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
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
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

The Political Role of the Securitate in the Romanian Government

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WARNING NOTICE

Unlike his predecessor, Minister of Interior Tudor Postelnicu continues to exert direct control over the State Security Department [Securitate], which makes him the most powerful individual in the Romanian security apparatus. Postelnicu is not b1 Per CIA

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popular within the security apparatus. In addition, his position places him in charge of monitoring the activities of the leadership of state and party organizations, thus aggravating the fear others have of him. Postelnicu owes his position and influence to the support of Elena Ceausescu and her son Nicu; he is their principal confidant for security matters. In the last year, Nicolae Ceausescu has tried to decrease Postelnicu's influence, possibly even considering naming him as a judet first secretary. However, so far he remains in his position. Elena Ceausescu once proposed that Postelnicu replace Ion Coman as the Party Secretary responsible for military and security affairs. This has not yet happened because Nicolae Ceausescu supports Coman; and the military, with Ilie Ceausescu, a Deputy Minister of the Ministry of National Defense and Ceausescu's brother in the forefront, is opposed to Postelnicu assuming this position. In an effort to penetrate the military, Postelnicu has proposed to Nicolae Ceausescu that the Intelligence Directorate (DI) of the General Staff of the Romanian Ministry of National Defense be merged with the Securitate and put under Securitate control.

- 3. On the other hand, Chief of State Security Iulian Vlad has considerable prestige within the security apparatus. Securitate officials describe him as intelligent, cunning, skilled, knowledgeable of his trade, calm in manner, and as having an open mind. In his position he must support Postelnicu, yet Vlad is wary of him. Postelnicu has constant direct access to Nicolae and Elena Ceausescu while Vlad does not see them as often.
- Because it is used to maintain the Ceausescu regime and is given free reign to do so, the security apparatus exercises great influence on the state and party leadership. Even though the fiction is maintained that the Securitate is under the control of the party, in reality the party is under the control of the Securitate. No important position is filled without the Securitate's approval, the leadership is monitored constantly by the Securitate, and the Securitate compiles dossiers on officials in positions of responsibility at all levels. In recent years the penetration of all segments of Romanian society, including government, military, party apparatus at the judet level, trade enterprises and academia, has been a principal objective of the security apparatus. The Securitate believes it has succeeded in this objective and very few sectors of activity are not under its control. The control extends from the physical protection of Nicolae Ceausescu to the local level where, as an example cited,

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unrest such as that which occurred in Brasov in November 1987, can be snuffed quickly.

- In recent years the primary goal of the Securitate has been to maintain the power of the Ceausescu clan. As one senior Securitate official noted, it was not the security of the state that concerned the Securitate but the security of Nicolae, Elena, and the whole family. The Securitate must therefore spend an inordinate amount of time and energy controlling anti-regime activities internally and popularizing the Ceausescus abroad. Because of their activities in recent years, the Securitate has become extremely unpopular within the country. This situation has resulted in an apparent deterioration of morale within the ranks of the Securitate; dissatisfaction with the regime is expressed openly with officials speaking against Nicolae and especially against Elena. occasion, Securitate officials have not moved against the populace particularly when the people were protesting against food shortages, even if derogatory statements were made about the Ceausescus by protesters. There have been cases where Securitate officials have not executed some of their responsibilities in reporting on the attitudes and statements of other Romanian officials. Corruption within the Securitate is widespread.
- 6. Notwithstanding possible morale problems within the security apparatus, it remains the best paid sector in Romania and its officials and their families enjoy many perks in the system. As a result, the Securitate continues to be docile and there is little likelihood it will move against Nicolae Ceausescu. However, if Ceausescu dies or is removed from power it is almost certain the Securitate will abandon the rest of the family.

Terrorism Warning and Forecast Meeting -- October

- 1. The Terrorism Warning and Forecast Meeting was held on 21 October. The following key judgments were derived from the discussion:
- While its network was debilitated by arrests in 1986-87. upcoming events in 1989 point up the potential for renewed terrorism by Hizballah in Europe.
- While a joint RAF-Red Brigades (BR) communique was released following the attempted assassination of Hans Tietmeyer, there is no evidence of European terrorist groups collaborating in joint operations.
- The support provided by Algeria facilitates the operations of international terrorist groups.

- The release of Mithileshawr Singh does not necessarily portend the early release of the remaining western hostages in Lebanon

2. Hizballah in Europe. CIA believes the Hizballah have been trying to establish terrorist cells in Europe since at least 1984 -- possibly earlier. In 1984, the arrest of a Lebanese Shia, al-Atat, in Switzerland led to the arrests of the Ladispoli Seven in Italy, a group of Lebanese Shia suspected of planning to attack the US Embassy in Rome. Sporadic events occurred after these incidents. In 1985, the arrest of Sami Nasr, a Palestinian with links to Hizballah, led the Hizballah to seize two Cypriot students in Beirut. Later analysis of this period shows that the Hizballah were developing local Muslim immigrants for subversive 12 NOV 18 1988 activities in Italy, West Germany and France.

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Three sets of arrests in 1987 unraveled information about an extensive Hizballah network in Europe with ties to Beirut through Imad Mughniyah and Abd al-Hadi Hammadi: The arrests of the Hammadi brothers in West Germany with explosives, the arrest in Italy of Bashir Khudr, a Lebanese Shia, with C-4, and the French arrest of Fuad Salah (who led the Hizballah-backed group that carried out the Paris bombings in 1986) with methyl nitrate and C-4. Information found on the persons of these individuals and explosives evidence showed links with all of these operatives back to Lebanon — specifically to Mughniyah and the Hammadi family.

The relative tranquility in Western Europe at this time points to the success of European counterterrorist efforts and Iran's apparent interest in lowering its terrorist profile. A number of upcoming events next year — the end of the Hammadi trial, the Iranian-imposed deadline for the release of Anis Naccache, and the Salah group trials — all point to motivations for renewed terrorism in 1989. Hizballah could reorganize its cells with sleeper operatives and undiscovered caches. Since Mughniyah and Hammadi are willing to conduct independent operations, even Iranian pressure might not prevent renewed activity.

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3. RAF-Red Brigades (BR). A joint RAF-BR communique following the September 1988 attack on West German Finance Ministry State Secretary Hans Tietmeyer increased concerns about linkages and joint operations among the various West European terrorist groups. DIA believes the Tietmeyer attack was conducted solely by the RAF; it was not a joint operation. There is no evidence of BR involvement. There is evidence, however, that the RAF felt it had to strike an IMF-related target to retain credibility as the leading anti-imperialist force in West Germany. The communique, however, was almost certainly a joint effort. The language was almost identical to that contained in BR-RAF documents prior to the Tietmeyer attack. We have

evidence that the BR and RAF engaged in a dialogue in 1987-88, in hopes of expanding mutual cooperation. There are no indications, however, that this cooperation had expanded beyond philosophical discussions.

The RAF is most likely instigating closer cooperation between the two groups. RAF was the originator of the Western European Anti-Imperialist Front. Due to other counterterrorist successes in Belgium and France, the RAF lost the Combatant Communist Cells (CCC) and eventually Action

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Directe (AD) as partners. Ethnic groups such as Basque Fatherland and Liberty (ETA) and the Provisional Irish Republican Army (PIRA) are not necessarily interested in forming a Front; and 17 November is sequestered and too insular. Therefore, it is logical for the RAF to press for closer ties with the BR, a group which might show more interest in forming a Front.

It is also logical for BR to desire closer ties. The Union of Communist Combatants (UCC) has been dismantled by police successes and the Fighting Communist Party (PCC) had been taking hits from the authorities even prior to the recent arrests. Also, BR is no longer the potent force that it once was in the seventies and early eighties.

DIA believes that, although the BR and RAF may have been moving towards increased cooperation, the arrest, since June, of 32 members of the PCC — the only operational faction of the BR — will likely inhibit any significant cooperation in the short term. DIA does not feel, however, that the BR have been dismantled to the point of inhibiting a limited relationship in the future. BR and RAF personnel have reportedly met frequently in the past and will likely continue to do so. However, the current emasculated condition of the BR suggests that its primary emphasis will be on rebuilding its infrastructure in Italy, rather than expanding cooperation with other groups. At the same time, some element associated with the BR might conduct a terrorist action to make it appear that the group is upholding its part of this "joint venture."

Italian CT forces have had tremendous success in stopping the activities of the BR-UCC and in apprehending BR-PCC members. Assassinations, such as the April 1988 attack against Italian Senator Ruffilli, are likely to continue after the group rebounds from its recent arrests and successfully rebuilds.

represents a return to action after a long period of dormancy. West German security forces have been unable to capture the few hard-core members still at large. The group eventually will be able to marshal its resources for another operation of this nature. Since no one was apprehended during the attack, there is obviously at least one RAF cell still at large capable of conducting assassinations. Based on the first joint communique, the attack may have been a kidnap attempt — a more ambitious operation than the previous assassinations. This could indicate that the RAF is capable of launching larger-scale operations.

Reports indicate that RAF elements are operating outside West Germany. Fingerprints of RAF operative Andrea Klump were found at the

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scene of an attempted moped bombing in Rota on 17 June. And reports indicate RAF support elements have been operating in Cuba and France. West German success in cracking down on the RAF apparatus probably has forced some support elements to relocate outside the country. The availability of an external safehaven may assist coordination of future RAF terrorist activity in Western Europe.

A joint operation by the RAF-BR against US interests is unlikely. The RAF will likely regroup after the unsuccessful assassination attempt on Tietmeyer and concentrate their efforts on domestic German targets. We can, however, expect to see an attack in the future based on their stated intentions, publications and ideology. The BR are not likely to conduct any short-term operations against the US, especially since it appears that they currently do not have an effective infrastructure.

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4. Algeria. Algiers maintains relations with several radical groups largely because of its traditional leftist orientation and sympathy for national liberation movements, and also because such activity provides the regime some influence over these groups. Algiers argues that its links to Middle Eastern and other radicals allow it to serve as a diplomatic conduit, to moderate the radicals' behavior, and to steer the extremists away from radical Arab regimes. President Benjedid's government has publicly condemned terrorism and, in some cases, has ended or scaled down support for liberation movements.

While publicly condemning international terrorism. Algiers has acted as mediator in international terrorist incidents and provides safehaven for groups that employ terrorist tactics. Importantly, such support has apparently facilitated terrorist activities, particularly by the Abu Nidal Organization (ANO).

Because the Algerians regard the Palestinian cause as a legitimate political struggle, they offer military and other facilities to Palestinian factions for attacks against Israel. Like most Arab states, Algeria views attacks inside Israel or the Occupied Territories as legitimate acts of war. Algeria provides almost unrestricted safehaven

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to a number of Palestinian groups, almost certainly including the Palestinian Front for the Liberations of Palestine - Special Command (PFLP-SC), the Palestine Liberation Front (PLF), Fatah's Force 17.

Algeria maintains contacts with Hizballah and such non-Middle Eastern groups as Basque Fatherland and Libery (ETA). Most recently, Algeria has limited its support to ETA to the provision of safehaven. Other fragmentary evidence indicates Algiers has provided safehaven to other terrorist groups as well.

CIA believes Algerian-ANO relations expanded in the period leading up to the April 1987 Palestine National Council (PNC) meeting held in Algiers. They believe that the Algerians were seeking to facilitate ANO's entry into the mainstream Palestinian movement.

Despite ANO's limited presence (estimates range from five to 400), recent developments suggest that the Algiers-based contingent is deeply involved in operational activities worldwide. Such activity probably violates the understanding by which Algiers permitted the group to establish a presence there. There are indications that ANO operatives worldwide rely on the group's Algerian infrastructure for support.

Because Algeria values its role as mediator, particularly between the West and the Middle East, and retains a sympathy for national liberation movements, it is likely to maintain contacts with and support — at least passively — radical groups. In the case of ANO, CIA believes that Algiers permitted the group to establish a presence there in order to prove their ability to moderate the behavior of radical terrorists, as well as to foster Palestinian unity. In the wake of renewed terrorist activity by Abu Nidal and international publicity about the group's use of Algeria to facilitate its operations. Algiers may reduce its support for the group.

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5. Implications of the Singh Release. Mithileshwar Singh and the other three Beirut University College professors (Turner, Steen and Polhill) were seized by friends of Hizballah's Beirut security chief Abd al-Hadi Hammadi for the same reasons as the two German hostages, Schmidt and Cordes. Abd al-Hadi's goal was to use these hostages to block extradition and prosecution of his brother Muhammad Hammadi, currently on trial in Germany for his part in the TWA 847 hijacking.

Cordes, the last German hostage, was freed September 12 after lengthy negotiations between Bonn and Tehran. We have no evidence that Bonn made any specific commitments about Muhammad's sentencing, but Abd al-Hadi apparently believed he was assured of a "fair trial" and humanitarian considerations. However, we assume that Abd al-Hadi's concerns about his brother were reasonably satisfied and that he no longer had a personal agenda regarding the BUC4.

Given Iran's recent attempts at rapprochement with the West. State thought that if Iran were to move on the hostages, they would move first on the BUC4 which were most accessible to them, i.e., they were unencumbered by extraneous concerns by the kidnappers. Three days after Cordes' release, we saw a communique by Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine, the first one in over six months.

According to State, the new communique was radically different from the earlier ones. The content was less Islamic and more Palestinian. The demands were more modest and the tone was almost one of pleading for the US to provide a pretext for them to release the hostages and so end the problem which they saw as having gone on for too long. Although the demands and tone in subsequent communiques stiffened. State believes Singh was released as a goodwill gesture about a week after the first of the new IJLP communiques.

The speed and ease of his release was so surprising and so different from previous IJLP actions that State thought it might have been written by a different group. State's chief Shia consultant thought the hostages might actually have been handed over to a Palestinian group. This seemed to be confirmed by remarks made by Singh immediately after his release. A careful perusal of Singh's debriefing soon disabused us of this notion. The captors were most likely Palestinian members of Hizballah. This would in part explain the Palestinian trappings displayed by the IJLP from the beginning. CIA does not believe the IJLP is a "real" organization, but a name used to shield the actual captors and possibly one pulled together to carry out this specific operation. Reliable reporting indicates Hizballah members who were friends of the Hammadi's were for the abduction and detention of the German hostages as well.

This still leaves open the question of why Singh was released. The traditional approach of trying to determine who benefited from the release didn't seem to work. No Palestinian element gained any political capital from the release and neither Hizballah nor Iran won any kudos for the release. CIA believes Singh was released because he is not an American citizen, and that the release was probably encouraged by Iran.

A glimpse into what may have happened surfaced in the press, which noted that before the release, the Iranians warned Genscher who told Shultz. We have no corraborating evidence, but we assume that the message passed along by Iran contained more than the name and date of the hostage to be released. This could have been an opening gambit by Iran. It was a relatively cheap one for them; they gain some credit but don't have to waste an American hostage doing so.

From the tone and speed of Singh's release, State expected other IJLP communiques to pour forth. They have not. This would confirm our supposition that the flurry of IJLP activity prior to the release was merely a smoke screen providing continuing deniability (both internally and externally) for Iran while its real agenda was conducted through Genscher.

Whatever the nature of the Iranian Gambit, it seems to have stalled. It is unlikely that we will see further activity before the American elections or before Tehran gets its own political house in order. This delay could work against the remaining BUC4 because Muhammad Hammadi's trial is going badly.

Abd al-Hadi may have believed that his brother Muhammad would be treated as a juvenile by the German court, get a 15-year sentence and be freed after serving, at most, 10 years. It is not clear why Abd al-Hadi might believe that his brother would be treated as a juvenile. In German law, this is not a mere question of chronology to be determined by his birth date. If (as seems likely) the court decides Muhammad acted as an adult, he would be sentenced as an adult and could receive much more than ten years. CIA anticipates renewed risks to German interests, if Abd al-Hadi is not satisfied with Muhammad's treatment. Moreover, Justice Department seems intent on once again approaching the Germans regarding extradition before the end of the trial. In short, setbacks in Muhammad's trial could cause his brother to dig in his heels on the BUC4 and make them less accessible to Iran for future overtures to the West.





To date, the CIA's hiring criteria does not seem applicable to us from these points of view: the high cost of hiring and intensive scrutiny of each person, the amount of psychology and psychological testing involved, the lack of FCI criteria themselves and the fact that to date it appears that they are looking for people similar to ours in the modified program.

It is interesting to note that the CIA does not consider a person fully hired until he/she has been there for three years and has passed his/her second polygraph.

<u>DETAILS</u>: Professional Staff of both the House and Senate Intelligence Committees have requested Bureau briefings regarding the investigation into the crash of Pan Am Flight 103. The House Intelligence Committee briefing is scheduled for Tuesday, January 3, at 11:00 a.m. and the Senate Intelligence Committee briefing is now scheduled for 2:00 on the same date. The briefings are primarily for Members of the two committees but some staff will also attend.

He also indicated that it would be appropriate for a representative from the FBI Laboratory to attend and explain the various physical characteristics of the suspected explosive.

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
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Narrative Justification For The Award Of The National Intelligence Medal of Achievement

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- (U) As Program Manager of the Interagency Telephone Laboratory (ITL), he directed a major IC technical surveillance countermeasures (TSCM) program during a period of dynamic change and increasing complexity. ITL was established as the technical support activity of the Telephone Security Group (TSG), Countermeasures Subcommittee, Technical Surveillance Countermeasures Committee, Interagency Group/Countermeasures (Technical). ITL's mission is to provide technical support to the IC on all matters pertaining to TSCM for telephones and telephone systems.
- effective countermeasures against the audio surveillance threat posed by telephones. The importance of ITL lies in the fact that, historically, telephones have been considered the most significant audio surveillance vulnerability posed to our classified conversation areas. Accordingly, ITL was tasked to develop policies and procedures for properly selecting and installing telecommunications equipment. Additionally, ITL actively pursued the development of new countermeasures techniques and equipment used by the TSCM community to examine telephone systems in the field.

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In the last several years, the telecommunications industry has undergone major technological advances which threatened to drastically increase the technical surveillance vulnerabilities of telephone systems. As the government's conventional telephones and key systems were replaced with new electronic, computer controlled equipment, traditional methods for protecting these systems were inadequate. TSCM technicians could no longer test and evaluate telephones with existing equipment and techniques. Past telephone security protective measures and inspections were simply no longer valid.

In the wake of this telecommunications revolution, took the lead in initiating efforts to expand and improve ITL's mission of technical investigative support to IC TSCN activities worldwide. Under his direction, the laboratory flourished. Today,

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it has a staff of five engineers/technicians (an increase of three) and a modern test and evaluation facility to handle a steadily increasing workload. A major improvement and expansion of ITL's physical plant was accomplished with the installation of a state-of-the-art shielded enclosure test facility. The capabilities of the ITL in evaluating suspected technical penetrations of telephone instruments and associated equipment were significantly enhanced due to efforts to obtain the necessary resources to purchase new generations of analytical/test equipment. began several programs designed to improve the IC countermeasures assessment of the vulnerabilities associated with the various telephone systems, domestic and foreign, used by U.S. Government organizations throughout the world. He fostered a dialogue with the telecommunications industry to insure that the Intelligence Community's views and concerns regarding "on-hook" **b6** audio telephone security were recognized and addressed. He b7C coordinated and managed efforts by ITL to develop a national standard for the design and manufacture of high security computerized telephone instruments. Telephones designed under this standard could be installed in sensitive discussion areas without adding costly protective devices or applying expensive construction techniques to physically protect the entire telephone system. accomplishment typifies approach of identifying cost effective solutions to complex technical security problems; a philosophy which has resulted in huge monetary savings to the US Government. Additionally, undertook the complete revision of the standards governing the installation of telephone systems used in sensitive compartmented information facilities. This was a major undertaking requiring both expert technical knowledge and keen interpersonal skills. As a national program manager, he proved extremely successful at coordinating unified national strategies on issues affecting agencies with many diverse b6 departmental views. b7C (8) in his capacity as Chairman, Telephone Security Group (TSG), Countermeasures Subcommittee, under the IG/CM(T), played a significant role in coordinating the development of an acceptable "on-hook" audio security standard for the governments new STU-III Secure Voice System; a multi-billion dollar program of the utmost importance to our national security. The groundwork performed by in developing the necessary interagency coordination with the National Security Agency, the STU-III proponent, made possible the timely identification of potential

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exploitable weaknesses with the STU-III and for the TSCM community

to rapidly develop countermeasures.


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🖎 As the first Chairman of the Capitol Hill Advisory Group (ChAG), Countermeasures Subcommittee, under the IG/CM(T), established CHAG as an effective mechanism for providing physical and technical security support to Congress. personally provided the necessary research, engineering and contracting support for the installation of an advanced in-place monitoring system (IPMS) which is designed to remotely sense and locate clandestine radio frequency transmitters targeted against sensitive Congressional facilities. played a continual role in efforts by the IC to establish a professional and highly effective, state-of-the-art TSCM capability within the U.S. Capitol Police (USCP). These efforts included: coordinating TSCM basic and advance training at national level training centers for police members assigned to TSCM duties; working closely with USCP to build an inventory of advance technology TSCM equipment; and assisting in developing technical threat and vulnerability data. Extensive history of dedicated support to Capitol Hill was recognized throughout the IC as well as Congress which frequently praised his outstanding efforts on their behalf. In fact, upon eminent reassignment, various learning of Congressional activities voiced their hopes that would receive some national recognition for the outstanding support he provided Capitol Hill. b6

b7C As the senior FBI representative on the Countermeasures Subcommittee, Technical Surveillance Countermeasures Committee, IG/Ck(1) (formerly the <u>Technical Surveillance Countermeasures</u> was one of its most active Subcommittee, SECOM), members. He continually worked to foster and promote common approaches and positions regarding the formation of effective national TSCN policy and procedures for countering hostile technical surveillance. He participated on numerous working groups formed to tackle very complex technical security issues such as drafting new standards for the physical and acoustic protection of the nations most sensitive discussion areas. His personal interest in reducing government expenditures on high dollar TSCM equipment lead to the discovery of significant cost differences between what individual agencies paid for the same item. he became a strong advocate for fostering equipment commonality and helped devise uniform equipment specifications/capabilities. He actively pursued joint, interagency purchases of TSCM equipment, which eventually resulted in significant savings to the federal government. As a member of the FBI, he often served as focal point on threat and vulnerability queries concerning foreign government technical surveillance offensive and defensive capabilities within the United States. His

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-{U}	assistance in this regard materially added to numerous National Foreign Intelligence Board threat estimates.
	In summary, was a driving force behind efforts to provide the Intelligence Community with the countermeasures tools and techniques necessary to keep pace with a rapidly changing and increasingly complex hostile technical surveillance threat. His distinguished record of support to the TSCM community is second to none. unselfish dedication and exemplary service reflects great credit upon the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the entire Intelligence Community.

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<u>SYNOPSIS: During recent discussions between Criminal</u> Investigative Division (CID), Terrorism Section (TS) Chief Steven L. Pomerantz and Deputy Chief of the CTC of the CTC, CIA, a need to strengthen both organizational and operational ties between the two agencies was identified. To fill that continuing need and to insure the future success of this critical interface between the two agencies, it was agreed that the FBI would consider detailing an SSA, GM-15 to the CTC, CIA, for an initial one-year period; concomitantly, the CIA would detail an experienced Research Analyst to the Terrorist Research and Analytical Center (TRAC), TS, CID, for a one-year period. SSA assigned to the CTC would retain and use FBI credentials in the conduct of any overt duties undertaken in connection with his assignment. This SSA would also be directly assigned to the CTC, CIA, but would remain under the administrative control of the TS, CID. If this detailee is to remain under the control of the TS, CID, the target staffing level (TSL) for the TS would have to be increased by one SSA.

During recent discussions between Deputy Chief of the CTC, CIA, and Terrorism Section Chief Steven L. Pomerantz, a need for close and continuing cooperation between the FBI and the CTC, CIA, was clearly indicated in cases of international terrorism wherein there is a commonality of interest. To insure the success of the critical interface, was agreed that the FBI would consider detailing a SSA, GM-15, to the CTC, CIA, for an initial one-year period; concomitantly the CIA would detail an experienced Research Analyst to the TRAC, TS, CID, for same one-year period on a trial basis. The FBI SSA assigned to the CTC would provide a direct and continuing liaison link with the FBI and, in particular, the TS of the CID, which has overall program management responsibilities. The CIA analyst assigned to the FBI would provide the same direct and continuing liaison link with the CIA and, in particular, the CTC.

This SSA would have continuing access to information in the CTC that impacts upon FBI responsibilities; moreover, the SSA could facilitate the FBI gaining access to information which the CIA would not recognize as important to or impacting on the FBI. Finally, the SSA could foster and facilitate more joint operations between the FBI and the CIA where indicated.

The CIA. for its part, is in complete concurrence with this concept. advised that the SSA assigned to the CTC at the CIA would have access to all incoming information as well as being fully integrated into the CTC operations. In return, the FBI Agent could help the CIA to better understand the Bureau and its role as a law enforcement agency within the Federal system, as well as the Attorney General Guidelines that govern both domestic and international terrorism investigations.

With regard to the assignment of an experienced CIA Analyst to TRAC, TS, CID, for a one-year period, the TS believes that approval is warranted because of potential benefits to the FBI. This CIA Analyst could certainly assist the FBI in refining its analytical approach. Moreover, the sharing of analytical techniques and methodologies in addition to information as well as the establishment of a direct liaison link between the analytical components of both agencies can only foster closer cooperation.

Because the CTC is not familiar with FBI operating procedures in terrorism investigations, there has been some initial confusion as to the role of the FBI. The FBI Agent detailed to the CTC must have considerable experience in terrorism investigations as well as detailed knowledge of the Foreign Counterintelligence Guidelines issued by the Department of Justice. It is anticipated that this detailee will contribute critical input into the future success of any FBI/CIA joint operations inasmuch as that Agent will be directly responsible for the interface between the two. Therefore, this Agent should have a thorough understanding of both the nature and importance of this continuing liaison relationship with the CTC of the CIA.

Inasmuch as senior analytical personnel assigned to the CTC are at grade level GS-14, it is preferable that, if approved, this SSA be a GM-15 inasmuch as he will interface with and report directly to the Deputy Chief of the CTC.

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Further, this detailee will effectively function as the law enforcement liaison with the CTC as well as participating in a coordination role in any CIA ad hoc working groups formed to coordinate U.S. Government activity in international terrorist crisis situations.

If approved, the TS will continue to be responsible for the detailee's performance appraisal; therefore, the detailee should remain a GM rather than reverting to a GS rating.

The TS also recommends that the Agent selected be a GM-15 inasmuch as he will be interfacing directly with and advising decision makers within the CIA. Further, analysts who will provide support are GS-14 and below. This detailee will be a decision maker and assist in the decision making process of the CIA in regard to those areas of particular concern to the FBI.

The TS also recommends that initially the assignment be on a trial basis for a one-year period. This would allow for reevaluation of the assignment to determine if it is productive and effective for both the FBI and the CIA.

The TS also recommends that the detailee be authorized to use his FBI credentials while conducting any overt business on behalf of the CTC, CIA. Although the detailee will be assigned to the CIA, the use of FBI credentials by this Agent will obviously open many doors for him in the law enforcement community and other Federal, state and local agencies. The individual assigned will have to insure that it is made clear to any contacts that although he is a FBI Agent, he is detailed to the CIA or in cases where that is not appropriate for security reasons to whatever appropriate governmental agency is being used as a cover.

The TS has previously coordinated with the Legal Counsel Division regarding the use of FBI credentials by the detailee. Legal Counsel Division has advised that there is no legal reason that would preclude the use of FBI credentials by the detailee.

By previous arrangement with the Administrative Services Division in the assignment of SSA to the Department of Energy as a GM-15, this detailed to the CIA would also be assigned from the Terrorism Section; therefore, the TSL of the TS will have to be increased by one SSA, GM-15.



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The study SW85-10085 came about as a result of the DCI's exceptional analyst award granted in 1983. The aim of the program was to produce an Unclassified reference handbook for military attaches, data exchange agreement personnel within various U. S. Government agencies and, to a limited extent, covert collection entities for the purpose of identification of Free World (non-U. S.) computerized fire control systems for a variety of field army, tube artillery weapon systems. A need for such a study was recognized after several years of analytical work about the subject (fire control computers) because numerous overt and covert collection systems had considerable difficulties understanding collection requirements concerning performance, parametric data, and identification and use of various fire control computers. Because of the anticipated and sought-after wide distribution of the study, all information gathered from international firms and used for the study was deliberately kept Unclassified to avoid possible compromise of classified information. However, an exception was made in the case of Table b1 per CIA 3 where some parametric data was derived from company proprietary b3 sources in order to give it meaning and completeness:

during this program or during the writing of the study were covert or sensitive intelligence sources or methods employed in obtaining such information. Consequently, our representative believes the "WNINTEL" (inside cover) caveat was inappropriately applied to the study.

The study SW85-10085 at the time of its publication contained company proprietary information which has become public knowledge since 1985, as a result of its disclosure in numerous armament magazines (e.g., International Defense Review, Mil Technology, etc.) and in product information brochures issued by the company of the proprietary information. The particular classified information, now public knowledge, is contained on Table 3, page 19, and is marked. Appended (enclosures 2-5) are company data from their unclassified sales brochure.

The "Confidential" classification of the study was applied by the CIA during the review and editing process. Since the cited company proprietary information is now public knowledge and the fact that all other data on Table 3 has appeared in numerous defense-oriented magazines for at least five years, it is requested that Table 3 be declassified to "Unclassified" and the entire study be unclassified as well.



met with CIAHO, concerning FBI asset reporting of interest to the CIA. was advised that an FBI asset recently returned from the People's Republic of China (PRC) and stated that the economy in China is in a "crisis state" and that Party Secretary ZHAO Ziyang is taking the brunt of the criticism for failing economic reform policies. was further advised that based that more "right-wing" factions of the Chinese Communist Party are steadily gaining influence because of the slower pace of economic reform.

Discussion continued, centering around the possible fall from authority of ZHAO as a scapegoat due to the economic problems in the PRC.

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NOTE: The attached revisions of proposed amendments to the Fair Credit Reporting, Act and the Social Security Act are submitted to ensure the requested authority is mandatory and to restore a deletion. These changes were made by CAO and have been reviewed and approved by INTO Special Staff.

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TITLE VI FBI ENHANCED COUNTERINTELLIGENCE AUTHORITIES

Access to Consumer Reports

SEC. 601 The Consumer Credit Protection Act is amended by inserting "(1)" before the existing paragraph of Section 608 (15 U.S.C. 1681f.); and adding the following new paragraphs:

- "(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1681b. of this title, a consumer reporting agency shall furnish a consumer report to the Federal Bureau of Investigation when presented with a request for a consumer report made pursuant to this subsection by the Federal Bureau of Investigation providing that the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or his designee, certifies in writing to the consumer reporting agency that such records are sought for foreign counterintelligence purposes and that there are specific and articulable facts giving reason to believe the person to whom the requested consumer report relates is an agent of a foreign power as defined in Section 101 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 (50 U.S.C. 1801).
- "(3) Notwithstanding the provision of Section 1681b. of this title, a consumer reporting agency shall furnish identifying information respecting any consumer, limited to name, address, former address, place of employment, or former place of employment, to a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation when presented with a written request signed by the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or the Director's designee, stating that the information is sought in connection with an authorized foreign counterintelligence investigation.
- "(4) No consumer reporting agency, or officer, employee, or agent of such institution, shall disclose to any person that the Federal Bureau of Investigation has sought or obtained a consumer report or identifying information respecting any consumer under this section."

Access to Social Security Information

SEC. 602 The Social Security Act is amended by adding at the end of Section 1106 (42 U.S.C. 1306) a new subsection (f):

"(f) FBI REQUESTS FOR FOREIGN COUNTERINTELLIGENCE PURPOSES.

"Notwithstanding Section 1306 (a), the Secretary of Health and Human Services, or the Secretary of Labor, as the case may be, shall disclose information in the Secretary's possession relating to the address, former address, place of employment, and former place of employment of a named person, when presented with a certification signed by the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or the Director's designee, stating that:

- "(1) The information is sought in connection with an authorized foreign counterintelligence investigation; and,
- "(2) There are specific and articulable facts giving reason to believe the person is an agent of a foreign power as defined in Section 101 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 (50 U.S.C. 1801)."

Mrs. O'Steen's 9-year old daughter is a fourth grade student at the Louise Archer School in Vienna, Virginia. In February 1988 a "Russian professor" appeared at the school to those who wished to correspond with Russian pen pals. All the students in the class reportedly signed up.

On 24 March 1988 Mrs. O'Steen's daughter received a letter, ostensibly from a fourth grader in the Soviet Union. In this brief letter the writer, Signe (last name not given), provided some basic (uninteresting) biographic data concerning her family and asked Mrs. O'Steen's daughter to enter into correspondence with her. Mrs. O'Steen subsequently established that her daughter was one of at least four Louise Archer fourth graders who had received letters from the USSR, all on 24 March 1988.

4. Mrs. O'Steen was told by the principal of the Louise Archer School, Ms. Judy RAMIG, that the "Russian professor" was one Igors TIPANAS whose visit to the school had been arranged through the parents of another Louse Archer School fourth OCI 3 grader, Robert and Lois McCormick, residing 428 Knoll Street NW, Vienna, Val. TIPANAS reportedly stayed with the McCormicks while in the D.C. area.

WARNING NOTICE INTELLIGENCE SOURCES OR METHODS INVOLVED

NO Response Required

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Igors TIPANAS is almost certainly identical with Igor Ol'Gertovich FIPANS. DPOB 2 February 1953, Riga, Latvia, USSR. TIPANS was one of 19 Soviets who was invited to the U.S. in December 1987 by the "Center for Soviet-American Initiatives" (believed identical with the "Center for US - USSR Initiatives", described as a peace seeking organization based in San Francisco). TIPANS was listed as an engineer/physicist in his U.S. visa request. Our only other possible trace on TIPANS is to a FNU TIPANS, mentioned in a Department of the Army FSTC (Foreign Science and Technology Center) message of 3 April 1987. The FSTC, a U.S. Army research facility in Charlottesville, Va. indicated no interest in this FNU TIPANS.

- TIPANAS' attempts to encourage the establishment of pen pal relationships between U.S. and Soviet children may be no more than the part of a normal Soviet propaganda ploy. It is noted, however, that TIPANAS' efforts in the Vienna, Va. area may be reflective of Soviet attempts to engage these children in longterm relationships. It is perhaps noteworthy that many U.S. Government employees, particularly those working for CIA and other sensitive government agencies, as well as businessmen doing business with the U.S. Government, and foreign diplomats reside in the Vienna area. The building of bonds of friendship with the USSR as well as the collection of biographic data on children of such people, would certainly be in the Soviets' interest.
