SURVEY OF CIA BY GENERAL MARK W. CLARK

Reference is made to my memorandum dated November 16, 1954, wherein information was set forth concerning comments made by Colonel John Julius Dubbelde, Jr., of General Mark Clark's group which is surveying the operations of CIA. You will recall that Colonel Dubbelde stated that it was his understanding that the Clark committee would have no reason whatsoever to check on any FBI operations.

The Director's comment was, "I want Belmont to be prepared to handle any and all phases of this.

Through contacts in General Clark's group and in the CIA, Agent Papich has been on the alert for any evidence indicating that General Clark will contact the Bureau or that he will be making 2 inquiries concerning any Bureau operations. So far, all information developed has indicated that General Clark is concentrating all of his interests in CIA operations and that he does not anticipate any contacts with the Bureau. It is realized that before Clark completes in his survey of CIA, he may encounter some problem which may require consultation or discussion with the Bureau. At this point this is only speculation.

Although General Clark's group has given every indication that the Bureau will not be involved in the survey being conducted, am having the Liaison Section nevertheless follow this matter very closely in order that the Bureau will be fully and completely prepared Z to discuss with General Clark any questions which may arise.

In accordance with the Director's instructions I will of course, be prepared to handle any and all phases of inquiries directed to the Bureau. Material to be used in any necessary briefing of the Clark group will, of course, be submitted for the Director's approval prior to its use. ALL INFORMATION CONTAINED

On November 15, 1954, Agent Papich had occasion to meet with Colonel John Julius Dubbelde, Fr., of General Mark Clark's group which is surveying the operations of CIA. You may be interested in the following comments which were made by Dubbelde and which may reflect the current thinking of the Clark group.

Dubbelde stated that he and his colleagues were slowly

getting started and were getting some idea of the full scope of their work. He stated that briefings already had been afforded to the Clark committee by CIA and for the first time since the organization of the committee, this working staff has had an opportunity to make some headway. He stated that as far as he could see, all of the committee's work will be devoted to CIA operations. He advised that about the end of this month the Clark group will be afforded briefings by the military intelligence agencies. Dubbelde stated that it is his understanding that the Clark committee will have no reason whatsoever

to check on any FBI operations but he would not be surprised if it becomes necessary to seek advice or observations from the Bureau concerning some problem which might crop up in connection with the CIA survey. He advised that so far no such matters have arisen.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. TOLSON

On October 6, 1954, I saw Lt. General James H. Doolittle who had been heading a Committee appointed by the President to study the covert operations of the Central Intelligence Agency.

General Doolittle stated that his group had completed their study but that before submitting his report to the President upon the President's return from Denver, he did want to talk to me in view of the contact which this Bureau has with CIA. In our discussion I pointed out to General Doolittle that CIA was, of course, a comparatively new organization and that no doubt some of its weaknesses and defects were due to the newness of its operations and the problems that always come in administrative matters when a new organization is set up to operate on such a broad and extensive scale. I commented that I thought there was too little coordination between the various units of CIA and too strong a stress upon departmentalization, with the result that one branch of CIA did not always know what another branch was contemplating doing. I stated I likewise felt that CIA, as well as many organizations of the Government, needed stronger and better discipline and that this, I believed, could be brought about by a vigorous and active inspection service of comparatively small size. I outlined to General Doolittle the inspection program which is utilized by this Bureau and which has been most effective.

I also commented upon the weak coverage which I believed CIA had behind the Iron Curtain and also in Mexico which was a problem and of vital interest to this Bureau. I stated that frankly espionage agents will arrive in this country and we have no advance word from CIA of their identities, which led me to the conclusion that they did not have as adequate coverage abroad as they should have.

Vashington Field Office employees contacting these agencies keep a continual check on those record requests which have been delayed an undue length of time and every effort made to obtain them from the agencies as soon as the information is available.

Such agencies as HUUA and CSC return their record check requests within a week or less.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is to be noted that the matter of expediting Bureau name checks at OHI, CIA and OSI was previously discussed by Liaison with those agencies. In view of the information furnished by Washington Field Office in its letter of October 19, 1954, indicating that CNI, CIA, OSI and State Department passport records are behind in their name searches, it is recommended that a representative of the Liaison Section discuss this matter with responsible officials of ONI, CIA, OSI and the State Department. The joint responsibilities of the

Bureau and these agencies under the Federal Imployee Security Program should be explained to these officials and they should be requested to take the necessary action to afford the name checks submitted by the Bureau expeditious attention in order that the investigations can be brought to a logical conclusion in the earliest possible time.

It is desired that the results of the contacts with the above officials be furnished to the Investigative Division, particularly what action is to be taken by the various agencies to speed up the name check program, in order that the matter can be closely followed to see if any improvement is made.

DITAILS:

I. Inspection of Employees Security Section (September, 1954)

As the result of the inspection of the Employees Security Section in September, 1954, the comment was made by the inspector in a memorandum dated September 23, 1954, from Mr. Harbo to Mr. Tolson that field investigative time in full field investigations showed an increase of 5.95 days in August, 1954, as compared with August, 1953. It was stated in the memorandum of Mr. Harbo that a partial explanation of this was to be found in Mashington Field where difficulty was being experienced in obtaining results of name checks from OhI, USI and UIA. It was likewise pointed out in the memorandum of Mr. Harbo that Washington Field had brought this to the attention of the Bureau by letter dated July 29, 1954. As a result of which Liaison contacted ONI, OSI and UIA and was promised more prompt action on Bureau requests.

II.

A. Washington Wield Office letter of July 29, 1954 Referral/Consult

III. Current Bituation in Washington Field Office
Regarding Agency Checks in Applicant and Security
of Covernment Employees Investigations

The Washington Field Office by letter dated October 19, 1954, has advised as follows:

A. Preparation of Requests

B.

Agency checks are made by means of a flimsy lead sheet prepared on each applicant or EGH case received. Immediately after these cases are opened and assigned, it is processed in the Flimsy Unit where flimsies are at the present time prepared within 24 hours of the receipt of the letter ordering the investigation and are immediately routed to the Special Employee or Special Agent handling the check of the records of the particular agency. The flimsies under normal procedure reach the folder of the employee handling the agency check during the day following the receipt of the letter ordering the investigation. The employeesthereafter deliver the flimsies to the particular agency on the following morning which would be the second morning following the receipt of the case in the office. The Washington Field Office pointed out that it is possible to handle the processing of the flimsies in this short time only at such times when the volume does not increase to the proportions during the past summer.





It is known that on September 9, 1953, Don Surine of the McCarthy Committee advised the Bureau that the McCarthy Committee possessed a 150 page factual report containing derogatory information pertaining to CIA and reflecting that These

names were not furnished to the Bureau. (62-80750-2211) On February 27, 1954, Surine indicated that the McCarthy Committee was still collecting information concerning CIA. In this connection Surine stated that the McCarthy Committee had been conducting some psychological warfare on CIA and a campaign of terror.

There appears to be little doubt that Senator McCarthy and members of his staff have collected considerable information concerning
CIA operations.

I had lunch with Senator "SCOOP" JACKSON today and he tells me that he has had no contact with Senator JOHN L. McCLELLAN (D. Arkansas) since the election. He has been advised, apparently through the Senate Democratic control, that McCLELLAN does not desire to take over Chairmanship of the Government Operations Committee, to which he is entitled by seniority, and noted that JACKSON will probably be the Chairman. He says he is not pushing the point at all to even find out, as he feels that if it were announced or something came out about it now, it would just add troubles on to him before necessary.

JACKSON said that if he does become Chairman or if McCLELLAN keeps the job, he will recommend to him and put some pressure on in order to keep JACKSON's support, that a conference be had with you concerning the future functioning of the Committee. JACKSON noted that there was no question but what all of the major personnel of the Committee would be "bounced" and he felt that as a courtesy to the fact that some of them had been members of the FBI, that he would try to see that they were allowed to resign rather than be fired.

There is no question in my mind but what Senator JACKSON is profressing as a real solid individual and that he has a great admiration for you and the Bureau. He despises CIA; feels that they are a bunch of fools and that there is no reason whatever for them to function in the United States proper, except for their administrative set-up. He says he thinks that any of the work to be done here should be done by the FBI, but upon my pointing out that this would put a tremendous load on us, to a point where it might endanger our efficiency on our statutory duties and responsibilities, he agreed that it probably was not possible for us to do it, but that something should be done about CIA. His ultimate suggestion was that we should take over as an efficiency expert and revamp CIA and keep it within bounds.

In connection with his comments concerning CIA, I noted to him that there was considerable "high level" discussion going on as to investigative jurisdiction between us and ONI, G-2, etc., under the Delimitations Agreement. Having formerly been a prosecuting attorney himself, Senator JACKSON said that he thought it was a shame that ONI and G-2 were anything except very small organizations of exceedingly restricted activity, as he felt that the Bureau should handle completely on governmental reservations, etc. I think I discussed the matter enough with him so that he has the correct viewpoint concerning it. Incidentally, JACKSON states that his main major committee is now going to be membership on the Armed Services Committee of the Senate.

Senator JACKSON asked me about any problems which we might be going to have in connection with appropriations, and I told him that I did not know of any and hoped that the routine followed the system of last year, with no Senate hearings. He felt there would be a decided effort to have Senate hearings because of the widespread public comment from administrative sources as to the number of perverts and Party members, etc., that had been ousted by the Republican administration. He felt that the Democratic group as a whole would want to "set the record straight" by having the Director comment on general security problems and the like which would include such data in an appropriations hearing as being the only way that the Senate would have the opportunity of asking pertinent questions.

I pointed out to him the fact that while that would be a very sharp political move, yet in the long run the Bureau could not fail to lose from it because it would put us on the spot no matter how such questions were answered and would be utilizing the Bureau as a political vehicle when we have endeavored so hard to stay out of that situation. He said that personally he understood the point, but that there were some wild eyed people who were on the Appropriations Committee who would not worry about that,

Senator JACKSON said that he would very soon after his return to Washington, try to get to talk with you about these matters, and that he would stay in touch here with me so that if it appeared that there was any definite move along these lines, he would advise me so that we could be prepared for the situation.
