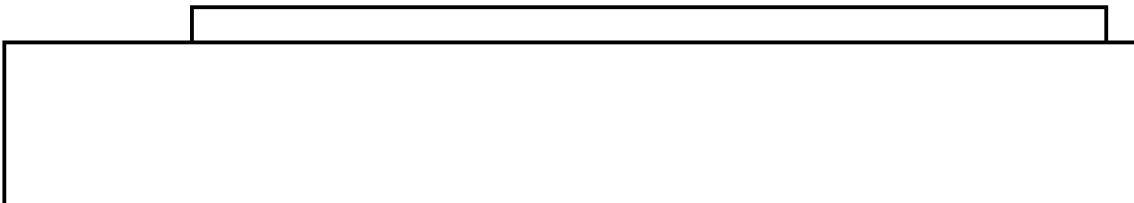

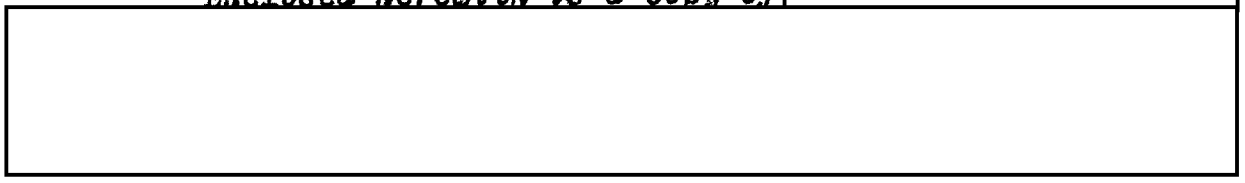

Under the captioned name check program, the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) disseminates Form I-57 to interested agencies. The form contains brief identifying data. Each agency checks its files and submits the results to the Bureau. For several years, the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), when disseminating the results of its file reviews to the Bureau, has indicated that a copy of the same communication was designated for the State Department. Recently it was noted that CIA had ceased such dissemination to State. The Liaison Agent inquired concerning this apparent change and was advised by [redacted] CIA, on June 9, 1958, that CIA is no longer disseminating copies to the State Department. According to [redacted] this change took place at the specific request of the State Department which indicated to CIA that such dissemination was not necessary.

W. J. ...

On June 11, 1958, [redacted] State Department, advised Mr. Bartlett that the State Department no longer desired to receive copies of file reviews prepared either by CIA or by us. [redacted] explained that the State Department submits name check requests when the individuals actually apply for visas at the consulates and that State assumes the recipients of the request, at that time, would be furnishing any significant information concerning the subject of the request. According to [redacted] the receipt of communications under the instant program would only involve a duplication of work and handling by the State Department.

Yesterday I saw the Deputy Attorney General, Judge Walsh, who called to advise me that he was shortly to have a conference with the Under Secretary of State, Mr. Herter, relative to the exchange of students and other individuals with Russia. Judge Walsh stated he had already talked to Mr. Yeagley and Mr. Reilly of the Department but wanted to check with me to see whether I had any ideas about the matter.

Judge Walsh stated he understood it would be the responsibility of the State Department and the Central Intelligence Agency for the handling of these visiting individuals from Russia and that only in instances where there is some indication of a violation of law or subversive activity would there be occasion to call these to the attention of the FBI by the State Department and/or CIA.

I told Judge Walsh this was my understanding, but I did want to point out our interests went a little beyond the specific fact in that by bringing these individuals and groups into this country, unless the State Department and CIA set up some kind of a real and practical control, the internal security of the country might be seriously endangered and then the public would look to the FBI as to why this had occurred. I stated it is entirely all right to state that any violation of law or any subversive activity would be called to the attention of the FBI by the State Department and CIA, but unless they really had some way to check and control the individuals and groups, they would not know of the same occurring.

I stated, therefore, I had little confidence in how substantive would be the controls which the State Department and CIA would set up, and I thought he, Judge Walsh, should make crystal clear to Under Secretary of State Herter the responsibility of the State Department and CIA and the need for realistic controls of such individuals and groups as may come into this country from Russia.

I told Kelley that this appeared to be highly undesirable and that he should advise the Birmingham Police Department that we would not cover the pay off and would not authorize [Redacted] cashing the check. Kelley was instructed that he should go ahead and conduct investigation of this possible car theft ring case without becoming involved in any pay offs or assuming any responsibility for them as they were set up by the Birmingham Police Department.

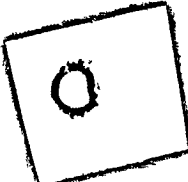

SYNOPSIS:

Since its inception, CIA has operated program involving interrogations of aliens in the United States who might be in possession of positive intelligence information. Under existing agreement such interrogations not to be conducted without first checking with Bureau. Throughout years there have been cases where CIA violated agreement and we made strong written protests. In past two months there have been approximately three such cases and we voiced vigorous objection in writing. Our letters induced reaction in that CIA officials asked to meet with the Liaison Agent. CIA official commented that our letters of protest were strong. He was told that we were not objecting to CIA interview of aliens but rather to that Agency's violation of agreement. CIA has asked if we would be agreeable to that Agency submitting its checks at field level. CIA believes this would be more efficient for both agencies. Although CIA's suggestion has some merit, it is believed we should maintain control at headquarters. CIA indicated it is not necessary to furnish that Agency results of our file reviews but merely advise whether or not CIA's interest in alien conflicts with Bureau interest. In view of this, we are in a position to eliminate much unnecessary work.

ACTION:

If you approve, the Liaison Agent will advise CIA that we insist that all checks made under this program will be made at Bureau headquarters. It will be reiterated and emphasized that interviews of any type under this program should not be conducted by CIA without first clearing with the Bureau. This will include the type of interview designed to obtain identifying data or assessment type of information. CIA will be told that we are in a position to give the Agency good service as we have in the past and that since CIA does not need the information in our files, we will merely advise if the planned interview does or does not conflict with Bureau interests. Upon the completion of this discussion with CIA, the results will be confirmed in writing in a letter to that Agency.

DETAILS:

Since its inception, CIA has conducted a program in the United States which has involved the interrogation of aliens who might be in possession of positive intelligence information. Such information might pertain to political conditions in a foreign country, and to commerce, industry, scientific research, etc. For several years we have maintained an agreement with CIA whereby that Agency will not interview an alien in this country for positive intelligence information without first checking with the Bureau. Such an arrangement provides us with an opportunity to make certain that CIA does not interfere with any Bureau operations. There have been occasions when CIA violated the agreement and we immediately made strong written protests. During the past two months there have been approximately three such cases and in each instance we voiced a strong objection in writing.

Our recent letters of protest definitely induced a reaction within CIA in that CIA officials asked to meet with the Liaison Agent. On June 24, 1958, Agent Papich met with [redacted] and [redacted] of CIA. The CIA officials expressed their regrets for the incidents which had taken place and they emphasized that in each case there was no motive to "pull a fast one on the Bureau." They stated that CIA receives voluminous requests from military agencies and from other CIA divisions to interview aliens who might be in possession of information of value to the national intelligence effort. [redacted] pointed out that now and then a CIA employee inadvertently might get out of line. He referred to the letters of protest and commented "Those were very strong letters." The Liaison Agent advised the three CIA officials that the letters of protest were not directed as objections to CIA's interview of particular aliens. They were told that we were protesting because an agreement had been violated and that we would continue to do so if there were reoccurrences. [redacted] then asked if it would be possible for CIA to submit its checks at a Bureau field office level. He was of the opinion that this would work more efficiently in that there would be less paper work for both agencies. He stated that under the present system a CIA field representative corresponds with the Bureau. Our reply goes back through the same channels. [redacted] stated that it is only necessary for his Agency to determine if a CIA contact with an alien would conflict with any Bureau interests. It was his belief that a check at a field level could immediately resolve whether or not we had an interest and CIA

could then act accordingly without getting involved in much correspondence. The Liaison Agent told [redacted] that his suggestion had some merit but we believed in controlling our interests in this program at a headquarters level. He was told that his suggestion would be presented to the Bureau and he would be contacted again by the Liaison Agent. It should be noted that both [redacted] and [redacted] emphasized that the checks under this program should be made in the most economical manner and it was important that interviews be conducted without any unnecessary delay bearing in mind that some requests received by CIA are of an urgent nature.

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[redacted] commented that if the Bureau insisted that all checks be made at headquarters and that no contacts be made with aliens without first checking with the Bureau, many situations could arise whereby CIA would not be in a position to furnish very much identifying data concerning a particular alien. He explained that quite often it is impossible to obtain the desired information from INS because the alien's file has not been transferred from one INS territory to another. He stated that if CIA were to initiate an investigation to obtain identifying data, it would mean the hiring of additional personnel solely for the purpose of gathering data for a name check request form. He felt that a fifteen to twenty minute contact with an alien would provide all the necessary data and would save the taxpayer money.

OBSERVATIONS:

CIA's suggestion to handle the checks with the Bureau at a field level has some merit but it is believed that numerous problems would result after a period of time. We would have 53 offices dealing with CIA at a local level and it is possible certain matters could get out of control. Under the present procedure we are in a position to maintain more effective control. The fact that CIA merely wants to establish if its interest in an alien conflicts with ours is an important item in that we can now eliminate extensive file reviews when requests are made by CIA. This naturally takes time. It would appear that we can now eliminate such reviews and only determine if the alien is of current interest to us and accordingly advise CIA. It can be anticipated that CIA might start furnishing name check requests under this program with skimpy identifying data. It is not believed that this will be a serious problem in determining if we have an interest in the alien as long as we at least have his name. With regard to CIA's concern about expense and paper handling, it is believed that as far as we are concerned this can be held to a minimum. Actually, all we need is a name check form with a copy. Our reply can

be stamped on a copy of the form to be returned to CIA. This same form can be passed on by CIA headquarters to its field representative. If there is an expedite request, the matter can be handled by phone and then later confirmed by a written form. None of this seems to involve any unnecessary paper handling. If the checks were made at the field level they would have to be written records of some type.

Reference is made to my memorandum dated June 27, 1958. Pursuant to instructions, the Liaison Agent met with Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) representatives on July 2, 1958, for the purpose of officially advising CIA concerning conditions we desired to be fulfilled prior to an interrogation of an alien by CIA. Agent Papich met with Messrs. [redacted]

The Liaison Agent advised the CIA representatives that we definitely wanted CIA to make all of its checks at Bureau headquarters rather than our field offices. It was explained that the Bureau did not desire that interviews of any type be conducted without clearing with us. Included would be the type of interview designed to obtain biographical identifying data or to assess an alien's potential as a source of positive intelligence information. The CIA officials were told that the check to be made by the Bureau would be only to determine whether or not the Bureau had any objection to the CIA contact or interview. When replying, the Bureau would not furnish the results of a file review.

The Central Intelligence Agency representatives agreed to the above conditions. [redacted] advised that a problem could arise in connection with emergency situations. He explained that now and then CIA receives a request from the military services to interview an alien within a matter of hours. [redacted] felt that CIA might find it extremely difficult to handle a check with the Bureau and still carry out the interrogation within the deadline period. He further advised that CIA men periodically make road trips into areas which are visited possibly once or twice a year. The CIA agent plans his interrogations but may hear of additional aliens who could be interviewed during the trip. [redacted] stated that it would be to the Government's advantage to complete those contacts or interviews during that road trip. He stated that there will not be very many such cases.

of your Agency and Mr. Sam J. Papich of this Bureau concerning checks to be made with the Bureau prior to the interrogation of aliens for the development of positive intelligence information. At the meeting of July 2, 1958, it was agreed that certain conditions would be fulfilled during the processing of checks with the Bureau. Set forth is a confirmation of the results of this meeting.

All checks with the Bureau are to be made at a headquarters level. Prior to interrogating an alien for the development of positive intelligence information, your Agency will submit a check to the Bureau for the purpose of determining whether or not there will be any objection to the interrogation. Such a check will include those cases where you plan to make contact for the acquirement of biographical data or for the purpose of assessing an alien's potential as a source of intelligence information. When replying, the Bureau will advise whether or not there is any objection to your contacting or interrogating the alien. The Bureau reply will not include the results of a review of FAF records.

You advised the Bureau's liaison representative that emergency situations might arise whereby it would be extremely difficult to check with the Bureau prior to contacting an alien. In such instances, it is requested that you notify the Bureau as soon as possible after the contact has been made.

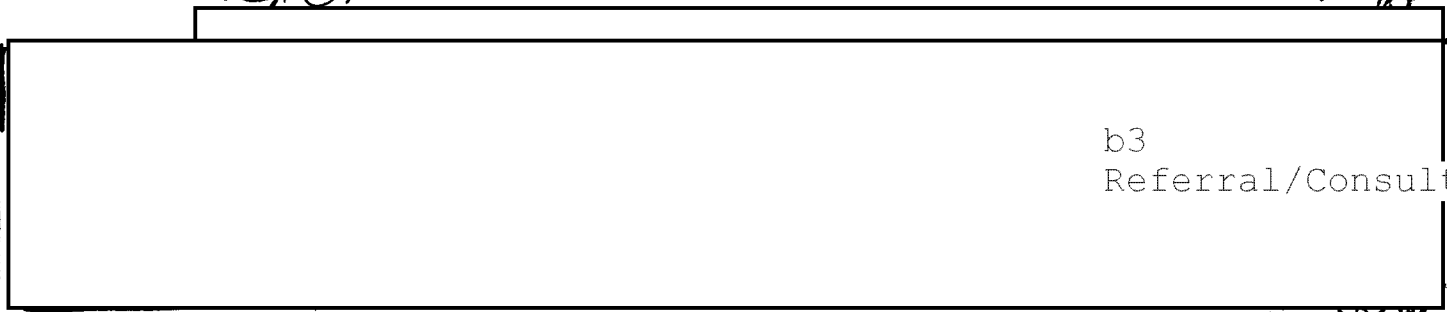

You previously have been informed that the Intelligence Agency (CIA) would be the target of stiff criticism for allegedly not making available advance intelligence information concerning the present crisis in the Middle East. Set forth is information correlated by the Liaison Agent which tends to describe CIA's position relative to allegations already made that the Agency was caught flat-footed.

Through routine dissemination of information from CIA, there has been no evidence of even a suggestion that trouble was brewing in Iraq.

Arthur Krock, "New York Times" correspondent, reported on July 16, 1958, concerning the National Security Council meeting held on July 15, 1958. He stated that at this meeting Allen Dulles admitted that his Agency did not have advance information and that CIA Director allegedly stated that his personnel had been concentrating on possible trouble in Jordan.

CIA has been strongly attacked by Fulton Lewis, Jr., and by John O'Donnell of the "New York Daily News." It is expected that other correspondents will be making similar criticisms. In the "Washington News" of July 16, 1958, Senator Mansfield was quoted as stating that it would not have been necessary to send troops to the Middle East if CIA had been on its toes.

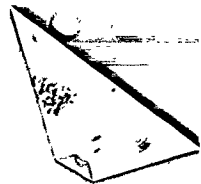

During his radio broadcast at 7:00 p.m., on Thursday, July 24, 1958, Fulton Lewis, Jr., briefly mentioned the Director and the Bureau in connection with remarks he (Mr. Lewis) made which were critical of the Central Intelligence Agency.

Mr. Lewis' criticism of CIA was based upon (1) The ultra-secrecy which is attached to CIA and (2) CIA's failure to produce important intelligence information in advance of recent world developments. Mr. Lewis stated that CIA is "supposed" to do for the United States in the foreign field what the FBI does on the domestic scene. He stated, however, that "J. Edgar Hoover's Federal Bureau of Investigation" does not indulge in the secrecy which CIA does, and he remarked that the FBI succeeded in infiltrating the Communist Party to such an extent that, at one time, it was said there were more FBI Agents (obviously he meant FBI informants) than actual communists in the Party.

On July 30, 1958, [redacted] and [redacted] Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), advised Agent Papich that Dulles had appeared before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to testify concerning CIA's coverage of the Middle East situation. [redacted] and [redacted] stated that they had not received any details but Dulles returned to his office and commented that he had not been treated roughly. Dulles allegedly did not make any excuses for failure to give advance information on the Iraqi revolt.

Limits of Intelligence

To the N. Y. Herald Tribune:

Don Whitehead's series, "The C. I. A. Story" was most interesting, but two important points were not emphasized.

1. Well over 80 per cent of the national intelligence effort is not "cloak and dagger." Rather it is systematic research and analysis of sources available to any one.

2. There are limits to the capability of any intelligence agency when it comes to predicting international behavior. As General Walter Beedle Smith said in 1950, "America's people expect you to be on a communing level with God and Joe Stalin. . . . They expect you to be able to say that a war will start next Tuesday at 5:32 p. m."

As recent Middle East events have demonstrated, no intelligence service can be that good, and the national intelligence community should not be too harshly criticized for an intelligence "failure" on the Iraq coup.

Reference is made to my memorandum dated July 8, 1958, captioned as above, describing procedures to be followed when the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) checks with us in order to determine whether or not there was a Bureau objection to a contact of an alien. As indicated in the memorandum, it was agreed with CIA that the Bureau would check upon receiving a request and then advise CIA whether or not there was any objection to CIA's contact of a particular alien.

On August 5, 1958, [redacted] CIA, advised the Liaison Agent that his Agency has completed a revision of internal procedures for the processing of the requests before submitting to the Bureau. [redacted] stated that he wanted to officially advise us that when making a request, CIA would submit a form letter carrying the name of the alien and with it, the phraseology "Alien Contact Check." [redacted] understands that a copy of the form will be returned to CIA indicating whether or not there is any objection. b3

The above information concerning the description of the CIA form letter was orally furnished to the Nationalities Intelligence Section on August 6, 1958.

THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

In scanning the Congressional Record for Friday, July 18, 1958, the following item contained therein pertaining to the FBI has been marked for your attention.

Pages A6464-A6465, Congressman Brownson, (R) Indiana, extended his remarks concerning House Concurrent Resolution 363, which he introduced, setting up a Joint Committee on Intelligence. Mr. Brownson pointed out that "This committee would see not only that good management practices are followed in the CIA, but also that a watchful eye is kept on our overall intelligence policies and operations." He further stated "We can have supervision with secrecy. Congressional committees operating for years in the sensitive areas dealing with the armed services, the FBI, and foreign policy have demonstrated this fact as has the conduct of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy. Secrecy for secrecy's sake alone can be dangerous in a field as vital as intelligence."
