However, I thought it advisable that you might interview Mr. Scott, acquainting him with the circumstances, if he does not already know, to the end that he may have relatives or other persons who may be in a position to assist in the welfare of his children.

I might say that I became rather well acquainted with the members of the Scott family and his children during the course of the investigation and found that his children are well brought up, are attending school, and in my opinion are deserving of every possible consideration.

There is only one course I have been able to take in response to kies Hurtienne's letter and that is to communicate of the Oregon State Police at Medford sho, I am sure, will discuss the matter with Miss Hurtienne and possibly make some arrangements through the county to temporarily provide for them if it is found that the circumstances warrant.



J SUMMARY REPORT

On the night of July 22, 1933, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, two men forcibly kidnaped Charles F. Urschel and transported him to a farm near Paradise, Texas, where he was held until July 21, 1933, when he was released after the payment of the sum of \$200,000.00.

Investigation subsequently disclosed that George Kelly Barnes, commonly known as "Machine Gun" Kelly, Harvey J. Bailey and Albert L. Bates were the main perpetrators of this kidnaping and received the ransom money. The investigation further disclosed that Mr. Urschel was held at the farm of Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Shannon near Paradise, Texas during the ransom negotiations.

Subsequently George Kelly Barnes, alias "Machine Gun" Kelly, Harvey J. Ba'ley and Albert L. Bates, together with others, were convicted in the United States District Court at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma for violating the Statute commonly known as the Lindbergh Kidneping Statute, and are now confined in Federal Peniteries.

Albert L. Bates, one of the persons convicted for this kidnaping, was apprehended at Denver, Colorado and removed to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. At the time of his apprehension, the investigation disclosed he had a portion of the ransom money or his person and a larger part of the ransom money was concealed in a suit-case located at an apartment in Denver.

On December 14, 1934, the Federal Grand Jury at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma returned a True Bill of Indictment charging Ben B. Laska, an attorney of Denver, Colombo, and James C. Mathers, an attorney of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, with violation of Section 408 a, Title 18, of the United States Code. This indictment was based upon evidence of the receipt by Laska and Mathers of a

Davis), at a parking lot in Denver, Colorado and took him to the Denver Police headquarters where he was confined; that they witnessed a search of his person by Officer who found the sum of \$777.00 in currency, of which amount \$660.00 was in \$20.00 bills and issued by the Kansas City Federal Reserve; that Bates, alias Davis, immediately wanted to give an order to have this money turned over to Mr. Ben B. Laska; that they took this sum of \$660.00 to the Forestry Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture at Denver, Colorado on August 17, 1933, where the same was photostated in their presence. Either one or both of these witnesses can identify the photostatic copies of these \$20.00 bills. (For further details, see page 27 of the summary report of Special Agent Gus T. Jones, Oklahoma City, Okla., dated 9-13-33.)

Will testify that he searched the person of Albert L. Bates, alias Davis, at the time of his arrest in Denver, Colorado and found on his person a wallet containing money; that he turned this wallet over to Officer who counted the same in his presence, and the money amounted to \$777.00; that \$2.00 of this amount was given to Bates and the balance retained in the files of the Denver Police Department. Will testify that on May 15, 1933 she married Bates, who was using the name of George L. Davis; that in August, 1933 they were living at 1275 Pearl Street, Denver, Colo., with her son, Edward Feldman; that on a Sunday (August 13, 1933) a man called at their address and stated that he had just been released from jail at Denver and had a message for her that this man then gave her a message from Bates that instructed her to look in his handbag and give \$200.00 to thi man; that she and Edward then looked in the handbag and found the same was filled with currency; that she then gave this man \$200.00 and later during the day she and Ed left Denver and proceeded to Laramie, Wyoming, thence to Cheyenn Wyoming, where they remained for a week; that after arrivin in Cheyenne she and Ed placed the money in two thermos jugs and buried them at a point approximately ten miles from Laramie; that several days after their arrival in Cheyenne and after burying the money, Edward made a trip to Denver, Colo. and upon his return advised her that Laska desired to see them; that it was agreed that Edward would go to see hi and thereafter made several trips to Denver for this purpos that upon his return from one of these trips he told her th Laska had asked for \$10,000.00 to meet expenses and attorne fees, etc. for Bates; that she and Ed then took some money from the thermos jugs and she gave most of it to Ed, who the left for Denver; that later Ed returned and said he had

delivered the money to Laska; that she and Ed remained in Obeyenne for a short time thereafter and then proceeded to Chicago, where she and Ed resided for a short time and then they proceeded to Portland, Oregon where they resided for approximately one month; that they then returned to Chicago by way of Denver; that while in Denver they called on Laska is home and at this time she transferred the title to the Buick Coupe that Bates had given her; that this transfer was made before a woman notary public who called at the Laska residence in answer to a telephone call made by Laska in which he told the notary that "a lame man is at my home who can not walk"; that after this visit she and Ed returned to Chicago, where they remained until about the month of January, 1934; that she and Ed then returned to Oregon and later she, together with Alvin Scott, drove to the point near Laramie, Wyoming, where they obtained the buried money and took it back to Oregon where they again buried it, in one thermos jug, on the vacant ranch of her father near Green Mountain, Oregon; that upon her apprehension by officers she disclosed to them, one of whom was Special Agent C. Spears of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the place where this money was buried and that these officers then recovered the money in her presence; that she also turned some of the money over to Alvii H. Scott, who buried it on the same farm.

Mrs. Feldman will also testify that on one occasion while they were residing in Cheyenne, Wyoming, Edward left for an appointment with Laska at Oklahoma City and that he took a sum of money with him which she believes was \$2,000.00 or more She will also identify as the person who delivered the message to her in Denver.

Mathers to whom, Laska stated, it was necessary that he pay \$1,000.00; that upon instructions of Laska he then placed \$1,000.00 under a small bath rug in the bathroom and that subsequently Mathers and Laska went into the bathroom; that when they came out of the bathroom Mathers stated, "It's O.K." and then left the room, after which he paid to Laska the remaining \$1,000.00, all of which was part of the ransom money.




The circumstances concerning the means by which possession of this automobile was obtained from Charles Caplan, as contained in report of Special Agent Chicago, Illinois, January 5, 1934, were outlined to both of the above mentioned Assistant United States Attorneys and after considering same, Assistant United States Attorney A. W. Bosworth advised that in his opinion the Government had no right to obtain title to this automobile and made the following

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notation, which is being retained in the Chicago Bureau files:

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No basis for forfeiting cer to the government. Car was not abandoned & the owner is known & claims title thereto. I have been unable to find any statute which authorizes the forfeiting of a car to the government in this type of case.

Assistant United States Attorney Bosworth further stated that the confiscation of automobiles heretofore made was upon the theory that such automobiles had been abandoned and no one claimed title thereto, and that a reasonable search failed to reveal anyone claiming title, but such, however, are not the facts in this case.

Manion to make application for a pauper's oath in connection with a \$10,000. fine assessed against him for aiding a Federal prisoner to escape.

A check of the United States Internal Revenue records at Dallas, Texas, for the years 1932 and 1933 failed to disclose any record of Mr. Manion having filed any return for those years.

Also a thorough check was made of the records of the Retail Credit Company, Dallas, Texas, but neither Mr. nor Mrs. Manion appeared to have any credit rating with that company.

The writer was advised at the Merchant's Retail Company located at 2.12 1/2 Jackson Street, Dallas, that Mrs. Manion has no rating there, but their card on Mr. Manion showed him to be the owner hf a piece of property valued at \$500.00, location unknown; also that some time during March of 1934 Mr. Manion had received from some Insurance Company unknown to the Merchant Retail Association about \$400.00; and that Mr. Manion was at present receiving \$25000 pension from the

these had to be cashed; that he at present has one policy of \$3000.00 with the Woodmen of the World, straight life, which she, Mrs. Manion, is keeping up payments on. Mrs. Manion stated that she too had a small policy but had to drop it over a year ago, being unable to meet the premiums due.

Mrs. Manion further advised that Mr. Manion did not have a bank account at any place, but that she kept a small one at the National Bank of Commerce, Dallas, Texas, and that about the only transactions she has with that bank is when she deposits the \$37.50 pension check, above referred to, or draws on such deposits.

Mr. and Mrs. Manion have one son, age 18 years, and a daughter, age 21 years. The son, is at present working at one of the Goodluck Filling Stations located in Oak Cliff, Dallas, Texas, and makes \$10.50 per week. The daughter takes subscriptions for magazines working on a commission basis, which nets her approximately from one to five dollars weekly; one week, however, making as much as ten dollars and then another week earning only fifteen cents.

The above information concerning the financial status of Mr. Manion and his family was all possible to be secured from the sources named herein. Mrs. Manion was positive that Mr. Manion had no property or money other than that set out above, and added that her family is at present entirely dependent on the above mentioned pension and the earnings of her son and daughter.

Mr. Brantley called from Oklahoma City to advise that they have been revising files for the trial of Ben Laska on Monday and case across smootebook, which was obtained in the office of Laska during the search last December and found therein a page on which had been written some information in pencil but had been erased and which may be of assistance in the above trial. He wanted to know if there is some way by which the Laboratory could bring the information out. I told him the Bureau had some success in bringing out erased writing but it depends on the paper and material used, also the age of the writing and a great many things. I suggested he send the notebook air mail, special delivery and if necessary a code telegram will be sent him as to the results. Mr. Brantley suggested that an Agent bring the book to Washington, if it was possible for the Laboratory to work on it, because it was needed luesday and he thought it important enough to do this. I told him this would be all right.

Mr. Brantley further advised that he had about \$5100 and two automobiles which he got from three bank robbers, and another individual and which he would like to get rid of. The United States Attorney does not want to take over some of the money which was received from the Fort Smith, Ark. district. I suggested that the United States Attorney be given the part which belongs to him to keep in the possession of the Clerk of the Court and send the part which belongs to the Fort Smith district to SAC Shivers registered mail to be given to the United States Attorney in that district. The two automobiles were taken from two of the robbers and were not stolen cars. I suggested that he asks the robbers what they desired done with the cars.

At the time of the arrest of Ben B Laska in Denver, Colorado, his office was searched and certain documents and memoranda were taken and forwarded to this office.

In a further examination of these exhibits, in order to determine just which would be used in evidence in the case, a thorough examination was made of the black "G. E. "hotebook, which contained certain entries relative to Laska's connection with Albert L. Bates. A further examination this morning developed on a page of this notebook under date of September 11, 1933, a penciled memorandum had been erased. Such examination as is possible to make here brings out the word "contacted" and a name following this word thought to be "Axel". The words "bring with," are also discernible.

CHELO

According to the statement of Edward Feldman, he was instructed by Laska to assume the alias "Axel Johnson". Feldman further stated that he contacted Laska in Denver, Colorado on September 11, 1933 and at that time Laska instructed him to bring \$2,000.00 to Oklahoma City and that \$1,000.00 of this money was tobe paid to someone associated with Laska in the case. The records here disclose that Feldman did arrive in Oklahoma City on September 16, 1933 and according to his statement he contacted Laska in the Biltmore Hotel on September 17, 1933 with the \$2,000.00 of the ransom money and was instructed by Laska to place same under a rug in the bathroom of Laska's room at the Hotel. The witness further states that it was at that time that he saw Attorney James Mathers, a defendant in this case, in the room of Laska.

It is believed that the notation erased from this book recorded the contact of Laska with "Axel" and recorded the instructions given him relative to bringing the \$2,000.99 to Oklahoma City. If our deductions are correct this will be a vital bit of evidence in this case. In accordance with telephonic conversation between Special Agent in Charge Brantley and Mr. Tamm today, it is desired that a laboratory examination be made in an effort to develop what was written on the page bearing the erasure. An Agent from this office is leaving by plane today for Washington with this book. -- If the writing is brought out and it has a bearing on the contact between Feldman and Laska and Feldman's trip to Oklahoma City, the employee in the laboratory who develops the writing will have to return to Oklahoma with the Agent who brings the book back, in order to testify to his findings. The trial starts Monday morning and as there are other entries in the book that will be evidence in this case it is absolutely essential that the book be back in Oklahoma City not later than Tuesday, June 11, 1935.

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


