DETAILS:

During the past few days numerous rumors have been circulating among Central Intelligence Agency personnel to the effect that General Smith might be replaced. Some of these reports indicate that General Smith may become the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff or that he would resign and go into private business. The Liaison Agent has made discreet inquiries, which included contacts with CIA officials and from all indications, most of the reports being circulated can fall into the rumor category.

On November 20, 1952, General Smith advised Liaison Agent Papich that he had just about resolved in his own mind that he should leave the CIA by January 20, 1953, or shortly thereafter. He repeated a statement which he has made on other occasions that he has never considered himself a professional in the intelligence field and that he had no desire to make a career out of foreign intelligence. He stated that he felt that he had done as much as he could as Director of the CIA and that he was now interested in saving his reputation, which has been subjected to some criticism and attack during the past year. He stated that it was only necessary for him to make one bad guess on one of the national estimates (i.e., an estimate on the capabilities of war in a particular area) and he would be ruined. He commented, "Maybe it isn't worth taking the chance" and also stated it moght be worth. while to leave and salvage what reputation he might have left. DEC. B. ICE

#### DETAILS:

Set forth is a summary of pertinent information in the files of the Bureau concerning the afore-mentioned individuals.

### Admiral Arthur William Radford

Admiral Radford was born February 27, 1896, at Chicago, Illinois. He graduated from the Naval Academy in the Class of 1916. He was appointed Vice-Admiral in 1946. At the beginning of the last war he was Director of Aviation Training in which post he served until April, 1943. In July, 1943, he went to sea and distinguished himself in numerous battles in the Pacific as a Commander of a Carrier Task Group. In December, 1945, he was made Deputy Chief of Naval Operations. In January, 1948, he was made Vice-Chief of Naval Operations. In April, 1949, he received a temporary appointment as an admiral and became Commander in Chief, Pacific, Commander in Chief, Pacific Fleet.

In the "New York Times" dated April 15, 1949, Hanson W. Baldwin made reference to Louis Johnson taking over as Secretary of

Defense and to the controversies which had arisen concerning the unification of the Armed Services. Admiral Radford was described as being outspoken against unification and he was referred to as "something of a stormy petrel in some of the inter-service discussions." Baldwin described him as an "able and tenacious leader" of naval aviation and an opponent of the Air Force. (62-87819-A)

#### General Charles Pearre Cabell

General Cabell was born October 11, 1903, at Dallas, Texas, and graduated from West Point in the Class of 1935. He served as Air Force representative to the United Nations Conference at San Francisco in 1945. He became Director of Intelligence, U.S. Air Force, in 1948, and in October, 1951, he became Secretary of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He has been very friendly and cooperative with the Bureau. By letter dated October 4, 1951, the Director expressed his best wishes to Cabell on his new assignment at the Joint Chiefs of Staff and thanked him for his past cooperation. 

As of Tuesday, December 9, 1952, Central Intelligence Gandy Agency (CIA) officials were preparing briefs on various matters for General Smith. The Liaison Agent has observed that considerable secrecy has been attached to all of this activity. One CIA official indicated that the briefs are being prepared for General Smith inasmuch as he may be leaving for Honolulu to take part in conferences with President-designate Eisenhower. This may be true but General Smith has indicated to the Liaison Agent that he will be in Washington, D. C., through Tuesday of next week. Newspaper reports reflect that Eisenhower might be leaving Hawaii by that date. It is possible that General Smith is anticipating a call from Eisenhower which might explain the afore-mentioned brief preparations.

Allen Dulles is leaving for Japan this week to see his son, who continues to be in a critical condition as a result of wounds received in Korea. Dulles advised the Liaison Agent that while in Japan he will take the opportunity to check on CIA operations in that area. He will also spend some time in the Philippines. Dulles did not indicate that he would take part in any conferences in Honolulu.

You will recall that by memorandum dated January 1, 1953, information was set forth indicating that General Smith might be removed as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). It was further indicated that his successor might be Allen Dulles.

Agent Papich that it is almost definite that Smith is through at the CIA. He stated that General Smith returned from New York City on January 6, 1953, and advised him that unless Eisenhower suddenly changed his mind. he was to be removed as Director of CIA. General Smith told that the pressure from the Dewey forces was too much to compat. He further advised that although Eisenhower felt that Smith should leave CIA, the President-elect would not discard him and would still utilize him in some important capacity. He stated that consideration was being given to making General Smith an Under-Secretary in the State Department. Newspapers of January 8, 1953, carried articles to the effect that Smith was to be an Under-Secretary of State.

According to it appears that Allen Dulles will be Smith's successor unless there is some last-minute change in Eisenhower's plans.





SYNOPSIS:

1 Information developed through liaison indicates that

General Smith definitely is through as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). As reported, Allen Dulles might be his successor, but heavy opposition has been mounting within the last two days, opposition coming from military and civilian circles. It is argued that his alleged specialty in the field of political and psychological warfare does not qualify him for the primary responsibility of collecting covert intelligence information. General Smith advised Liaison Agent Papich he definitely was leaving CIA. He has been offered the post of Under Secretary of State which he does not want. On January 9, 1953, in presence of Liaison Agent, Smith telephonically conferred with John Foster Dulles and stated that he wished to make announcement that due to financial and other reasons, he could not accept post in State Department. is scheduled to meet with Senators Hickenlooper and Ferguson on evening of January 9, 1953.

#### DETAILS:

Reference is made to previous memoranda furnished by me reflecting that General Smith might be removed as Director of CIA and that he might become Under Secretary of State. . It was further indicated that his successor might be Allen Dulles. As you know, considerable newspaper comment has been made in the last few days in connection with the foregoing,

On January 9, 1953, General Smith advised Agent Papich that he was definitely through as Director of the CIA unless General Eisenhower makes some last minute change. General Smith does not expect such a change. With regard to his successor, Smith stated that this question "was up in the air."

With regard to his future, General Smith stated that he definitely wanted to get out of the Government and go into private business. He stated that within the last two days he had received a very attractive offer and it was difficult for him to refuse. He stated that a few days ago he had conferred with President-elect Eisenhower who requested him to become Under Secretary of State. He told Eisenhower that he would give it consideration. Since then the newspapers have been announcing that he would be Under Secretary of State. Smith stated that he was awaiting for a call from John Foster Dulles.

He telephonically conferred with John Foster Dulles in the presence of the Liaison Agent at which time General Smith stated that he most earnestly desired to make a public statement to the effect that due to financial and other reasons he could not accept the appointment as Under Secretary of State. He indicated to Dulles that the newspaper articles had placed him in a rather embarrassing position and he wanted to put a "stop to any further stories." He stated that he realized that General Eisenhower wanted him to accept the position, but after analyzing the situation he haddefinitely decided not to accept the appointment. It was Papich' impression that Dulles wanted Smith to confer with Senators Hickenlooper and Ferguson before making a final decision. General Smith stated that if this was absolutely necessary he would suggest that the two Senators have dinner with him on the evening of January 9, 1953.

After the telephone conversation, General Smith advised Papich that he had made up his mind and he hoped that Eisenhower would not bring on any further pressure to take the job in the State Department.

The Executives Conference on January 5, 1953, consisting of Messrs. Ladd, Harbo, Glavin, Mohr, Gearty, Rosen, Tracy, Belmont, Holloman and Cleag, recommended favorably the suggestion of Mrs. Doris C. Maggio of the Domestic Intelligence Division that the Central Intelligence Agency bulletin number be placed on the Bureau's abstract slips and the inter card indexing this correspondence. The Central Intelligence Agency numbers their Special Operations Dissemination Rulletins but does not identify the subject matter in the case. They presently refer in any new correspondence to the former dissemination bulletin by the SO DB number. In order to expedite the location of the bulletin the employee suggested that the number be indexed and placed on the abstract The Domestic Intelligence Division recommended favorably. The Records and Communications Division recommended as to the abstract slip favorably and unfavorably as to the index eards.

The Executives Conference recommended unanimously that the number be recorded in both instances. It was also recommended that the Liaison Section of the Domestic Intelligence Division contact the Central Intelligence Division and suggest that they place an initiation of the subject matter in the caption in order to enable the Bureau to identify the material if it is practical for them to do so.

The Conference unanimously recommended unfavorably the suggestion that Mrs. Maggio receive a \$10 award for the sugrestion. There is attached a letter to Mrs. Maggio advisina her that her suggestion is being adopted.

On January 27, 1953, Mr. Dulles advised Liaison Agent Papich that he was most interested in ascertaining if the Director' would be in a position to make an address of approximately 15 minutes duration before a group of about Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) employees. This speech would be scheduled for February 10, 1953, and would be held in connection with CIA's Orientation Program. For your information, the CIA periodically orients CIA employees, particularly the new trainees, concerning CIA functions and responsibilities. The program is about one week in duration and is always featured by the address of an outstanding personality. About two months ago the featured speaker was ex-President Truman.

Dulles stated that he fully appreciated that the Director was extremely busy and that it would be difficult for him to find time to make the speech. He stated that he nevertheless would appreciate any consideration that the Director could give to his request. He advised that if the Director was unable to fill the engagement, he would ask some other outstanding individual; possibly General Bradley.

#### ACTION:

If you approve, Mr. Dulles will be advised by Mr. Papich that the Director regrets that he will be unable to make the speech due to other commitments on his schedule.
