A search of Bureau indices, New York indices, and Washington Field indices contained no record concerning the captioned subject or the organization he allegedly represents. Bureau files did contain a few references to "Muslim Council" in New York during 1956 and 1957. This group had considerable influence over the Moslems in the U.S. in relationship to a pro-Egyptian attitude at that time. It could not be established whether this group is identical with the alleged group the subject represents.

WFO, after contacting [REDACTED] and determining that no further calls were received, closed this matter. Attached from WFO indicates that on 9/29/78 [REDACTED] of the Washington Star, [REDACTED] (phonetic) at 8 a.m. received a call from subject [REDACTED] stating he had kidnaped a CIA Agent named "John Taysle" (phonetic). At 10 a.m. [REDACTED] receiving a second call from the subject stating that "John Paisley" CIA Agent had been seized by their commando units in the Chesapeake Bay area. Allegedly subject indicated Paisley was valuable to them for identification of Zionist Agents in other countries. Other demands made were the release of all Muslim prisoners, a demand of one million dollars, and that Henry Kissinger be turned over to them. It is pointed out that "The Washington Post" on Friday, 9/29/78, reflected an article concerning the disappearance of John A. Paisley and that he was lost off his sloop somewhere in the Chesapeake Bay. Further the article indicated he was separated from his wife. It is to be noted that "The Washington Star" representatives did not receive any calls concerning this until after the article regarding Paisley's disappearance appeared. The Intelligence Division has been in contact with CIA, which agency furnished information concerning John A. Paisley and details concerning his disappearance. WFO is not conducting an active kidnaping investigation inasmuch as evidence available does not support a legitimate kidnaping.

SA K. M. Raupach was personally acquainted with Paisley as a result of their mutual interest in amateur radio. Both made numerous contacts when Paisley was on an extended sailing voyage to Florida during the early part of 1978. Several messages of personal nature were relayed by SA Raupach from Paisley to his wife even though they were estranged at that time. [It should be noted that information reported by the U. S. Coast Guard indicated it appeared unusual that there were four radios on board Paisley's sloop which was named Brillig.] u Paisley used this radio equipment for amateur radio contacts and other radio equipment was strictly for Marine radio purposes. Paisley's amateur radio call was K4BM. [To date information available indicates U. S. Coast Guard is considering this a "man overboard" situation.] u

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CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

This concerns the disappearance of John A. Paisley, former Deputy Director of Strategic Research of the CIA, who disappeared from his sloop on the Chesapeake Bay on 9/24/78. Attached from Baltimore advises that [redacted] Maryland State Police, indicated that the body located in the Chesapeake Bay east of Solomons Island on 10/1/78 has been identified as that of Paisley through dental records. The coroner's autopsy report will reveal that death was caused by a gunshot wound to the left side of the head, approximately two inches above the ear; however, manner of death, suicide or homicide, is undetermined. It is the pathologist's belief that death was probably suicide based on the theory that Paisley had been in a mental depression in recent weeks due to the separation from his wife. The projectile fired in Paisley's skull was in two fragments and appeared to be a steel-jacketed projectile. State Police located a nine millimeter live round on his boat and two additional rounds at his residence. Further, it was determined Paisley owned an automatic either of .32 caliber or nine millimeter. No weapon has been recovered and it is believed to be in the Chesapeake Bay. Maryland State Police are not conducting the investigation as a homicide and after all logical investigation has been completed they will close the case. The family is arranging for the release of his body. Baltimore is maintaining liaison with Maryland State Police and the Bureau will be kept advised of pertinent developments.

You have been previously advised of the disappearance of John A. Paisley, former Deputy Director of Strategic Research of the CIA, currently affiliated with CIA in a consultant capacity.

Paisley was reportedly sailing in the Chesapeake Bay area on 9/24/78, alone, aboard his own boat. He was expected to return to port the same evening; however, when he did not return, the U.S. Coast Guard conducted a search, locating his abandoned vessel aground on the morning of 9/25/78.

The attached WFO teletype reports information received from the St. Mary's County Police, Maryland, that a Washington, D.C., resident, while sailing east of Solomon's Island in Chesapeake Bay, located the body of an unknown male in the Bay. The body was wearing two lead-weighted diving belts, jeans, a tee shirt, and tennis shoes. There was no identification on the body.

At the request of the Maryland State Police, the FBI Identification Division is attempting to identify the fingerprints of the deceased victim as possibly identical to the missing Paisley. The hands have been removed from the body and submitted to the FBI for examination.

You will be kept advised of pertinent information.

Former CIA Officer's Death Unofficially Called Suicide

Maryland investigators and friends of John Paisley, the former high-level CIA official who was found shot to death in the Chesapeake Bay, believe he took his own life because he had been despondent over his financial and marital affairs.

One source close to the investigation said the death has unofficially been ruled a suicide, but no formal determination will be released until the Coast Guard and Maryland State Police complete their investigations.

State police spokesman William Clark said Paisley's body was found Sunday floating in the bay at the mouth of the Patuxent River.

Clark said he died from a gunshot wound to the left side of the head and that 38 pounds of divers' weights were strapped to his waist and chest.

Paisley, 55, who lived in the 1500 block of Massachusetts Avenue NW, retired in 1974 as deputy director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research.

He was last seen Sept. 24 when he left a group of friends to sail his 31-foot sailboat, The Brillig, to Solomon's Island. The next day the owners of a private yacht found his sloop abandoned and aground near Point Lookout in St. Mary's County. Clark said there were no signs of a struggle.

THE BODY was found clothed in deck shoes, jeans and a T-shirt, according to Clark. He said the wound appeared to be a contact wound, which would indicate that Paisley was shot at close range. An automatic pistol that he had kept aboard the ship was missing, police said.

Retired Air Force Col. Norman Wilson, who met Paisley four years ago and allowed him to keep his boat at Wilson's Lusby, Md., dock, said he talked with Paisley the evening that he sailed.

"He called me on the short wave radio and said he was finishing up some paper work and would be in

later that evening," Wilson said. "I told him I would leave the dock lights on," he added.

A source said yesterday that Paisley was despondent over his recent separation from his wife, Maryann, who lives in McLean.

The source also said that Paisley had recently suffered several financial reverses and found it necessary to take out an unanticipated loan to meet a tax bill. "He had a lot of recent financial problems, but he kept most of them to himself," the source said.

WILSON SAID Paisley sought an early retirement from the CIA because "he wanted to spend a lot of time sailing. That was his one real love."

Six months ago, however, he applied for a full-time job and was hired by Coopers & Lybrand, an accounting firm with offices in Washington. A company spokesman, who characterized Paisley as "an intelligent and even-tempered man," said he was an executive assistant to the firm's president, Wayne Smith.

Wilson said Paisley frequently used the boat to work on office records and that it was not unusual for him to spend the night either on the boat or in a small cabin on the Wilson property.

Wilson said that after the boat was recovered it was brought to his dock, where it was searched by CIA and FBI agents. "They said they wanted to make sure that there were no classified documents on the ship," he said.

Wilson said that yesterday he inspected the boat and found an unspent pistol shell in the cabin. He said the shell fitted a 7mm pistol that Paisley kept aboard the ship.

"I KNEW he kept the pistol on the ship for protection," Wilson said. "I made a trip with him to the Florida Keys and he carried that pistol for protection when there was talk about pirates boarding and stealing private sailboats," he said. He said that when he inspected the boat yesterday the pistol was missing.

Wilson said he went over the sailboat and found that nothing else was missing, despite the fact that the boat was equipped with expensive electronic gear.

One source said it is believed that Paisley, an accomplished diver, wrapped the weights around his body, shot himself and then fell overboard with the pistol.

"He apparently tried to sink himself, but didn't realize that he didn't have enough weight, and that once the body gases began to form the body would rise to the surface," the source said.

"We believe he was trying to hide the suicide," he added.

Several of Paisley's friends, who asked that their names not be used, advanced the same theory and said that they too believed him to be concerned about his financial affairs and marital status.

"I think it's just a story about a guy, a nice guy who had too many

problems and couldn't deal with them," one of the friends said.

CLARK SAID that state investigators are still working and expect to make a formal determination within the next few days. "We're pursuing two possibilities. We don't know if it was a suicide or a homicide, but we are investigating both possibilities," he said.

Edward Paisley, 21-year-old son of the dead man, said his father was "in good spirits" the day he left on the sailboat, and he said he doubted his father's death was a suicide.

"My father was an excellent sailor and swimmer. He went down just about every weekend to sail. He seemed in good spirits. Everyone who talked to him that day said he was fine," he said.

The younger Paisley said he knew of no reason why someone would want to kill his father.

The dead man's estranged wife said her husband was an excellent swimmer, scuba diver and sailor and that at one time he had lived aboard his boat.

Suzanne Black, a CIA spokesman, said the agency would have no comment on the case. Another agency spokesman said the CIA "is not involved in the investigation in any way, but we will cooperate if asked."

A former CIA agent who has remained close to agency affairs told a reporter that Paisley was not involved "in the agency's clandestine work" and was not the subject of an investigation for any covert activity.

He said it is standard procedure for CIA representatives to accompany local law enforcement agencies when they investigate the unattended deaths of former CIA employees.

"Paisley was in research, he had never been assigned to Moscow and was never in a position to have access to sensitive information," the source said.

John A. Paisley, a former high-level CIA employee whose body was found Sunday floating in the Chesapeake Bay, either killed himself or was the victim of an execution-type murder, Maryland police said yesterday.

Police said they could not determine how the death occurred from an examination of Paisley's decomposed body, discovered wearing two scuba diving belts weighing 38 pounds.

The death of the former CIA official, who once had access to highly sensitive military secrets, is being investigated as "suspicious," said William E. Clark, a Maryland State Police spokesman.

Maryland Chief Medical Examiner Dr. Russell Fisher said Paisley, 55, who was last seen Sept. 24 sailing his 31-foot sloop on the bay, died of a gunshot wound above and behind the left ear.

The fatal bullet was fired from a 9 millimeter automatic pistol, the same

type of gun Paisley was known to keep aboard his sailboat, Fisher said. The gun has not been found, Maryland State Police said yesterday, but one 9 millimeter cartridge was found on board.

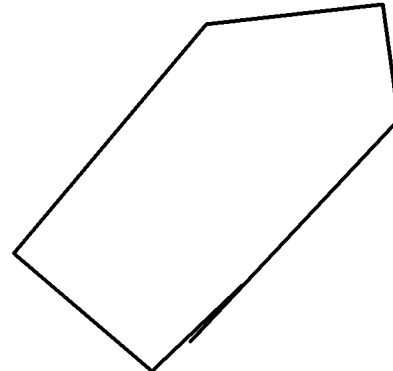
"I see no reason to doubt that Paisley's gun fired the fatal bullet," Fisher said.

The medical examiner said the decomposed body, identified yesterday through dental records, made it impossible to check for traces of gun powder on Paisley's hands, evidence which Fisher said would indicate suicide.

"There is no way of proving his death was a suicide," Fisher said. According to the pattern of the wound, the barrel of the gun that killed Paisley was pressed against his head when fired, he said.

Paisley, who was considered an expert sailor, once lived aboard his boat, the Brillig, for two years. He retired in 1974 as deputy director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research. That of-

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rice, according to a spokesman, "produces fine studies of foreign military programs and activities."

Paisley was in a position to know "highly sensitive" military secrets, according to a former CIA colleague.

The Brillig was found unoccupied but with its sails still set on the morning after Paisley disappeared. It had run aground near Point Lookout at the mouth of the Potomac River, 78 miles southeast of Washington.

Paisley's body was found Sunday afternoon about 15 miles north of Point Lookout near the mouth of the Patuxent River, according to the U.S. Coast Guard.

His body was dressed in blue jeans, a white pullover shirt and had no shoes, Fisher said. The diving weights were strapped around his waist. Paisley, according to his estranged wife Maryann, had recently completed a scuba diving course.

According to a close family member who did not want to be identified, Paisley often had been depressed while at

the CIA, but that recent months he had been "happier and more talkative than he ever was before."

In December, Paisley, at the urging of his family, participated in an encounter group called Lifespring, the family member said. "It seemed to give him a new outlook on life," the relative said.

Paisley had worked for the past six months as a consultant for the accounting firm of Coopers and Lybrand. He recently separated from his wife, who lives in McLean, and moved into an apartment at 1500 Massachusetts Ave. N.W.

On the day he disappeared, Paisley was sailing west across the bay from Hooper Island to his home mooring at Solomons, Md. At 6 p.m., he radioed to a friend at Solomons, retired Air Force colonel Norman Wilson, saying he was coming home after dark.

"He said he was going to do some paper work on the boat," Wilson said yesterday. "He sounded normal."

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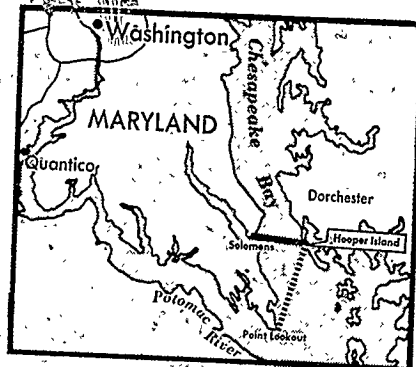

Paisley's boat was found near Point Lookout with its shortwave radio on, according to his wife. She said the steering mechanism on the sailboat was not locked into position.

Referring to speculation that Paisley may have fallen overboard while adjusting sails, his wife said that in several years of sailing she had never seen her husband tend the sails without locking the wheel. "He was a cautious, level-headed sailor," she said.

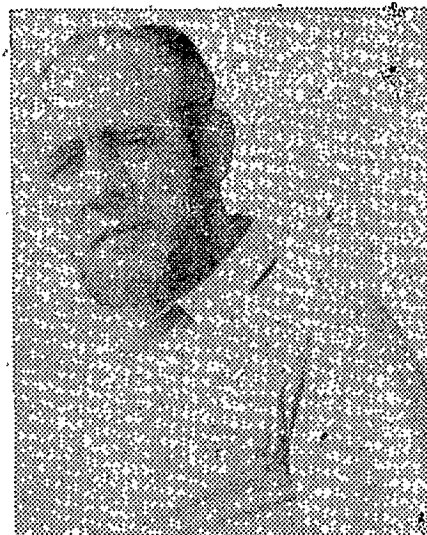
The boat's running lights were off when found, according to the Coast Guard. Wagoneer, also an experienced

sailor, said that fact probably means Paisley left his boat before dark—about an hour after his last radio communication.

John Harpold of the marine police said yesterday that drowning victims in the area of Chesapeake Bay where Paisley was last heard from are usually discovered within a few days because of the high volume of water traffic in the area.

"If the body is there, somebody is going to find it," Harpold said.

Paisley, who recently separated from his wife, lived at 1500 Massachusetts Ave. NW. He has two children, Diane, 20, and Edward, 21.

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Former CIA Employee Missing on Bay

John A. Paisley, a former high-level CIA employe described as an expert sailor, has been missing since Sunday when he was seen sailing alone in his 31-foot sloop across Chesapeake Bay, Maryland marine police reported.

Paisley's boat, the Brillig, unoccupied but its sails still set, was found the following morning where it had run aground near Point Lookout at the mouth of the Potomac River.

Paisley, 55, who retired in 1974 as deputy director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research, was last seen Sun-

day afternoon sailing west across the bay from Hooper Island toward his home mooring at Solomons, Md.

Following discovery of the empty sailboat the next morning, the Coast Guard began an extensive search involving three helicopters, two "utility" power boats, and a Coast Guard cutter. That search was discontinued Tuesday night after no trace of Paisley was found, but Maryland marine police continue to search waters near the mouth of the Potomac.

Paisley, who for the past six months has worked as a consultant for the accounting firm of Coopers and Lybrand, was an expert sailor who once

lived aboard his sailboat for more than two years, according to his estranged wife, Maryann Paisley of McLean.

Paisley was also an expert swimmer and scuba diver, capable of swimming several miles, she said.

Phil Wagoneer, a close friend of Paisley and a CIA employe, said yesterday that Paisley was sailing the Brillig on Sunday alongside another sailboat until the late afternoon. The second boat returned to its mooring at Solomons, Wagoneer said, and Paisley radioed at 6 p.m., saying he was coming home after dark.

Identity of Body Confirmed

The body of a man who was found in Chesapeake Bay wearing diving weights and with a bullet wound in his head has been identified as former CIA official John Paisley, Maryland state police said today.

Paisley, 55, was identified through dental records, and died from a gunshot wound to the head, authorities said.

Bill Clark, a police spokesman, said tests indicated the weapon was touching the victim's head at the time it was fired. That could mean either a suicide, or an execution-type murder, Clark said, adding that an investigation of the case was continuing. Clark said no weapon has been recovered.

Paisley, who lived in Washington, retired in 1974 as deputy director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research.

Death of Ex-CIA Man

The Senate Intelligence Committee began a secret investigation "several days ago" into the mysterious death of former CIA official John A. Paisley, a spokesman said yesterday.

Paisley, a 55-year-old former CIA analyst, was found floating in Chesapeake Bay last Sunday with a bullet wound in his head and 40 pounds of scuba diver weights wrapped around his waist.

Maryland state police are investi-

gating the death as a possible murder or bizarre suicide. Paisley's 31-foot sloop Brillig ran aground near Point Lookout, Md. Sept. 25, the day after he was last seen alive.

Police spokesman Cpl. Jerry Eiseman said yesterday that seven investigators have been assigned to the case and that detectives met yesterday with CIA officials at police headquarters in Pikesville, Md. "They (the agents) were able to shed light on Paisley's CIA activities," Eiseman said.

"The CIA is working with us. Because of the notoriety of this case we want to gear up the investigation and bring this thing to a head," he said.

A source close to the investigation said yesterday that documents found in a briefcase aboard the abandoned sailboat and marked "For Internal Use Only," were removed by the CIA before the police were called in, but Eiseman said he had no knowledge of missing evidence.

"We have to rely on the fact that

the CIA is telling us the truth," Eise-
man said. "They told us they took
nothing off the boat."

According to Paisley family attor-
ney Terrence O'Grady, the briefcase
contained typed and handwritten
notes on a CIA project Paisley had
been working on. Five of the docu-
ments were signed for and removed
by CIA representatives who were
called by a friend of the family,
O'Grady said.

CIA spokesman Dale Peterson yes-
terday denied that any papers had
been taken from the briefcase, but
said several documents marked "For
Official Use Only" were signed for
and removed by CIA officers from
Paisley's apartment at 1500 Massachu-
setts Ave. NW earlier this week. The
papers, according to Peterson, were

similar to the ones found in the brief-
case.

Peterson would not reveal the na-
ture of the project, but said Paisley
was a specialist in Soviet military eco-
nomics. Paisley retired from his post
as deputy director of the CIA's Office
of Strategic Research in 1974, but had
been retained as a consultant, the CIA
has revealed.

A Wilmington (Del.) Morning News
account citing unnamed CIA sources
this week drew a link between Pais-
ley's death and the alleged sale of
highly sensitive CIA documents to the
Soviet Union earlier this year by a
former CIA watch officer. The CIA
has labeled the story "absurd."

Citing the news account, Sen. Wil-
liam Roth (D-Del.) in a letter to the
intelligence committee yesterday
called for a full investigation "of the
theft of documents on the KH-11 sys-

tem, the loss of documents on any
other surveillance system and the al-
leged murder of Mr. Paisley."

Peterson yesterday denied that
Paisley was involved in work con-
nected with the KH-11 satellite sur-
veillance system, but said that while
he was a CIA analyst Paisley
"obviously had access to sources of in-
formation."

A committee spokesman yesterday
declined to elaborate on the prelimi-
nary investigation, but said "We're
looking into it. We've begun making
inquiries and we hope to answer Sen.
Roth's questions."

Paisley had separated from his wife
recently and moved to the Northwest
Washington apartment, and friends
said that Paisley had been depressed
about the breakup of his marriage.
But Paisley's wife, Maryann, who lives
in McLean, said Paisley had been
"in fine spirits" lately.

CIA Convinced Dead Analyst Took Own Life

A CIA spokesman says the agency is convinced that John Paisley, the retired agency official who was found shot to death in the Chesapeake Bay, took his own life. He discounted published reports which suggested that Paisley was a double agent for the Soviet Union.

The spokesman, Herbert E. Hetu, yesterday said Paisley became a consultant for the agency after he retired in 1974, but that he specialized in reports on Soviet military spending and did not handle or have access to highly classified information.

He said agency officials have been told by investigators that Paisley, who was reported to have been distraught over his marriage and his financial affairs, took his own life.

Hetu said a Maryland State Police investigation concluded Paisley wrapped skindivers' weights around his body, shot himself and then fell into the bay from the deck of his 31-foot sailboat, The Brillig.

HE SAID THE state police decided not to announce the findings after a Wilmington, Del., newspaper published reports suggesting that Paisley was a double agent who was linked to the disappearance of important papers dealing with the U.S. spy satellite system. "I guess they want to be very cautious about their findings," he said.

Knowledgeable sources inside and outside the CIA insisted that Paisley, who was deputy director of the agency's Office of Strategic Research when he retired, was never assigned to work on the satellite system, did not have access to classified information on the program and was not the subject of an internal CIA investigation.

Hetu confirmed reports that CIA agents were called to Lusby, Md., after a Coast Guard boarding party found Paisley's sloop aground in the Bay and reported finding classified documents on the ship.

A Coast Guard spokesman at Curtis Bay said the decision to call the CIA was made "after we found documents which appeared to be sensitive."

HETU SAID the Coast Guard found Paisley's CIA identification card in a wallet on the boat and then made "the inaccurate determination" that the papers found on the ship were classified CIA documents.

He said two agents examined the papers and then turned them over to Paisley's estranged wife, along with his other personal effects.

Retired Air Force Col. Norman Wilson, who owns the dock where Paisley kept his boat, confirmed CIA reports on the papers.

"I saw the papers. It was nothing more than a series of memos he was preparing on meetings. It was all pretty dry administrative stuff," he said.

Hetu, the CIA spokesman, said, "He was not involved in clandestine operations, and we are leaving the investigation of this incident to the Maryland State Police."

Paisley, who ended a 30-year intelligence career in 1974, was an avid salt-water sailor who took his sloop into the bay alone Sept. 24. He radioed Wil-

son that he would be returning to port later that evening. His body, with a bullet wound in the head, was found the following Sunday floating in the bay.

FRIENDS AND investigators said Paisley, 55, was depressed over several financial reverses and his recent separation from his wife, who lives in McLean. After that separation Paisley lived alone in an apartment at 1500 Massachusetts Ave. NW. He took a full-time job as a consultant with a Washington accounting firm.

Hetu confirmed that shortly after Paisley retired from the CIA he was retained as a consultant to the Military Economic Advisory Panel, which advises the agency's director on Soviet military expenditures and other economic affairs. He said Paisley was given this position because this was his area of specialization when he retired from the CIA.

"He was an analyst. He wasn't a spy," Hetu said.

Hetu said the CIA was not taking "an active role" in the investigation. "We are an overseas intelligence-collecting organization. We don't do domestic investigations. That is prohibited by executive order," he explained.

MARYLAND State Police Cpl. Jerry Eismann said the police have had no contact with the CIA apart from asking for help in the identification of Paisley's body from dental records.

"They have not approached us," Eismann said. "We asked them for help in identifying the body, and as far as I know that is the only connection we have had with the CIA or the FBI."

"It appears to be a suicide by all indications," a source in the Maryland medical examiner's office said. "There were no signs of a struggle."

An automatic pistol that Paisley kept aboard the boat for protection was missing, according to Wilson, the dock operator, who said he found a live cartridge in the ship's cabin.

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Police Say Cause Still Is Uncertain In Paisley Death

Maryland police said yesterday they are still unable to determine whether the death of John A. Paisley, a former high-level CIA employee found Sunday floating in Chesapeake Bay with a bullet wound in his head, was suicide or murder.

In an unusual response to newspaper reports that linked Paisley's death to his CIA involvement, the CIA yesterday announced that Paisley, at the time of his disappearance, was under contract as a CIA consultant studying "Soviet military expenditures and other economic affairs."

The intelligence agency labeled as "ridiculous" and "absurd" a copyrighted story in the Wilmington (Del.) News Journal which said the CIA fears Paisley was murdered by Soviet secret police because of his connection with the agency's satellite surveillance system.

CIA spokesman Dale Peterson said that Paisley, who retired in 1974 from his full-time job as deputy director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research, was not a spy and was not involved in clandestine activities for the agency.

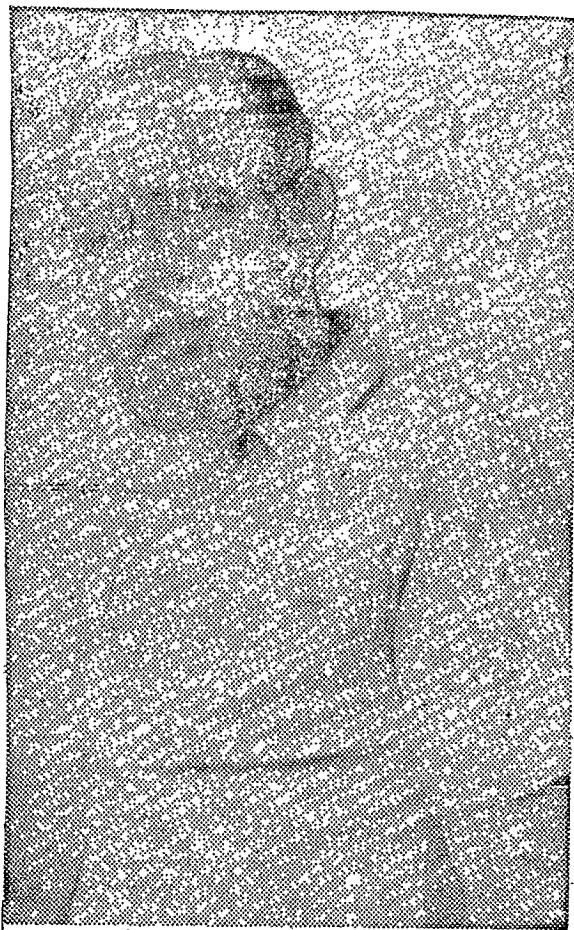
As a consultant, Paisley was "a member of the Military Economic Advisory Panel, composed of outside experts," Peterson said. "Much of this (work) is unclassified and released to the public."

Maryland's chief medical examiner, Dr. Russell Fisher, said Paisley, 55, who was last seen Sept. 24 sailing his 31-foot sloop on the bay, died of a gunshot wound to the left side of the head. The fatal bullet was fired from a 9 mm. automatic pistol, the type of gun Paisley was known to keep aboard his sailboat, Fisher said.

Police found an unspent 9 mm. cartridge aboard the sailboat, which was found unoccupied with its sails set on the morning after Paisley disappeared. It had run aground near Point Lookout at the mouth of the Potomac River.

It was learned yesterday that Paisley, although ambidextrous, used his left hand for writing. Fisher said the bullet that killed Paisley was fired with the gun touching the victim's head and the wound, above and behind the left ear, could have been self-inflicted.

Terrence O'Grady, a Falls Church attorney representing the Paisley family, yesterday denied reports that Paisley was heavily in debt at the time of his death. "I've had access to his financial records and there is no evidence of any debts that he couldn't handle with his consulting earnings," O'Grady said.

On September 30, 1978, [redacted] called the Indianapolis Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and furnished the following information:

[redacted] resides at [redacted] Indiana, and is employed at [redacted] Indiana. He advised that while visiting the Enterprise Night Club on North Post Road, Indianapolis, on September 29, 1978, he met and entered into conversation with a white female by the name of [redacted], who resides at [redacted] no telephone, whom he had never met prior to that night. Later as he initiated his departure from the lounge, [redacted] stated she had no way home and asked [redacted] to drop her off at her apartment.

As [redacted] was departing [redacted] car at her residence, she broke down and began crying. Upon questioning by [redacted] related that she is afraid for her safety because of her association with a "professional hit man," whom she has been seeing recently. She identified this "hit man" as [redacted], age approximately 24, who is an agent with the [redacted] home telephone [redacted] business telephone [redacted]. She continued that she was with [redacted] when he was presented a handgun by two other unknown white males and that she subsequently delivered [redacted] to the airport for a flight to kill a CIA Agent. She also stated that [redacted] has told her in confidence that [redacted]

[redacted] advised that [redacted] could well be a hooker but that he had no sexual contacts with her and that he has not seen her before or since this incident. He advised that she may have a mental record at the Gallahue Mental Health Center in Indianapolis.

It was determined that a [redacted] does in fact work for National Life and Accident Insurance Company in Indianapolis.

Police Complain Paisley Evidence 'Contaminated'

The investigation into the death of former CIA analyst John A. Paisley has been impeded because physical evidence was disturbed before the Maryland State Police officially entered the probe, according to a spokesman.

"We've been playing catch-up ball ever since Paisley's body was discovered," said William Clark. "We did not have an opportunity to go over his sailboat or to go through his Washington apartment until several other people had removed items from the boat and the apartment," he added.

"Our investigators have found that most of the physical evidence in this case has been contaminated," he said.

Clark said the Maryland State Police did not enter the investigation until after Paisley's body was found floating in the Chesapeake Bay, one week after his 31-foot sloop, the Brillig, was found aground off Point Lookout in Calvert County, Md.

Clark said that a Coast Guard boarding party, agents from the CIA, and several of Paisley's friends went on the boat before it was inspected by state police.

CIA SPOKESMAN Herbert E. Hetu confirmed that the agency sent two employees to Olivet, Md., after Coast Guard officials reported that classified documents might have been on board the ship.

Clark said personal items that were on the boat were gathered together and placed below deck by the Coast Guard. "That is probably standard procedure in a standard case when a boat is found aground or

adrift," he added. "But this is an exceptional case."

Clark said when investigators went to Paisley's Washington apartment they discovered that it had been "cleaned out" by his estranged wife, who lives in McLean, several days before his body was found.

Hetu said CIA employees went to the home of Maryann Paisley and recovered four CIA documents that had been marked "administrative use only" and several CIA identification badges. He could give no reason why Mrs. Paisley went to the apartment of her estranged husband before his body could be found.

Paisley, who retired in 1974 from his job as deputy director of strategic research, had been retained as a consultant to the agency on Soviet military spending. He was found in the bay with a gunshot wound in the head a week after his sailboat was found aground. He had 38 pounds of divers' weights around his waist.

CIA officials believe Paisley's death was suicide. Police said Monday that he was shot with a 9mm pistol, a weapon similar to the type of automatic pistol that he was known to have kept aboard his boat. But state police, who have assigned a team of seven investigators to the case, have not ruled out the possibility that he was murdered and that his death might have been related to his CIA employment.

"THE NORMAL TRAIL that we would have in a criminal investigation has been clouded because all of the evidence, all of the useful information, was disturbed or contaminated before we had an opportunity to examine it," Clark said. "The normal things that we would look for in

an investigation of this nature have all been disturbed," he added.

"It's very frustrating and very difficult to want to conduct a thorough investigation, to want to do a good job and not have the evidence available," Clark said.

Clark said the CIA is aiding in the investigation by "giving us any information that we ask for." But he said the intelligence agency does not have agents assigned to the case.

Maryland state police investigators have been conducting a probe into Paisley's background and are interested in his activities during the last several months of his life.

Last year Paisley attended sessions held by Lifespring, a California-based organization that holds "life awareness" sessions for participants. Sally Ann Robbins, a spokesman for the group's Washington office, confirmed that Paisley had participated in the sessions and had graduated from a series of classes in March of last year.

Carol Fletcher, another spokesman for the group, which has a Washington office at 1054 31st St. NW, said Lifespring "helps people get more out of life."

"WE HELP PEOPLE take an in-depth look at their lives. We help them with their communications and their relationships with others. We get people more in touch with themselves," she said.

She said she would not discuss Paisley's experience with the group, but did confirm that he "completed our initial training and graduated from the course." She said Paisley's wife also started taking Lifespring courses, but added that she did not attend classes during the same time her husband did.

Lifespring charges \$250 for the initial course and has a second course called "interpersonal experience" that costs \$650.

"There are things that prevent people from being who they really are," Fletcher said. "Some people have a negative view of themselves and so we take people who have poor self-images and get them to reassess their lives."

She said more than 1,200 Washington area residents have participated in the program since Lifespring began holding sessions here two years ago. She said the average age of participants is 45 and that most have incomes in excess of \$20,000 a year, and have college degrees.

But James Siegelman, author of a recent book on encounter groups, said the kind of training that Paisley received from Lifespring could have affected his mental attitude.

"Groups like Lifespring, and similar organizations, help people develop a tremendous physical high without the use of drugs. They actually get participants very, very high on life. This will usually last for several months, and then there is the

On October 18, 1978, [redacted] who is known also by the names [redacted] and [redacted] was interviewed at her residence at [redacted] Indiana. She furnished the following information:

She has known [redacted] for approximately three and one-half months and she believed he was going to marry her until she discovered he intends to marry her best friend. [redacted] never told her about any plot to murder a CIA Agent nor did he ever mention any other murders. He was arrested approximately two months ago for stealing hubcaps at which time police confiscated a pistol which was in his possession but which was registered to his brother. To the best of her knowledge, [redacted] has no other weapons and she never saw anyone give him a gun. She did not know where he lived; whenever she asked him where he lived or where he was going, he told her it was none of her business. He is an agent for [redacted] and as far as she knows, he has never worked for the government.

[redacted] recalled meeting a man named [redacted] a few weeks ago at the Enterprise Nightclub who gave her a ride home. She was somewhat upset about her relationship with [redacted] when she talked to [redacted] but she was unable to recall what she said to [redacted]. She frequently says things after she has been drinking or taking pills that she does not recall.

[redacted] stated that she has lived in Indianapolis, Indiana, approximately one year, having grown up in thirteen different foster homes. She denied a drug problem but advised that she has taken speed in the past and was recently hospitalized after taking a pill she later discovered contained heroin and LSD. On October 13, 1978, while she was [redacted] the Whitefront Lounge on West 16th Street in Indianapolis, she attempted to commit suicide and was arrested for disorderly conduct. She was released from custody on October 16, 1978, and was instructed to attend group therapy sessions at Community Hospital. She related that she had previously undergone psychiatric counselling for approximately one year to no avail. She has been married twice and of the five children she has had, three died and the other two were placed in the custody of their fathers'. She stated that she is very lonely and mixed up.

Traces of Gunpowder On Paisley's Hands, But Test 'Inconclusive'

Traces of a gunpowder residue have been found on the hands of John A. Paisley, who was found dead with a bullet wound in the head 12 days ago, but FBI tests have not proved conclusively that the former CIA analyst fired a gun the day he died, a Maryland state police spokesman said today.

The spokesman, William E. Clark, said investigators have been told Paisley's hands contained traces of barium antimony, a gunpowder ingredient. Clark added that though the FBI tests are "inconclusive, there is probably no other way that the trace elements could have gotten on his hands" than by firing a gun.

Maryland medical examiner Dr. Russell Fischer had asked the FBI to perform neutron activation tests on Paisley's hands. The process was developed to determine whether a person has recently fired a weapon. Fischer and an FBI technician said these tests are often inconclusive when performed on bodies that have been in the water because the elements chemists look for are water soluble.

Paisley's body was recovered from Chesapeake Bay on Oct. 1. It has been determined that the body had been in the water for more than a week.

CLARK DISCLOSED earlier that Paisley purchased 28 pounds of diver's weights and a belt to hold them from a Northwest Washington sporting goods store the day before starting his final voyage on the bay.

Clark said investigators have learned that Paisley bought the extra set of weights Sept. 23. Paisley already had a set of weights which he used when skindiving.

Paisley's body was found wrapped with the two sets of diving weights, but floating in the bay.

Friends had told investigators Paisley was known to own only one set of weights. They said they had never seen the second set.

Clark said the seven-man team investigating Paisley's death has talked to witnesses who saw the additional set of weights aboard Paisley's 31-foot sloop the day he sailed.

Tom Cooper, who manages the National Dive Shop in the 4900 block of Wisconsin Avenue NW, said Paisley was a frequent customer.

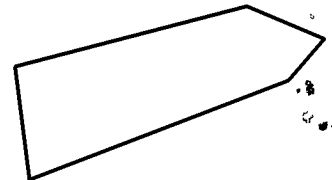
"The day he bought the weights, he was in a hurry. He bought the weights, a belt and some lubricant for diving equipment. He paid \$42.72 in cash for his purchase," Cooper said. "He appeared to be very much in a hurry on that day."

INVESTIGATORS AND CIA officials, who have said unofficially they believe Paisley committed suicide, have been attempting to determine the significance of the second set of weights that were wrapped around his body.

Friends in Olivet, Md., where Paisley kept his sailboat, told investigators they did not remember Paisley's ever owning two sets of weights.

Clark said Maryland investigators have been unable to substantiate the contention of a Cumberland, Md., woman who was a close friend of Paisley that he sold his 9 mm. automatic pistol last summer.

Ballistics experts said earlier this week that Paisley, who had confined to work for the CIA as a consultant after his 1974 retirement, had been shot by a bullet fired from an automatic similar to the one he was thought to have kept aboard his boat. Clark said investigators hope to conclude their investigation before the end of the week.

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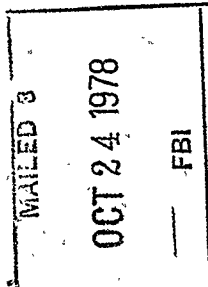
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Police Think Paisley Killed Himself.

Maryland investigators may never be able to say with certainty that John A. Paisley, a retired high-ranking CIA official, took his own life, but the results of their probe indicates that he did.

Col. Thomas A. Smith, superintendent of the Maryland State Police, said yesterday Paisley's death will be listed as an "undetermined death."

He said at least two investigators will continue their efforts to find out if the 55-year-old former CIA analyst shot himself and fell in to the Chesapeake Bay from the deck of his 31-foot sloop, the Brillig.

"If Paisley was anyone but a former high-ranking CIA official his death would have been classified as a suicide on the day his body was found," a source close to the investigation said.

"But this case was different because it might have involved compromises of U.S. intelligence, and Smith wanted to take it one step at a time. If someone dropped the ball on this one Smith didn't want it to be the Maryland State Police," the source said.

SMITH'S INVESTIGATORS have found answers to many of the questions that made the case one of the strangest in recent Maryland history.

They have determined that Paisley was shot with a 9mm automatic pistol similar to the one that he was known to have kept aboard his sailboat. They have determined that, contrary to reports from a friend that Paisley had recently sold the pistol, it was seen by several people on board the sailboat shortly before his final trip.

The investigators have confirmed that Paisley had suffered several episodes of depression and that on at least two occasions he had discussed suicide with friends. Smith said Paisley told friends he wanted to die and be buried at sea.

Smith's formal statement — "We have been unable to uncover any indication whatsoever of foul play involved with the death of Mr. Paisley" — is not as conclusive as statements he has made on other investigations.

THAT STATEMENT, combined with the fact that Smith has ordered two members of the seven-man team to continue working on the case indicates that Smith also feels a lot of question about Paisley's death are unanswered.

A Maryland pathologist said Paisley did not suffer from any terminal disease that might have provoked suicide.

"He had gall stones," Dr. Ann Dixon said, "but that is hardly reason enough for a person to take his own life."

Smith said Paisley may have had knowledge of a 1971 incident in which a Yale University professor, Richard Wolfgang, died. Wolfgang was found floating in Long Island Sound with a bullet wound in his head. His body was weighted down with a bag of stones. His death has not yet been ruled a suicide or a homicide.

Wolfgang was a chemist who worked with nuclear reactors. Paisley's work with the CIA dealt in part with the U.S. spy satellite system.

CIA OFFICIALS have insisted that Paisley was not involved in any activities that might have com-

promised his intelligence work with the agency. Though he was a deputy director of strategic research at the time of his 1974 retirement they contend that he was never involved in covert activities and did not have access to any classified information that would be of value to a foreign power.

But intelligence sources say foreign powers are also interested in non-covert employees because they have knowledge of what the U.S. assessments of other military powers are, and that this is "very valuable information."

The CIA has contended that it had no official interest in the investigation and that it was only assisting the Maryland State Police by giving them background on Paisley's career. But it was only after repeated questions from the news media that the agency admitted that Paisley has continued to work for the agency as a consultant on Soviet military affairs after his retirement.

AND ALTHOUGH they have acknowledged that Paisley's wife was also a contract employee of the agency, they have refused to disclose what kind of work she did for the CIA and what relation it had, if any, to the work done by her husband.

A state police spokesman, William E. Clark, said Maryann Paisley went to the Washington apartment of her estranged husband and removed his personal effects before his body was discovered because initial newspaper reports about the discovery of his boat reported his address and she feared that the apartment might be burglarized.

Clark said earlier that Maryland police found the investigation a difficult one because most of the evidence in the case was disturbed before Maryland police officially entered the probe.

Paisley's boat was searched by the CIA, friends and the Coast Guard before Maryland investigators went to Olivet, Md., where the boat was moored after it was recovered. Paisley's apartment had been "cleaned out," Clark said, before state police could go over it for clues.

"WE HAD TO play catch-up ball during the entire investigation," he said.

The two sets of diving weights that were found around his body were purchased by Paisley, investigators say. He purchased one set of weights last winter in Florida while taking diving lessons. He bought the second set of weights, which friends did not remember his owning, from a Washington diving shop about a week before he was reported missing.

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Paisley Death Was a Suicide, Md. Police Say

PIKESVILLE, Md. — The results of an intensive investigation by the Maryland State Police indicate that former CIA analyst John A. Paisley shot himself to death.

Col. Thomas A. Smith, superintendent of the Maryland State Police, said that the results of the investigation into Paisley's death are "inconclusive" but that all of the circumstantial evidence in the investigation indicates that Paisley shot himself to death with a 9mm automatic that he kept aboard his 31-foot sloop, the Brillig.

Smith made the remarks at a news conference attended by representatives of the Washington office of the FBI and personnel from the Maryland medical examiner's office.

Smith said he has reassigned five investigators who were conducting a probe of Paisley's death but said two full-time investigators will continue to work on the case to look for more conclusive evidence.

An FBI chemical analyst said that tests conducted on Paisley's hands revealed slight traces of a gunpowder residue but that the test did not conclusively determine that Paisley had fired a weapon on the day he died.

Smith said investigators have determined that the pistol, which some witnesses told police Paisley had sold, was seen aboard his boat a week before the incident.

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Smith added that authorities lack enough evidence to say definitely that the retired deputy director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research took his own life.

"I doubt we will ever be able to say it with certainty," Smith said.

Paisley's body was found floating in the Chesapeake Bay Oct. 1, six days after his unoccupied sailboat was discovered aground in the bay off Point Lookout, Md.

Paisley's bloated and decomposed body had 38 pounds of diving weights wrapped around the waist and police determined he died from a single gunshot wound behind the left ear.

Smith said investigators have determined that Paisley had purchased the diving belts himself. Smith said Paisley bought one in Florida last year and bought the second from a Wisconsin Avenue dive shop about a week before he took his final trip.

Smith said Maryland investigators were assisted in their probe by agents from the FBI's Baltimore field office and that they received cooperation from the CIA.

State Police spokesman William E. Clark said the investigation was "a difficult one" because much of the evidence in the case had been disturbed before the Maryland State Police assumed an active role in the probe.

CIA officials and Paisley's relatives went on board the boat and also went through his Washington apartment before Maryland investigators took over the case, Clark said.

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Letelier Jury Must Assess Conflict In 'Confessions' by Witness Townley

A major question for the jury in the Orlando Letelier murder trial is whether to believe a "false" confession or a "true" confession made by Michael V. Townley to Chile's military prosecutor.

Townley now says a March 29, 1978, statement to Gen. Hector Orozco, the Chilean military prosecutor, was a "cover-up story" to shift responsibility for Letelier's death away from DINA, the Chilean secret police organization.

The second statement, signed last April 18 by Townley after two interviews with Orozco at the Quantico Marine Base detention center, is alleged by the prosecutors and Townley to be a true account of the assassination plot.

The second statement was made just after two of the Cuban exile defendants had been arrested in Miami and Townley was faced with the possibility that one of them might agree to testify for the U.S. government and might implicate him.

TOWNLEY ALSO was informed by Assistant U.S. Attorneys Eugene M. Propper and E. Lawrence Barcella that he could be prosecuted for passport and munitions law violations, possibly getting him a long prison sentence.

How Townley, who has confessed to placing the bomb in Letelier's car, decided to plead guilty and implicate the Cubans as confederates was covered in yesterday's testimony in U.S. District Court.

Townley had been extradited from Chile in handcuffs by the government of Gen. Augusto Pinochet about 10 days before he decided to make the "true" Quantico confession.

Essential to his decision was a proposed plea-bargaining agreement offered by the prosecutors in return for his testimony, but sources said Townley first insisted on calling Orozco twice in Santiago to explain his decision to testify and to be relieved of his oath of secrecy as a DINA agent.

BEFORE OROZCO'S arrival, Townley said, he had not told the American prosecutors or investigators any details of his involvement in the plot to kill Letelier.

Present at the Quantico meeting, Townley said, were three Chilean officers, Col. Jeronimo Pantoja, the chief of staff of the secret police, and Maj. Jaime Vergara and Orozco; Townley's parents and wife, Marianna; Propper and Barcella; FBI agents Carter Cornick and Robert Scherrer; and Townley's lawyers, Seymour Glanzer and Barry Levine.

In exchange for the second, "true" statement, the prosecutors consented to a plea-bargaining arrangement by which Townley was permitted to plead guilty to one count of conspiracy to murder a foreign official and to receive a jail sentence of 3½ to 10 years. The second document became the basis for the government's case against the three Cuban activists on trial.

The activists are Guillermo Novo and Alvin Ross Diaz, on trial for murder conspiracy, and Ignacio Novo, on trial for perjury and failing to report the Letelier crime.

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THE SECOND statement was produced in court yesterday by the government after defense attorneys had obtained the first statement that Townley says was a cover story and contained lies.

Neither document's text has been made available in court, but the major differences were indicated by questions to Townley. The defense attorneys are using the first, or "false," statement to impeach Townley as a government witness while the prosecutors using the second, "true" statement to implicate the high command of DINA in the Sept. 21, 1976, killing of Letelier and Ronni K. Moffitt at Sheridan Circle.

Defense attorneys, attempting to undermine Townley's second confession, pressed him hard on the point that his Quantico statement contends that the Cubans agreed to assassinate Letelier only by using a remote-control explosion. Under questioning, Townley acknowledged, "I'm not sure if they demanded it, but the Cubans wanted to get home to New Jersey as soon as they could."

The trial was recessed until Monday. U.S. District Court Judge Barrington D. Parker said he understood the government will conclude its case by the end of next week, indicating a major change in strategy by the prosecutors who originally planned to put more than 40 witnesses on the stand.

Prosecutor Gets Report on Irregular Baltimore GSA Painting Contracts

Congressional investigators say they have found evidence of "possible criminal violations" by federal employees who arranged for excessive painting of federal office buildings in the Baltimore area.

Rep. Clarence D. Long, D-Md., referred the findings yesterday to Russell T. Baker Jr., the U.S. attorney for Maryland, as recommended by auditors from the General Accounting Office, a congressional watchdog agency.

The allegations made by the GAO are the latest indication of misman-

agement at the scandal-ridden General Services Administration, which performs housekeeping and procurement services for the federal government.

After reviewing painting contracts issued by GSA's Public Buildings Service, the congressional auditors concluded that "interior painting requirements appear to be duplicated and substantially overstated."

GSA field office officials could not explain these requirements, the auditors said.

MITCHELL, two other Maryland congressmen and the state's two senators asked for an investigation of

painting contracts after government painters complained that GSA was "contracting out" for services that could be provided more economically by GSA employees. Local members of the American Federation of Government Employees joined in the complaint.

While it is possible that the contract discrepancies involve "unintentional mistakes," the GAO said, "we believe it prudent to consider the possibility of criminal law violations by federal employees, particularly in view of the recent disclosures of fraud and collusion involving GSA employees elsewhere."

The report to Long involved three painting jobs together totaling more than \$66,000.

Two orders were issued for "duplicate painting" of the same four floors in a federal office building, GAO said. One order called for 190,000 square feet of painting; the other order called for 301,020 square feet.

BOTH QUANTITIES "appear to be substantially greater than actual paintable wall space," estimated at only 126,000 square feet for the four floors together.

In another case, the contractor was

paid a premium of 5 cents a square foot for painting 64,000 square feet of wall space located higher than 9 feet 6 inches.

The problem, according to GAO, is that the ceiling on these floors is only 9 feet high, so it's difficult to understand why the \$3,200 premium was justified.

In yet another case, the contractor was paid \$5,940 for fancy decorative painting of a "graphic" design covering 49,500 square feet in a federal office building.

But again there was a discrepancy: Building managers acknowledged that the painted space covered only

5,000 to 6,000 square feet, about one-tenth of the area supposedly painted.

GAO OFFICIALS, noting that these problems were discovered after checking just a few documents, said that such discrepancies may be widespread among federal painting contracts in Baltimore.

GAO did not specifically criticize the Arlington company that had the painting contract in Baltimore.

However, in an interview, the president of the company said that his purchase orders confirmed some of the problems spotted by GAO.

He attributed the problems to "typographical errors" made by GSA personnel who prepared the records.

Paisley Case Feared Tied To CIA Security Breach

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WASHINGTON — Authoritative government officials believe that the mysterious death last September of retired Central Intelligence Agency nuclear-arms expert John Arthur Paisley may be linked to a major internal security breach affecting the CIA.

This conclusion is based to a significant extent on the discovery that "current" top secret CIA documents — and not two-year old papers of a lower classification as believed earlier — had been found after Paisley's disappearance aboard his sloop, the Brillig. The documents were found in his Washington apartment and in his office at a public accountant's firm where he held an administrative post in the last five months of his life.

The fact that Paisley had access to super-secret intelligence data for years after his formal retirement from the CIA and a year after he was said to have completed a sensitive consultative assignment for the agency was disclosed privately Thursday by government sources.

Government sources said it is impossible to rule out the theory that the Paisley affair touches on the existence of a Soviet "mole" — a deep-cover Soviet agent planted inside the agency — and the dead officer's knowledge thereof. The theory has been the subject of speculation for years inside and outside of the intelligence community.

It was also learned that Col. Norman Wilson, a retired Air Force intelligence official and the last man to have talked with Paisley before his disappearance, left last Monday for Australia with his wife. An unidentified man answering the telephone at the Wilson home on Chesapeake Bay described it as a three-or four-month-long trip that had been planned for some time. But government sources expressed surprise at his departure while the investigation of Paisley's death is being expanded.

The new information came to light as the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence requested the Federal Bureau of Investigation on Wednesday to take over, in effect, its three-month inquiry into this latest CIA mystery. The committee said it had taken the action because it had come across "a number of trou-

bling questions" and because the FBI has "primary jurisdiction over counter-intelligence matters within the United States."

At first, the CIA claimed that the documents in Paisley's possession were relatively unimportant papers classified "for internal use only." Later it acknowledged that Paisley had kept materials pertaining to the top secret comparative study of Soviet nuclear capabilities conducted in late-1977 by a CIA group and an outside panel of experts known as "Team-B." It also admitted that Paisley had served as coordinator of "Team B."

The agency, including its director, Admiral Stansfield Turner, was also said to have initially misinformed the White House and the Senate committee concerning Paisley's actual importance during his formal CIA career and afterwards. It was an effort to portray Paisley as simply a CIA analyst while, in reality, he had participated in numerous top level clandestine intelligence operations.

Government sources said specifically that Paisley's documents were "over and above" the "Team B" papers that were also found aboard the sloop. They said that the CIA was unable or unwilling to explain to the Senate panel why Paisley had the documents for so long after his formal retirement as deputy chief of the Office of Strategic Research. Normally, the sources said, documents of this nature would never be removed from CIA headquarters in Langley, Va.

The committee, according to its chairman, Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., had interviewed CIA officials along with others in the course of its investigation. But sources said, the CIA had been less than forthcoming. This may have been one of the reasons for turning the inquiry over to the Justice Department.

However, the mystery remains as to the circumstances of Paisley's death. While it was first described as a suicide, the Maryland State Police subsequently concluded that he died from "undetermined" causes. Most investigators tend to believe that Paisley was murdered, but there appear to be no clues so far by whom and why.

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Public Backs Patty Hearst

More than 30,000 replies to an informal telephone poll indicate that a majority of callers believe Patricia Hearst should be freed from prison. The San Francisco Chronicle, which conducted the poll, reported Thursday that it received 30,348 calls during a 24-hour period. A total of 17,101 callers, or 56 percent, voted yes and 13,247 voted no on the question: Should Patty Hearst be freed now? The newspaper said it was the heaviest response yet since it began a series of telephone polls on controversial topics. The telephone poll is not a scientifically accurate survey of public opinion, the newspaper said, but "does give a strong indication of the way many Chronicle readers feel." The callers' votes are registered automatically and there is no means of screening multiple calls from one person.

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Bell Calls Bureaucracy Threat to Nation

Urges Cutback in Power of Federal Regulatory Agencies

LAWRENCE, Kan.—Atty. Gen. Griffin B. Bell, declaring that the ever-growing federal bureaucracy "is a prescription for societal suicide," called Thursday night for sharply reducing the bureaucracy's power.

In a lecture at the University of Kansas here, Bell said he was "fearful of what lies ahead for the nation."

If the republic is to remain viable, we must find ways to curb and then to reduce this government by bureaucracy," said Bell, who is not given to such somber declarations.

He proposed cutting back the regulating and lawmaking authority of the independent regulatory agencies and severely restricting the size of staffs allocated to the President, the Congress and the courts. And he reiterated a proposal to limit the President to a single six-year term.

A single term would permit the President to regain control of government from the bureaucracy by allowing the chief executive to concentrate his energy on the office rather than seeking reelection, and he would still have a long enough term to achieve major changes and improvements, Bell said.

"We must return to government by directly accountable public officials—local, state and federal," he said. "The only other alternative, I predict, is to have an increasingly costly and inefficient form of government, wholly removed from democratic control."

Bell, who served nearly 15 years as a federal judge before becoming the nation's chief law enforcement officer, said he was not speaking for the Administration.

Nevertheless, Bell's remarks take on added meaning because he is the Cabinet officer with the closest and longest ties to President Carter, a fellow Georgian. But Bell's stated philosophy is a far more conservative doctrine than Carter has embraced publicly.

"I'm a good deal more conservative than he is," Bell said in an interview before the speech.

In urging a reduction of the authority of independent federal agencies such as the Federal Trade Commission, the Consumer Product Safety Commission and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission are all wholly separate and not subject to his control at all," Bell said.

Bell said he would urge Congress "to sharply curtail, if not abolish, the so-called 'rule-making' powers of the independent regulatory commissions."

In the interview, Bell said that the rule-making power had developed over the last five years as a means of avoiding lengthy adversary proceedings at which all sides are heard. Through rule-making, for example, a regulatory agency could restructure the oil and banking industries, Bell said.

"Rule-making is a total substitute for all other forms of government—executive, legislative and even judicial," he said. "Its abuse can stymie and frustrate the government of whole states and the operations of entire industries."

Bell said that he would restrict the staffs of all three branches of government because "more staff invariably means more time in which to evolve more ideas about how to increase government control over the lives of the American people."

If the staffs were cut, however, citizens would have to lower their expectations about government, Bell said.

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"The temptation is overwhelming to ask that the federal government pay for this project or support that program," he said, "because then the average citizen cannot so easily perceive the linkage between the service delivered and the price paid in terms of the incremental federal tax dollars."

Bell said that the growth of the federal judiciary and its support staff "stems mostly from the desires of the American people, who now turn to the courts—and especially the federal courts—at the slightest provocation."

"The citizenry must reaffirm its commitment to other and more informal dispute-resolution devices or it cannot rightly complain when the judiciary, like its sister branches, continues to increase in size in response to cries for more services," Bell said.

He urged strong support for Carter's plans to reduce the volume, complexity and cost of government regulations.

The regulations "are often written in defiance of the English language," Bell said. Many of them "have retarded our real economic growth by impairing our efforts to improve the productivity of labor and capital."

Bell said that the paperwork and compliance burden on smaller American businesses "is simply impossible, so that the net result is wholesale disobedience, which then breeds disrespect for the law generally."

'Troubling Questions' Seen in Paisley's Death

The chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee told the Justice Department yesterday that "a number of troubling questions remain" in the death of former CIA official John A. Paisley, whose body was found last October in Chesapeake Bay with a bullet in his head.

Committee Chairman Birch Bayh (D-Ind.), said in a letter to Attorney General Griffin Bell that the FBI should begin an immediate investigation into Paisley's death. Bayh ordered that the findings of the committee's own investigation be given to the Justice Department.

The senator said, however, that it would be "premature" to disclose any of the findings until the FBI has looked at the case. He said the information was given to Bell "because of

the FBI's primary jurisdiction over counterintelligence matters within the United States."

Paisley disappeared Sept. 24 after setting sail alone in his 31-foot sloop, the Brillig. Although the boat was found aground the next day, Paisley's bloated body, weighed down by two diving belts, was not recovered until a week later.

Maryland police still classify the death of the former director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research as "undetermined." Paisley's estranged wife Maryann, also a former CIA employee, has said she doubts that the body found in the bay was that of her husband. She has hired Bernard Fensterwald, a Washington attorney, to investigate her husband's disappearance.

Justice Department spokesman

Terry Adamson said Bell has ordered the FBI to examine the Senate committee's findings and the bureau's own information on Paisley's death. An assessment will be made "reasonably promptly" of the need for a full-scale FBI investigation, Adamson said.

Sen. William V. Roth (R-Del.), who first called for an investigation into Paisley's death, said yesterday that "a cloud of suspicion" still surrounds the case.

"The Paisley affair was all set to be swept under the carpet; fortunately it didn't sweep too well," Roth said.

Roth said he is concerned by "inconsistencies" in the way the CIA has answered questions about Paisley's access to classified information, including his knowledge of a top secret manual on the KH11 reconnaissance satel-

lite — which can monitor foreign troop and equipment movements by photographing them from space.

"The CIA said at first that Paisley had no access to sensitive documents. Of course he did," Roth said. Roth also said it was "inconsistent" that the CIA should claim that a high-level official such as Paisley would have nothing to do with the KH11 satellite.

Roth said that if a "junior watch officer" such as William P. Kampiles, convicted last November of selling satellite secrets to the Russians, had access to the KH11 information, then Paisley also would have had access.

Roth and some other senators have asked publicly if there is a link between Paisley's death and the theft from CIA headquarters in Langley of 14 top secret manuals describing the satellite system. The theft was discovered last August.

Hill Panel Asks FBI Probe of Paisley Case

The Senate Intelligence Committee today turned over its files on the death of former CIA official John A. Paisley to the Justice Department with a request that the FBI conduct a full probe into the case.

Paisley was found shot to death in the Chesapeake Bay last October.

Spencer Davis, a committee spokesman, said Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., sent the files to Attorney General Griffin Bell this morning after committee investigators "continued to have a number of troubling questions about Paisley's death."

Davis said the files included interviews conducted with the Coast Guard, the CIA, the FBI and the Maryland State Police, and with a number of Paisley's friends and family members.

HE SAID the committee asked the Justice Department to take over the investigation because the FBI has "primary jurisdiction in all cases involving counterintelligence."

"The committee found a number of questions that the FBI should be looking at," Davis said.

Paisley, 55, was a high-ranking CIA analyst whose specialty was Soviet military strength. He had also worked on the K-H11 Big Bird satellite program. Paisley retired from the agency

in 1974, but several months after his formal retirement he rejoined it as a consultant.

Last September Paisley's 31-foot sailboat, the Brillig, was found aground in Chesapeake Bay. On Oct. 1 his body, wrapped in diver's weights, was found floating in the bay. He had been shot once in the head with a 9 mm pistol, similar to a pistol he was known to have kept aboard the Brillig.

The Maryland State Police conducted a lengthy investigation of Paisley's death but did not rule conclusively that it was a suicide. Though Maryland investigators have said they believe Paisley took his own life, the death is still carried officially as "undetermined."

Sources close to the investigation told The Washington Star today that the FBI has been specifically asked to investigate the access that Paisley had to highly classified documents.

The sources said that Senate investigators, who are convinced the analyst took his own life, may have been in possession of classified documents that he should not have taken from CIA headquarters in Langley.

SHORTLY AFTER Paisley's sloop was recovered by the Coast Guard, two CIA agents and Paisley's wife, who was also a contractual employee of the agency, went to his Washington apartment and removed several boxes of papers.

CIA agents also took custody of papers that were found on the Brillig, papers that they later confirmed related to his agency work. CIA offi-

cials initially contended that Paisley did not have access to highly classified materials and had not compromised himself with any foreign power.

But the agency later admitted that Paisley's work was "sensitive" and that he did work with materials that would have value to a foreign power.

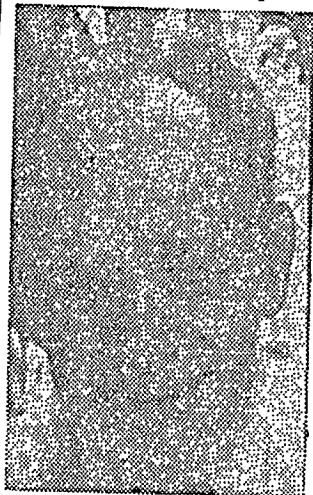
The source said the FBI has been asked to investigate the nature of the documents and agency papers that Paisley worked with. Several of Paisley's friends said it was not uncommon for the CIA analyst to take agency documents with him on sailing trips, because he often spent weekends working on the bay.

Davis said Bayh told Bell he wants the FBI to "stay in close touch with me" as the investigation progresses.

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Doctors Affirm Findings

Two doctors said yesterday that they are convinced a body found in the Chesapeake Bay three months ago was that of former CIA official John Paisley, despite doubts expressed by



both Paisley's wife and the Senate Intelligence Committee.

Dr. Albert Brendes, a McLean, Va., dentist, identified a partial denture taken from the body as being one he made for Paisley. Maryland State Medical Examiner Russell Fischer also said he is sure the body was Paisley's.

The New York Post reported Wednesday that Paisley's estranged wife,

Mary Ann Paisley, "began to wonder about the body" when the FBI found a set of fingerprints to use for identification after first saying Paisley's fingerprint file had been destroyed.

The Post also reported the Senate Intelligence Committee plans to continue its investigation into Paisley's death because of "apparent contradictions" about the identity of the body.

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Police Think Paisley Death Was Suicide

Former high-ranking CIA official John A. Paisley, whose body was found Oct. 1 in the Chesapeake Bay, probably committed suicide although investigators are still calling it an "undetermined death."

That is the opinion of Maryland State Police who have investigated Paisley's mysterious disappearance and death by gunshot. Paisley set sail alone in his 31-foot sloop, the Brillig, Sept. 24. Although the boat was found aground the next day, Paisley's bloated body, weighted down by two diving belts weighing a total of 38 pounds, was not recovered for a week.

"We have been unable to uncover any indication whatsoever of foul play involved with the death of Mr. Paisley," State Police Superintendent Thomas S. Smith said yesterday at a press conference at his headquarters in Pikesville.

Because of the bizarre circumstances surrounding Paisley's death, a team of seven state police investigators was assigned to the case.

Information uncovered by that team points to suicide, Smith said, but "we are still classifying this case as an undetermined death."

A spokesman for the Senate Intelligence Committee, which began an independent inquiry into reported links between Paisley's death and missing CIA documents, said that investigation is continuing and results will be made public within two weeks.

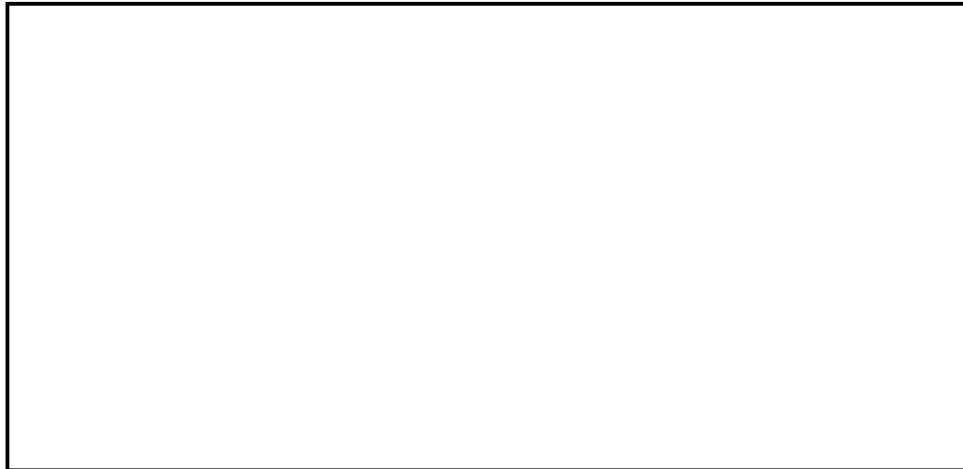

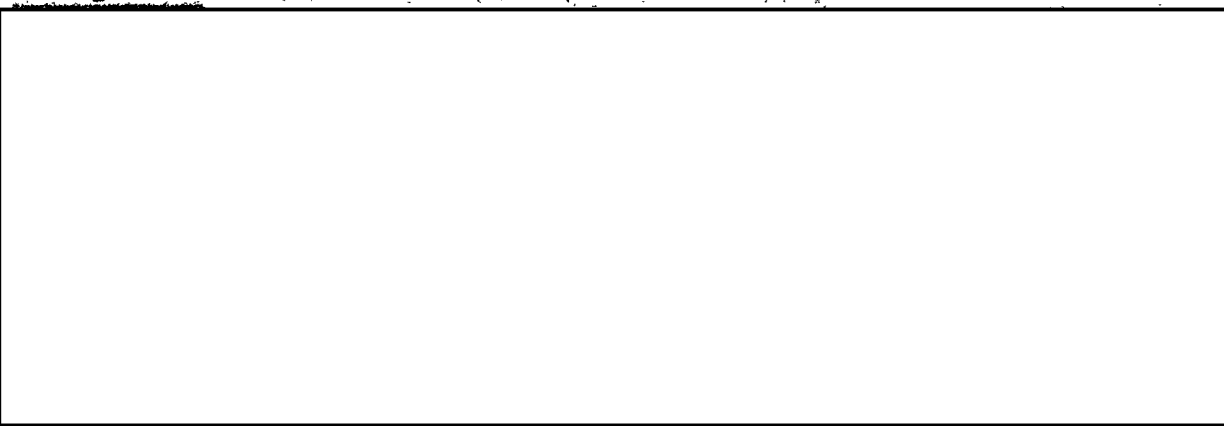

On October 1, 1978, one week following the last known contact with Paisley, a bloated and decomposed body was located in, and recovered from, the Chesapeake Bay east of Solomons Island. The body, with weighted diver's belts around the waist and chest and a gunshot wound to the head, subsequently was identified as that of John Arthur Paisley. (U)

Paisley's personal and professional activities, as well as the circumstances of his reported death, have been the subject of various news media speculations, the most notable and penetrating of which is an article that appeared in the January 7, 1979, edition of the New York Times Magazine captioned "The Missing C.I.A. Man," by Tad Szulc, who is identified as "a national-security-affairs writer based in Washington, D. C." In addition, the SSCI has identified certain "troubling questions" that remain consequent to its review of available facts in the Paisley death. 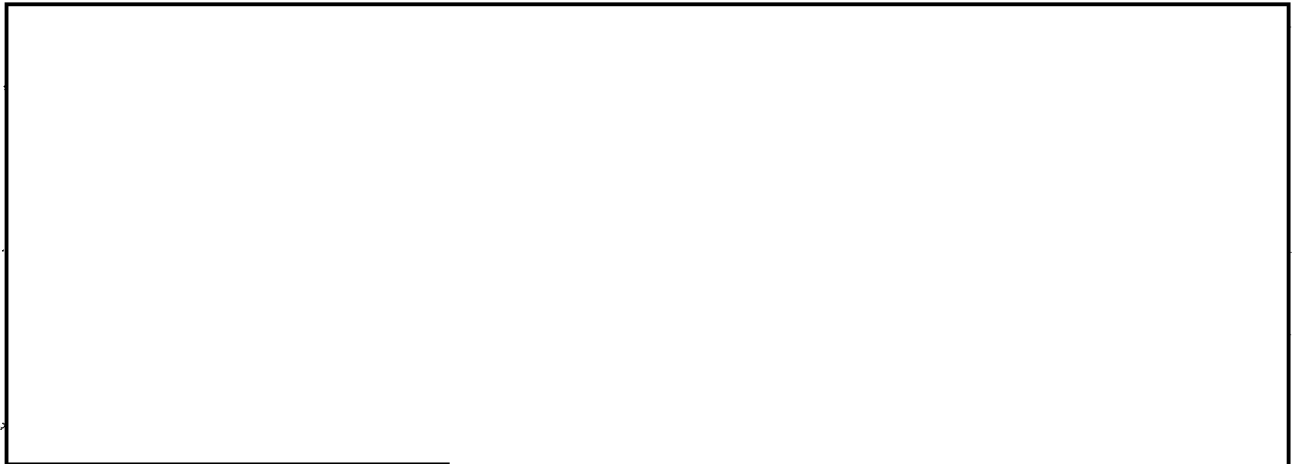

Conclusion

Based upon the foregoing reviews and assessments of available facts pertinent to each identified issue, it is concluded that no credible evidence exists to suspect John Arthur Paisley's death was other than a suicide. It is also concluded that no credible evidence exists to suspect John Arthur Paisley was, or might have been, engaged in espionage, sabotage, terrorist or clandestine intelligence activities pursuant to the direction of a foreign power; or that he was, or might have been, the target of a foreign intelligence service or terrorists acting pursuant to the direction of a foreign power. Thus, there are no specific and articulable facts upon which to base an FBI investigation of the death of John Arthur Paisley. (U)

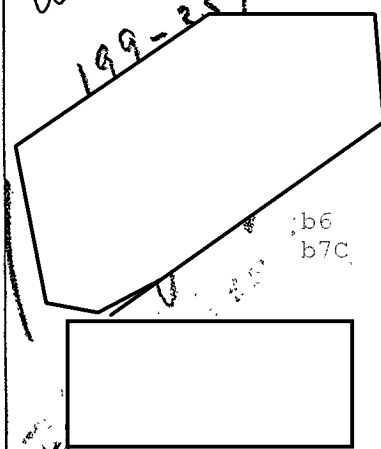



Six months later

New evidence clouds Paisley 'suicide' verdict

By TOM NUGENT and STEVE PARKS

Washington—Six months after the body of a former CIA nuclear weapons expert, John Arthur Paisley, was found floating in the Chesapeake Bay, new evidence, together with misleading statements about Mr. Paisley's role with the government, tend to cast doubt on investigators' verdict of "apparent suicide" in the case.

This evidence includes a firsthand account by a United States coast guardsman who says that he saw an opened package of lunch meat, a container of mustard and a knife smeared with mustard lying on a sink-top counter in the Brillig, Mr. Paisley's 34-foot sloop.

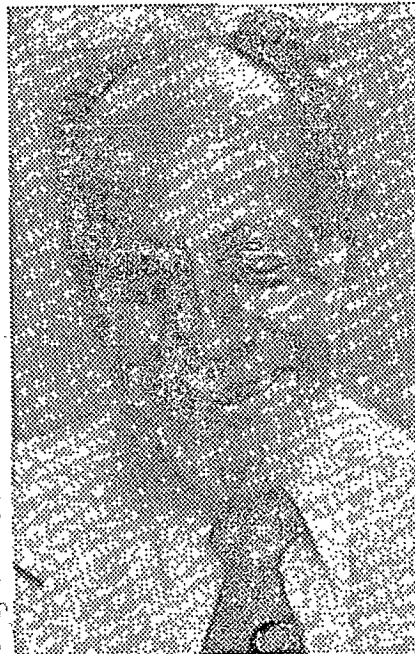
In addition to the food, the coast guardsman, who requested his identity not be revealed, said he saw a sailing chart, located near the sloop's wheel, on which a sailing-course had been partially mapped out, as well as a life preserver that had been left alongside.

"It looked to me like he had been interrupted in the middle of lunch," said the coast guardsman. "It looked like he had filled in part of the chart and then had decided to get something to eat. So he took off his life preserver and went below, down to the galley."

The witness was one of two guardsmen who were the first people to board the deserted Brillig a few hours after it was found washed ashore at Point Look In, near the mouth of the Potomac River in St. Marys county, last September 25.

In addition to this account, a three-month Sun investigation has produced new evidence that indicates a struggle may have taken place aboard the Brillig in the hours before Mr. Paisley's disappearance.

That evidence includes a statement by Mr. Paisley's widow, Maryann, who visited the sloop soon after it was found and who said that "a table had been pulled away from the wall. Several screws had been pulled loose, and it was tilted at an angle which would have made it impossible to use." Mr. Paisley, according to several sources, was writing a report during

his final sailing excursion, and the table was the only adequate writing surface aboard.

The Maryland State Police, whose investigation concluded that Mr. Paisley's death was an "apparent suicide," earlier said that one witness—an intelligence colleague of his who has since left for Australia—told them the table had been pulled loose from the wall months before the Central Intelligence Agency analyst's disappearance.

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The Sun—a young woman who was a guest aboard the Brillig one week before Mr. Paisley vanished—recalls that meals were served on the same table during her stay aboard.

"The table was working during our sailing trip; we had it up for meals and I also remember it folded up against the wall," said the guest.

In addition to these accounts, no fewer than six high-level government sources—at least one of whom worked directly with Mr. Paisley on top-secret projects—have told *The Sun* that, at the time of his death, Mr. Paisley—who had been described by the CIA as a "part-time consultant with a very limited access to classified information"—actually was engaged in analyzing extremely sensitive, top-secret documents dealing with American assessments of Soviet nuclear capability.

"I found the initial reports [after Mr. Paisley's death] that Paisley had only limited access to classified documents shocking," said a former, high-level staffer on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board (PFIAB) who had earlier worked closely with Mr. Paisley on projects involving top-secret, CIA estimates of Soviet weaponry. "In fact, I was surprised that the agency would even try to pander that sort of information.

"There is no question that Paisley, at the time of his death, had access to highly classified intelligence information."

The former PFIAB staff member said that Mr. Paisley, who had served as CIA deputy director of the Office of Strategic Research until his official retirement from the agency in 1974, had continued to work on top-secret projects as a \$200-a-day consultant until he disappeared on the night of September 24-25, 1978.

"Paisley was involved, all along, in highly sensitive estimates of Soviet capability," said the ex-PFIAB official. "And this wasn't academic, outside stuff; it would have been the nitty-gritty."

Intelligence sources, both inside and outside the CIA, meanwhile, contend that the agency misled investigators about the nature of Mr. Paisley's work at the time of his disappearance. "The agency is flat-out lying," said one source. "Paisley was never not involved in something big."

Mr. Paisley's death was ruled an apparent suicide by the Maryland State Police—the only governmental agency that so far has investigated the case—a few weeks after the badly decomposed body of the 55-year-old weapons analyst was pulled from the Chesapeake Bay, about 2 miles southeast of the Patuxent River October 1.

The victim, shot once behind the left ear with a 9-millimeter pistol, was found with two belts containing 39 pounds of diving weights attached to his waist.

The State Police, who entered the case soon after the body was found, identified the body as Mr. Paisley's on the basis of dental records and fingerprints.

But the State Police investigation was marred by several anomalies and inconsistencies of fact:

- Both the FBI and the CIA were unable to locate a set of Mr. Paisley's fingerprints for more than a week after the discovery of the body. ("Frankly, that strikes me as incredible," one high-level member of the intelligence community later remarked. "I've worked for some of these agencies, myself, and I know for a fact that every time you get a new clearance for classified information, they take your prints again. In fact, it got to be a pain in the neck: Every time you turned around, it was time to take your fingerprints. They must have had a dozen sets of Paisley's prints.")

- At the time Paisley's body surfaced, however, both the FBI and the CIA said that his fingerprints had been "lost." The fingerprint identification was not made until about a week after the discovery of the body. The FBI said that the prints had been misfiled; the only available set of prints had been filed under the name of "Jack" Paisley and had been taken when the weapons expert was 17 years old.

- The shooting death took place in the absence of witnesses, and the body, which was decomposed beyond recognition, was cremated in a CIA-approved funeral home without ever having been observed by anyone who knew Mr. Paisley.

- Both Mr. Paisley's boat and his Washington apartment were searched by CIA representatives soon after the discovery of the body. By the time the State Police came on the scene (after the body was

found) the original evidence had been tampered.

- No traces of blood or brain fragments were found aboard the Brillig. Thus, the suicide verdict requires one to believe that Mr. Paisley either shot himself while standing on the edge of the boat (so that the shell casing, the pistol, and the blood and brain fragments fell overboard with him), or that he shot himself while in the water and while wearing 39 pounds of diving weights.

- When the deserted boat was discovered, the wheel was unlocked and the ship-to-shore radio was still playing. Mr. Paisley's widow, who says that she sailed for years with her husband, insists that he was a meticulous sailor who would never have left these chores untended: "Even if he had been under emotional duress, he would have locked that wheel by instinct."

- The first people to be contacted after the discovery of the Brillig were officials at the CIA and at the Washington accounting firm of Coopers and Lybrand, where Mr. Paisley had been working as an administrative aide for about six months. The accounting firm, headed by K. Wayne Smith, a former Defense Department weapons expert who has served on the National Security Council and who has performed weapons-analysis work for both the Pentagon and the Rand Corporation, immediately dispatched one of its employees to Mr. Paisley's apartment, No. 847, at 1500 Massachusetts avenue, N.W.

After being admitted by the landlady, the employee searched the apartment and took away a Rolodex telephone book that contained numbers listed by Mr. Paisley.

The CIA, meanwhile, sent representatives to both the Brillig and the apartment; they confiscated a briefcase full of papers that they found aboard the boat and examined other papers located in the apartment.

All of these steps were taken before Mr. Paisley's family—he had two grown children, in addition to his estranged wife, Maryann—was notified that the boat had been found; Mrs. Paisley says she was not contacted until about 11 P.M. (the boat was discovered around 11 A.M.).

- Mr. Paisley's girlfriend, Betty Myers, reported in the days immediately following the discovery of the body, that

he had earlier sold the 9-millimeter pistol that he kept aboard his boat. (The State Police decided that she had misunderstood Mr. Paisley, however—that he had attempted to sell the gun, but actually had failed to find a buyer.)

• Mr. Paisley's wife (the couple had been separated for about two years prior to the disappearance) and several other people who knew him well insist that he was in good spirits just before his disappearance. "He called me up that weekend," said Mrs. Paisley in a later interview. "He said that he was thinking about going sailing—but that if he didn't, we'd have dinner together."

"My feeling is that something very sinister is happening. From the beginning, I've thought that I was up against something I couldn't do alone. John was an ethical man—he would never do this [commit suicide without an explanation] to his children."

"My own feeling is that if I drop this [her own private investigation—she recently hired Washington attorney Bernard Fensterwald for this purpose], I will be letting him down."

Most of the questions about Mr. Paisley's disappearance have focused, in recent months, on his participation in an extremely sensitive and controversial 1976 intelligence project, known as the "Team A-Team B Experiment."

That experiment was launched after White House experts on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board convinced CIA officials that the agency's yearly evaluations of Soviet military capability should be tested by comparing them with evaluations made by experts outside the CIA.

After agreeing reluctantly to the proposal, early in 1976, the CIA named Mr. Paisley to serve as coordinator between the agency's A Team—its own, "in-house" weapons-analysis group—and the B Team, which was composed of three different groups of outside experts and which was chaired by Richard Pipes, head of Harvard University's Russian Institute.

"It was Paisley who developed the list of people who would serve on the B Team," says a former PFIAB White House staffer. "It was his job to get these guys clearance . . . to discuss their back-

grounds with us. Then, after the team had been selected, he would schedule the briefings. He shaped the entire process. He made the arrangements for CIA couriers to bring classified information from the A Team to the B Team.

"And he liked that work. He was really enthusiastic. When I first met him, in the early going, he used to talk all the time about getting back to his sailboat and doing more sailing. It seemed at times like his work was interfering with his sailing. But then later he really got into it, and he worked like hell on it."

When the B Team finally released its report, however, Mr. Paisley found himself caught up in a swirling controversy. For one thing, the report was—at least in part—highly critical of the CIA's in-house evaluations (the "National Intelligence Estimates") of the Soviet military threat.

For another thing, the experiment had been compromised by serious leaks to the press of some of the classified information that had been fed—by Mr. Paisley and his aides—to the B Team.

The controversy was further heightened by its timing, occurring as it did while the U.S. government was in the middle of preparing its negotiating position for the strategic arms limitation talks (SALT II) with the Soviet Union.

At the time of his death, Mr. Paisley had been engaged in writing a "retrospective analysis" of the 1976 B Team experiment for an in-house CIA publication.

His report, according to intelligence sources, was to have focused on the recruiting methods and organizational procedures used during the experiment. Presumably, it also would have discussed the damaging leaks to the press.

But that report was never completed; the papers that were found in the briefcase aboard the Brillig contained Mr. Paisley's scrawled notes on the history of the project.

The high-level intelligence sources interviewed by *The Sun* strongly doubt that Mr. Paisley could have been killed because of his involvement in the B Team project. They point out that disagreements between different elements in the American intelligence community form a routine part of the process of analyzing military intelligence.

But these sources do not discount the possibility that Mr. Paisley might have been killed because he discovered a source of intelligence leaks to the Soviet Union or because he might himself have been involved in such leaks.

In assessing such possibilities, one former high-level staffer at PFIAB suggests a complicated, intriguing scenario—one that illustrates, compellingly, the difficulties involved in attempting to unravel incidents like the one involving John Paisley and the CIA.

First, the ex-PFIAB staffer points out that the disappearance of John Paisley coincided with the start of a trial in Newark N.J., in which two Soviet agents, Valdik A. Enger and Rudolf P. Chernayayev, were convicted and sentenced to 50 years in prison for attempting to buy antisubmarine secrets from a naval officer. The defense alleged in the trial that the naval officer, Lt. Cmdr. Arthur Lindberg, was planted by the FBI in an attempt to trap the Russian agents in an espionage offense.

"Look at it this way," says the former staff member, "the KGB has just gotten lured into this set-up; they'd gotten trapped."

"And now, here comes John Paisley. He's just left his job at the agency [in 1974], and he's left it on a low since a lot of people were blaming his department for the underestimates of Soviet military strength up until then."

"So he's depressed. In addition, he's in the middle of an ugly divorce. . . . Now, here's a man who speaks fluent Russian . . . who loves Russian music, Russian food. . . . And he moves into that apartment house on Mass. avenue—an apartment house where there are already eight Russians, employees from the Soviet Embassy, living. . . ."

"It's another set-up. They've got to figure that the agency is 'trailing' [offering Paisley as a likely double-agent, a man who might be willing to betray his colleagues] the guy . . . hoping to lure them into another trap."

"And so they decide to teach the agency a lesson. They decide to make it clear that if the CIA wants to play this game, they're going to have to pay a high price for it."

This memorandum is in response to a letter dated April 2, 1979, from United States Senators Birch Bayh and Barry Goldwater, Chairman and Vice Chairman respectively of the SSCI, to the Deputy Attorney General, which acknowledged receipt of an FBI assessment and analysis of identifiable issues and available recorded facts relative to the circumstances of the death of former Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) officer John A. Paisley. The letter from Senators Bayh and Goldwater also raised two collateral questions relative to application and interpretation of the Attorney General Guidelines for FBI Foreign Intelligence Collection and Foreign Counterintelligence Investigations (hereinafter referred to as Guidelines). Specifically, the SSCI letter asserts, and implicitly questions why, the FBI apparently did not exercise its authority to conduct a preliminary inquiry in accordance with Section III of the Guidelines; and questions whether or not the Guidelines apply to inquiries regarding past activities of deceased persons. (U)

In support of the first assertion and implied question, the SSCI letter pointed out that the Guidelines authorize the FBI to make certain preliminary inquiries based upon "information or allegations indicating" that an individual may be a foreign intelligence agent or the target of a foreign intelligence service; the Guidelines do not require "specific and articulable facts" before the FBI can make (preliminary) inquiries regarding such

The terms under which this matter was referred to the FBI included only a request for an assessment and analysis of the available facts and issues concerning Paisley's death; and a request for the FBI's views concerning criminal or counterintelligence jurisdiction and the potential for inquiry in this matter. These terms were clearly enunciated in the Deputy Attorney General's referral memorandum, dated January 26, 1979, to the FBI and in discussions between SSCI staff members and representatives of the FBI's Intelligence Division on January 31, 1979. Nevertheless, and because material made available by SSCI staff members was determined to be inadequate for assessment purposes, the FBI requested, received, reviewed, and returned literally hundreds of pages of CIA records, including the complete, unsanitized copies of that Agency's security, personnel and administrative files on Paisley. Additionally, and as documented in the assessment forwarded to the SSCI by the Deputy Attorney General's memorandum of March 28, 1979, the FBI initiated 11 distinct topical interviews of individuals in fulfillment of, and subsequent to, the SSCI's request for a review of this matter. Thus, it is respectfully submitted that the FBI did in fact conduct what amounts to a preliminary inquiry and concluded therefrom that there were no specific and articulable facts upon which to base a full counterintelligence investigation of Paisley's death or his prior activities. (U)

While it is true that preliminary inquiries may be undertaken by the FBI when there is information or allegations indicating, inter alia, that an individual is, or may be a foreign intelligence agent or the target of a foreign intelligence service, as specified in the SSCI letter, it should also be noted that the FBI does not undertake investigations to resolve all such allegations.

(U) Instead, the FBI applies a test of the credibility of the allegations based on its foreign counterintelligence investigative experience. Lest there be any misunderstanding, the FBI wishes to emphasize that the decision to discontinue our inquiry (preliminary and/or full investigation) in the Paisley matter was based on our judgment that no credible evidence existed to warrant a continuance, and not on any restrictions imposed by the Guidelines. (S)

As concerns the SSCI's second question, i.e., whether or not the Guidelines apply to inquiries regarding past activities of deceased persons, it is this Bureau's judgment that, inasmuch as these are termed "guidelines," it is reasonable to interpret them as providing authority to conduct the appropriate investigations in such cases. (U)

Maryland State Police Deny New Probe of Paisley Case

BALTIMORE (AP) — Maryland State Police emphatically denied today that they have resumed an active investigation into the death of John A. Paisley, a former CIA strategic weapons expert.

A report in today's Baltimore Sun, quoting unidentified state police officials, said new information has led state police to question the theory that Paisley committed suicide.

Sgt. Tom Moore, a state police spokesman, said: "We are not actively, nor do we plan in the immediate future" to actively investigate the Paisley death.

He said state police investigators have no new evidence or information that leads them to believe anything happened other than what has been reported already.

Moore added, however, that the case has never been officially closed and that if new evidence becomes

available, the investigation will be beefed up.

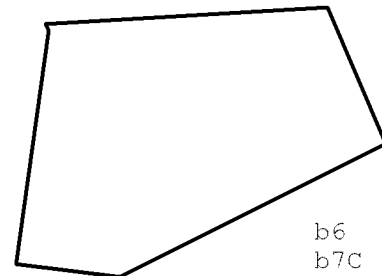
The state police had ruled Paisley's shooting death "an apparent suicide," after the Coast Guard recovered the decomposed body of a man matching Paisley's description who had been shot in the head with a 9mm pistol.

The Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, which has been investigating Paisley's death for several months, said Monday it would continue its inquiry.

Sources said the committee's investigation appeared to be continuing along the lines of questions raised in a probe of the incident by the Sun.

Those questions included suggestions that there were signs of a struggle aboard Paisley's sloop when it was boarded in the Chesapeake Bay by the Coast Guard. Paisley's body was found Oct. 1, a week after his disappearance.

Panel in Senate Decides to Probe Paisley's Death

A spokesman for the Senate Intelligence Committee said yesterday that the committee had decided to investigate "some troubling questions about counterintelligence aspects" of the death of former CIA official John Paisley.

The Maryland State Police and the FBI have completed reports that conclude that Paisley, who disappeared while sailing on the Chesapeake last September, probably committed suicide. Paisley's body was found a month later floating in the Bay. He had been shot once in the head.

The FBI report also said that there was no reason to investigate whether Paisley had been involved in counterintelligence activities before his death.

The Senate committee, which asked the FBI to investigate the case in January, decided that "there are further questions that still need to be looked at," according to spokesman Spencer Davis.

Davis would not comment on what particular aspects of Paisley's death or work the committee was investigating.

BALTIMORE (AP) -- NEW INFORMATION IN THE CASE OF JOHN ARTHUR PAISLEY, A FORMER CIA STRATEGIC WEAPONS EXPERT, HAS LED MARYLAND STATE POLICE TO RESUME THEIR INVESTIGATION INTO HIS DEATH, ACCORDING TO TODAY'S BALTIMORE SUN.

THE STATE POLICE HAD RULED PAISLEY'S SHOOTING DEATH "AN APPARENT SUICIDE," AFTER THE COAST GUARD RECOVERED THE DECOMPOSED BODY OF A MAN MATCHING PAISLEY'S DESCRIPTION WHO HAD BEEN SHOT IN THE HEAD WITH A 9MM PISTOL.

STATE POLICE SPOKESMEN SAID TUESDAY, HOWEVER, THAT THE NEW INFORMATION TENDS TO CAST DOUBT ON THAT FINDING. THE SENATE SELECT COMMITTEE ON INTELLIGENCE, WHICH HAS BEEN INVESTIGATING PAISLEY'S DEATH FOR SEVERAL MONTHS, SAID MONDAY IT WOULD CONTINUE ITS INQUIRY.

THE NEWSPAPER QUOTED CIA AND SENATE INTELLIGENCE COMMITTEE SOURCES AS SAYING THAT PAISLEY, WHILE WORKING FOR THE CIA, WAS GIVEN ACCESS TO A NUMBER OF CIA COMPUTER CODES, SATELLITE PHOTOS AND OTHER TOP SECRET INFORMATION.

THE COMMITTEE AND FBI ARE INTERESTED IN PAISLEY'S DEATH BECAUSE OF THE IMPORTANCE OF INFORMATION RELATING TO THE SECRET KH-11 SATELLITE, WHICH PAISLEY REPORTEDLY HELPED TO DEVELOP, THE NEWSPAPER SAID.

PAISLEY DISAPPEARED WHILE SAILING ON THE CHESAPEAKE BAY IN SEPTEMBER 1978. A WEEK LATER, A BADLY DECOMPOSED BODY, WITH A GUNSHOT WOUND IN THE HEAD, WAS PULLED FROM THE BAY AND LATER IDENTIFIED AS PAISLEY'S.

MARYLAND STATE POLICE AND THE STATE MEDICAL EXAMINER LISTED HIS DEATH AS A PROBABLE SUICIDE. MRS. PAISLEY'S LAWYER AND OTHERS HAVE ASSERTED HE DIED AS A RESULT OF FOUL PLAY.

PAISLEY WAS ORIGINALLY IDENTIFIED BY THE CIA AS A MINOR AGENCY OFFICIAL, BUT IT WAS LATER REVEALED THAT HE WAS THE FORMER DEPUTY DIRECTOR OF THE CIA'S OFFICE OF STRATEGIC RESEARCH. HE RETIRED FROM THE CIA IN 1974 AND WAS WORKING FOR THE AGENCY AS A PART-TIME CONSULTANT AT THE TIME OF HIS DEATH.

THE WASHINGTON POST REPORTED IN THURSDAY'S EDITIONS THAT A SECRET FBI REPORT OF HIS DEATH CONCLUDED THERE WAS "NO CREDIBLE EVIDENCE" TO SHOW THAT HIS DEATH WAS "OTHER THAN SUICIDE." 199-357-A

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On 9/25/78, the US Coast Guard Station, Portsmouth, Virginia, advised the [] that Paisley's pilotless sloop, "Brillig," had run aground under full sail that morning near Point Lookin (approximately five miles north of Point Lookout, Maryland), and that Paisley was considered missing in the Chesapeake Bay. It was further reported by the Coast Guard that Paisley had set sail alone on Sunday morning, 9/24/78, from a private mooring owned by [] located near Solomons Island, Maryland. Reportedly, Paisley contacted [] via ham radio between 5 and 6:00pm the same day and requested the dock lights be left on inasmuch as he would be returning later. There were no known subsequent contacts with Paisley. (U)

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On 10/1/78, one week following the last known contact with Paisley, a bloated and decomposed body was located in the Chesapeake Bay east of Solomons Island. The body, with weighted diver's belts around the waist and chest and a gunshot wound to the head, was subsequently identified as that of John Arthur Paisley. (U)

The official autopsy report of the Department of Post Mortem Examiner, State of Maryland, records the opinion that John Paisley died of a penetrating gunshot wound to the head and the manner of death is undetermined. [], Maryland State Police, advised on 10/3/78 that the attending pathologist is of the belief that Paisley's death was probably a suicide even though the official report indicates manner of death undetermined. (U)

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The autopsy report states that Paisley's death was caused by a close range gunshot wound to the left side of the head. [] noted on 10/3/78 that Paisley reportedly was ambidextrous but performed most tasks left-handed, except writing. [] further noted Maryland State Police investigators located a nine millimeter steel-jacketed live round on Paisley's sloop and two additional similar rounds at his residence. It was determined Paisley was the owner of an automatic weapon of either .32 or nine millimeter caliber.

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[] Maryland State Police, told the SSCI staff on 10/19/78 that Paisley was the owner of a nine millimeter weapon a week before his death, as he tried to sell it. No weapon, however, was recovered in the course of their investigation.

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(S) Paisley, the father of two children ages 20 and 22, was separated from his wife. [redacted]

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(S) [redacted] Paisley alluded to his financial difficulties by stating: "I finished my sailing and scuba phase for a while, anyway at least until the kids get through college. My annuity just won't stretch all that far." In this regard, it is noted that included in the material reportedly found on his boat were papers dealing with a divorce settlement. (U)

(S) A "Washington Star" newspaper article dated 10/21/78 reported an interview with Col. Thomas A. Smith, Superintendent of the Maryland State Police, who stated that investigators have confirmed that Paisley had suffered several episodes of depression and that on at least two occasions he had discussed suicide with friends. Smith said Paisley told friends he wanted to die and be buried at sea. (U)

(S) [redacted] both a professional associate and a fairly close friend of Paisley and his wife, provided some insight into Paisley's mental and emotional state during an interview with SSCI Staff on 11/16/78. [redacted] first found it difficult to reconcile suicide with his perception of Paisley's personality, but after talking with the [redacted] previously identified herein), he [redacted] considered suicide to be more plausible. The [redacted] reportedly told him [redacted] that Paisley had undergone a sudden personality change a couple of months before he died and he (Paisley) told the [redacted] he was not "going to go over the speed limit." (It was opined that Paisley was talking about his age, 55, and the speed limit of 55 mph.) [redacted] personally described a "miserable social life" as a contributor to Paisley's depression, noting that one [redacted] with whom Paisley spent much of his recent time, [redacted]

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[redacted] expressed the belief that [redacted] bothered Paisley considerably. [redacted] recalled seeing Paisley with [redacted] Paisley appeared withdrawn and morose. (U)

According to [redacted] Paisley was profoundly affected by a recent Lifespring experience. (Lifespring is a mission to provide basic educational awareness of self-actualization training that enables an individual to look at his/her own belief system; and graduate training in interpersonal relationships.) [redacted] also noted that Paisley began seeing a psychiatrist shortly after his Lifespring experience. He scheduled a joint appointment with his spouse on a date subsequent to his death. (U)

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Two Tell of Marks on Neck Of Former CIA Man's Body

Solomons, Md., June 27 — The body of former CIA official John A. Paisley, found near here last October in Chesapeake Bay, had markings around the throat indicating "foul play," according to statements made today by a county coroner and by the owner of an area marina.

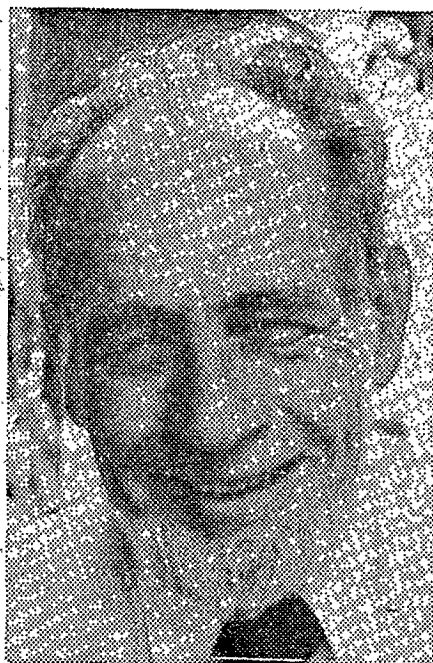
Dr. George Weems, coroner of Calvert County, said he viewed Paisley's bloated body when it was first brought ashore by the U.S. Coast Guard on Oct. 1, and noticed markings on the neck indicating it has "been squeezed or had a rope around it."

"They were the type of things you see when people are strangled," said Weems, who has been coroner here for 20 years. Weems made his statement today at a press conference called by Bernard Fensterwald, a Washington lawyer hired by Paisley's widow, Maryann.

Harry Lee Langley, owner of Langley Point Marina, said he also saw the markings on the body when it was brought to the U.S. Naval Ordnance Laboratory near here. "It was either a helluva (rope) burn or his throat had been cut," Langley said.

A report of the autopsy performed by Maryland state Medical Examiner Dr. Russell K. Fisher does not mention any markings on Paisley's throat. Fisher could not be reached immediately for comment.

Paisley was found with a bullet hole

... death still being probed

in his head. A state police investigation concluded that the former CIA official "probably was a suicide victim," although the case has not been officially closed.

In a separate development, Mutual of New York Life Insurance Corp.

announced today that after a six-month investigation of whether the body found last October was that of Paisley, it will pay off Paisley's \$100,000 life insurance policy to his widow.

A Mutual of New York spokesman said today the company had delayed payment because of doubts raised by Maryann Paisley about whether her estranged husband was dead.

"We are now satisfied that all the hard evidence shows this was the body of John Paisley," the spokesman said.

Paisley, the former director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research, disappeared Sept. 24 after setting sail alone from here in his 31-foot sloop, the Brillig. A week later the body of a man identified by Maryland State Police as Paisley—weighted down by two diving belts—was recovered from the bay.

At the time of his death, Paisley had access to top secret information about Soviet military capabilities. A spokesman for the Senate Intelligence Committee, which has been looking into Paisley's death since last fall, said yesterday the committee is continuing its investigation and a report will be issued shortly.

At the press conference here this afternoon, the two men who said they saw marks on Paisley's body indicating "foul play" had differing accounts of why they waited more than a half-year to make their information public.

Dr. Weems, who said that he and Langley were fishing on his boat when word came that a body had been found in the bay, said he did not mention the marks on Paisley's neck earlier because "I wasn't asked to."

Weems, who said he performed a preliminary examination of the body, said he made no mention of the neck mark in his report that he forwarded to the state medical examiner. He said it was not his job to make a thorough examination of the body.

The coroner said he had no idea why Dr. Fisher failed to mention the neck mark in his autopsy. Weems refused to characterize what he saw as murder, saying only, "I call it foul play." Langley, who said that he knew Paisley from seeing him around his marina, claimed he was told by unnamed officials at the time the body was brought ashore to keep quiet about what he had seen.

"They told me Mr. Paisley was CIA. Shortly after this happened, I thought this was all government, all secret. I thought I don't want to get into all this," Langley said. He said he finally called Paisley's widow, who lives in McLean, three weeks ago after hearing news reports that said she had not yet received her husband's life insurance.

Paisley, according to lawyer Fensterwald, was insured for \$200,000. His group insurance with the CIA for \$30,000 has already been paid, Fensterwald said. He said Mutual of Omaha Life Insurance Company and Mutual of New York have refused to pay off on their policies because of questions

about the identification of the body and the cause of death.

A spokesman for Mutual of Omaha said today that his company had paid its claim, which he said was "considerably less than \$100,000," earlier this year.

The Washington Post learned today that Mutual of New York, which announced it will shortly pay off Paisley's \$100,000 policy, made its decision after insurance investigators spent six months examining evidence found on the body.

The investigators, sources said, were satisfied that five fingerprints taken from the body found in the bay were those of Paisley. Sources said the insurance company also checked a dental plate found on the body with a dentist who recognized it as a plate he had made for Paisley.

Questions about oversized underwear found on the body were resolved, sources said, when investigators learned that a friend of Paisley had recently bought him several pairs of underwear that were too large.

Fensterwald, who said today he still is not sure that the body found in the bay was Paisley's, claimed he is certain Paisley was murdered.

"Jumping off a boat with gun in hand, pulling the trigger while in the water, is, to be charitable about the matter, a weird way to commit suicide," Fensterwald said.

Paisley's 22-year-old son, Eddie, said today that after talking with Langley and Weems he believes his father was dragged from his boat with a rope and killed.

Paisley acted as CIA link to Nixon's team of Plumbers

WASHINGTON — Former CIA official John A. Paisley worked with President Nixon's White House Plumbers, the Sunday News Journal has learned.

CIA associates and friends of Paisley, who disappeared while he was sailing in the Chesapeake Bay last September, have confirmed that Paisley was a CIA contact man for the secret team organized by Nixon to stop press leaks.

Paisley's link to the Plumbers was one of the matters the Senate Intelligence Committee had asked the FBI to address in its probe of the Paisley case.

However, the committee has rejected the FBI's report as unsatisfactory and launched its own investigation into what it calls the "troubling questions" surrounding Paisley's fate.

When the committee asked the Justice Department to look into the Paisley case last January, those questions were included. The FBI was given the assignment by the Justice Department.

But according to Delaware Democratic Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr., who sits on the committee, the FBI "begged the questions."

"I don't think they did a thorough job," Biden said. He said he was "disappointed" in the contents of the 12-page report the FBI submitted on the case.

The report includes the FBI's concurrence with the Maryland State Police conclusion that Paisley probably committed suicide.

A week after Paisley disappeared, a body later identified by the FBI as his was found floating in the Chesapeake Bay near where he was last seen. The cause of death was a close-range bullet wound to the brain.

Paisley, then 55, was a retired deputy director of strategic research for the

CIA. He was an expert on the U.S. spy satellite system and Soviet military strategy.

Who was killed and how pose the "ultimate question," as far as Biden is concerned.

Biden said he hopes the committee will "flush out the (answers) and force . . . the FBI to be more thorough with it, in addition to us going on (with our probe)."

"Where it will lead us, I'm not prepared to say," he added.

Committee sources Friday told the Sunday News Journal that, in addition to the Plumbers link, the committee will investigate:

□ Paisley's connection to several Soviet defectors, including Yuri Nosenko and Arkady N. Shevchenko, and a man publicly known only as "Igor."

□ Paisley's true role while with the CIA, including whether he was ever involved in cloak-and-dagger operations.

□ Paisley's responsibilities and activities as a member of the SALT I negotiating team in the early 1970s.

□ The effect of Paisley's disappearance on SALT II — which is now being negotiated.

"There are a number of things that have to be cleared up," Biden said last week, "not the least of which is the question of: Was it suicide? Was it Paisley's body? That's my concern."

Those questions were first raised by the Sunday News Journal and Paisley's wife, Maryann. Early this year the News Journal papers looked into the identification of the body and found that the Maryland State Medical examiner, Dr. Russell K. Fisher, never saw any of the evidence used to make the identification. Neverthe-

less, he certified the body to be Paisley's.

The News Journal papers found that the fingerprints used in the identification were mailed in to the Phoenix, Ariz., FBI office in 1940 — supposedly by Paisley. The FBI and the CIA both claimed no newer prints existed, even though Paisley was a career government official. Later the News Journal papers found a set of prints in Paisley's merchant marine records, a few blocks from FBI headquarters in Washington.

The second phase was the "eyeballed" identification of the upper plate found in the body. Dr. Albert F. Brendes, who said he was Paisley's dentist, identified the plate without consulting records. He said he had no records, and, when pressed by reporters, admitted the plate "could have been a million people's denture."

Spokesman Spencer Davis predicted that the Senate committee's Paisley probe would take "about four more weeks of investigative work, plus whatever it takes to write the report."

He said the FBI report is not being released, because "some members of the committee feel our own report ought to be released next to the FBI report to show the discrepancies."

The CIA has refused to comment on the Paisley case, as well as the upcoming Senate investigation.

However, CIA director Stansfield Turner laid out his agency's position on the Paisley case in the Central Intelligence Agency Retiree's Newsletter.

In that recent newsletter, Turner is quoted as saying: "We have cooperated fully with the Maryland State Police, the FBI and the committees of the Congress who have investigated it. Nothing was withheld."

He described Paisley as a "highly respected former CIA analyst and manager . . . (who) had no clandestine or covert responsibilities here (at CIA). Yuri Nosenko has no recollection of ever meeting him . . . no classified material was found either on his boat or at his home."

Turner also attacked "inaccurate and irresponsible reporting that has surrounded Mr. Paisley's death and the subsequent investigations . . . Conclusions have been literally fabricated in some cases," he said.

The agency has denied Paisley had any part in the SALT I negotiations — even though Paisley's role was confirmed by William G. Hyland, a former CIA official and aide to former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger who shepherded the SALT I agreement.

The CIA has also refused to respond to questions about Paisley's connection to the White House Plumbers. Paisley's exact role remains to be determined.

The Plumbers were a "super-secret team of operatives — some of whom had been associated with the CIA — organized by Nixon to stop embarrassing press leaks. They used CIA tactics to carry out their mission and sometimes used CIA equipment."

Their most famous — or infamous — operation was a break-in at the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist. They were looking for damaging information that could be used against Ellsberg in retaliation for leaking the controversial Pentagon Papers to The New York Times.

Paisley's connection with the Plumbers was confirmed by Bernard Fensterwald, a Washington attorney now representing Maryann Paisley. Fensterwald also represented Watergate burglar James R. McCord. McCord, a for-

mer CIA agent who was credited with breaking open the Watergate case, fired Fensterwald just before McCord cooperated with authorities.

Numerous intelligence sources have provided information that contradicts Turner's description of Paisley's career. They have also said repeatedly that the CIA was very uncooperative with the committee's Paisley investigation.

One committee source told the Sunday News Journal that Paisley was, in fact, involved in CIA covert operations from time to time and used several aliases when meeting with Soviet defectors — including Nosenko.

"The agency has used these aliases to lie," the staff member said. "They have said to us that a defector like Nosenko never talked to Paisley."

"Hell," the staff member said, "of course he didn't. He talked to a man who was Paisley but was introduced under a different name."

Nosenko, the highest-ranking Soviet KGB agent ever defect, met with Paisley at least three times in the year before Paisley disappeared, a committee staff member said.

When the CIA looked through Paisley's papers after he was reported missing, they found a handwritten note which said, "Now what about Shevchenko?" according to a committee source.

Shevchenko, the top-ranking Soviet United Nations staff member defected to the U.S. last spring. He was an expert on disarmament.

Sources at the committee say the note found in Paisley's papers was destroyed by the CIA. They say they want to know what it meant and why it was destroyed.

Also, sources on the committee have told the Sunday News Journal that a top-secret CIA phone book was found among Paisley's papers — contradicting Turner's remark that no classified material was found.

Committee sources have said that they are also concerned about a possible connection between "Igor" and Paisley during the SALT I negotiating sessions in Vienna and Helsinki.

Igor is the code name for a KGB officer who posed as a potential turncoat — known as a mole — and may have duped former CIA director Richard Helms into giving away valuable information to the Soviet Union.

Committee spokesman Davis refused to talk about the specific questions the committee would look into. But, when pressed about the Igor leaks at SALT I, he said, "Obviously, that is one of the questions we have."

While the Senate conducts its investigation, the Carter administration will be lobbying for support for SALT II. The SALT ratification in the Senate will be hanging over the Paisley investigation, according to members of the committee, since verification of the agreement is critical.

If the Russians have information that would enable them to circumvent U.S. monitoring of an arms buildup, the agreement would be difficult to enforce.

As a result, the man handling the probe, committee counsel Michael Epstein, is "trying to keep a low profile on this," a committee source said. "He doesn't want to be accused of blowing SALT right out of the water if they catch the CIA giving away secrets."

The committee is expected to call in some outside consultants to help in the probe — but their use will be kept to an absolute minimum. Epstein has started contacting — and interviewing — several investigators who worked with him in 1975 when Idaho Sen. Frank Church was committee chairman and conducted widely publicized probes of the CIA.

Special security precautions have been ordered by Epstein to prevent leaks of the Paisley investigation to the press.

The first order he gave was that the FBI report to the committee be marked "secret."

BALTIMORE (AP) -- THE CIA FEARS THAT FORMER AGENT JOHN PAISLEY MAY HAVE BEEN MURDERED BY SOVIET SECRET POLICE BECAUSE OF HIS CONNECTION WITH THE AGENCY'S SATELLITE SURVEILLANCE SYSTEM, THE WILMINGTON NEWS JOURNAL REPORTED TODAY.

CIA SPOKESMAN DALE PETERSON IN WASHINGTON EARLIER CHARACTERIZED PAISLEY'S WORK AS "ANALYTICAL, NOT COVERT." PETERSON SAID THE OFFICE OF STRATEGIC RESEARCH ANALYZES FOREIGN MILITARY PROGRAMS, ESPECIALLY THOSE OF THE SOVIET UNION.

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Evidence in Paisley's Death Points to Suicide, Police Say

Capt. Paul Rappaport, head of the state police investigation into Paisley's death, joined Smith, two FBI agents and a representative from the state medical examiner's office at yesterday's press conference in an unusual hour-long briefing.

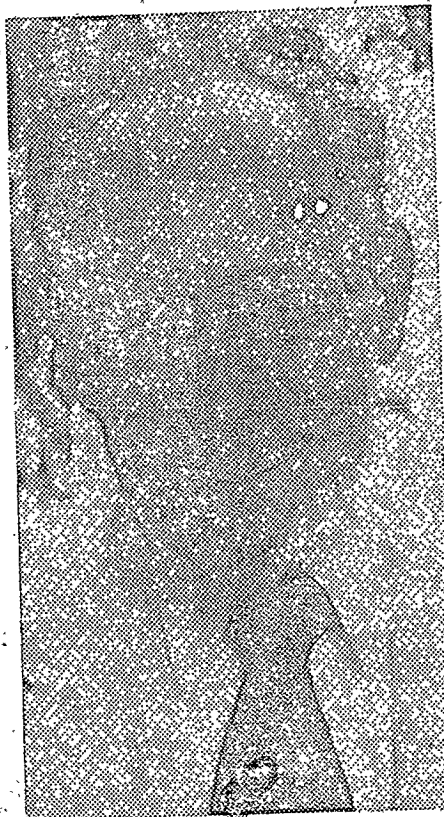
Rappaport cited several factors to support the suicide theory. Although Paisley's estranged wife Maryann has been quoted as saying he was "in fine spirits" at the time of his death, Paisley had talked about suicide two years ago, according to Rappaport. "Associates have told us he had been depressed but was coming out of it," Rappaport said. "Sometimes that's the most critical time."

Paisley's psychiatrist, Dr. Jack Baruch, told a reporter last week that the 55-year-old retired CIA official had given "absolutely no clues" that he was contemplating suicide but may have had "feelings of loss and abandonment" because of recent developments in his personal life.

Rappaport also said Paisley once told an associate, "If he should die, he wanted to die in the water. . . . He said he wanted to be buried at sea."

The bullet that killed Paisley, striking him above and behind the left ear, was fired from a 9 mm automatic pistol, the type of gun Paisley was known to keep aboard his sailboat. Although Paisley reportedly told a friend he wanted to sell the gun this summer, Rappaport said yesterday the gun was seen on the boat one week prior to Paisley's disappearance. The weapon has not been found, police said.

Although no bloodstains were found on Paisley's boat, police theorize he could have shot himself while leaning

... death officially "undetermined"

over the water or hanging from the boat's side.

FBI agent John Kilty said no traces of gunpowder were found on Paisley's hands. "We cannot tell if the man fired the gun," Kilty said, adding that any chemical residue would be washed off in the water.

Initially, the presence of two weighted diving belts on Paisley's body was a mystery, but state police previously reported their discovery

that Paisley had bought a second belt at a Northwest Washington diving shop on Sept. 8. Paisley was said to be an expert skindiver, but skindivers ordinarily would have no use for more than one belt.

Smith also said police are looking into a similar death, that of Yale University Professor Richard Wolfgang, who was found shot to death, his body weighted down with rocks, in Long Island Sound in June 1971. Wolfgang was a chemist who did research with nuclear reactors. His death was ruled a suicide.

Police said they had requested Paisley's CIA personnel file. Paisley retired as director of the CIA's Office of Strategic Research in 1974, but had been retained as a consultant. At the time of his death, Paisley was also earning \$36,000 a year as an executive assistant at the accounting firm of Coopers & Lybrand.

Rappaport said police are also checking into Paisley's life insurance. According to family attorney Terrence O'Grady, Paisley was covered by a government insurance policy, and suicide would not affect payment of benefits.

Although CIA documents pertaining to Paisley's most recent project were found on the boat and in his apartment at 1500 Massachusetts Ave. NW., CIA spokesmen have denied that Paisley was in any way involved with a breach in the security in the agency's so-called KH-11 satellite surveillance system. A report in a Wilmington, Del., newspaper had linked Paisley to the theft of documents related to that system.

State police said yesterday they have removed five of the seven investigators from the case, but will continue their inquiry into Paisley's death.

WASHINGTON (AP) -- THE FBI IS INVESTIGATING THE POSSIBILITY OF GUN PLAY IN THE DEATH OF FORMER CIA OFFICIAL JOHN PAISLEY, WHOSE BODY WAS FOUND SHOT AND STRAPPED WITH DIVING WEIGHTS IN CHESAPEAKE BAY, FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS SAY.

OFFICIALS, WHO ASKED NOT TO BE IDENTIFIED BY NAME, SAID THE FBI IS TAKING A CLOSE LOOK AT THE CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING PAISLEY'S DEATH. GOVERNMENT SOURCES SAID THERE WAS A POSSIBILITY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT COULD HAVE JURISDICTION IN THE CASE ON GROUNDS THAT A CRIME MAY HAVE BEEN COMMITTED ON THE HIGH SEAS.

FBI OFFICIALS HAD PREVIOUSLY DENIED INVOLVEMENT IN THE INVESTIGATION OF PAISLEY'S DEATH.

POLICE IN MARYLAND HAVE TENTATIVELY SAID THAT PAISLEY COMMITTED SUICIDE. THE STATE POLICE ARE DUE TO ISSUE A REPORT IN THE CASE LATER THIS WEEK.

PAISLEY DIED FROM A SINGLE BULLET WOUND IN THE HEAD AND NO GUN HAS BEEN RECOVERED. HIS BODY WAS DISCOVERED IN THE BAY ON OCT. 1.

STATE POLICE SAY THEY BELIEVE PAISLEY KILLED HIMSELF WHILE BOATING ON SEPT. 24. THEY ALSO SAY THEY FEEL HE WAS BESET BY FINANCIAL, MARITAL AND HEALTH PROBLEMS.

IN A MEETING WITH REPORTERS, THE FEDERAL OFFICIAL WHO REQUESTED ANONYMITY ALSO SAID THAT NO FURTHER CRIMINAL CHARGES ARE EXPECTED AGAINST REP. DANIEL J. FLOOD, D-PA. THE MEETING WAS HELD TUESDAY BUT THE OFFICIALS REMARKS WERE EMBARGOED FOR USE 24 HOURS LATER.

FLOOD WAS INDICTED LAST WEEK BY A FEDERAL GRAND JURY ON BRIBERY AND CONSPIRACY CHARGES. THE VETERAN CONGRESSMAN HAD BEEN INDICTED SEPT. 5 ON CHARGES HE LIED TO A TRIAL JURY AND A GRAND JURY WHEN HE DENIED RECEIVING PAYOFFS.

THE FEDERAL OFFICIAL, NOTING THAT FLOOD WILL BE 75 NEXT MONTH, SAID, "AT SOME POINT YOU SAY WE HAVE ENOUGH," WHEN ASKED IF ANY FURTHER CHARGES MIGHT BE BROUGHT AGAINST THE CONGRESSMAN.

THERE HAVE BEEN REPORTS THAT FLOOD WAS STILL UNDER INVESTIGATION BY THE U.S. ATTORNEY'S OFFICE IN PHILADELPHIA IN CONNECTION WITH CHARGES THAT HE USED HIS INFLUENCE TO GET FEDERAL AID FOR A \$65 MILLION EXPANSION OF HANHEIM HOSPITAL IN PHILADELPHIA.

A COPYRIGHTED STORY IN THE WILMINGTON NEWS-JOURNAL TODAY CLAIMED THE CIA WAS INVESTIGATING THE POSSIBILITY THAT PAISLEY WAS KILLED BY RUSSIAN KGB INTELLIGENCE AGENTS.

MARYLAND OFFICIALS SAID THERE IS NO WAY OF PROVING HIS DEATH AS A SUICIDE.

THE CIA SPOKESMAN SAID THE AGENCY WAS WILLING TO LEAVE THE CASE TO THE MARYLAND AUTHORITIES BECAUSE THE AGENCY CONSIDERED IT A POLICE CASE AND NOT A MATTER OF NATIONAL SECURITY.

THE NEWS-JOURNAL QUOTED CPL. JOHN MURPHY OF THE MARYLAND STATE POLICE SAYING POLICE HAVE NOT BEEN DIRECTLY CONTACTED BY THE CIA "BUT YOU CAN TELL THEY HAVE BEEN WORKING QUIETLY AROUND US. IT REALLY IS VERY WEIRD."

SYNOPSIS:

[REDACTED], USDS, advised through liaison that [REDACTED] Virginia Beach, Virginia, [REDACTED] told him Soviet Embassy some months ago arranged to [REDACTED] in Virginia Beach area. After attempting to report this directly to SAC Norfolk, [REDACTED] was telephoned by another FBI Agent, to whom [REDACTED] provided details and who indicated FBI would get back to [REDACTED]. The Soviets thereafter cancelled the [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] was not recontacted by FBI. Later, [REDACTED] realized the proposed date he was to [REDACTED] to Soviets was either day before or day after the day body of John Paisley, former CIA official, was found. 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Sniper shooting victim worked on CIA projects

WHEATON, Md. — A 53-year-old Maryland woman, slain by a sniper in her home, worked as a translator on some of the Central Intelligence Agency's most sensitive projects.

The Sunday News Journal has learned through police and CIA sources that police now believe the murder of Irene Yaskovich may be related to her work for the spy agency. Police say they have recovered sensitive intelligence documents from the murder scene.

Mrs. Yaskovich was shot in the back as she sat at a typewriter in the dining room of her Arcola Avenue home 17 days ago.

The front of her house was peppered with bullet holes, perhaps from a semi-automatic weapon fired by one or several snipers.

Neighbors knew the mother of three as a civic activist who often kept to her home for long periods. What they didn't know, and what the initial news stories did not disclose, is that she had been working for the CIA for perhaps 30 years.

Montgomery County Police investigating the killing say they have no suspects. But spokesman Phillip B. Caswell said the police "are looking for CIA employment. We have no other motive right now. We are hoping this might give us a clue."

The Sunday News Journal has confirmed through top-level CIA sources that Mrs. Yaskovich had worked as a Russian translator for the CIA since the early 1950s.

She had done translation for a number of CIA officials and for Soviet defectors who were under the agency's protection.

Mrs. Yaskovich also served as a translator for the agency's Office of Strategic Research, a role that brought her into contact with John A. Paisley, the former deputy director of that office.

Paisley's disappearance while he was sailing on the Chesapeake Bay on Sept. 24, 1978, caused tremors in the intelligence community. The case still has not been explained to the satisfaction of the U.S. Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.

Caswell said "numerous documents that we cannot talk about" were recovered from the Yaskovich household. Police sources say the documents are obviously the property of the Defense Intelligence Agency and the CIA.

Other local police departments are cooperating in the investigation because of their experience in previous national security cases, including the Paisley case.

The CIA will not comment on Mrs. Yaskovich's work as a Russian translator. Spokesman Dale Peterson said, "We can neither confirm nor deny allegations of Mrs. Yaskovich's employment with the CIA."

The Sunday News Journal has learned, however, from her family, police and CIA sources that Mrs. Yaskovich was considered a top translator at the CIA and had been given a variety of high-level security clearances.

As of now police don't even have an idea what kind of weapon was used in the slaying of Mrs. Yaskovich. Bullet fragments recovered from the body and from the dining room wall have been sent to the Treasury Department's Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms Division laboratory.

CIA sources said Mrs. Yaskovich began her career with the intelligence community in the early 1950s. In recent years she worked at home as a contract translator. Among the communications she translated were those obtained through the top-secret electronic listening post that the CIA tunneled into East Germany in 1961.

According to CIA sources, Mrs. Yaskovich translated work, includ-

ing conversations with several defectors, on a regular basis for the agency's Office of Strategic Research and John Paisley. Mrs. Yaskovich's murder is at least the third death or disappearance in the last 20 months of Americans involved in highly secret Soviet intelligence work.

In addition to the Paisley case, there is the still unsolved murder of a State Department code officer, Ralph Madden. Madden's body was found, with multiple stab wounds, in a suburban Virginia field on April 30. Madden had access to secret information at the State Department. Police have no clues in that slaying, which is also being investigated by the State Department's Office of Security.

Police investigating Mrs. Yaskovich's murder say she was shot late on the night of June 5. In the unpretentious suburban Washington, D. C., neighborhood, police say, usually the most serious crimes are occasional burglaries. However, no evidence of a break-in was found at the Yaskovich home.

Police believe at least one sniper aimed a weapon — probably a semi-automatic rifle — at the front of the house and began shooting. A large number of bullet holes in the front of the house made police suspect there was more than one gunman.

Neighbor Trish Oliverio, 17, says she heard the sounds: "My sister thought it was firecrackers, but I knew it wasn't."

Police believe the sniper or snipers sprayed shots across the front of the house at 1817 Arcola Ave. beginning about 11:30 p.m.

"If it were an automatic rifle or handgun the murder would have taken just a few minutes," according to Caswell.

About 12:15 a.m. Friday, Mrs. Yaskovich's teen-age daughter Janice came home from work and found her mother dead on the bedroom floor. Police believe Mrs. Yaskovich

lived about half an hour after being shot and crawled several feet.

Harold Yaskovich, her husband of 27 years, a retired Air Force lieutenant colonel, did not learn of his wife's death until the next day when he returned from a consulting assignment at Langley Air Force Base in Hampton, Va. Police interviewed him at length and say he is not a suspect.

The couple has another daughter and a son.

The victim had pushed for street lighting on Arcola Avenue and fought a federally funded subsidized housing project in a nearby development.

Neighbors are puzzled by the killing. They recall Mrs. Yaskovich as a woman who always had a petition to be signed. The Yaskoviches' acti-

vities caused the family to expand to a second house. Three years ago they bought the house next door.

Mrs. Yaskovich was a popular volunteer worker in the Newton Steers for Congress campaign. Several of the Republican candidate's staff attended her funeral.

Her work in the intelligence community began in her native Pittsburgh. She was recruited by the CIA while she was an employee of the Interior Department. In 1955 she was given a cover assignment with the Harry Diamond Laboratory in Washington. The Diamond Labs were used as a CIA front during the 1950, according to CIA sources.

The CIA sponsored her education at Georgetown Universities Institute of Language and Linguistics.

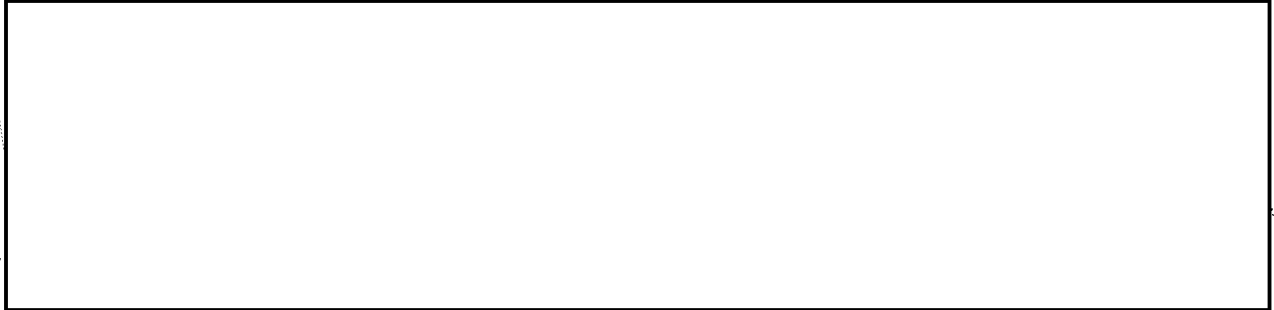

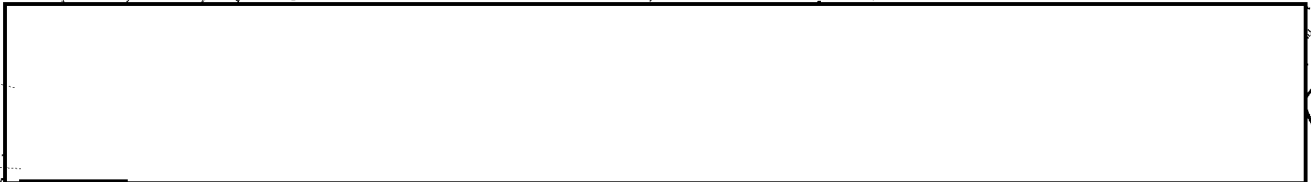

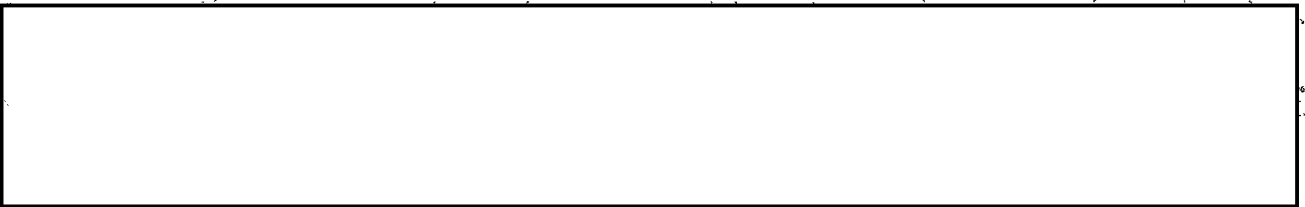

Top-secret notebook found on Paisley's boat

Washington—A CIA "red-line" telephone notebook—containing top-secret numbers of American spies—was among the effects left by John Arthur Paisley, the high-ranking intelligence officer who allegedly committed suicide last September.

Maryland State Police and Mr. Paisley's wife say that the notebook contained numbers and names in his own handwriting. The book bore a strip of red tape along its outside left edge—a CIA marking which indicates that it must never leave agency headquarters and must be kept in a safe.

The notebook contained top-secret telephone numbers which connected with American intelligence-gathering operations, according to Central Intelligence Agency sources who have examined it and Senate Intelligence Committee investigators who also learned that the notebook was found among Mr. Paisley's possessions.

The notebook was discovered in a briefcase full of papers, recovered from Mr. Paisley's boat, the 34-foot sloop Brillig, a few days after a body said to be Mr. Paisley's was found floating in the Chesapeake Bay last October 1.

The Maryland State Police confirmed that they looked at the red-line book, but pointed out that the briefcase in which it was contained already had been handled by several people by the time they arrived on the scene to investigate the circumstances surrounding the discovery of the body. The first people to board the boat were two United States coast guardsmen, who had been called to the scene of the abandoned Brillig, and representatives of

the CIA, who were notified by the Coast Guard.

The State Police, therefore, while confirming that they found the phone book in the briefcase, do not dismiss the possibility that it might have been planted there.

The discovery of the red-line phone book, along with several recent statements by officials in the U.S. intelligence community, suggests that Mr. Paisley may have been involved in covert operations at the time of his disappearance—rather than doing routine weapons-analysis work, as the CIA has maintained.

The red-line notebook, an indexed office model with a metal pop-up cover, contained several telephone numbers without names next to them. It also contained a few numbers listed next to the names of agency personnel—among them, a name identified by sources as that of the current London CIA station chief.

Taking such a notebook, which contains the unlisted numbers of covert intelligence operatives working at the agency, out of headquarters, is considered a security breach, according to CIA sources familiar with the agency's communications system.

"You know, for most of us who work here," said one CIA analyst who works in the agency headquarters in Langley, Va., "it's just like any other job. But the people whose numbers are in the red-line books, well, that's certainly the covert side."

Since his alleged suicide eight months ago, the CIA has maintained that John Paisley had no contact with the agency's

covert operations and that he had never worked in counterintelligence.

But The Sun's six-month investigation of the case has revealed a John Paisley who differs in some respects from the one characterized by the CIA.

Sources currently in the CIA and a former high-ranking officer of the agency, as well as naval intelligence sources within the Defense Intelligence Agency, have said this of Mr. Paisley's covert career with the CIA:

• Mr. Paisley regularly interrogated both dissident emigrants and political defectors from the Soviet Union—questioning, among others, a former KGB agent, Yuri Nosenko, and Capt. Nicholas Shadrin, a defector from the Soviet Navy—in an effort to locate possible Soviet intelligence operatives within the ranks of dissidents or to sniff out double agents among the defectors.

According to one counterintelligence source, Mr. Paisley wrote out questions for Mr. Nosenko—"requirements" to establish the defector's credibility or "bona fides"—which were presented by professional interrogators, often under hostile circumstances. Mr. Paisley also analyzed Mr. Nosenko's responses, the source said.

Several other agency sources have confirmed the questioning of both Mr. Nosenko and Captain Shadrin. In addition, Eva Shadrin, the wife of the Soviet naval officer (he disappeared while walking through a public square in Vienna in 1975) said Wednesday that her husband in recent years had moored his sailboat at tiny Solomons Island, Md., on the Chesapeake Bay.

John Paisley also moored his sailboat—the Brillig—at Solomons. It was from this mooring, owned by Col. Norman Willson, said to be the last man to communicate with Mr. Paisley, that he set sail last September 24 on the voyage that ended in his disappearance and alleged suicide.

In addition, Mrs. Paisley and other agency sources have said that the CIA has operated a "safe house" (a protected location in which intelligence activities, such as defector interviews, are carried out) at Solomons for many years. Mrs. Paisley says her husband often mentioned interrogation sessions that had taken place on the island.

During the early stages of the second round in the strategic arms limitation talks which took place in Helsinki, Mr. Paisley was approached by agents of the KGB—the Soviet intelligence counterpart to the CIA—and was asked to become a double-agent (to provide information to the Soviet Union) on the subject of the U.S. negotiating position at the talks. Mr. Paisley immediately reported the contact to his superiors in the CIA, and was advised to "take the pitch," according to sources.

Mr. Paisley, sources said, subsequently fed information to the KGB about the United States fallback position in the SALT negotiations and about how the U.S. intended to "cheat" on SALT. It is not known whether Mr. Paisley fed the Russians accurate information or "disinformation," as deliberate misinformation is known in the intelligence world.

Mr. Paisley apparently was involved, about five years ago, in an extraordinarily complicated, agency-wide search for a well-entrenched Soviet double-agent, or "mole," who had penetrated the highest levels of the CIA command.

That search, which reportedly culminated in a byzantine operation called "Kitty Hawk," focused on secret communications in which both the CIA and the KGB regularly contacted Captain Shadrin, Mr. Nosenko, and two other KGB defectors—a spy named Klimov (his name was later changed to Anatoly Golitsyn) and another, known as "Igor," whose last name is believed to have been Kubkov.

While the complicated series of counterintelligence maneuvers that produced Kitty Hawk has not yet been made clear, it is known that Captain Shadrin, who had defected to the West from the Soviet Union in 1959, was approached by KGB operatives, reportedly in 1966, and asked to "double"—to begin supplying the Russians with intelligence information.

Captain Shadrin reported the contact to his superior, Adm. Rufus Taylor, of the naval intelligence section of the Defense Intelligence Agency. Admiral Taylor, who died a few weeks before Mr. Paisley's disappearance last year, conferred with James Jesus Angleton, then head of the CIA's Counter-Intelligence Division. Mr. Angleton advised Admiral Taylor to persuade the Russian defector to take the pitch.

Captain Shadrin did. According to sources, he began feeding the Russians misinformation from a variety of CIA sources. It is believed, however, that one of these sources might have been the "mole"—and that the disinformation which he was providing might have been coded, thus re-establishing a link which had been broken by National Security Agency de-coders in the early 1970's.

From 1972 to 1974, a study was done within the CIA on who the mole might be. The report was put on the desk of the then-director of central intelligence, William J. Casey.

Soon after the completion of the report, which grew out of operation Kitty Hawk, Captain Shadrin disappeared while walking through a public square in Vienna. Allegedly, he was in plain view of the CIA station in that city when he disappeared and has not been heard from since.

Some agency sources believe that Mr. Paisley—in his role as deputy chief of the CIA Office of Strategic Research—may have been charged with collecting and collating the disinformation which was provided to the Russians and fed back by the U.S. during operation Kitty Hawk. These sources also suggest that Mr. Paisley might have been analyzing the wording of the information provided by the CIA sources—in order to unravel the code, and thus unearth the mole.

"Paisley may have gotten caught in the middle," suggests one intelligence source. "Maybe he learned who the mole was. Or maybe he stumbled across some piece of information which might have led to the mole—and which made him an instant liability."

There is some other evidence to suggest that Mr. Paisley was deeply involved in counterintelligence work—and perhaps in a search for a mole—at the time of his death.

Mrs. Paisley reports that James Angleton asked her to meet him in a bar, a few months after her husband's death. "He came in wearing a black trenchcoat, a hat pulled down low over his eyes, and carrying a newspaper under his arm," she says.

"He walked past my table, circled the entire bar, sat down at a table and then beckoned me over."

"He said he had only two questions to ask me. He wanted to know which CIA operatives John had known during his time at the Imperial War College in London, for one thing."

Mrs. Paisley refuses to permit Mr. Angleton's second question to be printed, claiming that it is "too sensitive."

According to agency sources, Mr. Paisley had several meetings—as late as last August, about a month before his disappearance—with the current director of

central intelligence, Adm. Stansfield Turner. Admiral Turner consistently has minimized Mr. Paisley's role within the agency since the body identified as Mr. Paisley's first surfaced.

Investigators at the U.S. Senate Intelligence Committee, who have refused to accept an earlier FBI finding which characterized Mr. Paisley's death as an apparent suicide, have confirmed that their continuing investigation focuses on certain counterintelligence activities in which they believe Mr. Paisley to have been involved.

There are literally dozens of unanswered questions about both Mr. Paisley's disappearance and the nature of the work he was doing for the agency in recent years. These include:

The first document the U.S. Coast Guard found after boarding the Brilling last September 25. According to Mrs. Paisley, it was a badge marked "Washington Post Agent No. [followed by a three-digit number]". The Coast Guard immediately called the Post, and was told that the newspaper did not have an "agent" named Mr. Paisley on its payroll.

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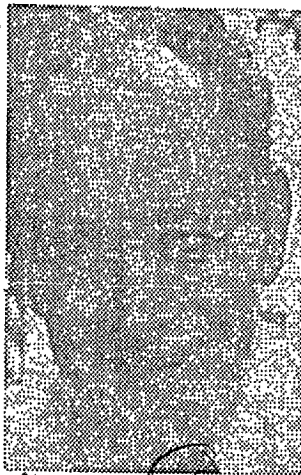

Paisley CIA Role Questioned

Former CIA intelligence officer John A. Paisley regularly interrogated both dissident emigrants and political defectors from the Soviet Union, according to the Baltimore Sun.

The newspaper's six-month investigation of the case has revealed a Paisley who differs in some respects from the routine weapons analyst characterized by the Central Intelligence Agency.

Paisley disappeared last fall after going sailing on the Chesapeake Bay in his 34-foot sloop Brillig. A few days later, a body said to be his was found floating in the bay and the death was ruled as

a probable suicide.

The discovery of a top-secret CIA telephone notebook among Paisley's effects in a briefcase on the boat also suggests the former high-ranking CIA intelligence officer may have been involved in covert operations at the time of his disappearance, the Sun said.

The "red-line" book — which contained top-secret numbers of American spies — bore a strip of red tape along its edge. That CIA marking indicates it must never leave agency headquarters, where it is kept in a safe.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION:

The clad body is that of an adequately nourished, well developed White male showing advanced decomposition changes, measuring 5'11" and weighing 144 pounds. The clothing will be described in detail below. There is no scalp hair present. There is a gunshot wound to the head to be described below in detail. There is green-tan-brown mottling of the face, chest, abdomen, and extremities with skin slipping. There is "washer womans" skin of the hands and feet. The color of the irides cannot be ascertained due to decomposition changes. The external ears show multiple irregular defects. There is a full denture at the maxillary jaw. The lower jaw shows natural dentition (see attached chart). The protruding tongue is brownish gray. The penis is circumcised and both testes are descended into the scrotum. Rigor mortis is absent.

Received with the body is a wrist watch at the left wrist having a silver colored stretch watch band, a black face with green numerals. The make is "CHALET". Also received is a blue cigarette lighter.

CLOTHING:

The body is clad in a soiled white t-shirt, brand name Jockey size 38-40, a pair of solid blue Levi slacks with a zippered pocket at the right front and two zippered pockets overlying the buttock pockets, a pair of white, soiled jockeyshorts brand name "JOCKEY" size 30 and light blue socks. Around the upper abdomen is a black divers belt with lead weights and a silver colored buckle and the initial "S". Received separately is a red skin divers belt with lead weights. The combined weight of both skin diver belts is 38 pounds.

EVIDENCE OF INJURY:

GUNSHOT WOUND, PENETRATING HEAD:

The entrance wound is located in the left parietal occipital region, 3" below the top of the head and $5\frac{1}{2}$ " to the left of the sagittal midline. Brain tissue is exuding from the wound. The wound is irregularly rounded, $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x 1", a small amount of grayish discoloration at the margin, and no marginal abrasion. The wound penetrates the scalp, passes through the occipital parietal skull with internal bevelling and powder deposition around the bony defect and on the dura. The brain is liquified and a large caliber, jacketed, deformed missile is found within the liquid brain substance and is not initialed for future identification (victim unidentified). The calvarium and base of the skull show numerous linear and comminuted fractures. The trajectory of the missile is from left to right, but due to the liquified state of the brain, and the multiple fractures of the skull, the trajectory cannot be further defined. The jacket is recovered at the entrance wound, separate from the lead missile which is recovered in the brain substance within the cranial vault.

There is no evidence of medical therapy.

INTERNAL EXAMINATION: The autopsy is performed utilizing the thoraco-abdominal and posterior scalp incisions. Trooper [] and Trooper [] of Maryland State Police are in attendance and have taken the cigarette lighter, upper denture, pubic hair, wrist watch, and the deformed lead missile and copper jacket in evidence. b6 b7C

HEAD: The reflected scalp reveals an area of pinkish red discoloration underlying the gunshot wound, measuring 2"x3". There is a comminuted fracture of the parietal occipital skull with internal bevelling and powder deposition on the bone and dura. The meninges show an entrance defect. The brain is liquified. There are linear and radiating fractures from the wound defect involving the left parietal, right parietal, and right frontal bones, and there are multiple linear and comminuted fractures of the base of the skull involving right and left posterior fossae, petrous temporal bones bilaterally, right and left middle cerebral fossae, sphenoid bone, and the orbital roofs bilaterally.

NECK: The airway is clear. The laryngeal and tracheal mucosa show greenish gray discoloration. The hyoid bone, laryngeal cartilages, and cervical vertebral column are intact.

BODY CAVITIES: The pleural, pericardial and peritoneal cavities show dusky, grayish green surfaces and no abnormal accumulation of fluids.

CARDIOVASCULAR SYSTEM: A 260 gm heart is normal in configuration. There is moderate atherosclerosis of the right coronary and left anterior descending coronary arteries with 40% stenosis. The myocardium and endocardium are autolysed. The intact aorta show moderate atherosclerosis.

RESPIRATORY SYSTEM: The right and left lungs weigh 560 gm and 540 gm respectively. Both lungs are autolysed and show dark bluish purple discoloration of the pleural surfaces and parenchyma. The bronchial tree shows grayish green discoloration of the mucosa. The pulmonary vascular tree is unremarkable.

HEPATOBIILIARY SYSTEM: The 1260 gm liver is covered by a dusky grayish tan capsule and the reddish gray parenchyma is autolysed. The gallbladder contains 6, tan, faceted gallstones. The extrahepatic bile ducts are unremarkable.

GASTROINTESTINAL SYSTEM: The tongue is tannish gray and protuberant. The esophagus reveals a grayish-green mucosa and the stomach is empty. The gastric mucosa; small and large bowel mucosae show greenish gray discoloration. The appendix is present.

GENITOURINARY SYSTEM: The right and left kidneys weigh 140 gms respectively. The capsules strip with ease to reveal dark reddish brown cortices. The cortical-medullary junction is vague and the tissue is autolyzed. The ureters, urinary bladder and prostate gland are unremarkable.

SPLEEN AND PANCREAS: The 90 gm spleen is covered by a grayish blue wrinkled capsule. The brownish blue parenchyma is soft. The pancreas is autolyzed.

ENDOCRINE SYSTEM: The thyroid, adrenal, and pituitary glands are autolyzed.

MUSCULOSKELETAL SYSTEM: See evidence of injury.

Results of Examination/Analysis:

An examination was conducted using the submitted jacket, and bullet core marked for identification (Q-1) & (Q-1A).

As a result of this examination the following facts were noted: The combined weight of the core and jacket equals 106.5 wt. The measured dimensions of the land and groove impressions are comparable to numerous makes of 9mm auto type pistols. However two of the most popular makes of pistols are the ASTRA and STARR, that meet the class characteristics of the land and groove dimensions.

The class characteristics eliminate the LUGER, -RADOM- and WALTHER (P-38).

The loaded cartridge (K-1) is a Winchester-Western (W-W) Luger or (Parabellum). However the bullet of K-1 was pulled for examination; the powder charge appears to have been the type used by W-W for this type load. The bullet weight is 106 grains, with a solid base, and exposed lead hollow point.

Telephone communication with a representative of S.A.A.M.I. indicates that W-W has used this type cartridge case for only the past 10 years, but have never loaded this type of bullet in the mentioned type cartridge case. Thus after removal of the bullet from K-1 it was determined that the above described bullet had been loaded in the submitted cartridge (K-1) by someone other than the Winchester-Western Factory.

The evidence bullet jacket (Q-1) was of the same type as the above described pulled bullet (K-1). It was also noted that certain die marks on the solid metal base of both (Q-1) and (K-1) match indicating the possibility of their being from the same manufactured line.

The above evidence is retained in the Ballistic Unit of the Laboratory and will be released to a Representative of your Post after contacting the Ballistic Unit on ext. 286 to arrange for a mutually convenient time of transfer.

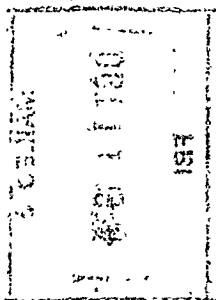

Specimens Q1 and Q2 were obtained by
Special Agent [redacted] of the FBI Laboratory.

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Specimens Q1 and Q2 were analyzed by instrumental means for the elements antimony and barium, which are components of most primer mixtures and can be deposited on the back of the thumb, forefinger and connecting web area of the hand when a firearm is discharged.

No significant amounts of antimony and barium were detected on specimen Q1 or Q2. Therefore, it could not be determined if PAISLEY had discharged a firearm. However, this does not preclude the possibility that PAISLEY could have discharged a firearm and no gunshot residues were deposited on the hand, or that these residues, if deposited on the hand, were removed by washing or wiping before the specimens were obtained.

It is pointed out that it is highly unlikely that any antimony and barium associated with the discharge of a firearm would remain on the hand of a person who has been submerged in water.

Specimens Q1 and Q2 were consumed during the course of the examination.

NOTE: Mr. Fensterwald is known through reports in the news media and by previous contacts with the FOIPA Branch of the Records Management Division (RMD) to be the attorney for the Paisley family. Although it is not the general policy or practice of the Identification Division to disseminate copies of fingerprints for noncriminal justice purposes, this request is being honored for several reasons. First, the request does not involve fingerprints taken in connection with a criminal justice matter and, therefore, the laws and regulations governing the dissemination of criminal history information are not applicable. Second, the requester evidently wants the fingerprints in order to make an independent determination regarding the accuracy of the FBI's identification of Paisley's body. Since the fingerprints in the possession of the FBI are the only means by which such a determination can be made, fairness and reason require that we make them available to the requester. Third, Section Chief Thomas H. Bresson, Disclosure Section, FOIPA Branch, RMD, has advised that there are no provisions of either the Freedom of Information or Privacy Acts which prohibit or exempt such a dissemination. Finally, Unit Chief [redacted] Intelligence Division, has advised that there is no ongoing investigation in this matter.

Ex-CIA Official Found Shot Dead

PIKESVILLE, Md. (UPI) — A former CIA official found floating in the Chesapeake Bay Sunday with 40-pound weights tied to his body had been shot in the head, state police said yesterday.

Police spokesman William Clark said the body was identified as John Paisley, a retired CIA official missing since Sept. 24. He said police were investigating the possibility of a suicide or homicide.

But Edward Paisley, the 21-year-old son of the 55-year-old

Washington resident, said his father was in "good spirits" the day he left on a sailboat trip across the bay and he said he doubted it was suicide.

"I don't know of any reason why he would kill himself," Paisley said. "My father was an excellent sailor and swimmer. He went down just about every weekend to sail. He seemed in good spirits. Everyone that talked to him that day said he was fine."

Paisley, who retired in 1974 as deputy director of the CIA's office of Strategic Research in Langley, Va., was last seen Sept. 24 when he left in his 30-foot motorized sailboat for Solomon's Island.

Slain CIA official tied to secret report

WILMINGTON, Del. (UPI)—Former CIA official John Paisley was working on a draft report of Soviet military capability before his body was found floating in Chesapeake Bay, the Wilmington News-Journal reported yesterday.

In a copyrighted story, the News-Journal quoted FBI sources as saying the draft report was found in a briefcase aboard Paisley's sailboat, the Brillig, when it was found by the Coast Guard Sept. 25. Paisley's body was found in the bay several days later, shot in the head and strapped to 40 pounds of diving weights.

CIA spokesman Dale Peterson yesterday described the newspaper report as "absolutely untrue."

One highly informed FBI source told the News-Journal the documents were classified "highly sensitive" but not stamped with security classification because the material had not been submitted to the CIA for classification.

The source said the documents would have been classified as top secret information if they had been submitted.

Maryland State Police last week theorized that Paisley fatally shot himself and fell into the Chesapeake Bay. His body was recovered Oct. 1.

However, police have not called the incident a suicide and have officially listed it as an "undetermined death."

The News-Journal said the CIA is looking into the possibility of

murder in the Paisley case.

The Senate Intelligence Committee and FBI are interested in Paisley's death because of the importance of information relating to the secret KH-11 satellite, which Paisley reportedly helped to develop, the newspaper said.

The satellite would be used to monitor Soviet compliance with the strategic arms limitation agreement now under negotiation, the newspaper said.
