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Centennial Exposition, held 1937 on Council Bluffs, Iowa, Park Board property called Dodge Park Fairgrounds, immediately across Missouri River from Omaha, Nebr., was financial failure and creditors to amount of approximately \$12,000.00 were largely Council Bluffs business men. Centennial Exposition Creditors btained five-year lease on part of Dodge Park Fairgrounds from Council Bluffs, Iowa, Park Board in 5/41 and assigned lease to LANSKY and associates, dba Dodge Park Kennel Club in 5/41. Terms were \$1000.00 per week for minimum of five weeks each season. Arrangements made so Creditors of Centennial Exposition were paid off from rental paid to Park LANSKY and WILLIAM SYMS (said to be deceased) built track and facilities on this property spring of 1941, cost estimated \$50,000,00 to \$100,000.00, and operated dog-race track summers of 1941, 1942, and 1943; did not reopen thereafter. Iowa had antigambling law and there had been no dog-race track in Council Bluffs before that time. Council Bluffs attorney, who was County Aptorney in 1941, states he questioned whether track would violated state law and checked with Attorney General of Iowa, who said it was all right; states if any payoff, would have been at state level; said Attorney General, above, deceased.

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SYNOPSIS CONT:

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Persons interviewed say LANSKY and associates maintained excellent public relations, were lavish spenders, hired all local people except key employees, and ran a "clean track." LANSKY resided Council Bluffs while operating track. No record for LANSKY at PDs and SOs, Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Omaha, Nebraska. IN VIEW OF SUBJECT'S BACKGROUND AND FORMER ARREST FOR HOMICIDE, HE SHOULD BE CONSIDERED DANGEROUS.

DETAILS:

The following information concerning MEYER LANSKY and the Dodge Park Kennel Club, a dog-racing track operated in Council Bluffs, Iowa, during the summers of 1941, 1942, and 1943, was obtained from the morgue of the Omaha World Herald newspaper by SA on March 10, 1958, and April 7, 1958:

July 23, 1941, Issue:

Dog races started July 11, 1941. "An 'option' system has been operated at the track. Spectators at the races under this plan can purchase an 'interest' in a dog. If the dog wins, the spectator turns his interest back at a profit since the dog's value has increased. If the dog loses, the spectator's interest' is forfeited because the dog is worthless."

The article mentions that the race track lease is producing money to pay off debts of the ill-fated Centennial Exposition of the late 1930's.

August 4, 1941:

1 Lines

A man by the name of JOE W. TRUE, Avoca, Iowa, filed a suit to halt; the dog races.



August 5, 1941:

EDWARD WHITE, Carroll, Iowa, Attorney for JOE TRUE, asked for Grand Jury investigation, stating "Everybody knows the option is just a subterfuge." WHITE called it a "flagrant violation of the law," and said law enforcement officers in the county did not have the courage to enforce the law.

September 24, 1941:

A spokesman for the Centennial Exposition Creditors said \$12,000.00 was owed to the Creditors and they received \$8,000.00 during the first racing season in 1941. The article said the City Park Board leased the buildings and grounds to the Centennial Exposition Creditors Association, which in turn assigned the lease to the Kennel Club. The Park Board assigned a \$12,000.00 interest in the lease to the Creditors Association.

October 14, 1941:

The track ppened July 11, 1941, and ran fifty-six nights. The track was located at the old Centennial Grounds in Dodge Park, Council Bluffs, Iowa, and the operators paid \$1,000.00 per week rental, of which \$8,000.00 was paid to Creditors (62 Council Bluffs and Omaha business firms and individuals) who held unpaid bills for the financially unsuccessful Centennial Exposition in 1937. The track has a five-year lease with a five-year renewal option.

October 28, 1941:

MEYER LANSKY and WILLIAM SYMS built a permanent track estimated to cost \$50,000.00. The suit by JOE TRUE, Avoca, Iowa, was dropped and TRUE was quoted as saying, "I am not convinced the enterprise (dog racing) is a gambling institution nor a racket."

October 29, 1941:

JOE TRUE dropped the suit which had asked a restraining order against the races. The defendants in the suit were the operators of the track (LANSKY and SYMS), the City of Council Bluffs and the Park Commission. TRUE's former attorney said TRUE could not dismiss the suit and that they would sekk to prove the "option" system was a "gambling nuisance."

November 8, 1941:

JOE TRUE dropped out as plaintiff in the suit to stop the dog races, but a district judge directed County Attorney ROY SMITH to prosecute the action to judgment. SMITH said he was ready to bring the case to the Grand Jury.

January 17, 1942:

County Attorney ROY SMITH said he would seek a court order at the March term of District Court on the request for an injunction filed by JOE W. TRUE. SMITH said, "It will be up to the court to decide whether or not the operations at the track constitute a parimutuel betting (prohibited by state law) or are option transactions."

March 12, 1942:

The Grand Jury failed to take action in January, 1942. County Attorney SMITH said he would wait until June, 1942, District Court Term to ask a court order on the injunction to halt the races.

December 31, 1942:

County Attorney ROY SMITH filed a motion for dismissal of the action regarding the dog-race track, saying the Grand Jury had looked into it. The article states the Grand Jury failed to hand in any finding.

SMITH was to leave office January 1, 1943.

April 6, 1944:

An article stated the Centennial Exposition Creditors had received all of their money.

April 20, 1946:

Dodge Park Kennel Club operated in 1941, 1942 and 1943, and was closed in 1944 and 1945.

June 27, 1946:

State authorities warned operation of dog races at Council Bluffs would not be permitted and that any such operation would result in prosecution under the State Anti-Gambling Statute. The article noted the track had operated three seasons under the theory that options were not gambling. WILLIAM SYMS, Co-operator of the track, said in view of this, he would discontinue operating the track and leave.

April 9, 1948:

Plans were made to revive dog racing in Council Bluffs. WILLIAM SYMS and MEYER LANSKY, former co-owners of the Dodge Park Kennel Club, had been contacted regarding plans for a new dog track south of the limits of Council Bluffs. This was admitted by an officer of the Grenville M. Dodge Post #737 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The article said the track would face two obstacles: The State Anti-Gambling ruling which closed the track in June, 1946. The track had operated three seasons by selling options on the Greyhounds. contended selling and redeeming the option slips was not gambling. The question was brought to a District Court suit, but the case was never tried. 2. The County's own current gambling crackdown. The article said the VFW was scheduled to receive the gate receipts of the track before the crackdown in 1946. The Kennel Club was also to have paid the city a weekly rental of \$1,200.00.

The morgue of the Council Bluffs Nonpareil newspaper was examined by SA on March 20, 1958, and the following information concerning MEY NSKY and the Dodge Park Kennel Club was obtained:

The July 6, 1941, issue that photographs of the grandstand, track and tennels at the Dodge Park Track. PAUL HARTWELL was presiding judge and FRANK HARTWELL was the scale clerk.

May 29, 1943:

The third season of Greyhound racing was to begin. WILLIAM SYMS was listed as general manager.

The following interviews were conducted by SAS by curless otherwise stated:

On March 11, 1958, advised as follows:

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someone told him a granustand type building was being built on City Park land just north of the approach to the bridge across the Missouri River from Council Bluffs, Iowa, to Omaha, Nebraska. He said he had not noticed it and did not know what it was for. Shortly thereafter, Chief of Police PAT BANGS, now deceased, called him in and told him a grandstand and other facilities were being erected on city property as described above, and that dog races would be run there.

MEYER LANSKY and WILLIAM SYMS, both from Hollywood, Florida, where they were running a dog track, were to be the builders and operators of the track in Council Bluffs.

The track was built by LANSKY and SYMS and was operated by them for three seasons, the summer seasons of 1941, 1942 and 1943.

the rates did not operate after 1943, but that in the spring 1946, LANSKY and SYMS began to paint and repair the blace for reopening. Some opposition arose, particularly in the press, and the dog track did not reopen. Said he heard that SYMS died a couple of years ago in Florida.

LANSKY and SYMS lived at the Chieftain Hotel in Council Bluffs while operating the track.

the Dodge Park Kennel Club was operating in the early 1930's in Council Bluffs.

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He recalled the City Council and Park Board had some discussions and disagreements because the Council wanted some of the money being paid by the Kennel Club. He believed the track did not reopen after running for three years because of a "change of administration."

said the track was well run and there was no trouble in connection with it. He believed LANSKY and SYMS both lived at the Chieftain Hotel in Council Bluffs. (It is noted the Chieftain Hotel has no records for that period.)

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furnished the following information on March 17, 1958:

The proposition concerning the operation of the dog-race track on Park Board property was brought up at a Park Board and City Council meeting about 1941 and was approved.

well operated and that no trouble was experienced whatsoever.

knew LANSKY and SYMS and said SYMS is deceased.

He said they had come to Council Bluffs to work at the track from Hollywood, Florida, where he understood they had worked at dog-race tracks. He believed they had returned to Hollywood, Florida, when the track in Council Bluffs ceased operation.

furnished the following information on March 20, 1958:

said arrangements had been made to operate a dog track on the same property and part of the money received was to go to the Creditors of the Centennial Exposition, who were leading Council Bluffs citizens.

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asked LANSKY why he would start his operation in a "cow town" like Council Bluffs. LANSKY replied that it was not to make money in Council Bluffs, but rather to provide a track for his bookies on the east coast to take bets on FLANSKY explained his Florida track was closed during the summer and by having a Council Bluffs track, it would be in the ration almost year round.

recalled the track paid \$1,000.00 a week to the City and the first \$12,000.00 was to go to the Creditors of the Centennial Exposition.

recalled LANSKY and SYMS stayed at the Chieftain Hotel in Council Bluffs with a couple of "broads" from New York witil they moved to the home of a Dr. STERNHILL in Council Bluffs. He said LANSKY and SYMS spent comey lavishly and tried to get along with everyone, obviously to keep anybody from complaining.

LANSKY and SYMS were free spenders and they had two women with them. They moved from the Chieftain to the home of Dr. ISAAC STERNHILL, who was in the service for a time. The home was located at 729 Forest Drive, Council Bluffs.

heard about the vacant home and referred them to the STERNHILLS. LANSKY and SYMS, the two women, SYMS fourteen-year-old son and a colored maid lived at the STERNHILL an extra \$100.00 when they left.

STERNHILL an extra \$100.00 when they left.

believed they stayed in this house for one summer while operating the dog track.

Council Bluffs, Iowa, on April 7, 1958, made available the official minutes of the Board of Park Commissioners, Council Bluffs, Iowa, The minutes for May 17, 1941, showed members of the Park Board as FRANK PETERSON, President; HENRY MEYER, Vice President; and WALTER GUGLER, Secretary. The minutes showed a lease agreement with the Centennial Exposition Creditors of Council Bluffs for part of the Dodge Park Fairgrounds for five years, starting June 1, 1941, weekly rental of \$1,000.00 for a minimum period of five weeks between June 1 and October 31 of each year, for purposes of staging public exhibitions, shows and contests.

The minutes for May 29, 1941, showed the lease above was assigned from the Centennial Exposition Creditors of Council Bluffs to the Dodge Park Kennel Club.

recalled MEYER LANSKY and said had worked at the track part of the time. He said LANSKY and SYMS were very good tippers and he thought they lived at the Chieftain Hotel in Council Bluffs most of the time and possibly at the Blackstone Hotel in Omaha, Nebraska.

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the Creditors of the Centennial Exposition and they were to get \$12,000.00 from the operators of the Dodge Park Kennel Club. He said they received this amount during the three years that the dog track was operated.

the Iowa Official Register for 1941

The Register also showed Attorney General FRED D. EVERETT had died on June 17, 1940, and that JOHN M. RANKIN had been appointed Attorney General in his place. RANKIN was then elected as Attorney General in November, 1940, for a two-year term said RANKIN is deceased.

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furnished the following information on April 7,

A man named WILLIAM LONG came in early 1941 and asked draw up a lease between the Dodge Park Kennel Club and the City of Council Bluffs, and also to file the

trade name Dodge Park Kennel Club

He thought a man by the name of HUGH FINERTY, deceased, who was active in politics in Iowa at that time, had referred LONG (It is noted FINERTY had previously been Mayor of Council Bluffs; also, GEORGE SPARKS, who was Mayor in 1941, is deceased.)

LANSKY and SYMS and left town after the races started. The dog track had very good public relations.

They hired many local people, bought Iowa licenses for their cars and in general ran a "clean track stated JOHN RANKIN was Attorney General in 1941. He had previously liberated Judge in Keokuk, Iowa, and is now deceased.

Records of the Pottawattamie County Recorder, Council Bluffs, Iowa, examined by SA on April 7, 1958, showed the trade name Dodge Park Kennel Club was registered on May 19, 1941. The owners were WILLIAM SYMS, MEYER LANSKY, and WILLIAM LONG, Agent, address 42nd Street and Broadway (Dodge Park Fairgrounds). LONG's address was the Chieftain Hotel, Council Bluffs, Iowa; LANSKY's was New York City; and WILLIAM SYMS' was 980 Park Avenue, Elizabeth, New Jersey. The signature of LONG appeared on the record and DE VERE WATSON was the Notary. It was filed May 20, 1941.

The same records showed the trade name was registered on June 16, 1941, to delete the name WILLIAM LONG and to show MEYER LANSKY, 950 Sherman Avenue, Elizabeth, New Jersey, and WILLIAM J. SYMS as the operators. It was signed by LANSKY and SYMS and notarized by DE VERE WATSON.

As indicated in the interviews above, LANSKY and SYMS lived at the Chieftain Hotel, Council Bluffs, Iowa, and in a private home which they had rented there.

b7C advised SA on March 10, 1958, he had no records for the early 1940's and was not at the hotel then.

The following individuals were contacted for information concerning the possible residency in early 1940 with negative results:

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All of these persons worked and the early 1940's. They were contacted on March 10, 1958.

advised he did not know of MEYER LANSKY or WILLIAM SYMS as having lived in early 1940!s. He said they have no records of guests for that period.

OM 92-112 March 20, 1958, advised SA there was no criminal record in the files of his office for the subject under his name or aliases. Associated Retail Credit Bureau, on March 20, 1958, advised SA there was no record in the files of her office for the subject. On April 8, 1958, Omaha Police Department, and Douglas County Sheriff's Office, both Omaha, Nebraska, advised SA they had no record regarding LANSKY or WILLIAM SYMS

Unless requested by the office of origin, no further investigation is being conducted at Council Bluffs, Iowa, and none will be conducted at Des Moines, Iowa.

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


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


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Letter to the Director



The Eavana daily newspapers of February 22, 1958, published the fact that the Cuban Government by order of President Fulgencic Batista had officially prohibited the return to Cuba of MEYER LANSKY effective February 21, 1958. Inquiry by these newspapers of Cuban Minister of the Interior, Santiago Rey, resulted in confirmation of this order.


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DETAILS: The title is marked Changed to add the name of MEYER SUCHOWLANSKY, as reflected in records of the United States District Court, Eastern District of New York.



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A. PERSONAL HISTORY AND BACKGROUND

1. Birth and Citizenship

The records of the United States District Court,

Eastern District of New York, were reviewed by SA
on February 28, 1958, and reflected the following
information:

Docket or Petition #74174 reflects Certificate of Arrival #209559 and indicates that MEYER SUCHOWLANSKY arrived on the KURSK, New York, New York, on April 4, 1911. His Declaration of Intention #100973 was filed on August 9, 1921, and reflects that MEYER LANSKY, age 19, occupation machinist, born July 4, 1902 at Grodna, Russia, was then residing at 6 Columbia Street, New York City.

Subject's Petition for Naturalization was filed on April 14, 1927, while subject resided at 125 South 3rd Street, Brooklyn, New York. His witnesses were JACOB KLEIN, Post Office clerk, of 1063 Eastern Parkway, Brooklyn, and IRVING SANDLER, occupation printer, of 359 South 2nd Street, Brooklyn. Doth indicated they had known the subject since January 1, 1922, and knew him to be married.

Subject took his oath of allegiance on September 27, 1928, Certificate of Naturalization #2517814, issued on September 27, 1928.

The record at the court failed to indicate any change of name on the subject's part during his naturalization proceedings.

in Charge of the Court Records, advised that it was common practice during the 1920's for petitioners to simply change their names when they filed their petition for naturalization. It was not required of them to go to court to change their name, and this in no way would effect the subject's citizenship status.



On February 26, 1958, Assistant United States Attorney MORTON S. ROBSON, Southern District of New York, advised that there was no change in LANSKY'S denaturalization case, and that the government is still waiting for the United States Supreme Court decision in another case.


It is noted that the school records for the subject, set forth in detail later in this report, reflect his birth date as August 28, 1902.

The New York "Journal American" 7th Sports Edition, issue of February 21, 1958, on page 1, carried an article captioned "GAMBLER FACES OUSTER TO POLAND." The article reflected that the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) was preparing deportation proceedings against the subject. It also stated that the Immigration officers had compiled a file on LANSKY'S background, gambling activities, and association with leading racketeers.

2. Education

On March 18, 1958, the records of PS 165 at 76 Lott Avenue, Brooklyn, of former students, were checked and reflected that a MEYER LANSKY, born on August 28, 1902, whose father was MAX, entered PS 165 on March 1, 1912, and attended until June 30, 1914, when he was transferred to PS 34, Manhattan. The record reflects that his grades were all A's, with the exception of 2 B's. His residences were reflected as 545 Grand Street (appeared to be address in 1914), 894 Rockaway, and 33 Chester Street (appeared to be address prior to 1912).

The record reflected his prior attendance at PS 84 in Brooklyn from April 28, 1911 to January 31, 1912. His record showed considerable absenteeism and very little tardiness. This was the only record of a MEYER LANSKY. The only other record of a "LANSKY" attending the school was for a JACOB LANSKY, born February 17, 1904, whose father was MAX, and resided at the same addresses listed above for MEYER LANSKY.





On March 11, 1958, it was determined from the Board of Education that PS 84 was discontinued and that their records are now kept at PS 284 located at Osborn and Watkins Streets near Sutter Avenue, Brooklyn.

On March 18, 1958, PS 284, 220 Watkins, Brooklyn, advised that the old records of PS 84 were just recently moved to his school and are in an unorganized manner in cardboard boxes and not available. He stated that they would be available for review in about a month.

On March 10, 1958, it was determined at the Board of Education that PS 34 was formerly located at Broome and Sheriff Streets, New York City, and was closed in 1928. These records are now kept at PS 4 at 203 Rivington Street, New York City.

On March 11, 1958, the records of PS 34 located at PS 4, 203 Rivington Street, New York City, were reviewed and reflected that only one MEYER LANSKY attended PS 34 and he was born on August 28, 1902, and his father was named MAX. He entered PS 34 on November 23, 1914, attending this school until 1917 when he graduated. While here he attended the 6th, 7th and 8th grades.

His residences were reflected as 894 Rockaway, 546 Grand 3rd floor, and 552 Grand 4th floor.

His records reflect that in the first 8 grades he received all A's and B's in his school work. His records reflect that he previously attended PS 165 and prior to that PS 84 in Brooklyn, having entered the first grade on April 23, 1911.

3. Previous Employment

It had previously been reported that the subject in the early 1940's was employed by Krieg, Spector and Citron Company, Hoboken, New Jersey.

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Stated he was familiar with the Krieg, Spector and Citron Company on Monroe Street. advised this company dealt in produce and fruits and was always regarded as a clean company. He stated that it was never known, to his knowledge, as the Lansky Food Corporation. Due to rapid expansion, it moved from Hoboken to Jersey City, New Jersey, around 1945. They were considered a hard working, aggressive and hustling outfit that expanded very fast.

indicated that he had no knowledge of anyone muscling in on the business or forcing them to pay protection money to operate. He stated that if such were true it would be likely that he would know about it

advised there was no known connection between MEYER LANSKY and that company.

advised the company was first known as the Krieg and Spector Company and then MOSES CITRON joined the company as a partner.

on March 10, 1958, that the Krieg, Spector and Citron Company had been a fruit and produce company on Monroe Street, in Hoboken, until around January, 1944, when it expanded to such an extent that larger quarters were necessary. Partners in the company were BENNY KRIEG, MO SPECTOR and MO CITRON. The company was regarded as a hard working, aggressive group of pushers and in population, was not being muscled in on. Stated if there were any strong-arm tactics or muscling, he would likely have known of it.

advised that he never knew the company as the Lansky Food Corporation and there was no known connection, to knowledge, with MEYER LANSKY.



When the company moved from Hoboken, it was recollection it changed its name to the Universal Food Corporation.

The records of incorporation for Hudson County, New Jersey, as checked by SAS on March 11, 1958, failed to reflect subject's name as an incorporating officer of the following organizations: Krieg and Spector, which was incorporated on February 19, 1934; Universal Food Market, which was incorporated on October 1, 1934; Krieg, Spector and Citron Realty Company, which was incorporated on May 5, 1938.

The company was originally known as Krieg and Spector, then Krieg, Spector and Citron and now is the Universal Food Market, Incorporated.

advised for a period of several months, around 1941, subject leased a store at 595 Broad Street, Newark, New Jersey, but was unsuccessful in the operation of the store; whereupon, the month to month tenancy was terminated.

named ANNA, married subject and the marriage later ended in divorce. Advised two boys and one girl resulted from the marriage, but he was unable to furnish any current information concerning ANNA LANSKY, nee CITRON, and her children.

should have knowledge

of ANNA LANSKY, nee CITRON, and her children.

advised his association with subject was very limited and except for the short time lease previously mentioned, subject was never an officer or invested any money in the company.








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It was previously reported that subject's current wife, THELMA TEDDY SCHWARTZ was to have married the subject in June, 1949, and prior to her marriage was employed as a manicurist at the Embassy Hotel.

the Hotel Embassy, 154 West 70th Street, New York City, advised that there is no barber shop located in this hotel, and to her knowledge, there has never been any manicurist employed in the hotel or a barber shop or beauty salon adjacent to it for many years.

that she knows of no THELMA TEDDY SCHWARTZ.

the Hotel Embassy.

She suggested that it was possible that the person may have been employed at the Hotel Ambassador located on Park Avenue near 50th Street, and at times is confused with

On March 7, 1958, SA checked the marriage records of New York City for a license of the subject and THELMA TEDDY SCHWARTZ for June, 1949. He reported he was unable to locate any such record.

On March 17, 1958, SA checked the marriage license records for Brooklyn for their marriage in June, 1949, with negative results.

A. PERSONAL HISTORY AND BACKGROUND

1. Birth and Citizenship

MEYER LANSKY was born on July 4, 1902, at Grodno, Poland, according to the files of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and arrived in the United States on April 4, 1911. He was naturalized on September 27, 1928, in the Eastern District of New York, and is presently a United States citizen although the United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York is still attempting to deport him.

It is noted that the school records for the subject, set forth in detail later in this report, reflect his birth date as August 28, 1902.

The New York "Journal American" 7th Sports Edition, issue of February 21, 1958, on page 1, carried an article captioned, "Gambler Faces Ouster to Poland." The article reflected that the Immigration and Naturalization Service was preparing deportation proceedings against the subject. It also stated that the Immigration officers had compiled a file on LANSKY's background, gambling activities, and association with leading racketeers.

2. Education

The subject was examined under oath on December 10, 1953, in the United States Attorney's Office, Southern District of New York, New York City, by Assistant United States Atborney (AUSA) ROBERT W. SWEET, in the presence of MOSES POLAKOFF, Attorney for the subject. Hereafter in this report, information attributed to this examination, will be referred to as the examination by AUSA SWEET in 1953.

In the above examination, the subject stated that he graduated from Public School 34 in the lower East side of Manhattan in 1916 or 1917. He attended this school under the name of MEYER LANSKY.



On March 18, 1958, the records of Public School 165 at 76 Lott Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, of former students, were checked and reflected that a MEYER LANSKY, born on August 28, 1902, whose father was MAX, entered PS 165 on March 1, 1912, and attended until June 30, 1914, when he was transferred to PS 34, Manhattan. The record reflects that his grades were all A's with the exception of 2 b's.

On March 11, 1958, the records of PS 34 located at PS 4, 203 Rivington Street, New York City, were reviewed and reflected that only one MEYER LANSKY attended PS 34 and he was born on August 28, 1902, and his father was named MAX. He entered PS 34 on November 23, 1914, attending this school until 1917 when he graduated. While here he attended the 6th, 7th and 8th grades.
