reached...this level of excellence...the American people can be grateful that it was the FBI because of the dependence of our people upon its performance for both their personal security and their liberty. Of all the attributes of the excellence demonstrated by the FBI, perhaps none is more impressive than the balance that is always shown.

Here, contrary to expectation perhaps by many in evaluation of human nature, there is no quest for empire. There is instead the constant awareness that its mission is described and delineated by a Constitution delegating powers to the Federal Government and reserving powers to the states...that it lends its strength to law enforcement throughout the United States, working daily to build excellence in state and local law enforcement which are so critical to the survival of this great Nation.

About the man that you honor today, there is nothing I can think to say more appropriate than that, as Ralph Waldo Emerson noted in the simple days before the Civil War, every institution is but the lengthened shadow of a single man.

It seems incredible to me that this could still be true in our day of such complexity and vast numbers, but it is true, because to a degree that I do not know to exist in any other institution, public or private in this country, the great Federal Bureau of Investigation is the lengthened shadow of John Edgar Hoover.

Thank you very much. (Applause)

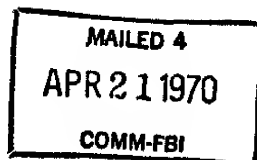

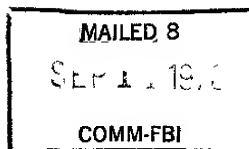

REMARKS OF JOSEPH J. CASPER
ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION
BEFORE THE 1970 CONVENTION OF THE
SOCIETY OF FORMER SPECIAL AGENTS OF THE FBI
DISNEYLAND HOTEL
ANAHEIM, CALIFORNIA,
OCTOBER 22, 1970

SO THAT WE CAN SAY "ALL SYSTEMS ARE GO"

IN THE UNITED STATES, AND, IN FACT, THROUGHOUT THE WHOLE WORLD TODAY, A STAGGERING SOCIAL METAMORPHOSIS IS TAKING PLACE. THE STARTLING AND CONSTANTLY ACCELERATING CHANGES THAT CONSTITUTE THIS METAMORPHOSIS BRING WITH THEM NEW, CHALLENGING AND, AT TIMES, EXTREMELY PERPLEXING PROBLEMS FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL AND, INDEED, FOR PRACTITIONERS IN EVERY SPHERE OF THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM. CHANGE IS THE KEYNOTE OF OUR TIME, A TIME WHICH THE MANAGEMENT SCHOLAR, PETER F. DRUCKER APTLY CHARACTERIZED AS THE AGE OF DISCONTINUITY. CHANGE ALWAYS BRINGS CHALLENGES AND, IN FACT, THE CHALLENGES WE FACE ARE SO GREAT THAT SOME DESPAIRINGLY ASSERT THAT THE AMERICAN SYSTEM OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE HAS FAILED. SUCH AN ATTITUDE IF ADOPTED BY PROFESSIONALS IN THE SYSTEM WOULD BE SELF-DEFEATING, THAT IS, WOULD NATURALLY RESULT IN THE ASSERTION BECOMING A REALITY.

ONE CANNOT REASONABLY DENY THAT THERE ARE PROBLEMS WHICH REQUIRE REVIEWING, REVAMPING, REVISING AND

ENCLOSURE

READJUSTING THE SYSTEM TO MEET CURRENT AND FUTURE NEEDS. BUT CHANGES FOR THE SAKE OF CHANGE, CHANGES BASED ON UNESTABLISHED ASSUMPTIONS, CHANGES DERIVED FROM DISTORTED PERCEPTIONS OF THE SITUATION, CHANGES THAT ARE REALLY SUPERFICIAL ALTERATIONS INTENDED SOLELY TO PLACATE A CONCERNED PUBLIC ARE NOT THE ANSWER.

WE MUST CONDUCT THOROUGH, SYSTEMATIC, SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH TO DETERMINE WHERE THE SYSTEM HAS FAULTS WHICH CAN BE REMEDIED OR ELIMINATED BY REVISIONS. ONE DOES NOT TEAR A HOUSE DOWN MERELY BECAUSE THE WINDOWS ARE BROKEN OR THE ROOF LEAKS.. I AM CONVINCED WE CAN RENOVATE AND REDECORATE OUR HOUSE BECAUSE IT HAS A SOLID FOUNDATION. CONSEQUENTLY, WE MUST DETERMINE WHAT OUR SITUATION IS TODAY.

YES, WE MUST ANALYZE OUR PROBLEMS BY APPLYING MODERN RESEARCH APPROACHES TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM. WE CANNOT SEGMENT THE SYSTEM BY EXAMINING ONLY LAW ENFORCEMENT, OR ONLY THE COURTS, OR

ONLY PROSECUTORS, OR PRISONS OR PROBATION OR PAROLE. WE MUST ANALYZE EACH PART BUT CONSTANILY BEAR IN MIND THAT THE PARTS MUST BE CONSIDERED IN RELATION TO THE WHOLE, THE COMPLETE, THE ENTIRE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM WHICH IN TURN MUST BE VIEWED AS ONLY ONE OF A SERIES OF SYSTEMS SERVING SOCIETY.

AS A PROMINENT JURIST WROTE RECENTLY IN A PROFESSIONAL JOURNAL:

RESEARCH IN THE AREA OF CRIMINAL LAW AND THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM HAS THUS FAR BEEN CARRIED OUT ALMOST WITHOUT ANY SPECIFIC REFERENCE TO SOCIETY, AS THIS AREA WAS CONSIDERED A DISTINCT PHENOMENON UNTO ITSELF. FOR THIS REASON, STUDIES IN LAW HAVE BEEN HIGHLY SOPHISTICATED IN CHARACTER, BUT HAVE BEEN CONCERNED ONLY WITH THEORETICAL AND FORMAL ASPECTS, ADDRESSED TO THE CONTINUOUS PERFECTING OF THE LEGAL NORM. MORE RECENTLY, THE ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE SOCIAL SCIENCES HAVE ATTRACTED THE ATTENTION OF SCHOLARS TO THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN LAW AND JUSTICE, ON THE ONE HAND, AND THE INDIVIDUAL AND SOCIAL REALITY, ON THE OTHER, BY POINTING OUT THE RELEVANCE OF THE FIRST TWO FACTORS AS SOCIAL FUNCTIONS.

THE JUDGE'S OBSERVATION IS A VALID ONE AND I BELIEVE AS HE DOES THAT THE SHIFT IN RESEARCH EMPHASIS FROM STUDIES OF LAW AS AN ISOLATED ENTITY UNTO ITSELF TO

THE STUDY OF LAW IN RELATION TO SOCIETY IS HEALTHY BECAUSE CRIMINAL LAWS, LAW ENFORCEMENT, AND THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM SHOULD NOT BE VIEWED AS STATIC BECAUSE THEIR FUNCTION IS TO BE RESPONSIVE TO CONSTANTLY CHANGING SOCIAL NEEDS. THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CRIMINAL LAW AND SOCIETY IS TRULY ONE OF DYNAMIC INTERDEPENDENCE.

THE RESULTS OF SUCH RESEARCH IN THE FIELD OF CRIMINAL LAW AND THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM CAN HELP LEGISLATORS DETERMINE THE PROPER TIME AND SPECIFIC OBJECTIVE, OF CHANGES IN THE LAW AND ITS ADMINISTRATION TAKING INTO ACCOUNT THE REAL NEEDS OF SOCIETY.

THE AIMS OF LAW ENFORCEMENT, INDEED OF THE ENTIRE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM MUST REMAIN COMPATIBLE WITH PUBLIC GOALS. THEY ARE FAR MORE COMPREHENSIVE THAN MERELY THE REPRESSION OF CRIME, THE APPREHENSION, PROSECUTION AND PUNISHMENT OF OFFENDERS AND THE RECOVERY OF PROPERTY. AS AN EMINENT GRADUATE OF THE FBI NATIONAL ACADEMY, DR. GEORGE D. EASTMAN PUT IT IN THE SIXTH EDITION OF MUNICIPAL POLICE ADMINISTRATION THE MISSION

OF LAW ENFORCEMENT IS THE " . . . MAINTENANCE OF SOCIAL ORDER WITHIN CAREFULLY PRESCRIBED ETHICAL AND CONSTITUTIONAL RESTRICTIONS." UNDER ITS CURRENT DEFINITION IT INCLUDES THE PREVENTION OF CRIMINALITY, THE REGULATION OF NONCRIMINAL CONDUCT AND THE PERFORMANCE OF A WIDE VARIETY OF MISCELLANEOUS SERVICES. BUT TO INSURE SOCIAL ORDER SUCCESSFUL LAW ENFORCEMENT ALONE IS NOT ENOUGH.

THE ALARMINGLY HIGH RATE OF RECIDIVISM ALONE SHOULD PROVE THIS. THE PUBLIC WILL NOT BE SAFE AND THE IDEAL OF TRUE SOCIAL ORDER REALIZED UNLESS CONVICTED OFFENDERS ARE NOT ONLY REHABILITATED BUT EDUCATED, TRAINED AND PROVIDED THE OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME ACTIVE PARTICIPANTS IN AND CONTRIBUTORS TO THE GROWTH OF SOCIETY. THE EXTENSIVE PERIOD BETWEEN A SUBJECT'S ARREST AND TRIAL IN FAR TOO MANY CASES ALSO GRAPHICALLY ILLUSTRATES ONE AREA OF NEED IN ANOTHER SPHERE OF THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM WHICH REQUIRES ATTENTION IF SOCIAL ORDER IS TO BE REALIZED.

IN AN ERA SUCH AS OURS CHARACTERIZED BY UNPRECEDENTED TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCE AND DISCOVERY OF

KNOWLEDGE THERE DEVELOPS WHAT HAS BEEN LABELLED "CULTURAL LAG." THAT IS, IT TAKES PEOPLE A CONSIDERABLE AMOUNT OF TIME TO ADJUST THEIR LIFE STYLES TO THE CHANGES CAUSED BY TECHNOLOGICAL DISCOVERIES. FOR EXAMPLE, PROCESSES AND TECHNIQUES USED IN INDUSTRY ARE OFTEN YEARS AHEAD OF SCHOOL COURSES PURPORTING TO TEACH FUTURE WORKERS HOW TO HANDLE MODERN PROCESSES AND TECHNIQUES. THE CONCEPT OF CULTURAL LAG POINTS OUT THAT CHANGES DO NOT OCCUR IN COORDINATED WAYS. THERE IS A FUNDAMENTAL DISHARMONY AND DISLOCATION IN SOCIETY WHICH RESULTS AS ONE PART OF A CULTURE FALLS BEHIND ANOTHER. TO REMEDY CULTURAL LAG, WHICH PRODUCES INEFFICIENCY AND MALADJUSTMENT, SOCIETY DEPENDS ON THE BEST POSSIBLE COOPERATION BETWEEN TECHNOLOGISTS, SCHOLARS, EDUCATORS AND GOVERNMENT LEADERS.

LAW ENFORCEMENT IS NOT IMMUNE TO THE EFFECTS OF CULTURAL LAG. IF WE EXAMINE JUST A FEW AREAS WE CAN READILY SEE THIS.

AS LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES BECAME MOTORIZED AND MECHANIZED AND AIR CONDITIONED THEY WERE ABLE TO PATROL GREATER AREAS WITH FEWER PERSONNEL BUT THE DAILY

FACE-TO-FACE CONTACT OF THE FOOT PATROLMAN WITH THE COMMUNITY WAS LOST. THE POLICE DID NOT IDENTIFY AS STRONGLY WITH THE COMMUNITY NOR THE COMMUNITY WITH THE POLICE. AT LEAST IN PART SOME OF THE COOPERATION OF THE COMMUNITY WAS LOST. RESEARCH TO DETERMINE THE MAXIMUM USE OF MECHANIZATION WITH THE MINIMUM LOSS OF COMMUNITY SUPPORT IS CONSEQUENTLY VERY IMPORTANT.

BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY HAVE UTILIZED COMPUTERS MUCH MORE EFFECTIVELY THAN LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES AND THEREBY MADE THEIR OPERATIONS MORE EFFICIENT AND ECONOMIC BUT LAW ENFORCEMENT HAS BEEN RELUCTANT TO ASSIGN COMPETENT CIVILIAN PERSONNEL TO ASSUME CERTAIN PHASES OF POLICE MANAGEMENT SERVICES.

WITH THE INCREASE IN CRIME AND SOCIAL UNREST THE COMPLEXITIES OF ADMINISTERING A MODERN LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY HAVE MULTIPLIED. CONSEQUENTLY NEW MANAGEMENT PRACTICES AND METHODS ARE NEEDED. THE SPIRALLING COSTS INVOLVED IN POLICING A COMMUNITY DURING A TIME OF INFLATION AND INCREASING TAXES DICTATE THE NEED FOR DISTRIBUTION AND DEPLOYMENT OF PERSONNEL ACCORDING TO CLEARLY ESTABLISHED NEED. YET FEW DEPARTMENTS MAKE MAXIMUM UTILIZATION OF THE COMPUTER TO DETERMINE MANPOWER ALLOCATION.

ADMINISTRATORS ARE NOW COMPELLED TO SEEK OUT MORE EFFICIENT WAYS TO PERFORM THE SERVICES DEMAND-ED IF THEY ARE TO SATISFY THE PUBLIC THEY SERVE. THE DIF-FICULTY OF THE SITUATION IS COMPOUNDED BY THE FACT THAT METROPOLITAN CENTERS ARE WITNESSING THE EXODUS OF THE MIDDLE CLASS AND THE ARRIVAL OF POORER LESS SKILLED PEO-PLES. CONSEQUENTLY WHILE THE NEED FOR SERVICES GROWS THE TAX BASE DWINDLES.

THE LAW ENFORCEMENT ADMINISTRATOR MUST LEARN FROM THE EXECUTIVE IN THE PRIVATE SECTOR. LIKE HIM HE MUST UTILIZE SOUND PLANNING. PLANNING PRESUPPOSES THAT THE ORGANIZATION HAS A SET OF CLEARLY DEFINED OBJECTIVES AND THAT MANAGEMENT IS COMMITTED TO THE ACHIEVEMENT OF THESE GOALS. SINCE A LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY IS DEDICATED TO A COMMUNITY SERVICE ITS OBJECTIVES MUST BE RESPONSIVE TO THE COMMUNITY AND PRIORITIES MUST BE GIVEN TO WHAT THE CITIZENRY, THE BODY POLITIC DEEMS TO BE MOST IMPORTANT. PRIVATE MANAGERS HAVE DEMONSTRATED HOW THE BUDGET CAN BE SKILLFULLY USED AS AN INSTRUMENT FOR PROPER PLANNING AND CONTROL. LAW ENFORCEMENT

AGENCIES MUST EMULATE THEM. THEY MUST USE THE BUDGET TO CLEARLY DETERMINE IF THEY ARE ACHIEVING MAXIMUM UTILIZATION OF PERSONNEL AND OTHER RESOURCES. FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY DEMANDS ACHIEVEMENT OF ORGANIZATIONAL ENDS IN THE MOST EFFICIENT MANNER.

WE HAVE HEARD MUCH OF LATE OF THE SILENT MAJORITY. THE MEDIA, POLL TAKERS AND POLITICIANS REFER TO THE TERM SO FREQUENTLY THAT ONE ALMOST BELIEVES THEY FEEL THEY HAVE MADE A NEW DISCOVERY. BUT FOUR SCORE AND SEVEN YEARS AGO WILLIAM GRAHAM SUMNER DELIVERED A SPEECH ENTITLED "THE FORGOTTEN MAN" WHICH IS PERHAPS A MORE ACCURATE TERM. HE DESCRIBED THE FORGOTTEN MAN AS:

" . . . DELVING AWAY IN PATIENT INDUSTRY SUPPORTING HIS FAMILY, PAYING HIS TAXES, CASTING HIS VOTE, SUPPORTING THE CHURCH AND THE SCHOOL . . . BUT HE IS THE ONLY ONE FOR WHOM THERE IS NO PROVISION IN THE GREAT SCRAMBLE AND THE BIG DIVIDE. SUCH IS THE FORGOTTEN MAN. HE WORKS, HE VOTES, GENERALLY HE PRAYS - BUT HIS CHIEF BUSINESS IN LIFE IS TO PAY . . . WHO AND WHERE IS THE FORGOTTEN MAN IN THIS CASE AND WHO WILL PAY FOR IT ALL?

HE MAY STILL BE FORGOTTEN BUT WILL HE REMAIN

SILENT?"

IF WE IN LAW ENFORCEMENT DO NOT WANT TO HEAR HIM INDICT US BECAUSE OF OUR FAILURE TO SERVE HIM EFFICIENTLY AND ECONOMICALLY WE MUST CONDUCT SYSTEMATIC RESEARCH TO DETERMINE THE PROPER PATH TO TAKE AND THEN TAKE THAT PATH FRUGALLY. WE MUST WORK TO MAKE OUR SUBSYSTEM OF THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM A SMOOTHLY FUNCTIONING ONE. IF WE CAN SET THE EXAMPLE FOR ALL THE OTHER SYSTEMS SERVING SOCIETY SO THAT THE FORGOTTEN MAN CAN INSIST THAT ALL OTHER SYSTEMS FOLLOW SUIT THEN MAYBE WE WILL HONESTLY BE ABLE TO RE-ECHO THE WORDS MADE FAMOUS AT HOUSTON'S SPACE CENTER "ALL SYSTEMS ARE GO."

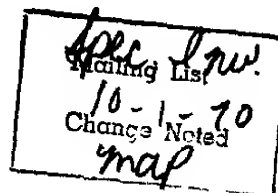

McGaughy Again Heads Police Commission for Los Angeles

On crime problems, McLaughlin stated, "We're going to start a get-tough policy on narcotics importers and wholesalers." He said the thrust of this campaign would be to stop the inflow of drugs to colleges and schools.

McGaughy was first appointed to the board by the late Mayor Fletcher Bowron. He was the only member to be reappointed by Mayor Norton.

He's No. 1 Tax Collector

IRS Commissioner Randolph W Thrower Supervises Job Of Gathering In \$200 Billion In Taxes Each Year

Society member Randolph W Thrower (1942-44), who already has earned an enviable reputation as a tax lawyer, office manager, law enforcement officer and a computer expert, has added another accomplishment to the list during the past year and a half.

As U S Commissioner of Internal Revenue, he's now also America's biggest tax collector. Gathering in \$200 billion in taxes each year may not be the most popular job around, but it's certainly one of the most important and demanding.

And X-Agent Thrower, who hails from Atlanta, Georgia, is measuring up to the task quite ably, even though this is his first Federal administration assignment. In his successful law career, he had good training for the job since he specialized in tax-related activities.

ADMITTED TO BAR IN 1935

Thrower was admitted to the Georgia Bar in 1935 and the District of Columbia Bar in 1933. He was co-chairman of the Atlanta Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights and is a member of the American and Georgia Bar Associations. He is a past president of the Conference on Personal Finance Law, the Atlanta Bar Association, the Atlanta Lawyers Club and the Atlanta Legal Aid Society.

In the field of taxation, Thrower was chairman of the Section of Taxation from 1961 to 1963 and a member of that tax section from 1958 to 1966. Also he was a member of the American Bar Association Committee on Substantive Tax Reform.

Commissioner Thrower has been a teacher and still serves as a guest lecturer on Current Tax Problems at Emory University School of Law in Atlanta.

FBI AND WAR SERVICE

In 1942 he left his law practice for

two years to serve as a Special Agent of the FBI in Albany, N Y and New Haven, Conn. He resigned in 1944 and served in the U S Marine Corps for two years during which he saw duty in Okinawa and the Philippines and attained the rank of captain.

Just prior to his IRS appointment by President Nixon, he was a partner in the Atlanta and Washington law firm of Sutherland, Asbill and Brennan.

Slim and graying at 57, Commissioner Thrower speaks deliberately about his work. His agency doesn't make the tax laws—it administers them. The job, as he sees it, is to be sure every taxpayer pays his fair share but not one penny more.

This is not to say that the IRS is not involved in the early stages of formulating tax law legislation. "As (Continued on page 8)

Commissioner," Thrower says, "I often perform as consultant to the Treasury Department and also, on occasion, testify before committees of the Congress during the early tax law writing stages."

100 MILLION FILE RETURNS

Thrower feels that the Service's most important asset is the taxpayers' voluntary compliance with the law. "It is a uniquely American phenomenon that more than 100 million individuals will file approximately 77 million individual income tax returns, which reaches a grand total of about 110 million when all returns are added," he said. "They will pay approximately \$200 billion and receive about \$12 billion in refunds. The success we have enjoyed with our tax system depends on the people's sense of honesty and integrity and responsibility, coupled with an unusual feeling of mutual confidence between the taxpayer and those entrusted with administering the tax laws."

"Because of this mutual confidence, we in the IRS recognize a heavy obligation to make this system of voluntary compliance work. Our ultimate yardstick in applying manpower and facilities, and in devising programs, is the measure of their contribution in supporting voluntary compliance."

Part of that voluntary compliance system, he says, is every taxpayer's confidence that every other taxpayer is paying his fair share. That calls for a big enforcement job by the IRS.

This year the IRS computer will select about 2,500,000 returns to be audited. For the average taxpayer an audit simply means a chance to straighten out his records and to be sure he is filing his forms properly. Most audits show that the taxpayer has overpaid. But tax audits turn up several cases of tax fraud every year.

DRIVE AGAINST CRIME

Since Commissioner Thrower took

office, IRS has stepped up its activities against organized crime. He says one of IRS' most potent tools in exposing gangsters is the tax return because "as they enter legitimate business, they tend to bring their illegal practices with them."

As part of his enforcement role, Thrower was appointed this year by President Nixon to the 18-man National Council on Organized Crime.

Thrower also has an eye on the future of the Service itself. He oversees continuing research and analysis of office procedures and new data processing equipment. The IRS has a reputation for being one of the Federal Government's most efficient agencies, and Thrower intends to preserve that reputation as the IRS workload grows every year.

VISITS MANY IRS OFFICES

He travels about the country often and every time he reaches a new city he goes to the IRS office, shakes hands all around, makes a little speech, and boosts office morale. He's the only Commissioner thousands of IRS people have ever seen and is becoming the most popular boss they've ever had.

Society member Thrower and his wife, Margaret, live in Washington, D C near the Washington Cathedral whose grounds they often walk. They have five children. Two of their daughters are married. Daughter Laura attends Oberlin College, and Randolph Jr attends the University of Georgia. The youngest, Mary, is a student at National Cathedral School in Washington.

GRADUATE OF EMORY

Thrower was born September 5, 1913 at Tampa, Florida and was graduated from Georgia Military Academy (now Woodward Academy) before going on to Emory University where he received his B Ph degree in 1934, and a J D degree in 1936.

Mrs Thrower is the former Margaret Logan Munroe of Quincy, Fla. Their two married daughters are Mrs Thomas (Margaret) MacCarty, whose husband is a University of

FBI Agent-Airplane Pilot Role

Was Proud Moment for Falkner

Toward the end of August, 1936 I had advanced enough in my sporadic flight training to where I was practicing the maneuvers essential to a flight test for a pilot's license at the Albuquerque Airport. Fifty solo hours were needed and they were hard and expensive to come by. After practicing some spins, tight figure eights and spot landings I sat down and taxed the Fairchild 24 (four passenger, 145 h p monoplane) back to the hangar.

As I entered the flight instructor's office to pay my account he remarked that a CAB Inspector (as he was known in those days) would be at the airport the following week and he was sure that I would have no trouble in passing the flight and written tests for a license, provided I had accumulated the required 50 hours of solo flight time.

WAS FIVE HOURS SHORT

A quick check of my flight log disclosed that I was more than five hours short of the required 50 hours. Dejection must have smothered me like a wet blanket, for the instructor glanced at me, then out at the Fairchild on the ramp and said, "You really love flying airplanes, don't you?" No answer was needed and he added (may the good Lord have long since blessed him), "I've got a notion that your arithmetic is a lot worse than your flying. You've still got this weekend for whatever flying you can get in, then bring me your flight log and I'll certify it at whatever figure is shown."

That was enough for me. I got more flying time on Sunday and on Monday morning I handed the instructor my log book, showing exactly 50 hours and 20 minutes of solo flight time and my conscience has never once belabored me. That day I took the flight tests and was

issued my license as a private pilot. It was indeed a proud and happy day, one never forgotten.

TRIP TO SANTA FE

The next day I was back at work again and a call came through from the State Police at Santa Fe, where my presence was desired without delay. At that time the Bureau had not said that I could fly airplanes on official business, on the other hand, it had not prohibited me from doing so.

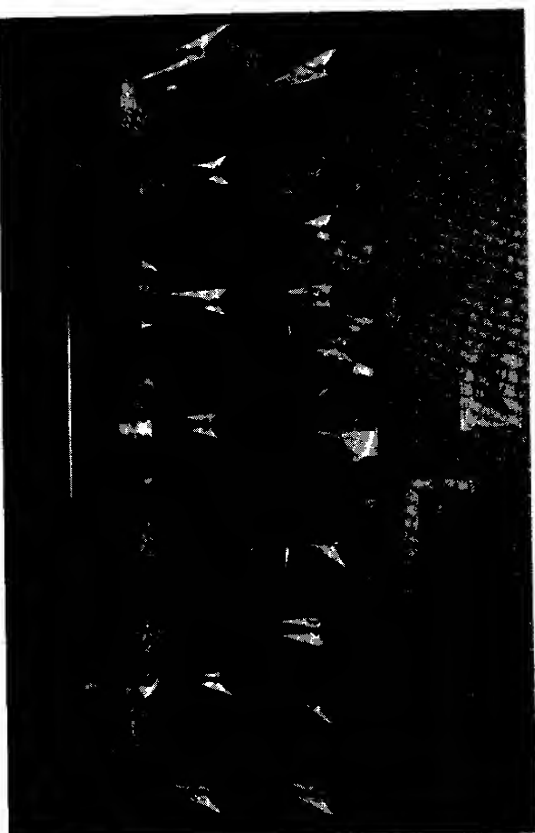
The upshot was that I celebrated the acquisition of my license by flying the Fairchild to Santa Fe. A State Police car met me at the airport and late that afternoon I had completed my work and was taking shop with a sergeant friend at the State Police headquarters awaiting someone to drive me back to the airport. A bus load of tourists arrived and entered the building. Among them was an attractive young woman and her little son, about 5 or 6 years of age. The two approached the sergeant and the little boy pointed to him and said, "Look, Mama, when I'm big I want to be a policeman and wear a pretty uniform just like this one."

CHANGED HIS MIND

The sergeant arose at once, thanked the little boy and returned the mother's smile. Then mother and child turned and started away, hand in hand. After a few steps the little boy suddenly stopped, looked up at his mother and exclaimed, "Mama, I've decided that what I really want to be when I grow up is an FBI Agent and an airplane pilot."

The mother bent over at once, hugged the child, looked up at the sergeant and stated, "Can you imagine his wanting to be both, when either one could kill him?"

Whether either one had noticed me, sitting quietly beside the desk, I do not know, but I knew the sergeant and as he looked from the mother to me and back again I said, "Let it go,

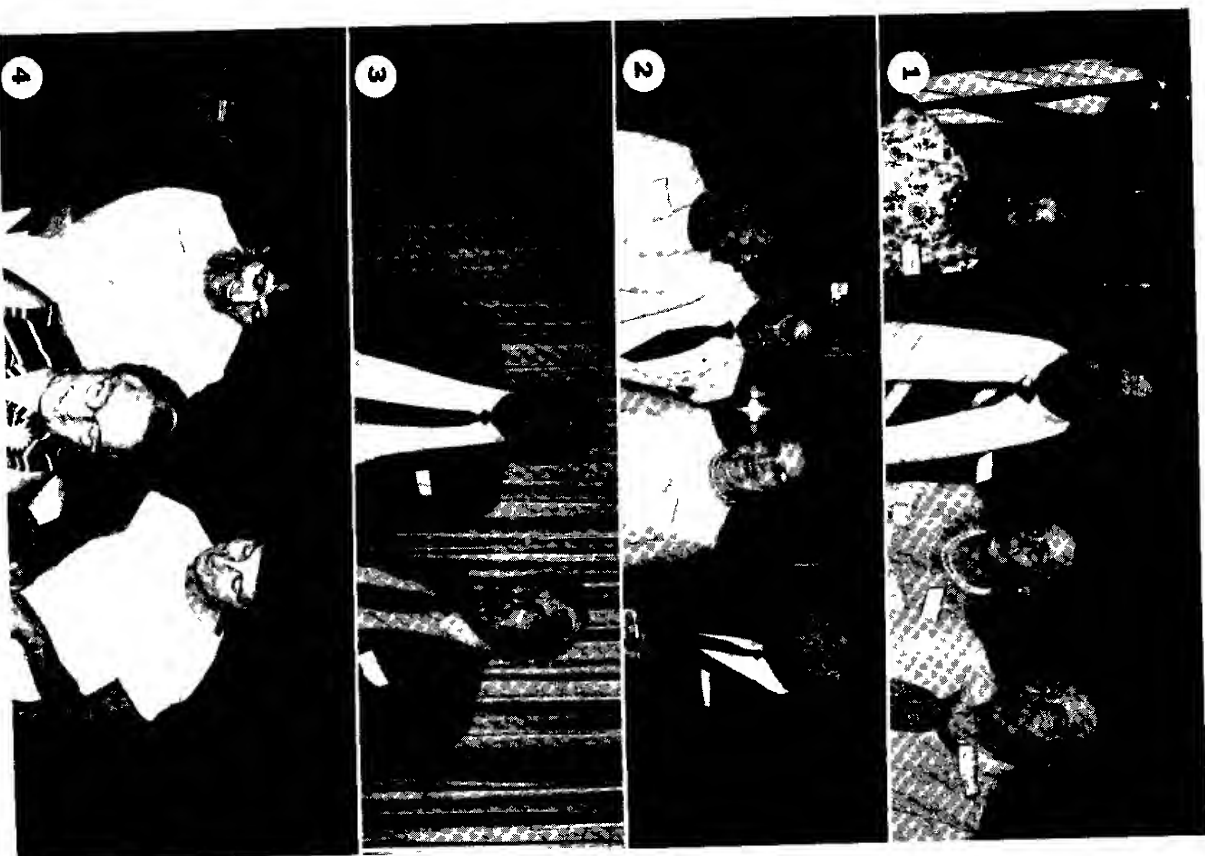

Bernstein Recalls Days When Fight Films Were Banned From Interstate Commerce

In a letter to the sports editor of the New York Times, Society member Lewis G. Bernstein (1928-31) of 2 Park Avenue, New York City, recalls a case on which he worked as a Special Agent of the FBI relating to the law against the transportation of fight films in interstate commerce.

The case involved the showing of the fight films of the Tunney-Dempsey world's heavyweight battle at a theater at Capitol Heights, Maryland. After the films were shown there, they were to be taken into the nearby District of Columbia, thus involving interstate traffic.

"I was assigned to the case," stated Bernstein, "along with Special Agent Herman Hollis (later slain by Baby Face Nelson in a gun battle in which Nelson also was shot to death). We saw the film in Maryland, succeeded in following the owner into the District where he was appre-

hended with the films.

"The case was given wide publicity, the defendant convicted but the law, which was highly unpopular, was repealed shortly afterward to the relief of many."

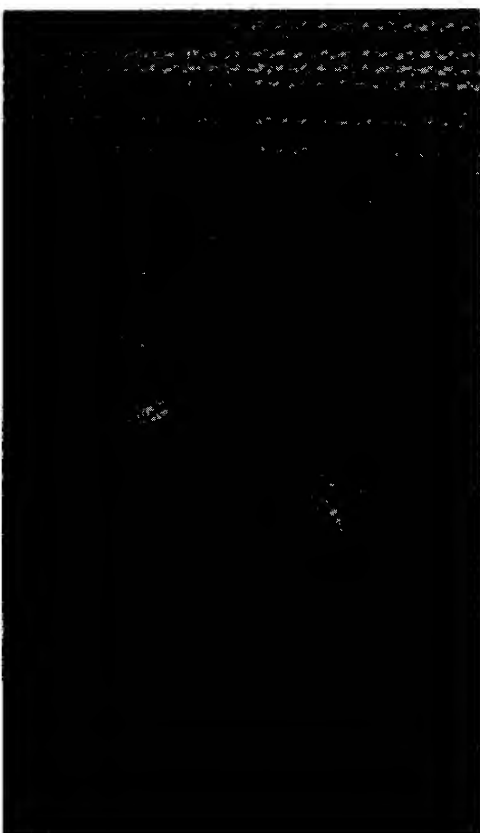

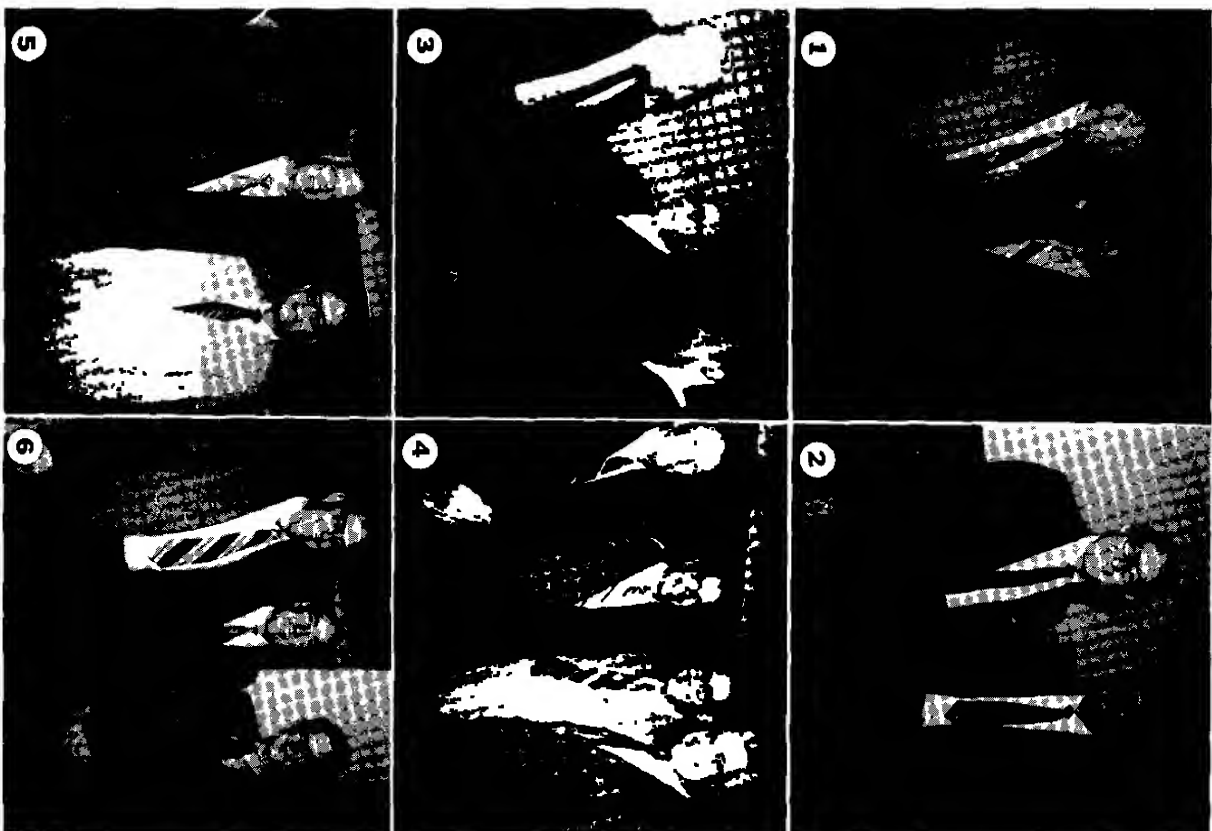

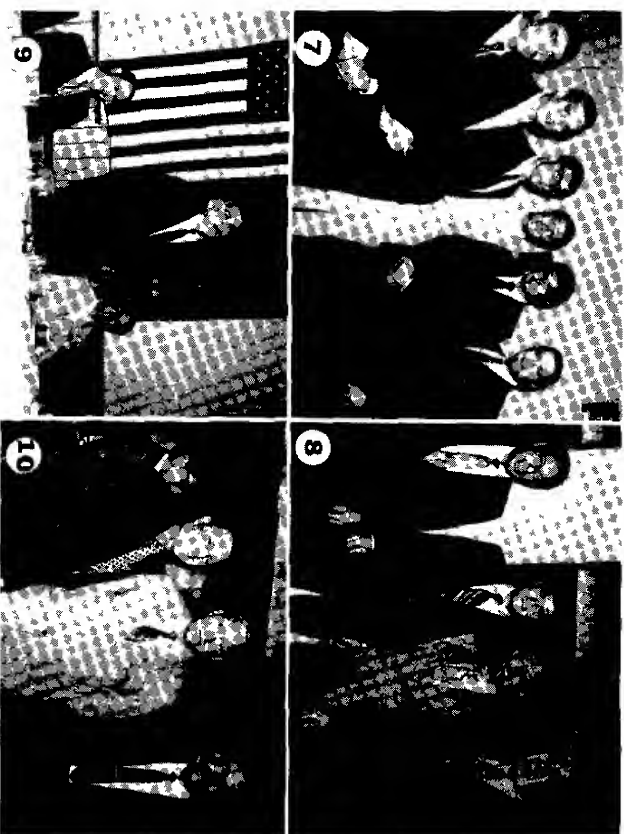

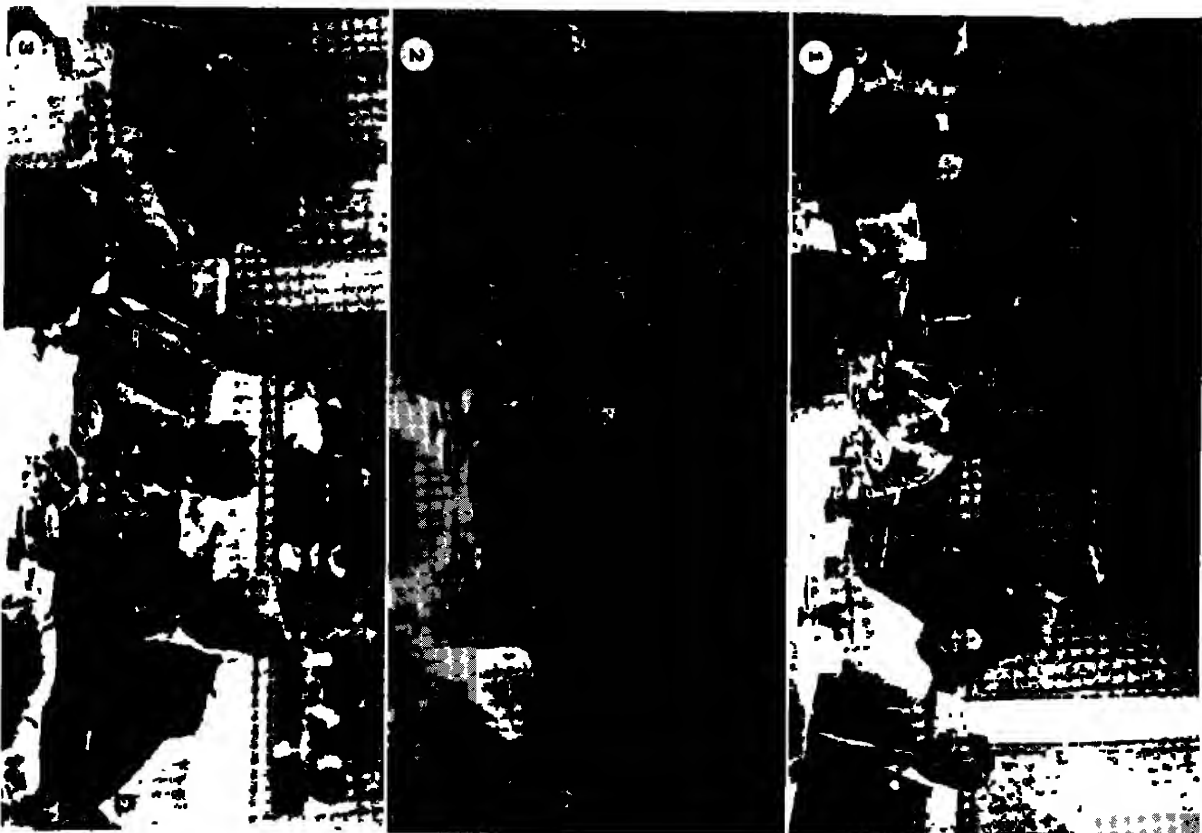
Duke Joins Harness Tracks Security

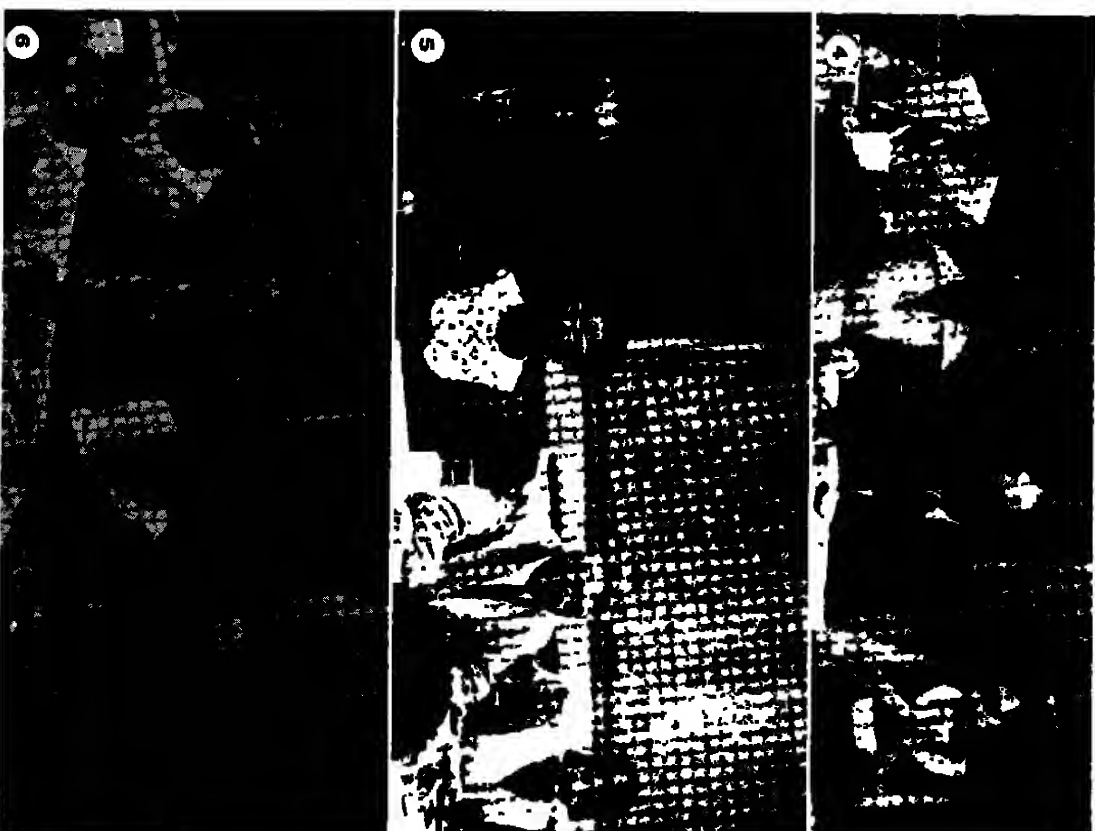
In his new post, Duke will be work-

Marshall W. Houts

Internationally Known Writer on Criminology



Marshall W Houts (1941-44), of Laguna Beach, California, noted criminologist and attorney, is author of a new book entitled "They Asked for Death" The volume is scheduled for publication in early October

Houts, in his latest study, analyzes the personality of the murder victim. Almost 80 percent of all murders, he finds, are committed by family, friends, or acquaintances of the victim. Many are the result of antagonisms that have endured for years while the victim teased, taunted, ridiculed or suppressed his eventual assassin until a breaking point was reached

Marshall Houts

Houts points out that the murder victim, often by subconscious or intentional action, may ask for death. He cites as examples those people who by their own makeup are natural victims, such as the unfaithful husband or wife with a jealous spouse, prostitutes, homosexuals, exhibitionists, bullies, etc. Houts' study of typical murder situations attempts to prove that many people possess a tendency toward self-destruction and are murder-prone just as some individuals are accident-prone

Society member Houts was general counsel to the Court of Last Resort founded by Erle Stanley Gardner. In this capacity he directed the investigation of 600 murder cases where persons under

THE FBI TODAY:
PROGRESS IN REALITYLAND

It is a great honor for me to have been designated by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover to address this Annual Convention of the Society. I know of the pleasure he derived from visiting with your membership and their wives during the Convention in Washington, D. C., a few years ago. He speaks often and appreciatively of the unflinching support the Society has given the FBI over the years. Were it not for his many commitments, I know Mr. Hoover would be here with you today.

Director Hoover joins me in thanking you for your gracious invitation. He has asked me to express his best wishes to all for a most successful and enjoyable convention. (1)

"Friendship in Fantasyland" is a most appropriate theme for this convention setting - of which I hope to take full advantage.

The Bureau has been honored by a succession of outstanding employees, many of whom I have been privileged to work with and some of whom are here today. This opportunity to greet old friends and recall past experiences is for me a very special occasion. In the hurly-burly pace of today, such opportunities are all too rare.

Anyone spending a few days at Disneyland cannot help being impressed by the fresh, colorful, orderly, and imaginative world it portrays. Its wholesome fantasy refurbishes dampened spirits and eases aroused frustrations that are all too often provoked by events elsewhere in the world.

Disneyland reconstructs events as we would like to think they were and the world as we might hope it to be. Unfortunately, the realities of much of today's events fall woefully short of such wistful notions. As we enter the Decade of the Seventies, realities are starkly contrasted with the fantasy of Disneyland. They sharply outline a society torn by increasing contempt for the rule of law and growing rejection of many fundamental values that have nurtured this country for nearly two centuries.

I need not catalogue these disturbing realities in detail.

You are all aware of the continually rising volume of crime which has consistently outpaced population growth in recent years; the increased killings of police officers, often in deliberate ambushes by extremists; the all-too frequent terrorist-type bombings of public and private facilities; the shocking attempts to mock, threaten, even disrupt court proceedings at gunpoint; the reckless student demonstrations which often have ignited the fuses of violence; and the frequent confrontations between massed militant dissenters and the communities they choose to intimidate by their protests.

This chaotic milieu of actual and threatened criminality has wrought vast changes in our society and placed awesome burdens on law enforcement. No less affected by these new demands is the FBI.

The Bureau is committed to dealing with realities and it is undergoing dramatic changes to keep pace with mounting challenges. These challenges have required additional FBI personnel, added jurisdictional responsibilities, new and enlarged Headquarters, training, and Field Office facilities, expansion and restructuring of police and Agent training programs, and the rapid assimilation of computer technology.

During the recently completed fiscal year, just over 800 new Agents successfully completed their training and entered on duty. This is the largest number of Special Agents to have been trained in nearly 19 years and brings our present investigative complement to more than 7,500 men. In spite of this expansion in our personnel, the average case load per Agent is nearly twice that which is most desirable.

Recognizing the increasing demands on our investigative personnel, the President last month instructed the FBI to further increase its staff with an additional 1,000 Agents. Beginning the first of this month, classes for the training of new Agents have been scheduled until that commitment is met.

Allow me to use this occasion to enlist your support in bringing to our attention the best possible candidates for this Agent recruiting drive. Your assistance will help insure the high caliber of men the FBI has been privileged to obtain over the years. (3)

As many of you know, particularly those of you who only lately departed the Bureau's service, the 1960's brought great demands upon FBI personnel. These heightened demands began with the increasing tempo of civil rights investigations which at times required the full-time assignment of hundreds of Agents - as in the case of the three civil

rights workers murdered in 1964 near Philadelphia, Mississippi.

Beginning in 1963, FBI jurisdiction in organized crime matters multiplied to a point where we now are investigating approximately 10,000 cases.

The President recently signed into law legislation which will require considerable additional assignment of Agent personnel to broadened investigation of organized crime activities.

The Decade of the Sixties was also punctuated with the tragic assassinations including President Kennedy and the ruthless murders of labor leader Joseph Yablonsky, his wife, and their daughter. All of these cases required extensive commitment of FBI investigative personnel over an extended period of time.

With aircraft hijackings having become nearly a weekly occurrence in recent years, the FBI, along with several other Federal agencies, at the request of the President, has assigned armed Agents as guards aboard international flights of American commercial airlines. Who would have dreamed that in the "sophisticated" Twentieth Century the equivalent of the stagecoach "shotgun" guard of nearly 100 years ago would have to be resurrected. But such is the state of affairs when criminals can impudently seek protection from their crimes - as many have successfully done-by fleeing to Cuba.

Besides broadened responsibilities in civil rights, organized crime, and aircraft hijackings, the rising cadence of criminal acts fostered by extremist organizations has demanded heavy FBI manpower commitments to penetrate their announced programs to overturn the Government by violent revolution. Following the senseless recent bombing of Sterling Hall at the University of Wisconsin, legislation has been passed giving the FBI primary investigative jurisdiction in bombings at schools receiving Federal funds.

Indicative of the accelerating pace of terrorist criminal acts committed by persons imbued with revolutionary philosophies is the fact that eight persons associated with New Left activities are wanted under the "Top Ten" fugitive program, while one other is sought in this program for violations stemming from militant black pursuits. Even the "Top Ten" has yielded to the times. It now lists 16 persons wanted under the program.

Yet these areas of increasing FBI responsibilities that I have cited are only a few among the 185 matters in which we have investigative jurisdiction. Many other categories of our duties are experiencing expanded attention.

Space needs have also become critical. Since 1934, FBI Headquarters and Department of Justice have jointly shared space

in the Justice Building. Manifold increases in our and the Department's personnel over the years have required the Bureau to house some of its operations in seven other locations in the Capital. As a result, construction began in 1968 - to be completed by late 1974 or early 1975 - of a new Headquarters which will bring together all FBI operations in the District of Columbia, including the Washington Field Office, under one roof. This modern and attractive building will occupy the entire block across Pennsylvania Avenue from present Headquarters.

One of the interesting features of the new Headquarters building, particularly in view of the fact that as many as 650,000 persons have annually visited FBI Headquarters to view our operations, will be a specially designed tour for the public. These tour accommodations will permit many more visitors a more comprehensive view of all phases of FBI operations and they are designed to eliminate distracting influences which congested space at our present location sometimes presents. With the pre-eminent position the FBI holds among the law enforcement profession and the impact our duties have in national affairs, public accessibility to our facilities and knowledge of the true nature of our operations are a most important obligation.

Supplementing many fine locally organized and directed police training programs, the FBI, last fiscal year, assisted with nearly 1,500 skilled Special Agent instructors in the training of more than 260,000 law enforcement employees. Still, more and better law enforcement training is required to help quell the spiraling volume of crime in our society. In response to this need, construction was begun and is now well advanced on a new FBI Training Academy adjacent to the Firearms ranges at Quantico. This Academy - consisting of a ten-building complex - will have classrooms equipped with the most advanced law enforcement training equipment available. It will increase ten-fold our present capacity to train all levels of municipal, county, and state law enforcement officers in every phase of their responsibilities. (4)

Complementing an experienced staff of Special Agent instructors at the Academy, many of whom will hold Doctorate Degrees in law enforcement related subjects, will be expert guest lecturers from universities and other law enforcement agencies. The curriculum will not only include basic law enforcement techniques but specialized training, for example, in advanced police management studies and in police-community relations - both areas of immense importance to modern law enforcement.

Firearms training courses at Quantico have already undergone changes in accordance with our continuing studies surrounding the increased shootings of police officers, particularly by sniper fire.

Expanded Bureau programs and personnel have also required many of our 59 Field Offices to seek larger facilities.

Technological achievement has always been one of our country's greatest national assets. All areas of this burgeoning capacity are being explored by the FBI to select equipment which will best enable the Bureau to effectively serve its responsibilities and maintain the dynamic posture Director Hoover has consistently required. Most dramatic among the new technology of law enforcement has been the use of the computer.

In less than four years since its founding, the FBI's National Crime Information Center has become one of the milestone developments in modern law enforcement. Linked electronically with terminals serving the District of Columbia, the Royal Canadian Mounted

Police, and thousands of law enforcement agencies in 49 states, the central computer at FBI Headquarters now stores more than two million records on wanted criminals and stolen articles. These records, in most instances, can be interrogated and a reply made to distant points within minutes and sometimes even seconds. Daily transactions between cooperating law enforcement computer systems and our master computer center - known as the NCIC - have exceeded 67,000. Positive responses - or "hits" - resulting in the apprehension of criminals, the solution of crimes, and the recovery of property are approaching 600 a day.

Typical of the positive responses occurring daily at the Center was a recent incident in which a Connecticut State Police Officer stopped a truck with a defective muffler. His suspicions aroused by the appearance of the truck and its cargo of 14 persons, the officer requested an NCIC check which was immediately accomplished through his car radio's dispatcher. Moments later, while still at the scene, he was informed over his cruiser's radio that the truck was listed in the NCIC as having been stolen two days earlier in Florida and that one of its 14 passengers was an escaped Federal prisoner from West Virginia. The startling swiftness and efficiency of the computer did not end here,

however. At the instant it made its response to the Connecticut State Police, FBI Headquarters was informing Florida authorities of the truck's recovery and the Pittsburgh office of the FBI, covering West Virginia, of the location of the fugitive for whom it had investigation outstanding.

Harnessing the wizardry of the computer for law enforcement objectives is not new to the FBI. For many years prior to inaugurating the NCIC, it has been used for many complex accounting investigations as well as for certain administrative tasks. Its potential future use is, however, truly astonishing.

Already well advanced are research contracts awarded competent private firms to develop an electronic scanner which, when coupled with computerized fingerprint records, can automatically search for and retrieve a single record from among the nearly 200 million fingerprint files in the FBI Identification Division. Connected with law enforcement agencies throughout the country it will serve their fingerprint inquiries - including those initiated directly from a crime scene - with the same speed and exactness as does now the NCIC.

I hope these few highlights of today's FEI operations and plans capture the vigor and foresight with which Director Hoover is committing the Bureau to its present and future responsibilities. With continued support from dedicated organizations such as yours, the FEI pledges to maintain the same standards of excellence in the performance of its duties as the Nation has a right to expect.

I apologize only in having taken you from Fantasyland on this brief trip back to Realityland.

SYNOPSIS:

Captioned has demonstrated great support for the Director and the Bureau, giving particular aid in recent years when FBI was attacked by hostile groups. High regard for Director and FBI again evidenced at 1970 National meeting in California when Assistant Director, Casper, representing Director, received rousing reception while addressing group. Many highly placed members continue to render valuable services. While in years past, a few members showed poor attitudes, current officers maintain careful control. Two SAC letters issued in 1953 and 1954 restrict Bureau contact with Society. In view of excellent relations, it appears timely to rescind restrictions.

DETAILS:

Captioned group has demonstrated, particularly in recent years, stalwart support for the Director and the Bureau, especially when the FBI has been subjected to false and malicious charges by hostile groups and individuals. A host of former Bureau Agents belonging to this Society have rallied to the Bureau's support in times of need and many of these highly placed individuals have forcefully displayed their continuing loyalty to the Bureau and its principles.

In recognition of the debt they owe to Mr. Hoover and the FBI, officials of this Society commissioned a famous artist to create a sculpture of the Director which was presented to the Director by the Society in 1964 as an expression of their appreciation. During their National Convention in Washington in 1967, the Director further cemented relations by attending a "Homecoming" luncheon given in his honor by the Society. It was a memorable event which highlights the degree of affection with which their group holds the Director.

Typical of the current spirit of recognition by Society officials and members of the debt they owe the Director and the FBI was the tremendous reception given to Assistant Director Casper of the Training Division when he addressed a business meeting during their National meeting, held in Southern California on October 21-24, 1970. Standing ovations were given before and after his remarks, as an obvious tribute to the Director whom he represented.

In years past, there were a few instances of unwholesome attitudes by a handful of individuals of this Society. These malcontents have since been effectively quieted by the established executive leaders of the Society who have repeatedly evidenced in the past decade wholehearted support for the Director and the Bureau. Careful screening is now given by the ex-Agents' Society to prospective members and anyone with a dissident attitude faces exclusion from their ranks.

In 1953 and 1954, before current controls were exercised and when a few isolated members displayed improper attitudes, instructions were issued via SAC letters 53-22 (G) dated 3-24-53, and 54-13(E) dated 3-9-54 (Copies attached) restricting Bureau participation in mutual activities. These instructions have remained in effect.

Since then, specific Bureau authority has been granted in individual instances for Bureau representatives to exchange social courtesies with the ex-Agents' Society and substantial public relations accomplishments have followed from these contacts. Many highly placed men who belong to this Society, including corporation heads, security chiefs, legislators and jurists, have rendered invaluable aid to the Bureau.

It appears timely now, in view of the current outstanding relations with this Society, to rescind the contact prohibitions issued in 1953 and 1954. All contacts, will, of course, be carefully followed to insure there are no attempts by Society Chapters or members to take advantage of the Bureau's prestige and care will be taken to make certain the Bureau's paramount interests are zealously protected.

RECOMMENDATION:

That SAC letters 53-22(G) and 54-13 (E) be rescinded and the attached SAC letter, so instructing, be approved and appropriately disseminated.

me (G) SOCIETY OF FORMER SPECIAL AGENTS OF THE FBI -- If your office receives invitations to attend any functions of the above-captioned group, prior Bureau approval should be obtained. Field offices should not invite Chapters of the Society to attend FBI functions without prior Bureau approval. The Bureau realizes that there are many very fine men who are members of the above-captioned group, but, on the other hand, there are some who, frankly, do not have the Bureau's best interests at heart and, consequently, the Bureau does not desire to provide any official recognition of the organization. The above-captioned affair was held at the Shoreham Hotel on the evening of February 24th. Approximately 275 former Special Agents from the Washington area, with a few from other cities, were in attendance, including 8 of the 11 Congressmen who were former Bureau employees. Grady, Carroll and Noone have advised Bishop that they are proceeding with tentative plans for this affair with the distinct hope that the Director will be able to honor them with his presence. They are planning on approximately 1200 former Agents and their wives being present, with representatives coming here from all of the chapters of the Society throughout the country. An elaborate souvenir program is being prepared which will be dedicated to Mr. Hoover and an as yet unselected, but extremely suitable, presentation will also be made to the Director if he is able to attend. These three gentlemen are spending a great deal of time in the planning of this affair because they sincerely wish it to be an outstanding tribute to the Director and they envision it as an excellent opportunity to demonstrate to the country that the entire membership of the Former Agents Society is 100 percent behind Mr. Hoover and that he has their complete support and loyalty. They have told Bishop that they realize that it is extremely difficult for Mr. Hoover to commit himself to attending the affair very far in advance but they hope that he will give most serious, and favorable, consideration to their invitation and advise them as early as possible so that they can firm up the necessary arrangements which are now being made on a tentative basis. Bishop has assured them that he will bring their feelings to the attention of the Director.

BACKGROUND:

By letter dated 2/15/71, Theodore A. King, [REDACTED]

advised he was the General Chairman for the National Convention of the Society of Former FBI Agents who will be the guests of the Georgia Chapter in Atlanta, September 29 through October 3, 1971. He said he would be in Washington, February 24th to attend the Washington Chapter of the Society's Congressional Night and would appreciate the opportunity to visit the Director on that date to personally extend an invitation for the Director to attend that Convention. Toastmaster Coyne (ph), Mr. Hoover, President
Reagan (ph), officials and friends of the FBI, it is a thrilling
experience to be with you today. Well, I'm not going to read
anything, but I can think better with my glasses on.

I had intended to tell Mr. Hoover earlier but hadn't
the appropriate opportunity that the President asked me to express
today, as he has himself on so many occasions, his great admiration
for his friend of many, many years, his neighbor for many, many years,
his colleague in the Government of the United States, Director John
Edgar Hoover. Unfortunately, he is traveling to view the ravages of
hurricane and flood in the Rio Grande Valley but is with you and with
Mr. Hoover in spirit at this time.

To the former Agents here I would like to say that you
are alumni of an illustrious institution: an institution unsurpassed in
governments in the excellence of its performance; one that reminds
us at a time when it is so important that we be reminded that we have
faith that big government, which is essential to a mighty Nation of
200,000,000 people, can perform through institutions with effectiveness,
with efficiency and with fairness. I hope that each of you will also

always feel that he is an alumni not only of the FBI but of the Department of Justice as well, which feels so close to the Bureau, to its members, which works constantly in a common mission.

Of all the institutions of Government, there is none in our time in this hour of great concern about crime that we are so fortunate to have such excellence. Of all the agencies that could have reached this level of excellence the American people can be grateful that it was the FBI because of the dependence of our people upon its performance for both their personal security and their liberty. Of all the attributes of the excellence demonstrated by the FBI, perhaps none is more impressive than the balance that is always shown. Here, contrary to expectation, perhaps to many's evaluation of human nature, there is no quest for empire. There is, instead, the constant awareness that its mission is described and delineated by constitution delegating powers to the Federal Government and reserving powers to the States. That it lends its strength to law enforcement throughout the United States working daily to build excellence in State and local law enforcement which are so critical to the survival of this great Nation.

About the man that you honor today, there is nothing I can think to say more appropriate than that as Ralph Waldo Emerson noted in the simple days before the Civil War that "Every institution

is but the lengthened shadow of a single man." It seems incredible to me that this could still be true in our day of such complexity and vast number, but it is true; because, to a degree that I do not know to exist in any other institution, public or private, in this country, the great Bureau of Investigation is the lengthened shadow of John Edgar Hoover.

It will be recalled that by letter dated February 5, 1971, Lt. General Joseph F. Carroll (Retired), a former Special Agent, invited the Director to be the honored guest at a formal dinner to be held on May 7, 1971, in the Regency Room of the Shoreham Hotel, which is for the purpose of honoring the Director's 47th Anniversary as Director of the FBI and to recognize the 25th Anniversary of the Washington Chapter of the Society of Former Agents of the FBI. By letter dated February 9, 1971, the Director reiterated to General Carroll, as he had told him when the latter visited Mr. Hoover on January 14, 1971, that he would keep the invitation in mind but it was yet too early to definitely state if Mr. Hoover would be able to attend. In the same letter, the Director told General Carroll to keep in touch with Bishop and advised that he would let General Carroll know his decision at the earliest possible date.

In accordance with the Director's instructions, Bishop met for the second time, on 3/23/71, with General Carroll and with John J. Grady, Chairman of the Washington Chapter and Charles Noone, former National President of the Ex-Agents Society. They stated that they wished to advise Bishop, and through him the Director, that they are proceeding with their plans for the dinner on May 7th and they are acting on the assumption that Mr. Hoover will be able to attend. They stated that they expect 1500 former Agents and their wives at this formal affair and that they intend to do everything humanly possible to make it a sincere and heartfelt tribute to Mr. Hoover. They stated that they are particularly anxious to demonstrate through this affair the complete support which Mr. Hoover enjoys from the former Agents of the FBI in the face of the unwarranted criticism which he has received from such elements as Senator McGovern and a few dissident ex-Agents. advised that they expect that representatives of every chapter of the Society throughout the United States will be in attendance at the dinner, as well as members of the executive committee, past presidents, etc. They said that although they are proceeding with their plans on the basis that Mr. Hoover will be able to attend they, of course, would like to have a definite assurance from him that he will be able to attend so that they can continue their plans with confidence in his appearance. Because of the extensive nature of the planning and the distance from which many people will come to attend, the earlier they can get a decision from Mr. Hoover on the matter, the better it will be for them.

General Carroll advised that he intended to contact Mr. Hoover within the next day or so in order to determine if Mr. Hoover is able to give a decision on his availability and that he sincerely hopes, as do all members of the Society, that it will be an affirmative one.

In his meetings with these gentlemen, Bishop is completely convinced that they are dedicated to putting on an affair which will demonstrate to Mr. Hoover the affection, esteem and honor in which he is held by all members of the former Agents Society and they are determined to make this affair one which will show just how solidly behind Mr. Hoover the former members of the FBI stand.

In October 1967 the Society of Former Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Inc. held its national convention at Washington, D.C., and as an X-Agent I was in attendance.

The Society then had about 5,000 members and there must have been well over 1,000 members and their wives attending the luncheon at which Mr. Hoover was the main speaker. Others whom I remember being at the speaker's table were former agents who then were in charge of the Secret Service, military intelligence agencies, members of Congress, and a Presidential assistant. The then Attorney General also spoke.

Everyone listened attentively to the remarks of the speakers who preceded Mr. Hoover but the contrast when the Director entered the room was unforgettable. Over 1,000 people of their own volition rose to their feet and gave him a standing ovation that must have lasted five minutes.

These people were not then employed by the FBI but each of them expressed his continued admiration and respect for the organization and the man who had been their Boss in years past.

At the most recent X-Agents' convention, a resolution was passed reaffirming the continuing support of the Director and his entire staff by these X-Agents, and I enclose a copy of it for you.

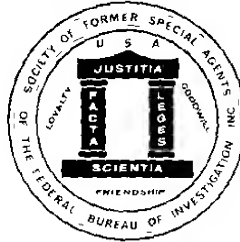

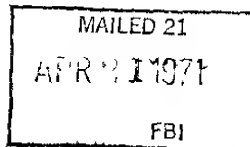

Hal Boggs Is Rapped By Agents

FBI Resolution Is Adopted Here

Eighteen former FBI agents living in the Tallahassee area, have passed a resolution condemning the "irresponsible politician Congressman (Hale) Boggs (D-La) for his recent unwarranted attack" on FBI Chief J Edgar Hoover.

The resolution, which has been mailed to Hoover, Boggs, and Florida senators and representatives, was voted unanimously by the Apalachee Chapter of the society of Former Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Steve M Watkins, local attorney and spokesman for the group said, "a lot of times people feel a sour note for their x-boss, but not us."

Watkins, a four-year veteran of the bureau, expressed concern over the possible damage which could be incurred by Boggs' recent attacks, saying, "political hacks will be the downfall of the bureau and not the personnel ... employed by this organization."

★ ★ ★

"THE BUREAU'S primary surveillance interests are internal espionage agents employed by the Soviet Union, the Communist Chinese and other governments not politically concerned with our democratic processes," Watkins explained.

Watkins said due to the secrecy which must often times be employed by the FBI when combatting foreign powers inside this country, citizens can not be fully informed of the extent of Hoover's service. "It is too bad the public cannot be fully appraised of the surveillance coverage Mr. Hoover has effected," he said.

The former agents meet once a month and include both "Democrats and Republicans" Watkins said.

For the Bureau's information, the 1971 Northeast Regional Convention of captioned Society was held in Buffalo, New York, 3/19, 20/71. The convention was sponsored by the Buffalo Chapter of the Society and Society President WILLIAM O. GRAY and the immediate Past President CHARLES N. NOONE, along with other national officers, as well as delegates from the northeast region of the Society, were present.

Mr. GRAY, who had formerly been a Resident Agent in Rochester, New York, Mr. NOONE, and [redacted] a Society member and [redacted] visited the office on Friday, 3/19/71, and were afforded the usual courtesies including a tour of the office, picture taking, etc. I also spent some time with these individuals and other members of the Society that evening and on Saturday evening, [redacted] and I were their guests at the convention dinner held at the Buffalo Club in Buffalo.

During the course of these contacts Mr. GRAY and other members of the Society expressed their extreme concern and dismay over the recent charges against the Bureau and the Director by Senator GEORGE McGOVERN (D-SD), and on 3/20/71 adopted a resolution in support of Mr. HOOVER and the Bureau, expressing their concern and support in a telegram to the President, the Attorney General, and to Mr. HOOVER. In his remarks before those attending the dinner on 3/20/71, Mr. GRAY urged all members of the Society to individually and collectively speak out in support of the Bureau, and specifically the Director, in connection with these unwarranted attacks. He also advised me that he intended to encourage support of this nature on behalf of Society members throughout the country during his official appearances as President of the Society. I also spoke to the group and took the liberty of expressing the Director's and the Bureau's appreciation for the Society's support.

Hoover Supported By Ex-FBI Agents

By ED TORONTO

Former agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, meeting here Saturday, sent a telegram to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover pledging their support to him against "criticism often instigated by those trying to take over and destroy our system of government."

Support for the 76-year-old Hoover, target of congressional and liberal critics as well as a disgruntled former agent, was contained in a resolution adopted by the Northeast Regional Convention of the Society of Former Special Agents of the FBI. The region represents 1,200 former FBI agents.

Wired to Capitol

It was wired to FBI head-

quarters in Washington shortly after the convention's final business meeting at the Lord Amherst Hotel, 5000 Main St., Amherst. An informal dinner at the Buffalo Club Saturday night, with Karl L. Brouse, special agent in charge of the Buffalo office, as guest, ended the two-day gathering.

"As former special agents of the FBI who have been privileged in the past to work with Mr. Hoover to maintain law and order and to preserve the internal security of our country," the message said, "(we) express our appreciation for Mr. Hoover's past and present leadership of the FBI.

"We note that Mr. Hoover and the bureau are being subjected increasingly to unjust criticism, often instigated by those trying to take over and destroy our system of government. We know Mr. Hoover has always stood for and worked to protect the rights of all people."

Continue Support

The pledge to "individually and collectively continue our support of the FBI and to defend it and Director Hoover" from such criticism followed.

The formal tone of the resolution was preserved in the telegram to Hoover, referring to him in the third person, and reflected the aura of respect that had gathered about Hoover as founder of the FBI and its director for 46 years.

Hoover's public image has been put to repeated tests recently, however, including one precipitated by a former agent named John F. Shaw, who had spoken of the director critically while in service and resigned.

Under Fire

That case brought Hoover under fire in Congress, where Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., charged on Feb. 10 he had given to a newspaper information he refused to reveal to a Senate subcommittee and branded the director "a liability to law enforcement."

Hoover was lashed by attor-

neys for the Revs. Philip and Daniel Berrigan, priests named in the director's anarchist-kidnap plot" charges before another Senate committee last November, as having "once more stooped to use his immense powers for the aggrandizement of his own office."

About a dozen representatives of the 11 Northeast Region chapters of the society heard national President William O. Gray of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, discuss the state of the society founded in 1941 to "perpetuate the camaraderie developed in the bureau as agents."

5,500 Ex-Agents

The society includes nearly 5,500 ex-FBI agents in 79 chapters across the country.

About 40 are in the Buffalo chapter, convention host under its president, Phillip A. Thielman, who was a special agent in San Diego, Calif., and Washington from 1960 to 1967.

Thielman and Gray said the society's purposes have expanded to include aid to members or present agents and their families. A foundation administered by five national officers sees to this. Some members help with the teaching and training of law enforcement students.

Sign Telegram

Gray and Desmond J. Bridges, Northeast Region president, signed the telegram to Hoover, with copies directed to President Nixon and Atty. Gen. John Mitchell.

Thielman and Gray were asked, after the meeting, why agents such as they resign from the FBI, in view of the devotion the region's resolution expressed for their former director. Both were prompted by nothing more mysterious than a desire to go back home and settle down as lawyers, they said.

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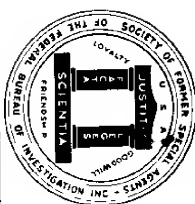

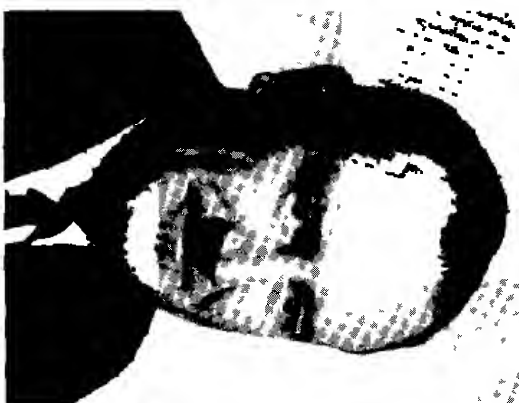
Richard D. Auerbach

Philip A. Thielman

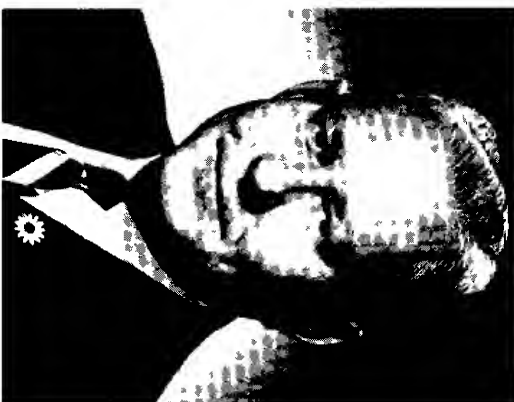

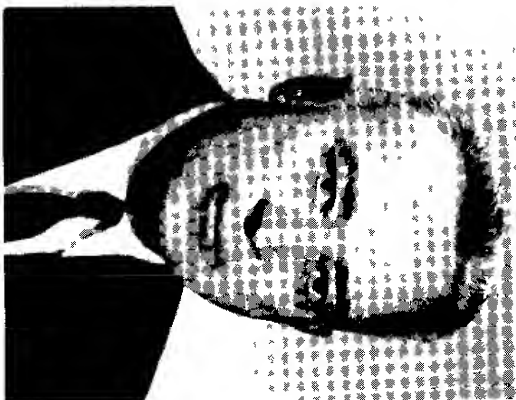

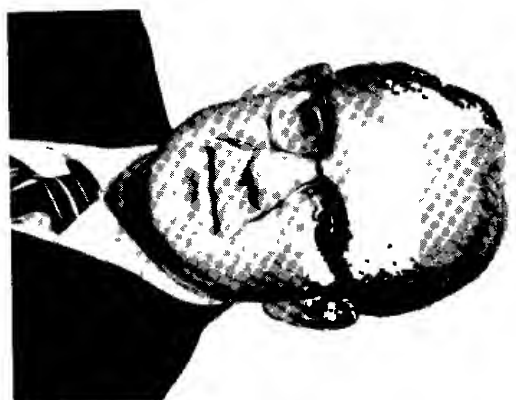
James L. McGovern

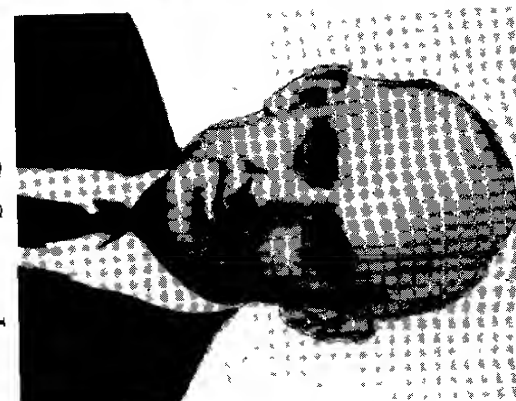
Caryl W. Garberson

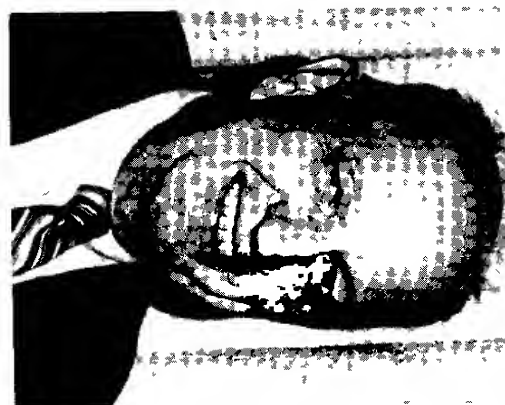


Robert A. Erskine

Devine, Blasts Boggs' Charges

Joins Hogan on House Floor in Denouncing Allegations Of Majority Leader Against FBI Director Hoover

Congressman Samuel L. Devine (1940-45) of Columbus, Ohio, joined Congressman Larry Hogan of Maryland on April 21 in denouncing in the strongest terms on the floor of the House the attack made on FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover by House Majority Leader Hale Boggs.

Boggs had alleged that the FBI had tapped the telephones of members of Congress but had failed to offer proof of any sort.

WIRETAPS EXPLAINED

Congressman Devine explained at some length the various wiretapping procedures since, he said, "there seems to be a great deal of misunderstanding on the part of some members of this body as well as some of our local newsmen as to exactly what constitutes a wiretap."

He said that "a wiretap is the surreptitious interception of a telephone conversation. The legality and illegality of wiretaps are carefully spelled out in the omnibus crime bill and Safe Streets Act of 1968. If a member of Congress, either in the House or the Senate, happens to call a person someplace else not within the confines of the Capitol that may belong to some organization that is under suspicion either from a national security or organized crime point of view, and that particular conversation happens to be recorded, that is not a tap on the telephone of a member of the House or the Senate. That distinction should be clear to all of us.

"Now, there are other methods of eavesdropping on conversations.

"One method involves microphones or what is commonly referred to as bugs. In other words, you just put the device on a wall of a hotel room and pick up conversations or activities in an adjoining hotel room. But that is not a wiretap.

RECORDING DEVICES

"A third method at times used by law enforcement agencies in order to get a complete record of a conversation of a suspect or a subject in a crime is the use of recording devices worn by a party to the conversation or attached to the telephone with the knowledge and permission of one of the participants in the conversation. "These are the methods sometimes used whether they involve a member of this body but which have been inaccurately referred to as wiretaps.

"The Supreme Court has ruled in separate cases that such methods of electronically overhearing and recording conversations are legal so long as one party to the conversation has given consent.

FBI HAD COURT ORDER

"And, Mr. Speaker, it should be emphasized that in the case involving a member of this body the FBI even had taken the precaution of obtain-

ing a court order authorizing the overhearing and recording of a specific telephone conversation using a recorder to report the face to face conversations in advance.

"This is an unusual precaution indeed, since it goes well beyond the legal requirements and shows very clearly the dedication of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to the avoidance of any unnecessary infringement upon the prerogatives of the legislative branch.

"Now, Mr. Speaker, the distinguished majority leader made great measure in his remarks about having been approached by two high officials in the Department of Justice. That is not the FBI but in the Department of Justice. He would have us believe that he is only serving as a spokesman for two highly placed Department of Justice officials who have contacts with the FBI and who came to see him shortly before he made his intemperate charges on April 5 against the FBI and demanding the resignation of its great Director, the Hon. J. Edgar Hoover.

CALLS ATTACK AN OUTRAGE

"Mr. Speaker, I may be prejudiced because I too, like the gentleman from Maryland (Mr. Hogan), served as an FBI Agent for nearly five years. It has been about a quarter of a century ago since I left the FBI, but I have been in contact with the Bureau, its Agents, and its Director, and I might say that my contacts with the Director have been as late as yesterday. He is just as sharp, he is just as alert, he is just as on the ball as during his entire 41 years of service. I think it is an outrage and a shame, as he approaches the time when he will retire, this great, loyal, and dedicated public servant, to be placed under a cloud raised by irresponsible charges for which thus far there has been no proof offered.

"So, now, I doubt that the FBI

will dismiss J. Edgar Hoover because of the word of two faceless informants and that their word would be taken above the word of Mr. Hoover who has been endorsed by and served under eight Presidents of this nation, who has served under numerous Attorney Generals, who has served numerous members of Congress, who enjoys the respect of the national chiefs of police and the National Sheriffs Association, is just beyond conception.

"Mr. Speaker, the majority leader on April 5 criticized the FBI for stationing Agents on college campuses to infiltrate college organizations, another false charge. Has the majority leader begun his own infiltration campaign? Has he planted sources within the FBI, if he feels that infiltration and informants are so bad? Then, let him have the stature to produce the two highly-placed Department of Justice officials so we can be informed as to what their complaints are and we can also explore what their motives may be. Who are they?"

RIDICULOUS CHARGES

"The majority leader asserts these two sources allege the FBI is being destroyed because it has not been used to fight crime but, to the contrary, to protect the position of Mr. Hoover.

"Well, hogwash. "While protecting Mr. Hoover, last year the FBI Agents also managed to collect enough evidence to lead to convictions of nearly 500 persons in organized crime. They also collected enough information which, when passed along to local law enforcement agencies, led to over 800 indictments and arrests of some 4,400 organized crime figures. And also, in the 1970 fiscal year Agents, which these faceless, unnamed sources claim were so busy protecting Mr. Hoover, (continued on page 46)

Free Insurance For Wives

**\$2,000 Policy at No Extra Cost Given to Those Under 50;
Coverage for Members 65 to 70 Raised to \$5,000**

Continuing the expansion of benefits under the Society's Group Life Insurance Program with North American Life & Casualty Company of Minneapolis, President William O. Gray has announced several new features have been added without an increase in premium.

Most important among the new benefits is a \$2,000 life insurance policy on the wives of all participating members up to the age of 50. Edward F. Monahan, Chairman of the Society's Insurance Committee, reports that the protection will remain in effect until the spouse's 50th birthday, and is designed to provide extra coverage for the family with growing children.

The first wife to receive a life insurance policy under the new program is Mrs. Charles D. George of Clearwater, Florida, wife of the Vice Chairman of the Suncoast Chapter. The presentation of the policy was made at the recent Southeast Regional Conference at Miami Beach.

OLDER GROUP ALSO AMEN

The second added benefit under the Group Life Program, Monahan announces, is a 25 percent increase in the amount of protection for participating members between the ages of 65 and 70. The coverage for this group of members has been increased from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

North American Life & Casualty has also increased the administrative allowance for the group program which will benefit both the Society and its members.

In addition, the Society Executive Committee has authorized a 15 percent reduction in premium for the insurance year from July 2, 1971 to June 30, 1972. This provision for a premium credit at the discretion of the Executive Committee, depending

upon claim experience, was provided for in 1969 when the Society extended its insurance agreement with North American for five years.

In 1969, a 10 percent credit was provided, and increased to 15 percent in 1970.

In view of this increased attractiveness of the Group Life Program, particularly for the younger members of the Society, Monahan announces that North American has agreed to open enrollment to members not previously declined for coverage.

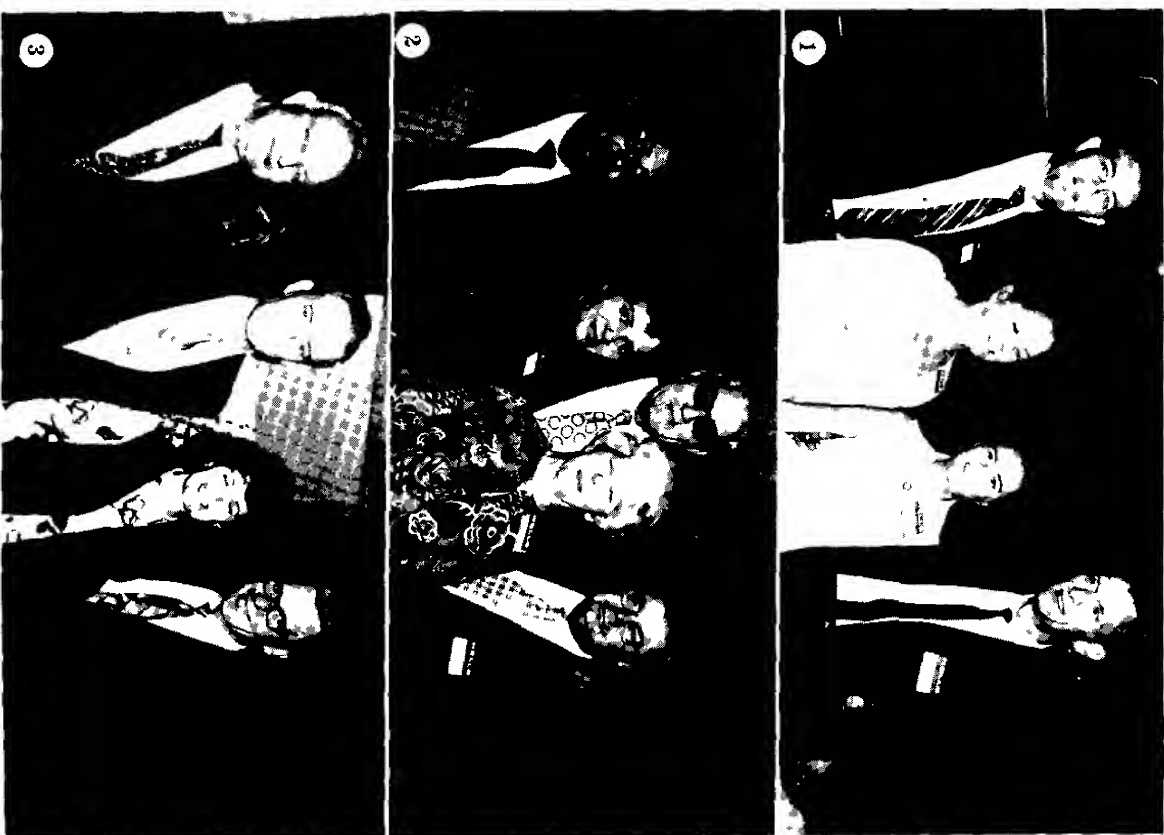

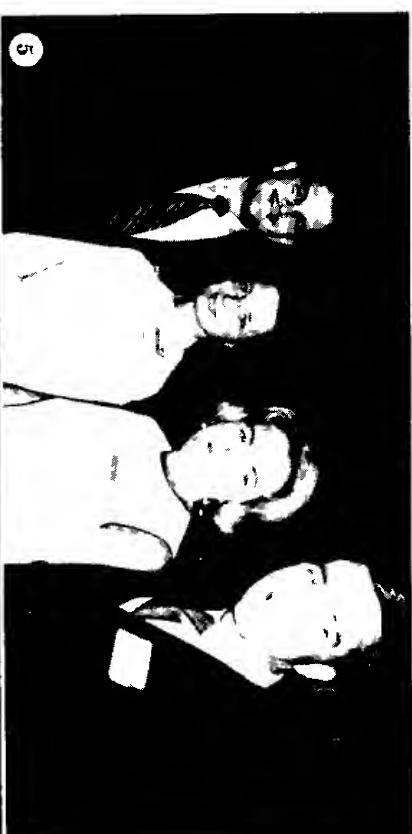
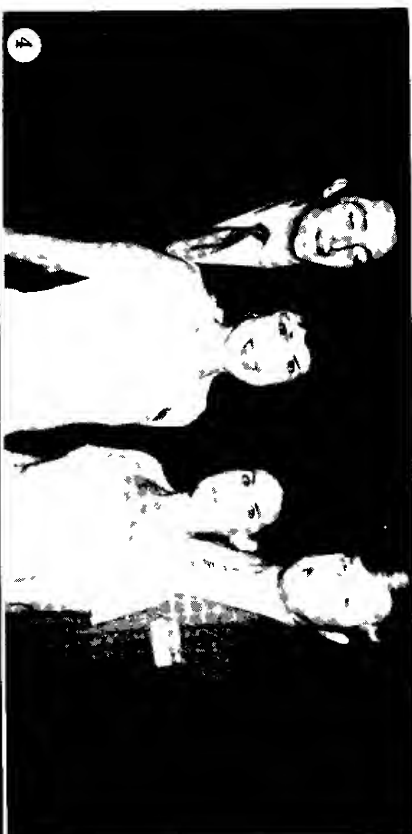

Kassinger says his department receives full respect and cooperation from most students and believes this is due in part to his requirement that all officers must take courses in the university.

DRUG ABUSE PROGRAM

"I want to have people who can relate to the academic process because they are part of it," he says. He is especially proud of his department's drug abuse program, headed by a pharmacy graduate student. Last year 16 students were arrested for narcotics possession on campus. This year there have been only six arrests. Kassinger credits his drug abuse program director for this improvement.

When a student is suspected of narcotics possession, he is called in and told he is under suspicion. The student is warned to reconsider his actions in the light of possible consequences.

"So far only two people out of 31 have told us to go to hell and both of them have been arrested since," Kassinger reports. "I think the word is out now — don't use drugs on campus."

Kassinger, a Georgetown Foreign Service School and law school graduate, believes increased professionalism in campus law enforcement agencies is an absolute necessity.

"The university community should be a model for the rest of society," he asserts, "and this includes the area of public safety. And as a recent report by the American Council on Education states, if colleges and universities don't govern themselves, they will be governed by others."

Obituaries

Carl F. Maisch



Carl F. Maisch (1947-58), of 203 West Montgomery Avenue, Rockville, Maryland, who was chief of the nation's sky marshal force, died May 12 at Suburban Hospital, near Washington, D. C., following emergency surgery. He was 56 years of age.

Mr. Maisch had directed the Federal Aviation Administration's program to avert airplane hijackings since last July when he was named director of the FAA Office of Air Transportation Security. He directed the application of FAA-designed measures against air piracy at key airports across the country.

A native of Philadelphia, Mr. Maisch was graduated from Pennsylvania State University and did graduate work there and at Temple University. He was a high school teacher from 1938 to 1942 and during World War II served in the Army Air Force as an aerial gunnery instructor and later a counter-intelligence officer. Following his discharge he was an instructor at Penn State for a year.

As a Special Agent of the FBI, Mr. Maisch worked in Washington and San Francisco in investigative and supervisory positions. After resigning from the Bureau, he was a staff investigator with the U. S. Senate Subcommittee on Investigations. In 1963 he joined the FAA as chief of the investigations division in the Office of Compliance and Security. He became deputy director in 1967 and director in 1969.

FAA Administrator John H. Shaffer eulogized Mr. Maisch as a "conscientious and dedicated public servant who had made an outstanding

contribution to improving the safety and security of air travel."

Mr. Maisch is survived by his wife, Marcheta, and two daughters, Gretchen and Emily Kristine, both at home, and a son, Michael, of Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Charles A. Whitten

Charles Alvin Whitten, a member of the Georgia Chapter, died May 11 at a hospital in Eatonton, Georgia following an illness during the last five years.

For almost a quarter of a century, Society member Whitten served as a Special Agent in the FBI, from 1927 until his retirement in 1948. During his tour of duty, he served in many offices, including Birmingham, Miami, New Orleans, Charleston, S. C., Johnson City, Tennessee, New York City, and Washington, D. C. He worked on many criminal assignments during his Bureau career, including the famed Ma Barker and Dillinger cases.

Since his retirement from the Bureau, he devoted most of his time to his personal interests involving land, timber, pulpwood, and farming. He was a veteran of World War I, a member of the Masonic Order more than 50 years, and was a member of one of the oldest families of Putnam County. His family was entitled in the Order of Cincinnati, a descendant of the families of officers of George Washington's Army of Independence.

Mr. Whitten is survived by his wife, the former Octavia Pollard, Eatonton, Georgia, sons, U. S. Army Lieutenant Richard Whitten, now in Viet Nam, Buddy Whitten, Eatonton, Dr. Charles A. Whitten Jr., Sarasota, Florida, a daughter, Mrs. Varve Dshel, Buffalo, N. Y., a sister, Mrs. Clyde McCart, Montgomery, Alabama, and six grandchildren. Funeral services were held in Eatonton, Georgia with burial in Pine Grove Cemetery.

Roswell T. Spencer



Roswell T. Spencer (1940-61), of 485 Elm Park, Elmhurst, Illinois, died of a heart attack at his home on June 10. He was 61 years of age.

Mr. Spencer was assistant superintendent of the Illinois Bureau of Investigation and was one of the best known investigators in the Midwest.

Illinois Governor Ogilvie said of him: "He was one of the really outstanding men in law enforcement that I have known." He recalled that he and Mr. Spencer, a Democrat, had been opponents in Mr. Spencer's only bid for public office, the 1962 Cook County sheriff's race which Ogilvie narrowly won, 964,001 votes to 931,680.

Mr. Spencer joined the Illinois Bureau of Investigation last February after serving two years as chief investigator for the Illinois Department of Revenue.

From 1966 to 1968 Mr. Spencer was chief investigator for the Better Government Association. Prior to that he was chief investigator under State's Attorney Daniel P. Ward and had a hand in the crackdown on crime syndicates in Cicero and other suburbs.

During his 21 years in the FBI, Mr. Spencer received 21 commendations from FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover. He was a counter-espionage agent during World War II, and helped capture eight German saboteurs after they landed by submarine on the East Coast.

Mr. Spencer received a law degree from Wayne State University, Detroit, and practiced law briefly before entering the FBI. He was an active member of the Chicago Chapter of the Society of Former Special Agents.

Mr. Smith was a member of the Lubbock Rotary Club, the Lubbock Club, the Country Club and a ruling elder of the First Presbyterian Church there. He was past president of All American Security Life Insurance Company.

He is survived by his wife, Stella, a son, David, of Austin, three daughters, Mrs. Jim Harris of Houston, Mrs. David Spaeth of Lexington, Ky. and Mrs. Gary Hancock of Odessa, Texas, his mother, Mrs. E. W. Smith,

establishing qualifications for commissioned personnel, planning organization structures for police departments at all component institutions, conducting continuing training programs (including basic, inservice sessions, and seminars, oriented to an educational community), maintaining and keeping a uniform record system, maintaining and keeping a uniform reporting procedure, and serving as liaison with other law enforcement agencies.

Carlson joined the UT System on September 25, 1967. He built the UT System's and its component institutions' police departments in such a manner that he has been called on by other educational institutions for counsel and advice in the area of law enforcement on campus. In addition, Carlson was invited by Director J. Edgar Hoover of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to write an article on "Campus Security" for the October, 1970, issue of the *FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin*.

In early part of 1969, the motto "Protection - Courtesy - Service" was adopted by the UT System and professionalization of the UT police has been Carlson's goal.

28 YEARS IN FBI

A native of Taylor, Texas, Carlson entered service in the FBI on April 18, 1938, after attending UT at Austin and working for the Department of Public Safety. 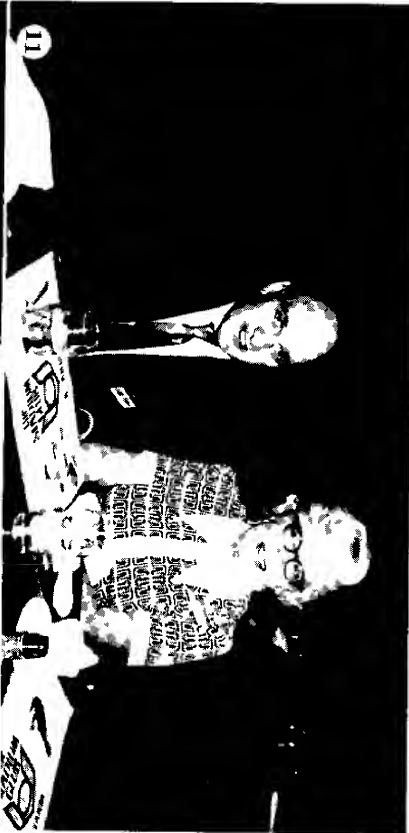

Probation Job is No Cinch

Nail, On Job For Year in Bexar County, Says More Must Be Done to Rehabilitate Men Coming Out of Jail

Chief Probation Officer Charles W. Nail Jr. (1939-62), of Bexar County, Texas, has been on the job just a year now and already has quite a list of projects he'd like to see initiated to improve conditions in the San Antonio area.

For one thing, he doesn't think that enough is being done to rehabilitate men who have been placed on probation. Most of the prisoners applying for probation have no skills with which to earn a living once they are released from jail, he reports.

Nail says he needs more personnel in the probation office and a diagnostic section to test and analyze persons applying for probation. His office is now handling about 1,400 persons a month who have been convicted of felony crimes and 900 persons who have been convicted of misdemeanor offenses.

CASE LOAD INCREASING

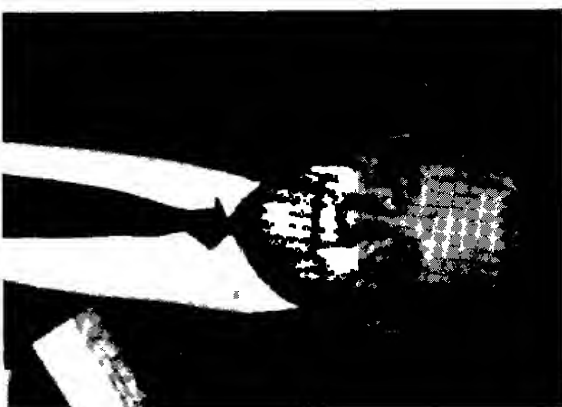
"The case load is increasing constantly," he reports. "It averages out to where each of the seven probation officers talks to at least 70 persons a day."

In addition to this work, Nail's office is called on by the courts to investigate the backgrounds of about 75 persons convicted of felony crimes and 100 persons convicted of misdemeanor offenses each month, to determine if they are eligible for probation.

"When we consider giving a person probation, we have to think of it in the light of the best interests of the defendant, the court and the public," Nail explains.

A written report is submitted to the judge who determines whether or not the convicted person receives probation.

Nail is now receiving assistance from the Texas Rehabilitation Commission which has now assigned a man to interview those seeking pro-

bation. He will attempt to determine what job the defendant is best suited for and then see that he receives vocational training in that area.

SEeks FEDERAL FUNDS
Since Bexar County is short of funds to finance some of these projects, Nail hopes he can obtain Federal funds. He has a number of ways in which the additional money can be used. He'd like to enlarge the diagnostic section and begin a job counseling program. Also, he'd like to open a half-way house for persons getting out of jail, and money to permit his staff to take night courses that will improve their own work performance.

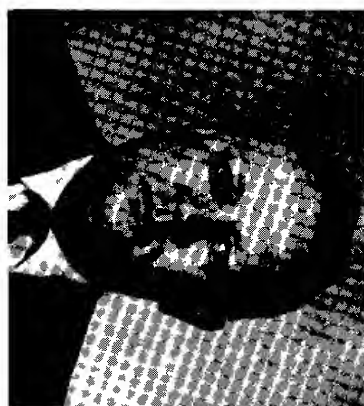
Prior to being appointed chief probation officer by the 11 district judges of the county, Nail was chief investigator for the Bexar County District Attorney.

The Department of Mental Retardation operates three residential facilities for the diagnosis, care, treatment, training, and rehabilitation of the mentally retarded. The Arkansas Children's Colony is widely recognized as being an outstanding state institution for mentally retarded and has been visited by individuals and groups from throughout the nation and several foreign countries.

Halliburton will develop, evaluate, prepare and coordinate special projects for mental retardation. He recently retired after 20 years of service in the Air Force and Navy. He also served as a Special Agent for the FBI and as an inspector for the Air Force Office of Special Investiga-

conducted investigations which led to over 13,000 convictions, the location of over 30,000 Federal fugitives, fines, savings, and recoveries exceeding \$400 million, and they also managed — while they were supposedly protecting the image of that great Director — to keep tabs on some of the organizations that have been under question in this country, like the Ku Klux Klan, the Black Panthers, the Communist Party, and many other extremist groups, both on the right and on the left.

"The allegations by the faceless informants are an insult to every member of the FBI and to the integrity of every American, and an indictment to the intelligence of any American who would give them any cred-

dence whatsoever.

SHOULD OFFER PROOF

"I would say to the majority leader that he has the responsibility to offer proof, to identify the names of these persons, these faceless officials in the Department of Justice who are so inclined to sneak in to him and give him information, but that he apparently does not wish to reveal."

Devine ridiculed other hazy allegations made by Boggs in which he said that other members of Congress "had reason to believe" that his telephone was under surveillance.

"I say to you once more," Congressman Devine concluded, "that we should have proof — or an apology is owed not only to Mr Hoover and the FBI, but to the entire nation for the headlines that occurred because of the untimely remarks of the gentleman on Monday, April 5."

Underground Atlanta

**Historic Area of City Restored During Past Few Years;
Now It's One of Major Attractions You'll Want to See**

When the traveller plans his visit to Atlanta, the place he hears most about is "Underground Atlanta." At first he is a little apprehensive about the word "underground," but during the short taxi ride or drive from his hotel to the downtown area, he senses that something exciting is going on in this bustling metropolis of the South.

As he approaches the entrance to Underground Atlanta, the faint sounds of a banjo band quickens his senses, and when he takes those first few steps down Old Alabama Street he sees before him hundreds of happy people strolling from one place to another in a Victorian city of the 1800s, complete with shops, restaurants, saloons, boutiques, cabaret theaters, and Dixieland jazz. He has discovered Underground Atlanta, the Historic City Beneath The Streets, a preservation and restoration project designed to be lived in and enjoyed, not just looked at and admired.

Underground Atlanta is unique in the true definition of the word. Where else will you find a city which has captured its birthplace beneath the modern-day streets, free and open for everyone to visit? Atlanta was born as a railroad terminal in 1837, but the numerous trains and tracks created traffic problems for this city that grew in a hurry. In 1852, the city fathers experimented by building a wooden bridge over the railroad tracks on Broad Street. This experiment worked so well that a huge civic improvement project was undertaken to raise the streets one level so the traffic could flow unimpeded by the comings and goings of the trains. The job was so big that it wasn't completed in concrete until 1929!

With the building of the viaducts,

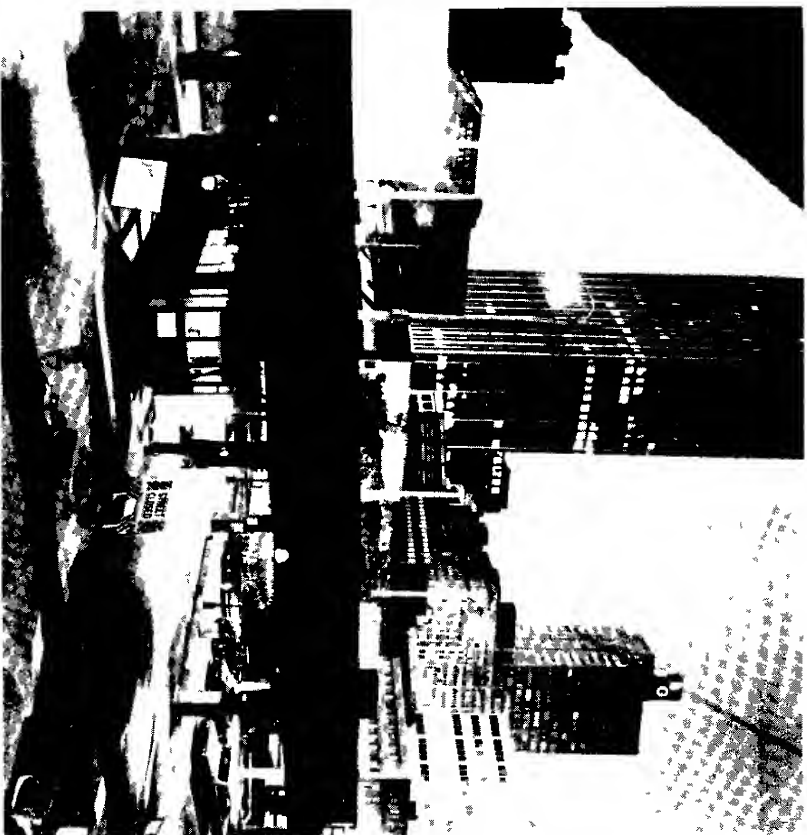
the streets beneath were shut off from commercial use, so the shopkeepers and businessmen boarded the fronts of the buildings and moved their operations up one level to where the traffic now flows. For approximately 70 years, these flamboyant buildings have been sleeping and gathering dust completely ignored by the people of Atlanta who were more intent on building a modern city with comfortable living, something they accomplished quite well.

HISTORIC AREA RESTORED

In May, 1967, Underground Atlanta Inc. was formed by a group of enthusiastic and enterprising young Atlantians to bring this historic area back to life. The company immediately put together all the wheels and cogs necessary to complete an undertaking no less ambitious than restoring four square blocks of downtown Atlanta to the glory it had known in the late 1800s. The historians did their research, the architects swarmed through the buildings, the construction gangs peeled away the decades of grime and dust, the real estate men put together the property package, the company officers guided the project and sold stock to finance it, and prospective tenants were lured back downtown by all the excitement being generated. Thus Underground Atlanta came to life again, the first businesses opening in April, 1969.

MANY ATTRACTIONS

Today the visitor to Underground Atlanta can dine or grab a snack at any one of nine restaurants, savoring such delights as a Mexican omelette, Irish stew, oysters on the half shell, North Georgia mountain trout, Rock Cornish hen, and many other dining delicacies. There are 23 shops offering goodies from around the world,

an astrology shop, an old fashion printer, a glassblower, a book shop, custom made knives, and on and on.

Special delights for the children include a museum of functioning antique musical instruments and machines and a blow-by-blow account of the Battle of Atlanta, 1864. Evening entertainment fans just can't take in everything in Underground Atlanta at one go, a cabaret theater with satirical review on the South, swinging Dixieland banjo band, several relaxing piano bars, a modern-rock dancing spot, and other vibrant and dy-

namic shows that keep the place jumping until the wee hours. Today there are 44 businesses open in Underground Atlanta, and there will be approximately 150 when the project is fully completed in about two years. There is without a doubt something for everyone at Underground Atlanta.

As the visitor leaves after a stimulating visit he knows he will come back soon and often to visit that shop he caught a glimpse of or hear that band he didn't have time to catch or try that other item on the menu that looked so tempting.

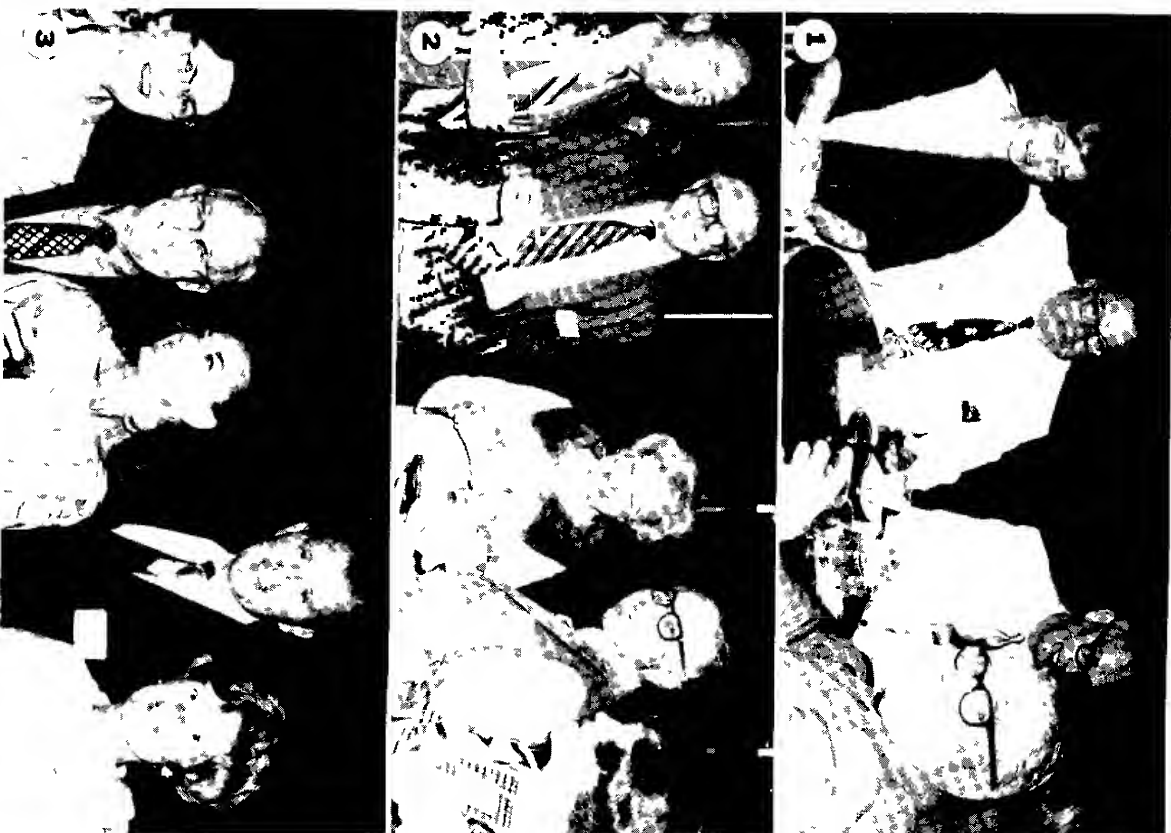

Society Members in the News

Edward T. Kassinger

Director of Public Safety, University of Georgia



Ed T. Kassinger

Edward T. Kassinger (1942-68), is attracting attention on college campuses throughout the country for the outstanding job he has done in developing a public safety program at the University of Georgia at Athens.

In fact, last year the University received an award of honor from the National Safety Council for having one of the finest public safety programs on a university campus.

When Kassinger took over the assignment in 1968, he received authority to begin at the bottom by junking the old system and building an entirely new one. Today he has a professional operation that is highly regarded throughout the State. This Summer his department is conducting a police training academy for law enforcement officers in northeast Georgia.

"To my knowledge we are the only campus police agency in the country ever given this responsibility," says Kassinger.

Kassinger preaches professionalism and active involvement in the academic community which he believes are essential to a successful university public safety department.

OFFICERS WELL TRAINED

In addition to completing the basic training course at the Georgia Police Academy and receiving 154 hours of instruction in law enforcement techniques, Kassinger's men must also spend at least two hours per week in the classroom, enrolled in either undergraduate or graduate level courses in law enforcement or community relations. Half of his officers, Kassinger reports, are now graduate students.

Public safety officers must also take instruction in life-saving techniques. The safety department's station wagons are equipped with stretchers, resuscitators and basic first aid equipment. Doctors credit campus officers with saving at least six lives last year.

Kassinger's Public Safety Office operates on a \$500,000 budget and is organized in three departments: protective services, safety services, and traffic safety and control services.

The protective services unit consists of a 40-man police force. The safety services division includes radiation and laboratory safety, fire and accident prevention and environmental safety. Traffic safety handles driving and parking regulations.

URBAN CRIME PATTERNS

Kassinger sees his job as an urban public safety responsibility. "We have a community of 27,000 people here," he says, "and while university officials don't like to admit it, we have some urban crime patterns with students being the victims of most offenses."

Last year 1,525 criminal offenses were reported on the University of

Recalled, too, is the tremendous reception afforded the Director at the 1967 "Homecoming" Convention of the Ex-Agents' Society in Washington when a memorable luncheon honoring him conveyed the outstanding respect and affection with which this group holds Mr. Hoover.

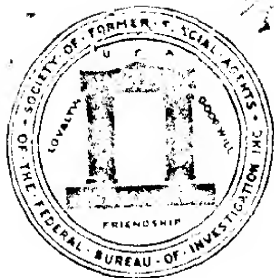

The Director has indicated that he will see captioned individuals at 11:00 a.m., Thursday, 9/16/71, and this appointment has been confirmed. By way of background, Lieutenant General Joseph F. In the Director's memorandum to Messrs. Tolson and Bishop of 4/12/71, Mr. Hoover pointed out that word has since been received from General Carroll that the dinner has been postponed and will be held sometime in September or October of this year, and that General Carroll will get in touch with the Director before that time to determine whether Mr. Hoover will be able to attend the dinner.

It appears that this is the purpose for which these individuals are now coming in to see Mr. Hoover. There follows a brief thumbnail sketch of these former Agents.

With further reference to the Washington Chapter of SFSA, General Carroll pointed out that there are more than 5,000 former Special Agents in the Society and that there are 79 Chapters located in the United States and abroad. He noted that the Washington, D. C., Chapter is twice as large as any other and includes in its membership some 11 members of Congress and at least 20 persons currently holding high-ranking positions in the Government as Presidential appointees.

With respect to the Society, the Director commented on the fine relationship the Bureau enjoys with SFSA, noting that such had not always been the case, as there had been some questionable individuals involved in its formation and during its early years.

General Carroll said that it was unfortunate that it was not possible for the Washington Chapter's 25th anniversary to be co-celebrated with Mr. Hoover's 47th anniversary last May. However, the General indicated that the Director's attendance at the forthcoming dinner in October would afford the Washington Chapter an opportunity to demonstrate its affection for Mr. Hoover and its loyalty and dedication to the Bureau and for what it stands.

**REMARKS OF ASSISTANT DIRECTOR THOMAS E. BISHOP
BEFORE THE 1971 CONVENTION OF THE
SOCIETY OF FORMER SPECIAL AGENTS OF THE FBI
ATLANTA, GEORGIA
OCTOBER 2, 1971**

There is an old saying in the FBI that you never say "good-bye" to a Bureau friend because sooner or later you'll be sure to meet him again. And there are many ways in the Bureau's service how that can be accomplished - a transfer, coming to Washington for In-Service, an inspection trip, stopping at a Field Office while on leave, calling a buddy a thousand miles away for a little advice and help!

Today I find this old saying more true than ever - with great personal joy and satisfaction for me. I've only been in Atlanta a short time but it's almost like reliving my Bureau career. I've met fellows with whom I served as fellow Agents; some who were assigned to field offices when I, as a supervisor or Agent in Charge, wrote their efficiency reports; and a few here who have written my efficiency reports!

It is indeed a pleasure to be your guest and to officially represent Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, our distinguished

Director. Before leaving Washington, Mr. Hoover asked me to extend his heartfelt and sincere greetings to each of you for a most successful convention. Not only that, but he wanted me to tell you how much he personally appreciates and is encouraged by the numerous expressions of support which he and the FBI have received from you - both from your Society as an organization and from many of you as individual former Agents. This sincere and unstinting confidence in the FBI has meant much not only to the Director but to all of us who are in active service.

The past year, as you know, has been a time of bitter - almost unrestrained - attack against the FBI. A chorus of jackals has howled a dismal litany of prevarication, innuendoes and misstatements against Mr. Hoover and the FBI. Columnists like Jack Anderson and Jack Nelson have fired salvo after salvo against us hoping to break down public respect for our organization. Anderson has even had his yokels going through Mr. Hoover's garbage cans seeking tidbits he might use in his syndicated column. A few prominent national figures, working on misinformation or for ulterior political motives, have tried to use the FBI as a punching bag. The last year witnessed a smear campaign of unprecedented proportions.

The smear campaign is probably far from over. Later this month, for example, a newly formed group called the Committee for Public Justice and the Woodrow Wilson School at Princeton University are holding a conference on the FBI. According to the original announcement, the Committee was to consist of prominent private citizens concerned that the Nation has entered a "period of political repression." Among the members of its Executive Committee is Ramsey Clark, and others associated with it are known for their hostility to the FBI and law enforcement in general. One of the announced participants at the Conference is Fred Cook who has made a career denouncing the FBI.

Here is a private group, under so-called intellectual and academic auspices, which is clearly stacked against the FBI. This is only another example of the kind of hostile situation we face and must vigorously meet.

How can we meet this challenge? By forthrightly and tirelessly telling our story, the story of the FBI and the story of how law enforcement protects the rights, lives and property of citizens.

This is not the first smear campaign directed against Mr. Hoover. Many times in the past there were campaigns by vultures looking for weak points. These smear campaigns failed simply because their instigators could find no solid evidence to support their allegations.

I feel that the current smear campaign, however, despite its noisy intensity, has failed in its basic aim to undermine the Bureau's respect among the American people.

Why has it failed?

Because of the tremendous confidence and support of the FBI by patriotic and concerned citizens, such as you in the Former Special Agents Society. These citizens know firsthand what the FBI is - the principles on which it was founded, the standards by which it operates, its goals for public service. Not only have thousands of citizens personally written Mr. Hoover and/or communicated their support to other FBI officials, but in their own communities by word of mouth, in forum discussions, in letters to the newspapers, they have helped puncture and expose the falsehoods spun by the jackal chorus of false critics. They have helped, in Mr. Hoover's words, to set the record straight.

On behalf of Mr. Hoover and all FBI employees, I want to pledge to you that we in the FBI will continue to fulfill our basic responsibilities and to uphold the high principles of our organization. The FBI is your organization too. You helped create it through your hard work, dedication and spirit of sacrifice. You

represent an alumni who are as interested as we, the present employees, in holding high the reputation of the FBI.

The recent criticism, unfortunately, has been catching the press headlines and has probably obscured many of the Bureau's accomplishments. I thought you might be interested in a "progress report" on some of the things going on now.

Probably of greatest interest to you is our progress at Quantico. Quantico seems to be one of those magic words for all former Agents conjuring up a host of memories - the eggs at breakfast, the lectures, the exams, firearms!

As you know, we are now in the final stages of completing our new FBI Academy complex. This is located just across the road from our new ranges on the Marine Base about 10 miles from the Old Academy building. If everything goes according to plan, we hope to occupy the new Academy in the late fall of 1972.

Let me tell you something about the new Academy. There will be an administration building, a student services building, a specialized law enforcement library, a large auditorium, a three-story building for classroom space and laboratories, and a three-section building housing physical training and specialized classrooms, for example where crime scene searches can be made.

You'll remember the housing facilities at the Old Academy building. Now we'll have two seven-story dormitories able to accommodate 720 persons. Lounges and a laundry area will be on the first floors, with 30 rooms on each floor. There will be two persons per room, with toilet and shower facilities located between the rooms.

These facilities, of course, will allow the Bureau to greatly expand its training possibilities both for our own Agents and for local officers. For example, we hope to train up to 2,000 local officers in the FBI National Academy per year - a tenfold increase over the present 200. In addition, we expect to offer training in specialized schools of shorter duration to another 1,000 officers per year.

At present, we are negotiating with University of Virginia officials to develop accreditation for educational phases of the Academy for officers successfully completing the program. Academic fields in the new curriculum will include, for example, Departments of Behavioral Science, Education and Communication Arts, Forensic Science, Law and Management. This accreditation will facilitate the transfer of credits earned at the Academy to colleges and universities in the graduates' home communities.

We are currently training a high quality faculty to handle our expanded educational program. A number of Agents are pursuing or have completed graduate work in a number of fields. In addition, as in the past, we will be calling upon guest lecturers to help.

We at the Bureau are extremely enthusiastic over the tremendous possibilities opening up in the field of law enforcement training. It will be with sentimental regret that we give up the Old Academy building - a building where all you fellows spent, I am sure, many pleasurable hours. But, the New Academy opens up vast additional possibilities in the FBI's fight against crime and subversion.

Still another field of almost sensational progress has been with the National Crime Information Center (NCIC). As you will recall, the NCIC was instituted in January, 1967, and currently there are 102 control terminals tied to our computer in Washington which provide service to Canada and to all of the 50 States. The NCIC, with its computerized index of documented information concerning crime and criminals, serves as the nucleus of a now vast information network which includes local, State, and Federal law enforcement agencies on a nationwide basis.

The NCIC's daily volume of transactions has been constantly increasing. For example, the central computer in Washington is now handling a daily average of over 72,000 transactions. Positive responses from the computer resulting in the apprehension of criminals, solution of crime, and the recovery of property number over 600 a day. The number of records stored in the NCIC central computer totals over 3 million.

A related program, which will greatly assist law enforcement over the entire country, is the FBI's computerized criminal history system. For over 47 years through our Identification Division we have exchanged criminal history information in the form of criminal identification records with local, State, and Federal agencies. This, of course, is a manual system operated through the United States mails. Working with the States, the FBI plans to process the criminal identification record for computer storage and make the computerized records available through an expanded NCIC communications network. In this way, criminal history information will be immediately available to Federal, State, and local police, prosecutors, courts and correctional agencies for day-to-day use. We believe that the computerized criminal history system represents a decisive breakthrough in law enforcement.

The FBI's success in the organized crime fight is most encouraging. During the 1971 fiscal year, as a result of Bureau investigation in this critical field, 631 hoodlum, gambling, and vice figures were convicted of an assortment of Federal charges, and more than \$9 million worth of cash, property, weapons, and gambling paraphernalia was confiscated. In addition, more than 1,000 organized crime subjects--including six national Syndicate leaders--were in various stages of prosecution as the fiscal year closed.

Passage of the Organized Crime Control Act of 1970 greatly expanded our jurisdiction in the illegal gambling field. Fiscal year 1971 accomplishments under this Act, which has been in effect only since October, 1970, amounted to some 725 arrests and the confiscation of cash, property, and gambling paraphernalia valued at approximately, \$1,700,000. Antigambling operations included the largest series of raids in Bureau history.

Another area of the FBI's current work might be of special interest to you, and this is our investigation of extremist New Left activities. This is a matter of key investigative concern for us.

Out of the so-called New Left, which started developing a number of years ago, has come a revolutionary-guerrilla type who is an extreme menace to our democratic institutions. An excellent example, of course, is the Weatherman, the extremist wing of the former Students for a Democratic Society.

Many of these New Left extremists are now living underground. They have changed their names, and are using aliases and moving clandestinely from location to location. They are bitterly hostile to law enforcement, and especially hate the FBI.

The Weatherman and their allies have been involved in a number of violations of Federal law. Some actually have operated bomb factories as symbolized by the terrible explosion in Greenwich Village in the spring of 1970. They have directed violence against military installations, police stations, Government buildings, private industry, and business establishments.

These revolutionaries represent a bitter and violent breed of criminal. They have absolutely no respect for the law or the law enforcement officer. They hate you, too, saying that as former Agents of the FBI you are "Establishment pigs" who should be liquidated. This hatred is not feigned; it is genuine and dangerous. Their heroes are Fidel Castro, Che Guevara, Mao Tse-tung and their basic aim is to destroy our society and democratic institutions.

Unfortunately, these extremists - whether they are Weatherman or members of the Black Panther Party - have many sympathizers. These sympathizers are often respected citizens of the community. They themselves probably would not be involved in an act of violence, but they are eager to give aid and comfort in the form of food, shelter, transportation, and counsel to the actual culprits. These sympathizers look upon extremist violence not as "crime" but as "political acts for a good cause."

Obviously, these sympathizers are hostile to law enforcement. They refuse to cooperate with our Agents. In fact, they will tell complete lies and falsehoods to protect the extremists. This makes the task of the FBI and other law enforcement officers more and more difficult.

Another construction project which receives considerable attention from the "sidewalk superintendents" back at the Bureau is our new Headquarters building. For those of you have recently been in Washington, you will have noticed that the big hole north of Pennsylvania Avenue between 9th and 10th Streets has gradually been filled with the underground structure and now, in the last few weeks, the first parts of the aboveground edifice have been shooting up. We'll soon be ready for putting up the steel girders and progress will then be even more rapid. Construction is right on schedule, and we hope that the building will be completed in 1974.

At the present time, the FBI's work continues to mount. The Uniform Crime Reports show a steady increase of crime. The Soviet Union continues through its espionage network to seek classified information in our country. The rise of the New Left, along with black nationalism, has propelled serious problems for the FBI. At the same time, we have received additional jurisdiction from various Acts passed by the Congress.

Perhaps never before in our history has the confidence of the American people been more vital to the FBI.

For that reason, we are deeply appreciative of the continuing support of the Society of Former Special Agents. If you visited FBI Headquarters in Washington or any of our 59 Field Offices, you would find at heart the same organization as when you left 20, 10, 7, or 1 year ago. Yes, there would be some changes. We've trained a large number of new Agents in the last year. In fact, we now have slightly over 8,500 Agents - the largest number we have ever had. You would find many new faces and perhaps different locations for some of the Field Offices. There have also been other changes in the interest of efficiency and improvement of operations.

But, in the FBI today we strive for the same level of excellence as when you were a Special Agent. We strive to do our very best, working to serve the people. Here the Bureau is the same today as in former years - and it shall be so in the future.

Yes, we have our detractors and critics. We have always had them. But as long as we in the FBI uphold Mr. Hoover's high standards, I am confident we will continue to merit respect and support of the citizenry.

Here is the challenge for the future.

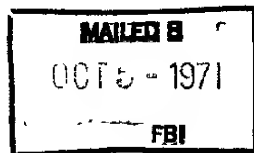

In accordance with the Director's instructions, Bishop attended the above-captioned Convention as Mr. Hoover's representative. Slightly over 1200 were registered for attendance at the Convention, which was an outstanding affair. Panels were held on legal and tax matters, industrial security and national affairs. In addition, at the luncheon on Thursday, September 30, 1971, Vice President Agnew was the featured speaker. In his talk he made very favorable mention of the Director and the FBI (a communication from Mr. Hoover has already been sent to the Vice President thanking him for his remarks). The Vice President was extremely well received by the members of the Society and it was obvious that he was impressed with the high quality of the membership. Governor James Carter of Georgia also appeared at the luncheon and made brief welcoming remarks. At the general business meeting held on Saturday morning, October 2, 1971, Bishop was the featured speaker and delivered the speech previously approved by the Director. It was extremely well received by the members and their wives who were also permitted to attend the business meeting on this day because of the Bureau representative being the speaker. At this general business meeting, two resolutions were passed, commending the Director and expressing support for him. These are being submitted separately to the Bureau by the Chairman of the Resolutions Committee and will be appropriately acknowledged upon receipt.

During the convention literally hundreds of former Special Agents made a point of expressing to Bishop their complete admiration, support and loyalty to the Director and the FBI. In private conversations

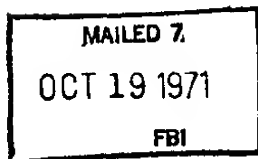

By letter to the Director dated 10-4-71, captioned individual advised he was coming to Washington on 10-22-71, to attend the dinner being sponsored on that date by the Washington Chapter of the Society of Former Special Agents for the purpose of honoring the Director. He wondered if it would be possible to call on the Director on that date in order to pay his own respects as well as those of the entire membership. He orally advised Bishop that necessity for plane trip prevents him arriving before noon on 10/22/71.

He went on to point out that the next convention of the Society would be held in New Orleans, Louisiana, from November 8-11, 1972, and he wanted to know if it might be possible for Mr. Hoover to address the members of the Society at that time.

He also noted the abuse which had been directed toward Mr. Hoover and the Bureau recently, and he pledged the fullest kind of support from the Society's entire membership and indicated that he and his associates were ready at any time to serve the Bureau in any possible way.

Mr. Dence is a former Special Agent who EOD as a clerk on [redacted] as an Agent on [redacted] and voluntarily resigned on [redacted]. He had a good record while he was in the Bureau, has been most cordial in his correspondence with us, and has repeatedly expressed his warmest personal regards for the Director. He has stated several times that he was always ready and available to be of any possible service to Mr. Hoover or the Bureau. Since his resignation, [redacted] and over the years he has been very active in the Society where he has held several national offices.

While in Miami, Dence appears to have been a strong "law and order" man and has, on occasion, aligned himself with those political figures in South Florida who have pledged to direct their activities against crime and the various criminal elements. [redacted]

On 8-30-61, Dence and [redacted] came to the Bureau and were afforded a very special tour. At that time, he discussed the communist menace with a Bureau official, expressed his deep concern about this problem, and spoke most highly concerning the manner in which Mr. Hoover was dealing with communism.

In May, 1967, [redacted] wrote to the Director and wanted to know if a duplicate 10-year Service Award Key could be given to [redacted] inasmuch as the original had been taken in a burglary of their home.

In view of existing Bureau policy, [redacted] was informed that it would not be possible to do this.

We have no records indicating that Mr. Dence has ever received an autographed book or photograph of the Director, and the files of the Identification Division contain no arrest data identifiable with him. Also, the files of the Director's Office contain no additional information regarding Mr. Dence.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) Although 10-22-71, is the evening on which the Director is to appear at the dinner being sponsored by the Washington Chapter of the Society, it is felt that Mr. Hoover might desire to indicate a convenient time on the afternoon of 10-22-71, when he could meet briefly in his Office with Mr. Dence.

I am making no P.M. appointments hereafter. I can see him in the A.M. or either Oct 22 or Oct 23.

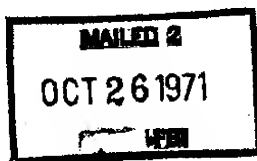

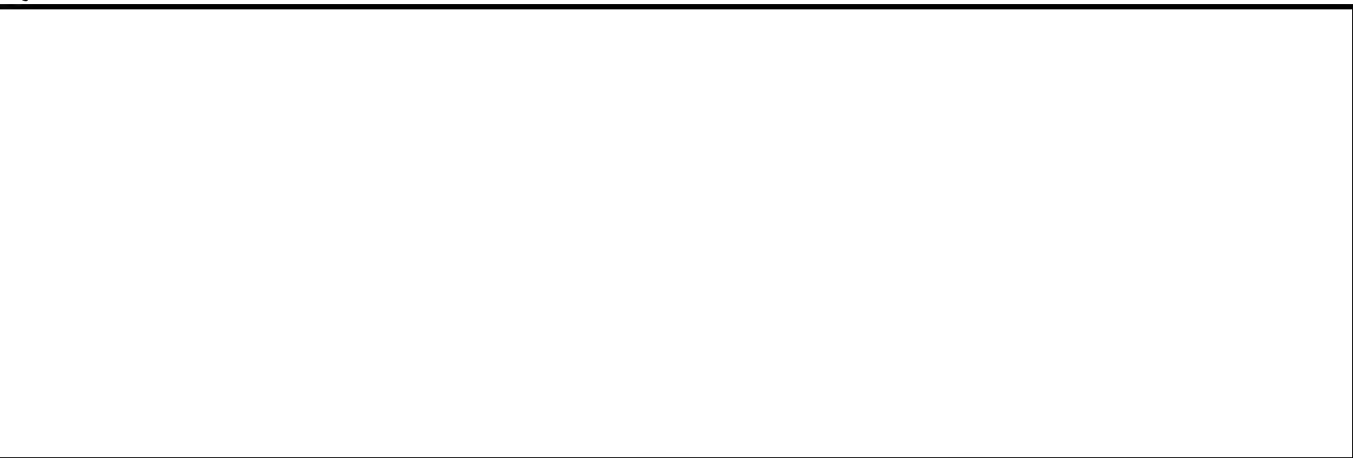

Washington, November 9: FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover has done some timely and most significant talking, but remarkably what he had to say has gone unreported.

With characteristic bluntness and forthrightness, the FBI chief replied to the furious and rancorous anvil chorus of denunciations that has characterized radical-liberal fulminations lately. He pulled no punches about them, the news media and the courts.

Yet not a line of his bare-knuckle observations has been published -- in striking contrast to the prompt dissemination the media give to virtually every attack on him and the FBI.

In Hoover's ignored discussion -- as guest speaker at the 25th anniversary of the Washington chapter of the Society of Former Special Agents of the FBI -- he sternly warned that "the publication of drivel, while admittedly a right, is not the best way of discharging the precious responsibilities of a free press".

"Incredible as it may seem," he continued, "there have been instances in which the news media, particularly television, have accepted without question wildly improbable allegations made by hate groups ~~and~~ even when the facts have been readily accessible, certain segments of the media have chosen to ignore and disregard them."

Unfortunately, the truth never seems to catch up with the 'big lie', and even if it does, it is too late to undo the harm that has been done in denigrating the forces of law enforcement.


"The foundation of any news media should be truth, objectivity and justice. Criticism, of course, is essential in our democratic society. But criticism without basis is demoralizing and serves the interests of those subversives and criminals who seek to serve only themselves and not democracy. No man has the inherent right to place himself above and beyond the law, even though he may personally consider that law to be onerous."

"If we are to survive as a nation, we must challenge the attitude of those who have been selling America short, who want to destroy, and who want rights without responsibilities, and who encourage disrespect for law and order."

SOFT-HEADED JUDGES

With equal severity, Hoover castigated "indulgent judges", "misguided attorneys" and others favoring the "coddling of law breakers".

Society to survive must protect itself, the FBI Director held, from criminal, subversive and disruptive elements. Justice is not served when innocent victims and society suffer while law breakers go free.

"Too long we have concerned ourselves with the plight of the criminal," warned Hoover. "We have coddled him, we have shown him compassion, mercy and leniency, and all too often, he has shown us  contempt and non-repentance. It is time we stopped coddling the hoodlums and the hippies who are causing so much serious trouble these days. Let us treat them like the vicious enemies of society they really are regardless of their age. Let the punishment fit the crime, not the age."

"Justice cannot be served when the rights of society are trampled in our courts by over-indulgent judges and misguided attorneys whose overriding concern for the criminal and obsessions with legal technicalities have all too often distorted the true meaning and purpose of our constitutional guarantees. Justice is not a separate thing; it is inherent in law and order."

Citing that in the past 12 months 105 FBI agents were assaulted and that in the last few years agents have engaged in 67 gun battles, Hoover zeroed in squarely on "a few journalistic prostitutes".

"In their jaundiced outlook upon realities and truth," he said, "they have attributed the increase in crime as somehow the fault of the FBI or the result of inadequate performance by it. They completely ignore the fact that the overwhelming part of the increase in crime has been in areas where the FBI has neither the authority nor jurisdiction -- namely at the local and state levels.

"The hazards of being a law enforcement officer, an FBI agent, continue to increase at an alarming rate as certain elements are determined to defy lawful authority and are encouraged in it by vituperative segments of the news media. Disregard for law and order is encouraged by hate mongers, extremists and others who assert that revolution against society is justified and necessary, and that men should be permitted to rob, murder, loot and pillage with impunity to achieve their aims."

The FBI has exacting standards and apologizes to no one for them, Hoover asserted proudly. Further, it has no intention of compromising those standards to "accommodate kooks, misfits, drunks and slobs."

"Maybe those of us in the FBI are narrow-minded when we frown on indiscretions involving unmarried couples," Hoover said. "Maybe we are intolerant when we refuse to permit our personnel to participate in the activities of groups

and organisations hostile to our government. Maybe we are old-fashioned when we frown upon extreme hair styles and wearing apparel. If we are, I am confident that ~~maximum~~ the majority of the American people share our views.

"We live in a period of great stress and turmoil. If this country is to wage an effective war against crime, it cannot be done by lessening the severity of the present laws, but by enforcing them. The going will be tough, but when the going gets tough, the tough get going."

When FBI Alumni Gather, They Back Hoover

Life of Agent, Unlike TV Version, Described as 90% Hard Work, 10% Glamor

There were five of them in the room and as I shook hands with each I seemed to hear a faint clatter, as of skeletons rattling in a closet.

The illusion, if it was that, was perhaps understandable. The men who surrounded me with guarded smiles had spent, together, 135 years with the FBI.

The scene was a house in Merion where the Philadelphia Chapter of the Society of Former Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was holding a small informal meeting.

130 Members Here

The Society has some 5,580 members throughout the country, 130 in Philadelphia alone. They hold annual conventions (the 18th was recently held in Atlanta) and each chapter meets a few times a year.

The yellow fact sheet from which I deduced this information also bore this credo:

"We have taken firm stands against the recent increasing attacks from various quarters on both the FBI and the Director. We . . . have a duty to speak out in defense of the bureau and Mr. Hoover. We . . . publicly express our gratitude that Mr. Hoover and the FBI have continued to demonstrate their unparalleled record of service, integrity and loyalty to the country."

I asked if life in the FBI really was like the TV show starring Efrem Zimbalist Jr.

The laughter startled me. It also reassured me. It's nice to hear G-men laugh.

Not Like Television

"Oh no," said Paul Hagan, a lean 28-year veteran who now works for the Franklin Mint in Media. "The FBI doesn't work that way. It's 90 percent hard work and 10 percent glamor, if that. But that doesn't make a dramatic story."

Robert Masters, a burly lawyer who served from 1942 to 1963, agreed.

"Sometimes we look at the show and recognize a case we worked on. But we didn't travel all that much. A case is handled by the agent on the spot. He sure doesn't chase a suspect all over the country. It would cost too much."

I asked how often they'd fired their .38s in anger.

"We never shot anybody," they chorused.

Noticing my shocked expression, Bill Naylor (1940-1963), now security chief of Bell Telephone Co., conceded that he had come close to pulling the trigger a few times. "I remember a suspect who shot himself with his own gun when we had to disarm him," he said.

Heavy Firepower

"You see," said Jim Mullan (1939-1965), a onetime professional baseball player now with the construction department at the University of Pennsylvania, "when we made a raid and moved in for the arrest we always had so much firepower with us, a man would have been crazy to shoot it out."

Naylor, an elegantly tailored man with gray hair and eyes, said, "There is of course some glamor. There is the prestige. The FBI agent is looked up to. And this is something we can thank Mr. Hoover for. Before he took over, the bureau was nothing. There was graft, inefficiency. Mr. Hoover changed all that."

He set up high standards of selecting candidates, standards of integrity, habits, education. He really made the FBI."

What about charges of dictatorship in the bureau, I asked.

"There is discipline," Naylor said. "In the training period they drill the same set of rules into you day and night. You have to conform to strict codes of conduct, you have to be a gentleman at all times. But that isn't dictatorship."

Nobody's Holding You

Doesn't that make for dull conformity?

"They tell every agent, nobody's holding you," Hagan said. "Those who stay in are of the same mold but we never walked with uniform step. I think all of us remained individuals."

They didn't have to wear

blue serge suits?

"It's a myth," chuckled Masters. "I once had a 45-minute conference with the Director and I wore a very light suit and loud tie. It didn't hinder my career."

"They say Mr. Hoover is aloof. Why, you have no idea of the humanity of the man. Once he was in Valley Forge—he was getting a Freedom Medal—and it was out in the open and it was raining. He wasn't even wearing a topcoat but he stood there for more than an hour signing autographs for the kids."

Doesn't Stand on Box

"They say he always stands on a box when he meets agents. That's baloney. I have never seen him stand on a box. They say he always uses blue ink on his memos. I say he uses whatever pen is handy."

Still, I said, at 76 and after

Hagan was ready.
"Felix Frankfurter, Dean

Mr. Hoover a birthday card."

It was true that FBI men
had certain characteristics in
common, Naylor said.

There is uniformity in one
thing, Naylor said. "It's the
friendship. At the conven-
tion in Atlanta I saw fellows
I hadn't seen in 20 years and
we picked up where we left
off as though we'd never
been apart. And we all told
the biggest lies, like fisher-
men. You see, in the FBI
you're kept pretty busy.
You're on 24-hour call. So
you just don't make any
friends outside the bu-
reau..."

Despite the Society's com-
mon interest, it has never
been a lobbyist agency, Mul-
lan said. "We're not com-
mitted to any legislation or
to anybody running for of-
fice."

The five agents agreed that
most attacks on the FBI and
J. Edgar Hoover were "un-
fair and usually made by peo-
ple anxious to advance their
own careers."

Attacks were not new, Mas-

ters said. "I remember looks
written against the FBI back
in the '40s. Of course the
bureau makes mistakes but
they are insignificant com-
pared with the accomplish-
ments."

Muskie Is Criticized

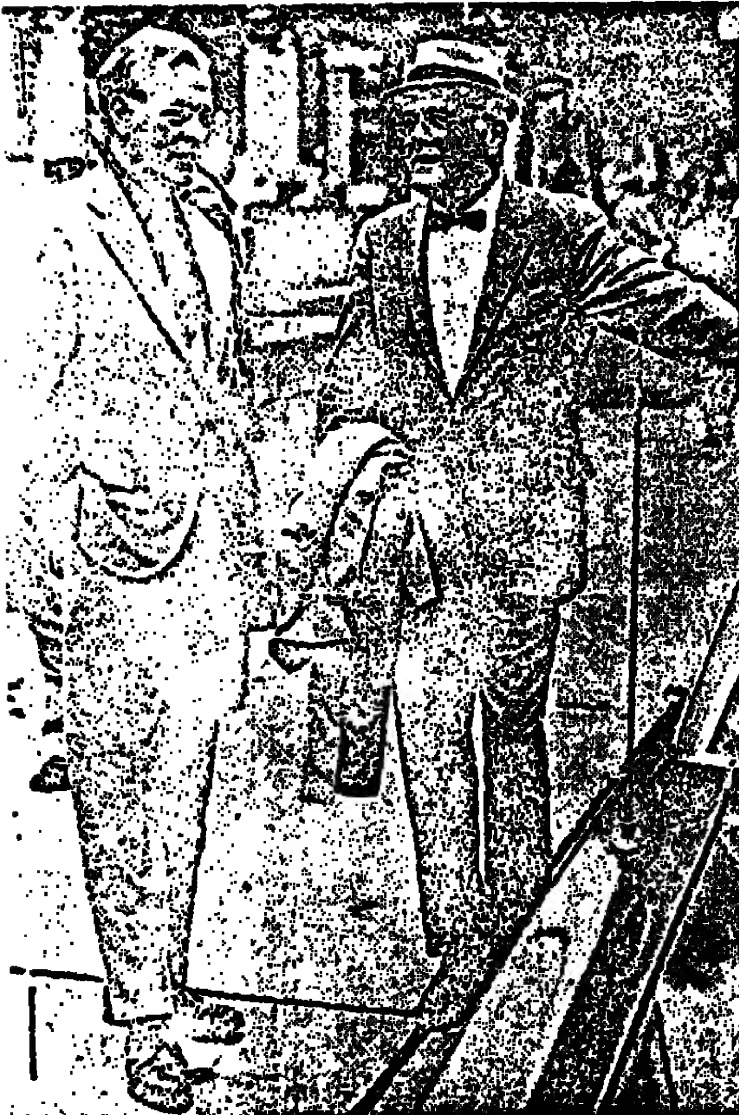
Hagan said he was particu-
larly angry at Senator Ed
Muskie who complained
about surveillance during the
Earth Day Rally last spring
in Fairmount Park.

"Muskie knew darn well
the FBI wasn't investigating
Ed Muskie," Hagan said.
"The agents were there be-
cause they were looking for
certain suspects. The trou-
ble was that Mr. Muskie
hadn't checked who all the
people were on the platform
with him."

"Senator McGovern also
made charges about wiretap-
ping that he never proved. So
did Rep. Hale Boggs. As for
former Attorney Ramsey
Clark, the Director was be-
ing kind when he called him
a jelly fish."

Mace Scovell (1940-45 and
1949-70), the oldest ex-FBI
agent in the group, said the
bureau had been criticized for
"riding roughshod" over
civil rights.

"But it was the FBI that
safeguarded people's civil
rights long before this was
popular practice among the
local police departments," he
said. "In the Miranda de-
cision, the Supreme Court
under Chief Justice Warren
specifically praised the bu-
reau and the director for
their longstanding practice of
advising suspects of their
rights. Unfortunately, this
kind of thing is forgotten."
