WHO'S WHO IN CIA?

An unusual book lies on our editorial desk. Its title WHO'S WHO IN CIA? -- A Biographic Reference Work Covering Collaborators of the Civilian and Military Secret Services of the US in 120 Countries.

Thus far, the world has never seen a publication of this sort. Therefore, our editor Franz HELM interviewed its publisher, Berlin publicist Dr. Julius MADER.

Question: Mr. MADER, what do you hope to achieve with this biographic secret service register?

Answer: The global strategists of North American imperialism use the scandal-ridden CIA like a dangerous weapon. All US espionage and sabotage activities are planned, prepared, executed, evaluated and controlled by specific individuals. If one wishes to take the required defensive steps against these subversive acts, one must be familiar with the organizers of North American "cloak-and-dagger" policy in sufficient time and with the maximum possible accuracy. My book names thousands of these subversive elements. In order to counter US global strategy in a special area, I placed emphasis on processing data from 120 countries on all five continents.

Question: This must have required an amount of effort which it is difficult to visualize. How long were you working on this book?

Answer: Ten years ago, I published a documentary report, entitled: <u>Gangsters in Action</u>, dealing with the establishment and crimes of the CIA. It could be said that I have been systematically working on <u>WHO'S WHO IN CIAP</u> since that time.

Question: How does that affect the currency of the information?

Answer: Naturally, this is assured. On the basis of research, which was also conducted in Mexico City, Yokohama, Bombay and Beirut, the book reflects the personal status as of the end of 1967 -- in individual cases, it even goes as far as the Spring of 1968.

Question: You are contravening the intensified CIA secrecy regulations through your work.

Answer: Certainly. It is said that the US secret service is as full of holes as Swiss cheese. For example, in April 1966, The New York Times published the results of its CIA agent counting efforts. The editors had found some 2,200 CIA agents under diplomatic cover at foreign representative facilities of the Department of State alone. However, The New York Times was not permitted to name a single name. In my book, those Interested will also find this circle of individuals, complete with detailed data, such as dates of birth, academic degrees, military service, career development, assignment locations and — I have restricted the last category to West Germany and West Berlin — residential addresses, complete with house numbers.

Question: Does the biographic data pertain only to CIA collaborators?

Answer: The CIA served as an appropriate synonym. You will also find that the publication contains personal data on secret service officers of the US Army, the US Navy, the US Marine Corps, and the US Air Force. US Military Attaches and US diplomats who have been expelled from socialist countries for espionage since 1945 are listed from A to Z. Also, anyone interested in FBI officials, both on domestic and on foreign assignment, will not find a derth of information.

Question: In how many languages has your work thus far appeared?

Answer: Currently, the book is in German and English. Publication in additional foreign languages is still currently under discussion with prominent publishing houses.

Question: In what do you see the principal effect of your right handily printed work?

Answer: First, in the fact that at one fell swoop, many hundreds of CIA men are deprived of their cover and the search-light of public [opinion] is focused on them and their activities, which endanger peace. Second, in the fact that precisely during a presidential election year in the US, a considerable portion of the "invisible government -- as the CIA is called in the US vernacular -- is identified by name and face [pictures?]. And third, in the fact that the branded CIA people cannot simply be sent off on new assignments to locations where their past CIA activities have remained unknown.

Let us take only three concrete examples from the book: C. G. COGAN, E. A. MARELIUS and P. R. PETERSON were unmasked by name years ago as agents of the CIA in New Delhi. The Department of State has since installed these subversion experts in the US Embassies in Khartoum, Stockholm and Warsaw. Such "transfers" will be rapidly detectable in my book, not only because of the biographic portion but also on the basis of the extensive specific geographic index.

Question: How do you visualize your further activities regarding this book?

Answer: As a rule, journalists do not like to discuss their future work. However, I cannot erase my sentence in the introduction to the book, which states: "Additional reference works could follow."


