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

Yesterday I saw the Deputy Attorney General, Judge Walsh, who called to advise me that he was shortly to have a conference with the Under Secretary of State, Mr. Herter, relative to the exchange of students and other individuals with Russia. Judge Walsh stated he had already talked to Mr. Yeagley and Mr. Reilly of the Department but wanted to check with me to see whether I had any ideas about the matter.

Judge Walsh stated he understood it would be the responsibility of the State Department and the <u>Central Intelligence Agency</u> for the handling of these visiting individuals from Russia and that only in instances where there is some indication of a violation of law or subversive activity would there be occasion to call these to the attention of the FBI by the State Department and/or CIA.

I told Judge Walsh this was my understanding, but I did want to point out our interests went a little beyond the specific fact in that by bringing these individuals and groups into this country, unless the State Department and CIA set up some kind of a real and practical control, the internal security of the country might be seriously endangered and then the public would look to the FBI as to why this had occurred. I stated it is entirely all right to state that any violation of law or any subversive activity would be called to the attention of the FBI by the State Department and CIA, but unless they really had some way to check and control the individuals and groups, they would not know of the same occurring.

I stated, therefore, I had little confidence in how substantive would be the controls which the State Department and CIA would set up, and bЗ I thought he, Judge Walsh, should make crystal clear to Under Secretary of State Herter the responsibility of the State Department and CIA and the Tolson need for realistic controls of such individuals and groups as may come into Boardman _ Belmont . 

If you approve, the Liaison Agent will advise CIA that we insist that all checks made under this program will be made at Bureau headquarters. It will be reiterated and emphasized that interviews of any type under this program should not be conducted by CIA without first clearing with the Bureau. This will include the type of interview designed to obtain identifying data or assessment type of information. DETAILS:

Since its inception, CIA has conducted a program in the United States which has involved the interrogation of aliens ~ who might be in possession of positive intelligence information. Such information might pertain to political conditions in a foreign country, and to commerce, industry, scientific research, etc. For several years we have maintained an agreement with CIA whereby that Agency will not interview an alien in this country for positive intelligence information without first checking with the Bureau. Such an arrangement provides us with an opportunity to make certain that CIA does not interfere with any Bureau operations. There have been occasions when CIA violated the agreement and we immediately made strong written protests. During the past two months there have been approximately three such cases and in each instance we voiced a strong objection in writing.

. Our recent letters of protest definitely induced a reaction within CIA in that CIA officials asked to meet with the Liaison Agent. On June 24, 1958, Agent Papich met with and of CIA. The CIA officials expressed their regrets for the incidents which had taken place and they emphasized that in each case there was no motive to pull a fast one on the Bureau." They stated that CIA receives voluminous requests from military agencies and from other CIA divisions to b3 interview aliens who might be in possession of information of value to the national intelligence effort. pointed out that now and then a CIA employee inadvertently might get out of line. He referred to the letters of protest and commented "Those were very strong letters." The Liaison Agent advised the three CIA officials that the letters of protest were not directed as objections to CIA's interview of particular aliens. They were told that we were protesting because an agreement had been violated and that we would continue to do so if there were reoccurrences. then asked if it would be possible for CIA to submit its checks at a Bureau field office level. He was of the opinion that this would work more efficiently in that there would be less paper work for both agencies. He stated that under the present system a CIA field representative corresponds with the Bureau. Our reply goes back through the same channels. stated that it is only necessary for his Agency to determine if a CIA contact with an alien would conflict with any Bureau interests. It was his belief that a check at a field level could immediately resolve whether or not we had an interest and CIA

could then act accordingly without <u>aetting</u> involved in much correspondence. The Liaison Agent told that his suggestion had some merit but we believed in controlling our interests in this program at a headquarters level. He was told that his suggestion would be presented to the Bureau and he would be <u>contacted</u> again by the Liaison Agent. It should be noted that both and and emphasized that the checks under this program should be made in the most economical manner and it was important that interviews be conducted without any unnecessary delay bearing in mind that some requests received by CIA are of an urgent nature.

commented that if the Bureau insisted that all checks be made at headquarters and that no contacts be made with aliens without first checking with the Bureau, many situations could arise whereby CIA would not be in a position to furnish very much identifying data concerning a particular alien. He explained that quite often it is impossible to obtain the desired information from INS because the alien's file has not been transferred from one INS territory to another. He stated that if CIA were to initiate an investigation to obtain identifying data, it would mean the hiring of additional personnel solely for the purpose of gathering data for a name check request form. He felt that a fifteen to twenty minute contact with an alien would provide all the necessary data and would save the taxpayer money.

OBSERVATIONS:

CIA's suggestion to handle the checks with the Bureau at a field level has some merit but it is believed that numerous problems would result after a period of time. We would have 53 offices dealing with CIA at a local level and it is possible certain matters could get out of control. Under the present procedure we are in a position to maintain more effective control. The fact that CIA merely wants to establish if its interest in an alien conflicts with ours is an important item in that we can now eliminate extensive file reviews when requests are made by CIA. This naturally takes time. It would appear that we can now eliminate such reviews and only determine if the alien is of current interest to us and accordingly advise CIA. It can be anticipated that CIA might start furnishing name check requests under this program with skimpy identifying data. It is not believed that this will be a serious problem in determining if we have an interest in the alien as long as we at least have his name. With regard to CIA's concern about expense and paper handling, it is believed that as far as we are concerned this can be held to a minimum. Actually, all we need is a name check form with a copy. Our reply can

If there is an expedite request, the matter can be handled by phone and then later confirmed by a written form. None of this seems to involve any unnecessary paper handling. If the checks were made at the field level they would have to be written records of some type.

Congressman Selden, (D) Alabama, extended his remarks regarding the recent revolution in Iraq, pointing out that as far as he had been able to determine, it took our Government completely by surprise. Mr. Selden stated "This is another instance which causes many Members of Congress and many of our constituents to question whether the <u>Central Intelligence</u> <u>Agency is really doing the job which we have a right to expect it</u> to do." The reference to the FBI contained in Congressman Selden's remarks was set forth in an earlier memorandum.





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

Limits of Intelligence 1. To the N. Y. Herald Tribune:

Don Whitehead's series, "The C. I. A. Story" was most interesting, but two important points were not emphasized.

1. Well over. 80 per cent of the national intelligence effort is not "cloak and dagger." Rather it is systematic research and analysis of sources available to any one.

2. There are limits to the capability of any intelligence agency when it comes to predicting international behavior. As General Walter Beedle Smith said in 1950, "America's people expect you to be on a communing level with God and Joe Stalin. . . . They expect you to be able to say that a war will start next Tuesday at 5:32 p. m."

As recent Middle East events have demonstrated, no intelligence service can be that good, and the national intelligence community should not be too harshly criticized for an intelligence "failure" on the Iraq.coup.

Reference is made to my memorandum dated July 8, 1958, captioned as above, describing procedures to be followed when the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) checks with us in order to determine whether or not there was a Bureau objection to a contact of an alien. As indicated in the memorandum, it was agreed with CIA that the Bureau would check upon receiving a request and then advise CIA whether or not there was any objection to CIA's contact of a particular alien.

On August 5, 1958 CIA, advised the Liaison Agent that his Agency has completed a revision of internal procedures for the processing of the requests before submitting to the Bureau. b3 stated that he wanted to officially advise us that when making a request, CIA would submit a form letter carrying the name of the alien and with it, the phraseology Alien <u>Contact Check.</u>" will be returned to CIA indicating whether or not there is any objection.

The above information concerning the description of the CIA form letter was orally furnished to the Nationalities Intelligence Section on August 6, 1958.

THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

In scanning the Congressional Record for Friday, July 18, 1958, the following item contained therein pertaining to the FBI has been marked for your attention.

Pages A6464-A6465, Congressman Brownson, (R) Indiana, extended his remarks concerning House Concurrent Resolution 363, which he introduced, setting up a Joint Committee on Intelligence. Mr. Brownson pointed out that "This committee would see not only that good management practices are followed in the CIA, but also that a watchful eye is kept on our overall intelligence policies and operations." He further stated "We can have supervision with secrecy. Congressional committees operating for years in the sensitive areas dealing with the armed services, the FBI, and foreign policy have demonstrated this fact as has the conduct of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy. Secrecy for secrecy's sake alone can be dangerous in a field as vital as intelligence.
