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article concerning plans made by the Marlen Scottsbore Refered Countities For a meeting scheduled October 25, 1937. The article listed among the speakers scheduled Boy Wilkins of the Matienal Association for the Marvancement of Colored People, and Richard B. Moore of the Communist French group, the International Labor Defense. (61-7563-62132)

Congress Against Whr and Passism held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, November 26-38, 1937. The records reflect that there were a number of subsessions in which the delegates took part and the one satisfied, "Sub-Session on Matienal and Racial Minorities" was set forth as having for its Chairman Boy Wilkins, "delegate from the Book and Magazine Guild and Editor of the Crisis." A press release of the Book and Magazine Guild issued in the early part of April, 1938, reported on a scheduled meeting for April 22, 1938, at the Central Industrial High School, 42nd Street, New York City. Among the listed speakers was Boy Wilkine, "Editor of the Crisis," and his subject was set forth as being "The War Danger — and What to Do About It."

In the testimony of Mr. Walter Steele before the Dies Committee on August 16, 1938, he discussed the last convention (1937) of the American League Against War and Pascism. In his testimony he stated that among the "headliners" at this convention was "Roy Wilkins," along with such people as Earl Browder, Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, Max Yergan, and Max Bedacht. (Dies Committee, Vol. 1, pg. 463)

The February 7, 1939, issue of the Daily Worker contained to article concerning the proposed first convention of the Workers Alliande

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scheduled for Pobruary 10, 1939. The article stated that among the scheduled speakers were Boy Wilkins of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People; Relen Marris, New York Director of the Mational Youth Administration; David Lasser, and Morbert Benjamin, Secretary-Treasurer of the Workers Alliance, during 146 existance, was known as a Communist influenced organization, [61-7451-16118].

The Jamary 29, 1939, issue of the "Daily Norker" carried an article concerning the Megre Peoples Committee to Aid Spanish Desceracy, which was designated as an affiliate of the Medical Bureau and North American Committee to Aid Spanish Desceracy, which are related to have been Commist controlled groups. The article listed a number of "prominent Megre anti-Pascists", who sent pledges of support, Included among the names was that of Noy Wilkins.

The January 30, 1943, issue of the Negro newspaper, the "New Jersey Herald News," published at Newark, New Jersey, contains an editorial by Harry V. Webber in which he charges that the major Negro newspapers in the country do not reflect Negro epixion. He states in the editorial, "Once upon a time there was a relatively free press in America, even among the national newspapers (Negro)... The national newspapers have welded themselves into an alliance with certain race erganisations, certain education leaders, and religious leaders, to tell the Negro what he ought to think or what they wanted him to think...by some secret arrangement which Noy Wilkins refused to reveal when asked point-blank here several years ago, nothing opposed to the NAACP and its allies can ever appear in these controlled national newspapers...one might almost call Walter White and Elmer Davis of the national newspapers. So the nationals continus to bore people with race issue propaganda along lines laid down by 69 Fifth Avenue (address of the NAACP)."

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During the course of ricting In Living Low Cost City of the first week of August, 1943, auxiliary police were appointed and among them Boy Wilkins of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People was included.

The name of Moy Wilkins appears on the Board of Biroctors of the Gitywide Citisons Counittee on Harlam which group became active shortly after the rioting in the Harlam area in August, 1943. The purpose of this group, according to its advertisement, has been to better racs relations in the City of New York.

The following speculation was offered by a usually reliable source in November, 1943, with respect to the columns of Moy Wilkins of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and W.E.B. EmBois, interpationally known Negro editor, which has been reportedly suppressed by the Amsterdam News, New York Negro newspaper, because these columns were allegedly opposed to Republican candidates. It was stated that the Amsterdam News had been attacked by other Negro newspapers because of its support of the Republican Presidential candidate and because of the suppression of the Columns. It was also stated that the possibility existed that the reason for the formation of a "league for a better press" in New York City was to offset attacks of the "Amsterdam News" on the Political Action Counittee, (100-7660-2664)

I flier announcing a series of forms on the general subject. "The Race Relations Battlefront Today," was distributed in February, 1944, by the Modern Trend Progressive Touth Group of New York City, an organisation which was said to have had a number of speakers of divergent views appearing before the group, including Communist Party and Socialist Morkers Party members. It was announced in the leaflet that the February 29, 1944, forum would deal with the "Megro press." Among the speakers listed was Roy Wilkins, editor of the "Crisis."

In which it stated that a move to draft A. Philip Bandolph, leader of the March on Washington Movement and head of the Sleeping Car Porters Union, AF of L, as a candidate for Congress in opposition to Adam Clayton Powell. The article also stated that Harlen's nonpartisan committee chaired by Mack B. It is further stated that a definite attempt was being made to have Randolph oppose Pewall for the Congression seat in a section in Harlem. The Jamary 14, 1944, issue of the Taily Worker contained by article discussing a scheduled meeting for Jamary 16, 1944, spencered by the Mational Workers Order, which meeting was labeled the "Martime Inter-Group Unity Conference." A number of persons either known Communists of reliably reported Communists, were listed in the article as scheduled speakers. Boy Wilkins, editor of the "Crisis," was a scheduled participant for the panel at the meeting to consider "the fifth column."



It is reported that the Ohio State Form, a lagre manipular published at Columbus, Ohio, criticised the race relations representative at Patterson Field, Dayton, Ohio, in its November and December, 1944, issues. Subsequently, there was a tour of this Field made by a group of Negroes including Louis R. Lautier, Administrative Assistant, Civilian Aid to the Secretary of War; Saumel L. Foster, race analyst of the Army Service Porces; Arnold B. Walker of the Mational Wrban League, and Boy Wilkins of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People. It is said that at the conclusion of the tour those who made it were loud in praise of racial conditions and complimented the race relations representative at the Field on this accomplishments.

The "Daily Worker" for July 29, 1938, contains an article concerning an apparent interview had by the writer, Will Lewrence, with May Wilking, the editor of the "Crisis" and Assistant Secretary of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People, The writer of the article states that Wilkins condemned the forces of big business which cause "misrepresentation"





of the Megre." In his remarks as reported by the mather, Wilkins tweed generally the plight for the Megre during and after the Civil War and pointed out that the movies, the press, the radio, the schools, and the theater premeditatively report that the Megre is a before, an Mignorant, Mappy-go-lacely, irresponsibly member of society." Wilkins reportedly referred to lymbing and mistreatment of Megrees and alleged that many ampleyers formerly were able to pit Megre workers against white workers. The article dads by stating that Wilkins informed the writer of the article along the following limes; of an in favor of any program that will bring out the identity of class interests of the masses of Megre and white workers. Meanwhile, advente the white workers in the history and struggle of achievements of the Megre people, Teach them that not only have Megrees given of their sweat and blood to make this the richest country in the world, but that Megre engineers, scientists, writers, artists, and musicians have carriebed the cultural life of the country.

The Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People held its 33rd annual conference in Les Angeles, California, during the period July 14-19, 1942. On the night of July 14, 1942, Noy Wilkins gave the keynote address. He is reported to have stated that the organisation would continue its fight against segregation and discrimination against Negroes and for equal rights of Negroes with white people. He is quoted as having made the following additional statements:

We are determined forever to be through with status que. this is no war--this is a social revolution. Mations and societies are being shattered and resolded evernight. I say to you that the reason why this association was born in 1909 and has lived 35 years - the reason why I am here and you are here - is because we are determined forever and a day to be throught with the status que." Are we worms to sit in a corner and say we yearn not for green pastures? We are impelled to impose the status quo by the imperatives of the situation. If you are in a crack you must get out... I do not recall a time when there has been such unity of thought and such clearness? as to the path we have to follow. It is not luxuries as fromdon of speech, by the control over his own body, the right to walk around and not be strung up to a tree, that concerns the Megroes at this time and that give rise to the association. Some say we should let things go during the war period so there will be no disunity, in other words remain in a status that we will not de because to make people free is why the war is being fought. On October 30, 1943, Wilkins spoke at the Matienal Touth Conference
of the Matienal Association for the Advancement of Colored People, held at
Lincoln University, Oxford, Pennsylvania. It is reported that he deveted his
address to criticising the "reactionary forces in America" specifically mentioning Westbrook Pegler and stated in 1863 the Megre was thrown into a competitive
world with nothing to struggle to the top with, and for that reason must contime to fight, first as an American for rights and second as a Megre, maintain
the tradition to fight with two hands and whip.

It is reported that in 1943 Wilking was sent at a tour of the consumities and army camps in the Western and Pacific Coast states by the Entional Association for the Advancement of Colored People. He reported on his tour in the "Crists," the efficial organ of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, at which time be described various areas he visited. He ended his article by stating that all was not dark for the Negro soldiers stationed in the West, pointing out isolated cases in which Commanding Officers are to be precised for their fair play and sincerity in trying to better the conditions faced by the men under their command. He stated, "If the Army could in some way adopt the philosophy of these Commanding Officers and make it with (most Commanders give only lip service to the 'no discrimination' rule), it would boost morale among Negro soldiers overnight." On June 11-12, 1944, the annual conference Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People in the state of South Carolina was

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held, at purpler, reported that the principal speaker of the section less and 12, 1944, was bey Wilkins. According to a source protest, Wilkins reviewed the history of the Negro relating how the Negro has always been disregarded as a personality both physically and politically in this country and added that the day of personation for the Negro race this terminating. He is said to have extelled the afforts of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People in citing the essay of the Negro and criticised representatives and political figures in the state of South Carolina for their degrees on while supressety the south. He reportedly stressed the fact that the Negro is South Carolina was still practically a slave to the white men and that the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People with the Assistance of all the Negroes would win their rights through the courts. Assorting to the source, Wilkins emphasised the fact that the Negroe did not desire to sequire his lastel rights through revolution but upuld do so by lastel court procedure.

It is reported that at the thirty-third annual comferen of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People, held at the Second Baptist Church, Los Angeles, California, Wilkins on July 14, 1944, as Assistant Secretary of the organization gave the key note speech. He is quoted as having stated, "We will fight against segregation and discrimination and for equal rights..... I know of no time when there has been such unity of thought on the with we must follow. It is reported that an an animal Director's meeting of the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People held Annaly 2, 1945 at 69 Fifth Avenue, New York City, Boy Wilkins, Acting Executive Secretary during the absence of Walter White, stated that although progress had been made politically and economically and in the Armed Forces in subdaing dangerous racial trends, "the picture for 1943 is not a 1948 ready one."

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The Pebruary 24, 1943, issue of the Daily Worker carried to article concerning the calebration of Hegro History Week, which had just previously taken place. Among the speakers listed by the article as having addressed the group assembled were Boy Wilkins, of the Matienal Association for the Matues of Colored People, Benjamin Pavis, Jr., and Guyndalyn Bennet, both known Communists. It is reported that during the early part of March, 1945, Milling spoke at a Forum sponsored by the Resident Group and Public Affairs Countitie the Earlem branch of the DKCA. He is said to have addressed his midlende of What technique shall we use and how shall we use them to insure dehocracy here now and during the posture period? Asserting to the source, Wilkian stated that at that time, for the first time in the history of the Megre, there was unity on what the Megro people wanted, but there were differences in the technique employed for the achievement of these wants. He reportedly stated that the Negro people: want first of all to be primarily free to be employed on their merits, secondly there should be on and to police brutality and lyaching and, thirdly, there should be opportunity for education and, fourthly, there should be freedom from all humilitating restrictions on people when they travel through certain sections of the country. The source stated that Milkins continued that these wants sammet be achieved through any mase organization on racial basis. "It was his " contention, according to the report, that large organisations do not "ket" the masses of the people. He reportedly said that the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People had only 175,000 members, which is a small amount of t Negre population, but that there is a need of a million people to back up some sort of progrem and according to his statement no great organization would do it n a recial besis. The Austerdam Star News, issue of August 21, 1943, carried on article by Roy Wilkins in which he severely criticised the Attorney General's suggestion to carb the migration of Magro workers to industrial areas.

During the early part of September, 1943, Wilkins, in his column, "The Watch Tower," published in the Emsterdam News] Negro newspaper, applied the term "quisling" to Warren Brown, Negro whose then recent article published by the Esturday Newsew of Literature and the Reader's Digest, advised the Negro press. "Bot to holler so loud or the white felks would get mad,"

In November, 1943, Benjamin Davie, Jr., Negro Communist functionary, was elected on the Communist Party ticket to the New York City Council. The "Daily Norker" for November 23, 1943, carried an article to the affect that Wilkins in his column "The Watch Tower" in the "New York Amsterdam News", made the following statements after condemning the New York World Telegram" in publishing articles on how Communists used racial and religious issues to wim places in the elections:

m hatred, whereas the Governorship battle was the elimiest wased. here in many a decade... is our system of government is so weak that two Communists out of a council of 17 members constitute a danger, then we had better be looking into our foundations... is a matter of fact, the presence of two declared Communists in our council probably will benefit everyone. Communists atimulate activity. They stimulate progressive measures more often than they voice the aspirations of the plain peoples, even though these plain people would not

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Must the caption "Precion Now Mase Meeting" at the 0. V. Catte Elks Hall enditorium, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The meeting was given under the emspices of the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers of America, CIO, and the Saptist Ministers of Philadelphia to calchrate the releases of Megro employees Henry T. McCrary and Billis Pickett, formerly employed by the Sum Shipbuilding Corporation, Chester, Pennsylvania, who had been sentenced to prison as a result of a shooting which took place at the Sum Shipbuilding Tard during the summer of 1943. Presiding as chairman of the meeting, according to the source, was Emssell Watson, whom the source stated to be a registered Communist and Communist Party organiser. Among the speakers was Mikins. We reportedly stated in substance that the Megro in America has three obstacles in his way and that one is a political one. He then referred to the pell tax in various states.

He also is alleged to have stated that economically the Negro must continue to fight in order to enjoy equal epportunities, and that through the CIO and other militant labor organisations the Negro is extending the apportunity of becoming united with powerful forces that will not only fight the cause of the Negro but will fight the cause of all working classes.



the use of the War Department of the pauphlet "Races of Mankind". Subsequently, this pauphlet was banned by the War Department. The "Daily Worker" for March 7, 1944, contained an article listing a number of persons who criticised the ban of the book. The article said that Roy Wilkins, acting secretary for the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People stated that Representative May's outburst against the booklet "exhibits fear of eclentific truth with respect to relations between the Magro and the white people of this

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country. Wilkins, according to the article, thee said that the fact that the information of the pamphlet was known to science for decades is no reason why the Kentucky Congressmen should have been sware of it.

A meeting was held on May 17, 1944, sponsored by the Minerities Workshop of the Socialist Party located at 303 Fourth Avenue, New York City, which was described as a "protest meeting against Mayor LaGuardia"s proposed Japanese-American discrimination policy. (Mayor Labuardia was alleged to have stated that he was opposed to the bringing of Japanese-Americans in the New York City area.) Among the speakers was Roy Wilkins, who described how the $m_{
m c}$: Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which he represented. was the first to publish anything about the Japanese evacuation program, and the first to condenn that action. He compared this action with discrimination 📆 🚟 against Negroes. No stated that Italians and Germans on the East Coast were the cause of the Maxie sending some five to ten shipe a day in 1942 because of the signals which they were able to give and that in contrast not one Japanese had been convicted of espionage or sabetage in the United States. Ne further 💉 stated that in Salt Lake City, Utah, there was a surfew at a certain hour of night after which Japansse-Americans were not permitted to leave certain sections of that city but rather remained at home. He said that in California, Negroes had absorbed the propaganda directed by Anti-Japanese forces and consequently a lêt of Negroes were of the opinion that the Japanese had not done the Negroes any good. He described his conversation with one Negre in California and quoted that person as saying, "I do not know why we are fighting the Japanese. They have not done anything to me. When I go to a hotel operated by white people they either tell me that they are full or that they do not accept colored people, and here im California there was only one hotel at which I could stay and that hotel was run by the Japanese, so why should we fight the Japanese, so why should we fight the Japanese, (Agent Coverage 100-164629-11)

Wilkins further described the Japanese as being the best truck farmers in America and stated that "they are the backbone of this country." He further criticised Mayor LeGuardia for the attitude which he took against the Japanese. (Agent Coverage 100-164629-11)

In hie column in the July 8, 1944, issue of the Musterdam News, Wikins wrote the following under the title, "Memo on "Rape" Charges"s Ne stated that Megre soldiers are getting "a thorough rooking in military courts on "rape" charges. He cited life contences given to two Negro soldiers in New Caledonia and the proposed hanging and later life sentences given to four Megre soldiers and a Merchant Marine in Australia for similar sex offenses. He also cited a recent conviction of a Captain Merrison Wilkinson (white) by Court-martial

in Senta Ana, California, to a sentence of 30 years' imprisonment for four sen offences, biguny and theft, "contracted with the conviction of Megross in the Army on charges of sex offences" as being bound to raise the question of the differences between rape by white men and rape by black week.

In the August 3, 1944, issue of the loss involve Tentinel, a Negro newspaper, Wilkins in an editorial declared that the Magre vote was necessary for the minning party in the forthcoming election. He stated, "It may be true that most of them, like a great many white voters, are not exactly cheering for Devey but they cannot even get up a smile for the Democratic platform and Trumen. It might be that unless the Rossevelt Administration does specified positive between now and November, great sections of the Magre population till swing to the 0.0.8.

Rikins' column, 'The Saich Tower," appeared in the Movember EJ, 1944, issue of the Los Angeles Centinel." This article relates that Fordham Cetholis University of America and Manhattam College and Sacred Heart had lowered the bar to Negroes in the past few years, but Notre Dame has the church baffled. No Negro has ever tried the campus at Notre Dame, according to the article, or work its athletic uniform. The article also implied that an injury suffered by a great Negro football player on the Illinois football term during the fall of 1944, in the game with Notre Dame, was comething more than just an accident.

The December 23, 1986, 1988, of the "Peoples Velce" carries an article entitled "Views an Devey Dusted Writer. This article stated that Wilkins had been custed from his post as columnist for the New York "Amsterdam News". The article stated that Wilkins interpreted his dismissal at the end of November instead of during the summer or fall as a desire on the part of the Editor to avoid "discussion of the sussling of a supposedly 'free' columnist during a political campaign."

Among the speakers on January 20, 1945, were more Wilkins and James L. Farmer, the latter being with the Fellowship of Reconciliation. According to an informant, Wilkins spoke on the subject, "A Program for Today" and stated that America is coming to age on the question of race relations. He reportedly made the following additional remarket. The Second World Way emused us to realist this a great deal more. The good neighbor policy does not mean for us to be good to our neighbor but for our neighbor to be good to us. Security is necessary for all groups. This includes physical protection, economic security, and the right to work.

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
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How York City, carried an article devoted to the directive of the Tair Employment Practice Committee to the Capital Transit Company in Machington, D. C., that it employ and upgrade Megroes as but and trolley operators. The article advises that the head of this company insisted that a strike threat barred the company from employing Megroes in these capacities. The article further stated that Boy Wilkins, Acting Secretary of the Matienal Association for the Advancement of Colored People, pointed out that the refusal of the Capital Transit Company to employ Megroes was more than a local issue. He is quoted as having stated, The eyes of the country are on this case. The eyes of our soldiers overseas are upon it.

On March 14, 1945, the sub-Conmittee of the Senate Labor and Education Committee concluded its hearings on the permanent Fair Esployment Practice bill. Wilking testified before the sub-Conmittee, He read into the record a five page prepared statement calling to the attention of the group the fact that the Mational Association for the Advancement of Colored People them had more than 400,000 members, Hegro and white, in some 800 local chapters, located in 44 states and the District of Columbia. In connection with the employment of Megroes in government agencies, Milkins stated that an overwhelming majority of these employees are still limited to sustodial and minor elerical positions, so that the general trend does not reflect any basis changes in governmental policy of limiting Negroes to Laborious and unremunerative positions. Wilking then referred to the discrimination against Hegroes by the reilroads and declared the adoption of 3-101 would give real meaning to democracy and equality for 13 million Negroes. Wilkins criticised Senator Taft's bill, and pointed out that there was no defined area in which it was to operate, that it failed to provide for the inclusion of nondiscriminating eleases in contracts met by the government. He concluded with the statement that the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People was irrevocably opposed to the Taft bill but that it strongly supported 3-101 in its them, present form



PURPOSE AND BACKGROUND:

A news story appearing in the April 18, 1955, iees of the "New York Herald Tribune" was headlined "Rey Wilkins Leader of H.A.A.C.P. The every evated that Wilking, Admini-atrator of the HAACP, had been named on April 11, 1985, to exceed the late Valter White as Executive Secretary of the organization, Mr. White having died on March 21, 1955. Filkine was elected unanimously by the Board of Directors of the MACP.

In regard to this nowe item, the Director noted, "What do we know of him?" The purpose of this memorandum is to answer the Director's inquiry.

BIOGRAPHICAL BATA:

Summary

The's The in America, 1954-55, reflects that Roman Filking, Social Felfare Executive, was bern in St. Louis, Missouri, August 30, 1901, He received on A.B. degree from the University of Minneseta in 1923. He was Managing Editor of the "Kaneas City Call" from 1923 to 1931. He was Assistant Mag; Secretary of MAACP from 1931 to 1949, Acting Secretary from 1949 to 1950, and Administrator of the organization from 1950 to his recent election as Executive Secretary. He was Editor of "Cricio" magazine, menthly official MAACP organ, from 1934 to 1949.

Filkine' home to at 147-15 Village Road, Janaica, Hew York, and his office is at 20 East 40th Street, New York

Additionally, the news story referred to above reflects that Wilkine majered in journalism, economics and ecolology. The news every also reflects that Wilkins former position of Administrator in the MAACP was abolished at the election in which he become Executive Secretary.

INFORMATION IN BUREAU FILES:

There are appreximately 400 references to Amy IS Vilking in Bureau files. The Bureau has never conducted an investigation concerning him. A review of these references reflects that for the meet part they are newspaper elippings beferring to his activities in connection with his dutie

an official of the MACP. Because of the volume of this material information will not be set forth in its entirety. The files has been reviewed and only significant references which will tend to characterize Vilkine are being set forth. It would appear from a review of Bureau files that in the 1930's and early 1940's Vilkine tended to adhere elseely to the Communist Party line, but since that time, it appears that he has been strongly anti-Commun and has done all possible to steer the MACP away from any Communinfiltration.

In April, 1945, Mr. Fred Lyone of the State Department submitted the names of five Negroes who were being considered for the position of American Minister to Liberia. One of these five individuals was also wilking. We, accordingly, prepared a 14-page blind summary namerandum of information appearing in Bureau files on April 28, 1945, and furnished it to the State Department In connection with this nemerandum, the above summary was utilized and brought up to date. Connections and Affiliations

The "Daily Verker" of July 89, 1937, made reference to a meeting of the Scottabore Defence Connittee. Among the various groups participating were the SAACP, Communist Party and International Labor Defence. .. 2001 Vilking was listed as one of the sutstanding speakers scheduled. (100-7583-36113)

A review of excerpts of talks he has given through the years as reflected in Bureau files would indicate that he has urged the Fegre through the erganization to fight for equal rights and against discrimination and segregation. There is no indication that he has ever represented violence or radical measures but advocated fight in through teaching the Phites that the Hegre is equal in all rights. He has criticized "reactionary forces in America" specifically mentioning Feetbreek Fegler.

On March 14, 1945, Wilking testified before the Subsemptites of the Senate Labor and Blueation Committee which was holding hearings on the permanent Fuir Employment Practice bill. Wilking was very critical of Senator Taft in his testimony. (100-273-184-13)

According to a news item in the New York Times for March 20, 1948, Boy Wilkins, as epokeeman for the MAACP, repudiated statements that the organization would assist Henry Vallace in his presidential campaign and the organization reaffirmed ite nonpartiean pelicy. (61-3176-4)

The Boston Herald for June 24, 1950, carried a etery headlined "Redo Told To Cease Attempts To Sabotage MACP Program." The news item indicated that the delegates at the forty-first annual convention then convened in Boston had voted 309 to 57 in favor of a special board to be appointed for the purpose of approximation. The news item said that Rey Vilkine effered the following statement, "The decisive vote of almost 6 to 1 by which the delegates declared the opposition of this association to Cemmunian is formal recognition of the eft-demonstrated fact that liberal erganizations eaching reforms under the American system cannot work effectively with Communists." The New Leader for February 4, 1950, in a column entitled "Heard On The Left" etated, "The Countee in the NAACP are gunning for Roy Vilkine, ite determinedly anti-Staliniet secretary."

CONTACTS WITH THE BUREAUS

Roy Vilking has had very little centact with the Rureau. In the absence of Malter White he did write to the Bircoter en September 10, 1967, in connection with "the ce-called Redecen incident in Peeris, Illineis, last April." He requested investigation cencerning this matter. Vilking had received his infernation from a Mr. Baxelwood of Pecria, Illineis, a vice precident of the Pecria Chapter of the MACP. Baxelwood had written directly to the Bureau at an earlier date regarding this matter. Vilking letter was acknowledged on September 15, 1947, and he was edviced that Baxelwood's letter had already been referred to the Attorney General for his consideration and any further action he deemed appropriate. We took no further action in this matter. (100-12304-87)

By letter dated August 14, 1953, Wilkine wrote to the Director and merely acknowledged receipt of a letter the Director had written en August 5, 1953, to Walter White. Wilkine advised that Mr. White would communicate with the Director upon his return to his office. (61-3176-652)

Inspector furnished to the Bureau for further action a letter dated November 5, 1954, received by him from Bey Vilkins. Attached to Vilkine' letter was a nineegraph of a copy of an extertion type letter wherein the writer eigned himself "Toure for the MACP, Bufus Trounsek Vackington III." This letter is dated September 8, 1954, and contains courrilous language and threats against Governor White of Mississippi. Vilkins in his letter indicated that the NAACP had no connection with the mailing of the letter to Governor White and that the letter had been nineegraphed and distributed in Mississippi in an effort to clander and discredit the NAACP. He requested investigation of the distribution of this letter through the mails. Actually, we had received an earlier copy of this letter through ether channels, and investigation by the

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Bureau had failed to identify the sender of this letter to governor Thite.

By letter dated Sevember 19, 1984, Filtime was advised that his letter had been referred to the Eurosu from the Food Office Department. Se was advised that the Eurosu was already conducting investigation reporting this letter as a possible violation of the Foderal Extertion Statute.

By letter dated December 12, 1906, Filtine use advised that the Assistant Atternoy General of the Orininal Biviolen, Department of Justice, had advised that there did not appear to be a violation within the Bureou o furiable tion and consequently no investigation use being expended by the Bureou. The New York Office by letter dated 8-2-56 forwarded a letter received by Walter Winchell. The letter written to Winchell is anonymous and is an attack on Negroes, particularly the MAACP. The anonymous letter writer quotes Wilkins as saying before the Bahai Assembly, 119 West 57th Street, in 1941, that "We Negroes are praying for a Japanese victory." According to the anonymous letter, during the question period a man sitting in the audience inquired "Thy do you want a Japanese victory." Wilking supposedly replied "Because the Japs will give us a better deal. You white people gave us a rotten deal."

Walter Winchell has written in the margin, "Is this true?"

A review of the numerous references to Vilkins in Bufiles fails to reveal such an incident.

The files do reflect that Wilkins supposedly described his conversation with another Negro in California in 1944 quoting the other Negro as saying, "I do not know why we are fighting the Japanese. They have not done anything to me. When I go to a hotel operated by white people they either tell me that they are full or that they do not accept colored people, and here in California there was only one hotel at which I could stay and that hotel was run by the Japanese, so why should we fight the Japs." Wilkins further described the Japanese as being the best truck farmers in America and "They are the backbone of this country. This information is the result of Agent coverage of a meeting at which Wilkins spoke. (100-164629-11)

The only other similar reference is the following supposedly said by Wilkins at an open forum on 11-1-48 at Partland, Oregon, "We are also concerned with the world front...Justice for all and not just for some. We cannot just sit here in Partland and say we will do we please After this war, we will have no separation from other places. The world is too small.... Thy do you suppose that Japan took Java, a country of forty million people in one week.... They were already sick of the people who were over them. It made no difference to them who was the slave drive

On 10-23-36 the New York Field Office forwarded a copy of the September 1936 issue of the "Crisis," the official publication of the NAACP. It was noted that Roy Wilkins was editor of the magazine. It was also noted that the agent who had obtained the magazine had contacted the Workers Book Shop, official part of the CP, and was emphatically informed that the publication was not handled at that book store, indicating that it was not classed as a communist publication.

According to the report the columnists on the smaller Negro papers "ape" their style and the editors carry headlines on derogatory stories involving the Army or Navy. 

The 11-28-42 issue of the "Lighthouse", Negro newspaper of San Diego, Calif., carried a front page lead article and photo of Roy Wilkins of the NAACP who spoke at a meeting in San Diego on 11-34-42. The article indicated that Negroes were told to fight for their rights during the war.

At the meeting in San Fiego on 11-94-42, Wilkins charged national legislators and administrators with failure to aid the Negroes. Wilkins was reportedly one of 20 Negro editors who conferred with War Department officials in Washington on general policies in the use of Negro soldiers and the norale of Negro Americans.





In approximately November or December 1942 or early January 1948
in his opinion walter white, National President of the NAACP and Roy Wilkins, Editor of the NAACP publication, "Crisis," were too well entrenched in the organization to be ousted. He stated that the white and colored people on the Board of Directors were substantial and prominent citizens in the U.S. and none were known to have communist tendencies. He stated that in his opinion there would be no changes in the leadership of the organization for many years.



The 1-5-43 issue of the "Baltimore Afro-American," colored newspaper, carried an article by Roy Wilkins, Assistant Secretary of the NAACP, entitled "California Riot Was 'In the Cards'." Wilkins indicated that he was in Vallejo, California that the disturbance happened on Nov. 9 (1949). The article quoted remarks made by Roy Wilkins regarding the extradition of George A. Burrows from New York to Mississippi. Wilkins expressed the opinion that MAACP lawyers, who were supporting Burrows, believed that Burrows would be lynched if he was returned to Mississippi.



According to the article Roy Wilkins, Assistant National Secretary of the NAACP, had joined with Ben Richardson, Benjamin Davis and other prominent Negro leaders in proposing that a concerted campaign, against the press be organized by civic and labor organization throughout the city. The article quoted Wilkins as stating that the press campaign against Negroes in Harlem was "linked to the action against labor and post war plans. It is part of the movement to see that the little people don't get too uppity and the Negro people are part of the little people." According to the article the MAACP's New York headquarters was besieged with letters and telegrams protesting the NAACP's association with the anti-communists and Roy Wilkins had wired the AP asking for a correction. Ecconnell. an MAACP attorney, had appeared in Federal Court during the injunction hearing and asked to speak as a friend of the court. Wilkins advised the INS investigator that he was not personally acquainted with for with her background but he did not believe that she was a member of any subversive organization. Wilkins noted that she was "the idol of a large number of people" many of whom had no political convictions. He also stated that he believed the Committee for the Negroes in the Arts, was a "leftist organization" but that every member would not be a "leftist."

It was noted that the attempted infiltration reached a climax in 1948 when the NAACP called for a National Emergency Nobilization for Civil Rights Legislation and Roy Wilkins, then acting Secretary, was offered the full support of the CP. The report indicated that when the NAACP realized what was happening it took a stand against the CP and since then had done what it could to rid itself of CP influence.







It was indicated that Mr. Tolson had instructed that the memo be prepared regarding the remarks made by Congressman Gathings of Arkansas as they appeared in the Congressional Record of 2-29-56, concerning the communist connection of the principal officers of the NAACP. It was noted that, Congressman Gathings inserted into the Congressional Record the communist front associations of the leaders of the NAACP, as obtained from the files of the HCUA.

It was noted that the material included the past record of Roy Wilkins, the present Executive Secretary of the NAACP, which indicated that Wilkins was associated with five communist front organizations and had voted for Benjamin J. Davis, a convicted Smith Act subject, in the 1940's. The records of Thurgood Marshall, special counsel for the NAACP and Dr. W. E. B. Dubois, one of the founders of the NAACP were also cited. It was noted that Wilkins stated on 10-19-54 that Dubois resigned from the NAACP in 1934 in a dispute over policy matters. According to Wilkins, Dubois returned to the NAACP in 1944 as director of special research but his position was terminated in 1948.

It was indicated in the memo that Bureau investigation of communist infiltration of the NAACP had established that the current leadership of the NAACP had repudiated the CP and had strongly resisted communist attempts to infiltrate the organization.

A copy of the "Congressional Record" of 2-23-56, which was enclosed with this memo, contained on pages 2805 through 2849 the records of NAACP officers whose communist connection were cited by the HCUA. Information concerning the CP affiliations of Roy Wilkins appears on pages 2805 and 2806.

The "Evening Star," Washington, D.C., on 3-6-56, carried an article entitled: "Civil Rights Group Hears Bitter Scott-Butler Clash." The article discussed the meeting of the "Assembly for Civil Rights" held the previous evening at the Willard Hotel, Washington, D.C. It was noted that the Assembly had been in session since Sunday, when NAACP leader, Roy Wilkins, called upon congress to "Enact Civil Rights legislation so that it would keep pace with advances made both in the Executive and Judicial branches of the Government." It was also noted in the article that Mrs. Juanita Mitchell, a Baltimore Negro, had stated that her delegation "got rude" with Senator Butler, Republican of Maryland, when they called on him and with Senator Beall whom she said "was almost rude to us at first."

A typelwote was attached to the newspaper clipping advising the Director that Mrs. Mitchell was a member of the delegation which saw him. The director made the following pencilled notation regarding Mrs. Mitchell: "And she knows how to be <u>rude!</u> H."



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



On 6-20-56 Roy Wilkins wrote to the Director advising that he had received reliable information that the White Citizens Councils were planning to instigate outbreaks of interracial violence during the summer in certain northern urban centers. Wilkins advised that he had no documents outlining the plan but had received the information verbally from an informant, whom he described as an intelligent man, not given to hysteria.

On 6-22-56 the Bureau replied to Wilkins' letter and thanked him for the information. Wilkins was advised that the New York Office had been instructed to have an Agent contact him regarding the matter.

A copy of the letter to Wilkins which was sent to the NY Field Office, contained a note instructing the NY Office to contact Wilkins immediately for further information and to determine the source of the information.

By teletype dated 6-28-56, the San Francisco Field Office advised that Roy Wilkins was interviewed on 6-28-56, in regard to information contained in a letter from Wilkins to the Director, dated 6-20-56. Wilkins, reported, in his letter, that he had received information that one of the plans of the White Citizens Councils called for the instigation, of outbreaks of interracial violence in certain northern cities. Wilkins advised that the source of his information was a colored Louisiana business man who had been given the information by a white friend on the basis of mutual respect. Wilkins stated it would be impossible for him to reveal his source or to allow the Bureau to contact his source. He advised that he believed his colored source was reliable but he had not received any information from any other source to substantiate the allegation. Wilkins advised he could furnish no further information at that time.

The wire contained the following notation by the Director: "Send memo to A.G. and Rogers. H."

By letter dated 6-29-56, the Honorable Dillon Anderson, Special Assistant to the President, was advised of the information furnished by Wilkins. It was indicated that Mr. Anderson had been advised on 6-22-56 of the information contained in Wilkins' letter. Anderson was advised that the information had also been furnished to the Attorney General and the Intelligence Agencies of the Armed Forces.

The letter to Dillon contained a note which stated, that the Field Offices concerned had been instructed to advise the appropriate local officials of the information furnished by Wilkins.

On 8-5-56, Roy Wilkins appeared on the Television program "Meet the Press" and was interviewed by Thomas Waring of the "Charleston News and Courier," Charleston, S.C.; Mrs. Elizabeth May Craig of the "Press Herald," Port-Ind, Maine; Lynn Van der Linden, of the "Nashville Banner," Hashville, Tenn.; Lawrence Spivak and the moderator, Ned The program was devoted to a discussion of the power wielded by Negro voters. Wilkins pointed out that Negroes may hold a balance of power in electing candidates. He deplored the lack of action on the part of either the Republican or Democratic parties in obtaining full civil rights for Negroes as called for by the Supreme Court. Wilkins was asked whether he had made a statement attributed to him by the "Daily Worker" in which he allegedly stated, "the communist party has a wholesome effect on Negroes." Wilkins denied ever praising CP actions and stated he did not recall making such a statement. He said he had been under fire from the CP for certain statements and added that he was never a sponsor or member of any group associated with the CP.





It was noted that Wilkins, who epoke for 21 organizations in addition to his own, indicated his agreement with liberal congressment that right-to-vote Agislation had the best chance of passage in the present session of congress. Wilkins expressed the opinion that by passing legislation protecting the right to vote, congress might lessen the civil rights task as that would give Negroes an opportunity to do something about their "rights."

The report contained the testimony of Carl Rachlin, identified as a New York Attorney and a member of the Board of Directors of the New York Civil Liberties Union, who was an unofficial observer at the recent Communist Party convention in New York City. Rachlin, who was a co-operative witness, furnished the committee his general observations and analysis of the convention proceedings. His testimony included the following "Another thing that they made quite clear at statement: the convention and which, in a way, was distrubing, is that the CP is going to make an extra special effort to infiltrate into Negro mass organizations. I read in the press later that Roy Wilkins, who is the head of the NAACP, publicly repudiated them, but there is no doubt from the nature of the national committee elected, approximately five or six of the 20 were Negroes, that the CP is going to make an extremely special effort to infiltrate and take over control of Negro groups.



The letter stated that the International Union of Students was supporting the Sixth World Youth Festival to be held in Moscow, July 28 - Aug. 11, 1957.




The "Daily Worker" on 4-16-57 on page 1, contained an article entitled "Justice Dept. Disavows Smearer of NAACP." 



The "Daily Worker" of 5-6-57 carried an article entitled "NAACP Urges Nixon to Back Words in Deeds." The article quoted in part, a telegram sent by Roy Wilkins to Vice President Nixon congratulating Nixon on his civil rights address before the Joint Defense Appeal of the American Jewish Committee and the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith in Chicago on April 30. Wilkins told Nixon the NAACP had long supported the principles he expressed but the leadership of both parties in congress had failed to enact needed civil rights laws and the Administration had adopted a policy of silence.

This reference was a memo from the Director for Mr. Tolson, Mr. Boardman, Mr. Belmont and Mr. Nichols, dated 5-10-57, advising of a conference which the Director attended in the Attorney General's Office on 5-8-57. The director stated that the purpose of the conference was to discuss the Prayer Pilgrimage for Freedom which was scheduled for 5-17-57 in Washington, D.C. The general plans and purposes of the filgrimage were outlined by the Director for the conference. He advised that the Attorney General was informed that the leaders of the movement were, Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary of the NAACP, the Rev. M. L. King, Jr., who headed the Montgomery, Ala., bus boycott, and A. Philip Randolph, President of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters.

It was noted that the Bureau had received previous information that, it as a large MACP setting in Philadelphia Roy Wilkins had warned that, delegates to the Pilgrimage must be screened in order that all "leftists" could be eliminated.

The Attorney General was advised that Chief Justice Earl Warren and the Vice President had been informed of the plans of the CP to infiltrate the Pilgrimage and both had expressed concern over the developments.

The memo also noted Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary of the NAACP, the sponsoring organization, had estimated that 50,000 people would participate in the "prayer pilgrimage for freedom."

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
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

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

This article showed that 13 Negro and white leaders in the fields of education, art; letters, religion and labor hand endorsed the IWO campaign to enroll 6,000 Negro Americans into its fraternal ranks by May 31, 1945. Among the names of leaders listed was Roy Wilkins, Editor of "The Crisis," official NAACP publication.

The June 11, 1944 edition of the Daily Worker, page 7, magazine section, contained an article captioned a Day With Councilman Davis. Pursuant to instructions, I met with Mr. Wilkins 2-24-60. He desire to express his appreciation to the FBI for the continuing good cooperation between t Bureau and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAAC: He asked that his comments be conveyed to the Director and was assured that they would be immediately.

Mr. Wilkins conceded there were a number of communists in the NA. He stated he could not prove this and actually was unaware of their identity. He str emphasized that communists were not in control of any of their chapters and would l "booted out" if enough proof could be obtained on them. He pointed out that the Los Angeles NAACP branch was at present composed of "extremists" and that he fe the activities of this group very much. He stated that administrative steps were bei taken to rid the Los Angeles branch of this group of "extremists" and he sincerely hoped that within the next several years conditions would improve. He advised he d not want to mention any names at this time but would keep in close touch with us in t event this group became too strong in their demonstrations.

I took the liberty of expressing the Director's appreciation to Mr. Wil for his support of the FBI and the fact that he had mentioned us very favorably on a number of occasions in his speeches. I told him the Director deeply appreciated the very favorable resolution passed by the NAACP at its last convention in New York. Mr. Wilkins stated he and Irving Ferman had engineered this matter.

I told Mr. Wilkins that as he well knew considerable pressure had bee put on the FBI by minority groups to make available to the public FBI reports in the Mack Charles Parker case. He was told that the FBI had withstood all types of disadvantages in order to solve this case against great odds. However, not with stand this fact, we have never received adequate credit for the great work done. Litold Mr. Wilkins that actually we had received a number of letters containing insults to o actions in this case and particularly as to why our reports were not made available to the public. I explained in some detail why it would be wrong under our democratic system of government to expose these reports.

Mr. Wilkins indicated that he was well aware of the above-mentioned problem. He stated he would take every step to remedy this situation and intended seeing to it that the FBI got the credit it deserved in the Mack Charles Parker Case





Patterson Executive Secretary of the CBC, demanded that his group by included. Set out is a letter signed by Roy Wilkins dated 11/22/4: to Patterson, in which he set out reasons for not inviting the CBC to participate. He diagnosed the CBC as a communist front.

This article reflected that one Roy Wilkins, not further identified, was listed as a sponsor of the Fourth Annual New York City Conference Against War and Fascism. This article reflected that the conference was held under the auspices of the New York City Division of the American League Against War and Fascism.

THE PHYSICIANS FORUM, INCORPORATED

Records in the office of the Clerk of New York State Supreme Court, Foley Square, New York, reflect that The Physicians' Forum, Inc. (PF) was issued a Certificate of Incorporation on April 27, 1944, under the laws of the State of New York, to operate as a non-profit, membership organization principally in the United States. The PF, under the name of the New York Physicians' Forum, had been in existence as an unincorporated association since about 1939.

A source, on September 13, 1954, furnished a folder of PF entitled "What is the Physicians' Forum?" which stated in part that to maintain freedom of thought and expression in medicine, the Forum opposes the imposition of "loyalty oaths" as a prerequisite for licensure, for hospital appointments or privileges, in medical schools, on hospital staffs and against patients; to re-establish the freedom of the medical press, the Forum urges medical society publications to open their volumes to diverse views on controversial subjects; and to provide a forum wherein socially liberal doctors may express their views in opposition to the policies of organized medicine.

The report of the Sub-Committee to Investigate the Administration of the Internal Security Act and other Security Laws of the Committee of the Judiciary, United States Senate, 82nd Congress, 1952 on "Subversive Influence in the Educational Process" on page 37 sets out the testimony of BELLA DODD, member of the National Committee of the Communist Party from 1944 to 1948. DODD testified that the PF was established primarily by the Communist Party (CP) and although not all members of the PF were Communists, the "initiative for organizing the PF came from the CP, came from the ninth floor (35 East 12th Street, New York City), where the National Committee of the CP existed."

On April 24, 1963, the above source advised that the PF is opposed to the resumption of nuclear testing and is against compulsory membership for physicians in the American Medical Association (AMA). It continues to be active in a program of supporting legislation which would provide medical care for the recipients of Social Security benefits, and provide for Social Security benefits for physicians.

The Physicians Forum is located at 510 Madison Avenue, New York, New York.





The "New York Amsterdam News" a NY Weekly Negro newspaper, of 1/20/62, reported that the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights (62-107653) would stage a mass mobilization of civil rights leaders throughout the country to Washington, D.C., in early March, 1962, to seek bi-partisan support behind certain civil rights bills. Roy Wilkins, Chairman of the Leadership group and Executive Secretary of the NAACP, stated, according to this article, that this year's mobilization would not seek to have a large mass of people but to have a wide cross section of representation from all parts of the country, "to show that we don't agree with the Kennedy Administration's civil rights position---." Wilkins said the Leaders Conference represented sixty national organizations.

The 7/16/63 issue of the "New York Journal-American" contains an article entitled "The Negro View: 'Now or Never' - Leadership 'Disunity' Grows Graver." This article was the third in a series by Negro author Louis E. Lomax (62-102926) which disclosed the increasing friction among Roy Wilkins, James Farmer and Martin Luther King, leader of the NAACP, CORE and SCLC, respectively. Who would get the credit for holding mass demonstrations and to whom well-wishers should send their money, were at the root of the "current" crisis. In a speech in Virginia, Wilkins claimed the NAACP was doing all the work and footing the bills while other organizations including CORE and King, were making all the noise and grabbing the headlines. He advised the people not to send money to the CORE and Rev. King but to the NAACP.

The following references in the file captioned "Desegregatio of Jackson, Mississippi, Business Establishments and Public Facilities file 157-896, contain information pertaining to the activities of Roy Wilkins. On 5/31/63 Wilkins was the principal speaker at a mass rally held at the Negro Masonic Temple, 1031 Lynch St., Jackson, <u>Miss</u>. His speech was in the nature of a pep talk encouraging continuing participation in desegregation activities. He criticized the detention facilities at the fairgrounds, comparing them to a concentration camp. Wilkins was arrested on 6/1/63 for picketing on the sidewalk in front of the F. W. Woolworth Store on East Capital St., and later released on \$1,000 bond.

The following references in the file captioned "Nation of Islam," (NOI) file 25-330971, contain information relative to the activities of Roy Wilkins during the period May, 1962 through June, 1963. NOI through the leadership of Elijah Muhammad, the Messenger of Allah, has affiliates throughout the US, and publishes a newspaper called "Muhammad Speaks." NOI's teachings stress separation of the black and white race, destruction of the white race, America, and Christianity by Allah, and non-participation in the white man's wars.

Nembers of NOI attended a rally at which Wilkins was a speaker, and at one time discussed asking Wilkins to speak at one of their outdoor rallies. Muhammad stated he would be glad to meet with Wilkins to discuss their working together on racial problems. On occasions officials of NOI thanked Wilkins and other officials of the NAACP for their love, sympathy and support of the black people and called for a united "Black Front to Fight Injustice." NOI leaders worked to undermine the prestige of Wilkins and other leaders of the Negro movement, and denounced Wilkins and the NAACP as an "Uncle Tom leader of an Uncle Tom Association which is led by white folk."

The following references in the file captioned "Racial Natters" file 157-6, contain information pertaining to the activities of Roy Wilkins. During 1963 Wilkins, Executive Secretary of the NAACP was very active in racial matters. He took an active part in racial demonstrations and affairs; spoke at meetings, and helped plan civil rights activity. He was one of the leaders of the 8/28/63 March on Washington. On 8/25/63 Wilkins appeared on "Neet The Press," NBC Television Program, and was questioned generally concerning the 8/28/6 March on Washington. Wilkins said he did not anticipate any violence during the demonstration. In connection with his activities in civil rights matters Wilkins traveled in various states, including Connectic Alabama, North Carolina, South Carolina, Indiana, California, Pennsylvania, New York and Washington, D.C.

The NY Office had established liaison with individuals in a number of groups sponsoring integration, one of which was Roy Wilkins of the NAACP.

Wilkins stressed the fact that he was not seeing me as an emissary. stated he had some influence on King but not much. He added that there were other within his movement who had greater influence and that perhaps together some pres could be brought on King. Wilkins then added that he hoped that the FBI would not expose King before something could be done.

I interrupted Wilkins at this point. I told him that the Director, of course, did not have in mind the destruction of the civil rights movement as a whol I told him the Director sympathized with the civil rights movement as exemplified I Director's supervision of the FBI's many brilliant accomplishments in this field. 

General Wallace Martin Greene, Jr.:

You had met with witches on 2-24-60 after he had requested interview with Director for latte part of February, 1960. He expressed appreciation for cooperation between Bureau and NAACP; revealed concern about possibility of communists in the NAACP. On 8-12-64 you again met with him in New York City. Wilkins pleased with Director's personal trip to Mississippi; expressed displeasure with Negro civil rights leaders including Martin Luther King, Jr.; James Forman (Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee). He considers Mississippi Summer Project as failure in view of unruly undisciplined individuals who went to Mississippi.

Informant advised in 2-65 of possible enors for a meeting between Environment, head of Nation of Islam; James Forman and Roy Wilkins to show Negro unity. Wilkins arrested 12-11-34 for parading without permit and 6-1-63 for violat of Rississippi Code (not further described)—no disposition for either case.

PACKGROUND:

In connection with the Director's attendance at the Gridiron Club on March 20, 1965, the Director is to be seated between General Wallace Martin Greene, Jr., A arine Corps Commandant, and Roy Wilkins, Executive Director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). There follows detailed information regarding General Greene and Roy Wilkins.

WALLACE MARTIN GREENE, JR.

Biographical Data:

General Greene, the 23rd Commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps, has been a Marine officer since 1930. He assumed his present duties and was prome to his current rank on 1-1-64. Greene was born 12-27-07 at Waterbury, Vermont, attended public schools in Burlington, Vermont, and spent a year at the University Vermont before entering the United States Naval Academy where he graduated 6-5-and received a commission as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Marines. His assignments here many and varied, having served aboard ship and in foreign countries, as well as in the United States.

He was commended for performance of duties during the Sino-Japane hostilities during 1937 and 1938. For his outstanding service as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3 Tactical Group, during the planning and effecting of the Marshall Islands invasion, Greene, then a Lieutenant Colonel, was awarded the First Legion of Meriwith Combat "V." For his outstanding services prior to and during the combat on Saipan and Tinian, he earned a second Legion of Merit. He was promoted rapidly through the ranks and graduated from the National War College in Washington in June, 1953, the following month becoming Staff Special Assistant to the Joint Chiefs of Staff for National Security Council Affairs. He became a Brigadier General on 9-1-55. In June, 1957, he became Commanding General of the Marine Corps Base at Camp Lejeune. While serving as Assistant Chief of Staff at Headquarters Marine Corps in 1958, he was promoted to Major General, subsequently, becoming Deputy Chief of Staff (Plans). On 1-1-60 he was designated Chief of Staff of the Marine Cowith the rank of Lieutenant General.


The late President Kennedy nominated General Greene, on 9-24-63, to be the 23rd Commandant of the Marine Corps for a four-year term, which was confirmed; and, when he assumed that command, 1-1-64, he was promoted to a ful General (four-star).




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General Greene and his wife, the former Vaughan H. Emory of Fairacres, Annapolis, Maryland, live (March, 1964) in the historic Commandant House in Southeast Washington. This has been the residence of every Commandant of the Marine Corps since 1805 and is probably the oldest public building in continuous use in the Nation's Capital. They have a daughter, Vaughan; and a son, Marine Captain Wallace M. Greene III. His parents are deceased.

Information In Bufiles:



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ROY WILKINS:

Wilkins has not been investigated by this Bureau; however, there are over 100 references in our files to him. Jones to DeLoach memo of 4-13-55 set for detailed data from Bufiles regarding Wilkins for the Director's information. There is all forth below data from this memorandum and other pertinent items in Bufiles since that time.

Bigraphical Data:

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Roy Wilkins was born 8-30-01 at St. Louis, Missouri. He received his A.B. degree from the University of Missouri in 1923 and married Aminda Bacea on 9-15-29. From 1923 to 1931 he was Managing Editor of the "Kansas City Call" newspaper. He became associated with the NAACP as an Assistant Secretary in 19:

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which position he he'd until 1949 when he became Acting Secretary. In 1950 he became Administrator and, since April, 1955, has been Executive Secretary of th NAACP. He was editor of "Crisis" magazine, a monthly official NAACP organ, from 1934 to 1949. According to "Who's Who in America" his home address is 147-15 Village Road, Jamacia, New York, and his office is located at 20 West 40th Street, New York City.

Connections with Communist Infiltrated or Dominated Organizations:

Over the years, due to Wilkins' extremely active participation in the civil rights movement, he has associated with or come into contact with individuals connected with the Communist Party (CP). There is no definite indication he has ever been a member of the CP, but in 1939 a source made such an allegation. In his early years (1930's and early 1940's) it appeared that he was adhering to the CP line but since the early 1940's Wilkins has evidenced a very strong and firm anticommunistand and has given every indication of steering the NAACP away from any communist infiltration or influence. More details on this will be set forth later.

Included among some of the communist influenced organizations he associated with are the following: in September, 1936, a member of the National Committee of the International Juridicial Association (communist influenced); in 1987, active in the Scottsboro Defense Committee; in 1937, associated with the Four National Congress Against War and Fascism, and described as a "headliner" at the Convention in 1937 of the American League Against War and Fascism; in 1939, active in the Workers Alliance (communist influenced) according to 'Daily Worker'; in 1939, active in Negro Peoples Committee to Aid Spanish Democracy (communist controlled); allegedly active in the American League for Peace and Democracy; in 1944, listed as speaker before Modern Trend Progressive Youth Group of New York City (group had speakers of divergent views including CP and Socialist Workers Party members); in 1944, a scheduled speaker before a meeting of the National Work Order (some of the other speakers scheduled either known or reliably reported communists). Some of the foregoing organizations have been cited by either the House Committee on Un-American Activities or the Department of Justice pursuant t Executive Order 10450.

The 12-8-40 issue of the "Daily Worker" revealed that American Civil Liberties Union charged that Westchester County Police permitted the assaults on the Paul Robeson concert near Peekskill, New York. Among those who signed the report was Roy Wilkins as Acting Secretary of the NAACP.

In November, 1943, Benjamin Davis, Jr., Negro communist functionary, was elected on the Communist Party ticket to the New York City Council. The "Daily Worker" for November 23, 1943, carried an article to the effect that



Wilkins, in his column, "The Watch Tower," in the "New York Amsterdam News," made the following statements after condemning the "New York World Telegram" on publishing articles on how communists used racial and religious issues to win pla in the election:

".... Moreover, the Communist appeals were not vicious or based on hatred, whereas the Governorship battle was the slimiest waged here in many a decade.... As our system of government is so weak that two Communists out of a council of 17 members constitute danger, then we had better be looking into our foundations.... As a matter of fact, the presence of two declared Communists in our council probably will benefit everyone. Communists stimulate activity. They stimulate progressive measures more often than they voice the aspirations of the plain people, even though these plain people would not go so far as to espouse Communism itself.... As for Ben Davis himself...it is to be doubted whether there is a single Council member of any higher caliber. Davis is a graduate of Amherst and the Harvard Law School... Needless to say, with this background and with the graduate course he has received in the Communist Party, Davis is far from being a greenhorn..." (100-149163-A)

At the 39th Annual Conference of the NAACP held in Kansas City in June, 1948, Wilkins, as the keynote speaker, stated, "Anyone who speaks up for his rights or who does not follow the beaten path is likely to be called a communist." He urged the delegates not to be intimidated by the cry of communism. He pointed cut that Negroes do not want a totalitarian state either of the right or of the left and further stated that they want democracy and that they would speak and work for it with every weapon at their command.

Indications of Anticommunist Attitude:

Since the early 1940's, as indicated previously. Wilkins' attitude has been strongly anticommunist. In 1943, stated the Party was greatly concerned about the election of Roy Wilkins to fill the vacancy Walter White of the NAACP during a year's leave of absence. According to Wilkins had been openly opposed to the tactics of the CP and had been one of the leaders in the NAACP responsible for the defeat of the communists in their effect of take over the organization on a national scale. Further stated that if the election of Roy Wilkins they expected a great deal of opposition.

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advised in January, 1950, that instructions had been given out to all CP members to make every effort to attend the National Civil Rights Mobilization sponsored by the NAACP in January, 1950. A top official of the CP criticized Wilkins and top leadership of the NAACP for the efforts of the organization to rid itself of all forms of communist assistance in the Mobilization.

There are numerous other instances in the 1950's wherein Wilkins we not allow his organization to participate in affairs with or sponsored by the CP. The Party had set its sights on the NAACP with the intention to capture the organization and it was said in one newspaper that the ultimate objective of the CP was to oust Loy Wilkins.

The December, 1951, issue of the "American Magazine" carried an article entitled "Stalin's Greatest Defeat" which was written by Roy Wilkins. The article set forth pertinent information concerning the CP's attempt over the years recruit the Negro people into the CP and stated that this recruitment had been met by failure. Within the Bureau, this article was considered a rather excellent treat on the CP approach to the Negro question.

stated that a fight was shaping up in the N/ACP between the V/alter White forces and the Roy Wilkins forces. It was stated Wilkins actually represented the Trotskyite element in the NAACP and although the CP was not interested in taking over the NAACP, the CP did not want the Trotsky to take over. Consequently, the purpose of CP infiltration would be to combat Wil and support White. As of December, 1954, Walter White was Chairman of the "Leship Conference on Civil Rights" and Roy Wilkins was Chairman of the Executive Committee of the NAACP. (61-3176-914)

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A 12-9-64 release of Fulton Lewis, Jr., concerned the activities of the groups campaigning to abolish the House Committee on Un-American Activities Lewis concluded his article by stating that the more moderate civil rights leaders including Roy Wilkins of the NAACP and Whitney Young of the Urban League 'have refused to join the anti-House Committee on Un-American Activities chorus.'' (163-433447-572)

General Contacts With The Bureau:

Wilkins' contacts over the years with the Bureau have been very implied. You (Mr. DeLoach) have spoken with him on several occasions. These contacts are set out separately in this memorandum under contacts with you.

In the absence of Walter White of the NAACP, Wilkins did write to the Director on 9-10-47 in connection with a "so-called Robeson incident in Peoria, Dinois, in April, 1947." He requested investigation concerning this matter. The matter had already been furnished to the Attorney General. By letter dated 8-14-53, Wilkins wrote to the Director to merely acknowledge receipt of a letter the Director had written several days previous to Walter White.

By letter dated 11-15-54 the Chief Postal Inspector furnished the Bure letter dated 11-5-64 received from Wilkins. Attached to Wilkins' letter was a mimeographed copy of an extortion-type letter, wherein the writer signed himself "Yours for the NAACP, Rufus Tecumseh Washington III." The letter was dated 9-8-and contained scurillous language and threats against Governor White of Mississippi. Wilkins indicated the NAACP had no connection with the mailing of the letter and the letter had been mimeographed and distributed in Mississippi in an effort to slander and discredit the NAACP. Wilkins requested investigation. We had received a copy of the letter through other channels, but we were unable to identify the sender.

Contacts With You (Mr. DeLoach):

You (Mr. DeLoach) have had several meetings with Roy Wilkins. By letter dated 1-21-60 Wilkins requested a meeting with the Director during the period 2/16-31/60. It was recommended that if Wilkins contacted the Director when in Washington during that period the Director's regrets be expressed and he be referred to you. You met with Mr. Wilkins on 2-24-60, at which time he expressed appreciation for the continuing good cooperation between the Bureau and the NAACP. He was assured these comments would be passed along to the Director. You expressed the Director's appreciation for Mr. Wilkins support of the FBI and the faction he had mentioned us favorably on a number of occasions in speeches. Further, appreciation was expressed for the very favorable resolution passed by the NAACP

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at its last convention in New York. The discussion revealed his concern about the possibility of communists in the NAACP, but he strongly emphasized that the communists were not in control of any chapter and that such persons would be eliminated if proof could be obtained. He was also concerned about extremists in the Los Angeles Branch of the NAACP. The Mack Charles Parker case was discussed and Wilkins indicated his intentions to see to it that the FBI got the credit it deserved in the matter.

On 8-12-64 you (Mr. DeLoach) met with Roy Wilkins in New York City with the Director's approval. This was a lengthy conference covering a number of general topics with regard to civil rights. Briefly, Wilkins was pleased with the Director's personal trip to Mississippi to open the Jackson Office, expressing the feeling that this had greatly restored the faith of the Negro people in the FBI. Willd explained there are two groups in the Negro movement responsible for criticism of the FBI. One group would not change its tactics no matter what miracle the FBI might bring about, and prominent in this group are Martin Luther King, Jr.: John Lewis of the Student Non-Vident Coordinating Committee (SNVCC); James Forman of the same group; Bayard Rustin; and Clarence Jones, formerly connected with the Ghandi Society for Human Rights. He felt that these individuals deliberately forment trouble in order to add to their own stature and that it is wrong for the Covernment and the President to attempt to pacify these people. He referred to the second element as the great majority of the Negro race who do not have good educations and intelligence, resulting in their misunderstanding of the FBPs furishiction. Wilkins recommended that you appear before the next NAACP Regiona Conference in Denver, Colorado, during the Spring of 1965; that an article in "Reade Digest" entitled "The FBI's Participation in the Racial Crisis" be prepared; and you meet with the President of the Negro Publishers' Association in Philadelphia. The Director approved the implementation of these recommendations where possible.

Wilkins indicated his desire to stay on for many years with the NAAC commenting that only about one-fifth of the 60 individuals on the Executive Board have criticized him for not being loud enough or militant enough in protesting discrimination and unequal rights. These individuals would like to take over the low iership of the NAACP. (We have since received information from sources indicating that these dissidents would like to accomplish this at the next NAACP Conference.) Wilkins described John Lewis of the SNVCC as being a poor or inarticulate Negro who does not control his own organization.

He feels the Mississippi Sammaer Project is a failure in view of the unruly, undisciplined individuals of this group who went to Mississippi. He also did not agree with the picketing of anomabile agencies and banks in California. He concluded that SNVCC and CORE consist of immature young whites and Negrous who are obviously frustrated in their own lives and turn to irrational activities for self-satisfaction.

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and Wilkins indicated responsible

leaders of the Negro movement have been alarmed about the communist association and procommunist statements of King. Wilkins mentioned that James Forman of SNVCC is also believed to be affiliated with the communists and highly suspect among the Negroes. Wilkins told of his fight against the communists over the past 30 years. In conclusion, Wilkins was invited to come and visit us at FBI Headquarters and that, if the Director was in, he would like to shake hands with Wilkins.

News articles indicated six top civil rights leaders, including Roy William with President Johnson, 11-25-64, and expressed concern and disagreement with Mr. Hoover's recent published remarks about Martin Luther King. Several demand Director's dismissal; however, Wilkins did not. Wilkins told a CBS-TV, "Face The Nation," audience that the Director was "a good public servant" with a "long and distinguished career" who is "simply wrong in this."

On a 2-15-65 memorandum from Baumgardner to Mr. Sullivan, the Director noted, "I don't want anything furnished to Wilkins or Forman in view of the visit to the President demanding my dismissal because of what I had to say re King, particularly since they knew I had stated the truth. H. "

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Wilkins al

pointed out that "Down With The Proletariat" was becoming the battle cry of militar

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Negroes in Mississippi and Alabama, and the same thing was true with respect to Negroes' allegations of laxity on the part of the FBI. Wilkins felt that King and Rusiin had led the Negroes to believe that the FBI can do nothing right.

In this conference, Wilkins admitted that he had criticized the Direct unjustly. He pointed out also that he has a difficult time controlling his Board of Directors since King is a member of the Board.

There has been evidence in the past year of a split between Martin Luther King, Jr., and Roy Wilkins. There have been a number of examples of this split. For instance in mid 1964 Wilkins denounced King and James Forman, the head of CORE, with respect to their planned purpose after the Civil Rights Bill because. According to Wilkins, King and Forman were trying to outdo one another and the approach to the situation should be slower for the most effective movement. According to confidential sources, King feels that Wilkins' attitude strengthens the resistance of the southern people. Confidential sources have revealed at other time that King has commented that Wilkins is always in conflict with him and he is gettin fired of it.

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Attitude Toward Civil Rights Demonstrations:

Generally, Wilkins has indicated a more moderate or "go slow" attit in the field of civil rights. While Wilkins is said to oppose demonstrations for the sake of demonstrations and has opposed irresponsible demonstrations, he has been associated with them on occasions. In June, 1964, when speaking on the matter of civil rights before the graduates of Morris Brown College he said, "Marches and demonstrations have their places and have proved their value but they are not necessarily the key to unlock all doors. We have a duty to recognize that for part these solutions we must look within ourselves and our group as well as without." E indicated that, 'We need frank appraisals of ourselves and, where indicated, corrective measures. We cannot have standards different from those of great and successful peoples throughout history. We must impose upon ourselves those meas of reliability, responsibility and excellence that are universally applied to men ever where." In this connection, the Director noted, "Very well stated." It is noted, however, that the NAACP made plans for possible nationwide demonstrations, inclu a work stoppage, in the event Congress did not pass the Civil Rights Bill, and the NAACP gave Wilkins stand-by powers to call the demonstrations.

Wilkins has participated to some degree in the racial imbalance situation with regard to New York public schools. Much publicity has attended this effort. The purpose of these demonstrations concerns a move of children from schools.

Civilian Review Boards:

With regard to the New York City riots last summer, in an interview over WCBS on 8-9-64, Wilkins urged a civilian review board made up of reputable a distinguished citizens to handle police matters. Wilkins believed that the Harlem riwere due to the refusal of the police department to handle the shooting of "Powell" by Lieutenant Gilligan in anything but a routine manner. Wilkins claimed that everyone Harlem felt they had been done wrong in the Lieutenant Gilligan matter. Wilkins, of course, was referring to the riots which were precipitated after the shooting of a young colored hoodlum by a police lieutenant. (100-3-116-2150)

African Policy:

The 11-29-64 issue of the "New York Times" indicated that 6 of the prominent American Negro leaders including such individuals as Roy Wilkins; Jame Norman of Congress of Racial Equality (CORE); Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.; and Williamsy M. Young, Jr., of the National Urban League, indicated to the Administrate that they favored a complete revision of the United States policy in Africa including the Fresident they indicated that the "Mercenaries and other external forces, including those of the United States, should disengage from all military commitment until such time as aid can be given in the context of requests from the Governments and Congo, acting in concert with the African Governments represented in the Corganization of African Unity." The remarks of these Negro leaders were drawn from resolutions passed by the American Negro Leadership of Africa held in September, 1964, in Washington. (105-116631)

Briefly, according to an August, 1964, news article the NAACP was founded in 1909 by white people, headed by a woman crusader Mary White Overturn. According to the article this group later affiliated with a Negro group led by the late W.E.B. DuBois. The NAACP today reportedly has 500,000 members of all races and religions and has 1,600 local groups. The article pointed out that most of its victories have been won in legal struggles. Wilkins reportedly heads a staff of 125. (100-3-116 "New York Times" 3-10-64)

An article in the 1-24-65 issue of "New York Times" indicated that with one exception the civil rights organizations suffered declining revenue and budge deficition 1964. The exception to the pattern of financial embarrassment was the National Urban League which increased its revenue in 1964.

Miscellaneous:

Bufiles indicate that since his initial association with the NAACP, Wilkins has traveled throughout the country speaking before various branches of the organization. Excerpts of talks he has given through the years would indicate that he has urged the Negro to fight for equal rights and against discrimination and segregation through the organization. There is no indication that he has ever advocated violence but has advocated the fighting of segregation through teaching the whites that the Negro is equal in all respects. He has criticized "reactionary forces in America" particularly mentioning Westbrook Pegler.

In 1943 a news article indicated that Wilkins severely criticized the Attorney General's suggestion to curb the migration of Negro workers to industrial areas.

A 3-20-48 item in "New York Times" indicated that Roy Wilkins, as spokesman for the NAACP, repudiated statements that the organization would assist Henry Wallace in his presidential campaign and reaffirmed its non-partisan policy.

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On 12-11-34 Roy Wilkins, along with other individuals, was arrested for parading without a permit in front of the Memorial Continental Hall at 17th and D. Scheets, Northwest, Washington, D. C.

Records of the FBI Identification Division reveal that Wilkins was arrested 6-1-63 by the Jackson, Mississippi, Police Department for violation of Section 1088, Mississippi Code, 1942 (not further described) and there was no disposition shown.

The <u>Journal Herald</u>, a daily morning newspaper of general circulation published in Dayton, Ohio, published the following article on page 35 of the final edition on March 13, 1965. The article under caption "Wilkins Streems" Need for Fair Housing Here" stated as follows:

"Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) urged Daytoniana to fight for a strong state fair housing bill and a local fair housing ordinance with teeth last night in an address at Tabernacle Baptist church.

Satirically referring to Dayton as a 'little paradise', he atressed the need in Dayton for fair housing.

'You have a problem here,' he declared.

'And I hope you're not going to let anyone frighten you out of an ordinance or maneuver you into a bad or weak law.

It's better to have no law at all than one with absolutely no teeth.

His statements about the Dayton's housing aituation brought applause from the 450 negroes and whites in the audience.

But watch those housing laws. Keep in touch with the state legislature, he warned.

'You're getting along pretty well in Dayton with your school board in eliminating de facto segregation, he added. ENCLOSURE

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'It's nothing to crack your heals about, but at least you're moving.'

While praising Rev. Martin Luthar King's Selma, Ala., actions, he warned that Negroes should not criticize President Lyndon Johnson for not 'going to Selma and fighting with his bare hands.'

'That's not his job,' Wilkins declared.
'He has not remained silent. His stand on voting rights is clear. His outrage over Selma is evident in his sending his emmisaries to Alabama along with the attorney general and the FBI. That's what ha has an administration for.'

'Wilkins, who delivered an emotional address full of description of the recent Selma beatings by Stata polica, drew several responsas from the sudience.

'That's right, it's true, 'Negroes commented sloud.

He said the NAACP has scheduled two new programs for the south for this summer, including a Mississippi project and citizenship training clinics.

'Colored people must learn to become better, more efficient citizens all over the country,' he said.

He forthrightly placed some blame for the Negro's second class citizenship in the laps of the Negroes.

'There isn't one large corporation in this country that isn't crying for Negroes,' he declared. 'They will hire any good secretary if sha's as black as coal and looks like a locomotive after a wrack.'

'Don't ever lump all white people together. Do for them what you ask of them-see them as people and individuals, not as just white people.'

He stressed the reality of unity of white and Negro in the Selma situation, referring to last Sunday's violence as 'Selma Sunday.'

Echoing King when he spoke in Dayton two months ago, Wilkins reminded the Negroes that 'We've made progress, but we've got a long way to go.'

'I think there will be a new civil rights law that will provide for federal registrars, state and local elections and will abolish literacy tests,' he added.

He pointed out the greatest task for the Negro today is to 'analyza the obstacles ahead of us.'

'How are you going to fight the Gov. George Wallaces and the Sheriff Jim Clarks?' he asked. 'What kinds of minds are these?'

He said he has been invited to speak at a memorial service for Rev. James Reeb, the Boston Unitarian minister who died in Selma Thursday after being beaten by whites.

'He had the old fashioned religion', Wilkins said. 'That kind of religion isn't fashionable any more. People just count their money and try to figure out how they can get ahead now.'


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GLOSSARY

In view of the fact that a considerable number of references concerning the activities of Roy Wilkins lacked a positive locality, it should be noted that Wilkins resided at Jamaica, Queens, N.Y., and maintained offices at NAACP Headquarters, 20 West 40th Street, NYC.



By airtel dated 8/12/64, Philadelphia furnished verbatim transcripts of telephone messages which began with the phrase, "Let Freedom Ring" (157-1704) and continued with comments relating to political and racial matters. The 8/5/64 message concerned the communist influence in the civil rights movement and indicated that, according to the 7/29/63 Congressional Record, Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary of the NAACP, had received seven citations in connection with his association with communist front groups.

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The "New York Daily News" issue of 2/7/64, page 5, contained an article entitled "State Calls a Secret Parley To Talk Out School Impasse." The article revealed that on 2/12/64, a meeting was scheduled to be held between top educators and national executives of civil rights groups to discuss the impasse which had developed over the pace of integration in the NYC public schools. The article disclosed that Roy Wilkins had been invited to attend this meeting


On 1/30/64, University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minn., furnished information concerning a symposium which was scheduled to be held at the University stated that although no difficulty was anticipated in connection with the appearance of the participants, including Roy Wilkins, an alumnus of the University and recipient of the University's outstanding achievement award, the University officials were concerned about the appearance of Governor George Wallace (62-102939).

It was noted that the symposium on "Great Issues in Government" would be held on 2/16-19/64, and the scheduled speakers included Wilkins; Robert Welch, founder of the John Birch Society; Norman Thomas, Socialist leader; and Walter W. Heller, Economic advisor to the President.

Alexander, Jr., Director, Joint Legislative Committee on Un-American Activities, State of Louisiana, Old Capitol Building, Baton Rouge, La., furnished copies of Report No. 5, of The Joint Legislative Committee on Un-American Activities, State of Louisiana. The report covered the hearing before the Committee on 3/19/64 and set out the connection between the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc. (SCEF) (100-10355), and the Fair Play for Cuba Committee. Two documents, a letter dated 9/10/63, which made reference to Roy Wilkins and an undated letter to Wilkins from Aubrey Williams, President Emeritus of the SCEF, were offered to the Committee as evidence. The letter to Wilkins bitterly condemned Wilkins for his criticism of Martin Luther King, Rev. Fred Shuttlesworth and others who were connected with the SCEF.

The 4/26/64 edition of the "NY Herald Tribune," page 10, contained an article by former professional baseball player Jackie Robinson, in which Robinson commented on the newspaper coverage of the racial situation and Malcolm X (100-399321). than Roy Wilkins and other civil rights leaders, although he had never gone to jail for freedom as Wilkins had, nor had he faced the personal crises endured by the other leaders.

The following references in the file captioned "NAACP" contain information concerning the activities of Roy Wilkins, Executive Director, from 6/1/64 to 7/8/66. The references disclosed that prior to the early 1940's, Wilkins tended to adhere to the CP line. Since that time, however, he had endeavored to steer the NAACP from communist infiltration. During attempts to follow up the 8/28/63 March on Washington, D.C., Wilkins stepped in and prevented direct action programs.

REVOLUTIONARY ACTION MOVEMENT

On November 3, 1964, a source made available a document entitled, "The Revolutionary Action Movement Manifesto", the document having been obtained by the source from an individual known to be a member of the Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM).

This document stated, in part, that RAM was officially organized in the Winter of 1963 by Afro-Americans who support the revolutionary objectives of ROBERT F. WILLIAMS, then residing in Cuba, and his concept of organized violence to achieve the liberation of the Afro-American people in the United States. This Manifesto disclosed that RAM had oriented its program to one of education and political revolution and the organization of a "black" political party with revolutionary objectives, having recognized the need for a "black revolution" that could and would seize power. RAM philosophy is described in this document as one of revolutionary nationalism, that is, one involving the struggles of the non-white races of the world against exploitation and enslavement by the white capitalist and imperialist nations.

Regarding WILLIAMS, it should be noted that on August 28, 1961, a Federal warrant was issued at Charlotte, North Carolina, charging him with Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution for the crime of kidnaping. Subsequent to the issuance of this warrant, WILLIAMS fled the United States to Cuba, where he published a monthly newsletter entitled, "The Crusader" from Havana. As of December, 1966, WILLIAMS was residing in Peking, China.

This source, in September, 1964, advised RAM is dedicated to the overthrow of the captialist system in the United States, by violence, if necessary, and to its replacement by a socialistic system oriented toward the Chinese Communist interpretation of Marxism-Leninism. A source advised on May 3, 1968, that the Nation of Islam (NOI) is an all Negro organization originating in Detroit, Michigan, in the early 1930s. Headquarters of the NOI is located at Muhammad's Temple (or Mosque) Number 2, 5335 South Greenwood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

MUHAMMAD teaches there is no such thing as a Negro; that the so-called Negroes are slaves of the white race, referred to as "devils," in the United States; and that the white race because of its exploitation of the so-called Negro will be destroyed by Allah in an approaching "War of Armageddon, a war between God and the devil.

Officials and members of the NOI, including MUHAMMAD, have refused to comply with provisions of the Selective Service Act, stating that they respect laws of the United States as long as they do not conflict with the laws of the NOI, but do not believe the government should force them to participate in wars from which they have nothing to gain.

Mr. Davise pointed out that Mr. Wilkins is to appear at a Freedom Fund dinner at 8 PM, August 22, 1969. The dinner is to be held at the Sheraton-Tampa Motor Inn, according to Davice. Mr. Wilkins is to remain overnight in Tampa, departing this city on August 23, 1969, via an unidentified airline. Mr. Davies continued by eaying that the Freedom Fund dinner at which Mr. Wilkins is to appear, ie being eponeored by the Tampa Chapter of the RAACP. He said that Bob Gilder, Precident, Tampa Chapter of the MAACP, Ela has been instrumental in arranging for the Freedom Fund dinner and has a responsibility for arranging accomodations for Mr. Wilkiha during the hight of August 22, 1969. Mr. Davies, who said he possessed no information, indicating violent activity toward Mr. Wilkins, concluded by maying that he wanted representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to be aware of the presence of Mr. Wilkins and to take whatever precautions are necessary in connection with Mr. Wilkins' vieit.

David Self, Negro male, active in Negro protest activity at Clarksdale, confirmed on November 20, 1969, that Wilkins was expected in Clarksdale, Mississippi, on November 22, 1969.

Aaron Henry advised a Special Agent of the FBI on November 21, 1969, that Wilkins would be present for a memorial service for President John F. Kennedy at the First Baptist Church, Clarksdale, Mississippi, 8:00 A.M., Saturday, November 22, 1969, after which there would be a meeting of Mississippi Chapter Presidents of the NAACP in what was termed "An Antomy of a Movement", which Henry described as a discussion of the legal means of protest. the meeting would be followed by a protest march at 10:00 A.M., through downtown Clarksdale to the front of the Coahoma County Courthouse where Wilkins was to make a brief speech concerning the school desegregation issue in Clarksdale and Coahoma County, Mississippi.

A memorial service for President Kennedy was held at the First Baptist Church, Clarksdale, at 8:30 A.M., November 22, 1969. The service was led by Aaron Henry and Reverend Willie B. Crump, pastor of the Haven Methodist Church, Clarksdale. Wilkins was late in his arrival from Memphis, Tennessee; however, he arrived about 9:15 A.M., and he spoke briefly concerning his admiration for President Kennedy, particularly mentioning the fact that Kennedy had the courage to face the issue of his religion as a major factor in his campaign. Wilkins advised the group of about 80 Negroes that they should recognize that there are many white people who are willing to give assistance to Negroes.

The service was followed by a meeting of 40 Mississippi NAACP Chapter Presidents, according to Henry, who advised on November 22, 1969, that the chapter representatives contributed about \$1,700.00 to the NAACP at the meeting.

At 10:00 A.M., 480 Negroes marched from the First Baptist Church through downtown Clarksdale, escorted by local police officers, to the Coahoma County Courthouse, where a public address system had been installed on the Courthouse steps.

Wilkins addressed the group at that location, with particular reference to the decision of the Federal Court in Mississippi, to exclude children from achool if they have refused to take achievement tests on which their assignment to particular schools will be based. He cited the need for white and black citizens to resolve this problem because it was his opinion that keeping children from school would not be the solution. He indicated that Negroes whould follow the instructions of their leaders in the current protest movement at Clarksdale and he pointed out that neither the Negroes nor the whites of Coahoma County were going anywhere and it was important for them to resolve their problems.

The group marched back to the First Baptist Church, again led by Aaron Henry, Roy Wilkins, and Alex Waites, who is employed by the NAACP Welfare and Relief Board in Jackson, Mississippi.

There were no arreats or incidents.

Wilkins arrived and departed in a black over green 1968 Plymouth four door sedan, bearing Shelby County, Tenneasee, license KO 7790. He left Clarksdale at 11:45 A.M., November 22, 1969.

Aaron Henry advised on November 22, 1969, that he is attempting to secure an appearance of entertainer Aretha Franklin for the protest activity of November 29, 1969, but no definite agreement had been made.



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Disorders Damages Worst Yet

Damages incurred in five days of disturbances in Hartford are expected to exceed \$1.5 million, police reported today.

The estimate was made as police and fire officials began inspecting the disorder torn areas of the eity and compiling a list of damages.

The damage report is expected to be completed by the end of this week.

If the \$1.5 million figure holds true, this year's disturbances will go down in, record as the most serious in Hartford history.

Last September's disturbances have held the dubious record. Ninety-seven businesses were burned and looted and damages then totaled \$1.3 million.

Three hundred and twelve persons were arrested in connection with this year's disturbances. Of those, 16 were inveniles, police said.

"On the other hand," Jordan said, "we have not had one juvenile arrested for curfew violation."

The most serious juvenile arrest of the past five days took place early Sunday morning, he said, when a 14-year-old Black Panther Party member was arrested on charges of conspiracy to commit murder, possession of

According to its official newspaper the Black Panther Party (BPP) was started during December. 1966 in Cakland, California, to organize black people so they can take control of the life, politics and the destiny of the black community. It was organized by BOBBY GEORGE SEALE, BPP Chairman, and HUEY P. NEWTON, BPP Minister of Defense. NEWTON is presently serving a sentence of two to fifteen years on a conviction of manslaughter in connection with the killing of an Oakland police officer.

The official newspaper, "The Black Panther," which further describes itself as the "Black Community News Service," stated that the BPP advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics in its revolutionary program to end oppression of the black people. Residents of the black community are urged to arm themselves against the police who are consistently referred to in the publication as "pigs" who should be killed.

"The Black Panther" issue of September 7, 1968, contains an editorial by BPP Minister of Education, GEORGE MASON MURRAY which ends with the following:

"Black Men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is revolutionary culture. Change, Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black Power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere!"

Included in the introduction to an article appearing in the October5, 1968, edition of "the Black Panther" is the statement, "...We will not dissent from American Government. We will overthrow it."

Issues of the "Black Panther" regularly contain quotations from the writings of Chairman MAO Tse-tung of the People's Republic of China and feature MOA's statement that "political power grows out of the barrel of a gun."

The national headquarters of the BPP is located at 3106 Shattuck Ave., Berkeley, California. Branches have been established at various locations throughout the United States.

Freedman said he would authorize only the use of birdshot for the shetguns, a milder ammunition than some other peliets.

At normal times, the manager said the shotguns "are under lock and key" at police headquarters.

He said several other morepolitan cities have taken to the use of shotguns "at any time" but that he did not foresee a similar occurrence in Hartford.

"Who would have thought we'd come to this?" Freedman asked to no one in

particular, circling his eluttered desk at City Hall.

Hartford policemen normally are armed with .38. caliber revolvers.

inriford police union, which tepresents some 400 policemen, referred to Jonzales' death as "a tragic thing."

But, said Det. William L. Kearns, "the police are trying to protect themselves and the city."

Shotguns, Kearns said 'have a psychological affect' on rioters.

"I think that just the sight of a shotgun being raised will stop bottle throwing and aniper fire during disturbances." Kearns said.

The detective admitted the shotaun's spraying effect but he, too, saw no other way to protect the city in a riot.

Meanwhile, the Gonzales' estate has instituted legal action against the city as has a North End woman who claimed she was slightly wounded from shetgan fire while sitting in her living room.

THREAT TO LIFE OF BOY VILKINS NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF COLORED PROPLE JULY 16, 1963
RACIAL MATTERS

On July 16, 1963, Mr. Granville Reed, Program Assistant, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), 431 South Dearborn Street, Chicago, Illinois, advised the Chicago Division, Federal Bureau of Investigation that he was in receipt on this date of a postal card addressed to the NAACP, 431 South Dearborn, Chicago, Illinois. Mr. Reed stated the card arriving in the morning mail is believed to have been mailed at Chicago, Illinois although the postmark is not thoroughly legible.

On the reverse of the post card is the following message:

"ATTENTION!

All N.A.A.C.P. members!

If your head, Roy Wilkens wants to live beyond Sat. 7/20 he had better leave the country.

I worn you I make no empty threats! K. P."

Reed advised that Roy Wilkins is currently in charge of the NAACP and maintains his residence and office in New York City. He stated that on July 16, 1963, he had been in telephonic contact with Wilkins' office at New York but had determined that Wilkins was not present in the office. Reed stated that he was unable to ascertain Wilkins' whereabouts as of the time of that call.

On July 16. 1963. details concerning this matter were furnished to Human Relations Section, Chicago Police Department.

SIN184 SPERIATIONS 2

On July 16, 1963, this matter was discussed with Wayne O. Wood, Region I, 113th INTC Group, Chicago, Illinois.

All N.A.A.C.P. Members! If your head, Roy Wilkens, wants to live beyond Sat. 7/20 he had better leave the country. I warn you I make no empty threats! K. P."

Although this card has been handled by a number of people and by the NAACP Office, the Lab is requested to examine this card for any latent fingerprints and also search the card through the appropriate files to determine if there is any similar correspondence coming to the attention of the Bureau. The Lab is requested to handle this expeditiously in order that the report may be included in the 10-day closing report.



He stated that he also recalls that a number of months ago his office received a crank telephone call but does not recall the contents of this call.

She is director of Community Relations and is employed in the offices of New York City Department of Welfare, 250 Church Street, on the 14th floor. The telephone number is DI 4-8700, extension 615.

Reference memorandum dated August 11, 1969, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

The August 11, 1969, issue of the "Oklahoma Journal" contains an article reflecting Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary of the nation-wide NAACP, had pledged wholehearted support for the Oklahoma City garbage workers' demand for a \$100 per month pay raise and five-day work week. According to the article, Wilkins, in New York, stated "We haven't made any definite plans. It's just a question of what form the action will take." The article quoted another NAACP official in New York, Henry Lee Moon, as comparing the Oklahoma City situation with earlier confrontations in Tennessee and South Carolina. Moon stated, "There is no question that we will stand behind them just as we stood by the workers in Memphis and Charleston."

The August 12, 1969, issue of the "Oklahoma Journal" contains an article indicating that a group of ministers representing 26 black members within the 75-member Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance in Oklahoma City, OKIA. announced that they were "shocked by the city sanitation workers' wages, working conditions and gave their support to the workers' threat to strike. Reverend J. C. West. President of the Alliance, was asked by newsmen what form the pledged support would take and West replied, "If it's necessary to say some more later, we'll say some ore. If it's necessary to do some more, we'll do some more.'
The August 12, 1969, issue of the "Daily Oklahoman"

contains an article stating that City Manager Robert H. Oldland, Oklahoma City, had reiterated his pledge that any sanitation worker walking off his job on August 19, 1969, will be dismissed. Oldland stated that the city will continue to refuse to respond to demands or ultimatums butindicated some complaints by sanitation workers may be resolved soon. Oldland stated that no action on a pay raise for the sanitation workers will be taken until a scheduled review of pay raises for sanitation workers and other city jobs is completed around the end of the year. According to the article, the Oklahoma City Youth Council of the NAACP has pledged to stand or lie down in front of garbage trucks to halt sanitation operations August 19th, if the workers strike.

No.1. August 13 1969 issue of the "Daily Oklahoman"

The August 13, 1969, issue of the "Daily Oklahoman" reflects that City Manager Oldland would meet on August 13, 1969, and August 14, 1969, with city sanitation workers for a general dialogue and briefing on new working conditions. Oldland outlined the new job conditions which includes a five-day, 40-hour week beginning September 2, 1969. He had presented this report on job conditions and changes to the Oklahoma City Council on August 12, 1969, and the council members approved the report and urged Oldland to make the same report directly to the sanitation workers. The article quotes Mrs. Clara Luper, Advisor to the NAACP Youth Council, as stating she did not think the sanitation workers will be satisfied with Oldland's program. She said she felt a pay increase which has been rejected by Oldland is a key issue to the workers. According to the article, State Senator E. Melvin Porter, former NAACP official in Oklahoma City, said he is personally satisfied that Mrs. Luper and other supporters of the sanitation workers aren't planning any activities involving violence. He confirmed that several East Side residents of Oklahoma City had asked him to check on rumors that a sanitation strike may lead to violence and widespread disorder. He said that about 10 persons have expressed concern to him about the involvement of young men that have identified themselves as Black Panthers, in the sanitation controversy. In addition, Porter stated that all indications he has indicate that the Black Panther group intends to follow Mrs. Luper's lead in making a non-violent stand on behalf of the sanitation workers. Porter stressed that he believes the sanitation workers have a legitimate complaint but said he hopes some compromise 🗵 can be reached before August 19, 1969.

On July 1, 1969, Bobby Seale, Chairman of the BPP, gave a press release by reading the text of a telegram received from Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

CALIF.

Wilkins' telegram read as follows:

*I am desirous of exploratory conference with officers of millitant group and particularly with you as chairman of the Central Committee of the Black Panther Party. Do not desire public meeting at this time. Certainly cannot arrange trip to West Coast before late July account prior committments. At this time my desire to explore areas of possible agreement and disagreement is purely an administrative one on my own authority as Chief Executive Officer of NAACP. It is official, of course, but not binding nor does it have the formal endorsement of my Board of Directors. I simply feel very strongly that present situation of our race requires trying to reach some common ground and arrival at some sort of strategy that will be effective even if used in only a few areas. I may be in error and there is not unamanous support even among my immediate co-workers on staff, but I feel I must try. I hope we may continue the effort to arrive at a mutually satisfactory meeting date and place late in July or early in August. /s/ Roy Wilkins, 1072 Lynch St. after July 7,790 Broadway New York."

It should be pointed out during the time this telegram was sent, the NAACP was conducting its national convention in Mississippi.

Seale stated he sent Wilkins a telegram on June 30, 1969, stating the Central Committee would meet with Wilkins on July 4, 1969, at a public meeting in DeFremery Park, Oakland, California, in connection with a rally and picnic originally scheduled.

Seale stated the BPP will meet with Wilkins only under these terms and to date, no answer has been received from Wilkins. Seale stated that it is obvious that Wilkins does not want to meet with the people and that he is separated from the Black community. He commented that if Wilkins was really concerned, he would have accepted a public meeting.

The "Black Panther" newspaper, for July 5, 1969 published a copy of the telegram and a picture of Roy Wilkins. Under the picture was a subtitle, "The Grand Cop-Out".

6. Reaction of Leaders and Members of the Community to Minority Demands and the Existence of Channels of Communications, San Francisco California Area

The Community Relations Unit, of the San Francisco, California Police Department, which has been under fire in the past months from minority leaders, has seen the previous leader of the Unit retire and a Negro patrolman appointed to head the Unit.

The new head of the Unit has been presented with a new plan of action. The plan was drafted by a member of the Mayor's Crime Committee and calls for sweeping changes and broad community involvement.

Emphasis of the new plan is for the police department to go to the people rather than wait for the people to come to them. The plan proposes seven Divisions; Ethnic and Racial Relations; Youth Relations; Bomestic Relations; Complaint Division; Social Abuses; Communications and Research addibrary. On 7/11/70 a march and rally were held in Augusta, Ga., led by WILBERT ALLEN, a self-proclaimed organizer of the Augusta Black Panther Party, without incident. Both gatherings were well attended and received local news attention. Speeches made at both gatherings called for the identities of the Augusta police officers responsible for the deaths of six individuals during the rioting on 5/11-12/70 in Augusta, Ga.

PERSONAL EVALUATION

Sources report that following both of the above gatherings, as well as during regular contacts, tensions appear to be easing in Augusta, Ga. I do not expect at this time that the Savan hah Division will have any major racial incidents. No indications have been received to date indicating that the integration of public schools in September, particularly in the rural areas, will be marred with any violence. It is expected that friction among the students will be present initially and perhaps generate minor incidents, however, no major difficulties are expected at this

Immediately before the meeting began, Allen and others in uniform left. Two or three of these uniformed individuals returned inside the church for the meeting but Allen did not return. observed throwing the fire bomb which was found to be a fifth-size whiskey bottle containing kerosene. There was no structural damage to the lounge and the persons responsible were not identified or arrested.

On September 23, 1969, 188 Negroes, all high school student age, were arrested at the Clarksdale High School, a white school, where they had assembled and marched to protest the segregated school system in Clarksdale. They were arrested after they were advised by local authorities that their arrest would result if they trespassed on the school grounds. There was no violence during the incident.


Following the above incident, frequent marches were held at Clarksdale sponsored by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) to protest the segregated school system which operated on a district plan and to protest the above arrests.

A boycott of white businesses and picketing of the downtown business area as well as the businesses of the members of the Clarksdale City School Board, was also instituted by the NAACP. Marches were held regularly on Saturdays with as many as 1,700 Negro participants. There were no acts of violence during the marches, meetings or picketing.

Mr. Aaron E. Henry, president, Mississippi NAACP and Coahoma County Chapter of the NAACP, Clarksdale, arranged for speakers to participate in several marches and meetings, including Mr. Roy Wilkins, Executive Secretary, NAACP, New York, New York, who spoke and led a march on November 22, 1969.

Reverend Ralph D. Abernathy, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), addressed a group of Negroes at Clarksdale on February 2, 1970, without incident.

WASHINGTON-Mississippl civil rights leaders Thursday launched a campaign for a massive demonstration to protest a acheduled speech by Atty. Gen. John Mitchell to the Delta Council-the epitome of the state's upper-crust white society.

Aaron E. Henry, Missistippi NAACP president said he had failed ir quiet efforts to persuade Mitchell not 's address the Chamber of Commerce-type organization, which Henry branded "segregationist and

A spokesman for the attorney general said Mitchell does not consider the organization to be reacially exclusive and plans to make the speech at its annual meeting on May 19 in Cleveland, Miss.

In letters mailed to other civil rights figures Thursday, Henry accused some Delta Council members of supporting private schools to thwart public (school segregation.

Among those he is inviting to Cleveland are Roy Wilkins, the Rev. Ralph David ther-nathy, Whitney Young, Bayard Kustin and A. Phillip Kandolph. Heary wrote that he was asking national

church and civil rights leaders, as well as some political leaders, to convene in Cleveland on May 18 and 19 "for a demonstration of civil disobedience against Mr. Mitchell's presence here."

For years national political figures journeyed to Cleveland to speak at the ouncille annual meeting. It was there on 1947, for example, that thenUndersecretary of State Dean Acheson first mentioned the European recovery program that a bit later was unfolded by Secretary of State George C. Marshall and became known as the Marshall plan. In his book, 'Present at the Creation" Acheson wrote of the Delta Council meeting:

"Once a year the Delta Council meets on the tree-shaded lawn of the teachers college at Cleveland, bringing families and relatives with them to discuss their own area's interests and problems and to hear about the great world to which historically their products have gone. Those most immediately concerned listen to the speaker in the large gymnasium of the college. His words are carried to many more thousands on the surrounding lawn while they eat candwiches, drink pop, and keep an eye on the aleeping children. The scene is an easygoing, good-natured, shirt-sleeved, thoroughly American one. .

By the 1960s, however, the heat generated by the civil rights movement persuaded national politicians that the scene might not be so easy-going and they stopped addressing the council. One of the last invited was Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman. A former council official recalled that "Freeman was supposed to come at about the time the freedom rides started and he suddenly decided he had to inspect the cranberry crop somewhere and couldn't come."

For more than two months Henry, a longtime civil rights leader, tried to convince Mitchell that lending the prestige of the attorney general's office to the Deita Council function would buoy segregationist sentiment.

ment. // / / / / / After Henry first protested, Morristewis. Jr. of Indianola council president, wrote him a letter saying that if the council's meeting is all-white 'It will be only because no Negroes want to attend. At our annual meetings in the past Negroes have attended and at no time were they denied admittance. . . The Deita Council has never had any restriction on Negro membership."

A spokesman for Mitchell said the attorne general, after receiving a copy of Lewis letter, decided the council was not raciall; exclusive.

A former council official who has been a member for more than 20 years told the Lo Angeles Times, "I've never seen a black face in the audience at one of our meeting Negroes are not excluded by the by-laws, b they aren't included as members. It's iu like Jews are not excluded by our count club's by-laws, but they're not admitted a members."

Council President Lewis, who is Jewis: said in an interview that he financia supports a private school at Indianola. said he also has supported public school

He said he does not know how many of 18-county council's 4,000 members (Negroes "because our membership car don't show race, but I recognize one or to names as friends of mine who are Negror

"I can say uncategorically I have s them quite a few times at the meeting Lewis said. "I can't recall whether I saw the last year or the year before, but I fold by people I know that they saw some year."

Dear Friend of the Cause of Freedom:

I am sorry to have to report to you that all of our efforts have been futile in trying to persuade the Attorney General of the United States Department of Justice, Attorney John Mitchell to uphold the reputation of the Department of Justice of men who held the office before him. This list begins with Attorney General Brownell and goes thru Attorney General Ramsey Clark, and of course, in between were such dedicated Americans as Robert Kennedy, Nicholas Katzenbach, John Doar, Bob, Lisbon Berry, the Flannerys and many others.

None of these men deminished themselves to the extent that they would openly associate the name of the United States Department of Justice with an organization that was segregationist and racist.

Yet, on May 19, 1970, in spite of the persuassion of many of us, and some members of the U. S. Department of Justice, including Attohey Jack Landau, who reportedly is now on his way t, being fired by the Attorney General. On Friday, April 17, I made another inquiry in the Office of the Attorney General, trying to persuade him not to make the same kind of "Mockery of a department in Washington called "Justice", as is a town in Mississippi called "Liberty". I was informed on that day ... "The Delta Council, although it has no Negro members, that this in the Attorney General's mind did not constitute segregation nor discrimination. Therefore, we have decided to organize a demonstration of Civil Disobedience against this racist identification. We are inviting Mr. Roy Wilkins, Rev. Ralph Abernathy, Mr. Whitney Young, Mr. Byard Rustin, Mr. A. Phillip Radolph, Rev. Dudley Ward, The National -Council of Churches and other Church Groups, The Delta Ministry, The American Friends Service Committee and several national politicismum both Democrat

and Republican, to join us at a Public Rally at the United Baptist Church, 1028 Christman Street, Ext., on Monday May 18th and at 9:00 A. M. the morning of May 19th and demonstrate to the Nation our objection TO OUR ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE TOP LAW OFFER IN THE UNITED STATES identifying with a group that remains in the valley of segregation. The activities of the President of the Delta Council and many of its members in support of segregation as they identify with the PRIVATE SCHOOL MOVEMENT that assists white children in the cause to not go to school with Black children is unforgivable.

The meeting is scheduled for Cleveland, Mississippi, May 19, 1970. Your presence is needed.



The 36-page booklet captioned, "Who Controls Black Destiny?" is self-described as a publication of Communiviews, a newsletter of the Black Parent, Teacher and Student Coalition, a monthly publication, P. O. Box 17148, Chicago, Illinois 60617, special edition, Volume 111, No. 6, Fall 1972. Page 2 indicates this is the only edition published since Spring, 1972.

Page 1 states: "Our Objectives: The Seven Stages to African Liberation".

The table of contents indicates this booklet contains 20 separate articles of interest to Black people.

The editorial on page 4 applauds President Idi Amin of Uganda for expelling the "Jewish-like" blood sucking Asians from his country. It derides President Julius Nyerere of Tanzania for invading Uganda and not Rhodesi or South Africa.

The cover story on page 5 condemns present Black leaders in industry, social and civic organizations as powerless, informants who are really tools of the white man or bonkies. Example of these Black traitors are: General Benjamin Q Davis, Jr., United States Air Force; Sammy Davis, Jr., Entertainer; Preston Wilcox, Consultant; Pow Wilkins, Executive Director of the NAACP; Dr. Andrew Felton Brimmer, member of the Federal Reserve Board, and Reverend Dr. Leon Howard Sullivan, founder of Opportunities Industrialization Center.

Black man of the month, on page 12 concerns a slanderous attack against George O'Hare, a white man, and the Black priest, Rev. George Clements. The article calls Rev. Clements a "traitor nigger" for naming O'Hare, Black man of the month for April, 1972. O'Hare is a merchandising manager for Sears, Roebuck and Company.

The National Black Political Convention in Gary, Indiana, is discussed on page 13. It was criticized for not being representative of Blacks in the United States, for allowing white "honkies" to be delegates and for not condemning Israel in their dispute ith the Arab states. It condemned the actions of Rev. Jesse. Jackson of Push, "People United to Save Honkies"; Mayor Hatcher, and Legislators Diggs, Newhouse and Dellum's.

The article "From Gary to McGovern: Black Politics-Lost, Strayed and Betrayed", appears on page 16. This is an excerpt from a story appearing in the September, 1972 publication,



Numerous Negro leaders in the City of Memphis were in this walk out group including Reverend James Morris Lawson, Jr., pastor of Centenary Methodist Church; Reverend S. B. Kyles, Labor Director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP); Maxine Smith, Executive Secretary of the NAACP, Memphis; Reverend Exekiel Bell, pastor of Parkway Gardens Presbyterian Church; and an individual tentatively identified as H. Ralph Jackson, of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church.

Reverend Kyles spoke before television cameramen and newsmen and addressed the audience, stating, "There is no justice for blacks at City Hall," whereupon he was loudly cheered. He was followed by Reverend James Morris Lawson, Jr., who spoke, saying, "We have to escalate our fight," and he emphasized that he would bring a wave of national civil rights leaders and other individuals from other parts of the country to Memphis to aid in the current strike struggle and also emphasized that Roy Wilkins, National Executive Secretary of the NAACP, would appear in town on March 14, 1968, and possibly Bayard Rustin of the A. Philip Randolph Institute would come to Memphis to address the strike supporters.





NAACP leader says blacks should present united front

Blacka should present a united front and practice restraint in dealing with problems, the executive director of the NAACP said Monday in Minneapo-

"There is nothing sadder than watching a black community that constitutes about I percent of the population throwing its weight around like they are the controlling community," director Roy Wilkins said at the 10th annual Opportunities Industrialization Centera (OIC) Convocation.

Wilkins urged the black community to put together a coalition to help them in their causes.

"You won't hear a politician saving he doesn't lis- A are education, employ-t ten to blacks, even if they are only 1 percent of the population," he added.

No matter how large or small a black urban community may be, he said, it must proceed along moral, legal and court persuasions to obtain its goals.

Two things have been realized by blacks in the last few years: The potency of the ballot and unity, Wilkins said.

"People are using the ballot. Even the Black Panthers have realized the po-tency of the ballot," he said.

Wilkins cited the number of black mayors in the nation. 'They were not elected just because they are black but because they were the best men for the jobs," he said.

"There is a unity that never existed before among organizations," Wilkins said. He mentioned the cooperation between OIC and the NAACP: "OIC is a apecialized continuation of the NAACP program."

"The great majority of blacks in the community want to learn a trade and have a fair chance at the jobs available. We know OIC can give them that ' chance," Wilkins said.

Gl's protest military racism

ATMICA

A group of 236 black, white, Chicano and Indian Gl's-all of them members of the 173rd Airborne Brigade that recently returned from Vietnam-have signed an open letter to Defense Secretary Melvin Laird accusing the armed forces of recial discrimination. The Gl's tried to present the letter to Laird earlier this month when the Defense Secretary visited Fort Campbell on the Tennessee-Kentucky border to welcome their brigade home from Southeast Asia. But Gen. William birdsong, the commander at Fort Campbell where the 173rd is now stationed, refused to allow the Gl's to make the presentation. The Gls' letter asserted that "throughout our time in the service we've seen minority group Gl's discriminated against. In Vietnam that's been evidenced by higher casualty rates. Other times it takes the form of slower promotions, higher penalties for rules violations and the worse job assignments. We feel that the Army fosters racism and has purposely avoided dealing with the day-to-day problems of minority groups."

In a press conference at the fort, Laird told newsmen he had not seen the petition, but acknowledged that the armed forces are beset with serious racial problems. "These are difficult problems," he said. "They are people problems." The secretary also contended, however, that progress has been made toward their solution. "We have made more progress in this area than any administration in American history," he asserted, and he said his source for that opinion is civil rights leader Rey Wilkins of the NAACP.

Another black leader who is less impressed with the administration! record, however, is Congressman Ronald V. Bellums, a Democrat from Berkeley, Calif. (See Race Relations Reporter, Vol. II, No 5). In an eight-page telegram to the protesting GI's of the 173rd, Dellums told them he supported their efforts to end racism in the armed services, to secure full constitutional rights for GI's and tybring about a complete withdrawal of U. S. forces from Vietnam. Pvt. Mike McIntire of Los Angeles read Dellums' telegram to the cheers of about 50 GI's who were demonstrating peacefully outside Fort Campbell following Laird's departure on Sept. 2. The group was predominantly white, but it also contained a healthy. sprinkling of blacks, Spanish-Americans and Indian McInti re, who is an Indian explained to RRIC that while non-white GIs may have a more that most of the problems that concern-him are common to soldiers of all races. During May, 1969, an organizational convention was held, attended by well-known black militants from the eastern part of the United States.

of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) had appeared in Suffolk, <u>Virginia</u>, on November 6, 1969, at which time he had spoken before approximately 300 people, primarily Negroes, at the Metropolitan Baptist Church in support of the efforts of Local 26 to be recognized by hospital officials. Wilkins stated that the Negroes had no quarrel with the Chief of Police or law enforcement officers, and likewise did not have any quarrel with the local Hospital Board, the Board of Supervisors of Nansemond

County or the Sheriff of that county. Wilkins stated that the complaint was with the system in which the Negro laborer has not found his place. Stated that Wilkins had flown into Tidewater, Virginia, shortly before his speech and left immediately thereafter. There were no incidents as a result of this meeting or Wilkins' speech.

stated negotiations had been conducted between union officials and hospital officials during the past ten days; however, these negotiations had not resulted in any agreement. The stated that hospital officials still are not willing to recommze the union as representing the nonprofessional workers; however, according to recent articles appearing in local newspapers, the union appears to feel that the hospital has recognized the union inasmuch as they did negotiate or confer with them. Now the union is stressing the point that the hospital should re-hire all striking nonprofessional amployees who have not returned to work at the hospital stated the hospital officials have agreed to place the names of all striking nonprofessional employees on the list of applicants at which time when positions open, consideration will be given to employing them equally with any other applicants.

stated that a small number of pickets daily have picketed the hospital and all of these pickets are former employees who are striking at the hospital. The number of these employees has not been more than 18 or 20 on any given day.



Analysis of Contents

The May, 1972 issue of the Black News consists of 32 pages of comments, illustrations, and a variety of advertisements from Black business establishments.

The Black News magazine bears no masthead but on Page 4 it is self-described as a VBlack nationalist publication", 10 Claver Place, Brooklyn, New York, telephone number 636-9400.

It is noted that telephone number 636-9400 is listed to African American Student Association, 10 Claver Place, Brooklyn, New York, whose telephone bills are paid by Youth in Action, 1180 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York, as of 1972. Youth in Action is an anti-poverty program.

Pages 1 and 2 contain an article by EUGENE A. PAIL. captioned "Young, Gifted, and Black But Their Souls' Not Not Hardly Intact". This article seems to find that generation after generation of the Black people seem to be no more prepared for the future than the generation that passed.

It states that the anti-poverty programs and extended welfare is used only to cool the revolutionary zeal among Black youths. Malcontents would get \$40.00 a week to hang around store fronts and take dope. Organized groups of youths that are threatening drug pushers with bodily harm are trying to solve the drug problem, especially among youths. They are taking the law into their own hands. The answer to where the Black youths are heading is more of a question of that are we doing now with our own stirdren. Youths

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Another article states "ROY WILKINS' (Executive Director NAACP) behavior in Africa will be dealt with. This Judas is beyond help in this world anyway. Those who is suggest he retire should give him some help".

Another article on Page Twelve states that of Colored the Triangle Shoe Store on Fulton Street in Brooklyn will soon close but two other stores are still open. The article continues we will get them soon. Triangle sent a cream puff imitation Puerto Rican with a Jewish wife, (HERMAN) BADILLO) to check out if Black News gets funds from Washington. That pig was snooping around seeing if the News is funded. (We're Not Funded You Fink). Another article on Page Twelve states "Interested in a free college scholarship call Sister JEANETTE ADAMS at NSSFNS and ask about the interviews being held on Saturday, May 6th. Not that you can learn anything but maybe you will get a chance to travel and that in itself is an education. Then, when you get on campus agitate, educate, and organize blood (us) like mad."

On Page 15 is the magazine editorial. This article states that the "African nationalist too long has remained aloof and alienated from the Black masses". The article points out that if the average Black person does not go along with a so-called Black nationalist, he is called a nigger Tom, or Whitey lover. Some Black nationalists have even called for this "niggers" death. If the Black nationalist would take time to think about it and study the Black masses, he would find great majority of the Black people are concerned with their own day to day survival.

The African nationalist who has made no inroad with the Black masses could never be elected since Blacks are faithful to politicans coming up for a re-election despite their records of doing absolutely nothing for the Black people. Therefore, a Black nationalist who is attempting to help his people cannot help them by revolutionary methods and cannot help them by attempting to be elected but first must organize an African nationalist party, that is, on the ballot as a result of legitimate petitions by the people. 

It goes on to criticize ACC WIRWINS of the HARP for statements he hade about a recent trip to Africa in which he said that Africans would be werse off in American corporations pull out of Africa.

"Triple Jeopardy" claims that the large comporations are exploiting the African workers and that once the working people overthrow the white minority rule and replace it with a government controlled by the laboring class the emploitation will end.

WILKIES is attached as a "dangerous enemy of both the African and the Afro-American", as well as an apologist for United States imperialism in South Africa.

It claims that no country in the world is safe from imperialist intrigue, pressures, and subversion as long as imperialism under any guise is left in the world.

This issue contains a poem by AITA CHRISTILLAUMINA entitled Sisters Work is Never Done.






The paper stated that some of the black leaders were charging that the Police Department used excessive force in making arrests on November 21, 1969, and that the Board of Education had agreed to three separate actions which would give Negro leaders a greater voice in the administration of Memphis Public Schools, namely, to appoint two Negro advisors to the heard; to work for legislation that would provide for Negro representation on the board and a study of the school system's administrative structure to be made with the goal of appointing a Negro Assistant Superintendent and a Negro Coordinator, and that advisors to make this study would be appointed by December 1, 1969.

The paper reported that Roy Wilkins, International Executive Secretary of NATCP, while passing through Memphis, on November 22, 1969, had "expressed confidence in the Negro leadership of the NAACP in Memphis."

The paper stated that Jesse Epps, International Representative of AFSCME denied that the ending of the school issue would hurt his campaign against St. Joseph Hospital in which he was seeking recognition of AFSCME. He said that until this time his union had put a higher priority on the educational issue than on the St. Joseph strike.

Mr. Epps accused the Memphis Police Department of excessive force in effecting November 21, 1969, arrests. The paper quoted the Memphis Police Director Frank C. Holloman as stating that the police had movies and pictures of students arming themselves with bricks, rocks and bottles during the demonstration activities, particularly on November 21, 1969, described above, and that when orders

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
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


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

WASHINGTON-Mississippi civil rights leaders Thursday launched a campaign for a massive demonstration to protest a scheduled speech by Atty. Gen. John Mitchell to the Delta Council—the epitome of the state's upper-crust white society.

Aaron E. Henry, Mississippi NAACP president said he had failed in quiet efforts to persuade Mitchell not to address the Chamber of Commerce-type organization, which Henry hranded "segregationist and racist."

A spokesman for the attorney general said Mitchell does not consider the organization to be reacially exclusive and plans to make the speech at its annual meeting on May 19 in Cleveland, Miss.

In letters mailed to other civil rights figures Thursday, Henry accused some Delta Council members of supporting private schools to thwart public school desegregation.

Among those he is inviting to Cleveland are Roy Wilkins, the Rev. Ralph David Aber-pathy Whitney Young, Bayard Austin and A.

Phillip Kandolph.

Henry wrote that he was asking national church and civil rights leaders, as well as some political leaders, to convene in Cleveland on May 18 and 19 "for a demonstration of civil disobedience against Mr. Mitchell's presence here.

For years national political figures journeyed to Cleveland to speak at the council's annual meeting. It was there on 8, 1947, for example, that thenUndersecretary of State Dean Acheson first mentioned the European recovery program that a bit later was unfolded by Secretary of State George C. Marshall and became known as the Marshall plan. In his book, 'Present at the Creation" Acheson wrote of the Deita Council meeting:

"Once a year the Delta Council meets on the tree-shaded lawn of the teachers college at Cleveland, bringing families and relatives with them to discuss their own area's interests and problems and to bear about the great world to which historically their products have gone. Those most immediately concerned listen to the speaker in the large gymnasium of the college. His words are carried to many more thousands on the surrounding lawn while they eat sandwiches, drink pop, and keep an eye on the sleeping children. The scene is an easygoing, good-natured, shirt-sleeved, thoroughly American one. .

By the 1960s, however, the heat generated by the civil rights movement persuaded national politicians that the scene might not be so easy-going and they stopped addressing the council. One of the last invited was Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman. A former council official recalled that 'Freeman was supposed to come at about the time the freedom rides started and he suddenly decided he had to inspect the cranberry crop somewhere and couldn't come."

For more than two months Henry, a longtime civil rights leader, tried to convince Mitchell that lending the prestige of the attorney general's office to the Delta Council function would buoy segregationist sen timent.

Jr. of Indianola council president, wrote him a letter saying that if the council's meeting is all-white "It will be only because no Negroes want to attend. At our annual meetings in the past Negroes have attended and at no time were they denied admittance. . . The Delta Council has never had any restriction on Negro membership.'


A spokesman for Mitchell said the attorney general, after receiving a copy of Lewis' letter, decided the council was not racially exclusive.

A former council official who has been a member for more than 20 years told the Los Angeles Times, "I've never seen a black face in the audience at one of our meetings. Negroes are not excluded by the by-laws, but they aren't included as members. It's just like Jews are not excluded by our country club's by-laws, but they're not admitted as members."

Council President Lewis, who is Jewish said in an interview that he financially supports a private school at Indianola. He said he also has supported public schools.

He said he does not know how many of the 18-county council's 4,000 members are Negroes "because our membership card don't show race, but I recognize one or two names as friends of mine who are Negroes.'

"I can say uncategorically I have seen them quite a few times at the meetings, Lewis said. "I can't recall whether I saw an the last year or the year before, but I wa told by people I know that they saw some ias year."

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

COMMUNIST PARTY, USA SUBJECT: COUNTERINTELLIGENCE PROGRAM INTERNAL SECURITY - COMMUNIST

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My memorandum October 16, 1963, recommended that information about the participation of two Wisconsin Communist Party, USA, district functionaries in a Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) picket line in Milwaukee, Visconsin, be furnished, through Crime Records Division, to Mr. James Farmer and Mr. Roy Wilkins, national functionaries of CORE and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, respectively. The purpose would be to warn those officials of the action of Communist Party members in participating in civil rights demonstrations and possibly illicit from them a public statement repudiating such Party support. This recommendation was approved by the Director.





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

Wilkins as Chief Executive Officer of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), requested a private meeting with officers of the Central Committee of the BPP and particularly with Bobby Seale as Chairman of this Committee. The same page of the BPP newspaper July 5, 1969 issue contained a reply to Wilkins from Bobby Seale, Chairman of the Central Committee, BPP. This telegram stated that the BPP would only meet with Wilkins in a public meeting in West Oakland.

The July 19, 1969 issue of "The Black Panther", Black Community News Service newspaper on page 27 lists the Central Committee of the BPP as Huey P. Newton as Minister of Defense; Bobby Seale, Chairman; Eddridge Cleaver, Minister of Information; David Hilliard, Chief of Staff; Ray "Masai" newitt, Minister of Education; Kathleen Cleaver, Communications Secretary; and Emory Douglas, Minister of Culture.

On page 27 of the same issue of the BPP newspaper, the rules of the BPP as established by the Central BPP Head-quarters and Central Committee members are printed for all .

Sources of the San Francisco Office have advised they knew of no plans on the part of the Black Panther Party (BPP) to establish a branch anywhere in Canada. Likewise they knew of no plans for reported regrouping or retraining.

The Black Panther Party (BPP) is a black extremist organization started in Oakland, California, in December, 1966. It formerly advocated the use of guns and guerrilla tactics to bring about the overthrow of the United States Government. Since early 1971, it has preached a policy of "survival pending revolution."

The "Los Angeles Times" of August 6, 1972, contained an interview of BPP leader Huey P. Newton, who claimed the BPP was very much alive with chapters "all over the country". No mention was made of any activity or interest outside the USA.

Recent issues of the Black Panther newspaper, as in the past, continued to refer to Party activities across the USA, but no mention has been made of any interest in affairs in Canada.

The chief thrust of the BPP at this period is in community political actions.

Current issues of the Party newspaper always mention that Bobby Seale, Chairman of the BPP, is running for Mayor of Oakland, California, in April, 1973, and urge its readers to register to vote. (See Black Panther issue of September 30, 1972).

Row Wilkins, head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), in the Oakland "Tribune" of October 3, 1972, claimed that the BPP was "not the bogeyman" it was often charged to be, and now had joined the NAACP in following the strategy of working within the system by exercising power at the ballot box.

The Registrar of Voters, Alameda County, California, in October, 1972, advised that the BPP had furnished 105 out of 145 Deputy Registrars to work in the voter registration just recently closed.

The United States Circuit Court of Appeals, in a decision rendered in a case involving a member of the BPP, dated June 30, 1972, called the BPP "a dissident political party".

Chairman Bobby Seale was featured in a five part statement in San Francisco radio station KCBS beginning August 7, 1972. This series featured the "evolution" of the BPP from a revolutionary organization to one working within the system, under the first two paragraphs of the Declaration of Independence.

The prime interest in "The Black Panther" issue of November 4, 1972, was a printed guide to the California residents on how to vote on the various state propositions.





"Yesterday, my wife,

at the State College at nayward, was savagely assaulted by black students, or ostensible students, in Meiklejohn Hall on the campus. She was on her way to an announced open meeting featuring ROY WILKINS of the NAACP. Unknown to her, the meeting had been taken over by members of the Black Students Union, who had thrown out white students and others. She entered, stood in the rear of the auditorium-sized classroom for a moment, letting her eyes adjust from the sunlight. A groups of six or eight young blacks, pretty obviously there as a goon squad, crossed the rear of the room and told her to get out. She said that she was there for the meeting. Thereafter, and all within a few minutes, she was seized and punched, dragged stunned to the door, and thrown out bodily, leaving a trail of blood.

"Her injuries include two black eyes, bruises and marks where she was held while being punched, four stitches to close the wound in her forehead, separation of the cartilage from the bone of her nose, small wounds where her glasses had been smashed to bits against her face, and glass particles in her right eye. She staggered to a room on the next floor, still bleeding copiously, where staff members gave her assistance and summoned the school doctor and nurse. After being worked over for fifteen or twenty mirutes, she was able to make a telephone call to me, to bet to the police station in Hayward, and thereafter to the Kaiser Hospital for further treatment.

"The college administration has directed Hayward police to stay off campus and has kept the campus security force, made up largely of untrained older men, small and under orders not to aid staff or faculty members attacked as my wife was. The campus is a no man's land, effectively beyond the control of civil authority.

"I should point out that both my wife and I are liberal Democrats, who have worked for minority rights for thirty years. The attack was unprovoked, without prelude, irrational, savage, nihilistic, and on a purely racist ground. The entire course of action was clearly a breach of her civil rights, contrary to both the Public Accommodations Act and the Civil Rights Act. I ask that you take action immediately, before the campus is overwhelmed. The time is Germany 1934.

The CSCH BSU received approval under CSCH rules to reserve a room from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. on April 22, 1969, at Alexander Meiklejohn Hall and only BSU members and their guests were permitted to attend. The purpose of this request was to permit the BSU to have a private audience with WILKINS. This audience was held as planned.

was attacked by three or four unknown Negroes. The individuals who attacked her struck her in the face, driving her eyeglasses into her forehead and the bridge of her nose, necessitating four stitches to close the tear in the skin.

As early as the fall of 1963, autonomous Negro students' organizations were properly registered and recognized as student organization on campuses in the Northern California area. The purposes of the organizations were generally given at that time as follows: "To engage in study of Negro life and history, to foster the growth and dissemination of Negro cultural contributions and to engage in projects which the membership considers to be in the interest of the Negro community."

At the outset, the organizations appeared to be purely cultural. As militant Negroes became affiliated with the organizations, the names of the organizations were changed to Black Students Union (BSU) in about 1965.



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

E. Open Letter to Stokely Carmichael and Other Comments re Subject's Resignation from BPP

"The Black Panther" newspaper, issue of August 16, 1969, Page 5, contained an "Open Letter to Stokely Carmichael" from ELDRIDGE CLEAVER, Minister of Information, Black Panther Party, July, 1969. The letter indicates it is reprinted from Ramparts Magazine, and is as follows:

"Your letter of resignation as the Prime Minister of the Black Panther Party came, I think, about one year too late. As a matter offact, since the day of your appointment to that position---February 17, 1968---events have proven that you were not cut out for the job in the first place. Even then it was clear that your position on coalition with revolutionary white organizations was in conflict with that of the Black Panther Party. But we thought that, in time, even you would be able to shake the SNCC paranoia about white control and get on with the business of building the type of revolutionary machinery that we need in the United States in order to unite all the revolutionary forces in the country to overthrow the system of Capitalism, Imperialism, and Racism.

"I know these terms are kicked around like lifeless bodies and that it is easy to allow the grisly realities behind them to become obscured by too frequent repitition. But when you see the squalor in which people live as a result of the policies of the exploiters, when you see the effects of exploitation on the emaciated bodies of little children, when you see the hunger and desperation, then these terms come alive in a new way. Since you've made this trip yourself and seen it all with your own eyes, you should know that suffering is cokr-blind, that the victims of Imperialism, Racism, Colonialism and Neo-colonialism come in all colors, and that they need a unity based on revolutionary principles rather than skin color.


"The other charges you make in your letter---about our new-found ideology, our dogmatism, our arm-twisting, etc.---seem to me to be of secondary importance, because, with the exception of the



honorable Elijah Muhammad, you are the most dogmatic cat on the scene today, and I've never known you to be opposed to twisting arms or, for that matter, necks. In many ways your letter struck me as being an echo and rehash of the charges brought against the party by the bootlickers before the McClellan Committee. And since you chose this moment to denounce the party, we--and I am sure many other people outside the party---must look upon your letter in this light. The only point in your letter that I think is really you is the one about coalition with whites, because it has been this point on which our differences have turned from the very beginning.

"You have never been able to distinguish the history of the Black Panther Party from the history of the organization of which you were once the chairman --- the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. It is understandable that you can have such fears of black organizations being controlled, or partly controlled, by whites, because most of your fears in SNCC were spent under precisely those conditions. But the Black Panther Party has never been in that situation. Because we have never had to wrest control of our organization out of the hands of the whites, we have not been shackled with the type of paranoid fear that was developed by you cats in SNCC. Therefore we are able to sit down with whites and hammer out solutions to our common problems without trembling in our boots about whether or not we might get taken over in the process. It has always seemed to me that you belittle the intelligence of your black brothers and sisters when you constantly warn them that they had better beware of white folks. After all, you are not the only black person out of Babylon who has been victimized by white racism. But you sound as though you are scared of white people, as though gou are still running away from the slave-catchers who will lay hands on your body and dump you in a bag.

"As a matter of fact, it has been precisely your nebulous enunciation of Black Power that has provided the power structure with its new weapon against our people. The Black Panther Party tried to give you a chance to rescue Black Power from the pigs who have seized upon it and turned it into the rationale for Black Capitalism. With James Farmer of the Nixon Administration to preside over the implementation of Black Capitalism under the slogan



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of Black Power, what value does that slogan now have to our people's struggle for liberation? Is denouncing the Black Panther Party the best you can do to combat this evil? I would think that your responsibility goes a little further than that. Even though you were right when you said that LBJ would never stand up and call for Black Power, Nixon has done so and he's bankrolling it with millions of dollars. So now your old Black Power buddies are cashing in on your slogan, in effect, your cry for Black Power has become the grease to ease the black bourgeoisie into the power structure.

"By giving you the position of Prime Minister of the Black Panther Party, we were trying to rescue you from the black bourgeoisie that had latched on to your coattails and was riding you like a mule. Now they have stolen your football and run away for a touchdown: six points for Richard Milhouse Nixon.

"In February, 1968, at the Free Huey Birthday Rally in Oakland, California, where you made your first public speech after returning to the United States from your triumphant tour of the revolutionary countries of the Third World, you took the occasion to denounce the coalition that the Black Panther Party had made with the white Peace and Freedom Party. What you called for instead was a Black United Front and would unite all the forces in the black community from left to right, close ranks against the whites, and all go skipping off to freedom. Within the ranks of your Black United Front you wanted to include the Cultural Nationalists, the Black Capitalists, and the Professional Uncle Toms, even though it was precisely these three groups who were working to murder your (obscene) even before it broke wind. (Remember what Ron Karenga did to your meeting in Los Angeles?)

"You had great dreams in those days, Stokely, and your visions, on the top side, were heroic. On the bottom side, when it came to the details of reality, your vision was blind. You were unable to distinguish your friends from your enemies because all you could see was the color of the cat's skin. It was this blindness that led you to the defense of Adam Clayton Powell, that Jackal from Harlem, when he came under attack by his brother jackals in Congress! And it was this blindness that

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led you to the defense of that black cop in Washington, D. C., who was being (obscene) over by the whites above him in the Police Department for whom he carried his gun as he patrolled the black community. In short, your habit of looking at the world through black-colored glasses would lead you on the domestic level, to close ranks with such enemies of black people as James Farmer, Whitney Young, Roy Wilkins and Ron Karenga; and on the international level you would end up in the same bag with Papa Doc Davalier, Joseph Mobutu, and Haile Selassie. Yes, we opposed that (obscene) then and we oppose it now even more strongly, especially since the Nixon Administration has stolen your program from you and, I think, included you out.

"And now your going to liberate Africa! Where are you going to start, Ghana? The Congo? Biafra? Angola? Mozambique? South Africa? If you are not aware of it, I think you should know that the brothers in Africa who are involved in armed struggle against the colonialists would like nothing better than for you to pick up your suitcase full of African souvenirs and split back for Babylon. They have never forgiven the fat-mouthing you did in Dar-es-Salaam when you presumed to tell them how to conduct their business. It seems to me that you are now trapped between the extremes of your own rhetoric. On the one hand, you have cut yourself off from the struggle in Babylon, and on the other hand, you are not about to become the Redeemer of Mother Africa.

"The enemies of black people have learned something from history even if you haven't, and they are discovering new ways to unite. One thing they know, and we know, that seems to escape you, is that there is not going to be any revolution or black liberation in the United States as long as revolutionary blacks, whites, and Mexicans, Puerto Ricans, Indians, Chinese, and Eskimos are unwilling to, or unable to unite into some functional machinery that can cope with the situation. Your talk and your fears about premature coalition are absurd, because no coalition against oppression by forces possessing revolutionary integrity can ever be premature. If anything, it is too late, because the forces of counterrevolution are sweeping



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the world, and this is happening precisely because in the past people have been united on a basis that perpetuates disunity among races and ignores basic revolutionary principles and analyses.

"You are peeved because the Black Panther Party informs itself with the revolutionary principles of Marxism-Leninism, but if you look around the world you will see that the only countries which have liberated themselves and managed to withstand the tide of the counterrevolution are precisely those countries that have strong Marxist-Leninist parties. All those countries that have fought for their liberation solely on the basis of nationalism have fallen victims to capitalism and neo-colonialism, and in many cases now find themselves under tyrannies equally as oppressive as the former colonial regimes.

"That you know nothing about the revolutionary process is clear; that you know even less about the United States and its people is clearer; and that you know still less about humanity than you do about the rest is even clearer. You speak about an 'undying love for black people.' An undying love for black people that denies the humanity of other people is doomed. It was an undying love of white people for each other which red them to deny the humanity of colored people and which has stripped white people of humanity itself. It would seem to me that an undying love for our people would, at the very least, lead you to a strategy that would aid our struggle for liberation instead of leading you into a coalition of purpose with the McClellan Committee in its attempt to destroy the Black Panther Party.

"Well, so long, Stokely, and take care. And beware of some white folks and of some black folks, because I assure you that some of both of them have teeth that will bite. Remember what Brother Malcolm said in his Autobiography: 'We had the best organization that the black man has ever had in the United States--and niggers ruined it!' POWER TO THE PEOPLE! ELDRIDGE CLEAVER, Minister of Information Black Panther Panty, July, 1969."

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

Over thirty black seamen faced a variety of charges resulting from clashes aboard two US Navy ships-the aircraft oarrier Kitty Hawk end the fleet oiler Maesayampa, no whites were charged in either incident.

One account in the straight presectains that the situation on the Kitty Hawk stemmed out of an argument in an enlieted men's club in Bubic Bay. On the night of October 11th supposedly there was a fight in a washroom of the club and it epread to the reet of the club involving about 25 black and white eailore, mainly from the Kitty Hawk. The fight was broken up and eeveral blacke were wrested.

Those who were arrested were sent back to the ship and the ship sailed. One of the ship's higher ranking officere called in two of the black eailore who were arrested on chore for questioning. Eleven other black orewmen went along in an expression of soldarity. The two esilors who had been the oalled in and their comrades left the interrogation session upset about being eingled out. Later the same off- word from brothere on either the icer went outside to talk to the men that Kitty Hawk or Haseayampa giving and tried to calm the men down.

The group of about a dozen then left the meee deck and went to the han-gar deck. The black earlore were just etanding around talking in groupe of threee and twoe, however, the Marinee guarding the planee on the hangar deck became uptight. The Marines tried to break up the group, which waen't doing anything, with their guns.

That eame night (Oot. 12) through a the early morning hours the next day, fighte broke out between a little over 100 black and white eailors, among the 4,935 man crew. The brass claimed that the fighte which epread to various parts of the ship grew out of an initial fight in a dining ball. The flight left 46 orewmen injured - 40 whitee and six blacks. cke. Only 5 men were seriously injured. A large group of both bleck and white sailors were credited with breaking up the fights.

At least 25 black sailors have al- 1 3734 ready been charged and two more might be-Twenty-one of the men were charged with both ricking and assault, and four were charged with just one of the two counts.

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The "Stanford Daily", a daily newspaper published by the Associated Students of Stanford University on November 14, 1972, page 3, carried a atory entitled, "Black Activiat to Speak at Roble Lounge Tonight". The article reported that MUHAMMED AHMED, Chairman of the African Peoplea Party, would apeak on November 14, 1972, at Roble Hall on the Stanford University campus under the sponsorship of the Black Studenta Union (BSU).

The article noted that AHMED, 31, studied at Central State University in Ohio, where he formed the Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM), that he thereafter joined the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), and subaequently worked with STOKELEY CARMICHAEL in forming the New York Black Panther Party (BPP). AHMED reportedly was arrested and jailed on chargea of advocating criminal anarchy in 1967 in the State of New York, at which time the authorities also brought charges against members of RAM for master-minding a plot to blow up the Statue of Liberty and to assassinate civil rights leaders ROY/WILKINS and WHITNEY/YOUNG. AHMED reportedly forfeited bail following his arrest and went underground, during which time he continued to write for "Black Scholar", "Vibration" and "Contraat" Magazines. On September 1, 1972, AHMED reportedly waa arrested in San Diego during the Congresa of African People's (CAP) Conference and he currently facea extradition to New York.

The African Peoples Party (APP) officially announced its exiatence in July 1971. The APP's 10-point program seeka independence, aelf-determination, black state power and independent nationhood for "African captives in America." It demands the States of Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama and Louisiana "as partial re-payment for injustices done to us for over 400 years."

BLACK PANTHER PARTY (BPP) RACIAL MATTERS

Relations, Boston College, Newton, Massachusetts, advised that the Cultural Committee of the Boston College Student Council would present a program at Roberts Center, Boston College Campus at 7:30 p.m. on December 8, 1969 on the subject "Who Speaks for the Black Community". A panel of four speakers have been engaged consisting of Ralph Abernathy of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCIC), Roy Innis of Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), Roy Wilkins of the National Association for Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and David Hilliard of the Black Panther Party (BPP). Mr. Lamer stated this program is one of a series arranged by the Cultural Committee with the approval of the Boston College administration.

The Boston Herald Traveler, a daily newspaper published in Boston, Massachusetts in its edition of December 9, 1969, carried an article concerning the panel discussion captioned "Black Leaders See New Racial Strife".

The article points out that for the first time the leaders of four nationally prominent black organizations spoke from the same platform before an audience of 2,500 and predicted the intensification of America's racial struggle.

Dr. Abernathy, the first speaker, attacked the war in "government for carrying on a "senseless" war in Vietnam, for ignoring the nation's poor and hungry, and for leading a "campaign of supression" against the BPP.

Dr. Abernathy stated SCLC is now organizing a counseling service for boys drafted into the Armed Forces saying "it will be a department of peace, to counsel them to say no when they are asked to go-10,000 miles away to fight in that senseless, godless war".

He said the SCLC is still committed to the philosophy of non-violence on which it was based thirteen years ago. It will work with other black organizations toward their common goal—a better life for all black citizens. He pledged his support to the BPP and plans to fly to Chicago this week to "say in person that the United States is seeking to suppress the Panthers and we don't like it. If the nation can get by with suppressing one group, it won't be long before they suppress a other".

Roy Innis of CORE charged that there is a national conspiracy against the Panthers and stated this is "the first phase of what might become a genocidal campaign against blacks".

Raymond "Masai" Hewitt, who represented the BPP in place of David Hilliard, equated the black problem in America with genocide. He claimed that black people understand what's happening to them. He claimed that rioting in Los Angeles, Detroit, and other cities was "the most eloquent statement" of the black position.


When the audience applauded Hewitt he said "Don't clap for me unless you'd clap for Husy Newton and Bobby Seale."

"I clap for Weathermen because the Weathermen shot pigs and pigs shoot niggers".

Roy Wilkins of NAACP said that two speakers referred to the United States as "your country", but "I consider it my country and I'm not giving up on it". He feels blacks have struggled too many years for racial equality to turn their backs now or go the way of violence or separatism.





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
