Dear left his paradise a few days ago and spent a little time with us here in Seattle. While he was here I tossed out for his consideration an idea some of us in the XVBI here have been mulling over. suggested that we solicit your views.
As you know the XFRI Society through the years has always studiously avoided enforsing or taking a stand one way or the other on any question or situation. Many have thought that as citizens in our communities we have ample opportunities to engage in civic affairs of various kinds. The Society has always maintained its position as a "social and friendship" group a cept for its support of the Director and the Bureau in matters of legislation, etc. Some of our local members - who have supported this view in the past - now wonder in the lift of national and world conditions whether we should centimae to be deliberately uninvolved. We have in mind of course the threat to ar fit enterprise system from the communist world.
Who the 643 me flam under the true Way II and flamework for

The two films "Jor uniam or tra "a;" and "Coeration
Abolition" have created a sterm of controversy in this part
of the country and I suppose to a greater or lesser degree
elsewhere. In spite of extremely poor production and content
they have roused the man in the "middle" and on the "right"
to the threat of communism to our way of life.

As an example, another former agent and I showed the film "Operation Abolition" to a Methodist mens group in recently. In the question period following they kept us for an hour and a half and we had to break away them. The first questions were about the film but they were soon about communism, how communists gain control of organisations, how they infiltrate into labor unions, how they recruit members etc.

The reason they asked so many questions was because as ferner agents they had confidence in our knowledge of the subject. We wonder if as former agents we are unsuare ed, how much we know about communism and how little the average eitisen knows but would like to know. We feel that former agents could fill a real need in this area and would like to do so if they had a "track" to run on.

We feel such a "track" sould be a movie film spensored by the XFBI Society and produced by professional people generally along the line of the old March of Time series. It would have to be carefully researched for accuracy. It should do two things: (1) sell free enterprise beginning with the Declaration of Independence and (2) show the threat of communism to this way of life. I personally believe that mati-semantar only would fall far short of a proper goal. As you know you don't sell Schenley products by running down your competition and we won't sell America by being anti-communist only.

As you probably know the Society has been apprecised in the past by a TV network with the idea of producing a series of shows based on actual cases handled by the Bureau. The offer was for us to supply the facts from cases that we had worked on and they would supply the writers. The Society for furnishing such facts would receive a substantial sum for its Foundation. This was turned down cold, and rightly so I'm sure, on the ground that the information we had in our possession was gained through a confidential sort of employment and was not really ours to give - and furthermore it could be the cause of some embarrassment to the Bureau.

I am sure the same objection would be raised against the film we have suggested UNLESS the Director would say that he would not object to its production from public sources of information. The principal purpose of this letter is to get your thinking as to what the Director's reaction would be to such a proposed film and pregram on the part of the Seciety. Is there say way the idea could be sold to him? We certainly could not expect any endorsement for obvious reasons but if he would say, "I have no objections, period" I feel sure we could sell the idea to our convention at Denver in October.

This question has been posed to a number of people here in Seattle who are not Society members, "Suppose the organisation of former special agents of the FBI preduced a film on Americanism and the threat of communism to our way of life - do you think it could be a valuable contribution to our sountry?" You would be amased, Bick, at the reactions - at least I was. "I'll see that you can show it im every school

in the city." "I'll make 15 phone calls to some fellow Rotarians and I'll help you raise at least \$10,000 fer its production." "It would be terrific!" "I'm sure you would, have more calls for a showing than you would be able to handle." These are some of the answers I received.

The other day I ran across this - "Surely to be men of our time, to be alive in the fullest sense of the word, implies a willingness not only to stand up and be counted but also to engage in some activity in which we believe." There is no group outside the government who could do more for our country than we could do and should do.

First of all, I would not prosume to speak for the Bureau. I think that in due time if you want to pursue these matters, that either or you should communicate with the Director. However, for what it is worth, I have no healtensy in passing on my own views.

As for the Society of Former Agents changing the policy of not emborsing or taking a stand on questions or situations, I think that this policy is well founded and the only exception to it should be when a special situation arises wherein the Society comes to the support of the Sureau or the Birector. In this I think the Society has an implicit duty because after all even though the numbership has no efficial connection, you cannot get many from the fact that they have a responsibility to maintain its reputation by their acts as an organization and as individuals.

If the Society was to change its policy then this would be the first step in what might become a chain reaction because if the national organization speaks out on numerous situations, then it would only be a matter of time before State and local chapters will be speaking out and before long confusion will reign.

As for the subject of Communism there is no question but that a transmious amount of educational work needs to be earried out constantly in this area.

I quite agree that the two films have erected a storm of controversy. Unfortunately this meet not have been the case had a little more foresight, restraint and planning been employed at the time the films were put together. The film "Operation Abolition" had an opportunity of becoming one of the most potent expose of Communican that we have had in a long time but unfortunately it was marred by taking certain scenes out of sequence and by becoming a vehicle for individual members of the Committee.

There is a lot to be said for a movie film which sould be sponsored by the Society but here again a lot of problems come up and unless a topacted job could be done, which would be foolproof in every respect, more harm night result them good. Should this be pursued them I think the script should be submitted to the Bureau, not from the standpoint of getting the Bureau's approval, but for giving the Bureau an opportunity of pointing out any deficiencies. I surlocally doubt that the Bureau should be asked to approve such a film but both you and I know there is no more expert knowledge in the land them is concentrated in the Bureau.

Frankly I do not know what the Director's reaction would be to a proposed film and program and I would be a little relestant to put him on the spot by raising the issue. Should you be in Mashington and happen to see the Director, then you could feel him out on an informal "eff the record" busin, but I certainly would not do it with a formal communication.

It was good hearing from you and I hope that both and you are continuing to prosper and render useful service which is characteristic of your past emissions.

If I can help at any point along the line, please let me know.

WHEREAS, it is the definite conviction of the members of the Society of Former Special Agents that the aforesaid column of John Crosby is scurrilous in character, and unjustly critical of an honored, devoted, and outstanding public servant, and the extremely reputable government agency he leads; and

WHEREAS, it is the further and definite conviction of the Society's members that the aforesaid article by John Crosby contains mis-statements, inaccuracies, half-truths, and displays on the part of the author a lack of knowledge of governmental functions and of the responsibilities of the various government agencies which is so deplorable that publication of such an article constitutes an affront to the intelligence of the readers of the New York Herald Tribune and of those other papers which published this article; and

WHEREAS, the article of John Crosby twists and misrepresents, makes inferences and draws conclusions without basis, with the obvious objective of directing unwarranted and unsupported criticism upon the Federal Bureau of Investigation and it's Director, J. Edgar Hoover;

BE IT, THEREFORE, UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED, that John Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation, be informed: That it is the conviction of the members of the Society that the statements of John Crosby are unwarranted and without basis in fact, and convey inferences and conclusions which are erroneous; and

Not one of the objectors offered us anything we could do and still in the Govt. said we were not qualified. I agree that as a body we are not all qualified but as long as we stick to the record (Masters of Deceit, Senate & House records I personally think we can do a good job of awakening the people. I personally cannot see fear of making mistakes as a reason for giving **b**6 up the fight. Joe McCarthy made many mistakes yet about a year or so ago when he thought he was talking to a closed audience in Europe that the CPUSA was just then recovering from McCarthy. I am sure Joe would like to have this statement engraved on his tombstone. In the course of the debate I pointed out that the FBI could not do anything to stop the advance of communism in Laos, Berlin or South Vietnam and frankly some people who should know better are doing it or getting credit for doing it. Fulbright was quoted as saying we give the FBI all the money it wants to fight communism in the USA. I also pointed out the fight was a political one and must be settled. NOV in that field, that the politican is a leader but unless his constituents told him where they wanted to go he would take the line of least resistance further that we must awaken the people.

When the matter came to a vote it was unanimous in favor of taking an active part in the fight.

The Executive Board is to meet in December in New York City and take steps to implement the directive.

The purpose of this letter is to inform you so that we as an organization can be truly helpful.

A word or two in the right place might be helpful to guide them.

The Society of Former Special Agents is a loosely knit society and fraternal organization which has supported the Bureau and the Director. We have generally had good relations with the Society recently but there have been some ELR:cmg 21362

difficulties with certain segments of the organization. In 1958, some members of the Society in California issued political pamphlets endorsing a Mr. Alan Cranston, for state political office. These pamphlets were headed "Ex-FBI Agents for Cranston for Controller." SAC, Los Angeles vigorously protested to appropriate Society personnel the use of the Bureau's initials in a political campaign. This matter was brought up at the 1958 National Convention of the Society at San Francisco but no action was taken to ban its use of the Society's name in promoting political campaigns. It was apparent, in this instance, that the former Agents were attempting to cash in on the Bureau's name in connection with the candidacy of Alan Cranston. It was reported during this period that the Board of Directors of the Society had voted to preclude any use of the name of the association in any political activities.

In March, 1959,
contacted Warner Brothers to determine if the Society could sponsor a premier of the
"FBI Story" at Dallas, Texas, in connection with its annual convention in October, 1959.
Incurry with the studio disclosed that there was no intention to allow the Society to use the
fil.a in connection with their convention and this was considered a presumptuous action
on the part of the Society

The Society has strongly supported the Bureau in recent smear campaigns directed against the Director and the Bureau. In this regard the 1958 President of the Society, Frank J. Holmes, Bethesda, Maryland, initiated a letter to all members alerting them to the campaign of the "New York Post" to smear the FBI and the Director.

The South Atlantic Chapter of the Society, Jacksonville, Florida, passed a resolution in April, 1959, to obtain local press assistance in counteracting the smear campaign against the Bureau.

In October, 1961, the Society's annual convention adopted a resolution denouncing a scurrilous attack by John Crosby in his column appearing in the "New York Herald Tribune." This resolution was sent to the "New York Herald Tribune" and particular Crosby's syndicated column. It was also indicated at that time by Rose Charled, New Orleans, Louisiana, President of the Society, that many letters would be sent to the "New York Herald Tribune" refuting Crosby's statements and demanding the cancellation of Crosby's contract with the newspaper.

The Society commended the Director with a presentation of a testimonial scroll in December, 1960. At other national conventions resolutions have been adopted expressing admiration and respect for the Director and attesting to the cordial relationship felt by the Society for the Bureau.

OBSERVATION:

Since our recent relations with the Society have generally been cordial it is believed that a statement by the Director expressing his good wishes to the Society on its 25th anniversary would be appropriate.



The Executives Conference on 6-7-62 considered the above recommendation. The Conference was in unanimous agreement that this action be taken; however, it was clearly specified that former Agent be told, as well as that the FBI, in furnishing this information, is definitely not approving or endorsing the so-called ex-Agents'Committee on Communism. The Conference was also of the opinion that we should diplomatically advise to "stop, look and listen" inasmuch as such a committee could be both detrimental to the ex-Agents Society and particularly to the reputation of the FBI. This reasoning was advanced inasmuch as there is a possibility that the ex-Agents' committee might in some manner recommend undesirable books or else get into a controversy through the medium of omitting books.

New Orleans, also informed us that many letters would be sent by members to the "Herald Tribune" refuting Crosby's statements and demanding the cancellation of Crosby's contract with the newspaper.

The Society presented a testimonial scroll to the Director in December, 1960, and several resolutions have been adopted by the organization expressing admiration for the Director and the Bureau.

We have also experienced some trouble with the Society. In 1958, some members in California issued pamphlets endorsing a candidate for state office which were headed "Ex-FBI Agents for Cranston for Controller." This improper use of the Bureau's name was brought up at the Society's 1958 national convention but no action was taken to ban such practice. It was reported, however, that the Society's Board of Directors, during this period, did vote to preclude use of the Society's name in political activities.

In March, 1959, the Society's publicity chairman contacted Warner Brothers regarding sponsorship of a premiere of the "FBI Story" in Dallas, Texas. Warner Brothers refused to consider this matter and termed this inquiry **b**6 presumptuous.

We have had generally good relations with the Society in the past, and the Society has strongly supported the Bureau against smear campaigns recently. However, in 1958 some members of the Society in California issued a political pamphlet endorsing candidates which were headed with the statement, "Ex-FBI Agents for Cranston for Controller." In March, 1959, the Society's contacted Warner Brothers in an effort to sponsor a premier of the "FBI Story" at Dallas, Texas, in connection with their annual convention in October of that year. At the time, this action on the part of the Society was considered a presumptuous act, but it was determined that Warner Brothers had no intention of allowing them to use the film as they desired. It is noted that on 3-6-62, the Director furnished a statement to the Society to be used in the 25th Anniversary issue of their publication, "Grapevine."



reflected in "Poor's Register," it is not being used on the autograph card inasmuch as Perry did not use it in his autograph request. Perry's middle initial is being used in the outgoing inasmuch as it has been used in prior correspondence.

It is noted that Perry sent a get well card to the Director postmarked 11-17-62 for the members of the Society, and it was acknowledged by the Director on 11-21-62. Therefore, he is aware of the Director's absence and it is felt his current incoming should be acknowledged by an In-Absence type reply advising him that the books will be autographed and forwarded to him upon Mr. Hoover's return. No cover letter will be needed to transmit the books when autographed.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) That the attached In-Absence type letter be sent to Mr. Perry.

(2) That upon the Director's return, the books should be autographed and forwarded without cover letter to Mr. Perry. The books should be returned to the Crime Research Section for mailing.

About the Joundation

The Former Agents of the F B I Foundation came into existence on May 31, 1957, when the duly elected officers of the Society of Former Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Inc., signed a trust agreement creating the Foundation. The preamble to the trust instrument contains the following language - "Whereas the Society and its members are desirous of contributing generally to the public welfare through the alleviation of suffering, the advancement of science, education and cultural arts and the promotion of our traditional way of life -" In furtherance of these purposes, the following language is contained in Article II of the trust instrument "The earnings of the Trust Fund and so much of the principal as the Trustees from time to time shall deem appropriate shall be used - for contribution to recognized tax-exempt organizations, or to deserving widows and children of the deceased members, or to needy living members of the Society of Former Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Inc., for relief of human suffering, advancement of science, education and cultural arts" The trust instrument further provides that none of the activities shall be considered as carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation or the election of public officials.

To implement the purposes of the Foundation, the Society made a small initial contribution. Since that date, over \$100,000 00 has been contributed by Former Agents and other individuals. The funds received have been invested by the Trustees.

The Trustees of the Foundation are composed of the following officers of the Society The President, immediate Past-President, President-Elect, Secretary and Treasurer. The Trustees serve without compensation and meet four times a year

The United States Treasury Department has granted to the Foundation an exemption from federal income taxes as an organization described in Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as an organization operated exclusively for charitable purposes. Therefore, gifts to the Former Agents of the F B.1 Foundation are tax-exempt as a charitable contribution

What it does

The Trustees of the Foundation have authorized grants totaling over \$42,000 00. These funds were expended for the benefit of some 37 individuals who, for one reason or another, were in dire financial straits. In one instance, a Former Agent and his wife were about to be ejected from their home. A rare disease had prevented his holding a steady job for nearly five years. In another case, a Former Agent had suffered financial reverses and after his death, his widow did not have the money for funeral expenses. Another Former Agent had had his eleventh operation when application was made to the Foundation for assistance. Similar explanations could be given for every one of the grants.

HOW IS AN APPLICATION FOR ASSISTANCE MADE?

Applications for assistance should be directed to the Trustees of the Foundation and should be mailed to Society Headquarters in New York. Answers to such requests will be expedited if a full explanation is given. Otherwise, time will be required for the Trustees to make an investigation. The obvious questions should be answered, such as, the correct name and address of the person seeking assistance, marital status, members of the family, nature of the profession or business, if any, social security benefits, or other income, if any, list of outstanding obligations or bills, some indication of the amount of the grant requested. In other words, sufficient information for the Trustees to make a decision,



John Edgar Hoover was born January 1, 1895, in the District of Columbia. He was educated in the public schools of the District of Columbia and received Bachelor of Laws and Master of Laws degrees from The George Washington University He holds honorary degrees from 18 colleges and universities.

Mr. Hoover entered the Department of Justice in 1917, and on May 10, 1924, he was appointed Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He stated that the photograph will be placed on the front of the brochure with a note to the effect that it is presented in its actual size. also noted that he assumes you will notify FBI employees of the availability of the miniatures to them. b6 REVIEW OF SAMPLE BROCHURE: The brochure mentions briefly/presentation of the life-size bronze bust to the Director, the creation of the miniature bust for former and present FBI employees and summarizes background data concerning the sculptor. It was noted that the brochure states that bronze miniatures will be available to members of the Society, FBI employees and FBI National Academy graduates at \$40 each. Persons/fin these categories will be charged \$60 for the miniatures and the Society reserves the right to decline the order of anyone not a Society member or an FBI employee. The sterling silver miniatures will be available at \$200 and, in all instances, there will be a \$1.50 postage and handling charge.

On the back page of the brochure is set out the address to which orders are to be mailed and/sample order blank, for Society members for the bronze miniature at \$41.50 or the sterling silver at \$201.50. There is also a sample order blank for persons other than Society members for the bronze at \$61,50. b6

OBSERVATIONS:

noted in his letter that there will be no solicitation other than to Society members and it appears, therefore, that the non-Society order blank in the brochure will be for handling purchases through the Society members for outside persons. This amounts to a rather peculiar device for making the busts available to almost anyone who knows a former Special Agent.

Handling of the sales in this manner by the Society gives a commercial aspect to the availability of these miniatures which is undesirable. It is felt, therefore, that the miniatures should be available only to present FBI employees and Society members in good standing. This would not only preclude outside persons from purchasing through the Society but would preclude miniatures being made available to FBI National Academy graduates as indicated in the brochure. This is in line with the official brochure prepared for use at the time of the presentation of the lifesize bust to the Director, which states in part that the sculptor was "commissioned to do a miniature bust in clay in order that the past and present personnel" of the FBI may obtain miniatures. mule 1. 9 bus



It would appear advantageous to continue to examine each specific request on its merits and that it would be desirable to permit SAC Houston to accept the instant invitation.

My dear Judge:

I received your letter of June 13th and want to thank you for your thoughtfulness in writing.

With respect to your inquiry, my statements, as contained in the December 21, 1964, issue of "U. S. News and World Report" accurately reflect my views on promotion from within regarding the FBI. I have always tried to maintain a chain of command throughout the service, both in our field service and at Headquarters in Washington, D. C., during the time I have been Director of the FBI. Promotions through this chain of command have been from within the service, and you will note, therefore, that I have always been an advocate of promotions from within based on merit.

On the same date that Congressman H. Allen Smith introduced his bill, March 10, 1965, Congressman Samuel L. Devine of Columbus, Chio, a former Special Agent of this Bureau, introduced H. R. 13507. The provisions of this bill are identical with those of the bill of Congressman Smith, and I am enclosing a copy of it for




