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In addition the questionnaire reflected that ROBBINS had had no prior military service, had no relatives in the Government service, and was not a member of any organizations or clubs. His Social Security # was reflected as [REDACTED] b7c

His physical examination reflected that he must wear glasses at all times.

He was hired by WRIGHT AERONAUTICAL CORPORATION on March 18, 1946 and laid off on June 28, 1946.

There was no photograph in the file.

On March 9, 1950 SA JOHN R. MURPHY of the New York Office telephonically advised that JOSEPH ARNOLD ROBBINS, true name JOSEPH REGENSTREICH, was employed from October 1942 to June 1943 by the M. W. Kellogg Company, Jersey City. He requested that this employment be verified and that the records be examined.

SA JAMES O. PONDER on the same day advised that the following information was contained in the records of the M. W. Kellogg Company concerning ROBBINS:

The date of his application was October 28, 1942 and he was listed under the name of JOSEPH REGENSTREICH, 5501 14 Avenue, Brooklyn. He described this as his present and permanent address, and his telephone number was listed as WI 5-1229. He was born on February 3, 1916 in the United States. He was described as being 5' 10" tall; weight 169. He is married and his wife's name is BEATRICE. His father, LOUIS, was born in Rumania and claimed to be a U. S. citizen. The father is a salesman. The mother was listed as CLARA, born in Austria. No maiden name was given. ROBBINS' Social Security Number is [REDACTED] b7c. The file indicates that he changed his name to JOSEPH A. ROBBINS (no date). He was employed by Kellogg Company in New York City as a piping draftsman. This employment, which began on October 28, 1942, was terminated April 16, 1943 because of lack of work. His supervisor at Kellogg in New York City was an individual by the name of J. G. BROWN. He gave as personal references LOUIS SADICK, 320 Cedar Avenue, Highland Park, New Jersey, Mechanical Engineer; LOUIS LEITER, 1830 East 22 Street, Brooklyn, Civil Engineer; and RALPH RABIN, 88-10 Whitney Avenue, Elmhurst, Long Island, who is a Mechanical draftsman.

ROBBINS listed as his friends in the company: A. BONAROS, piping draftsman; S. COLLIER, structural department; and a Mr. WEBER. He indicated in his application that he was a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers; that he had a \$1000 life insurance policy at an unspecified company; that he objected to travel; and that his hobbies were carpentry and hiking. In regard to a question as to administrative ability, he stated that he had been

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in charge of two junior draftsmen at one time. He listed as previous employers SANDERSON & PORTER, 44 Wall Street from June 1942 to October 1942 as a piping draftsman; supervisor Mr. GARLAND. He indicated that he worked for the War Department on a Civil Service job in Metuchen, New Jersey from March 1941 to December 1941 as a piping draftsman. His supervisor was Captain NEFF.

ROBBINS was employed by the Rosen Construction Company, South 9 and Kent Avenue, Brooklyn from 1937 until 1939. His application indicated that this company had been dissolved. In regard to education he stated that he attended Public School 181 in Brooklyn, New York from 1921 to 1931. He attended New Utrecht Technical High School, Brooklyn from 1931 to 1934. He attended CCNY from 1934 to 1941, at which time he graduated with a B.S. Degree in Civil Engineering. He indicated that he took graduate work from February 1942 to June of 1942, after which he wrote HARDY CROSS. The significance of this is not known. His application also stated that he wrote for the technical magazine while at CCNY. He stated that he had had considerable work in water and low pressure steam and in piping for dams.

The Newark indices were negative on SADIX.

Agent GEORGE W. RAE made a check at Raritan Arsenal, Metuchen, New Jersey where he determined that ROBBINS was employed as a draftsman in the Publications Department. The Publication Department handled many secret documents. ROBBINS left Raritan Arsenal on November 25, 1941. His address at that time was 1043 53rd Street, Brooklyn. It was also determined by SA RAE that Captain ROBERT LESLIE NEFF, Serial No. 0384442, was employed at the Raritan Arsenal from July 1941 to February 2, 1943, when he was transferred to the Detroit Arsenal. NEFF's father was listed as residing at 1546 Westfield Street, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

It was also determined by Agent RAE that 322 Cedar Avenue, Highland Park, New Jersey has been occupied from 1940 to the present by JIM OETTEL, (1940 to 1942); CLARENCE PARTCH (1942 to 1944); and Reverend SAHR, (1944 to date).

The city directories for 1940 to 1946 do not list SADICK's name.

The above information was telephonically furnished to Agent MURPHY who stated that it would be incorporated in a teletype from New York on the same date.

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BERTHA BECKER aka Mrs. Charles Lipstein

The following investigation concerns BERTHA BECKER who was listed by JOSEPH ARNOLD ROBBINS in his employment application at WRIGHT AERONAUTICAL CORPORATION, Wood-Ridge, New Jersey, as his sister,

The City Directory for Newark dated 1947 reflects that BERTHA BECKER, widow of JOSEPH BECKER, married CHARLES LIPSTEIN. The same city directory reflected that CHARLES LIPSTEIN, wife BERTHA, is a jeweler in New York and resides at 201 Milford Avenue, Newark, New Jersey.

The Credit Bureau of Greater Newark, Ind., 45 Branford Place, Newark, New Jersey in a report dated March 1948 reflects that CHARLES LIPSTEIN, wife BERTHA, resides at Apartment 12-A, 201 Milford Avenue, Newark, New Jersey. He was described as 48, white, married with one child and living at the above address for twelve years. His business was reflected as CHARLES LIPSTEIN, 64 West 48th Street, New York City, Jewelry. It was indicated that he is in business for himself and that he manufactures models for the industry. He has been in this business for the past five years. This same report reflects that Mrs. LIPSTEIN is employed by MAX BLAU AND SON, Office Furniture, Newark, New Jersey as a bookkeeper for the past year at a salary of \$56. a week. It was reflected that she has an account at the Howard Savings Bank, Newark, New Jersey.

Another credit report dated May 1945 reflects that Mrs. BERTHA BECKER, 201 Milford Avenue, Newark, New Jersey is the widow of JOSEPH BECKER who died in 1943. She was described as being about 35 and having one child age 11 1/2 years. She was reported to have lived at the above address for the past 9 1/2 years.

In addition Mrs. BECKER was listed as a bookkeeper and stockholder for about three years of BECKER'S MOTOR TRANSPORTATION, INC., 200 Ridgewood Avenue, Newark, New Jersey. The report explained that JOSEPH BECKER'S two brothers, JACK and ABRAHAM, were President and Treasurer, and Secretary, respectively. Mr. BECKER formerly operated this company as I. BECKER AND SONS, INC., 254 Gates Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey. The original business was established in 1917 by his brothers, ABRAHAM and JACK, and at the time of this report (1945) they were reported to be operating six trucks.

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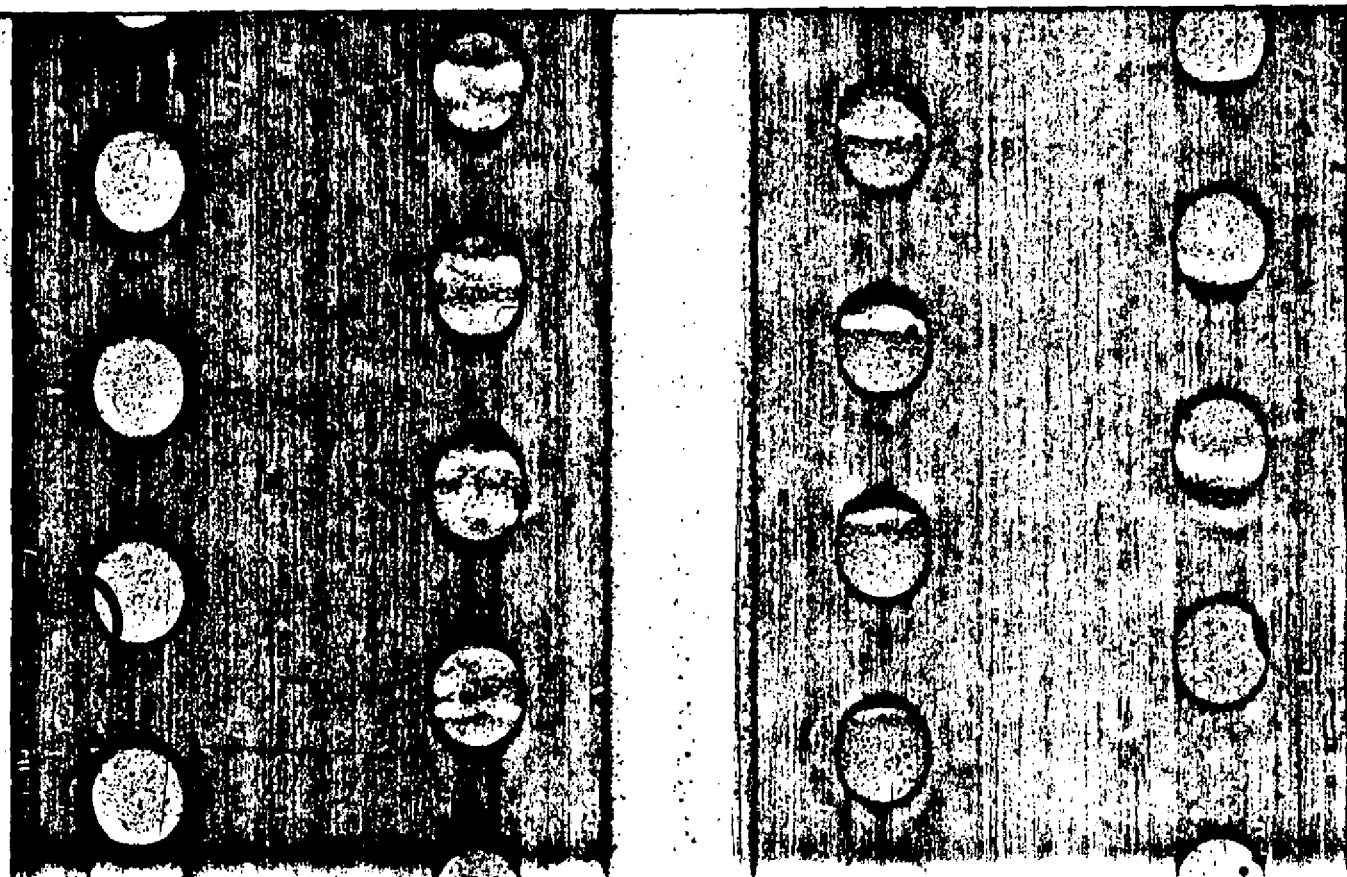

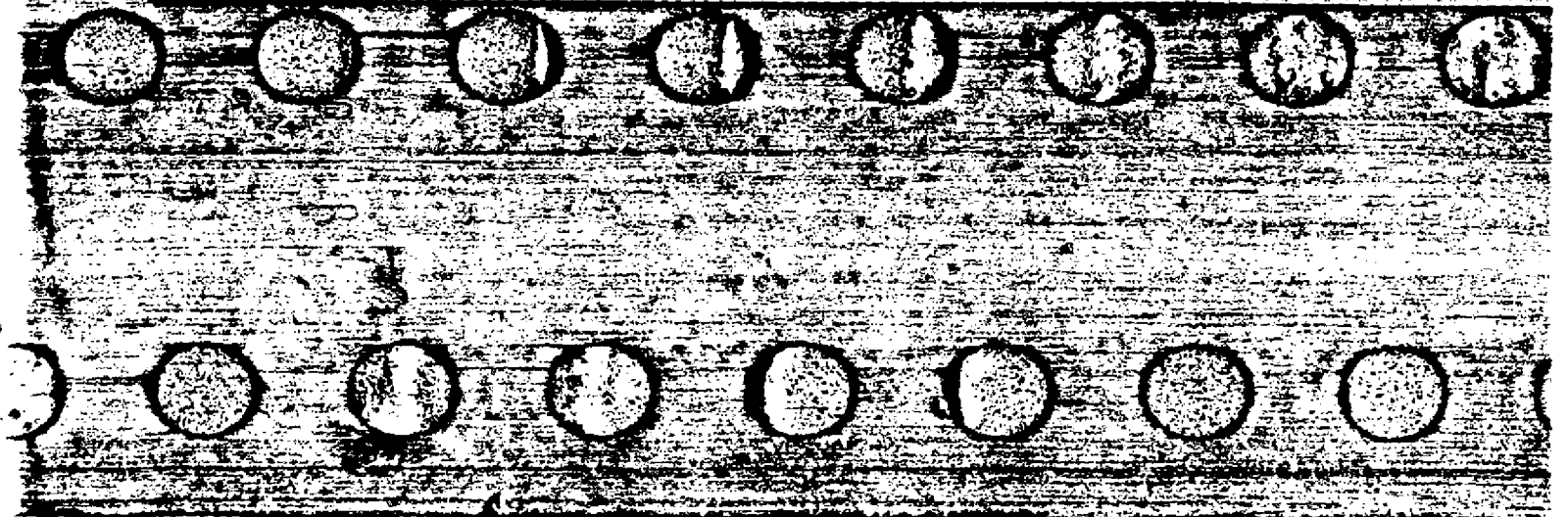

Please refer to your letter dated February 11, 1950, in which you express your deepest displeasure over my failure to immediately evaluate this very important matter and to institute inquiries to obtain the details of Dr. Fuchs' confession through my established sources in London. You point out that my prime responsibility in London is the development of contacts which will assure immediate referral to the Bureau of information pertinent to the Bureau's work.

I regret advising that I had no knowledge of this case, either officially or otherwise, from any source nor did I even know the name of Subject Fuchs, or that he was the subject, until the evening of February 2, 1950, after he had already been arrested. The first official piece of correspondence from the Bureau on this case was your cable of February 1, 1950, instructing that I advise Sir Percy Sillitoe that you were sending a top expert via air to be of any possible assistance. I did not know the significance of this message nor the case to which it related until I delivered the message to Sir Percy Sillitoe on the same date. It was at this time that

and actually it was not until the evening of February 2, 1950, I knew and confirmed through E-3 that Subject's name was Fuchs. This, as mentioned above, was after Fuchs had already been arrested. (S) X

In view of this situation, I found it most difficult to institute any kind of an inquiry to obtain the details of Dr. Fuchs' confession. Since the matter was then "sub judice" and Special Agent Lish Whitson was already en route to personally handle the case with them and also in view of the fact E-3 was instructed to handle the case with the Bureau through the Washington representative, it is speculative whether I would have had any success in obtaining his confession. I do not mean to imply that, had the Bureau given me advance information as to the developments in this case, I would have been able to obtain a copy of Fuchs' confession prior to his arrest. I sincerely believe, however, that the possibility of obtaining it may have been much easier. (S) X

After receiving your original cable in this case on February 1, 1950, I evaluated that it pertained to a very important case indeed, otherwise the Bureau would not be sending a representative to London to personally handle it with E-3 nor would it have been afforded such secrecy. It was assumed under these conditions that after the arrival of the Bureau's representative that the case was of such magnitude and importance that I should withdraw. Nevertheless, I have assisted Agent Whitson in every way possible in getting the information he is seeking from E-3 and other sources and consequently, assume responsibility. (S) X

It was embarrassing not only to E-3 but also to this office that the E-3 representative in Washington was kept informed of developments and selected by the Bureau to work on this case in preference to me. As far as E-3s concerned, I have not as yet received official clearance from the Bureau to work on this matter. (S) X

Regarding my lack of alertness and initiative in failing to advise the Bureau telephonically of developments which occurred during the arraignment, I regret advising that the principal concern at that time was in attempting to determine in what way the testimony offered varied from that which had already been forwarded to the Bureau by Agent Whitson. Consequently, a cable seemed at the time to be the best medium of transmittal and it was not known until the Bureau called that there had been a breakdown of cable.

On the morning of March 11, 1950 ROBERT B. HEINEMAN, accompanied by his attorney, JAMES MAHON, and SA B. S. Gordon, of the Boston Office, arrived in New York City for the purpose of having HEINEMAN view JOSEPH ARNOLD ROBBINS, with alias, to determine whether ROBBINS was identical with the man seen by HEINEMAN in his home in 1945.

At about noon on March 11, 1950 ROBBINS left his home at 5501 14th Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, and thereafter HEINEMAN was afforded the opportunity of viewing ROBBINS from all angles, with and without his hat, and in each instance HEINEMAN was emphatic in stating that ROBBINS is not identical with the person who had visited his home in February, 1945. HEINEMAN commented that ROBBINS' features are larger and coarser than those of the unknown individual and that ROBBINS in no way resembled this unknown man.

Thereafter an attempt was made to have HEINEMAN view EUGENE LOUIS FISHER, whose photograph HEINEMAN had previously selected as somewhat similar to the unknown man. However, FISHER'S activities for the weekend were not known and he was not seen at any time in the vicinity of his apartment while HEINEMAN was present. It is believed advisable, however, in view of HEINEMAN'S selection of FISHER'S photograph, to have him view FISHER. Accordingly, the New York Office will furnish the Bureau and Boston with FISHER'S teaching schedule at Long Island University during the week in order that the Boston Office can perfect plans to have HEINEMAN again come to New

Background:

In February, 1950, Dr. Tony Hilton Royle Skyrme was interviewed by the Newark Office in this case. Skyrme worked with Fuchs, both in England and in this country. During the interview, Skyrme stated that Fuchs was friendly with J. Robert Oppenheimer and others who were among the top leaders at Los Alamos. Newark has requested advice concerning a contact with Oppenheimer for information about Fuchs. J. Robert Oppenheimer is the famous atomic scientist. A brief summary memorandum, dated February 5, 1950, concerning him is attached hereto. He has admitted knowing and concealing Soviet attempts to learn of atomic research at the University of California. There is no definite assurance that Oppenheimer himself was not involved in giving away information to the Russians. However, he has been repeatedly interviewed by the Army and by this Bureau. It is conceivable, because of his background and prior record of concealment of Russian espionage attempts, that Oppenheimer may have some pertinent knowledge about Fuchs which he has not volunteered but which he might divulge upon interview.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that Oppenheimer be interviewed. If you approve, there is a letter attached hereto to the Newark Office requesting the interview.

You will recall that the Bureau requested Mr. C. A. Rolander of the AEC to conduct a search of AEC documents in an effort to locate one entitled "Problems of the Practical Application under Production Conditions of the Process of Thermal-diffusion of Gases." Rolander made a check of available files in Washington, but was unable to locate any such document. He then asked Dr. Paul McDaniels of the Commission to make a check of all technical documents. McDaniels checked available technical studies in Washington and was unable to locate any such document. He made a trip to Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and issued instructions that a complete check of all documents there should be made. This check involved the reviewing of between twenty and thirty thousand documents at Oak Ridge. This check was completed in about two weeks. In addition, a card file check was made and all other feasible sources were checked. No document was found entitled as above.

In connection with efforts to locate the document entitled, "Problems of the Practical Application under Production Conditions of the Processes of Thermal Diffusion of Gases" as an aid to identifying the Unknown Subject [redacted] with aliases, a request was made by the Bureau of the Atomic Energy Commission for a check of its records. The Atomic Energy Commission has advised that an examination of available files in Washington, D.C., including all technical documents and studies, has been made without locating any such document.

The Commission also advised that a complete check had been made of all documents at Oak Ridge, Tennessee, to which place thermal diffusion documents had been retired. This check involved reviewing between 20,000 and 30,000 documents at Oak Ridge, a card file, and other miscellaneous feasible sources. No document entitled as above was found.

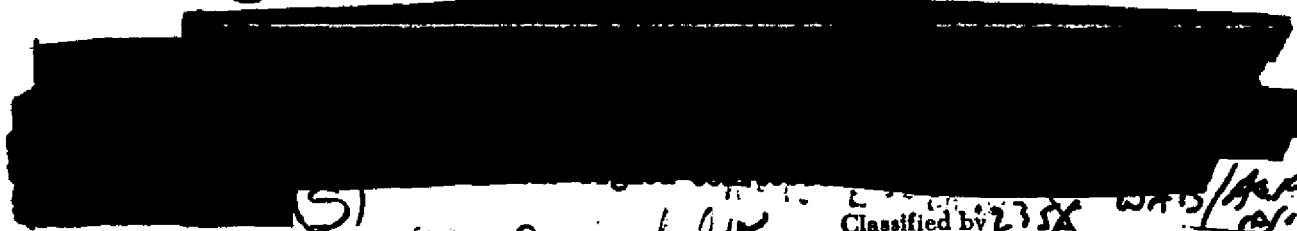

Since Special Agent Whitson arrived in London on the night of February 3, 1950, the question of possible interrogation of Fuchs was raised and was continued to be raised with the officials of [MI-5] particularly with Sir Percy Sillitoe and the interrogating officer, W. J. Skardon. (S) u

At the time Whitson arrived in London the matter was already before the court. Fuchs had been charged and was awaiting arraignment and trial. British criminal regulations prohibit interviews with prisoners awaiting trial or after commitment, unless the prisoner has requested such an interview. Consequently, the [MI-5] interrogator was not able to see Fuchs for some days after his arrest. As soon as he did see Fuchs the results of that interview were made available to Whitson and were cabled to the Bureau, and the same is true of each succeeding occasion on which the [MI-5] interrogator was able to speak to him. (S) u

It was explained to Whitson that the procedure in the case was entirely out of the hands of [MI-5]; that the prosecution was being handled by the Public Prosecutor under the Attorney General of Great Britain, and that the custody of the prisoner was in the hands of the prison system under the Home Office. (S) u

Not being sure how the man was going to plead and knowing the laws of Great Britain and the procedure in the court, the Attorney General and the Public Prosecutor felt that it was impossible to permit an interrogation of Fuchs by a representative of a foreign government prior to his trial, since such interrogation would of necessity have to be based upon his confessions and would jeopardize the entire prosecution if it was brought out in court that such had happened. Agent Whitson was advised that the British authorities did not wish to take any chances which might in any way jeopardize this prosecution because of the fact that the entire case hung upon Fuchs' confessions without corroborating evidence. (S) u

As soon as the trial was completed, Sir Percy Sillitoe attempted to sound out the Home Office on the matter of an interrogation of Fuchs by Whitson. He likewise instructed that Skardon should at the first opportune moment get a commitment from Fuchs regarding a request for an interrogation by an FBI representative. (S) u

Throughout Whitson's meetings with Skardon and in discussions of Fuchs' various interrogations by Skardon, it was impressed upon the latter that as an old police officer with years of experience in New Scotland Yard Skardon should be able to convince Fuchs that he should talk to the FBI. Skardon takes considerable pride in his ability as an interrogator and this matter has been impressed upon him by Agent Whitson as a matter of primary importance. Skardon has stated that having regard to Fuchs' general attitude he has not yet deemed it prudent to ask Fuchs whether the latter was prepared to see an officer of the FBI. Skardon stated he feels that the time is not yet ripe to introduce a new interrogator but in the absence of the express attitude of the Home Office toward immediate interview of Fuchs, he was prepared to put the matter to Fuchs bluntly at Whitson's insistence. The Home Office, however, in expressing its disapproval took the matter out of Skardon's hands since knowing their disapproval he would not be on sound ground in risking antagonism of Fuchs by attempting to persuade the latter to agree to an interview. 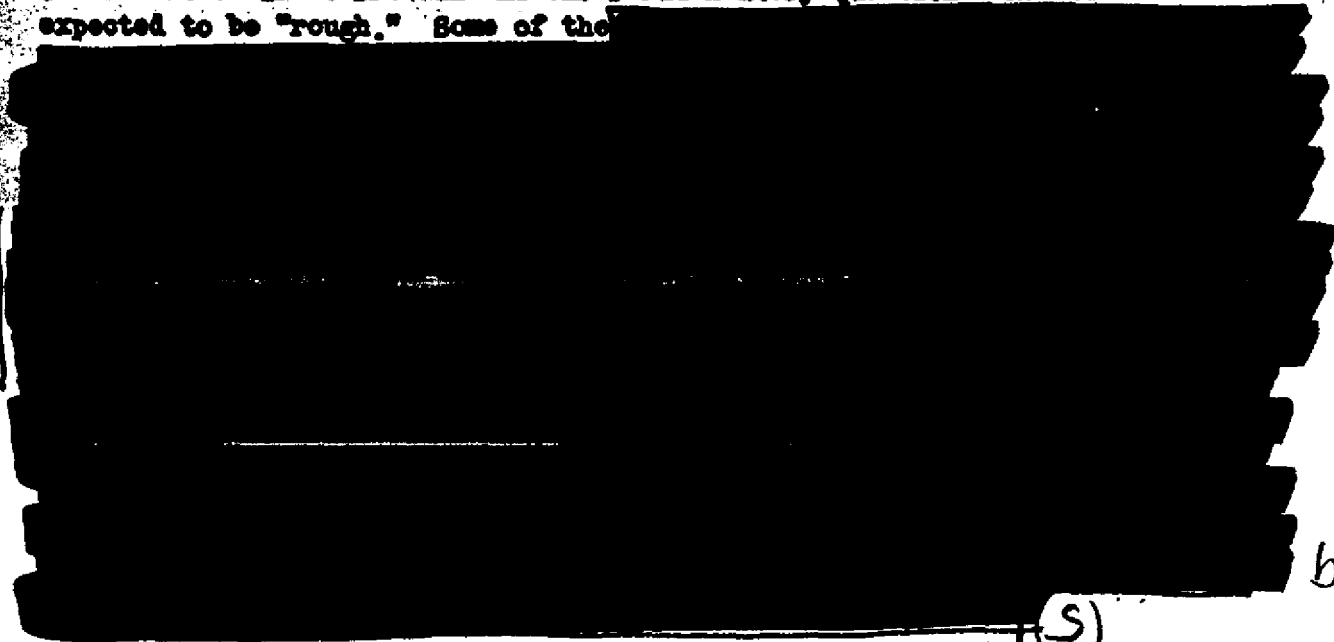
Sir Percy Sillitoe discussed the proposition of an interview with Fuchs by an FBI representative with Sir Frank Newsam, Permanent Under-Secretary for the Home Office. The Home Office of course has custody of Fuchs. Newsam (S) u

advised Sir Percy Sillitoe that there were three reasons why the FBI could not interrogate Fuchs at this time: first, that the 21-day period for appeal had not yet run; second, that the present place of detention of Fuchs was only temporary, namely, Wormwood Scrubbs Prison in London, and his permanent place of detention has not yet been settled on; third, that the Fuchs case was a matter of Parliamentary questions and debates in the House of Commons and the Home Office felt that these matters would have to be out of the way before a foreign intelligence agency could be permitted to interrogate Fuchs. The Fuchs case is a "hot potato" and source of grave embarrassment to the Government of Great Britain and the Parliamentary questions and debates are expected to be "rough." Some of the

Sir Percy Sillitoe stated that he wanted to cooperate with the Bureau and assist you in every manner possible. As an indication of his good faith he had instructed that questions propounded by the FBI should be asked of the subject and photographs desired displayed by the FBI be displayed to the subject on a priority above MI-5's own requirements. In doing this he observed that MI-5 had a number of individuals whom they desired to identify but unless Fuchs volunteered their identities they were concentrating on the FBI's expressed interests.

The situation as it stood when Agent Whitson left London on March 11, 1950, was that any additional inquiries directed by the Bureau would be given top priority on any further occasions when Fuchs requested an interview by Skardon and that the results thereof would be furnished promptly to the Legal Attache (S) u

The matter of interview rests as follows. The Home Office has indicated they would not accept any request through the Department of State for an interview with Fuchs until the three factors abovementioned had been disposed of, the most important of which are the political considerations involved in the Parliamentary debates. Fuchs himself has not yet softened up, according to Skardon, to the point where he is willing to request an interview by the FBI, although Skardon has promised that he will propose this question at the first opportunity. Taking the most unsympathetic view of the matter and giving the British credit for no cooperation, MI-5 could say there is no use asking us to put pressure on Fuchs because the Home Office will not grant an interview; the Home Office could truthfully say there is no use asking for authorization of an interview because Fuchs has not requested one. (S) u

Nevertheless, it is Whitson's considered opinion that Skardon as a police officer with pride in his work will put the question to Fuchs as soon as Fuchs' attitude indicates receptiveness. (S) u

The officials of MI-5 have refrained from making any pointed inquiries concerning stories uncomplimentary to them appearing in the American press. They did express some concern and wonderment as to the matters set forth in the first "Time" magazine article appearing in "Time's" international edition on the Fuchs case. They were assured that "Time" magazine did not speak for the Bureau and thereafter they raised no questions concerning news accounts. Their concern at the time of the "Time" magazine article was predicated upon references to Fuchs' confessions and the ease with which they were obtained, which were of a nature calculated to arouse the court trying the case since the matter was within the jurisdiction of the court at the time the article was published. The representatives of MI-5 were available to Agent Whitson on all occasions on which the Bureau specifically requested that they be contacted. Besides that, during the week and on weekends at hours which they did not normally work and would not have worked except for the insistence of Agent Whitson, they appeared to be entirely cooperative. Skardon, the interrogator, kept appointments with Fuchs at Whitson's insistence when Skardon might better have been under a doctor's care. Sir Percy Sillitoe came to his office though sick to discuss the Home Office attitude on interrogation with Whitson, and when Whitson left London had been confined to his bed on doctor's orders. The general attitude of the personnel of MI-5 was one of cooperation due primarily to the high regard in which they hold you as Director of the FBI.

Despite the degree of cooperation extended by MI-5, the fact remains that no Bureau representative has as yet interviewed Fuchs. This can be attributed primarily to the attitude of the Attorney General and the Public Prosecutor prior to the trial and the currently expressed views of the Home Office since the trial.

SUBJECT: FOOCASE

PURPOSE

To briefly identify [unclear] who was in France prior to the last war.

BACKGROUND

Konstantin Lafazanov has stated that Fuchs once told him that in pre-war years in France, he had worked with Henri Barbusse, a French Communist novelist.

(65-58805-673)

According to the records of the Westboro State Hospital, Westboro, Massachusetts, where Kristel Heineman, the sister of Fuchs is presently confined, Konstantin Lafazanov has been acquainted with the Heineman family over 10 years. Six months after meeting Kristel, he became intimate with her and claims to be the father of the last two Heineman children. There is a notation at the hospital that some persons there feel that Lafazanov belongs there-also. During World War II, Lafazanov was classified 4-F by reason of a medical statement that he was psychoneurotic. (Memorandum from Ladd to the Director dated March 22, 1950, entitled "Focase, Espionage - R.")

Based on Lafazanov's allegations, a review of Bureau files regarding Barbusse was begun but a complete review has not been made since it was determined that Barbusse died in 1935. His connection with this case, therefore, if any, is extremely remote and a complete file review or further investigation concerning Barbusse appears to be unwarranted. Barbusse lived from 1874 until 1935. He was a novelist (Encyclopedia Britannica). He was the principal organizer of the World Congress Against War at Amsterdam, Holland in 1932. At that time, Barbusse was a leader in the French Communist Party and a leader of the Executive Committee of the Communist International. He came to the United States in 1933 and helped organize the American League for Peace and Democracy (later known as the American Peace Mobilization) which ceased to exist in the Winter of 1939-40. (61-7589-89)

ENCLOSURE ATTACHED

The American League for Peace and Democracy and the American Peace Mobilization have both been cited by the Attorney General as organizations coming within the purview of Executive Order 9835. Barbusse sat in the Praesidium at the 7th Congress of the Communist International at Moscow in July, 1935. (61-7559-A)

RECOMMENDATION

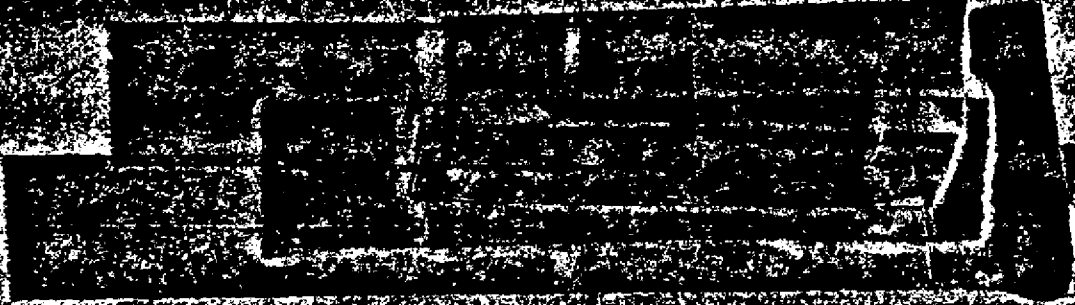
Although only about 1/3 of the Bureau references to Barbusse have been reviewed, it is recommended that a complete file review not be made since Barbusse died in 1935 and his activities can have little bearing upon instant investigation. It is further recommended that no further action be taken with respect to the Barbusse allegation in this case. It is further recommended that the notes of this incomplete file review be retained in the Fuchs files for the present in the event further reference to them becomes necessary.
