





## ASSOCIATES

On 1/3/73, Mr. RAY S. CLINE, Director, Bureau of Intelligence and Research, Department of State advised SA JOSEPH W. SPEICHER that he had first known RICHARD M. HELMS casually as a co-worker in the Office of Strategic Services during 1943 and 1944. From 1950 to 1969 they worked together at the Central Intelligence Agency and from 1962 to 1965 they were the two senior operating officers of CIA. HELMS supervised CLINE directly for a period of about one year from 1965-66. CLINE has continued to see the appointee frequently on a professional basis since 1969 when CLINE left CIA and they have occasional social contacts.

CLINE stated that he has no question concerning the appointee's loyalty to the United States, commenting that "If there is any question here, we all have a problem in the United States." He indicated that appointee's character, habits, morals and integrity are of the highest type, to the best of his knowledge, and he has never known HEIMS to drink to excess nor to conduct himself in an improper or immoral manner. CLINE mentioned that the appointee is quiet, reserved and keeps his opinions to himself. He remarked that appointee's personal and professional reputation is very good and his associations are above reproach.

CLINE reported that HELMS was divorced from his first wife several years ago and married a woman who had four children by a previous marriage. He emphasized that he has no personal knowledge of the details of appointee's divorce and remarriage. CLINE commented that both appointee's first wife and his present wife are very charming ladies.

CLINE recommended the appointee for a position of trust and confidence with the United States Government, adding that he is a very intelligent, security-conscious, discreet and reliable individual and "one of the most competent men in the intelligence community". He mentioned that he and HELMS have had occasional disagreements regarding official matters over the years, but they were concerning matters over which reasonable men could differ and CLINE added that "I'm not at all sure that I was always right".



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## RICHARD NC GARRAH HELMS

THE INVESTIGATION OF MR. HELMS COVERED INQUIRIES AS TO HIS CHARACTER, LOYALTY, ABILITY, AND GENERAL STANDING, BUT NO INQUIRIES WERE MADE AS TO THE SOURCES OF HIS INCOME.

This summary memorandum covers the period since March, 1953. Mr. Helms was born on March 39, 1913, in Saint Davids, Pennsylvania.

#### Employment

Since March of 1953, Mr. Helms has continued to be employed by the Central Intelligence Agency in various capacities including Administrative Officer and Department Head. On April 22, 1965, Mr. Helms was confirmed by the United States Senate as Deputy Director, Central Intelligence Agency. The United States Senate, on June 28, 1966, confirmed Mr. Helms as Director, Central Intelligence Agency. Mr. Helms continues to serve in the position of Director, Central Intelligence Agency, 8

#### Marital Status and Residence

, reside at 4701 Mr. Helms and Willard Avenue, Chevy Chase, Maryland, and maintain a summer residence at 1303 West Cedar Street, Lewes, Delaware. Mr. Helms was married to Julia Bretzman Helms on September 8, 1939, in b6 Indianapolis, Indiana. One child, Was b7C born of this marriage. The records, Superior Court for the District of Columbia, Family Division, Washington, D. C., indicate Julia B. Helms, plaintiff, filed for divorce on July 10, 1968, charging voluntary separation on the part of the defendant. The defendant was listed as Richard M. Helms, Chevy Chase, Maryland. On August 29, 1968, judgment was found for Julia B. Helms for absolute divorce on the grounds of voluntary separation for more than one year.

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#### Richard McGarrah Helms

Mrs. Julia Bretzman Helms, 3901 Fessenden Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C., advised that she was formerly b6 married to Mr. Helms and one child, b7C was born of this marriage. She met Mr. Helms in Indianapolis. Indiana, in about 1937, where he was employed by a local newspaper. She indicated that they were divorced in 1968, based on the grounds of voluntary separation for more than one year. She said that she and Mr. Helms have numerous friends in Iran, where she has been told Mr. Helms is to assume a position as a representative of this Government. She was of the opinion Mr. Helms might find the transition from Director of the Central Intelligence Agency to that of an ambassador to be a difficult one. She explained that Mr. Helms, at the Central Intelligence Agency, wields a lot of power over thousands of people, and as an ambassador would only be acting in a representative-type capacity and supervising a comparatively small number of employees.

Mrs. Helms stated that Mr. Helms will perform well as an ambassador. She described Mr. Helms as a complete patriot and as one who is extremely capable and very highly qualified in dealing with people. She described him as being a very strong person and one who is extremely intelligent. She knows him to be a convincing and persuasive person and would recommend him for appointment to a position of trust with the Federal Government.

#### Interviews

Howard J. Osborn, Director, Office of Security, Central Intelligence Agency, McLean, Virginia, advised that he has been acquainted with Mr. Helms since 1950. He said his acquaintance has been on a professional level. However, on several occasions he has attended social gatherings with Mr. Helms and his first wife, Julia. He indicated that he knew none of the personal details surrounding Mr. Helms's divorce from his first wife. However, to his knowledge, there has never been any question regarding the character, loyalty, or associates of Mr. Helms's family. He indicated that he has

met Mr. Helms's whom he considers to be a fine person and for whom he has the highest regard. According to Mr. Osborn, Richard Helms is one of the most outstanding public servants in the American Government today.

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Mr. Osborn stated that in all of the years he has known Mr. Helms he has always been impressed with Mr. Helms's devotion and loyalty to the United States Government, his integrity and unblemished reputation, and his contacts with the highest type of associates. He stated that he would strongly recommend Mr. Helms for any position of trust with the Government.

John A. McCone, Business Executive, Joshua Handy Corporation, Los Angeles, California, advised he has known Mr. Helms for the past fifteen years. He indicated that he was a former Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, and Mr. Helms served under his supervision in numerous capacities including that of Deputy Director. He described him as an excellent senior member of the agency for a great number of years, and as one who commands the respect of the agency, members of Congress, and the current and prior administrations.

Mr. McCone described Mr. Helms as being very temperate in his habits and very particular concerning his professional and business associations, and totally responsible concerning security matters. He has the highest respect for his intelligence and integrity and considers Mr. Helms to be an individual of unquestioned reputation and loyalty. He recommended Mr. Helms for continued employment in a position of trust in the Federal Government service.

Harry F. Byrd, Jr., United States Senator from the State of Virginia, interviewed in Washington, D. C., stated he has known Mr. Helms since the late 1940's as a personal friend. He described Mr. Helms's career with the Central Intelligence Agency as distinguished and marked by the highest level of public service. He has been in his company on numerous occasions at various social functions in Washington, D. C., and abroad. He also, as a member of the Senate Committee on Armed Services, observed Mr. Helms furnish

testimony before the committee concerning international political affairs. He considers Mr. Helms to be a forthright, intelligent, and thoughtful man. He has no question concerning his sense of patriotism and duty to his country. He stated that Mr. Helms's personal and professional integrity is above reproach and recommended him for any post to which President Richard M. Nixon would care to appoint him.

William Tyler, Director, Dumbarton Oaks Research Library, Washington, D. C., advised he has known Mr. Helms since 1950, when he, Mr. Tyler, was a foreign service officer at the United States Embassy in Paris. Mr. Tyler said that he has continued since that time a professional and social association with Mr. Helms. He described Mr. Helms as being one of a small handful of the most outstanding public servants in this country, and added that Mr. Helms has no political ambitions and maintains the highest of professional and personal standards. He described Mr. Helms as a dedicated person of strong character, and considers him to be eminently qualified for any office in any capacity that requires the utmost in ability and trust.

Mr. Tyler described Mr. Helms as being free of any character defect and as a person who never indulges to excess in any activity in which he participates. He recommended Mr. Helms for an appointment to any position of trust with the Federal Government.

Ray S. Cline, Director, Bureau of Intelligence and Research, Department of State, advised that he has known Mr. Helms since 1943, when they were both assigned to the Office of Strategic Services, and that they worked closely at the Central Intelligence Agency from 1950 until 1969. He indicated that he has no question concerning Mr. Helms's loyalty to the United States, commenting that "If there is any question here, we all have a problem in the United States." He indicated that his character, habits, morals, and integrity are beyond question, and he has never known Mr. Helms to conduct himmelf in an improper or immoral manner. He mentioned that Mr. Melms is quiet and reserved and keeps his opinions to himself. He indicated that his personal and professional reputation is very good and his associations are above reproach.

Mr. Cline reported that Mr. Helms was divorced <u>from his first wife several years ago and married</u>, about four years ago. He indicated that he has no personal knowledge of the details concerning Mr. Helms's b6 <u>divorce and remarriage</u>, but indicated that both Julia Helms and b7C are very charming ladies of unquestioned character. He recommended Mr. Helms for a position of trust and confidence with the United States Government, adding that he is a very intelligent, security conscious, discreet, and reliable individual, and one of the most competent men in the intelligence community.

J. Glenn Beall, Jr., United States Senator from the State of Maryland, interviewed in Washington, D. C., advised his knowledge of Mr. Helms is limited to his awareness of his good public reputation as an administrator and Director of the Central Intelligence Agency. He said he knows of no unfavorable information concerning Mr. Helms's character, associates, reputation, or loyalty. He stated that he would interpose no objection to Mr. Helms's selection for a high Federal post.

Charles McC. Mathias, Jr., United States Senator from the State of Maryland, interviewed in Washington, D. C., advised he has no personal knowledge of Mr. Helms and knows of no unfavorable information concerning his character, associates, reputation, or loyalty. Senator Mathias advised he interposes no objection to Mr. Helms's selection for a high Federal post.

Twenty-one additional persons, including social and professional associates and former Central Intelligence Agency employees, were interviewed. They furnished favorable comments concerning Mr. Helms's character, reputation, loyalty, morals, habits, ability, and associates. Persons well acquainted with Mr. Helms stated that he is a dependable, trustworthy, dedicated, and conscientious person. Those familiar with his work in the intelligence field stated he is very capable, has an extremely keen mind, and is doing an excellent job as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency. Mr. Helms was recommended for a position of trust and confidence. Persons acquainted with his close relatives stated to their knowledge they are reputable individuals whose loyalty to the United States is above question.

On January 5, 1973, JULIA BRETZMAN HELMS was contacted at her home, <u>3901 Fessenden Street</u>, Northwest, Washington, D.C., by SA Mrs. HELMS advised that, as far as she knew, her ex-husband presently resided at 4701 Willard Avenue, Chevy Chase, Maryland.

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Mrs. HELMS said that she did not see or talk to RICHARD MC GARRAH HELMS any more. She felt that the new appointment would be a difficult reassignment in view of the appointee's life at CIA. She felt, that he would fit in well in Iran due to the close friends, in high places. She advised that he knows the Shah personally along with other people in high places. She added, that she felt he would be qualified as far as knowing the people of Iran goes, and study of Iran undwine any a personal hobby. Monthuman She stated that the Government might wonder why the United States was sending a CIA man as Ambassador.

Mrs. HELMS advised that many of the friends her ex-husband had in Iran were also personal friends of hers. She said all of these people were aware of the situation between her and Mr. HELMS, and they would not admire him for it. Among her close friends is the mother of the

#### ASSOCIATES

On January 5, 1973, JAMES HUNT, 3200 S Street, N.W., was contacted at his home. HUNT advised that he had previously worked for the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), and had known the appointee since about 1946. HUNT said the appointee was a man of the highest integrity who handles himself well. HUNT advised the appointee would be ideal for the position of Ambassador to Iran and would make a good ambassador. He said the appointee knows both how to give and take orders. He said the appointee was a good team man, was good with people, and had marvelous relations with Congress. He advised he felt Congress had more trust in HEIMS than in, perhaps, many others. HUNT advised that the appointee was outstanding and that he had no question in his mind about the appointee in any way. HUNT said that the appointce's present wife would make a good ambassadors wife. HUNT said the appointee never over does it with alcohol and believed his social life never interfered with work. He said the appointee likes people, gets along well, and enjoys good company. HUNT reiterated that the appointee is a man of the highest caliber in every respect. HUNT advised he had never seen the slightest evidence that the appointee was a ladies man in any way, and said all his friends were completely surprised when he was divorced from his first wife in 1968. HUNT concluded that he knew of no reason why an ambassadorship would not work out for the appointee. He said the appointee was a delightful man, and he had no reservations about recommending him for any high position of trust and confidence.

On January 5, 1973, GORDON STEWART, 3111 Rolling Road, Chevy Chase, Maryland, was contacted at his home. STEWART advised that he was a retired General of the CIA. STEWART advised he first knew the appointee in OSS and that the appointee was his direct supervisor for eight years while he was in Germany after the war. He described the applicant as being very honest and a very capable man. He said the appointee works sefficiently and gets a great deal done . He said the appointee has a keen understanding of people, but said that he was sometimes slow to arrive at decisions concerning people. He said the appointee was a good judge of information, understands "sourcing", and has a good understanding of the process of analysis of information. He said the appointee "was smart as hell", a very solid character, who writes well and thinks clearly. He said the appointee was fair in his dealings with people and admired by all in the CIA.

On January 5, 1973, JOHN GARDNER, Director of Common Cause, 2100 M Street, N.W., was contacted at his office. GARDNER advised that he had known the appointee 29 years and said they were office mates at OSS. He said they are still friends and still see each other occassionally bathwapafessionalignment socially GARDNER advised he has the highest respect for the appointee. He said the appointee is the absolutely top caliber Namue public servant, and added that the appointee does his job the best way he knows how, through the ups and downs of politics. He said the appointee is a great credit to public service, a very honest man, and believed congressmen also found him to be so. He believed one would find a lot of respect for appointee on Capitol Hill. GARDNER said he had absolute confidence in the appointee's loyalty and advised that he knew of no habits or attributes that weaken the appointee as a person. He felt that appointee was quite a guy, not a woman chaser, and had extraordinary judgment and stability. He believed the appointee would do well as Ambassador to Iran and said he felt the appointee had the judgment necessary to do the job well.

BRUCE advised he has known the appointee for thirty years, since they were together at OSS, and advised that he has seen the appointee frequently from time to time since. # CHARLES BARTLETT AND Tehran a Logical Post for Helms

It was probably not a merry Christmas for the Americanologists in the Kremlin who were kept at their desks by their masters' demand to know why President Nixon is sending his intelligence chief. <u>Richard Helms</u>, to be ambassador to Iran.

Intelligence is the nerve center of the Soviet system and the White House move will inevitably put the comrades into a spin. Their conjectures on Helms' reassignment are certain to be laced with conspiratorial intrigues and suspicions that Nixon has dark plans for deeper meddling near the under-belly of the Soviet Union.

The Muscovites would intelligently brush aside most of White House press secretary Ron Ziegler's explanation that Helms had asked to retire as CIA director because he was near his agency's retirement age of 60. Helms is a man who keeps fit with daily stints on an indoor track at the CIA and he is lean, healthy and young - minded enough to qualify easily for an exemption to stay at his job.

The Soviet experts also would be correct in brushing aside published speculation that Helms fell out of favor or disappointed the President with the quality of his performance as the government's chief intelligence officer. He has not always told the admmistration what it wanted to hear but his record of discretion—in the men he sent abroad, in his intelligence assessments and in his archives with Congress — is widely juc<u>er to</u> have been remarkably solid.

Possibly his greatest feat has been to hold the confidence and credibility of Congress through a period in which the executive branch was faced with deep mistrust on foreign policy. It also was a time when the CIA's chief defenders on the Hill, domineering men like Sen. Richard Russell, D-Ga., and Rep. Mendel Rivers, D-S.C., were passing from the scene.

Actually the agency gained respect in a period when it easily might have fallen victim to the popular mood because Helms held tautly to his professional role. Once he persuaded skeptics that he was not a man who would play partisan games, he was able to head off those senators who were bent on shrinking the CIA's cloak so they could have a better look at what was going on.


Ironically, the events which led to Helms' replacement were launched many months ago by James Schlesinger, the Rand analyst who has agreed, reportedly with great reluctance, to take Helms' job. As the Budget Bureau specialist on defense, Schlæinger was asked to study how the government's intelligence needs could be accomplished more economically.


This is not a small problem for a pinched government. Intelligence costs run about \$3.5 billion a year and the upward pressures on that spending level grow more intense as inflation bries into

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the dollar. Schlesinger's study control intelligence would have to reach out beyond his agency to perform budget surgery in the overlapping areas of Pentagon intelligence.

Helms was handed this task with an unreassuring fanfare at the White House. He declined to move his office into the Budget Bureau and held as closely as he could to his old activities as an intelligence officer. This was rational prudence because an abrupt move to chop the Pentagon's intelligence budget would stir many enemies and perhaps shatter the working alliance he had forged on the Hill. Some believe he decided to postpone any strong moves until the elections were over.

But the President, pinched by fiscal pressures, came to an impatient conclusion that the job will have to be done by a non-career man who will play the bull in the china shop more cheerfully. He turned to Schlesinger who is tough, savvy and disposed to seek his future outside of government, perhaps as a university head. He is taking a role that promises to be as bruising as any in government.

Very well, the Russians will say, but why Iran? The fact is there are few significant nations to which an ex-CIA director, even with Helms' charm, could go as ambassador without stirring mass protests. Iran is one and the Shah, reportedly delighted to draw an envoy who is close to the President, will be certain to insure that Helms is well received.





Mr. FREDERICK C. COPELAND, Director of Admissions, Williams College, Williamstown, Massachusetts, and a classmate of the applicant, recalled the applicant as an outstanding member of the class of 1935. He described the applicant as a very popular student of excellent character and associates and one whose conduct and expressions never gave rise to any question about his loyalty to the United States.

Mr. WHITNEY S. STODDARD, Art Instructor and member of the class of 1935, Williams College, described the applicant as a highranking member of his class, a man of excellent associations, and one whose character, integrity and loyalty were on a high plane. He stated that the applicant was a man who had traveled widely and recalled that after his graduation he served as a correspondent for the United Press in Germany in 1936. Mr. STODDARD also advised that to his knowledge, the applicant's foreign travel had not induced him toward sympathy for any foreign system of Government.

Mr. NELSON S. BUSHNELL, Professor, Williams College, recalled the applicant as an outstanding student of excellent character. Mr. BUSHNELL had no reason to doubt the applicant's loyalty to the United States.

Both Mr. GEILFUSS and the applicant were classmates of one CARL MARZANI who was convicted in 1947 while an employee of the United States State Department on the charge of withholding his affiliation with the Communist Party. According to Mr. GEILFUSS, the applicant never associated particularly with MARZANI and never voiced acquiescence to MARZANI's ideas which, during the latter's college years were radical. The applicant was not at all sympathic to MARZANI at the time of his conviction. A letter was circularized to all graduates of Williams College in the Class of 1935 by one SWERZY, a lecturer at Harvard, petitioning clemency for MARZANI, and it is known to Mr: GEILFUSS that the applicant was not in accord with these views as expressed in this letter.

Mr. GEILFUSS continued by stating that the applicant is a man who could be trusted with any type of confidential mission or information. The financial background of the applicant's family is such that the applicant does not work for the Government out of necessity, but rather he likes public service and the type of work in which he is currently engaged and has decided to make it his career. Mr. GEILFUSS desires to give the applicant the highest type of recommendation possible.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

Mr. JOHN F. DINGWALL, former Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, 161 Devonshire Street, Boston, Massachusetts, stated that he graduated from Williams College with the class of 1937 and that he was acquainted with the applicant in college and recalls him to be very well thought of at the time and to be exceptionally active in college affairs and functions. Mr. DINGWALL stated the applicant's sister is married to a very close friend of his, one Dr. HAWN, who is known to Mr. DINGWALL as a high type gentleman. The following investigation was conducted by SA EBER PATTERSON in December 1942:

The Indianapolis Police Department advised on February 18, 1942, that NOBLE BRETZMAN who is a brother of JULIA BRETZMAN HELMS was a radical sympathizer of

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Germany and HITLER. At the start of the war, he made the statement that he hoped the Germans would blow England off the map and was in favor of HITLER taking over all of Europe, throwing England clear out of the water, and letting HITLER run Europe the way it should be run. BRETZMAN had a copy of "Mein Kampf" which he kept on the coffee table at his apartment and used this about the same as anyone else would use a Bible. He always referred to this book for proof of anything he was talking about.

The following investigation was conducted by SA CHARLES C. SPANN on December 17. 1942:

Mr. ANDREW HEPBURN, El Paso, Texas, a friend of BRETZMAN's advised on December 17, 1942, that NOBLE BRETZMAN was definitely anti-British but was not pro-German and is a loyal American. On February 4, 1943, BRETZMAN voluntarily appeared at the Indianapolis office and was interviewed by Special Agent JOSEPH W. RICHMOND. BRETZMAN stated that he was not a lover of England and probably never would be. However, he stated that neither was he a German sympathizer. When HITLER came to power, he first thought HITLER was doing a good job and prior to Pearl Harbor wanted to see Germany victorious over England. His belief was that the British Empire would fall regardless of the outcome of war. However, as the war continued, his opinion with regard to HITLER and the Nazis changed. HEPBURN stated that at the time of Pearl Harbor, BRETZMAN was completely disillusioned in regard to HITLER and became strongly opposed to both HITLER and the Nazi Government and was very anxious for a victory for the United States. He pointed out that in January 1942 immediately after Pearl Harbor he volunteered for any emergency duty. He was called in July 1942 and became an air raid warden. He held this position two or three weeks prior to the interview when he was compelled to resign due to his position in the Indiana State Guard, which he joined in August 1942. The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent ROBERT B. HAGG in December 1947.



During a previous investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation during 1947, the following information was obtained concerning HELMS and his family:

#### Education

Mr. ROY S. CLAGCOMB, Headmaster, Carteret School, West Orange, New Jersey, formerly Carteret Academy, West Orange, N.J., advised that the school records are somewhat mixed up as a result of the school changing hands recently and stated that at the present time he could give nothing official as far back as 1929. Mr. CLAGCOMB, however, together with Mr. HAROLD LAITY, head of the psychology department in the school, stated they both remembered HELMS attending the school between approximately 1920 - 1929 as they were members of the faculty at that time and taught HELMS in class.

Both stated they knew nothing of HELMS since he left the school, but considered the reputation of him and his family to be excellent at that time in all respects. They knew of nothing unfavorable concerning HELMS or any member of his family.

#### Neighborhood

All neighbors were specifically questioned regarding HELMS and his parents' foreign sympathies, and all stated that they felt HELMS and his family had no foreign sympathies.

Mr. and Mrs. LARS HEADSTROM, 378 Fairview Ave., Orange, N.J., advised that the HELMS were fine neighbors and well thought of in the neighborhood. Mrs. HEADSTROM stated that she has known HELMS and his parents for about twenty years. Mr. HEADSTROM advised that he has been acquainted with HELMS for about eight years. Both advised that at that time they considered HELMS and his parents to be loyal Americans of excellent character, habits and association and asserted that they knew nothing unfavorable about them.

Mrs. D. C. FEISNER, 370 Fairview Ave., Orange, N.J., was interviewed at the above address and Mr. D. C. FEISNER was interviewed at his place of business, 41 Lincoln Ave., Orange, N.J. Both stated that they held HELMS and his parents in as high regard as the HEADSTROMS on all points mentioned above. Mr. FEISNER stated she has been following HELMS' career since he was a young boy. Mr. FEISNER asserted that he was a teacher at the old Carteret Academy and taught HELMS while he was there. Both stated that the only thing foreign about HELMS is that he speaks German fluently and was partially educated in Europe. Mr. and Mrs. FEISNER felt that there was no question of HELMS' loyalty to the United States.

Mrs. FREDERICK A. SAMUELS, 315 Tillou Road, South Orange, N.J., advised that she has been a neighbor of the HELMS family for about four years and that she does not particularly like the family because of their alcofness. Mrs. SAMUELS said she does not know RICHARD HELMS but asserted that the other members of the family appear to be persons of good character and habits and that she has no reason to question their loyalty to the U.S. She knew of nothing unfavorable concerning them.

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Mrs. WILLIAM BARLOW, 305 Tillou Road, South Orange, N.J.

advised that she has been in the neighborhood about two years and that she does not know RICHARD HELMS. She stated, however, that the HELMS family are respected neighbors and as far as she can determine are persons of good character, habits and loyal Americans. Mrs. BARLOW stated that she knew of nothing unfavorable about the HELMS family.

Mrs. THOMAS E. WARD, 284 Tillou Road, South Orange, N.J., stated she has known the HELMS family from five to seven years, but that she does not know RICHARD HELMS. She stated that she has heard of RICHARD HELMS and his reputation is good as far as she can determine. Mrs. WARD stated that HELMS' father is odd and that she does not particularly get along with him, but that HELMS' mother and the rest of the family appear to be fine people. Mrs. WARD asserted that she actually does not know but feels that the family are loyal to the United States. Mrs. WARD did not feel in a pesition to comment on any foreign sympathies HELMS or his family might have, but stated that she was not aware of any.

Mr. PAUL J. CUPP, 556 Irving Terrace, South Orange, N.J., advised that he remembers HELMS living at 562 Irving Terrace for a short period but stated that he never did get a chance to meet him as HELMS was away most of the time. HELMS' parents attended the same church as CUPP in South Orange and they are very well thought of in that community. Mr. CUPP stated that he has known HELMS' parents for several years and feels that they are loyal Americans. Mr. CUPP further stated that HELMS and his wife were considered good neighbors and knew nothing derogatory of them. Mr. GUPP asserted that he could think of nothing that would led him to believe that the HELMS family had any foreign sentiments.

Mrs. H. P. GREEN, 722 Berkley Ave., South Orange, N.J., advised that she met HELMS on only one occasion, but that she knew of nothing unfavorable concerning his character, habits, associates and loyalty to the United States.

Mrs. ANNA H. BALDWIN, 332 Lawnridge Road, South Orange, N.J., advised that she has known HELMS since he was a small boy and at one time gave him piano lessons. Mrs. BALDWIN stated that she thinks very highly of HELMS and his family, but that she is not familiar with his activities in recent years as he has been away most of the time. Mrs. BALDWIN asserted that HELMS was a fine boy of upstanding principles and always eager to do the right thing and that she did not think he could go wrong. Mrs. BALDWIN advised that in her mind HELMS and his family are loyal Americans and persons of good character and habits of whom she knews of nothing unfavorable.

The two last mentioned addresses are in the neighborhood of Irving Terrace.

#### Credit

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Records of the Credit Bureau of Greater Newark, Inc., Newark, N.J., disclosed that the credit of HELMS as of 6/21/46 and that of his father as of 10/10/40 were satisfactory. A recheck of these records reflect no further information concerning HELMS or his family.

#### Police

The records of the Orange and South Orange Police Departments were checked against the name of HELMS and his family, and no record was located concerning them. A recheck of these records was made and no record concerning HELMS or his family was located.

T-l advised that the next time he was in the Headquarters in Berlin, he discovered both of his above mentioned reports filed in the "Not Used" files and they also bore the classification "Biased and Inreliable." After finding these reports in the files in Berlin, he had occasion to visit the Office in Heidelberg where the reports were sent after being processed in Berlin. He again found his two reports filed in the "Not Used" files.

T-l named five individuals who were charged with reading and classifying these reports, one of whom was the applicant. T-l is of the opinion that these individuals were pro-Communists because of the way his reports had been handled. He alleged that the applicant, although pro-Communist, never has been as dangerous as the other four officials that he mentioned.

He said he was certain that none of the men he named were Communist Party members as they were too intelligent.

T-l furnished no other information indicating any Communist sympathy or tendencies on the part of the subject.



#### Employment

Investigation to locate the office BV of the Navy Relief Society, Fifth Avenue and 57 Street, disclosed that the only office of this organization in New York, was located at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, Brooklyn, New York. Miss KAYE of that office advised that there was no record of Navy Relief ever having maintained an office at Fifth Avenue and 57 Street and, further, that the organization had no paid employees in the period from February, 1942 to May, 1943, when the applicant stated he was employed by the group. Miss KAYE made inquiry of individuals who were associated with Navy Relief in 1942 but none of these persons recalled the applicant as a volunteer worker.

Mr. HARRY FLORY, Foreign News Manager, United Press Association, 220 East 42 Street, stated that he was European manager of United Press during the period, 1935 to 1937, when the applicant was a staff correspondent in Germany. Mr. FLORY was unable to locate a record showing the exact dates of the

tions throughout the country due chiefly to his family background. He further informed that applicant had served in the U. S. Navy under Commander FARLEY who was in charge of Operations, Convoy and Rounting on the Eastern Leaboard, during 1941 and 1942.

Mr. JOHN SCOTT HARRISON, III, salesman with the American Indemnity Company, 536 Bankers Mortgage Building, advised he had known applicant very intimately two years during college terms of 1931, 1932, 1933, while they were attending Milliams College and while both were members of the fraternity Chi Psi. He advised applicant was president of this fraternity and was probably one of the most outstanding students ever graduated from this college. He stated he has corresponded intermittently with applicant since 1933, and he could think of no person whom he could recommend more highly. He stated that in his opinion applicant was thoroughly trustworthy, loyal and patriotic to the U. S. Government, and could be trusted with any top secret information concerning the United States.

Mr. HABRISON also mentioned that applicant has strong political backing because of his family background. Mr. HABBISON predicted that applicant would one day be the Secretary of State of the United States.

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#### NY 116-98702

Mr. GARDNER stated that he had only a casual acquaintance with the applicant's wife and had been unable to form any opinions concerning her.

Mr. MARK FERREE, Assistant Ceneral Business Manager, Scripps Howard Newspapers, 230 Park Avenue, advised that he had formerly been Business Manager of the Indianapolis Times and was closely associated with the applicant from 1937 to 1942 when the applicant was advertising manager of the paper. Mr. FERREE described the applicant as a hard-working, ambitious and conscientious individual who takes great pride in his work and strives to do a good job in all his undertakings. He stated that the applicant's character and reputation are excellent and his patriotism and Loyalty above reproach.

Mr FERREE stated that the applicant's wife, whose maiden name was JULIA BRETZMANN, had been formerly married and divorced from FRANK SHIELDS, president of the Barbasol Company of Indianapolis. Mr. FERREE stated that although he did not know the details or reason for divorce, it was a well-known fect that Mr. SHIELDS, deceased, drank heavily. According to Mr. FERREE, the BRETZMANN family were socially prominent in Indianapolis.

#### Associate

Mr. GARDNER STOUT of the Dominick and Dominick Brokerage Company, 14 Wall Street, stated that the applicant had been assistant operations officer under his command at the United States Naval Headquarters of the Eastern Sea Frontier during 1942 and 1943. STOUT advised that the applicant was a man who was completely trustworthy, and loyal. He added that the applicant's duties involved very confidential information and there had never been any question as to his having been trusted with same. STOUT stated that he would recommend the applicant without reservation as a man of fine character and a completely loyal and patriotic American.

#### Credit and Criminal

The records of the Credit Bureau of Greater New York and the New York City Police Department contained no information relative to the applicant in December, 1947.

Mr. FRANK G. WISNER, Deputy Director for Plans, CIA, and a reference of the applicant, advised that he first became acquainted with the applicant in 1944 or 1945 and that the applicant worked under him in France and Germany and was a senior staff officer during most of the year 1945. He stated he again became closely associated with the applicant in 1948 and this relationship has continued up to the present time. Mr. WISNER stated the applicant's family life is exceptional and he has never heard the slightest scandal or suspicion concerning the loyalty of the applicant or his family and that the same applies to the applicant's friends and associates. Mr. WISNER stated in conclusion that he would recommend the applicant for a position of trust.

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Street, Northwest, a reference of the applicant, supplied substantially the same information concerning the applicant as that supplied by Mr. WISNER.

The following investigation was conducted in 1947:

The applicant's personnel file at the Bureau of Naval Personnel reflects the applicant was born



March 30, 1913 at St. Davids, Pennsylvania. The file contained a memorandum from the Assistant Public Relations Officer which requested that the applicant be commissioned in the U. S. Naval Reserve and assigned to the Director of Public Relations. The applicant's medical examination, dated March 13, 1942, reflected temporary tachycardia, temporary hypertension and thirty-four pounds underweight. The applicant was not qualified for appointment to the U. S. Naval Reserve unless defects were waived. The file reflects the applicant was rejected by the Chief of the The file contains a letter dated Bureau of Navigation. April 17, 1942 endorsed by the Director at the Office of Public Relations, Secretary of the Navy, stating that the applicant's services were not required in the Office of Public Relations.

On May 27, 1942 the Office of Public Relations requested the Bureau of Naval Personnel to return the applicant's application for re-consideration. The Board of Medical Examiners, USN, rejected the applicant's application by letter dated April 9, 1942 and a survey was requested April 24, 1942. The file reflected the applicant was commissioned a Lieutenant (j.g.) June 26, 1942 to rank from April 1, 1942 and was promoted to Lieutenant on May 1, 1943. He was transferred to the Director of Strategic Services, Psychological Warfare on June 9, 1943. The file reflects that the applicant served in the Headquarters, Eastern Sea Frontier from August 29, 1942 to August 11, 1943 and a fitness report covering this period reflected the applicant to be outstanding. The applicant was transferred to OSS, Washington, D. C. under Captain WARD P. DAVIS, USN, August 16, 1943 to March 31, 1944. His efficiency rating for this period was outstanding.

From April 1, 1944 to January 8, 1945 the applicant served in OSS and his efficiency rating was excellent. The file reflected that the applicant also served in OSS in London, England. The applicant was promoted to Lieutenant Commander June 14, 1945 and transferred by Executive Order October 11, 1945 from OSS to the State and War Departments and was released from active duty March 19, 1946.

Captain PAUL CASSARD, USN, President, Board of Review, EXOS, USN, Washington, D. C., advised he did not recall the applicant and certainly did not know him socially. Captain CASSARD believes that whatever efficiency ratingshe signed for the applicant were correct at the time. He suggested that Lieutenant Commander GORDON STOUT, USN, be contacted in regard to the applicant.

Captain WARD P. DAVIS, USN, 3321 Wisconsin Avenue, Northwest, advised he was unable to recall the applicant but stated that he felt the applicant's fitness report properly reflected his ability at the time Captain DAVIS signed it.

Mr. WALLACE CARROLL of the New World Weekly, Incorporated, 1712 8th Street, Northwest, advised he first met the applicant in 1935 in Geneva, Switzerland when the applicant was overseas with his mother and father and at which time Mr. CARROLL stated he was head of the United Press in Berlin. Mr. CARROLL stated he requested the UP to assign the applicant to his staff while the applicant was overseas. Mr. CARROLL stated he met the applicant from time to time since then and has always regarded him as a man of highest character and reputation and has never known anything about him which was not good. He stated he always found the applicant to be a hard worker, intelligent, very sober and responsible and has no reason whatsoever to question his loyalty and patriotism. He said the applicant spoke German fluently and was a great service to the UP because of this fact. Mr. CARROLL stated he would not hesitate to recommend the applicant for any position of trust and confidence as he is highly interested in this type of work and enjoys it from the standpoint of true principles. He stated in conclusion that he has attempted to interest the applicant in the new publishing venture of New World Weekly, Inc.

Mr. FREDERICK OECHSNER, 3812 Fulton Street, Northwest, stated he was formerly with United Press Association in Germany and first met the applicant in

about 1934 in Berlin, Germany, at which time the applicant was on a trip with his parents following his graduation from college. Mr. OECHSNER said that he felt that the applicant would make a good man for UP and contacted the London Office and suggested employment of the applicant, following which the applicant was sent over to the staff in Germany. He said that the applicant's father was a banker and he believed he was born in Germany, but was not certain of this fact. Mr. OECHSNER remarked the applicant's grandfather GATES McGARRAH was a member of the Bank of International Settlements and that the applicant's mother is American born. He remarked that he considered the applicant to be a man of the very highest character who is clear headed and has good reasons for decisions that he has to make. He stated the applicant is a clean living man of a high type who has a keen mind and strong ethical feelings. He said the applicant has an excellent reputation among news men with whom he is associated and there has never been any reason whatsoever to question his loyalty or petriotism. as he is too high minded to violate any trust or confidence. The applicant is interested in the activities of Williams College and beyond that Mr. OECHSNER said that he feels that the applicant is not a member of any social or fraternal group.

Mr. WALLACE R. DUELL, 3026 Cambridge, Northwest, advised he was the Washington correspondent for the Chicago Daily News and was formerly in the Berlin Bureau of the United Press where he met the applicant about ten years ago. He said that the applicant served in OSS during the war and that he has tried to get him on the staff when they were located in Germany.

Mr. DUELL stated he had no information concerning the applicant 's family background, except that one grandfather was President of the Bank of International Settlement and the applicant's wife is a divorcee. He stated that the applicant is a man of the most un-impeachable and impeccable character and is known to others as an intelligent and hard working man who is regarded as almost perfect. Mr. DUELL states that the applicant has an excellent reputation and extraordinary integrity. He stated he regards the

loyalty and patriotism of the applicant as above reproach. He further stated that he considered the applicant to be no hazard to the national security as he has an outstanding personality and character. In conclusion he stated he believes the applicant's work and family consume most of his time and he does not believe the applicant is the joining type, other than perhaps the fraternities at Williams College.

 $\{S\}$ Mr. Street, N. W., a co-worker of the applicant at CIA, advised he has known the applicant for about one and one-half years, both in OSS and CIA, but almost entirely on a professional basis. He stated the applicant came from field work in Berlin to be Branch Chief at CIA in Washington, D. C. He stated that he has no information concerning the applicant's family background, but that he recalls the applicant to be a man of highest character, definitely under control, but an extremely nervous type of individual although he seldom shows this outwardly. He said the applicant is stable and hard working, but that, he believes due to his nervous tension, he prefers to do his work entirely alone. -(S)-Mr. said that the applicant has always been very fair to all of his employees with whom he is associated and that he has an excellent reputation among the people who are acquainted with him. He said that the applicant is definitely loyal, patriotic and entirely trustworthy from a security standpoint.

- (S) Mr. stated he believes the applicant presently gets about double the pay that he could normally make in the newspaper field and has mentioned how hectic news work was and felt that due to changes in his makeup during the war years he could not undertake
   (5) this hectic life again. In conclusion, Mr. stated
- (5) this nectic life again. In conclusion, Mr. stated that he would definitely recommend the applicant for any position in the Government, as he has great intellectual capacity.

#### REFERENCES AND ASSOCIATES

SA ROBERT J. MCKENNAN ascertained that ERIC W. TIMM, 4177 Vacation Lane, Arlington, Virginia, is presently out of the city and his whereabouts are unknown.

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The following investigation was conducted in 1947.

Mr. CARL McGOWAN, 3425 0 Street, Northwest, who formerly resided with the applicant at 2620 Foxhall Road, Northwest, advised he first met the applicant in the U. S. Navy about 1942 and they have been very friendly ever since. He said the applicant's grandfather, Mr. McGARRAH, was a banker in New York and was also the head of the Bank of International Settlements. The applicant's wife is a divorcee whom the applicant met at Indianapolis, Indiana during the time he was employed there by a newspaper. Mr. McGOWAN said he regards the applicant as a man of the highest character without any reservation and states that he is able and intelligent. He said he has an excellent reputation and is very popular and at the time they resided at 2620 Foxhall Road, Northwest, he was very popular with the other bachelor residents at that address. Mr. McGOWAN stated that he had no reason to question the loyalty, patriotism, trust or confidence of the applicant. In conclusion he said he would recommend the applicant without hesitation, for a position in the government.

Mr. ADRIAN S. FISHER, Solicitor, Department of Commerce, who formerly resided with the applicant at 2620 Foxhall Road at a bachelor hall called "Hockley", advised he met the applicant there about November of 1943 when the applicant was serving in the U. S. Navy. FISHER believes the applicant has a German background, at least



he is of German extraction and may have German relatives, although he is not certain of this. He said the applicant served with the United Press Association in Germany and lived there for some time and acquired excellent control of the German tongue. Mr. FISHER remarked the applicant is a man of the highest character, extremely intelligent and perceptive and enjoys an excellent reputation, particularly with the group of friends who resided at 2620 Foxhall Road. He stated there is no reason to question the loyalty or patriotism of the applicant and said that he has discussed the German situation with him on several occasions and believes that the applicant has a good knowledge of what is going on. From these discussions Mr. FISHER feels that the applicant is anti-Nazi. He said he would recommend the applicant for any position of trust and confidence as he believes the applicant is a man of the utmost discretion and had never disclosed any information to the group with whom he resided. He said in conclusion that he had no information concerning any social, fraternal associations of the applicant nor of friends or associates outside the group that resided at 2620 Foxhall Road.

Mr. COBURN KIDD, Central European Division, Department of State, advised he has known the applicant since June of 1945 and served with him in OSS and has been acquainted with the applicant since that time both professionally and socially. He stated that the applicant is a man of excellent character who appears to be aman of some standing and is perfectly genuine, honest, stable and a moderate drinker. Mr. KIDD stated that to the best of his knowledge there is no hint or suspicion of any weakness of character and that the applicant is given wholeheartedly to business and has kept himself cheerful in spite of hard work and has always been self-controlled under conditions in OSS that were very trying.


KIDD said the applicant enjoys an excellent reputation, and amongst his friends is MR. STUART HUGHES, grandson of Chief Justice HUGHES. He remarked that he has no information concerning the family background of the applicant but stated the applicant has many friends WFO 118-3108

both in his present group and in different places that he has been and has always carried himself as a gentleman of intellectual capabilities. In conclusion Mr. KIDD stated he would recommend the applicant wholeheartedly, perhaps more than anyone else he had known for any position of trust and confidence because of his character, cheerfulness and calmness of thought.

Mr. C. H. POPE, President of the Munsey Trust Company, Washington, D. C., knew the applicant's father, who was a banker, much better than he knew the applicant, he advised. He said that the applicant's father was connected with the Aluminum Corporation of America and that the applicant's grandfather GATES McGARRAH, was formerly head of the Bank of International Settlements. He said he recommends the applicant and his family as persons of excellent character and while he does not know him very well, has never known the applicant to be in any trouble of any kind. He remarked that the applicant and his family enjoy a good reputation and there has never been any reason to question the loyalty or patriotism of any of them.

Mr. POPE stated that he is unable to furnish any information concerning social or fraternal memberships of the applicant, nor his close personal associates. He stated in conclusion that he would recommend the applicant for any position of trust and confidence in the government as he feels the applicant's home life would bear out this trust.

Mr. WILSON T. H. BEALE, Chief of Division of Research for Europe, Department of State, advised he has known the applicant since about 1943 and was formerly Executive Officer in OSS and worked closely with the



applicant overseas and in Washington, D. C. He stated he has known the applicant both socially and professionally and has had occasion to visit the applicant's home frequently. He said he has a high regard for the applicant's character, reputation and personal intellectual accomplishments and states that he has no reason whatsoever to question the loyalty or patriotism of the applicant. He said he has no information concerning the applicant's family background and stated he was acquainted with the applicant at 2620 Foxhall Road, Northwest, which was a large hall used as bachelor quarters by a number of persons in the armed forces and where an average of about ten stayed at this address at any one time. He stated that due to the character of their work there were many changes and new faces appeared at that address from time to time. Mr. BEALE states that the group residing at 2620 Foxhall Road, N. W., were a group of intellectual extroverts and that all were hard workers, all were high type, and he feels that perhaps the harmony that existed in that house was because so many of the residents were of the same type. He said the applicant apparently lived a very quiet life, was well liked and friendly with the group and has been friendly with the group with whom he is employed. Mr. BEALE said that the applicant is a very serious minded person, but with this has a good sense of humor. He said he believed the applicant would do well in a position outside of the government but imagines that the applicant has devoted himself to principles which the applicant believes are necessary for the work he is doing.

Mr. DAGGETT H. HOWARD, International Attorney for the Civil Aeronautics Board, Washington, D. C. advised he had known the applicant since early 1944, at which time they both resided at 2620 Foxhall Road, N. W. At this time Mr. HOWARD stated he was employed at the White House. He stated that he has no information concerning the applicant's family background, but that he regards the applicant as a man of the highest character, reputation, a man who is serious, stable, very intelligent and somewhat idealistic. Mr. HOWARD stated that there is no reason whatsoever to question the loyalty and patriotism of the applicant, as from the standpoint of trust and national security, he

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would give him top rating. He said the applicant has a reputation of having done a "cracker-jack" job during the war. He said the applicant is the type of person who was self-contained and that the only memberships the applicant would have would be in connection with collegiate groups at Williams College. In conclusion, Mr. HOWARD stated that he believes that the applicant's ideal in Government Service is in doing the important type of work that he is doing.

Mr. STUART HUGHES, Chief, Division of Research for Europe, Department of State, advised he has known the applicant since July 1945, having served with him in OSS in Germany and having seen him frequently since that time. He said he has no information concerning the applicant's background, but regards the applicant as a man of very high character, of pleasant and intellectual disposition, who is regarded very highly and has an important position for a young man and is well adapted to this position. He stated that the applicant has an excellent reputation and has many friends, some of whom have achieved importance. Mr. HUGHES stated the applicant is loyal, patriotic and solid, and there is no question of trust from the standpoint of national security as he has had important jobs and has always done them without any question of his trust. He said he believes that the applicant is interested in his work, likes it immensely and is interested in the techniques and methods of intelligence work and has created for himself a professional attitude in this field. Mr. HUGHES stated in conclusion that he would recommend the applicant without reservation and recommend him as one of the best men in secret intelligence work, as he has great ambition as well as common sense.

Mr. W. GRAHAM CLAYTOR, Jr., 3018 N Street, Northwest, Attorney, advised he has known the applicant since 1942 and has had occasion to frequently exchange visits with the applicant. He stated he formerly resided with the applicant at 2620 Foxhall Road, N. W. He said he has no information concerning the applicant's

family background, but regards the applicant as a man of the highest character who has exhibited no weaknesses of character of any kind and has always demonstrated himself to be emotionally stable. Mr. CLAYTOR states that there is no reason to question the loyalty and patriotism of the applicant, and from the standpoint of trust he is a good security risk.

105 W. Bradley Lane, Chevy Chase, Maryland.

The following investigation was conducted by SA ROBERT M. BASS, JR.

Mrs. ELIZABETH L. LYONS, 109 W. Bradley Lane, advised she has known the applicant and his family as neighbors since 1946 and has no reason to question the patriotism of any member of the family. Mrs. LYONS added she believes the applicant and his family are people of excellent character, reputation, loyalty and associates; that she has never heard any unfavorable information concerning any of them and would unhesitatingly recommend the applicant for a position of trust and confidence.

Mrs. MARY ANSELL, 107 Bradley Lane, who has known the applicant and his family as neighbors since 1946, supplied substantially the same information concerning the applicant as that supplied by Mrs. LYONS.

Mrs. THOMAS W. HOLLAND, 200 Rosemary Street, whose residence is directly behind the applicant's residence and who has known the applicant and family as neighbors over eight years, advised that she had never heard any information of an unfavorable nature concerning the applicant or any member of his family, but stated that she was not well enough acquainted with the HELMS family to make any comment concerning their character or loyalty.

A search of the City Directory for Washington, D. C. was made in 1947 and the following information obtained:

The following investigation was conducted in

1947:

Mr. STEPHEN B. L. PENROSE, 7100 Meadow Lane, Chevy Chase, Maryland, advised that he has known the applicant since 1945 when they both served in OSS. He said that the applicant's mother's family are well known bankers and that the applicant's wife, JULIA, from Indianapolis, Indiana, was previously married to Mr. SHIELDS, the inventor of Barbasol, who was much older than the applicant's wife. They had two children before the divorce. He stated that the applicant's wife is a homemaker and does sculpture as a hobby. Mr. PENROSE remarked the applicant is a man of outstanding character with no weaknesses of any kind ever observed. He is stable and well orientated. He is calm and dispassionate. He said that the applicant also enjoys an excellent reputation among friends with whom he is employed at CIA and a few with whom he was formerly associated at OSS. Mr. PENROSE remarked he had no reason whatsoever to question the loyalty and patriotism of the applicant, and he would

give him the highest rating from the standpoint of trust and national security. He said he did not believe the applicant is a member of any organizations, outside of the fraternities at Williams College and in conclusion, he said that he regards the applicant as not being the student type but does not hesitate to recommend him, as he considers him as one of our most solid citizens.

Mr. BURR TRACT ANSELL, 108 W. Bradley Lane, Chevy Chase, Maryland, attorney, Washington, D. ., advised he has known the applicant since about March, 1946 but that he has no information concerning the applicant's family background. He said the applicant is a man of the highest character, very moderate drinker, well orientated who keeps a very nice and neat home, in which he is quite interested, and has an excellent reputation, and therefore, is a very desirable neighbor. He said that the applicant is a linguist and excels in the <sup>G</sup>erman tongue due to his German background and education in Germany. Mr. ANSELL stated that there is absolutely no question as to his loyalty and patriotism, and from the standpoint of trust and confidence, he is very closemouthed and an extremely high-grade citizen. In conclusion, he stated that the applicant is interested in and active in Williams College Alumni Association and believes that beyond that he is not a member of any fraternal organization.

Mr. and Mrs. JAMES H. McCLOTHIN, 33 East Bradley Lane, and Mrs. FLORENCE M. HOAR, 103 W. Bradley Lane, supplied substantially the same information concerning the applicant and his family as that supplied by Mr. PENROSE.

No criminal record for the applicant or any member of his family was contained in the files of the Metropolitan Police Department, Washington, D.C.

Special Employee WALTER JAMES TOLSON determined that no record of the applicant or any member of his family was contained in the files of the United States Park Police.

Special Employee JOHN J. LANDERS ascertained that the files of the Washington, D.C. Credit Bureau, Inc. in report dated September 13, 1951, reflected that the applicant had three accounts which were rated as satisfactory.

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#### MISCELLANEOUS

SE XAVIER F. CLARK determined that there was no record of the applicant or any member of his family in the files of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

SE ROY F. RODMAN ascertained that the files of the Office of Naval Intelligence reflected an arrest for speeding at Lee, Massachusetts on June 5, 1935, at which time the applicant was fined \$10.

No further information of a derogatory nature concerning the applicant was noted in the files of the Office of Naval Intelligence.

SE WAYNE S. CURTIS determined that the files of the Department of Navy reflected that the applicant was transferred to inactive status effective July 1, 1950 as Lieutenant Commander, USNR. No additional information concerning the applicant was contained in the files of the Department of Navy.

SE JOHN J. LANDERS ascertained that the files of the Investigations Division, Civil Service Commission, contained no record under the name of the applicant.

SA ROBERT J. MCKENNAN was advised that the security files of the Central Intelligence Agency contained (S) security information.

The files of the Passport Division, Department of State, reflected that passport number 31815 was issued May 2, 1929 to the applicant for travel to the British Isles,

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France, Germany, Belgium and Holland for one year. On April 29, 1931 this passport was extended for two years by the American Consulate at Basel, Switzerland. On the application for this passport the applicant stated he was born in St. Davids, Pennsylvania on March 30, 1913 and his permanent residence was listed as 407 Tillow Road, South Orange, New Jersey.

Passport number 100453 was issued to the applicant May 14, 1934 for travel to England and France for three months on pleausre. On May 7, 1936 the American Vice Consul in Berlin, Germany renewed this passport for two years and at this time the applicant advised he represented the United Press of America, Daily News Building, New York, New York.

Special passport number 9746 was issued to the applicant June 28, 1946. At this time the applicant stated his permanent residence as 105 W. Bradley Lane, <sup>C</sup>hevy Chase, Maryland.

On June 26, 1946 the Strategic Services Unit of the War Department advised the State Department that the applicant had been ordered to Switzerland, Austria and Germany and that he would report to the Strategic Services Officer at Frankfurt, Germany.

Enclosed herewith is the report of SA WALLACE A. HAWKINS dated March 16, 1953 at Washington, D. C., captioned as above.

It is to be noted that the former address of the applicant in instant investigation at 2620 Foxhall Road, Northwest, Washington, D. C. was included in a project requested by President Harry S. Truman in connection with a security check of State Department leaks.

On April 24, 1945 Inspector M. E. GURNEA requested a technical surveillance at that address, which was listed in the names of JOHN C. GEILFUSS and DAGGETT H. HOWARD. Other persons residing at that address included Lt. BERNARD T. BRENNAN, Captain JAMES R. BURGESS, Lt. Col. HARRY C. GREEN, Lt. EDWARD A. MCELWAIN, Major JOHN F. RUNNALLS, Lt. A. E. TATHAM, Lt. JOHN M. WOOLSEY and JULES HANAFORD.

This surveillance was predicated on information that EDWARD F. PRITCHARD who resided there had been named in summary memorandum covering previous security leaks in the State Department. It is noted that these and other friends of the applicant resided at that address. It was impossible to successfully complete this technical surveillance and this part of the project was discontinued April 27, 1945.

This information is being set out here rather than in the details of the report, inasmuch as there is no indication that the applicant was in any way involved in this surveillance or that he was residing at this address during the alleged security leaks in the State 112-371317-19 Department.

During the interview, Lauren advised that in 1952 he was the Subversive Intelligence Analyst at the Strategic Air Command Headquarters and he came to Washington to do research. In his research he had deduced that Jay Lovestone is still very communistic "and the apparatus of which Lovestone is a part is more dangerous to the United States than Communism as personified by the Russians" in that while we are so concerned in every way with the Soviets and the practices which they personify, "the Soviets are actually being implemented within all of our institutions from within." Lauren stated Lovestone and several labor attaches are part of the "apparatus which is inducing the United States into an international socialistic organization, diffusing our international definitions in economics, politics and culture."

During the interview, Lauren advised he is a captain in the United States Air Force Reserves and had been employed to assist the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee. He stated that about a year ago he was in line for a high position in the State Department but did not obtain the position and he believes there is a flag in the State Department files against his name. He said his reason for so thinking is that apparently the word had gene around, down through the Republican Mational Committee to the State Department that he is anti-Sametic and has a file relating to this. He stated this is watrue but the word has apparently gene around, although, no one apparently wants to put it on the record.

#### SYNOPSIS:

Reference is made to allegations of General Arthur S. Trudeau, former Assistant Chief of Staff, U. S. Army, and former G-2 (Army Intelligence) chief, concerning possible infiltration of Fabian socialists and communists into high policy-making areas of Government service. This matter has required very detailed and extensive file review on names submitted by General Trudeau. As there was no urgency, this has been done from time to time by the Central Research Section, other work permitting. Background on Fabian socialism and General Trudeau's feud with Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) set forth.

### The Results

Over 5, 500 references were reviewed in Bureau files on 122 1. names listed on charts and memoranda left with the Bureau by General Trudeau.

2. Three names were not identified in Bureau files, making a total of 119 names which were identified.

Identifiable derogatory information was found on 105 of the 119 3. individuals identified and is set forth in enclosure under separate captions.

4. Of the 105 individuals on whom identifiable derogatory information was found, 94 have been investigated by the Bureau under classifica - 3 tions of Atomic Energy Act, Voice of America, Loyalty of Government Employees, Security of Government Employees, CIA-Applicant, special Inquiry-White House, Security Matter-C, Internal Security-R, and others. Results of investigations have been disseminated.

5. Proper dissemination has been made of identifiable derogatory information on the remaining individuals not investigated.

6. Cases are pending on three subjects not now in Government employment. Cases on other individuals have been closed.

7. No attempt was made to verify present number of individuals still in Government because of the Director's instructions to remain out of G-2 and CIA feud. It was correctly assumed that inquiry would have aroused curiosity and questions in high policy-making Government circles.

## Conclusions

1. **FBI** files do not contain any specific, concrete, and conclusive proof that the subjects are Fabian socialists as charged by General Trudeau.

2. FBI files do not contain any similar conclusive proof that these subjects have been and, in some instances, are influencing Government policy along Fabian socialist lines as charged by General Trudeau.

3. FBI files do show, however, that a considerable amount of "smoke" surrounds these subjects in that many have been charged by associates and acquaintances with the following:

a. Describing Chinese communists as being harmless "agrarian reformers" when they should have known that they were actually communists

b. Suppressing information unfavorable to communists and communism

c. Issuing slanted reports favoring communism

d. Minimizing the threat of Soviet Russia to peace and democracy

e. Manifesting thinking which coincides with socialist thinking in different instances

f. Lacking, from a loyalty standpoint, in qualifications desired in strategic or sensitive Government positions

4. Others have been named by Louis Budenz, former official of the Communist Party, USA, as being communist or under communist discipline.

To sum up: While the evidence is not present to prove the validity of General Trudeau's charges, it must be admitted that the persons singled out by General Trudeau do not, in the main, have altogether clean, sound, and unquestionable security backgrounds. However, the FBI has investigated 94 of the 105 subjects on whom there is derogatory information. Proper dissemination of available derogatory information has also been made on those persons not investigated. Therefore, there appears to be no more to do at this time.

It is interesting to note that this study does show the FBI was already aware of these subjects and had information on them long before General Trudeau submitted their names.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

(1) That no dissemination be made of allegations by General Trudeau in accordance with Director's indication that Bureau should not in any way become involved in the dispute between G-2 and CIA.

(2) That no dissemination be made of information set forth in enclosure under individual captions inasmuch as information of a derogatory nature in Bureau files has received proper dissemination.

(3) That no new cases be opened on individuals named by General Trudeau since charges do not constitute sufficient basis for opening new investigations.

## DETAILS:

### General Trudeau Material

General Trudeau furnished the Director with charts and memoranda purporting to substantiate charges that certain individuals in and out of Government were influencing the United States to take a soft policy against Soviet Russia and world communism. General Trudeau furnished the names of individuals, some allegedly with Fabian socialist leanings and possibly some with communist leanings, who, he stated, had penetrated certain policy-forming organs of our Government, including State Department, CIA, Operations Coordinating Board, Planning Control Group, and Planning Board, as well as academic research units at Harvard, Princeton, and Johns Hopkins Universities, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the Ford and Rockefeller Foundations which do research work for the Government.

Trudeau material furnished last names only on majority of individuals. Later, Colonel Earle L. Lerette, G-2, furnished limited additional identifying data.

Bureau files reflect that Colonel Lerette and a Lieutenant Colonel Phillip J. Corso, Operations Coordinating Board, associates of General Trudeau, disseminated information regarding Fabian socialist charges outside the Executive Branch and that G-2 did not handle the matter of Fabian socialists in a secure and prudent manner. (62-9798; 100-420468-5, 10, 11) As a result, Colonel Lerette was accused by CIA of releasing false and derogatory information about that agency.

## Fabian Socialism

Fabian socialism had its origin with the Fabian Society in England in 1884, largely as the result of influence and teaching of an American, Professor Thomas Davidson. The end of Fabian socialism is the elimination of private ownership as an exclusive means of production and the substitution of state or social ownership of the means of production; hence, socialism. The name Fabian was derived from a Roman general, Quintus Fabius Maximus Verrucosus, who became famous by his military tactics of avoiding direct battles, resorting to deliberate procrastination, and using delaying procedures

during his defense of Rome against the attacks of Hannibal. The aim of Fabian socialism is to permeate every segment of society with socialistic ideas, words, attitudes, tendencies, and modes of thinking in order to gradually lay the foundation of a slow, steady, peaceful transformation of the social order from capitalism to socialism. The tactics of Fabian socialism include concessions, compromises, advances, avoidance of conflict, all of which are to be made with great patience.

## CIA - G-2 Feud

General Trudeau was relieved in August, 1955, of his duties as Assistant Chief of Staff, U. S. Army, and as head of Army G-2, and was transferred to the Far East Command. General Trudeau's removal stemmed from charges by Allen Dulles, Director of CIA, who claimed that General Trudeau's dealings with top West German officials, including Dr. Heinz L. Krekler, West German Ambassador to the United States, and Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, during the latter's visit to the United States in 1955, were prejudicial to United States intelligence efforts. General Trudeau was reportedly critical to Ambassador Krekler and Chancellor Adenauer regarding the West German intelligence organization headed by General Reinhard von Gehlen which had been subsidized by CIA.

James Angleton, CIA, confidentially advised the Bureau on August 1, 1955, that CIA had evidence that General Trudeau, in his visits with Ambassador Krekler and Chancellor Adenauer, had violated the CIA and G-2 agreement on foreign espionage and counterespionage activities, and that CIA had protested to the White House.

General Trudeau advised the Bureau on August 8, 1955, that in his visits with Ambassador Krekler and Chancellor Adenauer he had discussed nothing of an intelligence nature not already known. He admitted being at odds with CIA and stated that he believed CIA was attempting to gain complete control of the foreign intelligence field. He stated that if CIA accomplished its purpose, the military intelligence services might as well go out of business. (62-9798-2653, 2657, 2661, 2674, 2680)

According to an article by John O'Donnell, newspaper columnist, in the New York <u>Daily News</u>, September 2, 1955, page 2, General Trudeau was "fired" by President Eisenhower at the personal request of Allen Dulles, Director of CIA. According to O'Donnell, Dulles complained that Trudeau had talked with Chancellor Adenauer, without notifying CIA, in order to lessen Adenauer's confidence in the "CIA-bankrolled setup" in Germany operated by Reinhard Gehlen.

### File Reviews

An analysis of the allegations of General Trudeau required very detailed and extensive file reviews on names submitted by General Trudeau. As there was no urgency, this has been done from time to time by the Central Research Section, other work permitting.

### Results

1. Over 5,500 references were reviewed in Bureau files on 122 names in charts and memoranda left with the Bureau by General Trudeau.

2. Three names were not identified in Bureau files, leaving a total of 119 names which were identified.

3. Identifiable derogatory information was found on 105 of the 119 individuals identified and is set forth in enclosure under separate captions.

4. Of the 105 individuals on whom identifiable derogatory information was found, 94 have been investigated by the Bureau under classifications of Atomic Energy Act, Voice of America, Loyalty of Government Employees, Security of Government Employees, CIA-Applicant, Special Inquiry-White House, Security Matter-C, Internal Security-R, and others. ### Conclusions

1. FBI files do not contain any specific, concrete, and conclusive proof that the subjects are Fabian socialists as charged by General Trudeau.

2. FBI files do not contain any similar conclusive proof that the individuals named by General Trudeau have been and, in some instances, are influencing Government policy along Fabian socialist lines as charged by General Trudeau.

It is to be noted that Bureau files do not contain a record of day-to-day decisions of these individuals and do not set forth the part which they have played in policies formulated. There is no information in individual files regarding the decisions which General Trudeau has stated were influenced by individuals named.

3. Derogatory information is set forth in enclosure regarding individuals who appear to be identical with names on General Trudeau's list. Some reportedly regarded the Chinese communists as "agrarian reformers." Several reportedly suppressed information unfavorable to communist activities in Europe during and after World War II while serving in Office of Strategic Services (OSS) and G-2. Others reportedly minimized the Soviet threat or slanted reports in State Department. Several identified by Whittaker Chambers

and Elizabeth T. Bentley, former self-admitted Soviet espionage agents, as participants in espionage activities in Washington, D. C., and New York, New York, in the mid 1930's and early 1940's. Several have been critical of the Bureau. Several alleged to be socialists; others "leftist" and "procommunist." Several reported as members, in the past, of organizations cited by the Attorney General under Executive Order 10450. Allegations generally name many individuals as questionable for strategic or sensitive Government employment.

4. Several were named by Louis Budenz, former Communist Party, USA, official, as being communists or under communist discipline.

Some of the sources of information used in the enclosure were closely associated with the individuals named and requested that their identities be concealed. Others expressed a willingness or unwillingness to testify in loyalty or court proceedings against individuals named. In order to indicate the desires of the source an (a) was placed after the names of sources who requested that their identities be concealed. A (b) was placed after the sources's name when be was willing to testify. A (c) was used to indicate source not willing to testify.



### Background


Helms was born March 30, 1913, at St. Davids, Pennsylvania. He was graduated from Williams College, Williamstown, Massachusetts, with an A. B. degree in 1935. He was employed by the United Press from 1935 to 1937 in London, England, and Berlin, Germany. From 1937 to 1942, he was with the Indianapolis, Indiana, Times. He served with the United States Navy from 1942 to 1946, transferring to the Office of Strategic Services (OSS) in 1943. From 1946 to 1947, he was with the Central Intelligence Group (CIG) and since that time has been with CIA. (116-371389-1)

## Untavorable Information

has stated that some of his <u>reports</u> were filed in the "not used files" and classified "biased and unreliable." **said that several individuals**, one of whom was named Heims, were responsible for classifying these reports and he considered these individuals procommunist, because of the way his reports had been handled. He added that he was certain none of the individuals were members of the Communist Party\* since they were too intelligent. (100-350685)

Don Surine of the staff of Senator Joseph R. McCarthy advised in 1954 that the Jenner Committee of the U. S. Senate had developed information regarding individuals on CIA's payroll. Surine stated that an informant advised that Richard Helms of CIA was in a unique position and could become a key witness if it became apparent to Helms that he should protect himself. Surine stated that Helms had advised a potential witness on the CIA that he (Helms) might become involved in matters investigated by the Jenner Committee, but that there were others in CIA far more deeply involved than himself. In 1955, Mr. Nichols received information regarding several individuals from a source which he designated as According to the source, Richard Helms of the CIA and others connected with the WIN project had misled CIA officials and pictured the CIA controlled Polish underground as so good that it could overthrow Poland whenever it was desired. The story was picked up the next day by "Pravda," Tass and Moscow Radio which gave it widest dissemination. The following day the story, with some embellishments, was printed in CP papers in London and Paris. At the same time, Genevieve Rabouis, an anti-American pro-Soviet French journali st, printed a variation on the story in a noncommunist Paris newspaper quoting a nonexistent letter from British Prime Minister Macmillan to President Kennedy warning the latter against the generals. This variation was then picked up by Tass and Moscow Radio and given further dissemination. Thereafter, Moscow Radio telephoned the Washington "Post" and asked about a reference to the CIA Algerian allegations in the "Post's" "Letters to the Editor." The Russian read the letter back to the employee at the "Post" who merely verified that such a letter had been received and printed. On 5-5-61 the telephone conversation which had been recorded was broadcast by Moscow Radio to Soviet listeners. Obviously, the tape recording the call had been doctored to include long propaganda statements by the Soviet inquirer. During the past four years 32 phony documents purporting to be written to or by U.S. Government officials have been printed by Soviet, East German and other bloc agencies in various newspapers. The most frequently used is "Neues Deutschland" in East Berlin, which is suspected as a propaganda organ because it is the official paper of the East German Socialist Unity Party (SED). Another favorite for planted documents and propaganda stories is the newspaper "Blitz" in Bombay, India. The Soviet Committee of State Security (KGB) has an outlet in the newspaper "Mirror" in Burma. This paper was used during a period of negotiation between the U.S. and Indonesia for the publication of a false intelligence report "proving" U.S. support of Indonesian rebels against the Indonesian Government.

During 1960 and 1961 the bloc has distributed a pamphlet purporting to come from "African Friends Association," a nonexistent organization. This pamphlet has been widely distributed in Africa and purports to set forth in text and pictures atrocities currently perpetrated against Negroes in the U.S.



WASHINGTON, D. C .-- The Soviet Union is engaged in an ambitious propaganda campaign utilizing forged documents designed to look as though they had been written by or to officials of the American government, according to testimony of a Central Intelligence Agency official released today by the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee.

Richard Helms, assistant director of CIA, told the Subcommittee in closed-session testimony taken June 2 that the agency has "discovered no fewer than 32 forged documents" during the past four years. The published hearing is titled, "Communist Forgeries."

Latest example was the false rumor that the Algerian generals' revolt was supported by NATO, the Pentagon, and CIA.

All 32 of the forged documents are printed in the hearing transcript with Helms' testimony.

Helms said the Algerian revolt rumor was published first in a Rome daily called Il Pagse, which purports to be an independent newspaper, but chviously serves Communist ends. From there it was picked up by Pravda and subsequently spread into France and other European countries -- and then over the world.

"We found," said Helms, "that each Soviet forgery is manufactured and spread according to a plan. Each is devised and timed to mesh with other techniques of psychological warfare in support of Soviet strategy."

He said the analysis showed three main purposes: First, to discredit the West generally, and the United States and its government specifically, in the eyes of the rest of the world. Second, to sow suspicion and discerd among the Western allies, and especially between the United States and its friends. And third, to drive a wedge between the peoples of non-Communist countries and their governments by fostering the line that the governments do not represent their citizens because they are the puppets of the United States.

Of the 32 examples given by Helms, he noted that only 11 were openly launched by the Communist bloc. "The remaining 21, like cowbird's eggs slipped into other nests, were hatched in places that had no visible ties to the Communist world," Helms said.

An example of documentary deception surfaced by a known Communist organ, Helms said, is a forgery attributed by its authors to Nelson Rockefeller. In February 1957, an East German Communist newspaper published several pages of what purported to be a letter in the "original" English from Rockefeller to President Eisenhower.

"The letter spelled out a cynical plan for American manipulation of military and economic aid in order to gain domination of the world," Helms said.

Of the 32 forged documents packaged to look like communications to or from American officials, 22 were meant to "demonstrate imperialist American plans and ambitions. Of these, 17 asserted U. S. interference in the affairs of the Communist-selected free world countries."

Some of the documents were never publicized, Helms said. An example was a letter in 1958 insulting the Shah of Iran supposedly written by the Secretary of State to Ambassador Chapin in Iran. It was channeled directly into the Iranian government.

Helms pointed out that not all Communist forgeries are attributed to the U.S. government. Several have been disguised as official documents of other pro-Western administrations.

Another technique is inventing of false intelligence reports designed to influence the policies of Free World governments.

The most recent technique, launched only last year, is warping a genuine American document to Communist purposes. The document used was a background study on U.S. foreign policy in Africa prepared at Northwestern University for the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. "They did not actually change some of the sentences in it. . .the body of the document was as originally printed, but they lifted certain key sentences and paragraphs out of context," Helms said.

Sometimes the forgeries are attributed to "phantom" organizations. Helms said a current "phantom" document is attributed to a group of American Negroes dubbed "African Friends Association."

"The pamphlet overflows with horror pictures and atrocity stories about the treatment of Negroes in America. . The leaflet first appeared in Africa last November and it is still being circulated there. Thus far, it has turned up in 16 African countries. A French edition is making the rounds in the French-speaking areas...Technical analysis of the pamphlet has shown that it was printed in Eastern Europe, probably in East Germany," Helms said.

Helms was born March 30, 1913 at St. Davids, Pennsylvania, ke attended Carteret Academy, Orange, New Jersey, (a prep school), private schools in Germany and Switzerland and graduated from Williams College in 1935. He served as Lieutenant Commander in the U. S. Navy from July 1, 1942, until March 19, 1946. During this particular period he was assigned to the Office of Strategic Services (OSS). He has been employed with CIA and its predecessor organization, the Central Intelligence Group, from October 20, 1946, to the present date. Prior to World War II he was a newspaperman and was connected with the "Indianapolis Times" and United Press. He is married to Julia Helms who is the former wife of Frank Shields, President of the Barbasol Company.

In May, 1947, the Bureau initiated an investigation (Security Matter - C) of Helms on the basis of a letter sent to Thomas D'Alesandro Jr., former member of Congress. by \_\_\_\_\_\_ of Fairfax, California. He had discussed "The FBI Story" by Don Whitehead with the Director at the Liaison Party on December 4, 1956, and the Director subsequently autographed a copy of "The FBI Story" for Helms' teenaged son who was described as a great admirer of the Director.

Helms made a speech on world communism at the conference of the International Association of Chiefs of Police in Honolulu in September, 1957. The speech contained favorable reference to FBI cooperation with CIA. (62-35717-1633)

By memorandum dated November 29, 1961, a summary concerning CIA was prepared for the Director for his assistance in a meeting which was to be held with Mr. McCone. Helms was described as having been cooperative with the Bureau but we were not in a position to thoroughly evaluate his over-all capabilities. (62-80750-3882)

Over the years we have not had reason to maintain frequent contact with Helms. However, in all of our dealings with him he has been friendly and cooperative.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

He stated he wanted my evaluation as to the man's weaknesses and strengths. The President stated that Clark Clifford thinks highly of J. Patrick Coyne and the people with whom he has to work and he, the President, wants to put them up as to ages, experience, training, et cetera.

Mr. Belmont's Office has been instructed to handle the above.

The President continued that there is another matter which is really not in  $\frac{1}{100}$  field but he guessed there was nothing with which I had not had some experience, but he had seven names for Ambassadors. One he did not think was the proper time to sentiup, but there were six others and he wanted me to look at these six again; that the Bureau still has investigations running on them. He stated an evaluation could be made and Mr. DeLoach could go over to the White House and give him, the President, my reactions. The President indicated he would have Marvin Watson call Mr. DeLoach and furnish him the name of the six individuals. SUBJECT: RESIGNATION OF WILLIAM F. RABORN AS DIRECTOR OF THE CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY

> News media has announced today that Admiral Raborn has resigned as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). On the afternoon of 6-18-66 Liaison learned the following from Howard Osborn, Director of Security, CIA:

The resignation of Admiral Raborn has come as quite a surprise to high officials within that Agency. As of 5:15 last evening, there was no indication at the Agency that Admiral Raborn had any intention of resigning. Osborn had a conversation with Mr. Richard Helms, Deputy Director, CIA, late afternoon of 6-17-66 at which time Helms gave no indication he was aware of Raborn's decision. Osborn is of the opinion that Helms did not know as of that time that Raborn planned to resign.

Although officials at CIA have no idea as to the reason for Raborn's decision, Osborn speculates that Raborn's decision results from a personal conflict between the President and Raborn. News media have indicated Raborn's decision to resign may have resulted from a conflict between Raborn and Senator Fulbright, Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Of the two possibilities, Liaison is of the belief Rayborn's resignation results from a personal conflict with the President rather than a conflict over members of Fulbright's committee having membership on the committee which oversees CIA operations.

Helms was born March 30, 1915, at Saint Davids, Pennsylvania. He served as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Navy from July, 1942, until March, 1946, during which time he was assigned to the Office of Strategic Services (OSS). He has been employed with CIA and its predecessor organization, the Central Intelligence Group, from October 20, 1946, to the present date. Prior to World War II, he was a newspaperman and was connected with the "Indianapolis Times" and with the United Press. Yesterday evening, Mr. Bill Moyers, Press Secretary to the President, called me by phone and stated the President had asked him to get in touch with me relative to a situation concerning Director Richard Heims of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA).

Mr. Moyers told me that Helms had written a letter to the St. Louis Globe-Democrat praising an editorial appearing in that paper entitled, "Brickhat for Fulbright."

Mr. Moyers stated that Helms had been hared into appearing before the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations, of which Senator Fulbright is Chairman, this morning and the President desired that I get in touch with Mr. Helms and give him some advice and counsel as to how to handle himself so as to avoid the greatest embarrassment.

I communicated with Mr. Helms by telephone last evening and advised him of the request of the President for me to talk to him about his appearance before the Fulbright Committee this morning. I stated that as he, Mr. Helms, well knew, Senator Fulbright controlled the Committee by a substantial majority and that my advice to him, Mr. Helms, would be to have someone in his organisation who might know Senator Mundt and Senator Hickenlooper, contact these Senators to ask questions that would bring out the basic facts as both Senator Mundt and Senator Hickenlooper were considered favorable to CIA.







PERSONAL HISTORY DATA: Star

Alelms was born March 30, 1915, at Saint Davids, Pennsylvania, attended Carteret Academy, New Jersey, private schools in Europe and graduated from Williams College in 1935. He served in the U. S. Navy from July, 1942, until March, 1946, during which period he was also assigned to the Office of Strategic Services (OSS). He has been employed with CIA and its predecessor organization, the Central Intelligence Group, since October, 1946. Prior to World War II he was a newspaperman and was connected with the Indianapolis Times and the United Press. He is married to Julia Helms, the former wife of Frank Shields, President of the Barbasol Company.

During the period 1946 - 1950 Helms handled various intelligence assignments in foreign countries and was considered a specialist on Germany. He came to CIA Headquarters in 1950 and immediately became one of the key officials in the organization. In February, 1962, John McCone appointed Helms to serve as Deputy Director of Plans. He became Deputy Director of the Agency in April, 1965, when Raborn succeeded McCone. He was sworn in as Director of CIA on June 30, 1966.

#### **RELATIONSHIP WITH BUREAU:**

We have had occasion to deal with Helms on numerous matters for a period of approximately 15 years. The relationship has been friendly and cordial. He has been cooperative and very definitely careful not to become involved in any conflicts with the Bureau. He has a very significant respect for the Director.

We do have one glaring example of an uncalled-for breach of security which has affected relations between the two Agencies. Early in September, 1966, we developed information indicating that Senator Robert C. Byrd (D - WV) was in possession of Bureau documents and that everything indicated that this material may have come from CIA. The facts were given to CIA and we made it emphatically clear to Helms that unless the Agency could prove to our satisfaction that it

was not involved, we were lodging a strong protest. To Helms' credit we did not get mere lip service because he immediately initiated an investigation and the Agency has determined that two of its employees were involved in the submission of a name check request to the Bureau and the subsequent receipt of Bureau information which was passed on to "persons outside of CIA." CIA is continuing its interrogation of the employees and we are awaiting details concerning the identity of the person or persons involved outside of CIA.

Although the information involved in the foregoing instance was not of a sensitive nature, this does not minimize the gravity of the situation when one recognizes the potential for such gross mishandling of security.

#### CURRENT ASSESSMENT OF BUREAU BUSINESS:

The volume of communications (reports, memoranda, letters, teletypes) between the Bureau and CIA is approximately four times as large as it was in 1955. Both Agencies have become involved in numerous sensitive operations particularly in the Soviet field. The operations have been of such a nature to require efficient coordination. New approaches and techniques by the Soviets have hit both Agencies. We have been able to handle all business with CIA, some of which has been extremely delicate, with a minimum of conflicts.

#### **REPUTATION:**

The appointment of Helms as Director of CIA was generally well received within the Agency because he was the first Director who came to that position from the ranks. He has been referred to as a professional intelligence officer fully qualified for his job. He has his critics who sometimes have referred to him as a "smoothy" or an "Ivy League dandy." He can be easily underestimated because he does operate very quietly behind the scenes. He has numerous connections in Congress, in the journalistic world and in high levels of both political parties. From all indications officials in the "U. S. intelligence community" have accepted Helms with an outlook of "wait and see."

#### STATUS AT WHITE HOUSE:

He is completely subservient to the President and has been going to extremes to avoid irritating the President

in any manner whatsoever. He has established what appears to be a good working relationship with Bill Moyers.

#### HIS PROBLEMS:

Helms got off to a bad start as Director of CIA as a result of some adverse publicity which has not ceased. Shortly after he became Director, a letter was sent from CIA over Helms' signature to the St. Louis Globe Democrat which was somewhat critical of Senator Fulbright. The newspaper published the letter and Helms immediately was the target of widespread criticism for becoming involved in political business. He ended up by apologizing to Fulbright.

Not long after, one of his employees, Hans Tofte, went to the press and the television media criticizing CIA for illegally searching his home, using Gestapo police tactics, etc. CIA had learned that Tofte had collected a large volume of classified material which he had been keeping in his home. Agency employees went into the house and confiscated the material which led to Tofte's complaint including the charge that \$20,000 of jewelry had disappeared. Tofte is now attacking the Agency as being badly disorganized and generally incompetent.

Helms, of course, has inherited problems which have been with CIA since its inception. This includes many deficiencies resulting from tremendous administrative superstructure, lack of sufficient discipline, and continued presence of misfits.

Every CIA Director has had to live with the headaches which go with U. S. involvement in political action activities in foreign countries. Helms is no exception. The classic goof by CIA in this area was the Bay of Pigs fiasco. Under Helms, CIA's political action activity has been considerably restricted pursuant to orders from the White House. Nevertheless, the Agency is still involved in various countries and is, therefore, always vulnerable to potential embarrassment and criticism on the charge of being part of the "invisible government."

CIA is a regular target of propaganda attacks by the Soviets and communists throughout the world. These attacks are taking place through the press, radio, books, etc.

Much of the material is fabricated. All of this concerns Helms because he personally has become a key target. He possibly could make reference to this particular item when he meets with the Director.

CIA is continually under heavy pressure to produce high quality intelligence in areas such as Cuba and North Vietnam. It is our assessment that CIA has not been able to deliver with any outstanding effectiveness. The Agency has not been successful in infiltrating those areas with measurable success.

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS:**

It is possible that CIA has made some significant score in an intelligence operation which has not come to the attention of the Bureau. Based on information coming to our attention, there has been no unusual accomplishment by the Agency since Helms became Director in June, 1966. CIA does continue to collect highly valuable intelligence through sophisticated coverage such as high altitude photography. This goes on in collaboration with the Air Force.

### CIA ACTIVITIES IN THE UNITED STATES:

In 1964 we initiated discussions with CIA concerning the establishment of ground rules relative to the Agency's activities in the United States. These rules were instituted and have been refined to some extent. We have had a minimum of differences or conflicts.

> Richard Helms met with the Director on 10/14/56. Present was Liaison Agent Papich.

There was a general discussion concerning the President's trip to the Pacific and the Director expressed concern for the President's safety in view of the wide exposure to Asiatic types who would not hesitate to sacrifice their lives in order to carry out a mission. Helms was particularly concerned about security problems in Manila. The Director referred to the valuable cooperation the Bureau is receiving from countries in the travel area where we have National Academy graduates.

The Director briefly reviewed the problems faced by the Bureau in handling technical surveillances. He emphasized that the Bureau always has been very direct and specific when presenting its position on this particular subject. He commented regarding the need of technical coverage to "fight fire with fire," but he very clearly stressed that it was necessary to maintain a control whereby approval is granted in each case from an appropriate authority such as the Attorney General.

Helms referred to the case of the Bureau information which was leaked to Senator Byrd of West Virginia and which involved CIA employees. Helms apologized for the uncalled-for activity and stated that the "culprits" had been identified and that appropriate disciplinary action was to be initiated.

### Memorandum Brennan to Sullivan RE: RICHARD HELMS DIRECTOR, CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY (CIA) MEETING WITH THE DIRECTOR, 10/14/66

The CIA Director referred to CIA's problems emanating from the Hans Tofte case. Tofte is the former CIA employee who has been denouncing CIA and has been publicly commenting concerning the Agency's activities. The Director stated that unauthorized disclosure of classified information has always been a perplexing problem; that it was absolutely wrong; and that there was a need for appropriate legislation.

There was a general discussion concerning the threat of Soviet Intelligence, Soviet propaganda attacks against the Bureau and CIA, the value of double agents and the lack of honesty and objectivity by some newspapers and columnists.

Helms later informed Agent Papich that the meeting was a highlight in his career. He was most impressed with the Director's vigor, his articulate presentation on several difficult problems and his up-to-date knowledge on a variety of significant matters. Helms expressed the hope that he could see the Director from time to time because he felt that discussions coupled with the Director's vast experience and unusual insight into problems served as extremely valuable assistance to him. Helms was very grateful to have the opportunity to be photographed with the Director.

Richard Helms furnished the following to the Liaison Agent on March 7, 1968:

On the evening of March 6, 1968, Helms attended a reception at the Iranian Embassy. While engaged in a conversation with Senator Symington, Soviet Ambassador Dobrynin came up and greeted the Senator. Symington introduced Helms, and a few moments later Helms quietly left the two.

On the afternoon of March 7, 1968, Maxine Cheshire, Society Editor for "The Washington Post," contacted Senator Symington and told him that she had seen the Senator, Helms, and the Soviet Ambassador together at the Iranian Embassy affair. Miss Cheshire inquired if this was the first meeting between Helms and Dobrynin. The Senator told her that as far as he knew Helms may have met Dobrynin at some other social gathering. The Senator wanted to call this to Helms's attention since he received the impression that Miss Cheshire may have had in mind to write some kind of article emphasizing the significance of Helms's meeting with Dobrynin.

Helms advised that he has seen Dobrynin at other affairs, but this was the first time that he was introduced to the Soviet Ambassador. He stated that he did not engage in any conversation with the Soviet.



Helms advised Liaison Agent July 16, 1969, that briefings and discussions disclosed: (1) the similarities in the history and development of the New Left in the United States  $\cdot$  and in Europe, (2) the tremendous and often underestimated influence  $\lambda$ of mass communication media (TV, radio, newspapers, etc.), (3) no intelligence service produced evidence that New Left leaders or organizations were dominated or controlled by communist bloc intelligence services or by a communist party; Cuban intelligence ser vice in France did have contact with students but not to the extent of being a dominating influence, (4) police in Europe have learned that most riots can be prevented or controlled by having adequate advance intelligence information and then moving in with massive manpower, (5) no evidence that New Left groups and leaders are being financed by communist bloc countries. Money coming from wealthy donors, affluent parents of leaders, and fund collection drives, (6) Soviets do not find it necessary to employ any extensive machinery to achieve results because social and political conditions A in all countries offer the necessary ingredients for development of 8 student agitation, (7) all intelligence services agree that employment of technical surveillances, mail coverage, etc. are necessary GINAL techniques.

### PERMIS:

Richard Helms, Director, CIA, recently returned from a three-week trip to Europe, where he conferred with intelligence chiefs in Great Britain, Germany, France, Switzerland, and Holland. He was afforded extensive briefings among which included the subject of the New Left. You may be interested in the following comments which were volunteered by Helms to the Liaison Agent on July 16, 1969.

The briefings brought out two very distinctive factors, namely, (1) the similarities in the history and the development of New Left activities in Europe and in the United States, (2) the tremendous and usually underestimated influence of mass communication media (TV, radio, newspapers, etc.). Helms explained that most of the universities in Europe are experiencing the same problems as our institutions in the United States and most of the student leaders come from affluent sectors of European society. A riot or demonstration taking place in one country is being viewed on TV by students in another country. It is not necessary for radical groups to set up elaborate means of communicating needed knowledge when practically all of the significant information is being visually transmitted to several countries. This even includes the revelation of techniques being employed on the streets to disrupt local law enforcement. In each country where Helms visited, the authorities emphasized the failure of the average citizen to fully appreciate the significance of mass media influence.

In the countries visited, Helms did not receive any evidence whatsoever indicating that New Left leaders or organizations were being dominated or controlled by communist bloc intelligence services or by any communist party. In Paris he was told that the Cuban intelligence service through its propaganda and contacts did get involved with French students but never to the point of affording any control or direction.

Police services in all of the countries were unanimous in concluding practically all riots can be prevented or rapidly placed under control if (1) adequate advance intelligence information is obtained regarding preparations for the meeting and (2) the police make certain that they appear in the area with "mass manpower."

None of the intelligence services have come up with any evidence to clearly show that New Left leaders or organizations are being financed by any communist bloc country. Experience so far shows that the funds are coming from donations from wealthy supporters, from affluent parents of some of the leaders, and from fund collection drives sponsored by various organizations.

With regard to the position of the Soviet Government, Helms was told that so far it has not been necessary for the Soviets to set up any elaborate, clandestine machinery for the promotion of the New Left disruption activity. The intelligence chiefs all agree that the social and political conditions in all of the countries provide all the necessary ingredients for fomenting unrest, and it is only necessary for the Soviets to follow and profit from the developments. The intelligence services agree that the Soviets undoubtedly are looking at radical students as potential recruits and indirectly they must be affording some guidance. It was stressed to Helms that conditions do not make it necessary for the Soviets to expend a lot of manpower or to show their hand; so much is taking place without the assistance or involvement of the Russians.

Helms learned that the foreign services have been slow in appreciating the significance of the threat of black nationalists such as the Black Panthers. Most of the foreigners look at the

Black Panthers as strictly a U.S. problem, and there has been a reluctance to become actively involved in coverage of these individuals when they travel to the various European countries. Helms is hoping that he can improve this situation through the various CIA offices.

Wherever Helms traveled, it was agreed that for any intelligence or internal security service to acquire the intelligence information needed, it was absolutely necessary to employ techniques such as technical surveillances, mail coverage, etc. This is no problem in Europe because most countries application of such techniques is considered an elementry tool for the internal security service involved.

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## Prosecution **Of Helms Ruled** Out

By Bob Woodward Washington Post Staff Writer The Justice Department announced yesterday that former Central Intelligence Agency Director Richard M. fielms and others will not be prosecuted for their roles in a 1971 break-in at a Fairfax photo studio.

Helms' attorney, Edward Bennett Williams, said afterward that the Justice Department decision means the current CIA director, George Bush, has the right to approve break-ins if he deems them necessary to protect national security. Williams applauded the

move not to prosecute Helms as "an unusually smart decision" and noted that the 1947 National Security Act imposed an obligation on the CIA director to protect security.

"If the government has a right to conduct electronic surveillance," Williams said, "then it has a right to make surreptitious entry."

He said that Helms believes the law should be changed so that the CIA director does not have such power.

Informed sources in the Department re Justice ported last month that they expected Helms to be prosecuted on a misdemeanor charge after he acknowledged that he personally approved the break-in to gather information about a former CIA employee suspected of a security violation.

The Justice Department investigation involved the Feb. 19, 1971, break-in at the now-defunct Roland Studio on the second floor of 10419 Main St. in Fairfax City. Three Fairfax City policemen apparently cooperated by ensuring that no one interrupted the CIA break-in team.

The Justice Department was prepared to take the matter to the grand jury for prosecution last month be-

fore department attorneys began a series of three meetings with Williams, according to government sources.

In an unusual press release—the Justice Department rarely announces a decision not to prosecute—Attorney General Edward H. Levi said the department. concluded that the case did not meet a Supreme Court standard set in a 1945 decision.

The standard, according the press release, would require the Justice Department to show that Helms "willfully' deprived an individual of a specific and welldefined constitutional right" by approving the break-in-

Justice Department sources said that Helms clearly thought he had the authority to approve a break-in and did so to complete a security investigation of Deborah Fitzgerald, who ran the photo studio.

"It was imposible to prove he (Helms) had intent to violate anyone's civil rights," one Justice Department source said yesterday. "It is regretable that this puts him out of reach of the law and many seem to be an endorsement of breaking and entering," the source added.

The 1947 law setting up the CIA says, "The director of central intelligence shall be responsible for protecting intelligence sources and methods from unauthorized disclosure."

Under this law Justice Department attorness said they felt Heims reald rea-

sonably argue the protection required extraordinary means.

On the other hand, the attorneys said, there was evidence indicating the breakin was approved to close out the security violation investigation and the CIA had no evidence that the national security was in immediate danger.

The photo studio was run by Fitzgerald and Orlando Nunez, a former middlelevel official in the Castro government in Cuban.

Sources said that both were under CIA surveillance after Fitzgerald, while working in the records division of the CIA, tried to

find out what CIA files existed on Nunez, Fitzgerald and Nunez have since married and separated.

Levi said that the decision not to prosecute Helms, now ambassador to Iran, was based on recommendations of Deputy Attorney General Harold R. Tyler Jr. and Assistant Attorney General J. Stanley Pottinger, head of the Civil Rights Division and in charge of the investigation.

The break-in, but not Helms' role in it, was first publicly revealed last year by a presidential commission headed by Vice President Rockefeller in a report on CIA abuses

The Justice Department did not specify others who would not be prosecuted in the Fairfax breakin, but reliable sources said that Rich. and Ober, a CIA official now assigned to the National Security Council, was one of those under investigation in the case.

A separate Justice Department investigation into possible perjury by Helms is continuing. This investigation focuses on Helme sworn testimony deny as CIA role in domesic surveillance and in providing covert support to curtain political testimos in testing


Following the regularly scheduled meeting of the United States Intelligence Board this morning, Mr. Helms called a short Executive Session. His purpose was to advise members regarding his future in view of the extensive speculation appearing in the newspapers regarding his leaving the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). Helms stated that he plans to retire in the very near future although he gave no specific date. It is to be noted that Helms will be 60 years old in March of 1973. He has enforced a rule making It mandatory that employees retire from active service with CIA upon reaching the age of 60.

Helms noted that he has absolutely no idea who might succeed him as the Director of CIA other than that which he reads in the newspaper. He stated he has had no conversation with the President and has no idea when an announcement will be made. He did state that the issues discussed in the newspaper regarding his disagreements with Dr. Kissinger are completely false, and that minutes of the United States Intelligence Board meetings would clearly show he had no substantive disagreements with Dr. Kissinger.

It cannot be determined from the report whether or not he is identical with William L. Cary, applicant's friend. It is noted that applicant's friend has a middle initial L. and is a professor of law at Northwestern University, whereas a review of the report of Special Agent John A. Swartz dated April 18, 1944 in the Washington Bookshop investigation reflects that the William Cary who is in the Washington Bookshop resides at 237 Park Street, Newton, Massachusetts.

On page five information is set out that Edward F. Pritchard was on the membership list of the American Peace Mobilization. Nothing is set out to identify this Pritchard as being the same Edward Pritchard mentioned as a friend of the applicant.

On page seven there is set out information that Mrs. Thomas W. Holland was on the membership list of the Washington Committee for Democratic Action. The implication is that Mrs. Thomas W. Holland is identical with Mrs. Varian W. Holland whose comments regarding her friendship with the applicant and his wife are set forth in the report. However, this identity is not definitely established.

Regarding the three above-mentioned situations, it is requested that you attempt to definitely establish the questioned identities by a thorough review of field office files, use of other sources readily available in the field office such as the City Directory, Telephone Directory, and any other means which do not entail an extensive investigation. In the case of Pritchard, it is felt that reference to the Martindale Hubbell may aid in establishing the identity.

On page six there is set out information regarding 7. Graham Claytor to the effect that he was registered with the Secretary of State pursuant to the Act of June 8, 1938 as amended. However, no statement is made regarding the principal for whom Claytor registered. This information should be obtained from the State Department.

Mr. HARRY FIORY, Foreign News Manager, UNITED PRESS ASSOCIATIONS, 220 East 42nd Street, New York City, stated that he was European manager of UNITED FRESS during the period, 1935 to 1937, when theapplicant was a staff correspondent in Germany. Mr. FIORY was unable to locate a record showing exact dates of the applicant's employment but recalled that the applicant covered the Olympic Games in Berlin in 1936. Mr. FIORY stated that the applicant was taken on by UP through his friendship with GEORGE HAWKINS, son of the Chairman of the Board of SCRIPPS HOWAFD newspapers. He also advised that the applicant's superior in Germany was FRED OECHSNER, Central European News Manager, who is now in Washington, B. C. Mr. FIORY stated that he personally, had a great liking for the applicant and considered him to be an average American college boy. He added that he knew nothing unfavorable concerning his loyalty or patriotism, although he emphasized that he has not seen the applicant since 1937.

#### REFERENCES:

I'r. ALLEN W. DULLES, attorney, 48 Wall Street, New York City, stated he has known the applicant for about three years and that the applicant served under him in the OSS during the war. Mr. DULLES stated that he was very closely associated with HELMS for a period of three months in Germany in 1945 and watched his work during the remainder of his service overseas. Mr. DULLES stated that he considered the applicant to be of excellent character and reputation and would trust him implicitly with any confidential position. He added that HELMS is definitely a loyal and patriotic citizen and as far as he knows has never been connected with any un-American groups or individuals.

Mr. JOHN W. GARDNER, Executive Associate, CARNEGIE CORPORATION, 522 5th Avenue, New York City, stated that he has known HELMS since 1943 when they were both with the OSS and shared office space in Washington, D.C. Mr. GARDNER stated that he went overseas in September, 1944 and did not see HELMS again until the end of the war. Since then, he advised, their friendship has continued and they have visited frequently both in Washington and New York.

Mr. GARDNER stated that he would recommend the applicant in the highest possible terms, that he has great respect for his ability, integrity, loyalty and patriotism and has never known him to have any foreign sympathies or to have been associated with anti-merican groups or movements.

Mr. GARDNER stated that he has only a casual acquaintance with the applicant's wife and has been unable to form any opinions concerning her.

Mr. MANK FERREE, Assistant General Business Manager, Scripps Howard Newspapers, 230 Park Avenue, New York City, advised that he was formerly Business Manager of the Indianapolis Times and was closely associated with HEIMS from 1937 to 1942 when the latter was advertising manager of the paper. Mr. FERFEE described the applicant as a hard-working, ambitious and conscientious individual who takes great pride in his work and strives to do a good job in all his undertakings. He stated that HEIMS' character and reputation are excellent and his patriotism and loyalty above reproach.

Mr. FERREE stated that the applicant's wife, whose maiden name was JULIA BRETZMANN, was formerly married and divorced from FRANK SHIELDS, president of the BARBASOL COMPANY of Indianap olis. SHIELDS is now deceased. Mr. FERREE stated that although he did not know the details or reason for the divorce, it was a well known fact that SHIELDS drank heavily. According to Mr. FERREE, the BRETZMANN family are socially prominent in Indianapolis.

He also served as Editor-in-Chief of both the college year book and the undergraduate organ. He was recorded as having been born at St. David's, Pennsylvania, on March 30, 1913. His prior educational background was given as the Institute Le Rosey, Rolle, Switzerland, from 1929 to 1930, and under a private tutor from 1930 to 1931.

A certification from the Institute La Rosey, Rolle, Switzerland, reflected that the applicant had attended that school from September, 1929, to July, 1930. He studied academic subjects and was highly recommended by the principal of the Institute, Mr. H. CARNAL. The college files contained no verification of the applicant's alleged attendance at the Realgymnasium, Freiburg, Germany.

The 1935 issue of the "Gulielmensian", Williams College year book, set forth that in the class election the applicant was the choice of his classmates for the following designations:

- 1. The class member who had done the most for Williams
- 2. The most respected class member
- 3. Most brilliant class member (3rd choice)
- 4. Most versatile (2nd choice)
- 5. Most likely to succeed
- 6. Class politician
- 7. Had biggest drag with the faculty (2nd choice)

### REFERENCE

JOHN C. GEILFUSS, an attorney in the firm of Herrick, Smith, Donald, Farley and Ketchum, 1 Federal Street, Boston, Mass., has been well acquainted with the applicant since they entered Williams College together as classmates, graduating in 1935. He was in close association with HELMS during college years, being in the same class, fraternities, honor societies, and extracurricular activities. He has been in constant correspondence with HELMS and during the war lived with HELMS in Washington, D. C. for a period of time when both were in the service. During the college years HELMS was recognized as being the outstanding man in the class and in his senior year was President of his class, President of Gargoyle, an honor society, and recognized as a good scholar. Upon graduation, HELMS entered employment with the United Press as a staff correspondent in Europe, serving primarily in Berlin. After about two years in this type of work HELMS decided that the future for foreign correspondents was decidedly limited and thereupon

returned to the United States and took employment with the Scripps-Howard chain of newspapers, specifically as the Advertising Manager of the paper in Indianapolis. He remained in this employment until 1942, when he entered the United States Navy as a Lieutenant (jg), assigned to ONI, New York City. Since his separation from the service, HELMS has been employed by the Central Intelligence Group in Washington, D. C.

According to GEILFUSS, HELMS is the highest calibre gentleman of his acquaintance. He is thoroughly honest, reliable, trustworthy, sincere and conscientious. His loyalty to the United States is above reproach. GEILFUSS has on numerous occasions discussed domestic and international politics and ideologies with HELMS and at no time during these discussions has HELMS voiced any opinion contrary to the recognized policy of the United States Government. He is in full sympathy with the ideologies of the United States and GEILFUSS is firm in his statement that there was no trace of any other political ideals in HELMS' mind as expressed by his conversational thoughts.

Both GEILFUSS and HELKS were classmates of one CARL MARZANI, who was convicted in May 1947, while an employee of the United States State Department, on the charge of withholding his affiliation with the Communist Party. According to GEILFUSS, HELMS never associated particularly with MARZANI and never voiced acquiescence to MARZANI's ideas which, during the latter's college years, were radical. HELMS was not at all sympathetic to MARZANI at the time of his conviction. A letter was circularized to all graduates of Williams College in the Class of 1935 by one SWEEZY, a lecturer at Harvard, petitioning clemency for MARZANI, and it is known to GEILFUSS that HELMS was not in accord with these views as expressed in this letter.

HEIMS is a man who could be trusted with any type of confidential mission or information. The financial background of HEIMS' family is such that the applicant does not work for the Government out of necessity, rather he likes public service and the type of work in which he is currently engaged and has decided to make it his career. GEILFUSS desires to give HEIMS the highest type of recommendation possible.

### MISCELLANEOUS

JOHN F. DINGWALL, forrer-Special-Agent-of\_the\_Federal Bureau of Investigation, 161 Devonshire Street, Boston, Mass., was contacted. He stated that he graduated from Williams College in the Class of 1937 and has advised that he was acquainted with the applicant in college and recalls him to be very well thought of at the time and to be exceptionally active in college affairs

and functions. HEIMS' sister is married to a very close friend of DINGWALL's, one Dr. HAWN, who is known to DINGWALL as a high-type gentleman. HEIMS was two years ahead of DINGWALL in college and at the time DINGWALL was well acquainted with him and advised that the applicant was of the highest type in every respect. DINGWALL has not had any close association with HEIMS since graduation from college and recalls that while at college HEIMS was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Gargoyle, an honor society, and active in several other campus activities.

DINGWALL is well acquainted with JOHN C. GEILFUSS, a Reference, and knows him to be a fine man and presently a practicing attorney in the City of Boston.

DINGWALL recalls that HEIMS was a classmate of CARL A. MARZANI, who on May 15, 1947, was convicted as a State Department official on eleven counts of failing to disclose his Communist Party affiliation in the Federal loyalty test. DINGWALL recalled that MARZANI was also a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Gargoyle, which latter society in 1935 had 22 members which met weekly. MARZANI was an agitator type in college and active in many extra-curricular activities, however, DINGWALL recalls that HEIMS was not especially friendly with MARZANI but of necessity was associated with him to some degree due to the smallness of Williams College and the club-like atmosphere of its various groups and functions.

Mr. FREDERICK C. COPELAND, Director of Admissions, Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., and a classmate of the applicant, recalled the applicant as an outstanding member of the Class of 1935. He described HELMS as a very popular student, of excellent character and associates, and one whose conduct and expressions never gave rise to any question about his loyalty to the United States.

Mr. WHITNEY S. STODDARD, Art Instructor and member of the Class of 1935, Williams College, described the applicant as a high-ranking member of his class, a man of excellent associations, and one whose character, integrity, and loyalty were on a high plane. He stated that the applicant was a man who had traveled widely and recalled that after his graduation he served as a correspondent for the United Press in Germany in 1936. He advised that to his knowledge the applicant's foreign travel had not induced him toward sympathy for any foreign system of government.

Professor NELSON S. BUSHNELL, Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., recalled the applicant as an outstanding student of excellent character. He had no reason to doubt the applicant's loyalty to the United States.

D. E. WOODARD, Manager, Certified Credit Service, North Adams, Mass., advised that he had no references on the applicant.

Mrs. HELEN FERGUSON, Probation Officer, Williamstown, Mass., checked the arrest files of her office, with negative results.

The records of the Massachusetts Board of Probation, Boston, Mass., reflect that RICHARD HELMS, who was born March 30, 1913, St. David's, Pennsylvania, of 295 Tillow Street, South Orange, New Jersey, was fined, on June 5, 1935, in the amount of \$10, which he paid, for a violation of Section 116-A. It should be noted that this is a violation of the motor vehicle laws of the State of Massachusetts.

The Credit Bureau of Greater Boston, 52 Chauncy Street, Boston, Mass., had no record of the applicant.

They knew of nothing derogatory concerning HELMS or any member of his family.

#### NEIGHBORHOOD

All neighbors were specifically questioned regarding HELMS and his parents foreign sympathies, and all stated that they felt HELMS and his family had no foreign sympathies.

Mr. and Mrs. LARS HEADSTRCM, 378 Fairview Avenue, Orange, New Jersey, advised that the HELMS were fine neighbors and well thought of in the neighborhood. Mrs. HEADSTROM stated that she has known HELMS and his parents for about twenty years. Mr. HEADSTROM advised that he has been acquainted with HELMS for about eight years. Both advised that at that time they considered EELMS and his parents to be loyal Americans of excellent character, habits and associations and asserted that they knew nothing derogatory about them.

Mrs. D. C. FEISNER, 370 Fairview Avenue, Orange, New Jersey, was interviewed at the above address and Mr. D. C. FEISNER was interviewed at his place of business, 41 Lincoln Avenue, Orange, New Jersey. Both stated that they held HELMS and his parents in as high regard as the HEALSTRON s on all points mentioned above. Mrs. FEISNER stated she has been following HELMS' career since he was a young boy. Mr. FEISNER asserted that he was a teacher at the old Carteret Academy and taught HELMS' while he was there. Both stated that the only thing foreign about HELMS is that he speaks German fluently and was partially educated in Europe. Mr. and Mrs. FEISNER felt that there was no question of HELMS loyalty to the United States.

Mrs. FREDERICK A. SAMUELS, 315 Tillou Road, South Orange, New Jersey, advised that she has been a neighbor of the HELMS family for about four years and that she does not particularly like the family because of their aloofness. Mrs. SAMUELS said she does not know RICHARD HELMS but asserted that the other members of the family appear to be persons of good character and habits and that she has no reason to question their loyalty to the United States. She knew of nothing derogatory concerning them.

Mrs. WILLIAM RAPLOW, 305 Tillou Road, South Crange, New Jersey, advised that she has been in the neighborhood about two years and that she does not know RICHARD HELMS. She stated, however, that the EFLMS family are respected neighbors and as far as she can determine are persons of good character, habits and loyal Americans. Mrs. BAPLOW stated that she knew of nothing derogatory about the HELMS family.

Mrs. TFOMAS E. WARD, 284 Tillou Road, South Orange, stated he has known the HELMS family from five to seven years, but that she does not know RICHARD HELMS. She stated that she has heard of RICHARD HELMS and his

reputation is good as far as she can determine. Mrs. WARD stated that HELMS father is odd and that she does not particularly get along with him, but that HELMS mother and the rest of the family appear to be fine people. Mrs. WARD asserted that she actually does not know but feels that the family are loyal to the United States. Mrs. WARD did not feel in a position to comment on any foreign sympathies HELMS or his family might have, but stated that she was not aware of any.

Mr. PAUL J. CUPP, 556 Irving Terrace, South Orange, New Jersey, advised that he remembers HELMS living at 562 Irving Terrace for a short period but stated that he never did get a chance to meet him as HELMS was away most of the time. HELMS' parents attended the same church as CUPP in South Orange and they are very well thought of in that community. Mr. CUPP stated that he has known HELMS' parents for several years and feels that they are loyal Americans. Mr. CUPP further stated that HELMS and his wife were considered good neighbors and knew nothing derogatory of them. Mr. CUPP asserted that he could think of nothing that would lead him to believe that the HELMS family had any foreign sentiments.

Mrs. H. P. GREEN, 722 Berkley Avenue, South Orange, New Jersey, advised that she met HELMS on only one occasion, but that she knew of nothing derogatory concerning his character, habits, associates and leyalty to the United States.

Mrs. ANNA H. BALDWIN, 332 Lawnridge Road, South Orange, New Jersey, advised that she has known HELMS since he was a small boy and at one time gave him piano lessons. Mrs. BALDWIN stated that she thinks very highly of HELMS and his family but that she is not familiar with his activities in recent years as he has been away most of the time. Mrs. BALDWIN asserted that HELMS was a fine boy of upstanding principles and always eager to do the right thing and that she did not think he could go wrong. Mrs. BALDWIN advised that in her mind HELMS and his family are loyal Americans and persons of good character and habits of whom she knows of nothing derogatory.

The two last mentioned addresses are in the neighborhood of Irving Terrace.

### CREDIT

Records of the Credit Bureau of Greater Newark Incorporated, Newark, New Jersey, disclosed that the credit of HELMS as of June 21, 1946 and that of his father as of October 10, 1940 were satisfactory.

### POLICE

The records of the Orange and South Orange Police Departments were checked against the name of HELMS and his family with negative results.

Defendant filed the answer which denied every material allegation in plaintiff's complaint. A divorce decree was granted September 30, <u>1938 in favor of plaintiff, granting custody of children</u>, and \$75,000 alimony was granted with \$125 allowance per month for each child. \$20,000 in Barbasol stock was awarded plaintiff as agreed in pre-nuptial arrangements.

HOMER ELLIOFT, Martinsville, Indiana stated that he was attorney for the plaintiff in the divorce and that he knew her by reputation but that his personal contacts with her had been very slight. He stated that her reputation in the community was good; that she was known to have come from a reputable Indianapolic family; and to the best of his knowledge, she was a loyal American citizen.

JAMMS T. SARGENT, Secretary for the Barbasol Co., Indianapolis, a practicing attorney with offices at 207 Bankers' Trust Building, Indianapolis stated that he knew JULIA, the plaintiff in the divorce case, fairly well through his contacts with her husband, FRANK SHIELDS, President of the Barbasol Co. SARGENT stated that to the best of his knowledge, JULIA was a respected member of the community, was of good reputation and character, and he felt that she was innocent of any fault in her marriage. He stated that the divorce was the result of an argument between the couple.

FRED E. JOHNSON, 4115 N. Illinois St., Indianapolis stated that he knew applicant, RICHARD McGARRAH HELMS, very well through his contacts with the newspaper business in Indianapolis. It was in the home of Mr. JOHNSON that HELMS and JULIA, his present wife, were introduced. JOHNSON stated he has maintained close contact socially and in business affairs with applicant since they first met in 1937 and regards him as a very brilliant observer in the field of international politics. JOHNSON stated that there was no question in his mind of applicant's loyalty and stated that he was very well informed and very intelligent in his views reparding Amorica's part in international affairs. JOHNSON stated that he believed applicant cane from a very fine old American family and that there was nothing in his background, his past, or in any of his beliefs that could be b6 b7C

Mrs. CATHERINE B. GRIFFITH, 4014 Winthrop, stated that HELMS rented a room from her approximately one year and that he seems of excellent character, is honest, and sincere and made an ideal roomer. Mrs. GRIFFITH never heard anything or saw HELMS with any papers or literature that would cause her to doubt his loyalty as an American. She stated that she knows nothing of his associations or organizations to which he belongs. HELMS married a very nice woman, comes from a family with an outstanding reputation. She stated that she knows nothing of his qualifications or abilities but he seems very intelligent and agressive.

Mrs. CHARLES MORELAND, 402 East Fifty-ninth Street, stated that WELMS didn't associate with anyone when they lived in that neighborhood and she considered his wife to be a social snob. She stated that he married a woman who was very wealthy. She stated that HELMS seemed to be of good character and she had no reason to doubt his loyalty. She stated that the only thing unfavorable she knew about him was that his wife had a son by a former marriage, that he was very annoying in the neighborhood.

Mrs. FREDERICK B. CLINE, 5890 North New Jersey, stated that HELMS seemed honest and sincere and that she believed his associates were only the best. She stated that she never had any reason to doubt his loyalty and he seems to be of good character.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

The Indianapolis Police Department advised on February 18, 1942 that NOBLE BRETZMAN who is a brother of JULIA BRETZMAN HELMS was a radical sympathizer of Germany and HITLER. At the start of the war, he made the statement that he hoped the Germans would blow England off the map and was in favor of FITLER taking over all of Europe, throwing England clear out of the water, and letting HITLER run Europe the way it should be run. BRETZMAN had a copy of <u>Mein Kampf</u> which he kept on the coffee table at his apartment and used this about the same as anyone else would use a Bible. He always referred to this book for proof of anything he was talking about.

Mr. ANDREW HEPBURN, El Paso, Texas, a friend of BRETZMAN's advised Special Agent CHARLUS C. SPANN on December 17, 1942 that NOBLE BRETZMAN was definitely anti-British but was not pro-Cerman and is a loyal American DOn February 4, 1943 BPETZMAN voluntarily appeared at the Indianapolis office and was interviewed by Special Agent JOSPPH W. BICHMOND. BRETZMAN stated that he was not a lover of England and probably never would be. However, he stated that neither was he a German sympathizer. When FITLER came to power, he first thought HITLER was doing a good job ent prior to Pearl Harbor wanted to see Germany victorious over England. His belief was that the British Empire would fall regardless of the outcome of war. . However, as the war continued, his opinion with regard to HITLER and the Vazis changed. | HEPBUEN stated that at the time of Pearl Herbor, BRETZMAN was completely disillusioned in regard to HITLER and became strongly opposed to both HITLER and the Mazi Government and was very anxious for a victory for the United States. ( He pointed out that in January 1942 immediately after Pearl Harbor he volunteered for any emergency duty. He was called in July 1942 and became an air raid warden. He held this position two or three weeks prior to the interview when he was compelled to resign due to his position in the Indiana State Guard, which he joined in August 1942.





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Memorandum for Mr. A. Rosen

DETAILS:

An investigation is being conducted concerning at the request of the Central Intelligence Agency (UIA). CIA included a request that the Bureau interview Lee Davis Leuren, who day alleged to be in possession of some "interesting information" concorning . CIA also asked it be determined whether Leuren has any derogetory information concerning any other employees of CIA. Colonel Sheffield Edwards, Director of Security, Central Intelligence Agency, confidentially advised through Lesison channels that Leuren had indicated to a CIA official that he had been exployed by Senstor MeCerthy's office and had access to information in that office and he made it quite clear that the information he possessed was in the files of Senstor McCerthy.

By letter dated September 21, 1955, the Washington Field Office advised that Leuren had been interviewed and had said the only information he had concerning was hearsay and his cource was Donald Surine of Senstor MeConthris staff. Leuren said he had heard

The only other CIA employee concerning whom Leuren had information was Richard Helms. Leuren's source again was Surine. Lauren said he heard Helms was responsible more than anyone else within CIA for rehiring so many former Office of Strategic Services personnel whom General Donovan had eliminated for security reasons.

The Bureau has previously conducted two applicanttype investigations on Richard Holarnh Helms, who appears to be identical with the Richard Holars referred to by Lauren. <u>The results were almost entirely favorable</u>. vere filed in the "not used" files and classified "biased and unreliable." \_\_\_\_\_ seid five individuals, one of whom he nemed as Richard Helms, were responsible for classifying these reports and he considered these individuals pro-Communist because of the way his reports had been handled. He added he was certain none of the individuals were Communist Party members as they were too intelligent.

During the current interview by the Washington Field office Louren said he is a ceptain in the United States Air Force Reserves and hes worked for the Senate Internal Security Subcormittee. He said about a year ego he was in line for a high nosition in the State Department but he did not get the position and he believes there is a flag in State Department files against his name. He remarked that apparently the word has gone eround, down through the Republican National Committee to the State Department, that he is sati-Senatic. He said this was warme. He asked if the FBI could clear him pointing out that he still had top secret clearance with the Air Force. He was adviced the FBI makes no recommendation for clearance of an individual for Government employment.

Levren applied for a position with the Bureau in July, 1953, desiring to serve as an "intelligence analyst - writer" at a selary of \$7500 per year. He did not have a high school or college diploma and accordingly was not offered employment by the Eureau.

During the current interview Lewren seid that in 1952 he was the Subversive Intelligence Analyst at the Strategic Air Command and did research in Weshington. In his research he had deduced that Jay Lovestone is still very communistic as far as Leuren 18 concorned and that the apparetus of which Lovestone is a part is more dengerous to the United States them Communism; that b7D

Lovestone and several labor attaches are part of an "apparetus which is inducing the United States into an international socialistic organisation, diffusing our international definitions in accountes, politics and culture." The Machington Field Office observed Lauran does not appear to have any information of value as to any particular person. Lauren was very anxious to discuss his theories on international Communism and of interlocking personalities in high places in the State and Labor Departments. He offered to make himself evailable at any time for further discussion on these points. He said that in his work for the Military and Congressional Committee his particular specialty was practices and policies rather than personalities, and that he would have no interest in a person other than that the person might personify a certain set of practices.

It might be noted that in May, 1954, Lauren called at the Bureau and was interviewed by the Repionage Section of the Bomestic Intelligence Division. At that time he desired to discuss matters relating to Jay Lovestone but could furmish me factual information concerning him. (61-1292-879)
