Facts of complaint

[redacted] advised his station received an envelope approx. 6" x 3" addressed to "Elizabeth Taylor, MGM Studios, Studio City, Ca." with a return address of [redacted]. [redacted] said beneath the return address (back of envelope) is written, "I'd like to kill Shirley Black." [redacted] further stated there may be some kind of explosive device in envelope. [redacted] said he informed the Postal Inspectors regarding this matter and was advised that threatening notes are investigated by FBI. [redacted] said the letter will be maintained in the [redacted] office at his station. It is presumed Shirley Black is also known as Shirley Temple.

POSTAL INSPECTORS ADVISED XXXXX 8/17/87 to inspect package & deliver if no bomb & advise [redacted] to contact FBI if contains a threat.

On Saturday, 8/15/87, [redacted]

[redacted] advised that an envelope addressed to ELIZABETH TAYLOR at METRO GOLDWYN MAYER (MGM) STUDIOS with a return address of [redacted] was observed to have written on the outside, "I'd like to kill SHIRLEY BLACK." [redacted] advised that they suspected that the letter was a letter bomb. They contacted the postal inspector's office who advised them to contact the FBI. They put the letter in a desk drawer and were holding it for the FBI. On 8/17/87, writer telephonically advised [redacted] at the station that there was no extortion violation based on the statement outside the envelope. He was also advised that if they suspected that the envelope contained a letter bomb that the FBI was not going to come out and pick it up. It was recommended that they re-contact the postal inspector's office and also the LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT Bomb Squad. Writer further advised that the letter should be, if cleared, delivered to the addressee with instructions that if the letter contains threats against any person that the FBI should be contacted.

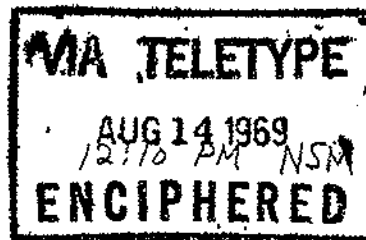
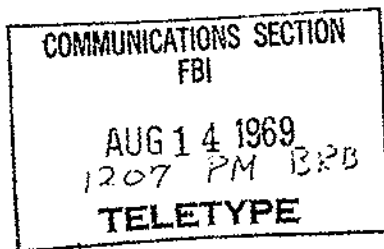

This file indicated that on February 8, 1955 they resided at 60 Clay Drive, Atherton, California, and as of November 1962 their address was 115 Lakeview, Woodside, California.

The credit file contains a newspaper clipping dated October 20, 1954 reporting that Mrs. CHARLES ALDEN BLACK had established a business address at the Franciscan Forge for a part time decorators business. The file further indicates that CHARLES A. BLACK was previously employed as the Assistant to the President of Ampex Corporation, and his most recent employment was noted as business executive, Pacific Mericulture, Pescadero, California. An item of record dated February 21, 1964 reveals that a mechanics lien in the amount of \$366 had been filed against CHARLES A. and SHIRLEY T. BLACK and Roth Construction Company. No additional pertinent information is contained in this record.

The records of the Redwood City Police Department reviewed August 14, 1969 contained no information identifiable regarding CHARLES ALDEN BLACK, his wife SHIRLEY TEMPLE BLACK or their children.

AT REDWOOD CITY, CALIFORNIA

Sheriff EARL B. WHITMORE, (NA), San Mateo County Sheriff's Office, Hall of Justice, advised on August 13, 1969 that he had known Mrs. CHARLES A. BLACK and her husband to some degree during the entire time they have lived in San Mateo County, approximately 15 years. WHITMORE also noted that he had been a candidate for the Republican nomination to the United States Congress in opposition to Mrs. BLACK.

Sheriff WHITMORE stated that he considers Mrs. BLACK to be a very forthright citizen whose loyalty to this country is completely unquestioned. He advised that he has had considerable association with Mr. BLACK through the Sequoia Club, a Redwood City businessmen's lunch club and considers him to be a person of good character and reputation. Sheriff WHITMORE stated that he knows of nothing which would be adverse concerning the character, loyalty or reputation regarding Mrs. BLACK or her husband. Sheriff WHITMORE stated that he has little information about the qualifications of Mrs. BLACK for a government position and did not feel that he could comment regarding her qualifications.

AT SAN CARLOS, CALIFORNIA

Mrs. LUCILLE HOSMER, 520 Elm Avenue, was contacted in regard to Mrs. CHARLES BLACK on August 13, 1969. Mrs. HOSMER stated that she is currently a member of the California Women's Board of Terms and Parole, an appointment by Governor REAGAN, is the First Vice Chairman of the San Mateo County Republican Central Committee and the Third National Vice President of Pro-America. In addition, she has served as the past State President of the California Federation of Republican Women.

Mrs. HOSMER stated that her contact with Mrs. CHARLES BLACK came principally at the time Mrs. BLACK was running for Congress. She stated that her association was most pleasant

and she has found Mrs. BLACK to be a charming, warm and friendly person. She advised that she has no doubt in regard to her honesty, integrity or her loyalty.

Mrs. HOSMER stated that she feels that Mrs. BLACK is a person of conviction and basically a person of good common sense. She stated, however, that she believes Mrs. BLACK is somewhat naive in her acceptance of people and organizations and does not fully realize either the background or implications of some of the people with whom she becomes involved. She stated that she feels if she sees an issue clearly she will take a definite stand and cited Mrs. BLACK's action at the San Francisco Film Festival as an example. Mrs. HOSMER stated that Mrs. BLACK is an extremely sympathetic and understanding person particularly in regard to handicapped individuals and has worked very hard in these fields, citing particularly the Muscular Dystrophy Association and the California Hospital Advisory Council.

Mrs. HOSMER stated Mrs. BLACK does not appear to have a good memory for names and faces and because of this has sometimes been accused of snobbery. She stated that she does not feel that this is the case, that she is not a snobbish person, however, because of her public acclaim and exposure it has been necessary for her to on occasion remain somewhat aloof to protect her home and maintain a normal family relationship.

Mrs. HOSMER stated that she feels most of the positions held by Mrs. BLACK have been honorary positions and she does not personally consider her to be a deep thinker. She stated that she is somewhat uncertain as to Mrs. BLACK's capability in a serious administrative job, however, believes she would be very capable in a public relations type position and that she would recommend her for a position with the Federal government.

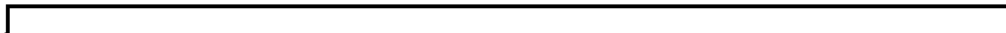

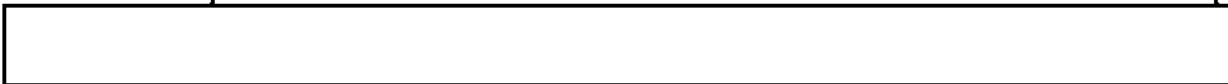

# Nixon Returning to East—and the Files

Barry Goldwater, in his halcyon days, used to suggest that "the Eastern Seaboard be sawed off and floated out to sea."

Nobody thought it was a practical idea until Richard Nixon came along and did it.

Early in August, he dug up his administration by the roots and transplanted it to San Clemente. The distance from the Potomac did wonders. The hungry didn't seem so hungry or the poor so poor or the ending of the war so urgent.

Everybody who was anybody went with him and discovered that government in the sun can be fun—especially if you leave the files at home.

The "Forward Together" group has always had trouble with its appointments, beginning with Willie Mae Rogers as consumer affairs adviser and peaking, until recently, with John Knowles, the Boston doctor the American Medical Association decided was bad medicine.

Having blundered using the conventional methods, the administration in San Clemente apparently decided it would do as well if they put the names of deserving Republicans in a hat, matched whatever name they drew on their way to the beach to the vacancies, and said "let's check later."

How else did it happen that Shirley Temple Black, the former child star, was named to a post on the U.S. delegation to the United Nations?

Nobody had noticed that the former Little Miss Marker, who lost her campaign for Congress last year, had once designated the forum of nations as "a funnel for Communist propaganda."

Mrs. Black's views on the Vietnam war also would tend to make her peace-minded colleagues a little nervous. She said she thought the President should pay more heed to the Joint Chiefs of Staff than the civilian secretary of defense.

Fox for Coop

The battered United Nations has always had trouble fending off critics from the outside. Now it will be put on its mettle by a member, and not a challenger, respect.

Dean Burch, Barry Goldwater's former campaign manager

and Republican National Committee chairman, had his name drawn one sunny afternoon among the oleanders.

Just what the President owed him is not clear, but, proceeding on the notion that a fox in a chicken coop keeps the chickens on their toes, they seem to have chosen him as chairman of the Federal Communications Commission.

Had the files been handy, the problem-solvers in the San Clemente White House would have seen that Burch once sued the FCC. It was in 1964, when he demanded equal time for his candidate after a Johnson "non-political" broadcast. He went all the way to the Supreme Court with his suit and lost.

He also shares his former candidate's views about the "Eastern liberal Establishment press," with whom he will be dealing intimately as the television networks come before him.

Three for Two

Then there was the choice and the swearing in of Mrs. Peter Cameron as a \$19,000-a-year "special projects officer" for the State Department. She was quickly put in a "suspended" status when it was discovered, belatedly, that she picketed on behalf of George C. Wallace at a 1964 rally.

The most interesting seaside

lapse was the appointment of three men to two vacancies on the Draft Appeals Board. Henry Shavitz, who ended up as odd man out, took the news like a man. Mrs. Shavitz, however, did not.

She said it was her impression that Washington was the capital, and she thought there should be just the one. She doesn't know which White House told her husband he was in and which that he was out.

But she knows that between them they have undermined her confidence in the master of both. She feels that a President who would goof on such a minor matter might get muddled on the greater ones.

The President will be reunited with his problems and his staff with its files sometime to lay. The vacation is over. The Eastern Seaboard, he will find, is very much as he left it, full of critics and pickets and bewilderment over the choices that were made by the Pacific and which gave some of his fellow citizens the impression that the administration was all at sea for a month.

## Shirley Gets Post in U.N. Delegation

"I had been called by the White House and asked if I approved of the appointment of my most prominent constituent to this important post.

"I replied that, of course, I had no objections.

### IRONIC

Shirley Temple Black, the former child movie star who once attacked the U.N. as communicating "mostly Communist propaganda," yesterday was named by President Nixon as a member of the United States delegation to the United Nations.

Her appointment was predicted in the Thursday editions of The Chronicle.

Mrs. Black, 41, a Peninsula matron, has been an active fund-raiser for the Republican party and was an unsuccessful candidate for Congress from San Mateo county's 11th District in 1967.

Mrs. Black, in Hawaii to attend a dinner for U.S. Senator Hiram Fong, was contacted by ship-to-shore radio on a fishing boat off Honolulu.

"I haven't heard the report," she said, "but I'll take your word for it. It's the thrill of my life. Thank you."

In contrast to her earlier statements, Mrs. Black yesterday described the U.N. as "a great hope for peace in our world."

"I'm very much in favor of the work the U.N. is doing and has done," she said.

She will attend the next session of the U.N., which opens in New York on September 16.

Congressman Paul N. McCloskey Jr., the San Mateo Republican who defeated Mrs. Black in a special election in October 1967, said yesterday:

"But it seemed to me somewhat ironic that Mrs. Black should be appointed to this particular post in view of the statements she made condemning the United Nations during the (1967) campaign.

"It is my hope and firm desire that, on seeing first-hand how the United Nations works, Shirley will have the opportunity to rethink her position, and come to believe that the United States should stay in the U.N."

During the 1967 campaign, Mrs. Black was quoted as saying that while the U.N. serves "as a means of communication," it communicates "mostly Communist propaganda."

### CONFIDENCE

At the Western White House in San Clemente, press secretary Ronald Zeigler told The Chronicle he was "not aware" that Mrs. Black had made such statements, but nonetheless the White House has confidence in her.

"We're sure she'll do a good job," Zeigler said. "That's why she was appointed."

Named with Mrs. Black as principal representatives for the next U.N. session were Charles W. Yost, permanent U.S. representative to the U.N.; William B. Buffum, deputy permanent representative. Congressmen Dante B. Fascell (Dem-Fla.) and J. Irvin Whalley (Rep-Pa.).

*P* My previous memorandum, 8/12/69, advised that the State Department had requested an investigation of Mrs. Black who is being considered for a Presidential appointment in the State Department. She is the former Shirley Temple, the child movie star, now married to Charles Black and residing in Woodside, California. The press has speculated that she is going to be appointed Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Educational and Cultural Affairs.

Investigation of Mrs. Black now complete except for Central Intelligence Agency check. Investigation was generally favorable concerning her, but some people felt she was politically naive and could be easily led. She ran for Congress in California in 1967 and was defeated by Representative Paul N. McCloskey, Jr. Some people felt her defeat was due to public reaction against the election of movie stars to political office, mentioning Senator George Murphy and Governor Ronald Reagan, both of whom were interviewed and highly recommended Mrs. Black.

Investigation also indicated that [redacted] who graduated from Woodside High School, Woodside, California, this past June and will attend college this fall [redacted]

[redacted] In spite of this, persons interviewed advised that Mrs. Black is a good mother and has reared her children in a commendable fashion.

**ACTION:** Enclosed are letters to the Secretary of State and to Mr. Ehrlichman at the White House transmitting the results of our investigation, which should be delivered by liaison.

John George Agar, Studio City, California, advised he was married to Mrs. Black from 1945 to 1950. Mr. Agar stated he has had no close contact with Mrs. Black for the past 20 years. He further stated during his marriage to Mrs. Black, her mother interfered with their affairs, which caused part of their marital problems. He advised he would hesitate to recommend Mrs. Black for a position of trust and confidence in the Federal Government as, during their marriage, he considered her emotionally unstable in that she had a tendency to "overreact" if she did not get her way. Mr. Agar said, however, Mrs. Black was very young when they were married and she may have matured considerably since that time. He advised there is no question concerning her character, reputation, loyalty, or associates, and he considers her an intelligent and capable person.

The records of the California Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation, Sacramento, California, indicate Mr. Agar was arrested for drunken driving on eight occasions between February 12, 1950, and December 18, 1951, in Los Angeles, California, and Santa Monica, California. The dispositions of these arrests ranged from "released on bail" to 180 days in jail, which was suspended, and he was given three years' probation and fined \$150.

C., that he has known Mrs. Black as a personal friend as well as professionally and politically for the past 30 years. Senator Murphy stated he has the highest regard for her and would heartily recommend her for a position of trust and responsibility.

Governor Reagan stated he has the utmost trust and confidence in Mrs. Black's ability and considers her loyalty, morals, character, reputation, and associates to be above reproach. He stated he has never heard anything of a derogatory nature concerning Mrs. Black and he highly recommended her for a position of trust and responsibility with the United States Government.

He stated she is one of the finest persons he has ever known and he considers her a dedicated and loyal American citizen whose morals, character, and reputation are above reproach. He stated her associates are people of the highest type and he highly recommended her for a position of trust and responsibility.

Edward Small, President, Edward Small Productions, Los Angeles, California, advised he has been acquainted with Mrs. Black for many years and, in 1942, produced the motion picture, "Miss Annie Rooney," in which Mrs. Black was the star. He advised she is a fine young lady who is intelligent, conscientious, and hardworking. He stated she has an excellent relationship with other employees and her character, reputation, loyalty, and associates are above question. He highly recommended her for a position with the United States Government.

William Asher, Producer-Director, Screen Gems Productions, Hollywood, California, advised he was the Producer-Director of Mrs. Black's television series, "The Shirley Temple Storybook," and has been acquainted with her both socially and professionally since the late 1950's. He stated he considers Mrs. Black to be the "epitome of propriety." He said Mrs. Black is an extremely "proper" person and "leans to the right" politically. As a result of these two traits, he said, she is sometimes ridiculed by professional comedians. Mr. Asher said Mrs. Black is a loyal American whose character, reputation, and associates are above question, but stated he would hesitate to recommend her for a high Government appointment unless he knew specifically the position for which she was being considered.

Dean F. Johnson, partner, law firm of O'Melveny and Myers, Los Angeles, California, advised he has known Mrs. Black for approximately 12 years as he has been her legal representative for that period. He stated he has become well acquainted with both Mrs. Black and her husband and has the highest regard for them. He stated Mrs. Black is intelligent and capable and all members of her family are highly reputable persons. He said

Mrs. Black has been active in the affairs of the Republican Party and is conservative in her views. Mr. Johnson stated he considers Mrs. Black a remarkable person who is outstanding in every respect and whose character, loyalty, reputation, and associates are above reproach. He highly recommended her for a position of trust with the Federal Government.

Loyd Wright, senior partner, law firm of Wright, Rodi, Wright, Tolton, and Vanzyl, Los Angeles, California, advised he represented Mrs. Black when she was a child actress and has known her and the other members of her family for many years. He said Mrs. Black was a very bright child and her parents and the other members of her family are very reputable persons. He stated he has not seen Mrs. Black for several years and is not acquainted with her husband, but he is aware Mr. Black enjoys an excellent reputation in California. Mr. Wright said he has never heard anything of an unfavorable nature concerning Mrs. Black or any member of her family and he recommended her for a position of trust and responsibility.

[redacted] advised she has been active in the affairs of the Republican Party in California for several years and was in contact with Mrs. Black when Mrs. Black was running for Congress in 1967. She stated her association was most pleasant and she has found Mrs. Black to be a charming, warm, and friendly person. She advised she has no doubts in regard to Mrs. Black's honesty, integrity, or loyalty. She also said she feels Mrs. Black is a person of conviction and basically possesses good common sense. She stated, however, she believes Mrs. Black is somewhat naive, but if she sees an issue clearly, she will take a definite stand. She advised she does not personally consider Mrs. Black to be a "deep thinker" and is somewhat uncertain as to Mrs. Black's capability in an important administrative job. She said, however, she believes Mrs. Black would be very capable in a public relations position and she would recommend her for such a position with the Federal Government.

William Boyd, San Francisco, California, advised he has known Mrs. Black and the other members of her family for the past ten years and considers them all close friends. Mr. Boyd said in 1965 he was selected by the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce to head the International Film Festival,

which was to be held in San Francisco. He said he asked Mrs. Black to be Chairman of the Program Division, which position she accepted. He stated her duties were selecting films to be shown and persons to be invited from various countries throughout the world. Mr. Boyd stated he personally selected a film entitled "Night Games" produced by the Swedish film industry to be shown at the Festival and Mrs. Black took exception to having the film shown, taking an adamant stand that it was not to be shown as she considered it pornographic. She appealed to the executive committee of the Festival, taking the stand that the committee was to choose between the film and her. When the committee voted eight to one in favor of the film, she burst into tears and resigned her position. Her action in this regard caused a minor furor in the foreign press and it eventually resulted in a Swedish Government official's coming to the United States to defend the film.

Mr. Boyd advised Mrs. Black is a talented, hardworking, and single-minded person whose character, morals, reputation, and associates are above question. He stated she is a loyal American and he would recommend her for any position having to do with domestic matters. He stated, however, he would hesitate to recommend her for a position wherein she would come in contact with officials of foreign countries. He said she has a fine family and her three children are well mannered and have been reared in a commendable fashion.

[redacted] attorney, San Mateo, California, advised he was one of the persons who urged Mrs. Black to run for Congress in 1967. He said he had met her previously on social occasions but began his close association with her at that time. He stated she is intelligent and capable and works very hard when she undertakes a task. He stated she has the self-discipline to force herself to do a good job. [redacted] advised he feels Mrs. Black's defeat was largely a public reaction against the election of movie stars to public office, noting there was considerable comment in that regard at the time. He advised she is a person of strong character whose loyalty, reputation, and associates are above reproach. He said he is also acquainted with Mr. Black and considers him a "solid" citizen. He advised he has no hesitancy in recommending Mrs. Black for a position of trust and responsibility.

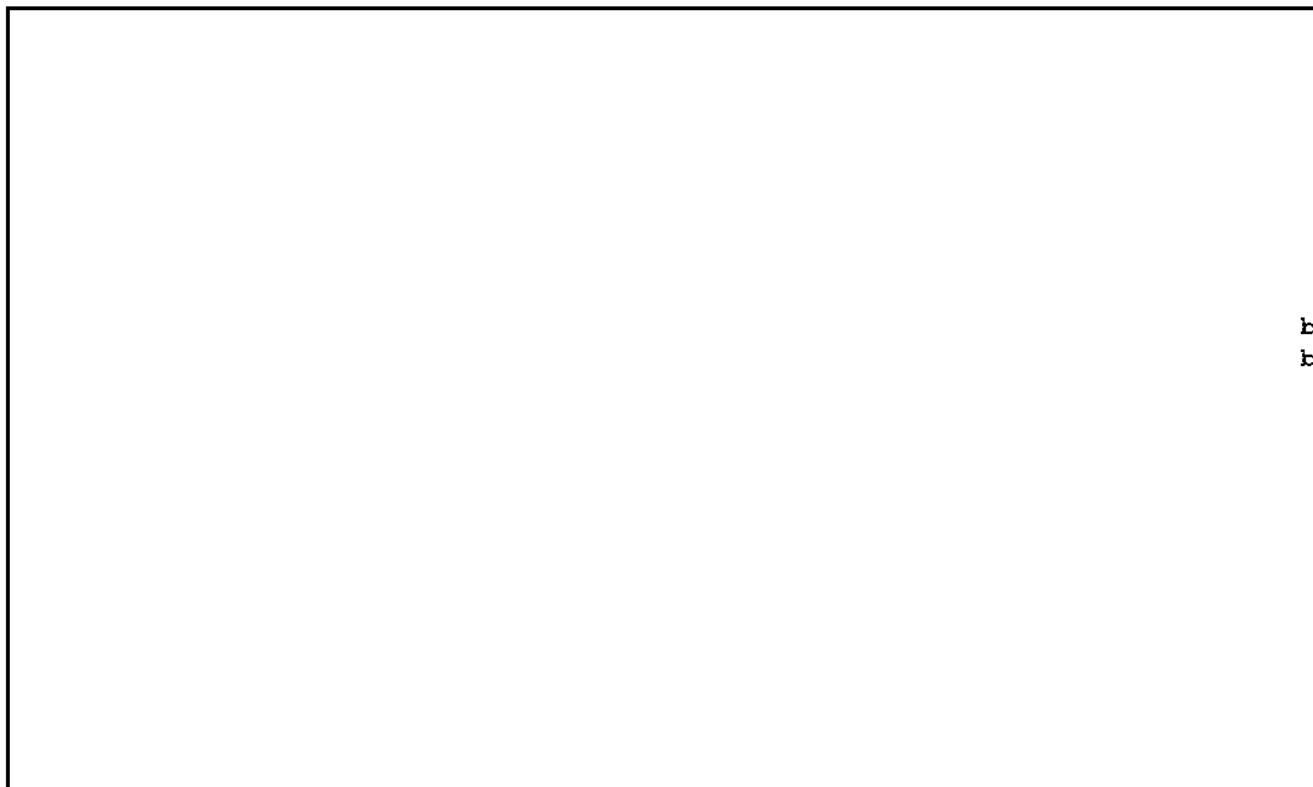

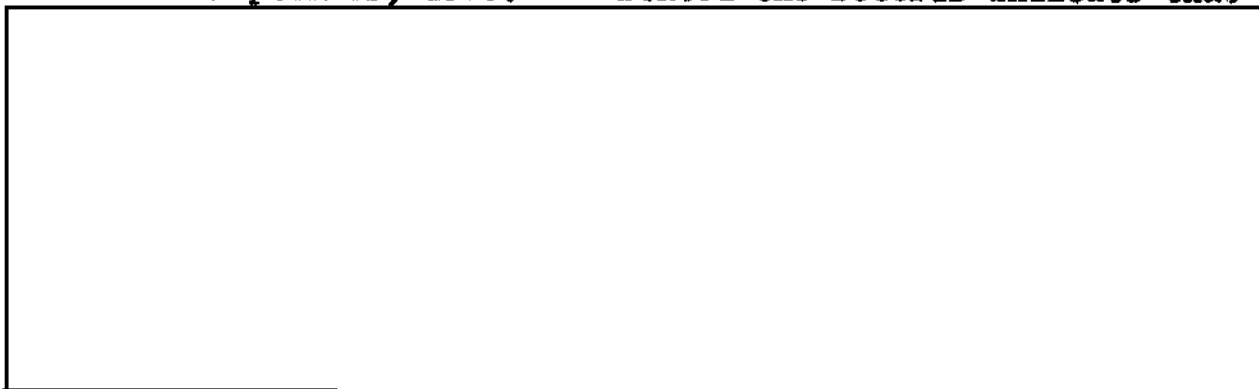

# Shirley Is Candidate, Says Country 'In Great Trouble' Tells Huge Meet, 'It's Uphill Fight'

By LIN DAY

Shirley Temple Black today announced she will run for Congress "because I believe our country is in great trouble."

She told a jam-packed San Mateo news conference that included 16 television cameras and 22 microphones

that the late Congressman J. Arthur Younger, at an Easter Sunday breakfast, had asked her to run for the office.

"This is a step I did not take lightly," she told an assemblage of more than 100 newspapermen, and as many more onlookers who crowded into the Winchester room at Villa Chartier.

"It will be an uphill effort. I'm getting a late start. There are ten men already in the race and they have their campaigns well under way."

#### Will "Work Hard"

Shirley said that she will "work hard" for the support of the county's electorate.

"I will need the hands and the hearts of thousands of you who live in this county if I am to be successful," she said.

One of Hollywood's top all-time favorite stars, as Shirley Temple, she began her movie career at the age of three. A fact sheet distributed at the press conference noted that she had held AFL-CIO affiliations during her precocious career with Screen Actors Guild, and later with the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists.

#### "Not Shirley Temple"

But she noted that "Shirley Temple is not running."

"I have lived here for 13 years," she said, "and the people of this district know me as I am today."

She said she hoped to get 50 per cent of the votes cast in the special election so that a runoff election in December would not be necessary.

Coupling her announcement with a slashing drive at Democratic administration policies, Shirley said that she will not campaign against the several Democrats in the race, and refused to name any one of them as "formidable." She will campaign, she made it clear, against the national administration policies.

She said her campaign slogan will be "All the way with LBJ has gotten us into the shape we are in today."

In words that brought ringing applause from the assemblage—so much so that a

San Francisco political reporter three times asked for quiet so he could hear the answers to the questions, Shirley named the policies she is opposing.

They included being bogged down in the Vietnam war, the failure to solve the riots in the cities, allowing pornography to become big business, never balancing the budget, and being so uninspiring in leadership that young people turn to drugs and become "hippies."

Mrs. Black pointed out that as the mother of three teen-aged children, "I can tell you that I am vitally concerned."

"And," she added, "I believe all the mothers and fathers in this district are equally concerned. Because I am a woman and a mother, I think I can effectively represent the interests of those families in Congress."

She pointed out that California has 38 congressmen but not one congresswoman.

#### Charges Politics

"I will speak out on the issues, honestly as I see them," she declared. "I want us to get back on the road of progress."

"I won't pretend to have all the answers to all the problems; but L.B.J. doesn't seem to have any."

She charged the President with playing politics with war and playing politics with the riots.

"I think it is time we sent more people to Washington who will not play politics," she said.

As to political labels, Mrs. Black said that she welcomes the support of Democrats, Republicans and independents who agree with her stand. If anyone insists on a label, she suggested, let it read, "Shirley Black, Republican Independent."

She revealed that in announc-

ing, she had sent a letter to State Chairman James Halley of San Mateo, in which she promises to abide by the "Eleventh Commandment" in the Republican code of conduct promulgated in 1966 — "Thou shalt not speak ill of any Republican."

Asked about her stand on Civil Rights, Shirley said I think we have to stop thinking of each other in regard to color — we are all Americans."

Asked her viewpoint on the recent rat control legislation, she answered that "I think anything that would make life better for Americans deserves consideration, but I have been told that that rat control bill was not well written, and that only one dollar in four would have gone toward the control of rats."

Of the people affected in general, she said "I feel that they have been let down. They have been made tremendous promises by the present administration, and these promises have not been kept."

#### Leave to Soldiers

Asked about her views on Vietnam, she said it is a small country but that we have "an awful lot of men over there."

She said she believed that the war should be left to the decisions of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and that she believed that if it were so left, "it could be ended quickly."

She said that, if necessary, she would be willing to go to Vietnam "if it would serve any worthwhile purpose."

Asked whether she believed her lack of experience would be against her in Congress, she answered she felt no Congressman is "experienced" until he has served, and said "I hope that the voters will find me an honest woman with no axe to grind, and will vote for me."

#### That Song

One of the reporters quoted a Democratic candidate as saying he was campaigning against the "Good Ship Lollipop" and asked her opinion.

"Is he still singing that song?" she smiled.

Mrs. Black was joined by her husband, Charles A. Black, electronics executive now a member of a business men's task force appointed by Governor Reagan to streamline and economize in state government, and by her two daughters and son: Linda Susan, 19; Lori Alden, 13; and Charles Adlen, 15.

Black said that a campaign chairman "will be named within a day or so."

As Shirley Temple, Mrs. Black was listed among the motion picture industry's top money-making stars for six consecutive years — 1934 through 1939. In 1938, she starred in "Little Miss Marker" with George Murphy, present U.S. Senator from California; in 1947, in "That Hagen Girl," a fellow actor was now Gov. Ronald Reagan.

Shirley said she had not discussed her candidacy with Governor Reagan and Senator George Murphy.

She said either Reagan or Murphy would have been leaders no matter what work they took up.

"Not all actors should be in politics, but then, not all haberdashers should be President," smiled Shirley, in an obvious reference to former President Harry Truman.

The special primary election will be held November 14. If no candidate wins a majority, the top Republican and top Democrat will meet in a runoff December 12. A runoff is expected because of the large number of candidates, although filing is not until October.

Among those in the field are former New York Congressman Robert Barry, San Mateo County Sheriff Earl Whitmore; and San Mateo Mayor Roy Archibald.

# Shirley in N. County; Says She's Now an Owl

By FRANK LAPIERRE

Shirley Temple Black denied reports she is a "hawk" on the Vietnam War as reported in worldwide news media.

"Truth of the matter is, I'm neither a hawk nor a dove — I'm an owl," the former Hollywood starlet confessed during lunch last week.

The pert brunette, a candidate in the upcoming 11th Congressional race here, said an owl "is a wise bird who listens a lot and thinks about things" before making a move.

Still bubbling over with energy after walking the Daly City precincts for hours Saturday morning in an effort to "get out the vote," Mrs. Black admitted she didn't know "all there is to know about the Vietnam War."

I'm not a military expert — I'm a mother of three children who feels we are relying too much on (Defense Secretary) McNamara and not enough on our Joint Chiefs of Staff in the present (Vietnam) crisis.

"I feel we must support our men who are in Vietnam now and honor those who died in the cause of keeping Communism from taking over all of Asia," she explained.

Mrs. Black, the only woman candidate in a field of 13 candidates running for the seat vacated by the death of J. Arthur Younger, had some strong opinions on the present system of federal government spending and taxes.

"We should establish priority

projects and, in some cases, cutback spending ... for example in federal aid to education. If State and local governments can't take care of the matter, then the federal government should offer aid, with complete autonomy," she said.

Rattling off statistics to support her claims of misspending in higher government, Mrs. Black said the tax burden was becoming "increasingly harder on the taxpayer."

"Money isn't the answer, it's the way it's spent," she explained. "Look at Detroit where the federal government poured millions of dollars. It didn't work."

"We can't have all these glorious projects that aren't working. The money should be appropriated for projects at the (grass roots) level of government — the state, county and city," she said.

"These tax boosts are really caused by administrative deficits on the local scene. If the federal government would appropriate necessary funds for various programs — with no strings attached — instead of the present procedure, we wouldn't have this problem," Mrs. Black said.

In another blast at what she called "financial blundering," Mrs. Black said "President Johnson is offering us a guns and butter deal, but it looks like we'll have to satisfy ourselves with margarine instead."

Although flattered by international press coverage of her campaign (which is scheduled

to officially get underway this week) she hoped that coverage would not hurt her on the local scene.

"After all, I'm interested primarily in San Mateo County voters — not Sweden, Italy, France and other countries that have contacted me," Mrs. Black said.

Asked if statements made by fellow Republican candidate Bob Barry, regarding equal time on television if any of Mrs. Black's old movies are shown were acceptable to her, the former child star replied:

"Certainly, if he has any old movies to show on television."

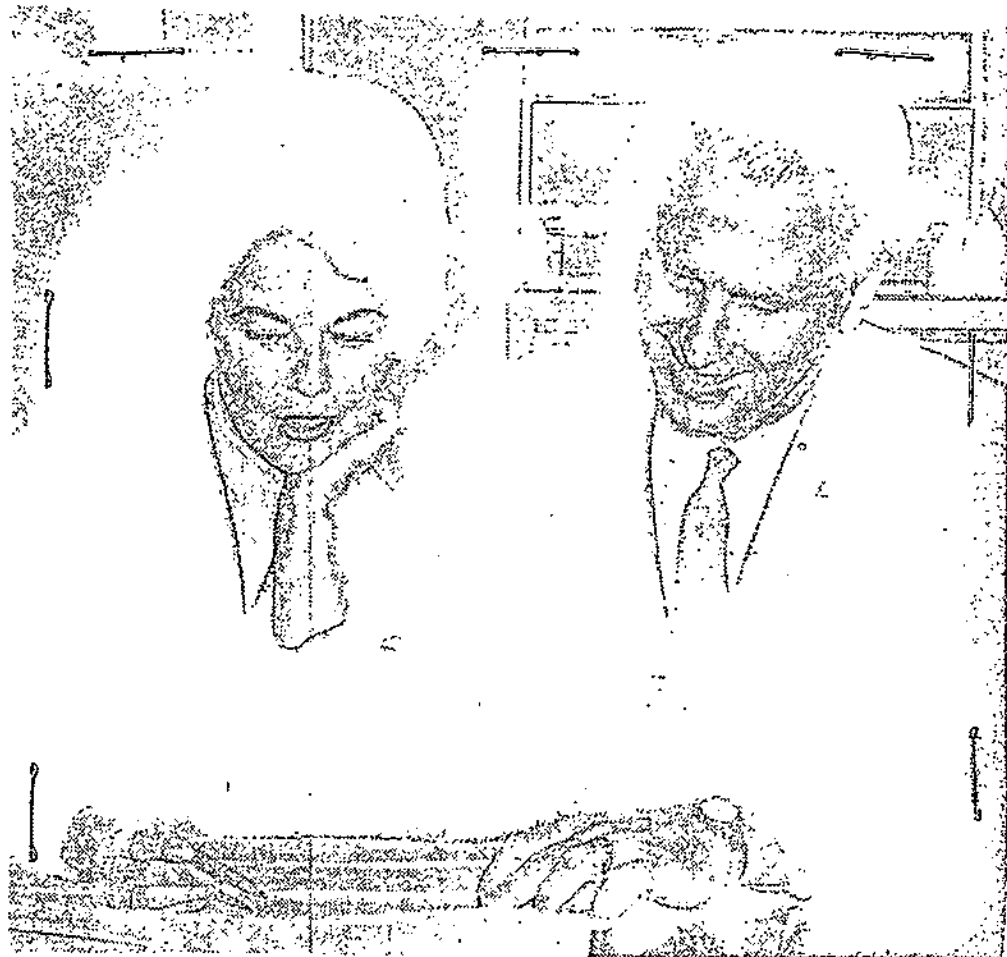
Mrs. Black said she is a Republican-Independent.

"That is to say, I am a Republican, but I am completely independent and owe nothing to anyone."

She said, "The only money I have spent so far out of my own pocket is for gasoline."

Was she just a "concerned housewife" entering this congressional race?

# McGucken Won't Sign Loyalty Oath, Eliminated From Congressional Race

The first elimination of a candidate in the Eleventh District Congressional race took place Tuesday; Patrick McGucken's application to file was rejected when he refused to sign the loyalty oath.

McGucken said he believed the loyalty oath is illegal.

County Clerk John Bruning said he received a letter from McGucken stating that he refused to sign the oath.

Bruning reported that he got quite a different opinion from Secretary of State Frank Jordan, as to the legality of the loyalty oath.

McGucken, still a Maryland resident, had written saying that he wished to enter the race to defend President Johnson's policy in Vietnam.

Despite McGucken's elimination, there still was no lack of competition in the race for the seat held by the late Congressman J. Arthur Younger.

Five Republicans, five Democrats and one independent appeared to be heading for the hustings November 14; and there was every indication it was turning into something resembling a team wrestling match.

Attorney Paul McCloskey, who wants the United States to get out of Vietnam, attacked three fellow Republicans — Shirley Temple Black, Earl Whitmore and William Draper,

for wanting to "win the war," without stating how many casualties we should take, or how many years we should maintain the effort.

He called Mrs. Black "a child movie star" and Draper "a gen-

eral's son, using his father's credentials."

McCloskey, who thinks the United States can defend Vietnam by moving back to Thailand and South Korea, suggested Vietnam would become a buffer state if the United States troops quit it, and asserted it is not going to join with Red China.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Black's campaign chairman, Stanley Hiller, Jr., said today that Shirley will not visit Vietnam during her current campaign, "in deference to a bipartisan request that political candidates refrain from political junketing in Vietnam."

He referred to a joint statement of the House Armed Services Committee chairman and the committee's ranking Republican member made to the national chairman of both parties.

"We are advised that there have been and are presently Congressional office seekers in Vietnam, being briefed by our military personnel and, in general, consuming the time of military personnel in that area," Hiller quoted the statement as saying.

"In our judgement," the statement continues, "this political junketing should be condemned forthwith. We call on national chairmen of your political parties to discourage candidates of your party from such junketing."

Hiller said: "Shirley has demanded a swift and honorable end to the fighting, noting that military tactics should be left to experienced fighting men, not junketing civilians."

# Shirley Foresees Home in Capital

By MICHELLE CARTER

Looking more like a school teacher than the society matron she is, Shirley Temple Black met with women's editors yesterday morning over breakfast at the Villa Hotel to discuss her Congressional campaign.

Mrs. Black, wearing a long sleeved white blouse detailed with rows of lace, a belted straight gray skirt stopping well below the knee, tall patent leather heels and a gold elephant pin, explained she had been "preaching involvement all my life. Now I'm really involved."

Claiming a national need for inspirational leadership, her campaign theme, she suggested that the country is "living by slogans . . . such as 'Keep American Beautiful'" instead of finding words of leadership to live by.

She criticized President Johnson's handling of the Vietnam War and Johnson's reliance on the advice of Defense Secretary McNamara but declined to offer an alternative solution.

"This is not the job for armchair strategists. The President must make the decisions."

Bombing Haiphong harbor may be the answer, she feels, and she does not think the Red Chinese would retaliate after such a move.

"Most of all, the President should rely more on the Joint Chiefs of Staff and make some kind of a decision."

Mrs. Black said she is not directing her campaign in a special appeal to women, and she refuted the title of a female politician.

The day of a woman candi-

date begins much the same as that of any candidate — very early. Her mornings are filled with coffees at the homes of San Mateo Countians.

"I've had as many as 30 women at a coffee depending on the size of the hostess' house."

A luncheon meeting follows and then afternoon coffees, shopping center tours and handshaking (which hurts if she wears a ring, "but then I've been shaking hands for 36 years") and door-to-door campaigning.

"But there's always dinner at home. It's my only contact with my family."

Contact with the family will continue if Mrs. Black should win the position she's campaigning for. "We will all move to Washington although our legal residence will remain here. My husband will be able to work from there so we will all be together."

The only casualty of the campaign so far is daughter, Linda Susan, 19, who is staying home from college to help her mother's campaign. She suffered a strained tendon in her arm after addressing 1500 envelopes at campaign headquarters last Friday and is sporting a cast.

A request has been received today from the State Department to bring a special inquiry conducted in 1969 concerning Mrs. Black up to date. She is currently being considered for a Presidential appointment, position not indicated. Following our 1969 investigation of Mrs. Black, she was named a member of the U. S. Delegation to the United Nations.

Mrs. Black, aged 46, is the former Shirley Temple, the child movie star. She is the wife of Charles Alden Black and they reside in Woodside, California. Mrs. Black was an unsuccessful candidate for the U. S. House of Representatives from California in 1967. She was defeated by Representative Paul N. McCloskey, Jr.

The 1969 investigation of Mrs. Black was generally favorable, although some persons advised they felt she was politically naive and could be easily led. The investigation developed information that [REDACTED]

Schorr is a veteran CBS correspondent and investigative reporter.

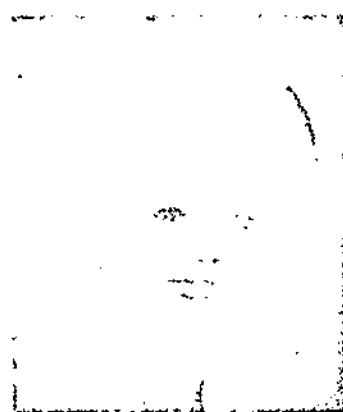
At first, it was believed that the White House, nettled by his investigations, was trying to harass Schorr via the FBI.

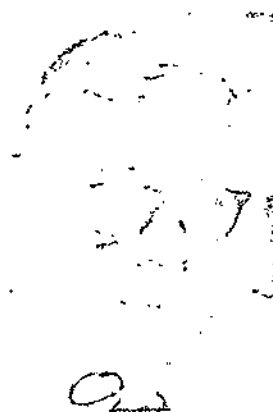
It has taken some time to determine the exact position the Nixon Administration had in mind for Daniel Schorr, but Intelligence Report has finally found out.

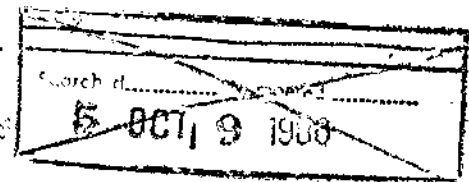

# George F. Temple, Father and Manager of Shirley Temple

WOODSIDE, Calif. (UPI)—George Francis Temple Sr., 92, the father of diplomat Shirley Temple Black and the manager of his daughter's childhood film career, died Tuesday after a brief illness at a convalescent hospital. The cause of death was not reported.

Mr. Temple, a banker who moved to the Woodside home of his daughter in

In the mid-1930s, he quit banking to become business manager for motion picture industry personalities, including his daughter.

He had a long career with both Southern California Edison and the California Bank. He also was a former director of the First Federal Savings & Loan of Beverly Hills, president of the

American Insurance Agency, president of the Beverly Hills Title Insurance Co., and had been a director and vice president of the Bank of Los Angeles, now the First Western Bank.

In addition to his daughter, survivors include two sons, John S. and George F. Jr., five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

1974, was a lifelong athlete and was seen on the course at the Los Altos Golf and Country Club only two months ago.

Born in Fairview, Pa., Mr. Temple moved to California in 1903. Self-taught after grade school, he learned book-keeping, typing and accounting in night school and from correspondence courses.

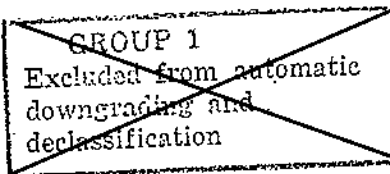

## TINY STAR AIDED BY COURT

### *Shirley Temple's Contract With Business Aide Revised to Her Advantage by Judge*

Shirley Temple, 6-year-old picture actress, went before Superior Judge McComb yesterday to acquire a new business manager, but she should have hired the judge.

Before he was through he had saved her 5 per cent commission on her salary, had eliminated a provision giving the business manager the right to handle her bank account, and had insisted on clarification of another paragraph dealing with indefinite continuation of the manager's contract.

The contract was with Bern Bernard and it called for payment to him of 10 per cent of all she may receive under a new contract, or of any increase over her present salary of \$150 a week in her present contract.

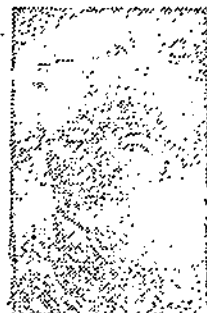
Martin Gang, attorney for Shirley and her mother, Mrs. Gertrude Temple, explained that since the little star has commenced to "click in a big way," she is entitled to a better contract than she has at present and that she needs a manager to negotiate it for her.

Judge McComb said he would not approve of 10 per cent and cut it to a 5 per cent commission. He also took exception to the other provisions and insisted on their being changed. Attorney Gang said he would present the revised contract for approval today and the case was taken under submission.

Little Shirley Temple, child star of films, played in her backyard at Santa Monica yesterday unmindful

of a fight going on for a larger pay check for her screen efforts. Reliable reports were that her father, George F. Temple, branch bank manager, asked an increase to \$2500 weekly before his daughter would be allowed to work again.



Executives at Shirley Temple, the Fox studio, which has a contract on her services, countered with an offer of \$1000. At the studio the next step in the negotiations are uncertain, while Temple said he will see his attorney before going ahead.

Shirley, 3 years of age, became a star almost overnight after her discovery while working in two-reelers. She was signed at \$150 a week.

## *Shirley Temple Pay Scale Set*

Stardom with a reputed salary of \$1000 a week for Shirley Temple, 5 years of age, was the compromise reached yesterday between her parents and officials of the Fox Studio.

Mr. and Mrs. George F. Temple had asked \$2500 weekly instead of the studio's \$1000 offer. The Temple's, however, agreed to \$1000 when it was stipulated Mrs. Temple is to receive \$100 a week to remain on the set while Shirley works.

The contract is for seven years with yearly options providing increases. Attorney Loyd Wright represented the Temples.

On a five weeks' vacation Shirley leaves today with her mother for Northern California points. Her father is a branch bank manager.

Settlement out of court of the dispute between Elinor O'Reilly and Gene Mann, theatrical agents, and George and Gertrude Temple, parents of Shirley Temple, diminutive screen actress, was reported yesterday when the agents' suit for construction of their contract to manage the little actress was called for trial before Superior Judge McComb. The agents contended they had a five-year contract to manage Shirley's affairs.

The terms of the settlement were not announced.

# Shirley Temple Heads List at \$5000 a Week

*Studios Careful About Revealing Pay, Lest  
Other Children, Parents, and Adult  
Players Also, Get "Ideas"*

Clever babies are climbing up into the big money. More smart lambskins are being paid higher salaries than ever before in pictures. A little Shirley Temple or Freddie Bartholomew in the family is as valuable as a flowing oil well, or a nice productive gold mine.

The studios are wary about revealing the salaries paid to these youngsters, because, ahem, comparisons are odious, and parents and guardians get ideas in their heads. To say nothing of adult players who get restive by the comparison, too. Nevertheless it is known that while a new "adjustment" was recorded for Shirley Temple in August, 1934, by which she was to receive \$1500 a week, with mamma receiving \$150 a week to take care of her, there has recently been a new boost, which with her commercial tie-ups, puts Shirley in the \$5000-a-week class. The actual salary from Twentieth Century-Fox is around \$2500 a week, and the Shirley Temple dolls and dresses on the market

bring in an additional \$2500 a week at least.

This is higher than Jackie Cooper ever received at the height of his glory, which was \$1200 a week. This boy has lately signed a new contract with M.-G.-M. by which he accepts a mere \$1100 a week for a spell, with, however, a rising scale to reach \$1500 a week, next year.

Little 10-year-old Freddie Bartholomew's first contract, for "David Copperfield," was for thirty pounds a week, i.e. around \$130, but his marked success in that picture soon boosted that. The next recorded raise was to \$250 a week, with \$150 a week for Aunt Mylicent as his guardian, and now, with "Little Lord Fauntleroy" coming up, it has been boosted to \$1000 a week on a forty-week contract.

## MICKEY ROONEY

Mickey Rooney, who is also to be in that picture, is now 15 years old. Although he played Puck in Warner Brothers' "Midsummer Night's Dream" he was only loaned to that studio by M.-G.-M. His contract with M.-G.-M. began at \$150 a week for twenty weeks, then rose to \$200 a week for twenty more weeks, and he now receives \$400 a week on a yearly basis whether he is working or not.

Sybil Jason, the little 7-year-old at Warners, began with an optional contract at \$100 a week for six months. The option has now been taken up and Sybil receives \$230 a week on a new long contract.

## PAID BY PICTURE

Young Jackie Scarl, age 14, is paid by the picture. He first received \$2000 a picture from Fox, and has nine other options in the contract by which he receives \$2500 each for three pictures, \$3000 each for three more, and is to receive \$3500 each for the last three.

At Fox, too, is young Jane Withers, 9 years of age. Jane is receiving \$150 a week, but because of her work in "Gentle Julia," just concluded, a handsome boost is under discussion.

Paramount has several bright babes on its list. David Hicif, age 7, receives \$175 a week on a regular contract, and his 4-year-old sister Betty gets \$75. They will star in "Timothy's Quest" as brother and sister. Then there's Billy Lee, 5 years old, who has a contract for \$85 a week when he's working, and \$35 a week when he's not. Baby Le Roy's contract still goes marching on—that youngster has been a wage-earner for nigh three years and he's only 3 now! This little like started at \$20 a week all the time and \$50 a week for ten weeks of work. This has risen to \$50 a week now, and \$35 a week even when he isn't appearing in a picture. Virginia Weidlen, age 8, started at \$50 a week a year ago, rose to \$60 a week for the second six months and is now to receive \$75 a week.



## Farm Boy Accused of Threat Letter Demanding \$25,000 From Child Screen Star's Father

Threats against the life of Shirley Temple, juvenile screen actress, by a 16-year-old Nebraska farm boy demanding \$25,000 in an extortion note, were revealed last night by Department of Justice agents following arrest of the youth in Grant, Neb.

Sheriff H. Bechtel, who arrested ~~Shirley Temple~~ Powell, said the boy sent a letter May 9 to George F. Temple, the child actress' father, reading:

"Unless \$25,000 is dropped from an airplane near Grant, Neb., on May 15, the life of Shirley Temple will be endangered."

U. S. Atty. Hall said a complaint against young Powell was filed in United States District Court at North Platte, Neb.

### ARRAIGNMENT TODAY

The boy will be arraigned at 9 a.m. today.

The child actress was in Eureka last night with her parents on a vacation trip. Her father commented evasively on the plot.

"We want to be by ourselves and hope to spend our time fishing," Temple said. He explained that they will leave tomorrow for Southern Oregon, to rest at a location 150 miles from a railroad and seventy-five miles from the nearest telegraph station.

R. A. Alt, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Omaha, said Powell confessed writing the extortion letter. Alt dispatched agents to take Powell to North Platte for arraignment before United States Commissioner A. F. Streitz.

Federal agents used a technical laboratory in identifying the writer. The letter paper was traced through manufacturers to various stores in Grant and Madrid, Neb.

### NO MONEY PAID

The child's father, a branch bank manager, paid no money. The letter was not noticed in the fan mail until May 18.

Sheriff Bechtel said the boy was found working in a field in a farm rented by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Powell, a mile south of Grant. He quoted the youth as saying he was "sorry." He accompanied the officers without protest.

## YOUTH FREE UNDER BOND IN SHIRLEY TEMPLE PLOT

GRANT (Neb.) Aug. 1. (AP)—Sherling W. Powell, 16 years of age, who admitted writing a letter threatening the life of Shirley Temple, child film star, unless her father paid him \$25,000, was free under \$1000 bond tonight to await action of a Federal grand jury.

Powell, a voracious reader of film and detective magazines and a motion-picture fan, pleaded guilty to an extortion charge before United States Commissioner Streitz at North Platte today and was bound over to the next term of Federal district court which begins June 8, 1937.

Sheriff Betchel of Perkins county, Powell's home, signed the \$1000

bond and brought the boy back here.

He said Powell had told him "he never meant to go through with it" and did not go to the specified place to look for the money.

The letter, written last May to Shirley's father, George F. Temple, ordered him to drop \$25,000 "from an airplane near Grant, on May 15" or "the life of Shirley Temple will be endangered."

Temple, at Eureka, Cal., told authorities the letter was not noted until May 18, three days after the dead line. The Temples did not take the matter seriously and Shirley was not told of it. Temple called it "a silly action by some youngster."

Powell's arrest yesterday was announced by J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who said the youth was traced through scientific paper tests of the stationery used. The department learned the paper was sold at Grant and Madrid, Neb., neighbor towns in this West Nebraska county. Hoover did not disclose how Powell was singled out. He was plowing in a field near his home when officers seized him.

### GOT IDEA FROM FILM

Betchel said Powell told him he got the idea for the note after seeing a motion picture with a kidnapping plot. Carl F. Powell, his father, said the boy would go to the picture "every night if we would let him," and that he seldom missed a picture in Grant.

Powell also said his son "read all the time and read everything he could get his hands on, especially detective and film magazines."

## Write-in Vote for Judgeship Cast for Shirley Temple

Shirley Temple, motion-picture actress, has arrived at the place on the list of celebrities where she receives write-in votes at elections.

This is indicated in the official canvass of ballots of the recent primary election being made by the Board of Supervisors, for on one is the name of the child star, written in for the nomination of judge of the Superior Court.

The usual number of others

appear on ballots, among them Mary Pickford, Tom Mix and Mae West. Votes for judge were also written in for Tom Mooney, Joe Bloo, John Doe, David Lamson, Clara Phillips, Irvin Cobb, Herbert Hoover, Jr., Erwin P. Werner and Rev. R. P. Shuler.

Aimee Semple McPherson was given several votes for District Attorney. Also Rhea Crawford Splivalo. Representative Scott and Supervisor Jessup also got write-in votes for District Attorney.

## SHIRLEY TEMPLE EXTORTION THREAT TRAPS DIXIE YOUTH

A \$25,000 extortion threat aimed at Shirley Temple, child film actress, was frustrated by Federal officers yesterday with the arrest of a 16-year-old unemployed youth in Atlanta, Ga.

Giving his name as Frank Edward Stephens, the youth admitted having posted a letter last August 1 to "Mrs. Shirley Temple" demanding that she "get the money if you want to keep Shirley."

### INTERCEPTED BY STUDIO

The letter evidently intended for the girl's mother, Mrs. George F. Temple, never reached her. It was intercepted in Shirley's fan mail by studio employees and given to John Hanson, chief of the Bureau of Investigation here.

Like a letter received last May from a Nebraska farmboy

of the same age as Stephens, the missive was sent to J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Federal bureau, and agents went to work.

### ADMITS WRITING IT

Taken into custody in an Atlanta restaurant, Stephens brushed his sleek black hair nervously and quickly admitted he scrawled the letter with his left hand. The message requested that the money be mailed to a Curtis Palmer in care of an Atlanta grocery.

"I figured the Temples would pay off quicker than anybody else," the youth told officers.

A few days ago the lad telephoned the grocery store and inquired about "a package I am expecting from Hollywood." That call put Federal men on his trail.

# Suit Names

## Child Star

Shirley Temple One of  
Defendants in \$500,000  
Action by ex-Trainer

Over the small head of Shirley Temple yesterday broke a \$500,000 storm when suit for that amount was filed against her in Superior Court by Jack Hays, who described himself as her discoverer and trainer.

The 8-year-old screen celebrity was named defendant in the action along with her parents, George F. Temple and Mrs. Gertrude Temple, and her employers, the Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation.

Also included as defendants are the California Bank and the California Trust Company, which are said to hold large amounts of money, securities and real estate titles in trust for the child film star.

### CONTRACT CITED

Hays said in his complaint that he signed a contract with the little girl on January 23, 1932, whereby he agreed to train her for theatrical work and motion pictures in exchange for her services for two years with the right of an option for an additional two years, during which time he would pay her \$50 a week when she was actually working.

The contract, according to the complaint, was approved in Superior Court on October 7, 1932 and thereafter, Hays declared, he engaged tutors and directors for Shirley and gave her his services to the end that she was taught drama, voice, cinema technique and English, Spanish and French.

### IN ONE-REEL FILMS

During this time she appeared in six one-reel pictures and received all his attentions when she was not actually engaged in work, Hays added.

It was entirely through his efforts, Hays continued, that Shirley became a \$5,000,000 personality and was recognized as such throughout the world.

Nevertheless, he said, Miss Temple's parents on October 1, 1933, declined to accept any further services from him and thereafter signed a contract with the film studio, where she had originally been placed only through his own efforts and strictly on a "loan" basis.

From the time she entered the employ of Twentieth Century-Fox until the present time, Hays asserted, the little girl has earned, first, \$150 a week, and then \$1000 a week. In addition, Hays said, she has been paid in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000 from other sources for the use of her name for advertising purposes.

### FAMILY SILENT

Besides the damages for asserted breach of contract, Hays demands an accounting and a percentage of her earnings, appointment of a receiver for her property pending the outcome of the litigation and an injunction to restrain all the defendants from disposing of any of the property during this time.

Members of the Temple family declined comment when advised.

## Child Star Deal Related

### Hays Seeks to Nullify Temple Contract Sale for \$25 at Auction

Sold for \$25

One four-year contract calling for the exclusive professional services of Shirley Temple, child film actress.

Jack Hays, who is suing Shirley, her parents and others for \$500,000, yesterday disclosed that it was that sale which removed him from control of the "little girl's" film destinies.

#### BOUGHT BY FATHER

Examination of Federal court records shows that on October 3, 1933, Hays was in voluntary bankruptcy and that the contract was put up for sale as an asset.

It was bought on that date for \$25. The purchaser was George Temple, Shirley's father.

Hays, seeking to set the sale aside, yesterday filed an action in United States District Court declaring that the contract was for personal service and could not be disposed of at such a sale as an ordinary asset.

#### DESCRIBES CONTRACT

He set forth that he had taken over direction of Miss Temple, had her taught the essentials of acting and in return was granted the contract, beginning January 2, 1932, to run for the next four years.

On October 3, 1933, when the contract was sold for \$25, Shirley was a \$1,000,000 property, he set forth in the action prepared by Attorneys William C. Ring and M. G. Gallaher.

#### ASKS ACCOUNTING

Since that, profiting from his instructions, she has developed into a \$5,000,000 property, the attorneys set forth, and has become the most valuable child screen personality yet known.

To recompense him for his services, Hays asked that he be granted the \$500,000, legal interest and an accounting of her earnings.

#### ASKS RECEIVER

He also asked that a receiver be appointed to take charge of her affairs pending outcome of his action.

A copy of the contract, attached to the filing, shows Hays was to pay the child actress a minimum salary for making one-reel pictures for him.

In addition, if he contracted her out to other studios he was to pay her 50 per cent of the proceeds, leaving the other 50 per cent for himself.

#### DUPLICATES SUIT

In yesterday's action, which duplicated in large part a filing in Superior Court on Wednesday, Hays named as defendants Miss Temple, her parents, Fox Film Corporation, Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation, California Bank, California Trust Company and Harry Ashton, the trustee in bankruptcy who conducted the contract sale.

#### HEARS ARGUMENTS

Judge Hollzer took his decision on the motion under advisement at the conclusion of arguments by attorneys for Hays and those representing Shirley, her parents, George F. and Gertrude Temple, Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation and Harry Ashton, the trustee in bankruptcy who conducted the sale.

Shortly after Hays filed his petition in bankruptcy in 1933, the contract between himself and Shirley, then practically an unknown, was put up for sale and was purchased by Temple.

#### SIMILAR SUIT FILED

In seeking to have the sale set aside, Hays contends the contract was for personal services and could not be disposed of as if it were an ordinary asset.

A similar suit was filed in Superior Court by Hays shortly before he commenced the Federal court action.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6. (Exclu- sive)—Shirley Temple, child mo- tion-picture actress, was the larg- est box-office attraction last year, according to a survey announced today by the Motion Picture Herald, trade journal. It was her second consecutive year as the leader.

Robert Taylor, feminine heart- throb, who was eighty-third in 1935, pulled up to number four position. Clark Gable was in second place, succeeding the late Will Rogers.

The ten leaders were: Shirley, Gable, Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers as a team, Taylor, Joe E. Brown, Dick Powell, Joan Craw- ford, Claudette Colbert, Jeanette MacDonald and Gary Cooper.

## Shirley Temple JAN 8 1937 Suit Dismissed

Action by Jack Hayes,  
Trainer, for \$500,000  
Loses on Demurrers

Shirley Temple, recently rated the nation's foremost theater box-office attraction, again came out ahead yesterday when United States District Judge Hollzer dismissed the \$500,000 suit brought against her, her parents and others by Jack Hayes, who said he was her discoverer and trainer.

Judge Hollzer's decision sustained arguments of the defendant's attorneys, who maintained among other things that the court is without jurisdiction and that the complaint did not set forth a cause of action.

### TRAINING PROVIDED

The contract between the child star and Hayes was executed in January, 1932, to run for four years. Its terms provided that Hayes would train the child and would share in the proceeds from her work.

In October of the year following, the contract was sold to Shirley's father, George Temple, for \$25, by a trustee in bankruptcy, Hayes having been adjudicated a bankrupt.

### ACCOUNTING ASKED

Some weeks ago Hayes brought suit in Federal court seeking to set aside the sale of the contract and asking for \$500,000, interest, and accounting of Shirley's earnings.

Hayes has a similar \$500,000 contract suit pending in Superior Court.

## OIL NEWS

BY HOWARD KEGLEY

When the Fox motion-picture interests moved to the area between West Los Angeles and Beverly Hills they bought a large block of acreage on which the old Associated Oil Company had a number of oil wells in the Fox Hills Field.

Two of the wells were on film company holdings, so Fox got the royalty. When sound pictures came in the crews made so much noise in pulling the sucker rods to clean out the wells that the studio officials used to howl loudly about noise ruining pictures.

Recently the studio needed room to build bigger stage facilities, so it prevailed upon Tide Water Associated to abandon West Coast No. 1 and No. 2, in which the film company owned the royalty, and now it is out of the oil business.

### SHIRLEY BUYS IN

The other day Shirley Temple and King Vidor, as principals in the Temple Investment Company, bought through Reed & Wright, a block of the old Fox Hills field, controlled by Tide Water Associated, and in doing so came into possession of the royalty from one well.

Beverly Hills high school has for some time enjoyed the royalty income from Rodeo No. 106, another of the Fox Hills oil wells, being situated on a parcel of land where the well had been drilled years ago.

## SHIRLEY TEMPLE OUT OF SUIT

Parents Must Answer  
Demand for \$500,000

Shirley Temple, child film star, yesterday was eliminated as a defendant in a \$500,000 suit brought by Jack Hays, film representative, when Superior Judge Kenny so ruled during the course of legal technicalities preliminary to trial.

The little actress was named along with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Temple, by Hays, who asserted he is entitled to one-half her earnings during a two-year period ending January, 1934, by virtue of an asserted contract with the father and mother. The latter must remain defendants and were given ten days to answer.

"Oh, that's easy," was the reply. "She's really 9, but people just think she is 8. Understand?"

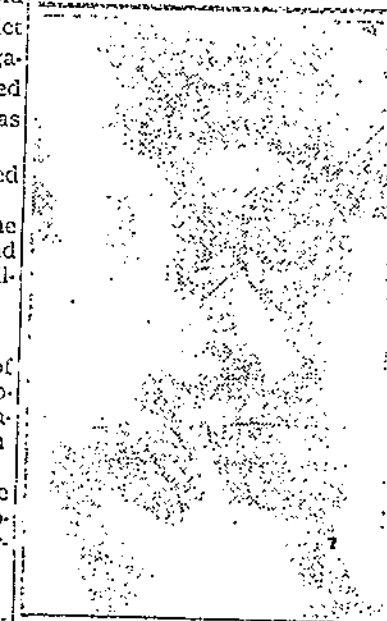
"I see," mused Capt. Winn.

## Shirley Temple Wins Libel Suit

Child Star Awarded

LONDON, March 22. (U.P.)—A libel suit brought on behalf of Shirley Temple, American child actress, against the now defunct magazine Night and Day, was settled in the King's bench division of the English high court today with a \$10,000 award for Shirley, \$5000 for the Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation of America, and \$2500 for the Twentieth Century-Fox Film Company of England.

### CRITICISED ACTING

The suit concerned an article criticising the child's acting in a recent picture.

Sir Patrick Hastings, attorney for the plaintiff, said that "It was one of the most horrible libels one can well imagine which this heastly publication has written, and it is right to say that every respectable news distributor in London refused to be a party to selling it.

### "MONEY NO OBJECT"

"Money is no object in this case. The child has a very large income and the film companies are wealthy concerns. The money will be disposed of in a charitable way."

Reference to a candy bar which figures in Shirley Temple's latest picture yesterday became the basis of a suit for \$500,000 damages filed in the New York Supreme Court against the producers by the National Confectioners' Association.

The legal action resulted from a sequence in the picture, "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm," during which the script assertedly implies that the candy bar is not decent to eat. A chicken leg is substituted pictorially.

### COMPLAINT IN SUIT

The association complains in the suit that the scene from the picture presents a false impression of their product in that it libels a bar of candy and holds up the candy profession to ridicule and shame. The action further seeks to restrain the defendant, Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation, from showing the picture without deletion of the scene in question.

The confectioners, claiming a membership of 325 candy makers and merchants, say they suffer because other children view the child actress as "a

model and eschew everything not considered good for her."

A spokesman for the child and the film company said:

"So—they filed it, did they? You know what it is, don't you—a publicity stunt!

### SEQUENCE ATTACKED

"No, the company will have nothing to say about the matter of deleting the scene from the film, the suit itself, nor anything else until they are served with formal notification that the suit has been filed. That goes for Shirley, too, and also her parents."

The sequence that brings Shirley into the tangle of legal actions has to do with her arrival, as Rebecca, at Sunnybrook Farm in company with her stepfather.

Child and parent are greeted by Aunt Miranda who immediately asks if Shirley has had anything to eat.

"Oh, yes, I have," Shirley answers. "Uncle Henry bought me a candy bar."

"A candy bar!" cries the aunt. "Take the child to the kitchen and give her something decent to eat!" The chicken leg is then provided.

Appellate Justices  
Reserve Decision on  
Viewing Picture

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20. (AP) Three black-robed justices pondered lengthily today whether to see little Shirley Temple in the film, "Stowaway." Decision finally was reserved.

The problem arose when attorneys for Joan Storm Dezen-dorf offered a private showing of the film in carrying forward their contention that 20th Century-Fox had infringed on her copyright of the play, "Dancing Destiny," which assertedly was submitted to and rejected by the film company in 1935.

The justices—of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals—decided to hear arguments first and then determine whether to see the picture.

The case is on appeal from Federal Court in Los Angeles, where the film company was upheld.

Shirley Temple yesterday stepped into a real life role of civic leader as she accepted the honorary chairmanship of the 16th annual Community Chest appeal which has for its goal the raising of \$3,221,720 for 88 member agencies' support during 1940.

While her mother, Mrs. George Temple, and her schoolteacher listened approvingly, the child actress had her first campaign conference with Dr. A. H. Giannini, general chairman of the appeal, intent on his recital of the needs of the Chest agencies, particularly those pertaining to child-health and family welfare.

#### SUGGESTS SLOGAN

"We will raise it," was Shirley's suggested slogan for the more than 18,000 volunteer workers being recruited for the campaign which begins officially on Oct. 26 and extends through November.

"As parents, Mr. Temple and myself feel that Shirley, like all other children of school age, should enlist in the Community Chest campaign," Mrs. Temple told Dr. Giannini. "If, through her chairmanship, she can inspire and encourage support from others, she will have gained by an example of good citizenship."

#### WILL WORK IN DRIVE

At 20th Century-Fox Studio, where Shirley is working, it was said that the star would finish her current picture in time to participate actively in the fund-raising appeal, especially among school children.

Public school division of the Chest campaign will reach more than 350,000 children and nearly 11,000 teachers, with Supt. Kersey as chairman, Dr. Giannini said. Teachers and pupils now are engaged in a publicity campaign, including poster and cartoon contests, use of motion pictures of various phases of welfare activity, and public speakers which will be climaxed by the fund appeal in schools from Nov. 6 to 17.

#### PLANS ANNOUNCED

### SETTLEMENT FRIENDLY

Discontinuance of Shirley Temple's contract was arranged in New York between William Goetz, vice-president of 20th-Century Fox, and Frank Orsatti as representative of the Temples.

The settlement was described as amicable and an amount paid by Mr. and Mrs. Temple for obtaining Shirley's freedom was determined to the satisfaction of all parties.

During the life of her contract, it is understood Shirley brought in \$20,000,000 to the company through her numerous pictures.

### TOPS FOR FOUR YEARS

For four years she was rated the top box office star of the movies, and even during the last poll of exhibitors she was shown ranking fifth. She is the first star to sustain such a record for so long a time, her closest competitor being Clark Gable.

On receiving the news of the closing of the contract, Mrs. Temple in an exclusive interview with this writer said:

"Every decision that Mr. Temple and I make regarding Shirley must take into account not only her present welfare but the future. Above everything else, we have to consider the effect that events in her career have upon her mind and character.

### HAPPY NORMAL CHILD

"So far, Shirley has been a happy, normal child who has been given every opportunity and advantage in her work and studio environment. Everything has been in her favor because of her box-office popularity.

"She has been able to maintain that position consistently over a period of years. The studio now feels there has been a change—that Shirley is not now the No. 1 star of the screen. Technically that may be true, but personally we feel that it is not a question of Shirley's personal appeal but rather a matter of stories.

### STORIES UNSATISFACTORY

"Admittedly greater discernment is required in the selection of material for Shirley today than when she was just a cute little girl with dimples and twinkling feet. We feel that 20th Century-Fox has made an effort toward finding proper and suitable material, but that the results have not been satisfactory to suit the new growing-up phase in Shirley's life.

"If we could look ahead with some assurance that stories provided for Shirley would insure her progress, that she would be as happy in the future in her work as she has been and is now, we would be pleased to continue.

### PARENTS UNCERTAIN

### WANTS NORMAL LIFE

"I do not think it wise for her to be deprived of the normal, natural benefits that may be derived from mingling and competing with a large number of other children.

"We feel that she may be able to gain more from these associations if she leaves the screen for a time, because she will not then be spotlighted in the eyes and minds of those about her.

### MAY RESUME CAREER

"This does not mean that if an opportunity comes along that will spell advancement for Shirley in a professional way we will ignore it, because we are constantly aware of Shirley's abiding love for her work.

"Incidentally, she has never regarded it as work. It has always been play.

"That spark was born in her and it is our duty to see that it is nurtured, not crowded or stifled."

It was learned that several times before Manheim attempted to contact Miss Temple. At first he was considered the usual annoyance but recently, it was said, his attempts to see the young star became more persistent.

Recently calls have been received at the film studio where she works and at the Temple home. The calls were deemed to be veiled threats and Miss Temple was put under the watchful eye of several bodyguards.

It was shortly after this that the F.B.I. was called into the case.

### POSED AS GARDENER

Attention to the suspect first came some months ago when he assertedly posed as a gardener and tried to see Miss Temple at her home. He was intercepted by servants and ushered from the residence grounds.

It was later, police said, that he tried to see her at the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio and where he telephoned her.

## Shirley Temple Married in Glamorous Ceremony

A glamorous night wedding—one of the biggest nuptial super-productions ever seen in Hollywood—last night signaled the arrival of Shirley Temple at the matrimonial state.

So enormous a crowd gathered in the street to catch a glimpse of the star and her bridegroom, Sgt. John Agar Jr., at Wilshire Methodist Church that traffic congestion delayed the arrival of the bride's brother, George Temple Jr., and such guests as David Seiznick, Shirley's producer, and Gov. and Mrs. Warren past the appointed time for the ceremony to start. More than 12,000 persons gathered in the street, police estimated.

### Traffic at Standstill

Later, a veritable stampede followed when the newly wed Sgt. and Mrs. Agar appeared to have their photographs taken in front of the church. Military and civil police were called on to hold back the surging public while traffic was practically at a standstill in the vicinity of Plymouth and Wilshire Blvds.

Another crowd gathered on Rockingham Road, Brentwood, where a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Temple.

The church ceremony was scheduled to start at 8:30 p.m.,

but at the appointed time someone noticed that Seiznick and George Temple Jr. had not arrived and the organist nervously stalled with appropriate music until the producer came in—out of breath. A few minutes later George Temple Jr. entered the church. Gov. and Mrs. Warren came in a side door only a few seconds before the start of the ceremony.

### Seven Bridesmaids

Shortly afterward the seven bridesmaids proceeded down the aisle, followed by Miss Temple on the arm of her father, who gave the bride away.

As Dr. Willsie Martin, pastor of the church, performed the marriage ceremony, both bride and bridegroom enunciated the responses so that practically every one of the guests in the church could hear. Both seemed very controlled for the occasion and on completion of the marriage rite, the sergeant kissed the new Mrs. Agar as if he really meant it.

Notable at the ceremony was the absence of motion picture stars in any number. Many of the guests were personal friends of the bride and bridegroom. Among the Hollywood figures present was Shirley's neighbor, ZaSu Pitts, at whose home the

one-time child star met her fiancé about two years ago.

Decorations throughout the church matched the flowers carried by the bride and her attendants, which were in the main pink and red roses. Miss Temple's wedding dress was of white satin, with a fitted bodice, short sleeves and "little infantia" skirt held out at the side by panniers. She wore satin gloves of wrist length and a headdress in the form of a small crown of corded satin, from which fell a silk knit veil.

The bridegroom, best man and the ushers were mostly in uniform. The bridesmaids were attired in gowns of a new color, called "Temple blue," and of shepherdess design. Mrs. George Temple, mother of the bride, wore a dress of slate-gray-crepe.

#### Gov. Warren Attends

Bridesmaids were Joyce Agar, Katharine Ferguson, Phoebe Hearst, Mary Lou Isleib, Betty Jean Lail, Nancy Majors and Constance Webb. The ushers included James Agar, Thomas Gallagher, Ernest Graft, John Herford, John McNeill, George Temple, Jr., and Sgt. Frank Walters. Mrs. Temple was matron of honor.

About 700 guests, including Gov. and Mrs. Warren, attended the reception at the Temple home where the receiving line was so long that it took two hours for some to reach the smiling bride and bridegroom.

Elaborate wedding presents were viewed in the building which the bride, as a child star, used as a playhouse and which will be transformed into a French provincial home to be used as the Agars' residence.

The reception in the garden had a bright moon overhead. There were roses everywhere.

The bridegroom still has a week of his furlough left, he

disclosed as he started on a motor trip with Shirley to an undisclosed destination.

Long after the reception was under way, the crowds still gathered in Rockingham Road.

But the huge crowd in the street at the church was the one which really paid tribute to Shirley's fame.

# Fame, Friends Ruin Shirley's Love Life

I wasn't surprised when Shirley Temple called me yesterday to announce that she and John Agar had called it a day and she was filing her divorce suit, charging cruelty.

For months there has been talk around Hollywood that the Agars were near the breaking point. There was other talk, too, of both John and Shirley having interests elsewhere, but this was awfully hard to believe.

I made several bets that Shirley was a level headed kid who would hold her marriage craft to the course with steady hands, no matter into what storms it ran.

I lost the bets. The storms grew too large for even Shirley's

level head to handle.

As her ship floundered and wallowed in a sea of misunderstanding, another bark drifted across its course with two other confused young people in it.

They were Johnny Johnston and his wife, Kathryn Grayson, singing star of MGM.

In the mixup that followed, one or the other of the ships was bound to be sunk.

## Two Different People

How does a little girl who earned a lot more than a million dollars by the time she was six years old grow up to be a happy, healthy normal young lady?

A long time ago, Shirley, who was 21 years old on April 23, found out she had to be two different persons in order to find any happiness.

To the world that went wild over her big hazel eyes, her dimpled smile and her burnished gold curls she was a fairy princess; but to herself and her close pals she was "Butch."

She was "Butch" to Jack Agar, the sergeant in the air force whom she met at March field and who wooed and won her for his bride before she was 18.

'Mr. Shirley Temple'

I attended their wedding, which was everything a fairy princess should have.

And I wondered as I watched John cutting the cake, with the slim, beautiful Shirley by his side, if the lad had any idea he was

marrying an American institution instead of a girl who was going to be known to the world as Mrs. John Agar.

He had never seen Shirley on the screen before he married her.

She had been away from pictures for quite a while attending school and to the boy who fell in love with her she was just a pretty, laughing kid who loved to dance, drink pop and eat hamburgers like other lively youngsters in her class at Westlake school for girls.

Theirs was a war romance, and time was too short for him to think much about the fact that Shirley was big business and

high among the 10 most popular American personalities before she could write her name.

When he came back from the war it didn't take him long to realize that he was Mr. Shirley Temple.

This probably amused him for a while, but a disproportionate relationship like that between man and wife ultimately erodes a feller's ego.

#### It Needed a Giant

It takes a giant of a man to rise above a situation such as confronted young Agar when he decided to cast his lot as a screen actor after he had shed his air force uniform.

Unfortunately for Agar, he was not fashioned in such heroic mold.

"I'm going to get a press agent," he was overheard to remark one night at Ciro's. "I'm tired of being known as Mr. Shirley Temple."

He must have felt that Shirley was never quite entirely his.

When they were out together

she was always listening to some columnist or fan writer passing by instead of to him.

Wooing the press box became as automatic for her as breathing.

She'd been doing it since she first tripped out on the stage at the Meglin Kiddie school.

#### Always on Parade

She has been on parade ever since she can remember and of course her husband was in the parade too, but people quite often forgot he was there.

Recently Agar has acted as if he felt that Shirley forgot he was there, too. ~~NOT 14 1937~~

If he'll study up on English history he'll realize what a guy named Prince Albert had to take when he married Queen Victoria.

Shirley no doubt was pretty shocked when she first learned that Jack was getting an ego buildup from a beautiful girl who lives entirely away from the entertainment world.

Jack could strut and preen, his feathers, as any male must do, while with this girl, without the fear of some photographer shoving him out of the way so Shirley's lovely face would be in full view for the camera.

#### Wife Left at Home

In retaliation, Shirley probably made a few eyes at boys in their social set without thinking much about it, but one of the boys she smiled at often was the singer, Johnny Johnston.

Johnston and Agar played golf at the Riviera country club, and became close friends.

Another pal who played golf with them was Joe Kirkwood, Jr.

About this time, Johnston was singing at Ciro's and his wife, Kathryn Grayson, was going to have a baby.

"I didn't feel very good and thought Shirley wasn't very kind to invite Johnny to go with them to Sherry's after Ciro's closed when I was home all alone," Kathryn told me.

"Shirley had a baby and she should have known how I felt. I told her so, too. Johnny went to the Agar house one time when we had a spat."

#### Shirley Explains It

"Kathryn is pretty silly to take that attitude," Shirley told me.

"Johnny did ask Jack Agar if he could come to our house to stay a few days when he was having trouble with his wife.

"He stayed in the chauffeur's quarters, but Jack was always there in the house as long as he stayed.

"It is terrible to work so hard all your life to maintain a good reputation and then have someone get it all dirtied through a lot of misunderstandings.

"I want to have our divorce on a dignified and high plane for our little daughter's sake. I could fight dirty, too, if I wanted, but I'm not going to."

#### Listening In on It

Kathryn precipitated quite a little talk when she visited the apartment of Joe Kirkwood, Jr. a short time before his marriage to Cathy Downs about a week ago and eavesdropped on a telephone conversation he was having.

"I had heard he was telling columnists about trouble between me and Johnny," Kathryn said to me yesterday. "I was so angry I went to see him to talk about it.

"When Johnny comes home he'll poke him in the nose and if he doesn't, my brothers will."

-In retreating from the back

yard at Kirkwood's place Kathryn fell and hurt her arm.

"I wish she had hurt her neck," Mr. Kirkwood remarked to me yesterday in discussing the visit. "She and Johnny Johnston are welcome to each other."

#### Innocent Bystander

"I'm amused about this talk of nose poking. Maybe I'll do a little of that myself."

"I was just trying to help everybody out and persuade Kathryn that she was wrong in thinking Shirley was too interested in Johnny."

"That's what you always get for trying to help out. I just got married myself and all I want is to be left alone."

Shirley wasn't so complimentary about Joe as he was about her.

"Just find out all about Joe Kirkwood," she told me. "Then print it. Just find out all about him."

I asked her what she meant, but she refused to elaborate.

#### All Straightened Out

Kathryn told me that Johnny is doing okay in New York with a spot on Milton Berle's TV show and a chance to sing at the Waldorf Astoria, "but if there's any trouble about Shirley Temple he'll come right away."

"Johnny and I are all straightened out now and there isn't anything going to happen to our marriage."

In New York Johnny told the New York Daily News, "There is a certain fellow in Hollywood who is trying to make trouble for me with my wife and when I get back out there I'm going to punch him in the nose."

He wouldn't tell who he was thinking about.

If all this kid stuff was happening in some little town between a bunch of young people who weren't in the public eye like these beautiful children are, it could more than likely be straightened out in a jiffy by the minister or a close family friend.

#### New Dolls for Linda

But in the perfumed tropical winds of the glamour capital of the world it is being blown into a full-sized marital wreck, for one of the couples at least.

And "Butch" will pick up the pieces of her broken dreams and try to find happiness in the honeymoon house where she lived with John.

She will play with her baby, Linda Susan, who is just as lovely a doll as any of the hundreds stored in the basement room below.

They are dolls from all over the world showered on Shirley by those who loved her everywhere.

I once asked Shirley if she will give her dolls to her baby when she is old enough to play with them.

"No, I'll let her have her own dolls. I want her to have a life all her own. I don't want her to be a remake of Shirley Temple."

"I hope she'll always have more time to herself than I ever had."

Thanks to the shrewd management of Shirley's father, George Temple, the gal will never have to worry about paying the rent or getting coffee and doughnut money.

The world owes Shirley a lot of happiness because she gave it so much sunshine and laughter and warm, glowing memories.

# Shirley Temple Seeks Divorce From Agar

Hollywood Rocked by Word of Suit Filing;  
Cruelty Charged, but She Asks No Alimony

Shirley Temple, a few short years ago the dimpled, toddling highest-paid juvenile in the history of the screen, filed suit for divorce yesterday in Superior Court.

The news rocked a Hollywood which still recalls as though it were only yesterday the ingratiating little blonde who for four years, from 1935 through 1938, was the leading box office attraction of the movie industry.

But the decision seemed irrevocable for Shirley, now 21 years of age, and for her 28-year-old husband, John Agar. Her complaint charges him with cruelty but Shirley asks for no alimony and for no allowance for the support of their daughter, Linda Susan, born Jan. 30 of last year.

## Tears in Her Eyes

"For the last two and a half years," said Shirley yesterday with tears in her eyes, "we have been trying to make this marriage work. We both tried hard—we really did. But it just didn't work."

But Hollywood could recall other and apparently happier days of a year ago.

"We have never exchanged a single harsh word," Shirley said at that time. "Two careers in one family work out wonderfully for us."

Miss Temple's complaint is a masterpiece of brevity. It was prepared by Attys. George Stahlman and Grant B. Cooper. It sets forth that Miss Temple and Agar came to the parting of ways only the day before.

In a single paragraph the lawyers informed the court that Miss Temple and Agar were married Sept. 19, 1945, and that they lived together four years and 23 days.

Much more was written on that wedding day four years ago. The ceremony was performed at the Wilshire Methodist Church. It was attended by some 500 invited guests, including Gov. and Mrs. Warren, and there were some 12,000 movie fans elbowing for a glimpse of the couple outside the church.

Later there was a reception, likewise attended by the Govern-

nor and Mrs. Warren, at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Temple, on Rockingham Road in Brentwood.

Shirley was then only 17 and her marriage license had required the formal consent of her parents. Agar was 24 and a sergeant in the Army Air Forces. He had been employed in a chemical laboratory in Chicago when he enlisted in 1942. He met his teen-age bride while he was stationed at Riverside's March Field.

But none of that is in the two-page divorce petition. The document demands very little—a decree of divorce, custody of the 20-month-old child and return of Miss Temple's maiden name.

"Since the marriage of the parties defendant has treated plaintiff with extreme cruelty and has wrongfully inflicted upon her grievous mental suffering," is all the petition says on the subject of cruelty.

## No Community Property

The complaint specifically states that Miss Temple and Agar own no community property—presumably because they have kept their earnings from mingling. At any rate, Atty. Stahlman expressed the belief that no dispute over financial matters will develop. Agar himself seemed to confirm that belief.

# Divorce Granted to Shirley Temple

## Actress Tells of Suicide Idea; Says Husband Agar Misbehaved

"I was going to drive the car over the cliff or something. Instead, I went to the doctor."

Shirley Temple, 21, said these lines quietly in her role of plaintiff yesterday, and she was granted a divorce from John Agar, 28, actor.

She told a long story of embarrassments before friends, of a husband who went home drunk with lipstick on his face when she was expecting their baby.

Trouble between her and "Jack" began five months after their Sept. 19, 1945, marriage, she told Superior Judge Roy L. Herndon, who granted the decree. Agar began failing to appear for dinner, she said, and he got home later and later until 4 a.m. was not unusual.

Two months after she began to plan on their child, she said, he got home at 4 in the morning, with lipstick on his face.

"He was very intoxicated," she said in answer to a question by her attorney, George Stahlman.

### 'He Brought a Girl'

Four months before their baby was born, she said, she thought her husband was playing cards with his men friends. Instead, she said:

"He brought a girl into the bedroom at 1:30 in the morning. He said, 'Come on, let's all go to a party.' I'd been in bed since 10 o'clock. After all—I didn't feel like going out. They went, and he came home at about 4, after I'd given up staying awake."

Before that, though, before they became prospective parents, she said, she consulted a physician regarding her nervousness and their inability to get along.

"One time the doctor talked to both of us and tried to figure what was wrong," she said. "But when we were with people Jack would always say he hadn't done anything wrong."

Then there was the night when he came home to dinner, "drunk and very belligerent."

"After dinner, I jumped into the car. I was going to drive the car over the cliff or something. Instead I went to the doctor."

The chestnut-haired girl with big brown eyes said it so quietly that the small roomful of spectators could scarcely be certain they'd heard aright.

### 'You Get Embarrassed'

She told more. Prompted by Stahlman, she said she tried to go out with her husband as much as possible, "to movies and things—but you know—you get embarrassed." Two weeks after the baby was born, she said, she dressed up in a new frock to go out for the first time—and "he got home about 2 o'clock."

"You didn't go out at all?" asked Stahlman.

"No."

When she telephoned her husband's golf club, she said, her call "would usually be bounced all around the club." One night, she said, Agar left her at a table with four other persons after whispering, "I've got to go see my girl."

### Dancing and Kissing

That night, he had an accident in his car, she said, and got home at 6 a.m. At another party, he stopped dancing with his wife, saying, "Oh, you're too short," she testified, and he spent the rest of the evening dancing and kissing "an unmarried girl," even taking his partner to their home.

"Did that embarrass you?" queried her counsel.

Shirley looked around at the crowded courtroom, at the silent judge, at the newspapermen busily writing.

"Of course, it did. But yet you keep thinking of the baby all the time."

Her husband, she said, told their friends:

"You can't have any fun with Shirley. She won't get drunk."

After that, she said, "he went out and got drunk and fell downstairs, upset a plant and passed out in the driveway."

Her witness, Mrs. Sidney Franklin Jr., who gave her name as Mary Alice Franklin and said she and Miss Temple went to school together, corroborated.

She told of Agar's interest in "another girl" at a party at The

Chanticleer, and of a woman guest who told him "go back to your wife and stop making a fool of yourself."

On the Agars' fourth wedding anniversary, she said, there was a party, and at a restaurant when the orchestra honored the pair with an anniversary selection, "Shirley was sitting alone at the table and Jack was over at the bar."

### Anniversary Cake

They went to King's restaurant, and the chef made a special anniversary cake for them, Mrs. Franklin said. Instead of cutting it with ceremony, she testified, Agar instructed the management to put the cake in a box so they could take it home.

"Jack said to Shirley, 'You're repulsive. You're horrible. Why don't you let your hair grow long?'" Mrs. Franklin told the court.

Shirley, wearing a navy blue hat with fly-away veil on the back of her shoulder-length chestnut tresses, nodded as her friend said it.

### Judge Makes Speech

Besides her witness and Stahlman, the young woman was accompanied to court by Atty. Grant Cooper and her father, George Temple, investment counselor.

The Judge, in granting the decree, recognized that though Agar defaulted, the occasion was not usual. He made a formal speech in recognition of the importance of the plaintiff:

"This court believes that a due regard for legitimate public interest in this case not only justifies but requires some comment. This court cannot fail to take notice of the well-known fact that this plaintiff occupies a special place in the hearts and affections of millions of people not only in this State, but throughout the country.

### 'Vital Public Concern'

"Therefore," Judge Herndon continued, "this appears to be a peculiarly fitting and appropriate occasion upon which to reassert and redeclare the vital public concern with the problem of divorce and the urgent need for giving serious study to the environmental and sociological factors which contribute to it.

"We all know that the integrity of the family lies at the very foundation of the welfare, tranquility and good order of our society. Accordingly, this court is faithful to the declared and established policy of this State, that no divorce shall be granted except upon grounds which our law recognizes as sufficient.

### 'Fairness to Plaintiff'

"Fairness to this plaintiff, however, requires this court to declare that the evidence which has been offered here, the plaintiff's demeanor and the very evident sincerity with which she testified have convinced the court the grounds . . . are serious and substantial . . . but also that the plaintiff has made every reasonable effort to save her marriage and to avoid necessity for this proceeding."

### Custody of Child

The divorce was granted, and Miss Temple was given custody of the child, Linda Susan, 22 months old, together with \$100 a month for the child's support. Under an out-of-court property settlement agreement, Agar will invest his half of community property in a trust fund for the child.

Clore Warne, Agar's attorney, sitting as a friend of the court, asked leave to make a statement inasmuch as the Judge had spoken at length.

He stated that his client had made no attempt to justify himself with the public since the separation, and had "conducted himself as a gentleman throughout all the conferences for settlement." Also, he said, Agar had at heart the welfare of his child and his wife.

# Agar Says Shirley Fails to Tell 'Real' Trouble

## 'There Are Two Sides'

"As usual, there are two sides to the controversy," Agar said in a low voice.

"There is much I might have said and might say now. However, as I see it, no constructive purpose could be served by recriminations or airing our respective sides in public."

"This is the course I have followed since our separation and I still want to follow it despite possibly wrongful implications which might result from what she said today."

"I am naturally greatly concerned with the welfare of our child and trust that what has happened will ultimately result for the best to all of us concerned."

Agar begged off when photographers requested him to pose holding a picture of his now former spouse.

"I don't think that would be right," he said.

## Stage Appearances

Agar, who made his stage appearances in real trouser fashion despite the unhappy condition of his personal life, was noticeably grim throughout the day. He appears in the stage revue as a singer and in two character roles.

Film Actor Rory Calhoun, who is in the show with Agar, said

"John hasn't spoken 10 words all day offstage."

"This thing has obviously upset him a great deal," Calhoun commented.

Another member of the troupe, Rhonda Fleming, said she felt "sorry for both Shirley and John."

"I know something of what they're going through," she said. "I had marital troubles myself."

Agar said he received a telephone call from Los Angeles today but declined to say who called.

"But it wasn't from Shirley," he said almost inaudibly.

It was as a winsome, golden-haired tot that Shirley Temple charmed her way into the hearts of movie-goers everywhere. From 1935 through 1938 she was the nation's top boxoffice attraction. As she grew up, her blonde curls were succeeded by soft chestnut hair and she became a graceful portrayal of mature parts.

This irresistible film moppet was the greatest child star of them all, an idol not only to a screen public all over the world, but to her fellow workers as well. When she retired temporarily from the screen at the age of 12, she reputedly had more than a million dollars of her own and it was said she had brought 20 millions of profits to Twentieth Century-Fox Studios.

Shirley Temple was an actress at 4, a star at 5 and for several years the most famous little girl in the world. She won four straight Academy Awards for the best performance by a juvenile.

Her temporary retirement came as it must to all child stars as they enter the "awkward age." She had then finished her 24th picture for Fox in seven years.

The wonder child's mother welcomed the rest from movie-making, feeling that Shirley was entitled to "those normal, natural benefits that may be derived from mingling and competing with a large number of other children." Her schooling had been carried on under supervision of the Los Angeles Board of Education by a teacher paid by the studio.

### Unaffected by Fame

Miss Temple had come out of her movie success relatively normal. She later credited her mother for this.

"My mother saw to it that I led as normal a life as possible," she said. "My studio work was done like play. Mother explained the scenes to me and I learned the lines for fun."

The young actress attended the Westlake School for Girls, from which she was graduated in 1945. She did not go to college.

Producer David Selznick brought her back to movie popularity, though not, of course, to the stature she had as a child star. He presented her as a comely young woman with a flair for comedy.

Events continued to move along speedily for her. She became a wife at 17, a mother at 19, a divorcee at 21. Then at 22 she married again and announced she had definitely retired from films.

"I have signed a new contract—with Charles—the only contract I have," she said. She was referring to Charles Alden Black, son of the president of the Pacific Gas & Electric Company. Her previous husband was John Agar, scion of an Illinois meat packing family.

### Her Movie Rise

Shirley Jane Temple was born in Santa Monica, Calif., April 23, 1928, the third child of George F. and Gertrude Temple. The other children were boys. One, Jack, was 14, and the other, George, Jr., was 10 at the time of her birth. Mrs. Temple had always wanted a daughter.

With the boys at ages which did not require constant care, Mrs. Temple devoted much of her time to her daughter. Shirley started dancing almost as soon as she could walk. When the child was 3, her mother enrolled her in a dancing school.

A talent scout saw Shirley when he visited the dancing school. Soon she was appearing in baby comedies. She graduated to bits in feature pictures. Then came a series of two-reelers in which she played the baby sister of an adolescent boy. Those landed her a role in a Fox musical called "Stand Up and Cheer."

Warner Baxter, Madge Evans, John Boles and James Dunn were the stars in that. Shirley was just another cute kid actress. But the little girl with bobbing, yellow curls, big dimples and a broad smile proved in the music recording room that she was more than just another cute kid actress. She ispingly sang a song entitled "Baby Take a Bow." Mrs. Temple was asked if she would consider a contract for \$150 a week.

### Becomes a Star

After "Stand Up and Cheer," Shirley was lent to Paramount for "Little Miss Marker," probably the best-remembered of all her pictures. This was a Damon Runyon story of a poor, broken-down horse player who left his little girl as a marker—or security—for a horse bet on credit with his bookmaker.

There was an avalanche of fan mail for the little star and she soon was given top billing. On her 11th birthday 135,000 persons sent gifts or messages to her. Among her pictures were:

"Baby Take a Bow," "Bright Eyes," "The Little Colonel," "Our Little Girl," "Curly Top," "The Littlest Rebel," "Captain January," "Poor Little Rich Girl," "Dimples," "Stowaway," "Wee Willie Winkie," "Heidi," "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm," "Little Miss Broadway," "Just Around the Corner," "The Little Princess," and "Susannah of the Mounties."

The later pictures in which she appeared included: "Since You Went Away," "I'll Be Seeing You," "Kiss and Tell," "That Hagen Girl," "Honeymoon," "The Bachelor and the Bobby-Soxer," "Miss Annie Rooney," "Mr. Belvedere Goes to College," and "Kiss for Corliss."

Besides her income from pictures, the young actress received royalties from the sale of "Shirley Temple dolls" and "Shirley Temple dresses." Her father, a banker, handled the financial end of her affairs.

#### Her Two Marriages

The 17-year-old Miss Temple and Agar were married in the early autumn of 1945 in the Wilshire Methodist Church in residential Los Angeles. Gov. Earl Warren and his family were among the guests. Agar then was 24 years old and a sergeant in the Air Force. There were 500 invited guests, but a crowd of 5,000 gathered outside the church.

In January of 1948 the former child actress added motherhood to her roles. A daughter was born to her in the Santa Monica hospital and was named Linda Susan. The Agar marriage ended in divorce in the winter of 1949.

Miss Temple's maiden name was restored by the decree and she received custody of the child.

On a trip to Honolulu she met Black. Soon they were going together and in December of 1950 were married in a civil ceremony at Del Monte, Calif., a few days after her divorce became final. She was 22 and Black was 31. It was Black's first marriage.

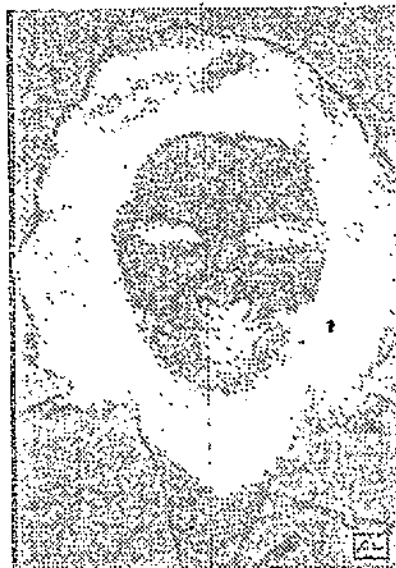

The baby, a girl, weighed in at 7 pounds 1 ounce at 6:43 p.m. while her father and grandparents paced the corridor outside.

Dr. William C. Bradbury, the attending physician, delivered the baby by Caesarian section. He reported that everything went satisfactorily.

The former child actress, now Mrs. Charles Black, was born in the same hospital 26 years ago this month—on April 23, 1928.

She has a daughter, Linda Susan, 6, by her marriage to Actor John Agar, which ended in divorce in 1949. She was married to Black in 1950 and they have a son, Charles Jr., 2.

# Shirley Temple's Show Has Brilliant TV Debut

Shirley Temple, the mar-  
velous moppet of another  
age, returned to show busi-  
ness last night as hostess  
and narrator of a brilliant  
new television series called  
Shirley Temple's Storybook.

Judging by the initial  
presentation of the ancient  
French legend, "Beauty and  
the Beast," Shirley and her  
show should be around for  
years to come. Because this  
was one of the pleasantest  
hours the little electronic  
medicine show has given us  
this season. It will be pre-  
sented monthly in color dur-  
ing the next 12 months.

The first show brought to  
the screen a delicate and  
beautifully conceived tale  
that made no compromise  
with this Atomic Age, but  
told truly and simply a fairy  
story, woven of the stuff of  
childhood dreams.

*2 Gentle Realism 3*

With a growling, growl-  
ing Chariton Heston, wear-  
ing a hairy, fanged head that  
was half lion, half bear, as  
the Beast, and with the ra-  
diant Clare Bloom as Beau-  
ty, the play unfolded in a  
gentle, wide-eyed realism  
that left no doubts in even  
the toughest and most lit-  
eral of viewers that magi-  
cians still cast magic spells  
and that love can transform  
a monster into a prince.

The old fairy story was

told much as we remember  
it. A merchant (E. G. Mar-  
shall) with three daughters,  
two vicious and selfish (June  
Lockhart and Barbara Bax-  
ley) and the third an angel  
(Miss Bloom), wanders in a  
storm into a strange forebod-  
ing castle where there lives  
a beast that walks as a man.  
He steals a rose for his  
daughter, Beauty, and the  
Beast's wrath descends upon

him. However, the Beast  
agrees not to kill him if he  
will send one of his daugh-  
ters in his place.

The daughter who agrees  
to come is, naturally, Beauty.  
She learns to love the beast  
for his kindness and his good  
heart, saying that "in many  
a man there is the heart of  
a monster, but there can be  
in a monster the heart of a  
man."

After a great deal of

hanky-panky in which the  
beast almost dies (for love),  
she agrees to marry him and  
he is transformed into a  
prince.

Miss Temple as hostess  
seemed little changed from  
the tiny beauty who won the  
hearts of the world on the  
screen 20 years ago. Wear-  
ing a flowing, shimmering  
gown, she sang the theme  
song of the series in a small

but pleasant voice that re-  
minded many a watcher of  
her days of singing "The  
Good Ship Lollypop."

She narrated the tale with  
a childlike enthusiasm that  
sounded much as if she were  
telling it to her own three  
youngsters.

# The Best Thing In Life

It's a long way from child star to child-raising,

These days juvenile problems demand, and get, a great deal of attention. The voices and pens of all sorts of experts have been telling us about the problems of youth. The finger of guilt points in every direction.

However, almost everyone seems to believe that parental influence can go a long way toward preventing the rebellious tendency of young people today. My husband and I certainly agree with this, as do most other American parents.

We believe firmly in the essential goodness of all children. But theirs is a fragile goodness, easily shattered by the ones who love them most, their parents. Too much supervision may encourage weakness; too little guidance and they become bewildered. Over-indulgence makes them weaklings, and harshness encourages rebellion. Being a successful parent is a tricky business, as we all know. Maybe that is why we all have little signposts to mark our way.

My husband and I have a particular favorite among our own signposts.

It is neither original nor startling; quite the contrary. It is simply: kindness.

We have found that everyday kindness is a practical key to happy and productive living. Now I don't for a moment mean to confuse kindness with softness. For instance we certainly want Charles Jr. to run a football with his knees high and a stiff arm for the tackler. But we'd also like to see him give that same tackler a helping hand after the whistle.

We constantly stress to our three children the spiritual nature of kindness. Understanding, sympathy, compassion and forgiveness all spring from kindness. Anyone who is kind soon finds that kindness is returned to him, providing a double satisfaction.

Kindness, as an everyday habit, leads directly to successful and happy growth in children. In our family this is one of the most important building blocks in the game of living which all parents and their children play.

Nor can I. I remember so well visiting Shirley when her husband was in the Navy. They were living in a tiny house in Bethesda, Md., just outside Washington, D.C. She was not only taking care of Susan but doing her own cooking and housework. She even ran a tractor to cut down the deep grass in front of the house.

#### Close Touch

She told me how amused she was when five people got out of their car, lined up on the fence and watched her working, dressed in blue jeans, sweater and with a scarf over her head. She heard one of them say, "Wouldn't you think Shirley Temple could hire a man to do that hard work instead of a woman?"

Soon after my visit, her second child, Charles Jr., was born at the Navy medical center near her home. It wasn't Shirley's idea to have her baby at government expense. A public relations-minded naval officer thought it would be good for Navy morale to have a famous actress who parlayed a crown of golden curls, a dimpled smile and dancing feet into millions of dollars, give birth to her child in a Navy hospital like any other Navy wife.

I've kept in close touch with Shirley over the years. Her life has been a pattern for all the youngsters who became stars at a ten-

der age. But they haven't all had the wise parents who guided Shirley. Her mother was a wise and loving woman; her father, a banker, took care of her finances. She's one of the richest girls in the industry. Her husband refuses to allow her to spend her money on their home or for living expenses.

A year or so ago I visited the Blacks and took Rory Calhoun along to do commentating on a fashion show at Menlo Circus Club for benefit of Stanford Convalescent Home. While waiting for Shirley, Rory and I were entertained by her daughters.

Susan got out Shirley's scrapbooks and her tiny sister insisted upon giving us the facts of the pictures. Charles Jr. was in bed with a bad cold.

#### Children Critics

Each child has a bedroom with appropriate signs on each door. Charles has a pair of boxing gloves on his. There were few mementoes of Shirley's past glory. In Susan's room was a beautifully made stage setting and one doll; all the rest of her things had been given away.

Shirley furnished their home herself. It is done in good taste. She told me she was decorating homes for some friends, too. She has a passion for interior decorating.

Since her marriage she has refused all stage and motion picture offers and many from TV, but this TV series is one she liked so much she couldn't turn it down because "these are fairy tales I have read and reread to my children and they have acted out with their friends. And believe me, we'd better do them well or my children will begin criticizing. They never let me off lightly."

Shirley says that none of her children have shown signs of following in her footsteps.

"Susan loves the piano, butterflies and bugs. Lori, the younger sister, isn't at all impressed with my acting ability. But if they wanted to go into show business I wouldn't mind. Show business has been good to me. It's helped give me a happy, balanced home with family and friends, and what more could anyone ask?"

# Mrs. Black Out of S.F. Film Festival

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Shirley Temple Black, child movie star of the 1930s, has bowed out as a director of the San Francisco Film Festival because of the selection committee's refusal to ban a film she terms "pornographic."

Mrs. Black, 37, now a suburban Woodside housewife, announced her resignation at a press conference Wednesday and described the film as one which "merely utilizes pornography for profit."

The Swedish entry, "Night Games," directed by Mai Zetterling, is the story of a man corrupted by a seductive mother and crippled in his sex relationship with his wife.

Albert Johnson, a member of the selection committee and a recognized authority on film art, disagreed with Mrs. Black, saying "This film must be accepted as a serious film."

The film was presented in a closed showing at the recent Venice Film Festival with only critics and journalists in attendance. But the New York Times stated that "there

seems little in 'Night Games' to argue a sound censorship case."

Mrs. Black was chairman of the festival's program division and a member of the board of directors. The festival opens Oct. 20 for a 10-day run.

Festival officials said that Mrs. Black attempted to prevent the film from being shown here and, failing persuasion, presented the festival with an ultimatum: Either the film went or she went.

Several members of the film selection committee, which included Barnaby Conrad, artist, novelist and film maker, and Herbert Gold, novelist and film maker, said they would quit if the film wasn't shown.

The committee voted 5-1 to show the film.

## Shirley Temple Plans to Run

Shirley Temple, the curly-haired screen darling of three decades ago, plans to announce next week that she will be a Republican candidate for Congress, it was learned Thursday.

The former child star, now Mrs. Charles Black and a mother of three children, will enter the lists for Congress in a special election Nov. 14 in San Mateo County's 11th District, called to fill the unexpired term of the late Rep. J. Arthur Younger (R-San Mateo).

The 39-year-old resident of Atherton, an affluent community south of San Francisco, will seek to follow Sen. George Murphy and Gov. Reagan as the third show business performer in the state to be elected to high political office on the Republican ticket since 1964.

Mrs. Black is reported to have been taking "issue lessons" from Sen. Murphy, her onetime dancing partner in the movies. He reportedly gave her a cram course on the issues voters want to hear discussed, and what positions she should take on such issues.

Mrs. Black could not be reached

for comment Thursday. But her decision to run did not come easily.

On June 2, she said flatly that she would not be a candidate to succeed Younger.

Four weeks later, after four GOP candidates had gotten in the race, she changed signals and said she was giving "most serious consideration" to her candidacy.

Then came a lull when she didn't say "yes" or didn't say "no."

SAN MATEO, Calif., Aug. 29

—Shirley Temple learned early in her childhood that the best time to memorize her lines for the next day's film shooting was just before going to sleep. Shirley Temple Black, now 39 years old, followed her mother's teaching last night at her Woodside home. It was the eve of a momentous event—the announcement of her candidacy for Congress—and the former child movie star did not want to have to read her four-page prepared statement at a news conference today.

Thus, when she stood before a microphone-laden table, facing a formidable array of television cameras, she only occasionally glanced at her sheet of papers. She had the words well in mind.

"She is a fast reader and a good retainer," a friend said. "She does her homework on anything she decides to tackle."

"But this is not a one-shot thing," one speculated. "Shirley is looking long-range. She is dedicated to public service. She is not saying 'Gee, I'd like to cap my career with a term in Congress.' It could be the Senate some day."

A Millionaire at 12

She began tackling movie scripts at the age of 3, and, during the nineteen-thirties, as a blonde-curl symbol of all the best in childhood, she earned more than \$3-million by the time she was 12. She was credited by President Franklin D. Roosevelt with having been an influence in lifting the nation's morale out of the slough of the Great Depression.

The former "Little Miss Marker" and skipper of the "Good Ship Lollipop" of the movie screen, who now pushes a shopping cart as she buys groceries once or twice a week in a Menlo Park supermarket, is following her friends Gov. Ronald Reagan and Senator George Murphy of California, also former film stars, in seeking public office.

Close friends surmise that she has obtained the blessing of both the Governor and her one-time dancing partner, the Senator, before finally deciding to try for the Congressional seat left vacant by the death of Representative J. Arthur Younger.

"But this is not a one-shot thing," one speculated. "Shirley is looking long-range. She is dedicated to public service. She is not saying 'Gee, I'd like to cap my career with a term in Congress.' It could be the Senate some day."

She has applied herself assiduously in the San Mateo County, and also to an extent in San Francisco, to Junior League activities and to the work of such organizations as the Children's Health Council of the Mid-Peninsula, the Woodside-Atherton Auxiliary to the Stanford Children's Convalescent Hospital, the Peninsular Children's Theater Association and the National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

In activities such as the Children's Health Council

work, a friend reported, "Shirley worked at the health center as a receptionist, secretary and volunteer chairman, and when a rummage sale came along she was there selling articles."

Governor Reagan recently appointed her a member of the Advisory Hospital Council of California. She has won many awards from educational and professional organizations, including one last year from the National Press Club "in recognition of meritorious service to correspondents of press, radio and television in the nation's capital."

The most widely publicized recent incident involving Mrs. Black occurred during the San Francisco Film Festival last October. She re-



signed as chairman of that festival's program division because of inclusion in the festival of the Swedish film "Night Games" ("Natt Lek"), which she called "pornography for profit."

A storm of controversy followed. She received more than 3,000 letters for her stand, with an asserted 90 per cent backing her.

While Mrs. Black was under attack for being "prissy," a friend related, her son reported home from Manlo School, where he was being chided by fellow students with the remark "Gee, your mom's a square."

"Shirley," the friend said, "gave a little speech to the family on the courage of your convictions, and that was that."

Before she finally ended her movie career in 1949, after appearing in a few films as a late teen-ager, she had appeared in more than 35 movies. Since then she has narrated a television series, "Shirley Temple Story Book," then was hostess and actress on "The Shirley Temple Show" and hostess of "Shirley Temple Presents Young America on Stage," a two-hour live program about high school dropout problems. Her hour-long television shows have numbered about 40.

The newly announced candidate lives with her husband, Charles A. Black, and her three teen-age children in the suburb of Woodside, about 30 miles south of San Francisco.

The Black family is known to friends and neighbors as one with close rapport, one in which the son and two daughters have been encouraged to take part in family discussions as they grew up.

The oldest child, Linda Susan, 19 years old, is a daughter by her first marriage, to John Agar. The Black children are Charles Alden, 15, and Lori Alden, 13.

"The family eats together and there is a lot of communication between parents and the kids," an observer related. "Dinner is a long affair. When there's a party, little Lori and Charlie are at the door taking hats and coats of the guests."

Mrs. Black has a housekeeper, with whom she makes up the grocery list before she goes to market to select her

# McCloskey Claims Poll Lead Over Mrs. Black

SAN FRANCISCO — Paul N. (Pete) McCloskey produced a poll Thursday indicating that he has forged ahead of Shirley Temple Black in the race for the 11th District congressional seat.

The poll, taken by the San Francisco marketing research firm of Corey, Canapary & Galanis for McCloskey's campaign organization, indicated that McCloskey now has 19.3% of the vote to 15.7% for Mrs. Black.

Others who placed high in the door-to-door sampling of 600 of the 500,000 residents in San Mateo County were:

William Draper, 12.2%; Sheriff Earl Whitmore, 9.8%, and Edward J. Keating, 8.7%.

All but Keating are Republicans.

McCloskey told a news conference here that 25% of the voters were still undecided on the basis of the poll, taken last week.

He said the same firm took a poll for him in September which showed him with only 7.9% of the vote. Ahead of him in that sampling were Mrs. Black, the former child movie

star, with 15.7%; Whitmore, 14.7%; Draper, 9.2%, and Keating, 8.7%.

McCloskey, 40, is an attorney and lieutenant colonel in the Marine Corps Reserve who received the Navy Cross, Silver Star and Purple Heart as a rifle platoon leader in Korea. He advocates a gradual withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam.

He accused Mrs. Black of preaching "fear, hate and anger" in warning voters against his Vietnam position. He read from a press release issued by Mrs. Black in which she claimed, "He (McCloskey)

would abandon South Vietnam to the Viet Cong and the North Vietnamese even though by his own admission it would bring on the butchery of 1.5 million people."

McCloskey said he has no such intention.

"I have repeatedly said that we must provide a

sanctuary for those Vietnamese who face reprisals for past cooperation with the United States."

He said this could be accomplished by evacuation to non-Communist countries or to an "international settlement" set up as an enclave at Cam Ranh Bay in South Vietnam and guarded by U.N. forces.

Eleven candidates, seven Democrats and four Republicans, are contending at a special election Tuesday for the 11th District seat vacated by the death last June of Rep. J. Arthur Younger, a Republican.

## ELECTION: McCloskey Defeats Mrs. Black

California voters in 1964 elected a movie song-and-dance man as U.S. senator. In 1966 they elected a movie actor governor. But last week voters of the 11th Congressional District (San Mateo County) decisively rejected a former child movie actress, now 39, who wanted to go to Washington as a congresswoman.

Paul N. McCloskey Jr., 40, a liberal Republican and decorated hero of the Korean War who advocates a gradual withdrawal of U.S. troops in Vietnam, defeated Mrs. Shirley Temple Black, 52,878 votes to 34,521 on the Republican ticket.

McCloskey will face Roy A. Archibald in a runoff election Dec. 12. Archibald, 47-year old San Mateo councilman and a defender of President Johnson's policy in Vietnam, received only 15,069 votes to become the Democratic nominee.

### Party Lines Crossed

Because there are 117,816 Democrats to 96,000 Republicans registered in the district, it was plain that many Democrats crossed party lines to vote for McCloskey because they feared Mrs. Black might otherwise win. They could vote for a candidate of either party because it was a special election to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Rep. J. Arthur Younger, a Republican.

Shirley Temple Black, strongly hawkish, favored leaving the war up to military leaders. The attitudes on the war of the 10 candidates who sought the seat ranged from Mrs. Black's stand to that of Edward M. Keating, a Democratic candidate who ran second to Archibald and who advocated an immediate withdrawal from Vietnam. Keating is the founder of Ramparts magazine.

McCloskey was cautious about interpreting his heavy backing as indicating most voters in San Mateo County precisely support his position on the war. However, he said:

"I'm sure a lot of people are not yet ready to accept the fact that what we are doing there is wrong, but I think a gradual shift is beginning to take place toward a rejection of the President's policy."

### How Will Democrats Vote?

He said he would shape his campaign for the runoff to keep the Democrats who voted for him. Archibald said he was confident he could win them back because many of them voted for McCloskey solely to stop Mrs. Black.

One thing both McCloskey and Archibald agreed upon: The Vietnam War is the No. 1 issue in next month's runoff.

Shirley Temple Black vowed to continue in politics. "I am dedicating my life to public service because the country needs us now more than ever before and I want to help," she said.

# Shirley Temple Black Takes New Role

PASADENA — Shirley Temple has returned to Southern California to begin a new career.

When she spoke Thursday to East Pasadena-Sierra Madre Republican Women's Club, the one-time child star was introduced as Mrs. Charles Black but was warmly received as a potential "Mrs. Republican."

Her future, she said at the Huntinton-Sheraton, is in fund-raising.

"I've decided not to run again in the June primaries," she announced, answering an important question after her recent defeat for the GOP nomination in the 11th Congressional District in San Mateo County.

"So I'll be a fund-raiser, at least for awhile," she said.

Showing traditional trooper spirit and some of the same old ability to bring in the cash, she flashed the famous

dimples and said, "If Ronald Reagan has raised \$2 million, I can raise \$2,000!"

"I've received 300 invitations to speak and I worked with the Republican National Committee to figure out which I'd accept."

"Many of them will be little groups in little towns. In one midwestern town I'll be addressing the Contractors and Lathers Assn., of all things."

When asked why, the answer was a simple—"Because they asked me."

The reason she was in Pasadena was similar.

"This was one of the first invitations I received, early last year before the election," she said. "I accepted the ones that said, 'We want you, win or lose,' so here I am."

The speaker, who smilingly and willingly admits she'll be 40 in April, is still easily identifiable as Shirley Temple. Her costume Thursday featured demure ruffles at the neck and wrists of her Navy dress, a skirt that

came to her knees but still showed plenty of lacy hosiery, a wide wrist watch and lots of big diamonds on her fingers.

Her audience, which had to be moved to the hotel's largest dining room because of the large turnout, was similar. There were hundreds of beautifully dressed and coiffed women, mostly about the speaker's age.

"I like appearing before women," she said. "Fortunately, I'm a woman, so we understand each other."

"I'm very much a Republican, but I'm a woman and a mother first, and

that, I think, is what motivates me."

Though her talk was designed to be a pep talk pleading for Republican unity, Mrs. Black spoke from a feminine viewpoint. She discussed Vietnam, juvenile crime, narcotics and inflation at both the press conference and luncheon talk.

"Women are really very involved in everything, just from the nature of their roles," she said.

While declaring to be pro-female, she nevertheless insisted she will not support any particular

women for office or even encourage women to enter politics.

"Women have a difficult time running for office," she explained. "For one thing, you must have a husband who wants you to have a career and who will be supportive. Mine is that kind, thank goodness.

"Then you have to have good children--those who have no more than the usual problems for their ages. I'm fortunate with this, too." The Blacks, who live in Atherton, have children aged 20, 16 and 14.

Implying the need for money, Mrs. Black added, "You have to have a home that will run all right without you, and you also have to be able to get home once in a while when you're on a speaking tour.

"There are lots of problems in running for office, and one of the biggest is that you're running against men. I was running against 12!"

o This is truly a marvelous nation. We entrust our bodies to doctors; our eyes to optometrists; our leaky pipes to plumbers; our machines to engineers; and our teachings to educators.

All of these specialists are trained over a period of years and, hopefully, become sensitized to the complexities of their professions. But such a contradictory people are we that we entrust the weaving of our political framework to men and women who have had little or no training in their chosen field—the profession of politics. Clearly, the vast majority of our politicians learn while they practice on their constituents.

How else can one explain the candidacy of a Shirley Temple Black? In our unrelenting accent on achievement, we blithely state that success in any area of life is adequate training for the world of politics. Prof. Minott's book is, in part, a study of Shirley Temple Black's campaign to become Republican Congresswoman from the 11th Congressional District in a special 1967 election. Little reason existed to

question that she could not achieve electoral success. Her two Hollywood friends, Ronald Reagan and George Murphy, had utilized mass media exposure to gain entrance into politics just a few short years before her own announcement. Amazingly, she did not make it.

Or perhaps not so amazing.

The winner, Paul N. (Pete) McCloskey Jr., a young lawyer and former Marine, is described as a moderate, middle-of-the-road Republican who supported negotiations in Vietnam and had an interest in problems such as high taxes, racial conflict and social justice. But his political experience and exposure, like Mrs. Black's, was limited.

The title of the book unfortunately detracts from its major emphasis, which is a graphic study of a local election: the problems of an amateur running for office, his attempts to learn the nature of the issues, the organizing of many young, eager volunteer workers and the woes and afflictions of a person seeking a political office.

## Shirley Temple, Mate May Get U.S. Posts

\$28,000-a-Year State Department Job  
Reported for Her, Similar One for Black

Exclusive to The Times from a Staff Writer

WASHINGTON — Mrs. Shirley Temple Black and her husband, Charles Black, are candidates for posts in the Nixon Administration, informed sources said Friday.

The former child film star is being considered, along with several others, for the \$28,000-a-year post of deputy assistant secretary of state for educational and cultural affairs.

Her husband has been proposed for an unspecified post of comparable rank, it was said. A decision on both jobs is expected within a week.

White House Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler declined comment on the possibility of Mrs. Black's appointment beyond saying, "She's very qualified."

Mrs. Black also had no comment.

According to a story in the Detroit Free Press, Mrs. Black would supervise about 50 persons working with foreign visitors, American specialists traveling abroad, visa matters affecting exchange students and public information and reports.

The story said the office of White House personnel chief Harry Dent reported "several things" were under consideration for Black, a wealthy businessman.

Mrs. Black was an unsuccessful Republican congressional candidate in 1967. She was defeated by Rep. Paul N. McCloskey Jr. (R-Calif.) in a special election for the 11th Congressional District, seat in San Mateo.

America owes Shirley Temple a debt that many Americans still acknowledge, though some have forgotten. More than any other film figure, the little chubby one she used to be cheered folks through the sad era called The Depression.

The little girl whose dancing feet, dimples, bobbing curls and baby voice lightened some of the darkest hours of the century is a big girl now. The baby is gone, and in her place is a lovely young dramatic actress. But in charm of personality, and in dancing, singing and acting ability, she is still the same old Shirley.

During the filming of one of her "adult" pictures, RKO Radio's "Honeymoon," she turned another milestone in her career. On April 23,

1946, Shirley became eighteen. That meant that she passed from the control of state welfare officials, teachers, and in general, the close regimentation of a child film star's life. The picture itself, a gay romantic comedy by Wicki Baum, presented Shirley for the first time as a young but strictly adult lady.

Two years before that, David O. Selznick had signed Shirley Temple, then 15, after she had been off the screen for more than 25 months, the longest idle period in her career. Her three subsequent pictures, "Since You Went Away," "I'll Be Seeing You" and "Kiss and Tell" promptly proved that her fans were willing to follow her from childhood to young womanhood.

Shirley was born April 23, 1928, at Santa Monica Hospital in Santa Monica, a few miles from Hollywood on the Pacific Ocean.

At this time her father, George F. Temple, was an associate of the California Bank, in Los Angeles. Born in Fairview, Pa., he had come to Los Angeles in 1903. Shirley's mother, Gertrude Temple, had been born in Chicago. The couple had three children, Jack being 14 when Shirley was born, and George Jr., was 10. The former served in World War II in the Air Corps, the latter in the Marines.

When Shirley was two, her mother noticed that Shirley had a fine sense of rhythm, and casually decided to have her take dancing

lessons in a Los Angeles school where lessons were one dollar apiece. The investment was due to pay big dividends!

After her third lesson a film scout approached her family. He wanted Shirley for a series of baby burlesques of famous pictures. At first the family was inclined to refuse the offer, but finally, "just for the fun of it", accepted. After the two-year-old had appeared in a succession of the baby pictures, stars of the period, such as Zasu Pitts, predicted a brilliant future for her, and she was given bit parts in full length pictures, such as "Red Haired Alibi" and "Out All Night." During this time she made four other two-reelers and "Frolics of Youth" and a Paramount Western, "To The Last Man."

At a preview one night, Jay Gorney, the celebrated musician, urged Mrs. Temple to take Shirley to 20th Century-Fox the following day for a part in "Stand Up and Cheer." Mrs. Temple took his advice. Of 150 children out for the role, Shirley got it, and her tests so impressed studio officials that they offered her a contract starting at \$150 per week.

After a very serious debate -- for accepting the offer meant they were committing Shirley to a film career "for keeps" -- the Temples decided to accept the offer. Meanwhile Shirley worked in her small role in the picture and recorded the song -- now famous, -- called "Baby, Take A Bow."

Naturally, the Temples have never regretted their decision.

They believe that Shirley has had a natural, happy childhood, has grown up unspoiled and has never been handicapped in any way by her career, either as a child or now, as a "grown-up."

After "Stand Up and Cheer" her popularity rocketed. Paramount borrowed her for "Little Miss Marker"; then Fox recalled her for "Baby, Take a Bow." Next came "Curly Top," "The Littlest Rebel," and the long succession of pictures that brought Shirley authentic and lasting fame, and along with it, fortune.

In 1936, Shirley won a special Academy Award for cheering up a depression-weary country.

For eight years she reigned as Hollywood's unchallenged juvenile acting and popularity queen. At the age of 12, after completing "Young People," the screen's great little lady paused. She has been entered as a student at Westlake School for Girls in Los Angeles, after making excellent progress in studio school. Her mother announced that for awhile, at least, pictures were out, and Shirley would be given a chance to concentrate on her studies.

It was a rather bold move, considering how quickly movie fans forget their idols. But fortunately, the arrangement lasted only 3 years, and Shirley's fans were not so fickle as many; they didn't forget her in that period. Then came the Selznick contract and "Since You Went Away."

Still another milestone was passed in Shirley's career on September 17, 1945. On that date she married John Agar, then in the U.S. Army, at the Wilshire-Methodist Church in Los Angeles. On Jan. 30, 1948, there was born to the happy couple a child,

With all these changes the even tenor of the little star's life hasn't changed so much, behind the scenes or in front of the camera. She usually rises at 6:30, has a glass of orange juice, and a bit later a hearty breakfast. She attends to pets consisting of three dogs (a Cocker, a Scottie and a Pekingese), a macaw named Red and a canary named Bing. Then she's off for the studio, where she has seldom been known to be late by so much as a minute.

She learns her lines for next day each night in bed; rarely muffs one next day.

Shirley thinks she has had a grand childhood, that movie people are among the best and most interesting in the world, and that she has been a remarkably lucky girl to have grown up among them. She gives her parents a great deal of credit for her success, and hasn't a single regret for the part of her childhood that career took from her. In her opinion it substituted something vastly more interesting and generally beneficial for any time or energy it may have cost her.

"It was like a fairy tale," she summarizes, simply and sincerely.

# Another Appointment in Sight for Mrs. Black

## Ex-Child Film Star May Be Appointed to U.N. Committee on Pollution Problems

**UNITED NATIONS** — Shirley Temple Black is coming back—in diplomacy, not films.

Mrs. Black is expected to be named shortly as a U.S. representative to a U.N. committee working on world pollution problems.

She will serve as deputy to Christian Herter Jr., son of the secretary of state in President Eisenhower's cabinet. Herter is to head the U.S. delegation to the U.N. preparatory committee that will meet March 10 to start laying the groundwork for a June, 1972, international parley on environment questions to be held in Stockholm.

### Political Contact

It is intended to bring pollution specialists into active contact with world politicians who have the power to tackle supranational environment problems.

Mrs. Black presumably would be in line to represent the United States at that conference.

The former child movie star served last fall as the most-noticed representative on the five-member U.S. delegation to the U.N. General Assembly. Pollution was a major topic of her speeches, alongside youth and human rights matters.

But when the U.N. Assembly ended, so, apparently, did Mrs. Black's diplomatic career.

Not daunted, she wrote personal notes to both President Nixon and Secretary of State William P. Rogers, it has now been learned, asking for a new international assignment. As a result, she was offered the environment conference preparation job. This task should involve her in periodic diplomatic work from now through mid-1972 if she wishes.

Colleagues who got to know Mrs. Black well here last fall say they would not be surprised if she managed still further diplomatic roles. In an interview at the end of her term in December she said she hoped she would be appointed again as a U.N. delegate.

She suggested that it ought to be possible for a nonprofessional American delegate to make use of experience gained, and serve a second time. Representatives from other nations sometimes appear as delegates to more than one General Assembly.

### Cuts Across Policy

This idea cuts across standard U.S. policy of using the five slots for delegates and five for alternate delegates to honor political debts on a non-renewable basis.

American U.N. delegations are usually made up of professionals—the ambassador and his deputies; one congressman from

each party alternating between House and Senate; and a sprinkling of national civic leaders. In order to honor as many of the latter as possible, Presidents have traditionally named a new selection each year.

Mrs. Black urged that a President appoint prospective delegates to serve as alternates for a first year, gaining experience at the side of the professionals before becoming full delegates the next year.

### She's Persuasive

Her argument for appointment of delegates to more than one term is not expected to alter traditional practice. But the still-dimpled Mrs. Black appears to have been persuasive to some extent on her own behalf.

State Department specialists of the United Nations are still enthusiastic about her performance here last fall. Many of them privately say she surprised them.

"She did her homework," one Washington official summed up. "She was the most visible and most understandable symbol to most Americans that the United States is still interested in the United Nations. I scoffed when she arrived last September, with her Nixon purse and big smile. But not now."
