Bowles FROM McGu tre SUBJECT: REQUEST FROM-CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE Rosen AGENCY FOR NAME SEARCHES IN IDENTI-FICATION DIVISION liaison representative from Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), inquired January 7 whether we could make 50 to 100 name searches a month, until July, 1961, in the Identification Division. The names to be searched are those of employees of contractors and subcontractors working on construction of the new CIA building, which is expected to be completed in July, 1961. CIA has been making and will continue to make "agency checks" (including name checks in FBI's general indices) on these people. These are handled by the Name Check Section of the Domestic Intelligence Division and are included in that Section's budget estimates. said the purpose of these searches is to "establish bona fides" -- part of the program to determine whether these people are legitimate construction workers engaged in their trades for a long time or whether they might possibly be using this occupation to penetrate the CIA. At present time Identification Division makes about 2 name searches a month for CIA. Identification Division can handle the above-requested volume of name checks for arrest data which would be a total of about 1350 name searches in the next 18 months. Estimated cost of such a name search would be about \$1.00 each, or a total of approximately \$1,350.00 over the next 18 months. CIA will furnish complete name, date of birth and brief description. It is understood that if the name is so common that we would have too many individual records under that name to review, we would advise CIA-that a name search in such instance is not feasible. 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Was Bang-Jensen Murdered?

THE testimony of Robert Morris of New I Jersey is that Povl Bang Jensen had proof that Soviet Union agents had infiltrated not only the United Nations secretariat but the U.S. foreign intelligence.

The U.S. foreign intelligence is the Allen W. Central Intelligence Agency. Allen W. Dulles is CIA's headman. Povl Bang-Jensen was the UN official who lost his job because he refused to surrender to Dag Hammarskjold the names of Hungarian freedom fighters who had told to

him the story of communist repression of the Hungarian rebellion. Now, Bang-Jensen has lost also his life.

Bang-Jensen was listed as a suicide. But, was he? Some persons think not. Some persons suspect that Bang-Jensen had knowledge of Soviet Union espionage operations in the UN and CIA which made the man a real menace to the communist cause.

The smartly edited weekly "National Review" has been agritating the Bang Jensen case. Robert Morris of New Jersey is interested because he was Bang Jensen's lawyer. Mr. Morris is a candidate against Sen. Clifford P. Case for New Jersey's Republican senatorial nomination.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Dulles made reference to his recent Congressional testimony and stated that he had found it most difficult to maintain a clear neutral line because certain people wanted to use him politically. He made reference to statements he made concerning U.S. intelligence estimates, and as you know, there has been conflict between the Administration and certain Senators concerning estimates made relative, to Soviet missilepproduction capability. Dulles stated that his figures concerning Soviet production varied with that of the Air Force but he maintained that he was sticking to figures which resulted from studies made by the coordinated efforts of not only CIA but also military personnel who participated. Dulles indicated that Senator Symington had given him more trouble than any of the other Senators. Symington, as you know, has been a strong critic of the Administration's views concerning our air power and missile production. MIKE Dulles also mentioned that he recently conferred with Senator Mansfield concerning possible legislation which the Senator might introduce for the establishment of a congressional watch-dog committee.

Mansfield, a few years ago, introduced legislation to set up a joint committee which would supervise all of our foreign intelligence activities. Mansfield has told Dulles that he will not introduce any new legislation during this session unless he has the support of Congressional leaders. Dulles advised that he will not personally fight any legislation but he will make an issue if there develops a situation where periodically he will find it necessary to testify to more than one committee concerning CIA's operations. He commented that from a security standpoint this would be very unwise. He further stated that he essentially would not be disturbed about testifying before a watch dog committee once it was well established, but he does notlichere would be any number of problems rising from loose handling of information by staff members of such a committee. He expressed the opinion that legislation for such a committee would not get very far during this election year. ACTION: For your information.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Since we are not in a position to interview CIA employees as might be done in a normal investigation, other tactics will be required to dig up facts. Pushing and prodding CIA will be absolutely necessary, and this will be done. To handle this matter successfully additional information could be extremely useful. The following is recommended:

(1) Mr. DeLoach has excellent and very cooperative sources within HCUA. It is recommended that he obtain the identity of the individual or individuals who disseminated information concerning the Seventh World Youth Festival to HCUA. By acquiring such information, we will be in a much better position to follow developments and concentrate on the area within CIA where the dissemination took place.

(2) It is further recommended that Mr. DeLoach obtain from HCUA samples of CIA information (not Bureau disseminated data) furnished to the Committee concerning the Seventh World Youth Festival. Possession of such information will provide valuable ammunition in countering possible CIA denial of any implication in this matter. Such information will also suggest leads for the Liaison Agent to produce additional information through available sources within CIA.

Re: Loyalty Oath Requirement Under the Nat'l Defense Education Act.

Dear

This reply to your 5 November letter has been delayed in the hope that would answer my letter of 28 October. He has not done so. But I have many responses from Seminar members, notwithstanding the fact that a return address was purposely omitted from the mimeographed copy of my letter. Yours was the only dissent out of more than a 10% response.

It seems to me our differences revolve around four issues:

- 1. First, and perhaps the most important, is what appears to be a woeful lack of understanding at Harvard over the magnitude of Soviet psychological warfare in general (its all-pervading influence over the various facets of American life) and the role in that warfare which the Soviets have assigned to education in particular (infiltration and indoctrination in our schools, colleges and textbooks). If you have any doubts about this, I refer you to the enclosed article, "Academic Freedom or Communist Coddling?", by our Seminar speaker and discussion leader, Dr. Anthony T. Bouscaren.
- 2. You readily admit that loyalty oaths "are quite appropriately required of people undertaking positions of trust or confidence in the armed services." Yet the very purpose of NDEA after Sputnik was to train more scientists specifically for the armed services. I find it as hard to reconcile this Jekyll and Hyde position as I do the AAUP's consistent support for Communist teachers and its equally consistent antagonism to anti-Communist teachers (Fuchs of American University, Evans of Northwestern, and others).

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- 3. Opposition to the Loyalty Oath comes from only 19 of the 1368 colleges and universities eligible under NDEA, mostly from the Ivy League the largest colleges and, presumably, the leaders in educational thought and policy. It is natural indeed, logical to find Soviet efforts directed where those efforts would do the most good. That 19 of the leading colleges join with the Communists in opposing the NDEA Loyalty Oath clause seems the clearest indication that these efforts have not been without their measure of practical success.
- 4. When you refer to the Loyalty Oath as "obnoxious interference", "conformity", and "typical of dictatorships", aren't you hitting the wrong target? Aren't those 19 colleges (less than 2% of all colleges) taking the position of "dictating" to their students, many of whom would like to apply for aid and would be proud to take the oath? Are they not "interfering" with their students' freedom of choice in the matter, thus forcing them to "conform"?

One is tempted to wonder whether Ivy League opposition to the Loyalty Oath doesn't stem, basically, from a reluctance to assume responsibility for weeding out their needy Red students - in the face of a demonstrable inability on the part of most of those same Ivy League colleges to weed the Reds out of their faculties.

This time I provide a return address - with the hope that every Seminar Student will (a) weigh these issues, in the light of the lateness of the hour, and (b) find the time and courage to send me his vote one way or the other.

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

"Washington Star," paid a courtes; visit to the Paris Office on 3/10/60. During als visit, the following comments were made by Mr. BROWN:

He expressed considerable concern over the racial tensions which are mounting in the southern portion of the United States. He expressed the opinion that further use of Inited States troops, such as was done in the racial crisis at Little Rock, Arkansas, could result in a general deterioration of the internal stability of the United States, bringing the nation to the brink of civil war.

Present during the contact of Mr. SROWY as
Lt. Col. HAYMOND R. O'BRIEN, Assistant Air Attache, U. S.
Embassy, Paris, former Secretary to Senator STYLES BRIDGES
of New Hampshire, and a long-time friend of Mr. BROWN.
Lt. Col. O'BRIEN inquired of Mr. BROWN as to whether he
considered the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) to be an
effective intelligence agency. Mr. BROWN Indicated that he
did not and stated that ALLEN DULLES, CIA Director, had no
idea of what was going on within his own organization.
Mr. BROWN stated that there is an internal strupple for power
within CIA between one group headed by _______ and a second
group headed by _______ Mr. BROWN stated that these two
individuals are struggling for power to take over CIA when
DULLES leaves. Mr. BROWN indicated that both
are immature and complotely incapable of running such a
critical operation as CIA.

Mr. BROWN also commented that CIA has a current budget of approximately 650 million dollars and has cost the United States taxpayers approximately 8 billion dollars since it has been established and has failed to produce information of true value to the nation's security.

Mr. BROWN recalled that LLEN DULLES recently testified before Congress to the effect that CIA had passed information concerning the Soviet missile capabilities to Gen. NATHAN TWINING of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Actually, such data was never received by Gen. TWINING and DULLES had merely assumed that since his agency possessed such material that proper dissemination had been made, when such was actually not the case.

As an example of the irresponsibility of
Mr. Brown stated that a recent party was held at the Italian
Embassy in Washington, D. C. During the course of the evening,
Ineld forth in a loud voice on various occasions, stating
his opinions of world affairs. At one point stated
that the United States should recognize Communist China. This
statement, according to Mr. BROWN, was immediately challenged
by him and he inquired of AMORY as to when CIA had become a
policy-making branch of the Government. On this occasion,

in effect, that Benator BRIDGES wasn't too bad until he married
and his wife began to exert undue influence over him. Mr. BROWN
stated that he immediately furnished the substance of

him to his office and stated he desired to be furnished the
full particulars of remarks about Senator BRIDGES, and

was in possession of AMORY's comments and that if he were
looking for witnesses, the remarks were made in the presence
of GEORGE ALLEN of the U. S. Information Agency. DULLES

CIA and BROWN reportedly told Mr. DULLES that he knew the
incident would be passed over and no corrective action would
be taken.

This individual, according to Mr. BROWN, has a record of 21 Communist Party front affiliations or involvements. He stated the Bureau is in possession of complete details with respect to this individual.

In commenting upon the current political picture in France, Mr. BROWN described this country as a managed democracy with a strong man at the helm of government in the person of General DE GAULLE working for the welfare of France and all its citizens. He contrasted the situation in France with that of the Soviet Union where all power is centralized in the hands of KHRUSHCHEV who uses it to subjugate the Soviet masses.

Throughout his contact with the representative of this office, Mr. BROWN was very complimentary in his references to the Director and the Bureau. He stated that there are two great public institutions in the United States, the FBI and the U.S. Marine Corps, and unscrupulous individuals are trying to destroy both of these organizations. He did not further elaborate on this latter comment.

Mr. BROWN departed Paris for Madrid on the evening of March 10 and indicated he would contact Legat CLARK D. ANDERSON on arrival there.
