The House investigation of the super-secret Central Intelligence uncovered some Agency has startling facts.

Among them is an almost incredible story of the CIA forking over more than \$1,000,000 for hidden ore in Japan in exchange for super-secret Communist information, only to find that both it and the ore were virtually worthless, and that the deal had been enginered by an American who pocketed upward of \$100,000.

So far, he has gone scot-free. The House investigators were told that when this case was turned over to the Justice Dept. it was dissuaded from prose-

cuting by the intelligence agency. CIA is now one of the biggest contractors in the government.

In 1958, on the basis of one study in the probers' hands, the intelligence agency was the third largest federal purchaser, topped only by the Defense Dept. and the Atomic Energy Commission. Practically all of the CIA's buying is in Toreign countries.

This agency is the only one in the government whose budget has never been revealed. It is concealed in the funds of other federal bodies. Authoritive congressional sources have estimated CIA's annual appropriation

at between \$350,000,000 and \$500,

000,000.

The House investigation is the first full-scale scrutiny of CIA's was set up after World War II.

The inquiry is being made by a special seven member Armed Services subcommittee, headed by Representative Paul Kilday (D. Tex.), one of the ablest and most respected members of Congress. An expert staff has been compiling data about CIA for months in preparation for hearings at a still-undetermined date.

The General Services Administration, principal purchasing agency of the government, supplied most of the information about the ore deal.
