EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

As it now appears that this action will again become active in December, and because your agency is at present, preparing draft responses to somewhat similar Interrogatorie in Driver, et al. v. Helms, et al., USDC D. R.I., Civil Action No. 750224, I believe it is in the defendants' best interests for you to now review the Interrogatories and Request and draft responses for possible use in this action by the defendant United States. 



This lock box is opened by utilizing a three digit combination, which numerous of the nurses know. The nurses know this combination due to the fact that when Mrs. McCONE goes out they have to assist her in dressing and would require the combination in order to obtain the jewelry that she has chosen to wear that particular evening.

The first items of missing jewelry were discovered in late March, 1988, but because Mrs. McCONE kept insisting that she had the articles, they were really not truly discovered to be completely missing until late May, 1988. Mrs. McCONE showed me where the lockbox is located under a counter in her dressing room. This lockbox is a metal box approximately 18"x9"x9" with a 3-number combination lock. Mrs. McCONE said that the box is kept locked at all times except when she or one of her nurses is getting jewelry in or out of the box. She said that the lockbox contains her good jewelry which she wears when she goes out or has dinner guests, however because of her health she has not done much entertaining recently, therefore has not had but a couple of occasions to wear the jewelry in the past several months. Mrs. McCONE said that several of the nurses have the combination to the lockbox as does She said she has given the combination to several of the nurses so that they could get jewelry out of the box for her or put it away when she is finished wearing it. However, she is not sure which nurses she has given the combination to and which ones she has not.

Mrs. McCONE said that she is sure that the jewelry items from the lockbox have not been misplaced or placed in any other location by her. She said that because of her health she is unable to get around without assistance as she loses her balance, therefore she has nurses around the clock who assist her in dressing and undressing and getting her around.

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

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

Mr. McCONE was also Chairman of the Board for the Pacific Far East Lines, and Chairman of the Board for the Pacific Tankers Corporation. Mr. JOHN ALEX McCONE has held several high Government positions, one of which was that of member of the President's Air Policy Committee. Mr. McCONE is a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley and is an engineer by profession.

Mr. RYAN advised that he was positive that Mr. McCONE had never belonged to any organization or group which would in any way reflect on his loyalty. Mr. McCONE is a staunch supporter of the present system of Government in the United States. Mr. RYAN advised that the general reputation and character of Mr. McCONE is excellent and that he is an outstanding man in the community. Mr. McCONE's associates are of the highest type, being men such as Governor EARL WARREN, and LEE DUBRIDGE, President of the California Institute of Technology.

The following information was obtained on May 18, 1950:

Mr. TERRANCE M. LEE, Joshua Hendry Corporation, 612 South Flower, Los Angele's, advised that he is an associate and secretary of Mr. McCONE, President of the Joshua Hendry Corporation, Los Angeles. Mr. LEE furnished the following data relative to Mr. McCONE's biography.

Mr. McCONE married POSEMARY COOPER on June 21, 1938, and their permanent address is 1100 Oak Grove Avenue, San Marino, California. He stated they have no children. McCONE on graduation from the University of California in 1922, was employed as construction superintendent of Llewellyn Iron Works and later as superintendent of the Consolidated Steel Corporation which took over the Llewellyn Iron Works about 1929. He was executive vicepresident and director of Consolidated Steel during 1933 to 1937. McCONE left this corporation in 1937 to form Bechtel - McCone - Parsons Corporation to engage in design, engineering, and construction of process plants, refineries, and power plants. He was the president and director of the California Shipbuilding Corporation from 1941 to 1947, president and director of Bechtel -McCone Corporation 1937 to 1946, president and director Joshua Hendry Corporation, Sunnyvale, California, 1945 to 1947, director of Marin Shipbuilding Corporation, Sausalito, California, 1942 to 1946, and director of the Oregon Shipbuilding Corporation 1941 to 1948. Mr. LEE stated that McCONE is presently active as president of the Joshua Hendry Corporation, Los Angeles;

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chairman of the Board of Pacific Far East Line, Inc.; director of Industrial Indemnity Company of San Francisco; director of California Bank of Los Angeles; and director of Curtiss - Wright Corporation, New York City. Mr. LEE advised that McCONE's main activities were in connection with the Curtiss - Wright, Joshua Hendry Corporation, the Pacific Far East Lines and as a consultant for the Government in Washington, D. C., regarding the air forces program.

LEE stated McCONE had worked closely with Secretary FORRESTAL in connection with the air forces program and in preparing the budget in 1949 -1950. Mr. McCONE was in Washington, D. C. during the latter part of 1948 and early 1949 with reference to the air forces program and since that date has also been to Washington as a consultant.

LEE stated McCONE was associated with the following clubs: A. P. 

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During coversation on September 16, 1958, Mr. Gandy Joseph Campbell, Comptroller General of the United States, W. C. Sullivan remarked to the Liaison representative that he first met Chairman McCone, of AEC, at a small social affair on August 7, 1958. He added that he couldn't quite figure McCone out. Campbell did not offer to elaborate on this latter remark. However, he went on to state that Mc^oone's wife has been trying to get the two couples together again since their initial meeting. Campbell has told his wife to put off Mrs. McCone's overtures. Campbell said that he just does not want to get close to McCone in view of his (Campbell's) position, as he felt it might be quite awkward in the event his General Accounting Office ever had occasion to make inquiries into the operation of the Atomic Energy Commission.

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My dear Mr. Gray:

In compliance with your request we have reinterviewed Mr. John A. McCone, Chairman, Atomic Energy Commission, in connection with the leak of National Security Council information which appeared in "The New York Times" on August 13, 1960.

During the interview Mr. McCone advised that at approximately 11:30 a.m. on August 12, 1960, he had briefed Atomic Energy Commissioners Mr. John S. -cham, Dr. Robert E. Wilson, and Mr. Loren K. Olson .cgarding the natters discussed at the National Security Council meeting that day. These members of the Atomic Energy Commission were also interviewed.

The results of our interviews of Mr. McCone and the above-mentioned commissioners of the Atomic Energy Commission are set forth in the enclosed report. A copy of this report is also being furnished to the Attorney General.

For your confidential information, Mr. McCone gave every indication of being forthright and fully cooperative during the reinterview. Following the reinterview and as the agents were leaving his office 5 Mr. McCone in an obviously personal comment made in an offhand manner the statement that S ru Liniu NOTE THAT ON

personal opinion that the publication of this article actually did no harm. He did not elaborate on this but two commented that he wondered why there was so much pressure on the investigation. At this point he was again reminded that he had received a memorandum from Mr. Gordon Gray that the investigation was to be conducted by the FBI at the President's request. Mr. McCone stated he was aware of this and realized the Bureau's investigation was being conducted at the President's request but it was his personal opinion that maybe the agents' time could be better spent on other official matters. It was pointed out to him that the Lureau was performing its responsibilities in other matters within its jurisdiction. He stated he understood the above situation.

In view of the obviously personal tenor of the above comments of Mr. McCone, they are not being sot forth in the enclosed report.

The Washington Post, June 7, 1962, carried a short item indicating that Mrs. Paul Pigott, a prominent Seattle widow, was to wed Mr. McCone in Seattle next fall. You will recall that the Liaison Section recently reported that McCone was reported to be making a trip to the Far East and additionally, CIA was tightly holding information that McCone would be in Seattle on personal business. McCone is in Southeast Asia at the present time and he very likely could have traveled to Seattle, which trip may fit in with the news item.

A review of Bureau files indicates that Mrs. Pigott is the widow of Paul Pigott, former President of the Pacific Car and Foundry Company, Renton, Washington. This firm was founded by Pigott's father about 1900 and allegedly was affiliated with the Bethlehem Pacific Coast Steel Company.

In 1943 the Bureau conducted an investigation involving Pigott in an alleged fraud against the Government. This investiga-tion stemmed from reported irregular transactions between the Pacific Car and Foundry Company and the U. S. Ordnance Department. The results of our investigation were submitted to the Department with the request that the Bureau be advised if any further investigation was desired. No further investigation was requested.

In 1953 we conducted an investigation of Pigott for the Atomic Energy Commission; this was done in connection with the processing of a security clearance for Pigott. The only derogatory information which was reported was that pertaining to the abovedescribed alleged fraud against the Government. With regard to Mrs. Pigott, Bureau files indicate that she is 57 years of age. McCone is 60 years of age. In 1947 the Pigotts had three sons and two daughters. Mrs. Pigott's maiden name was Theiline McGee.

In 1944 one informant reported that the mailing list of the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee carried the name of Mrs. Paul Pigott. You will recall that this was a procommunist organization but mailing lists did include individuals who were not communists or procommunists.

You previously have been advised that the captioned Board was reviewing the case of Sergeant Jack E. Dunlap, the National Security Agency (NSA) employee who operated as a Soviet Agent and who committed suicide in July, 1963. J. Patrick Coyne, Executive Secretary of the Board, brought up this case when he met with the Director on 10/29/63. On 2/11/64, Coyne confidentially advised Agent Papich that the Board had completed its report which includes a review of the case and its ramifications which affect the counterintelligence capabilities of U.S. agencies. Coyne stated that the Board's findings and recommendations were being submitted to the Attorney General, State Department, Secretary of Defense and the Director of Central Intelligence. Each is being asked for views and comments. Coyne pointed out that a special communication was being directed to each of the above agencies in order to circumvent any move on the part of John McCone to assume the responsibility of coordinating the comments and observations of up other agencies and having him submit one representative reply to the Board. According to Coyne, McCone had informally suggested that the matter be handled with him as the coordinator. Coyne has vehemently Ma opposed this.

Coyne assumes that the Attorney General will refer the report and recommendations to the Bureau since there are certain items of interest to us. In this connection he made the following information, /available. 16-

The Board recommends that steps be taken to assure that the FBI has adequate agent resources to effect "required domestic counterintelligence coverage of both Soviet-bloc and non-bloc official installations and personnel who may be engaged in intelligence or related activity." According to Coyne, the Board discussed problems encountered by the Bureau when much of its personnel is diverted to various problems and activities such as Civil Rights matters. The discussion included a statement, source not identified, that 200 additional Agents would be needed to handle domestic counterintelligence coverage. 1.2

Another recommendation reads that the policies of the State Department with respect to authorizing technical coverage be re-examined with a view of liberalizing such policies to the extent needed to provide adequate coverage. This recommendation was centered around the discussion dealing with State Department's reported refusal of a Bureau request to install technical coverage of certain diplomatic installations, not identified.

In another recommendation, the Board requests that in the future when consideration is being given to "exchange of spies", State Department should make certain that there is advance consultation with the Bureau and CIA in order to assure that adequate attention is given to all intelligence aspects. This recommendation was predicated on the Board's discussion on the Egorov case. The Egorovs were "traded" with the Soviets without consultation with the Bureau.

The Board also recommends that consideration be given to the establishment of an "interdepartmental counterintelligence mechanism to assure promulgation of counterintelligence policy," to assure proper guidance, exchange of information and the overall coordination of efforts in the counterintelligence field. Such a mechanism would not involve operational matters. This recommendation allegedly was based on information coming to the attention of the Board indicating that some agencies do not have the benefit of knowledge and experience gained by other agencies in countering Soviet penetrations. The recommendation does not specify exactly how such a mechanism will be established and how it will be directed. The recommendation reads that "consideration be given."

concerning security; (10) that personnel handling counterintelligence matters be fully briefed concerning "sophisticated and professional information" regarding abnormal sexual activity, perversion, etc.; (11) that any agency having the responsibility on a particular security case be promptly furnished information in the possession of other agencies; (12) that "the need to know" principle be rigorously applied by all agencies; (13) that more cover positions be afforded to CIA in Soviet-bloc countries; (14) that State not restrict clandestine intelligence operations by U.S. personnel until full consideration is given at the highest level in Government. (According to Coyne, this is based upon State's refusal to permit CIA to run certain operations in Moscow relating to our sensitive source TOPHAT); (15) prevent construction of Soviet Embassy in Washington, D. C., area until the U. S. Government is satisfied that we can proceed with the construction of comparable facilities in Moscow; (16) that reciprocal arrangements be made to correct the serious imbalance in numbers of U.S. personnel stationed in Soviet-bloc countries as compared with Soviet-bloc personnel stationed in the U.S.; (17) that the White House be promptly notified when an agency receives information concerning a serious penetration of a U.S. installation. (This apparently was pointed toward DOD not reporting certain information to the White House on a more expedite basis.)

ACTION:

For information. If approved, we will wait for the Attorney General to refer the Board's report to us so that we can have the benefit of full details and exact language for any action we may be obliged to take.

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

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

JOHN A. MCCONE

John Alex McCone was born in San Francisco, California, January 4, 1902, son of Alexander J. and Margaret (Enright) McCone.

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He was graduated by Los Angeles High School in Los Angeles and is an alumnus of the University of California, College of Engineering, Class of 1922.

Mr. McCone began his business career as construction engineer for Llevellyn Iron Works in 1922. In 1929 this company and others merged to form the Consolidated Steel Corporation. Mr. McCone served progressively as Construction Manager, Vice President in Charge of Sales, and Executive Vice President and Director of the Consolidated Steel Corporation.

In 1937 the Bechtel-McCone Corporation was organized and Mr. McCone became President and Director. The engineering firm engaged in the design, engineering and construction of petroleum refineries, power plants, and process plants throughout the United States, in South America, and in Arabia.

During World War II under the management of Bechtel-McCone Corporation, the Birmingham Aircraft Modification Center at Birmingham, Alabama, was designed, constructed and operated. This facility was the largest of its kind in the country and was responsible for the modification of B-24 and B-29 bombers and other combat aircraft.

Mr. McCone also was President and Manager of the California Shipbuilding Corporation, the second largest "omergency shipyard" in the United States during World War II. This company constructed 467 ships, including cargo vessels, tank ships and troop transports. Mr. McCone also was a director of Marinship Corporation (Sausalito, California), builder of 15 liberty ships and 78 turbo-electric T-2 tankers. He also served as a director of Oregon Shipbuilding Corporation.

In 1945 Bechtel-McCone increased their ownership of the Joshua Hendy Iron Works of Sunnyvale, California, and Mr. McCone became President of this company, which produced many types of heavy machinery and equipment including propulsion units for Liberty and Victory ships, reduction gears, heavy equipment for reclamation projects, diesel engines, etc. This

In the Los Angoles community Mr. McCone has served ON Various boards and committees, including the Board of Trustees of California Institute of Technology, Board of Mcgents of Loyola University, the Welfare Federation of Los Angoles (Community Chest), Hollywood Turf Club Associated Charities, Air Pollution Board, and various philanthropic erganisations. He was one of the organizers and President of the Los Angoles World Affairs Council.

Mr. McCone is a number of Phi Kappa Signa Fraternity, the California Club and the Los Angeles Country Club in Los Angelos, the Pacific Union Club in San Francisco, the Links Club in New York, and the Burning Tree and Metropolitan Clubs in Machington, D. C.

Mr. McCone carried Miss Rosemary Cooper on June 21, 1938. Their California residence is at 1100 Cak Grove Avenue, San Marino.

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in 1948, served as a basis for the nation's air policy for Several years.

During 1948 Mr. McCone served as Special Deputy to Secretary of Defense James Forrestal, and in this capacity was responsible to the Secretary of Defense for the preparation of the first and second budgets of the newly formed Department.

In June 1950 Mr. McCone was appointed Under-Secretary, Department of the Air Force, with primary responsibility for the procurement of new aircraft and the construction of air bases throughout the world. He retained this post until October 9, 1951.

Early in 1954, Secretary of State Dulles appcinted Mr. McCone to the State Department's Public Committee on Personnol, which was formed particularly to survey the urgent requirement for increasing the effectiveness of the career services of the Department of State.

On June 6, 1958, President Eisenhower nominated Mr. McCone for a five-year term as a member of the Atomic Energy Commission. The nomination was approved by the United States Senate on July 9, and on July 14, 1958, Mr. McCone took the company also owned and operated the Crocker-Wheeler Electric Manufacturing Company of Ampere, New Jersey.

Subsequently, a new corporation was formed and Mr. McCone became President of Joshua Hendy Corporation. This company, through its Pacific Tankers Division, has been actively ongaged in the shipping business, operating tankers in world trade and cargo ships in the Pacific.

In 1948, Mr. McCone became Chairman of the Board of Directors of Pacific Far East Line, Inc., one of the largest western steamship companies flying the American flag.

He served as director of various banking and insurance corporations but has terminated all business officerships.

In addition to business activities, Mr. McCone has served the United States Government in several important capacities.

Mr. MOREHEAD PATTERSON, Chairman of the Board, American Machine and Foundry Conporation, 261 Madison Avenue, New York, advised on October 25, 1961 that he had served with the appointee on the Public Committee on Personnel and his principal association with the appointee has been confined to the activities of that committee which continued to meet on a semi-annual basis after it had submitted a report. Mr. PATTERSON also spends considerable time in Washington, D. C. and while the appointee was with the Atomic Energy Commission he would near about him from mutual acquaintances and occasionally met him in that city.

Mr. CLYDE E. WEED, Chairman of the Board, Anaconda Corporation, 25 Broadway, New York, and Mr. HENRY D. MERCER, Chairman of the Board, States Marine Corporation, 90 Broad Street, New York, who were interviewed on October 24, 1961; and Mr. ROBERT L. CLARKSON, Chairman of the Board, American Express Company, Incorporated, 65 Broadway, New York, who was interviewed on October 25, 1961 by SA JOHN E. WARREN, advised that they have been close social acquaintances of the appointee and are in frequent contact with him. In addition, Mr. MERCER has had a business association with the appointee as their companies are both concerned with shipping interests.

These acquaintances highly recommended JOHN ALEX MC CONE for appointment as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency as an intelligent, energetic administrator and executive of proven ability in both business and government. They stated that he is a man of the highest type integrity and ethics and a completely discreet and trustworthy individual. He is a man who will handle this post with dedication and zeal. He is a completely loyal American citizen and his conduct, associates and reputation have always been above reproach.

Mr. WEED, Mr. CLARKSON, Mr. SHIELDS, and Mr. MERCER, who are acquainted with the appointee's wife, stated that she is a fine person of excellent character, reputation, and associates, and a completely loyal American citizen. Inquiry of these individuals developed that they are the appointee's closest associates in the New York area.

On October 27, 1961, HENRY C. DWORSHAK, Senator for Idaho, 319 Bank of Idaho Building, commented as follows:

He first met JOHN ALEX McCONE during the year 1948, when McCONE, a successful executive in private industry, was serving in some administrative capacity in the Executive Branch of the U. S. Government. In the ensuing years, McCONE served in several administrative positions with the Executive Branch of the Government, as an appointee of both Democratic and Republican presidents. During 1958, McCONE was appointed Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission and in this position DWORSHAK became personally acquainted with McCONE, inasmuch as DWORSHAK was serving as a member of the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy, which met regularly with McCONE and members of the Atomic Energy Commission.

DWORSHAK said this association generated a profound respect for McCONE's ability as an administrator, leader and a man. McCONE, with his tact and deplomacy, was able to work harmoniously with the committee and had the ability to control and guide both political sections. McCONE resigned in January, 1961, when a new administration took office at Washington, D. C.

McCONE, in DWORSHAK's opinion, is an honest, personable, dedicated, capable administrator, whose loyalty and patriotism are of the highest order. He said he would recommend McCONE without reservation for any position of trust and responsibility with the U.S. Government.

Joshua Hendy Corporation 612 South Flower Street Los Angeles, California

On October 26, 1961, Miss MARY DETHL, secretary to Mr. JOHN A. MC CONE, advised that Mr. MC CONE returned to the Joshua Hendy Corporation and Panama Pacific Tankers Corporation approximately February 1, 1961, following the termination of his position with the Atomic Energy Commission. She stated that upon his return he was elected President of the Panama Pacific Tankers Corporation and Chairman of the Board of the Joshua Hendy Corporation. Miss DEIHL stated that when Mr. MC CONE assumed duties with the Atomic Energy Commission in 1958, he severed all connections with all of his business interests, and upon his return to Los Angeles he affiliated himself only with Panama Pacific Tankers Corporation and Joshua Hendy Corporation and accepted positions on the Boards of Directors for the Standard Oil Company of California at San Francisco, California; the Trans World Airlines, Western Bancorporation, Los Angeles, the Firsc. Western Bank and Trust Company, Los Angeles; and the Pacific. Mutual Life Insurance Company of Los Angeles. She stated that he was a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors for Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company. Miss DEIHL stated that Mr. MC CONE had submitted letters of resignation to each of the above companies, including Panama Pacific Tankers Corporation and Joshua Hendy Corporation, to become effective on or prior to the date he assumed his new position with the Central Intelligence Agency. Miss DEIHL stated that most of these resignations had been accepted by the various Boards of Directors. Miss DEIHL made available for observation copies of the various letters submitted by MC CONE.

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On October 26, 1961, W. C. RVAN, President; Joshua Hendy Corporation, and Vice President, Panama Pacific Tankers Corporation, advised that these two companies with regret accepted the resignation of JOHN A. MC CONE, effective the day prior to his assumption of his new duties with the Central Intelligence Agency. Mr. RYAN stated that Mr. MC CONE is a devoted public servant of the highest integrity, with outstanding administrative ability, and a man of exceedingly strong loyalty to the United States Government and the principles which it represents. He stated that Mr. MC CONE has in the past done an excellent job with the Panama Pacific Tankers Corporation and Joshua Hendy Corporation, and he knows he will do exceedingly well in administrating the Central Intelligence Agency.

Mr. RYAN stated that following his resignation from the Atomic Energy Commission, Mr. MC CONE, although widely sought, accepted appointment to the Boards of Directors with Standard Oil Company of California; Trans World Airlines; Western Bancorporation, formerly known as First America Corporation; First Western Bank and Trust Company; and Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company. He stated that he was elected President of the Fanama Pacific Tankers Corporation and Chairman of the Board of the Joshua Hendy Corporation. Mr. RYAN stated that Mr. MC CONE has severed all relations with private enterprise. Mr. RYAN stated he would recommend Mr. MC CONE most highly for any position of trust and responsibility with the United States Government.

BUSINESS AND SOCIAL ACQUAINTANCES

On October 26, 1961; CNET, HOLLFIELD, United States Congressman from the State of California, 2001 Lincoln Avenue, Montebello, California, advised that he considered JOHN A. MC CONE a most highly qualified person. He stated that he had the highest opinion of Mr. MC CONE's ability to properly administrate the Central Intelligence Agency. He stated that during Mr. MC CONE's tenure as head of the Atomic Energy LA 161-385 JPB:slb

Commission he, HOLIFIELD, was on the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy and through this position had association with him. He stated that there was no question in his mind whatsoever concerning the loyalty, integrity, reputation, associates, and devotion of Mr. MC CONE. He stated that, in his estimation, Mr. MC CONE is a desirable public servant, and he would highly recommend him for the position for which he is being considered.

On October 26, 1961, Mr. ASA V. CALL, Chairman of the Board, Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company, 523 West Sixth Street, Los Angeles, advised that Mr. JOHN A. MC CONE served on the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors for this company between February, 1961, and the present time: He stated that ten days ago he received from Mr. MC CONE a letter of resignation, which will become effective prior to or on the day of assumption of Mr. MC CONE's duties with the Central Intelligence Agency. Mr: CALL recalled that he had been interviewed during a prior investigation concerning Mr. MC CONE, in 1958, and stated that "everything I said then still goes." He stated, in addition, that Mr. MC CONE is an extremely satisfactory administrator of the highest reliability and integrity. He stated there is absolutely no reason whatsoever to question his loyalty to the United States Government, and he would highly recommend him for the position for which he is being considered.

On October 27, 1961, FRANK L. KING, President, Western Bancorporation, 600 South Spring Street, Los Angeles, advised that Mr. MC CONE became a member of the Board of Directors of the Western Bancorporation in February, 1961. At that time the Western Bancorporation was known as the First America Corporation, but a merger was effected and the Western Bancorporation was formed as a holding company for the United California Bank. He stated that he had in his possession a letter of resignation from JOHN A. MC CONE, to become effective prior to or on the date of Mr. MC CONE's assumption of duties with the Central Intelligence Agency. Mr. KING

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stated that acceptance of this letter of resignation is presently pending, awaiting a special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Western Bancorporation. He stated that the resignation will be accepted automatically with a letter of regret.

On October 27, 1961, HERBERT L. HAHN, Actorney, Security Building, Pasadena, California, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the California Institute of Technology (CIT) at Pasadena, advised SA GILMER G. ROBINSON that his personal contacts with Mr. MC CONE have been limited to mutual relations in the past as members of the Board of Trustees of CIT. He stated that Mr. MC CONE resigned from the Board of Trustees when he assumed his duties as head of the Atomic Energy Commission in 1958, and he has had no con-nection with CIT since that time. He stated that Mr. MC CONE has done a remarkable job in his job as a public servant, and he feels that he will continue to do an outstanding job as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency. Mr. HAHN stated that he has never heard Mr. MC CONE utter one word in opposition to the principles of the United States Government. and for this reason he believes him to be a completely loyal United States citizen; and he would recommend him for a position of trust with the United States Government.

On October 27, 1961, HERBERT H. G. NASH, Secretary, Board of Trustees, CIT, Pasadena, California, advised that JOHN A. MC CONE's resignation from the Board of Trustees of CIT was effective July 7, 1958. His tenure of service as a member of the Board of Trustees began in 1946 and continued until his resignation in 1958. Mr. NASH stated that he has had little association with Mr. MC CONE, but he has never heard anything unfavorable concerning his character, associates, reputation, or loyalty; and he would recommend him for the position for which he is presently being considered.

On October 27, 1961, CLAIR ENGLE, United States Senator from California, was interviewed at the Jonathan Club, 545 South Figueroa Street, Los Angeles, and he advised that LA 161-385 JPB:s1b

JOHN A. MO CONE is known to him as a most able and patriotic individual. He stated that MG CONE has an outstanding reputation among the Government officials throughout Washington, D. C. ENGLE stated he considers MC CONE a highly responsible person; possessed of a great amount of drive and integrity, and he knows him to be a man of excellent character. He stated he is not personally acquainted with MC CONE's associates outside the Government, but he has never heard of any associations which would in any way reflect adversely on MC CONE. He stated he would give MC CONE his highest recommendation for appointment to a responsible position in the United States Government.

On October 26, 1961, HOWARD HANSON, Secretary and Counsel, First Western Bank and Trust Company, Los Angeles, advised that JOHN A. MC CONE was elected to the Board of Directors on February 27, 1961, and has now submitted his resignation to become effective prior to or upon assumption of his duties as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency. Mr. HANSON stated that the Board of Directors has voted to accept the resignation with regrets. Mr. HANSON stated his only association with Mr. MC CONE has been through the Board of Directors meetings, and he has been very impressed by Mr. MC CONE's ability and wide knowledge in various fields of business. He stated nothing has ever come to his attention. which would cause him to question the character, associates, reputation, or loyalty of Mr. MC CONE, and he would highly recommend him. for a position of trust with the United States Government. Mr. HANSON stated that Mr. M. E. MC MILLAN, President of First Western Bank and Trust Company, is currently on a tour of the United States and his exact date of return. is not known. He stated that Mr. MC MITLAN is the only other individual in the bank who would be closely associated with Mr. MC CONE.

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HOSTIER

On October 27, 1961, United States Congressman CRAIG HOSMER of California, was interviewed at the residence of his parents, 4130 Cedar Avenue, Long Beach, Callfornia, by SA KENNETH C. WALKER. HOSNER stated he had known MC CONE by his exceptionally good business reputation, since MC CONE had first had a part in the construction of the Hoover Dam many years ago. HOSNER stated he has personally been acquainted with MC CONE since 1956, both socially and in connection with MC CONE's position as head of the Atomic Energy Commission. He stated MC CONE is a person of integrity, and has been very successful in the business world. He stated that through personal contacts with MC CONE and with employees and associates. at the Atomic Energy Commission, he has observed that MC CONE. as a leader, was extremely highly respected and looked upon as a capable administrator. He stated that MC CONE has the "drive" and insight to organize to fulfill his appointment as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency. HOSNER stated he has no qualms whatsoever in recommending MC CONE for the position of Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, and has never heard anything which would reflect unfavorably on his character, associates, reputation or loyalty.

H'S EMARTICE

On October 27, 1961, JAMES FRANCIS Cardinal MC INTYRE, Archbishop of Los Angeles, 1531 West Ninth Street, Los Angeles, California, advised SA JOHN M. CASHEL that he had been acquainted with MC CONE in New York before he came here 15 years ago. He stated that MC CONE has been in Government service extensively and has a well-known good reputation. He stated that MC CONE is of the highest integrity, and the United States Government is fortunate to have a man of his caliber in service because of his honesty, integrity, loyalty and courage of convictions. He stated that MC CONE has headed an advisory committee of a technology school in Los Angeles for the Cardinal, and is highly regarded among businessmen throughout the United States. He stated that the name MC CONE is always received with esteem. Cardinal MC INFYRE stated that MC CONE has, in the years past, been Director of numerous companies and businesses throughout California, and has

always been a public-minded individual. Cardinal MC INTYRE stated that he would recommend JOHN A. MC CONE for any job regardless of the position. He stated that MC CONE is a top-flight man of independent thought and, in addition, is a very prudent man. Cardinal MC INTYRE stated he would give his unqualified recommendation for appointment of JOHN A. MC CONE as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

On October 25, 1961, a review of the files of the Riverside County Sheriff's Office and Riverside Police Department, Riverside, California, as caused to be made by SA STANLEY H. FUEHRER, failed to reflect any record identifiable with ALICIA MC CONE in addition to that previously reported.

On October 26, 1961; a review of the files of the Riverside Credit Bureau, as caused by SA FUEHRER, failed to disclose any additional information concerning ALICIA MC CONE, 3205 Polk Street, Arlington, California (a suburb of Riverside), in addition to that previously reported.

MC CONE, in addition to that already reported.

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RELATIVES

On October 26, 1961, Mrs. COLADENE HYKES, 3200 Tyler Street, Arlington, California, advised that her property immediately adjoins that of ALICIA MC CONE at 3205 Polk Street. She stated that nothing has ever come to her attention which would reflect unfavorably on Miss MC CONE, and she believes her to be a person of good character and reputation and a loyal United States citizen.

On October 26, 1961, Mrs. RUTH GARMES, 460 Dalehurst Avenue, West Los Angeles, Galifornia, advised SA CARL V. PORTER that she had been a neighbor of the SHELEYs for fifteen years. She stated just recently DONALD and MARY LOUISE SHELEY moved to 11922 Saltair Terrace, Los Angeles 49, California. She stated she is a frequent visitor in their home and that her daughter CAROL regularly dates JOHN SHELEY. Mrs. GARMES stated nothing has ever come to her attention which would reflect adversely on the character or reputation of any member of the SHELEY family.

On October 27, 1961, Mrs. J. C. BRIDGES, 665 Westbridge, Pasadena, California, advised that Mrs. MARGARET AICHER currently resides at 670 Westbridge, Pasadena, and enjoys a good reputation in the neighborhood. Mrs. BRIDGES stated that Mrs. AICHER is a widow, and she believes her to be a completely loyal United States citizen.

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NEWSPAPER MORGUES

On October 26, 1961, the files of the "Los Angeles Times", a local daily newspaper, were reviewed by IC STEVEN T. SCHOENBAUM. Contained in the "Los Angeles Times" issue of September 28, 1961, was an article which reflected that JOHN A. MC CONE, who had been in Washington, D. C. conferring on Atomic Energy Commission matters, had returned to Los Angeles. While in Washington, D. C., MC CONE had been called to the White House and asked to take the Job of Director of Central Intelligence Agency. The article disclosed that DULLES called MC CONE the "ideal choice for a man to carry on this important work."

No other information of pertinence to this investigation appeared in the files of the "Los Angeles Times".

On October 26, 1961, the files of the "Los Angeles Herald Express" were reviewed by IC STEVEN T. SCHOENBAUM, and no information in addition to that contained in the files of the "Los Angeles Times" was noted.

MC CONE, 1100 Oak Grove Avenue, San Marino, California, issued as Consultant to serve as Advisor to the Commission, at the rate of \$100 per day when actually employed during the period January 21, 1961; June 30, 1961. This contract was reissued for the period July 11 1961; June 30, 1962.

No additional pertinent information was contained in the above file.

On October 27, 1961, Mr. LOREN K. OLSON, Commissioner, AEC advised the has known the appointee both professionally and socially for approximately ten years. Mr. OLSON stated he is acquainted with the appointee's wife. Mr. OLSON described Mr. MC CONE as the most intelligent man he has ever met, who is honest, forthright, and outstanding in every way. Mr. OLSON stated he would not have any hesitation whatsoever in recommend-

ing the appointee for any position involving trust and conflidence. Mr. OLSON stated that during the period he has known Mr. MC CONE nothing of derogatory nature concerning his character, reputation, associates, and loyalty has ever been brought to his attention.

On October 30, 1961, Mr. JOHN S. GRAHAM, Commissioner, AEC, advised he has known Mr. MC CONE since the early 1950's when he, GRAHAM, was Assistant Secretary of the Treasury. He stated that he worked closely with the appointee when the latter was Chairman of the AEC from July, 1958 until January 20, 1961. Mr. GRAHAM described the appointee in the highest terms with regard to his character, reputation, associates, and loyalty, and stated MC CONE was "two-fisted," dynamic, of high moral and religious convictions. Request for investigation of McCone received from Mr. O'Donnell at the White House on October 23, 1961. McCone has been named Director of Central Intelligence Agency. Investigation completed with the exception of checks of several governmental agencies and interviews with several individuals who have been unavailable.

BACKGROUND:

McCone, aged 59, is a native of California. He attended the University of California, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in 1922. He has had various business interests in California which have included, among others, the California Shipbuilding Corporation (President), Pacific Far East Lines (Chairman of the Board), Panama Pacific Tankers Corporation (President), JoshuaHendy Corporation (President and Chairman of the Board), and Bethel-McCone Engineering Company (President). McCone's permanent residence is in San Marino, California. He also has a residence at 3025 Whitehaven Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C.

McCone was employed by the President's Air Policy Commission, as Consultant (1947-1948), Department of Defense and as Special Assistant (1948); Department of the Air Force as Undersecretary (1950-1951); Department of State, Consultant (1954-1956). He was Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission from July, 1958, until January, 1961, when he resigned. We conducted applicanttype investigations concerning McCone in 1948, 1950, 1954 and 1958 in connection with the above positions. No derogatory information was developed. He was described as a man of outstanding ability, a natural header and an excellent organizer and administrator.

That McCone, when Undersecretary of Air Force, was alleged to have shown favoritism or personal interest in awarding a \$190,000,000 aircraft contract in 1951 to the Kaiser-Frazer Corporation. The allegation was refuted by prominent individuals in possession of

knowledge concerning same. Allegations that McCone was involved in the illegal or unethical purchase of surplus vessels from the United States Government were also refuted during the investigations by individuals, including officials of the United States Maritime Administration.

The results of our previous investigations were summarized in memoranda dated May 5, 1954, June 12, 1958, June 24, 1958, and June 30, 1958, a copy of each was furnished the White House on October 25, 1961.

The current investigation was favorable, however, it was stated that McCone has been in favor of continued nuclear tests, whereas some scientists feel the United States should not conduct nuclear tests. As a result thereof, newspaper reports indicate some of the scientists were furious when he was named to succeed Dulles at the Central Intelligence Agency.*

INFORMATION NOT INCLUDED IN TRANSMITTAL LETTER OR SUMMARY MEMORANDUM:

Ralph P. Flegal, San Francisco, California, former employee in one of McCone's business enterprises, alleged that during World War II McCone, in his business practices. made excessive profits bordering on profiteering.

Prior investigations which included McCone's business activities did not reveal any unethical business practices.



Applicant-type investigations were conducted concerning Mr. McCone in 1947-1948, 1950-1951, 1954 and 1958. In 1958 at the request of the Eisenhower Administration, we conducted an applicant investigation of McCone who was being considered as the Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission. In October, 1961, the Kennedy Administration requested that the investigation of McCone be brought up to date.

SPECIAL INQUIRY - WHITE HOUSE

During the 1958 investigation, information was developed that McCone when Under Secretary of the Air Force was alleged to have shown favoritism or personal interests in awarding a \$190,000,000 aircraft contract in 1951 to the Kaiser-Frazer Corporation. The allegation was refuted by prominent individuals in possession of knowledge concerning same. Allegations that McCone was involved in the illegal or unethical purchase of surplus vessels from the U.S. Government were also refuted during the investigation by individuals, including officials of the U.S. Maritime Commission.

During the 1958 investigation Mr. McCone was interviewed concerning his business activities. Records of U.S. Maritime Commission were also reviewed and no information was obtained indicating illegal or unethical business practices on the part of Mr. McCone were developed. It is to be noted his business practices were also discussed with him at the hearing when he was confirmed as Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission in July, 1958.

The results of our previous investigations were summarized in memoranda dated May 5, 1954; June 12, 1958; June 24, 1958; and June 30, 1958, a copy of each was furnished to the White House on October 25, 1961.

By letter dated November 2, 1961, a summary memorandum covering McCone's activities since 1958 was furnished to the Kennedy Administration. FX 105 = 105 = 100

No. derogatory information was developed during the 1961 investigation concerning McCone, and he was described as a person of outstanding ability, a natural leader and an excellent organizer and administrator.

One Ralph P. Flegal, San Francisco, California, a former employee in one of McCone's business enterprises, alleged that during World War II McCone in his business practices made excessive profits bordering on profiteering. Flegal was confined in a mental hospital in California from 1954 to 1960 and as of November, 1961, he was on leave at home from the hospital but was under continuous supervision. This information was not included in either the transmittal letter or summary memorandum furnished to the White House.

By letter dated January 13, 1962, received January 15, 1962, Herbert H. Seidler, Santa Barbara, California, advised that a local Santa Barbara paper contained a syndicated column of Drew Pearson's of previous date captioned "FBI Overlooks McCone's Gravy," wherein Pearson questioned the awareness of the FBI in connection with the past history of McCone.

ACTION

Mr. DeLoach's Office is obtaining a copy of Pearson's article. When it is obtained, it will be analyzed, and you will be advised. Mr. Seidler's letter is being acknowledged.

Information set forth hereinafter reflects the results of additional inquiries made by this Bureau concerning Mr. McCone.

Mr. Thomas K. Finletter, attorney, Coudert Brothers, New York City, advised that he was the chairman of former President Truman's Air Policy Commission on which Mr. McCone served as a member from approximately 1947 to 1948. He further stated that he was Secretary of the United States Air Force when Mr. McCone was Under Secretary from 1950 to 1951. Mr. Finletter stated that he considered Mr. McCone to be a man of exceptional mental and administrative ability and of the very highest personal integrity. He stated that in his opinion Mr. McCone is a loyal American citizen of excellent character, associates and reputation and he highly recommended him for a position of trust.

Mr. Finletter continued by stating he recalled a meeting which took place in former President Truman's office in approximately 1950, at which time he, the President and Mr. McCone were present. He stated that at this meeting Mr. McCone agreed to accept an appointment as Under Secretary of the United States Air Force with the stipulation that it would be for one year only. Mr. Finletter said that this stipulation on the part of Mr. McCone resulted from the fact that Mr. McCone was engaged in many business activities at the time and was reluctant to neglect them for a longer period.

Mr. John J. McLaughlin, Administrative Assistant to the Secretary of the Air Force, exhibited Mr. McCone's letter of resignation as Under Secretary of the Air Force.

This letter, which is retained in Mr. McCone's personnel file, is directed to the President and is dated October 5, 1951.

Mr. McCone in his letter of resignation, stated that when he accepted his position, he did so with the "idea" that he would serve for a period of one year and that this period "has extended a year and a half."

He further stated in the above-mentioned letter that he desired to leave the Air Force "to return to private life."

Mr. Thomas Coggeshall, chairman, Renegotiation. Board, Washington, D. C., advised that he was formerly with the old Air Force Renegotiation: Board during the time Mr. McCone was Under Secretary of the Air Force. Mr. Coggeshall stated that in this capacity he became professionally acquainted with Mr. McCone. Mr. Coggeshall stated that he found Mr. McCone to be a capable and energetic Government official. Mr. Coggeshall advised that Mr. McCone was a sound businessman and discharged his duties as a Government official in a vigorous manner "representing the Government's position" at all times.

Mr. Coggeshall stated he is aware that Mr. McCone has been recently nominated to be a member of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) and stated that he is personally "delighted" to see such a sound appointment because of Mr. McCone's excellent record in both Government and private business.

Mr. Coggeshall stated that the Bechtel-McCone-Parsons Corporation and the Bechtel-McCone Corporation have had matters before the Renegotiation: Board. Mr. Coggeshall explained that this is no reflection upon either of these corporations or Mr. McCone because it is the intended purpose of the board to examine contracts with the idea of "equitable renegotiation in the light of some unseen subsequent event." Mr. Coggeshall stated that it was his recollection that these corporations "never caused the slightest bit of trouble" and "there was an agreement of settlement between the Government and these organizations" in which they agreed to pay refunds to the Government. Mr. Coggeshall stated that Mr. McCone personally was not connected with any of these renegotiation matters.

Mr. Coggeshall, after stating the above, recalled that while he, Mr. Coggeshall, was connected with the Air Force Renegotiation: Board, Mr. McCone called him to his office and

instructed him to make a survey of Air Force contracts with private interests paying particular attention to the possibility of renegotiating contracts "to prevent private concerns from getting windfall profits." Mr. Coggeshall stated that Mr. McCone was vitally aware that the Government lets many contracts and that it was possible that firms could "take the Government." Mr. Coggeshall stated that, in his opinion, Mr. McCone's background in private business made him aware of that possibility and Mr. McCone had the taxpayers' interests in mind at all times.

A review of the United States Maritime Commission's ship file for the vessel "McKittrick Hills," T2-SE-Al, indicated that the "McKittrick Hills" was allocated for sale under the Merchant Ship Sales Act of 1946 to the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated (citizens sale). The contract was signed February 17, 1948, and title was transferred from the United States Maritime Commission to the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated, at Wilmington, Delaware, March 16, 1948, at 1:00 p.m., Eastern Standard Time.

The statutory sales price, unadjusted, amounted to \$2,026,500. The purchase price of the vessel stated in the mortgage foreclosing March 15, 1948, was \$1,652,163.43, payable \$415,363.43 cash or its equivalent on or before closing and the balance as stated in the mortgage and notes.

It is to be noted that adjustments were made for repair, dockage, insurance, depreciation, removal of national defense and war service features, leap year depreciation, et cetera.

The file contained nothing of an unfavorable nature concerning the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated, and contained no information concerning Mr. McCone.

A review of the United States Maritime Commission's ship file for the vessel "Montebello Hills," T2-SE-A1, reflected that this ship was disposed of in substantially the same manner as was the "McKittrick Hills." Nothing of an unfavorable nature was noted with reference to the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated, or Mr. McCone.

A review of the United States Maritime Commission's file captioned "Pacific Tankers, Incorporated," reflected no unfavorable information concerning this firm or Mr. McCone.

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Mr. Robert S. Pitzer, chief investigator and security officer, United States Maritime Commission, advised that a review of his files reflected no unfavorable information concerning Mr. McCone or the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated. Mr. Pitzer explained that the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated, was a bona fide established corporation engaged in ship transportation. Mr. Pitzer stated that in this capacity during the war (World War II) the firm operated for the Government funited States Maritime Commission) a number of ships as general agent and had approximately at the peak in 1946, seventyeight vessels in service. In accordance with established procedure after the war, the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated, purchased from the Government two of the ships they formerly operated as general agent, the "McKittrick Hills" and the "Montebello Hills," which the firm used in the shipping business.

Mr. Herbert Brezil, chief, Reports and Statistics Branch, Division of Construction and Supply, United States Atomic Energy Commission, Germantown, Maryland, advised that his records are the central indices for current contracts with the AEC which total \$25,000 or more. He advised he has no record for contracts of lesser amounts. He advised in addition his records, which are for construction and architect-type contracts, go back only to 1949 and to 1952 on other types of contracts such as supply contracts and research and development contracts.

Mr. Brezil advised he has no reference in his files to Bechtel-McCone-Parsons Corporation or Bechtel-McCone Corporation.

Mr. Brezil pointed out that the AEC did not come into being until January, 1947, and that prior to that time, the related work taken over by AEC was done by the Manhattan Engineer District. When AEC came into being, existing records were taken over by AEC.

Mr. David H. Carey, assistant chief, Statistical Branch, Division of Construction and Supply, United States Atomic Energy Commission, Germantown, Maryland, advised he has no reference of any kind in his central indices of past or present contracts with the AEC with reference to the Joshua Hendy Corporation. Mr. Carey advised his office has no record of any evaluation file on the Joshua Hendy Corporation since such files are set up only on those concerns with which the AEC actually had a contract.

It is also noted Miss Lola Jaques, contracting officer. Office of the Secretary of Defense, Washington, D. C., advised that the AEC took over the records pertaining to contracts from the Manhattan Engineer District in January, 1947, when the AEC was established. Miss Jaques advised further that these contracts would be located at the AEC in Germantown, Maryland.

As indicated previously no contracts concerning Mr. McCone or the Bechtel-McCone-Parsons Corporation or the Bechtel-McCone Corporation were located at the AEC, Germantown, Maryland.

Mr. Kenneth K. Bechtel, chairman of the board, Industrial Indemnity Company, 155 Sansome Street, San Francisco. California, who is also a director and stockholder in the Bechtel Corporation, 220 Bush Street, San Francisco, California, advised that his comments concerning Mr. McCone are necessarily based upon his best recollection of past events extending over the past eventy odd years and, without reference to specific records which would require considerable additional time, he cannot be certain of the dates and estimated figures furnished. He stated that it should be clearly understood that John McCone is a very capable and highly talented man in the construction field and it is by virtue of these talents, the trust he has derived from his business associates and his marked financial success in business which underwent phenomenal growth immediately prior to, during and subsequent to World War II, that he has attained the very favorable financial and business stature of the present date.

Mr. Bechtel advised that he has never been aware of any unethical practices, business or otherwise, by Mr. McCone but, on the contrary, Mr. Bechtel considers Mr. McCone one of the few men he has known in the business world who has never "cut corners or taken advantage to the detriment of others." He considers Mr. McCone one of the highest principled men and finest men he has ever met and one whose experience, organizational ability and leadership should assist him in becoming a real asset to the United States Government. He stated he feels that Mr. McCone will be wholly unbiased in the treatment of all matters and will consider only the best interests of the Government.

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Mr. Bechtel's first business contact with Mr. McCone was between 1931 and 1935 when the W. A. Bechtel Company and Llewellyn Ironworks or Consolidated Steël Company, with which Mr. McCone was associated, were both doing work on Boulder Dam. Mr. McCone had advanced "up the ranks" in Llewellyn Ironworks and was active in their sales organization. After Consolidated Steel Company was formed, Mr. McCone became executive vicepresident and was in that position when he left to join with the Bechtels in organizing the Bechtel-McConeCorporationin 1936 or 1937.

Mr. Bechtel related that the Bechtel-McCone Corporation was organized by Kenneth K. Bechtel, W. A. Bechtel, Jr., Stephen D. Bechtel, John McCone and Hal Price. He stated that he recalls Mr. McCone had a one-third stock ownership, Stephen D. Bechtel had a one-third stock ownership, Kenneth Bechtel a onesixth stock ownership and Hal Price a one-sixth stock ownership. Mr. Bechtel could not recall the specific interest of W. A. Bechtel, Mr., or that he had any stock investment at the time. He recalled that Mr. Price had remained a party in interest for only a short time. Mr. Bechtel stated he was certain that Mr. McCone had put up his own money as his investment in the Bechtel-McCone Corporation up to possibly \$50,000; however, the source of Mr. McCone's personal funds was not known. He recalled the original capitalization was perhaps \$100,000 to \$200,000. He stated that, prior to the organization of this company, the W. A. Bechtel Company had existed as a family interest, originally founded by W. A. Bechtel, Senior, deceased. This latter company was engaged in heavy-type construction such as bridges, dams, et cetera.

In forming the Bechtel-McCone Corporation, the purpose was to supplement the operations of the W. A. Bechtel Company, specifically in engineering and building of refineries and chemical processing plants. The main office of the Bechtel-McCone Corporation was in Los Angeles and John McCone was president or managing head of the company operations.

Mr. Bechtel advised that shortly after the Bechtel-McCone Corporation was organized, or within the first one or two years of its existence, the name was changed to the Bechtel-McCone-Parsons Corporation. The Ralph Parsons Company of Chicago, Illinois, was well known in the construction trade as a company which excelled in the technical aspects of the business and since they were anxious to expand through better sales organization methods, that company was dissolved and Ralph Parsons became a

stockholder in the new Bechtel-McCone-Parsons Corporation with approximately ten per cent to twenty per cent ownership.

Mr. Bruce Thorne, Mr. Parsons' partner, was on the West Coast on occasion in connection with some apparent financial interest in the new company, but Mr. Bechtel stated he could not recall what, if any, specific stock ownership Mr. Thorne had in the Bechtel-McCone-Parsons Corporation. Neither was Mr. Bechtel aware of the details of Mr. Parsons' acquiring his stock ownership nor the nature of the ways he paid for his stock. He stated the name was simply changed with no change in the corporate structure and, with the new name Mr. McCone held approximately twenty-five per cent to thirty per cent stock ownership.

Mr. Bechtel related that about 1939 or 1940, or three or Your years after Mr. McCone had acquired his initial interest in the Bechtel-McCone Corporation, Mr. McCone was permitted by the Bechtel interests to purchase some stock ownership in the W. A. Bechtel Company (WABC). He stated that the reason for this move was due to Mr. McCone's ability, a feeling of the Bechtel brothers (Kenneth, Stephen and W. A. Jr.) that Mr. McCone would enhance the company's operations, the fact he was well liked by all the Bechtels and to encourage his desire to broaden his ownership interests. Mr. Bechtel recalled that Mr. McCone acquired about five to ten per cent ownership interest, for which he paid cash of somewhere in the neighborhood of \$50,000 to \$100,000. Mr. McCone was made a director of WABC at the same time.

Mr. Bechtel stated that the Bechtel-McCone-Parsons Corporation (BMPC) and WABC were in supplementary fields although owned substantially by the same people. BMPC was also designers as well as builders whereas WABC performed only building operations. Mr. Bechtel advised that BMPC and WABC sometimes operated jointly with one or more of the so-called "Big Six" companies which included Utah Construction Company, Henry J. Kaiser Company, Morrison-Knudsen, and others. He stated the purpose of such joint operations was to share risk, responsibilities, equipment and organization in certain jobs of such magnitude that more than one company was required in order to operate with the greatest efficiency. He stated that these particular companies shared mutual respect among the corporate managements; therefore, they were able to cooperate with great Specifically, Mr. Bechtel referred to the Seattlefacility. Tacoma Shipbuilding Company, Tacoma, Washington, which had

been formed as a joint enterprise to build ships. The Todd Shipyards Corporation was the principal sponsor and designed, built and operated the Seattle-Tacoma Shipbuilding Company. Affiliated with the Todd Shipyards Corporation was the so-called "Western Group" which included members of the "Big Six" companies, BMPC and WAEC.

It was in 1938 or 1939 that the Seattle-Tacoma Shipbuilding Company commenced building ships under the United States Maritime Commission, and it was Mr. Bechtel's recollection that BMPC or WABC or both, he could not recall, had an estimated ten per cent or fifteen per cent ownership interest in that company. The amount of the investment in dollars was not recalled.

In 1940 the BMPC and WABC sponsored the organization of the Todd-California Shipyards Corporation at Richmond, California, in which Todd Shipyards Corporation, the Henry J. Kaiser Company and other "Big Six" companies also participated. Mr. Bechtel recalled that the group also formed other shipyard operations including the Todd-Bath Iron Works at Bath, Maine. It was his recollection that the Todd Shipyards Corporation had an approximate one-third to one-half ownership and the "Western Group" consisting of BMPC, WABC and members of the "Big Six" companies held the same amount.

In late 1940 or early 1941, the California Shipbuilding Corporation was organized as a result of the Liberty shipbuilding program. This resulted from a request of the United States Maritime Commission which wanted to build more ships at a faster rate. BMPC was the sponsoring group with Mr. McCone operating as managing head or president of the new corporation, better known as Calships. At the beginning, funds were derived from stock purchases by the "Big Six" group and BMPC and WABC. . The Todd Shipyards Corporation never acquired any interest in Calships. About this time an exchange of stock was effected by which Todd Shipyards Corporation took over the interest of the "Western Group" in the Todd sponsored shipyards and the "Western Group" assumed full management and ownership of what was believed to be the only remaining interest, the Richmond, California, shipyard, better known as Kaiser Shipyards. Details of this exchange of stock were not recalled by Mr. Bechtel. He stated that BMPC and WABC were the sponsoring group of Calships from the beginning and, he believes, they had the largest stock interest.

About 1945, Calships was dismantled and the two concerns, BMPC and WABC, ended up as residual owners of practically all the stock.

In late 1945 the firms WABC and BMPC were liquidated with approximately five to ten million dollars in assets being distributed to the stockholders. Mr. Bechtel stated that the Bechtel Brothers-McCone Company (BBMC) was then organized but existed for only a short time. He explained that he, his brothers, Stephen and W. A. Jr., and John McCone desired to withdraw from active participation in wartime activities of these companies which had been their principal field throughout the war years and to devote more time to their peacetime interests, which included the Industrial Indemnity Company, which had continued to expand during that period with practically no guiding impetus. The BEMC had as its principal active management, William Waste, Perry Yates, Van Rosendahl and others and the Bechtel brothers, Stephen and Kenneth, and John McCone limited their stock ownership to approximately ten per cent each. In late 1946 or 1947, Kenneth Bechtel and John McCone withdrew from BBMC, both, withdrawing their entire ownership interest and investment which. to the best recollection of Mr. Bechtel, amounted to between \$100,000 and \$150,000 each. Mr. Bechtel noted that neither he nor Mr. McCone realized any profit or appreciation on their stock investment in that company but, instead, it represented a great loss to both in prospective earnings. Those in management control of the company specifically requested that Stephen Bechtel remain in the company as president and leader and he did so. The company changed its name to the Bechtel Corporation by which it is presently known.

Mr. Bechtel stated that, throughout the period Mr. McCone was associated with the Bechtel companies, none of these companies had any contracts with the AEC. It was not until 1949 or 1950 that the Bechtel Corporation undertook its first contract with AEC in connection with the Arco installation in Idaho. At the present time, Mr. McCone has no stock or other ownership interest in the Bechtel Corporation and has held no such interest since he withdrew in 1946 or 1947.

Mr. Bechtel recalled that Mr. McCone, about the end of World War II had become interested in the Joshua Hendý Ironworks at Sunnyvale, California, and it was Mr. Bechtel's belief that the WABC had purchased some stock ownership in the iron-

works, extent of the investment not recalled. The Calships operation was Mr. McCone's particular interest at that time and there was a series of transactions which took place including conversion of Calshipsabout 1947 to a cash position, which resulted in the formation of the Joshua Hendy Corporation. Mr. Bechtel could not now recall the details involved in these transactions. He stated that, following the change of name to . Joshua Hendy Corporation, the Sunnyvale plant of the old iron= works was sold to Westinghouse Electric Corporation and the plant in the East had been sold to another company. As of 1948. by these sales, the Joshua Hendy Corporation had also been reduced to a cash position. It was Mr. Bechtel's recollection that John McCone then held approximately sixty per cent stock ownership in that company while Stephen Bechtel held about twenty-five per cent and he, Kenneth, held about fifteen per cent.

Mr. Bechtel stated he was not sufficiently acquainted with the financial status of the Joshua Hendy Corporation to even estimate its worth as of 1948 when the company had been reduced to a substantial cash position. He stated that in 1955, he and his brother, Stephen, had sold their stock interest in that corporation, either to Mr. McCone directly or to the corporation for a figure which approximated several hundred thousand dollars, but less than one million dollars. He stated that he does not know for certain whether Mr. McCone is now the sole owner but the Bechtel family has no stock ownership interest in the corporation at this time and he is certain that Mr. McCone owns the vast majority of the stock, if not all.

With regard to the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated, Mr. Bechtel recalled that corporation had been organized as one of the operations of the Bechtel-McCone Corporation during World War II and had subsequently been acquired by the Joshua Hendy Corporation. The Bechtel brothers and Bechtel Corporation do not have any vested interest in that corporation at this time and it is Mr. Bechtel's belief that the Joshua Hendy Corporation has now acquired full ownership of the Pacific Tankers, Incorporated, but he was not certain on this point.

Mr. Bechtel advised that the Industrial Indemnity Company with offices at 155 Sansome Street, San Francisco, California, consisted of the Industrial Indemnity Company, a corporation, in which Mr. McCone owns approximately five per cent stock interest and is also a director, and the Industrial

Underwriters, a general partnership, in which Mr. McCone is one of the general partners with approximately five per cent interest. Among approximately twenty other general partners are included the three Bechtel brothers who, with Mr. McCone, own the majority interest in that company and in the Industrial Indemnity Company, the corporation. Mr. T. G. McGuire is president of Industrial Indemnity Company, Kenneth Bechtel is chairman of the board, and Stephen D. Bechtel and Stephen D. Bechtel, Jr., are directors.

Mr. Bechtel stated that there are no joint activities in which that company or, to his knowledge, the Bechtel Corporation, are engaged with the Joshua Hendy Corporation or with Mr. McCone and no such activities are contemplated, to his knowledge, in the foreseeable future. He stated that John McCone recently informed him that, if appointed to the position under consideration, he plans to immediately dispose of his partnership interest in the Industrial Underwriters and will, in all probability, dispose of his stock interest in the Industrial Indemnity Company in order to remove any possible hint of a continued affiliation with the Bechtel interests, Mr. Bechtel noting that the Industrial Indemnity Company is basically a Bechtel enterprise.

Mr. McCone testified during September, 1946, during the hearings before the Committee on the Merchant Marine and Fisheries, United States House of Representatives, 79th Congress, Second Session. These hearings were held in connection with an investigation of shipyard profits. There is enclosed a copy of the results of these hearings and Mr. McCone's testimony is reflected on pages 189 to 225, inclusive.



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

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

As a matter of interest there are attached three columns by Pearson, all of which appeared on January, 12, 1962, in different localities. The Washington Post article contains no mention of the FBI, the Los Angeles Times article mentions the FBI only in the first paragraph and The Morning Herald, Hagerstown, Maryland, column mentions the FBI in the caption as well as the first and second paragraphs.

Pearson's column deals with hearings which were conducted by the Committee on the Merchant Marine and Fisheries, United States House of Representatives, 79th Congress, 2nd Session, in 1946 regarding the Henry Kaiser interests at San Francisco during the war and the fact that McCone testified during these hearings. Pearson states it would have been easy for the FBI to have read these hearings and adds in a snide manner in the Hagerstown column "The FBI, however, asks questions. It doesn't read." This remark could not be further from the truth.

As a matter of fact, when we investigated McCone, we were fully aware of his appearance before the Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries in 1946. The record of these hearings Wasp reviewed and a complete transcript was furnished to the White House as an enclosure with our summary dated June 30, 1958. The attention of the White House was specifically called to the fact that Mr. McCone's testimony appeared on pages 189 to 225 inclusive.


It is interesting to note that on June 25, 1958, Mr. McPhee at the White House advised Mr. Bartlett of the Liaison Section that Governor Sherman Adams was very impressed with the promptness and thoroughness of the Bureau's handling of the McCone investigation. Of more significance is the fact that on the same date Senator Clinton Anderson of New Mexico, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, a Democrat, advised Mr. Tolson that he had reviewed the White House file and it looked like "a good plece of work on the part of the FBI," referring to the investigation of McCone, a Republican.

Res. 135) providing for the construction by the Department of the Interior of demonstration plants for the production, from saline or brackish waters, of water suitable for agricultural, industrial, municipal, and other beneficial consumption uses.

CONSERVATION OF THE RARE HAWAIIAN NENE GOOSE

Mr. BONNER. Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent to take from the Speaker's table the bill (S. 4249) to authorize a program for the conservation, restoration, and management of the rare Hawaiian Nene goose, and ask for its` immediate consideration.

The Clerk read the title of the bill. The SPEAKER. Is there objection to the request of the gentleman from North Carolina?

Mr. ARENDS. Mr. Speaker, reserving the right to object; will the gentleman tell us what this bill does?

Mr. BONNER. Mr. Speaker, the purpose of the bill is to authorize a program of research, propagation, and management for the Hawaiian Nene goose. At the present time, there are only about 50 geese at large in the entire Territory of Hawaii, and their continued existence is threatened in the absence of a program. for their management. Up to the present, voluntary efforts by private individuals and very small grants by the Territory of Hawaii have served to keep the species from following the passenger pigeon into extinction. Existing

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funds that might be used are not available because of regulations' of the Fish and Wildlife Service and, in the absence of this authorization, necessary steps for the propagation of the species cannot be undertaken.

Mr. ARENDS. Mr. Speaker, I withdraw my reservation of objection.

The SPEAKER. Is there objection to the request of the gentleman from North Carolina?

There was no objection.

The Clerk read the bill, as follows:

Be it enacted, etc., That whereas there are less than 50 Nene geese in the wild state in the Territory of Hawaii, and this unique, native species of waterfowl is threatened with imminent extinction, the Secretary of the Interior is hereby authorized and directed to promote a program of research, propagation, and management necessary to effect the restoration of this threatened species in its natural habitat.

SEC. 2. The sum of \$15,000 per annum is hereby authorized to be appropriated each year for a period of 5 years to carry out the purposes of this act.

Mr. BURNS of Hawaii. Mr. Speaker, S. 4249 and H. R. 11584 are identical bills to authorize a program for the conservation, restoration, and management of the rare Hawaijan Nene goose-Branta sandvicensis—which is now considered one of the rarest species of waterfowl in the world.

I want to take advantage of this opportunity to commend the chairman and members of the Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee of the House for their expeditious and gracious consideration of this bill and its prompt reporting to this House. I want to also acknowledge the kind courtesy of the senior Senator from Washington, the Honorable WARREN MAGNUSON. for his introduction of the Senate bill which was promptly considered by the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee of the other body which the Senator from Washington is chairman. The diligence and great interest of Chairman MAGNUSON and the members of his committee are gratefully acknowledged.

By action of the Territorial Legislature in 1955 the Nene, or Hawaiian goose, was named the official bird of Hawaii.

The history of the effort to preserve the vanishing species of wildlife in the table. United States is one of too little too late. The Nene was abundant at one time on the slopes of Mauna Loa and Hualalai in Hawaii and Haleakala in Maui.

nificent waterfowl has declined seriously in numbers due to several factors, including indiscriminate hunting in past years, changes in land use, and the increase of predators, such as mongooses, wild pigs and dogs. The bird was formerly a migratory one but became at some time in the distant past a resident of Hawaii.

Today, as a result of extensive efforts, there are less than 50 birds in the wild state. Two captive flocks are in existence, one owned by Mr. Herbert C. Shipman, of Hawaii, and the other by the Wildfowl Trust, Slimbridge, Gloucestershire, England. This latter flock was started from a male and 2 females in 1950.

In 1955, with the help of interested conservationists in Hawaii and on the mainland, grants to the total amount of \$8,000 to finance an ecological survey were secured through the Yale University Bishop Museum Fellowship, Pan American Section of the International Committee for Bird Preservation, the Guggenheim Foundation, and the Mc-Inerny Foundation. Dr. William H. Elder, professor of zoology at the University of Michigan, conducted the study and made a four-step recommendation.

The Legislature of Hawaii and the Territorial administration have made material contributions of effort and money to the preservation of the None and its reestablishment. Since July 1, 1949, to June 30, 1958, \$22,865 has been expended through the fish and game division of the board of agriculture and forestry. The budget request for the 1958-59 biennium is \$17,000.

Within the last month an agreement was made with the Bishop estate and C. Brewer & Co., owners of the land where the Nene is found in the wild state, for the establishment of a sanctuary which will be maintained and controlled by the fish and game division of the Territorial government. The two owners of the land are allowing the use of their property without compensation. Hawaii has done its part with the means at its command. The Federal assistance is needed so that competent personnel can be assigned to the task of permanently restoring the Nene and seeing the job through. This can be done by enactment of S. 4249 and H. R. 11584.

The Wildlife Management Institute, the National Parks Ast mation, the National Audubon Society, the Wildfowl Trust of England, the Federation of Western Outdoor Clubs, the Izzak Walton League of America, among others, have expressed their support of the bills. The Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, has recommended onactment of the bills, and the Bureau of the Budget interposes no objection.

There was no objection.

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Mr. BONNER. Mr. Speaker, 2 years ago there was enacted a bill, which I introduced in the spring of 1955, to authorize the construction of an atomic merchant ship powered by a specially designed advanced type of reactor. This first great application of nuclear power to shipping was to be a practical merchant vessel of combination passenger and cargo design capable of providing shipping services on routes essential for maintaining the flow of the foreign free 161-1709

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commerce of the United States. The authorization took the form of an amendment to sitle VII of the Merchant. Marine Act of 1936, since it was intended that the ship would be in furtherance of our national maritime policy as laid down by the Congress in that act.

The creation of the ship was to be a joint project with the Atomic Energy Commission responsible for the nuclear, reactor and the Department of Commerce responsible for design and construction of the vessel itself and all of its other equipment and machinery.

This important project is now under. way. She was christened the Nuclear. Ship Savannah at her keel-laying in Camden, N. J., on National Maritime Day, May 22, of this year. She is scheduled to be launched next year and be ready for operation in 1960.

The Savannah, in her construction and operation, will be the laboratory in which the American merchant marine in the nuclear age will be developed. Upon completion it is contemplated that she will operate to various areas throught the world in demonstration of the peaceful uses of the miracle power of atomic energy.

We are fortunate that through the effective operation of the Merchant Marine Act of 1936, to foster the development and encourage the maintenance of an American-flag, citizen-owned merchant marine, there are long-established and experienced operators serving essential trade routes with wholly owned and operated American-flag passenger and freight vessels serving Western Europe, the Mediterranean, the east and west coasts of South America, the Far East, Australia, Africa, and around the world.

Thus, there are logically available many companies ready, able, and willing to perform their share in their partnership with the Government in carrying out our national policy. Among them are major companies whose very names bespeak of our country: United States Lincs, American Export Lines, and American President Lines.

In view of the foregoing, therefore. I was greatly disturbed—I might even say I was shocked-when it was announced by the Maritime Administration and the Atomic Energy Commission 2 or 3 weeks ago that States Marine Corporation of Delaware has been selected as the general agent for the operation of the nuclear ship Savannah, under a negotiated operating agreement.

At this point I want to make it perfeetly clear that my reaction to the announcement implies no criticism of States Marine as an operating steamship company. Nor do I suggest that the proposed assignment of the vessel is not within the letter of the law.

On the basis of information which has come to my attention, there are, how-ever, certain aspects of this proposition which I consider to be highly questionable.

First, it is the intent of the 1936 act: that the American merchant marine United States flag by citizens of the United States. Provisions of the shipping. laws implement this intent by strict requirements regarding citizenship. Fur-

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ther to assure the very highest degree of? American control, the 1936 act provides that it shall be unlawful for any contractor receiving an operating differential subsidy, or for any charterer of vessels under that act, or any holding company, subsidiary, afiiliate, or associate of such contractor or such charterer, or any officer, director, agent, or executive thereof, directly or indirectly to own, charter, act as agent or broker for, or operate any foreign-flag vessel which competes with any American-flag service determined to be essential under the act.

It is my understanding States Marine Lines operates about 15 American-flag ships of its own, plus 24 more through its wholly owned subsidiary, Isthmian -Lines, Inc. Some 40 to 50 American-flag ships are said to be operated under charter. And an additional 4 or 5 are operated through a berth agency with But Bloomfield Steamship Company. the States Marine fleet of 122 vessels includes somewhere between 30 and 40 foreign-flag ships, operated through foreign connections and affiliations which makes it presently ineligible to receive operating subsidy or charter vessels under the 1936 act. In the operation of both its American and foreignflag ships, this company uses foreign shipping firms as its agents abroad, and in turn acts as United States agents for them.

According to Fortune Magazine, in South Africa, for example, States Marine, headed by Henry Mercer of New York, helped set up a company for an old friend, former British Air Marshal Harris. As the Fortune article says:

Mercer was instrumental in getting some ships from the United States Maritime Commission for the South African company, and the two firms whack up 50/50 such cargo as they can corral that is headed either east or west between the United States and South Africa.

Only by resorting to the broad au-thority in the Federal Maritime Board to use general agents to operate vessels owned by the United States for experimental or testing purposes, can the assignment of the nuclear ship Savannah to States Marine rather than to an American operator without foreign, connections be legally justified.

While flexibility of authority is un doubtedly desirable in connection with the development, trial and testing of . vessels for experimental purposes, no facts have come to my attention which would justify the assignment of a vessel having the significance of the nuclear ship Savannah to an operator who because of extensive foreign-flag affiliations cannot meet the tests laid down in `the 1936 act, when there are fully-qualified wholly-owned American steamship: companies available to perform this important function.

In this connection, it is my under-standing that an interagency operator selection board of the Maritime Administration and the Atomic Energy Comshall be owned and operated under the mission was appointed to review and United States flag by citizens of the analyze the replies of the seven operators indicating an interest in operating the Savannah. It is further my understanding that this Board unanimously

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recommended American President Lines. Limited, as first choice and United States Lines Company as second choice, on the basis of the many factors involved, but with particular reference to basic trade. routes and extent of experience with passenger operations. Moreover, these two companies have already made substantial studies in connection with nuclear propelled vessels. I have requested the Maritime Administrator to furnish me with a copy of the board's report with the background justifications for the final selection of an operator. This has been denied me.

Nonetheless, it is a well-known fact that States Marine does not now, and never has, engaged in the operation of passenger vessels, although I believe the. Isthmian subsidiary carries some passengers on its 12-passenger freighters. I am at a loss to understand the decision that has been made.

The publicity attending the announcement of the assignment of the vessel states that in the handling of future passenger travel, Matson Navigation Co. would act with States Marine. Again I cannot understand why other qualified American passenger operators should have been passed over in favor of a company that had indicated no interest in operating the vessel.

The picture becomes even more cloudy and confusing when it is realized that the able and distinguished new Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, Honorable John A. McCone, is a man with extensive shipping interests. Mr. McCone's shipping companies are Joshua Hendy Corp., and Panama Pacific Tank-; ers which are engaged directly or through subsidiaries in the shipping business as owners, charterers and operators of ships under both foreign and American flag. The Hendy vessels are employed in the distribution of chemicals, crude oil and refined petroleum products, and iron ore and bauxite. At the time of his nomination for the Atomic Energy Commission post, Mr. McCone was engaged in a very active. partnership with Mr. Mercer, the head of States Marine Lines. According to the August 1958 issue of Fortune:

With Mr. Mercer's support, Mr. McCone had plunged ahead with a plan to make Joshua Hendy one of the most important seagoing ore carriers. Its trade prospered. It was hauling iron ore from Venezuela and Peru, bauxite from Jamaica, and chemicals in the intercoastal trade.

The nomination hearings before the Senate Section of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy on July 2 of this year do not go into detail except to show that Mr. McCone has divested himself of his control of the two shipping corporations to the extent of placing his stock. in them in an irrevocable trust with the trust department of the California Bank of Los Angeles. I have no concern with the arrangements made by Mr. McCone to meet the technical requirements of , the law in regard to the difficult problem of avoiding conflicts of interests

faced by so many able and successful businessmen when called to public service. However, the facts concerning the intimate business relationships which have existed between Mr. McCone and Mr. Mercer raise certain obvious questions when we seek to find the answer to the apparently illogical assignment of the nuclear ship Savannah to States Marine Lines by the Department of Commerce and the Atomic Energy Commission.

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Another recent development seems to shed further light on a picture that be-comes more complicated as it is examined. As recently as August 14, 1958, the president of Matson Orient Line, Inc., an applicant for operating subsidy from United States Atlantic ports to the Far East, announced that Matson Navigation Co. and Isthmian Lines, Inc., will each acquire a 50-percent ownership of Matson Orient. Matson Navigation and Isthmian will buy 100 percent of the common stock of Matson Orient, Inc., for \$8½ million, with which Matson Orient then proposes to purchase three vessels from each Matson Navigation and Isthmian with which to commence its new service and will have \$1 million left over as working capital. The officers and directors of Matson Orient Line are also officers or directors of one or more of Matson Navigation Co., Isthmian Lines, Inc., and States Marine Corp. Perhaps this new development explains why Matson Navigation Co., which expressed no interest in operating the Savannah, should nevertheless be designated to act with States Marine in the handling of future passenger travel.

Mr. Speaker, even though I have no reason to believe that any law has been violated by the decision of the Secretary of Commerce to select States Marines. Lines as operating agent for the nuclear ship Savannah in preference to exclusively American-flag lines, which to me are seemingly more logical and qualified, the known circumstances in this matter are of great interest to me and I feel that they must be to the Members of Congress generally.

I do not know whether there was any undue pressure from any source that caused this situation to be brought about; but I can assure you that I intend to follow the future course of arrangements relative to the development and operation of our first nuclear merchant ship with even more intense interest than I heretofore have since I introduced the original authorizing legislation.

There is not now, and I doubt if there ever has been, any Member of this Congress more devoted to the cause of developing and maintaining a strong American-flag merchant marine. The Merchant Marine Act of 1936 is an excellent law if administered properly and carefully. But if it is not, I fear that we might again find ourselves confronted with the disgraceful situation that brought about the Black investigation of 1934 and 1935, with its disclosures of complicated corporate subterfuges and favoritism diverting the purposes of the then existing law which Congress had passed in the hopes of developing an

adequate, stable, and efficient merchant marine to serve the needs of the commerce and defense of this country.

Mr. Speaker, I will watch with interest to see who plucks the plum.

We are fortunate that through the effective operation of the Merchant Matine Act of 1936, to foster the development and encourage the maintenance of an American-flag, citizen-owned merchant marine, there are long-established and experienced operators serving essential trade routes with wholly owned and operated American-flag passenger and freight vessels serving Western Europe, the Mediterranean, the east and west coasts of South America, the Far East, Australia, Africa, and around the world.

Thus, there are logically available many companies ready, able, and willing to perform their share in their partnership with the Government in carrying out our national policy. Among them are major companies whose very names bespeak of our country: United States 14ncs, American Export Lines, and

American President Lines. In View of the foregoing, therefore, I was greatly disturbed—I might even say I was shocked—when it was announced by the Maritime Administration and the Atomic Energy Commission 2 or 3 weeks ago that States Marine Corporation of Delaware has been selected as the general agent for the operation of the nucicar ship Savanah, under a negotiated operating agreement.

At this point I want to make it perfectly clear that my reaction to the announcement implies no criticism of states Marine as an operating steamship company. Nor do I suggest that the proposed assignment of the vessel is not within the letter of the law.

On the basis of information which has cone to my attention, there are, however, certain aspects of this proposition. which I consider to be highly questionable.

First, it is the intent of the 1936 act. that the American merchant marine: shall be owned and operated under the United States flag by citizens of the United States. Provisions of the shippinghard implement this intent by strict resurfaments regarding citizenship. Fur-

ther to assure the very highest degree of American control, the 1936 act provides that it shall be unlawful for any contractor receiving an operating differential subsidy, or for any charterer of vessels under that act, or any holding company, subsidiary, affiliate, or associate of such contractor or such charterer, or any officer, director, agent, or executive thereof, directly or indirectly to own, charter, act as agent or broker for, or operate any foreign-flag vessel which competes with any American-flag service determined to be essential under the act.

It is my understanding States Marine Lines operates about 15 American-flag ships of its own, plus 24 more through its wholly owned subsidiary, Isthmian Lines, Inc. Some 40 to 50 American-flag ships are said to be operated under charter. And an additional 4 or 5 are operated through a berth agency with Bloomfield Steamship Company. But the States Marine fleet of 122 vessels includes somewhere between 30 and 40 foreign-flag ships, operated through foreign connections and affiliations which makes it presently ineligible to receive operating subsidy or charter vessels under the 1936 act. In the operation of both its American and foreignflag ships, this company uses foreign shipping firms as its agents abroad, and in turn acts as United States agents for them.

According to Fortune Magazine, in South Africa, for example, States Marine, headed by Henry Mercer of New York, helped set up a company for an old friend, former British Air Marshal Harris. As the Fortune article says:

Mercer was instrumental in getting some ships from the United States Maritime Commission for the South African company, and the two firms whack up 50/50 such cargo as they can corral that is headed either east or west between the United States and South. Africa.

Only by resorting to the broad authority in the Federal Maritime Board to use general agents to operate vessels owned by the United States for experimental or testing purposes, can the assignment of the nuclear ship Savannah to States Marine rather than to an American operator without foreign connections be legally justified.

While flexibility of authority is undoubtedly, desirable in connection with the development, trial and testing of vessels for experimental purposes, no facts have come to my attention which would justify the assignment of a vessel having the significance of the nuclear ship Savannah to an operator who because of extensive foreign-flag affiliations cannot meet the tests laid down in the 1936 act, when there are fully-qualified wholly-owned American steamship companies available to perform this important function.

In this connection, it is my understanding that an interagency operator selection board of the Maritime Administration and the Atomic. Energy Commission was appointed to review and analyze the replies of the seven operators indicating an interest in operating the Savannah. It is further my understanding that this Board unanimously

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recommended American President Lines, Limited, as first choice and United States Lines Company as second choice, on the basis of the many factors involved, but with particular reference to basic trade routes and extent of experience with passenger operations. Moreover, these two companies have already made substantial studies in connection with nuclear propelled vessels. Unfortunately, I cannot vouch for the accuracy of the conclusions which I have been told were contained in the report of the inter-agency board, because I have-been unable to obtain a copy of the report. I have requested the Maritime Administrator to furnish me with a copy of the board's report with the background justifications for the final selection of an operator. This has been denied me.

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Nonetheless, it is a well-known fact that States Marine does not now, and never has, engaged in the operation of passenger vessels, although I believe the Isthmian subsidiary carries some passengers on its 12-passenger freighters. I am at a loss to understand the decision that has been made.

The publicity attending the announcement of the assignment of the vessel states that in the handling of future passenger travel, Matson Navigation Co. would act with States Marine. Again I cannot understand why other qualified American passenger operators should have been passed over in favor of a company that had indicated no interest in operating the vessel.

The picture becomes even more cloudy; and confusing when it is realized that the able and distinguished new Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, Honorable John A. McCone, is a man-with extensive snipping interests. Mr. McCone's shipping companies are Joshua Hendy Corp., and Panama Pacific Tank-: ers which are engaged directly or. through subsidiaries in the shipping business as owners, charterers and operators of ships under both foreign and American flag. The Hendy vessels are employed in the distribution of chemicals, crude oil and refined petroleum products, and iron ore and bauxite. At the time of his nomination for the Atomic Energy Commission post, Mr. McCone was engaged in a very active partnership with Mr. Mercer, the head of States Marine Lines. According to the August 1958 issue of Fortune:

With Mr. Mercer's support, Mr. McCone, had plunged ahead with a plan to make Joshua Hendy one of the most important seagoing ore carriers. Its trade prospered. It was hauling iron ore from Venezuela and Peru, bauxite from Jamaica, and chemicals in the intercoastal trade.

The nomination hearings before the Senate Section of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy on July 2 of this year do not go into detail except to show that Mr. McCone has divested himself of his control of the two shipping corporations to the extent of placing his stock in them in an irrevocable trust with the trust department of the California Bank of Los Angeles. I have no concern with the arrangements made by Mr. McCone to meet the technical requirements of the law in regard to the difficult problem of avoiding conflicts of interests

faced by so many able and successful businessmen when called to public service. However, the facts concerning the intimate business relationships which have existed between Mr. McCone and Mr. Mercer raise certain obvious questions when we seek to find the answer to the apparently illogical assignment of the nuclear ship Savannah to States Marine Lines by the Department of Commerce and the Atomic Energy Commission.

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Another recent development seems to shed further light on a picture that becomes more complicated as it is examined. As recently as August 14, 1958, the president of Matson Orient Line, Inc., an applicant for operating subsidy from United States Atlantic ports to the Far East, announced that Matson Navigation Co. and Isthmian Lines, Inc., will each acquire a 50-percent ownership of Matson Orient. Matson Navigation and Isthmian will buy 100 percent of the common stock of Matson Orient, Inc., for \$81/2 million, with which Matson Orient then proposes to purchase three vessels from each Matson Navigation and Isthmian with which to commence its new service and will have \$1 million left over as working capital. The officers and directors of Matson Orient Line are also officers or directors of one or more of Matson Navigation Co., Isthmian Lines, Inc., and States Marine Corp. Perhaps this new development explains why Matson Navigation Co., which expressed no interest in operating the Savannah, should nevertheless be designated to act with States Marine in the handling of future passenger travel.

Mr. Speaker, even though I have no reason to believe that any law has been violated by the decision of the Secretary of Commerce to select States Marines Lines as operating agent for the nuclear ship Savannah in preference to exclusively American-flag lines, which to me are seemingly more logical and qualified, the known circumstances in this matter. are of great interest to me and I feel that they must be to the Members of Con-. gress generally.

I do not know whether there was any undue pressure from any source that caused this situation to be brought about: but I can assure you that I intend to follow the future course of arrangements relative to the development and operation of our first nuclear merchant ship with even more intense interest than I heretofore have since I the original authorizing introduced legislation.

There is not now, and I doubt if there ever has been, any Member of this Congress more devoted to the cause of developing and maintaining a strong American-flag merchant marine. The Merchant Marine Act of 1936 is an excellent law if administered properly and. carefully. But if it is not, I fear that we might again find ourselves confronted with the disgraceful situation that brought about the Black investigation of 1934 and 1935, with its disclosures of complicated corporate subterfuges and favoritism diverting the purposes of the then existing law which Congress had passed in the hopes of developing an

adequate, stable, and efficient merchant marine to serve the needs of the commerce and defense of this country.

Mr. Speaker, I will watch with interest to see who plucks the plum.

vailable when a passport is denied, the applicant shall be accorded the right to apar, to be represented by counsel, to present cyldence, to be informed of the evidence against him and the source of such evidence, and to confront and cross-examine adjerse titiceses. These are the essential cleteres of due process. Rooted in expe-rience tree afford indispensable means tothe wondering of fair and reasonable ward judghonts.

Mr. WALTER wants the Department of State to abandon these procedures. He wants the Department to deny passports to citizens of the United States on the mere say-so of anonympus informers, without allowing the applicant to confront the informers and cross-examine them, without allowing even cross-examine them, without allowing even the officials of the Department to know the identity of the informers. Apart from the fact that the Supreme Court has expressly declared that such procedure is forbidden by the Constitution, it is forbidden by com-monsense as well. For decisions based on such evidence are not judgments at all; they are nothing more than capricious and orbitrary guesses.

arbitrary guesses. No one can question Mr. WALTER'S zeal to protect American security. But what kind of America will be have made secure if its citizens can be denied constitutional rights and deprived of liberty by the mere whim of administrative officers? We congratulate the Department of State for restoring fairness to its passport procedures. "For," as Judge Charles Faby put it recently in an essay on "The Right To Travel," "liberty is" precious and one may be deprived of it only by methods which are fair and for reasons which are sound and rest on the common good, on a good so great as to outweigh in some circumstances the great good of individual liberty."

Mr. MORSE. Mr/President, I was so moved by the editorial that I saw fit to send a letter to the Attorney General of the United States this morning on the subject of passports because, as Sena-tors know, for years I have taken a very definite position in the Senate in regard to the constitutional questions that have been involved in the passport controversy. I wrote to the Attorney General as follows:

Hon. ROBERT KENNEDY,

Attorney General

DEAR MR. KENNEDY: This letter is to advise you of mý gratification with the regulations you worked out with the Department of State to govern the issuance of passports to persons believed to be Communists. In my opinion, it is long past time for the execu-tive and legislative branches of the Federal Government to observe the provisions of the Constitution which too often are left to the courts arone to protect.

I know from my own experience that this area of conestic security against the Com-munist conspiracy is one of the most mis-understood issues of the cold war. As you know, after the U.S. Supreme Count ruled he State Department could not withthel hold passports in the absence of legislative authority to do so, the previous administra-tion tried to get Congress to pass such legislation. Unfortunately, it also sought con-gressional sanction of the use of star-chamber methods in determining whether a passport should be withheld.

The use of secret information available only to the official making the decision and Conigd to the individual who is exercising a given right is nothing but a police-state pro .edure. Whether the practice is used in con nection with passports or any other official matter, it is the earmark of totalitarianism. It certainly is one of the principal abuses of Executive power from which our constitu-

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tional forefathers tried to save the American

people. The right to know the identity of an ac-cuser, to know the nature of the accusation, and the right to offer rebuttal are basic to due process of law. It is always astonishing to me that some people would destroy/these Constitution guarantees of due process of law in the name of defending the Constitution.

It was for this reason that I opposed this legislation in 1958 and again in/1959. I especially objected to the attempt to rush a bill through the Congress in the closing days of the 55th Congress, with only a few days of the 35th Congress, with only a few days of hearings. I therefore objected to the holding of hearings while the Senate was in session, and as a resulf, no final ac-tion was taken. It was rather shocking to me that when members of the Foreign Rela-tions Committee proposed legislation au-thorizing the withholding of passports with proper procedural stregunds, the Depart-ment of State declared: "Aroreover, the De-partment must oppose any provision which might require the Secretary to make his determination on a particular passport ap-plication only on the basis of information and sources thereof which could be disclosed in open court." in`open court."

In open court." Obviously, to make the determination on any other basis is repugnant to the terms and to the principles of our Constitution. I am pleased that you have now made this-perfectly clear. I am also pleased that this battle I waged against police state methods has been vindicated, and I am so informing Mr. Roger Jones the Deputy Under Secretary of State for Administration, as well as your-self.

Mr. President, this announced policy of the administration represents a very important contribution to constitutional guarantees on the part of this administration. It is a reaffirmation, with no question of doubt, with no equivocation, that these precious constitutional rights of due process will be respected by this administration. I congratulate the President of the United States that under his administration this very clear and unequivocal position in regard to the passport issue has been announced.

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Mr. MORSE, Mr. Fresident, Isim one who is very much disturbed and concerned about the discussions which have rector of the CIA., I have reached no . final determination as to my own position on that nomination, because all the facts are not in. Before I make my final decision, I shall await the hearings before the committee, the report of the com-mittee, and my own analysis of the record as it is finally presented to me as a Member of the Senate.

I do most respectfully say, however, in view of the information which has already been publicized, that the burden of proof is on the administration to justify this nomination. Every shadow of doubt as to the qualification of this nominee ought to be removed.

Mr. President, we are dealing here with, an operation of an agency which also gives me great concern as a constitution-

We are dealing here with alist. an agency in which the people do not have very effective checks as of now. We are dealing here with an agency whose operations are conducted in complete secrecy, even so far as the elected representatives of a free people in the Congress of the United States are concerned.

I hold to the point of view that in our Republic the adoption of procedures of complete secrecy are difficult to justify under our constitutional system. I have never been one who holds to the point of view that the CIA should be allowed to operate as it now operates, in complete secrecy with respect to the attaining of knowledge of its actions by the elected representatives of a free people in the, parliamentary body in our form of government, which is the Congress of the United States. Why do I say that? I say it as a constitutionalist. I find great difficulty reconciling the granting of such power to the CIA with that basic safeguard of freedom guaranteed to our people by the Constitution known as the check and balance system.

Where is the check on the CIA? Mr. President, do not tell me that the check is to be found in the office of the Presidency of the United States. I speak quite impersonally. It makes no difference to me who occupies the Presidency of the United States when we deal with a question of constitutional power and constitutional guarantees. I say, as I have-said before, it is not safe for freedom to grant any agency of government, no matter how much it is attempted to cloak it under the name of security, the unchecked power now vested in the CIA.

Therefore, when the nomination for Director of CIA comes to the floor of the Senate, as long as that unchecked power remains vested in the CIA. it is incumbent upon us to see that the greatest care be exercised by us under the advise and consent clause of the Constitution in respect to that nomination. Unless every shadow of doubt is removed from this nominee as to his qualification, the senior Senator from Oregon will not possibly be able to vote for the confirmation of the nomination.

More than that, I believe that when the nomination is under consideration may be a fitting time to raise this whole question of unchecked CIA power on this been carried on in the press with respect Side of the aisle. Much has been heard to the nomination of Mr. McCone as Di- on this side of the aisle in recent years. when a representative of the party of the opposition occupied the White House, in respect to the CIA. As far as I am concerned, these issues are always two-way streets. Therefore, it is incumbent upon the Democratic side of the aisle in the Senate in this session of Congress to take a long, hard look at the question as to whether we are going to continue to permit the CIA to function with unchecked power, so far as the legislative branch of the Government is concerned, which is irreconcilable, in my opinion, with the very precious constitutional guarantee of checks and balances.

> Mr. President, do not tell me that it is not safe to permit the elected parliamentary officials of a free people to take a look at the activities of the CIA;

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but that it is perfectly safe to allow a considerable number of unelected people, who never had to meet the challenge , of a free ballot box in this Republicnot only on the staff of the CIA, but down in the Pentagon and in the State Department and at the White House staff level-to have knowledge as to the operations of the CIA. It is difficult to justify permitting appointed staff members of the executive branch to have access to CIA information and then say that the elected representatives of a free people must not have access to the activities, the maneuverings and, yes, sometimes, as I am satisfied, and as we already know and the record shows, manipulations in the field of foreign policy by CIA.

With the issue of war and peace so nip and tuck in our time, it is all the more important that we see to it that the check and balance policy of our Constitution be carried out in full.

Therefore the senior Senator from Oregon will continue to support, may I say to my Democratic colleagues—and I hope there will be sufficient Republican support—the passage of legislation in this session of Congress which places a congressional check on the CIA.

The time to consider it is now, when we have before the Senate of the United States the question of the confirmation of the nomination of the head of the CIA.

What are we afraid of? Freedom? What are we afraid of? The constitutional principles of the organic law of this land, which become meaningless if we sacrifice the check and balance system?

I am for as much check on the congressional branch of the Government as I am for a check on the executive branch. However, here in respect to the CIA we have an unchecked executive power that ought to be brought to an end.

We need to keep in mind that foreign policy is not the property of the President. The foreign policy of the United States is the property of the American people-all of them. All the President is, as I have raid many times before, is the administrator of the people's foreign policy. I am concerned about being confronted with after-the-fact situationsafter the CIA has created problems, as it has in the past—in certain foreign lands, which, in my judgment, have caused embarrassment to the United States. I speak as the chairman of the Subcommittee on Latin American Affairs. It is well known by members of my subcommittee that I am not too happy about some of the manipulations by the CIA in Latin America in times gone by. I think the policies of the CIA ought to be changed. What is wrong with that? What are we afraid of?

Do not tell me, Mr. President, that to preserve freedom, we must adopt the police state methods of communism or fascism. I renounce that theory. However, I see no escape from the premise that if we continue to tolerate the unchecked power of the CIA, we are adopting a police state procedure.

Let the record be clear as to what the operations of the CIA, in part, are. They

deal with the whole question of espionage? They deal with the whole question of spy activity. This is necessary. I have joined in voting millions of dollars for such activities of the CIA and shall continue to do so in the interest of security. However, I only insist upon the exercise of the constitutional right of Congress to check upon the work of that agency, which deals with es-pionage and spy activities. Apparently we have come to the pass where today it is necessary to have legislation for that purpose. That was not true in the early history of the Republic. What is needed is to review the relationship between Congress and the executive in the early history of the Government. Would we have told Webster or Calhoun, or any of the other great forefathers who trod the carpet of this great parliamentary Chamber, that it was necessary to have legislation to enable the legislative branch of the Government to find out what the executive branch of the Government was doing in some cloak-anddagger operation somewhere in the world which might very well involve the suffering and the lives of tens upon tens of thousands of American boys? What would Jefferson have said about such an unchecked power at the time of his Presidency? All of these forefathers and many more would have thrown up their hands in horror at the suggestion that this was not an inherent right of Congress, ingrained in our constitutional system. As a matter of right, Congress should know what the CIA is doing, has done, and contemplates doing in connection with its operations in any foreign land.

I'am one who believes that in this year of 1962 we may very well determine the whole future, if there is to be one, of the history of the United States.

I say most respectfully to my President-and I use the word in its proper sense-I truly love him for his great statesmanship and leadership. However, I say to my President, from the floor of the Senate today, that the great-, est defense weapon which the American people have is the Constitution of the United States, with all the guarantees of procedural rights specifically spelled out and clearly inherent in it, and unanswerably implied, as well. With the utmost respect for the President of the United States, I raise the question: Why continue, under your administration, this unchecked, unreviewable policy of the CIA in the field of foreign policy? It is such unchecked power that can cause a war. Once the war situation is created and the incident has occurred, even though it might constitute a second "sinking of the Maine," there is no question as to what the action of Congress has to be.

We are in a situation in which we shall probably never again see Congress pass a declaration of war prior to the beginning of war. I think the probabilities are much greater that war will have started and that Congress, after the fact, will declare war. That is why this Senator is so much concerned about the unchecked power, exercised by the CIA or any other agency of Government.

So I raise my voice today with this warning, because a full discussion of the facts of the problem should not be avoided in the consideration of the McCone nomination.

I close by saying that I shall make my final decision on the McCone nomination when the whole record is in. But my administration has the burden of proof on that record, because from the objections and such documentation as I have already read, the administration cannot escape that burden of proof. We have been reading in recent days allegations, supported by documentation, which has been offered us for our consideration, but which, I hasten to add, should be subjected to the most thorough cross examination and analysis, in the form of a series of columns written by Drew Pearson. I have referred to Drew Pearson on other occasions, even when he has. dipped his pen in my blood, as well as. that of other Senators, to be un-doubtedly the most able and effective muckraker of our time. But let us also recognize that the muckrakers throughout our history have performed a great public service to the American people. They are needed. Sometimes I think their breed should multiply. Be that as it may, I think the columns of Drew Pearson concerning McCone certainly place upon the administration the burden of proof of answering them, because we are hearing from home about them. What do we"read in the letters which come in, as they are coming in to me? Is this true? Is that true? Is this true about this nominee as I read today or yesterday or the day before yesterday, in a Pearson column?"

I understand that as of January 17, 1962, Mr. Pearson wrote a column on the McCone nomination which was rather heavily edited by clipping shears by many newspapers. By that I mean that his article was not printed in full. I shall offer that column for printing in full at this time.

Mr. President, I ask unanimous consent to have the entire column written by Drew Pearson, and published by the Bell Syndicate on January 17, 1962, printed at this point in the RECORD.

There being no objection, the column was ordered to be printed in the RECORD, as follows:

JOHN MCCONE DE NOT SELL HIS STOCK WHEN HE BECAME AEC CHAIRMAN-HIS SHIPPING

LINES DID PROFITABLE BUSINESS WITH AEC CONTRACTORS—THE LAW DOES NOT PERMIT ANY CHOICE ON CONFLICT OF INTEREST

(By Drew Pearson)

WASHINGTON.—In June 1958, John A. Mcz. Cone, the new would-be Central Intelligence Cinet, wrote a letter to Sherman Adams, later Ricked out of Government for a confilet of interest, to see whether he, McCone, might have a conflict of interest as new Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Ignoring the fact that the Goldfine charges against Adams had not made him the best man to act as judge, McCone listed the Utah Construction Co., Kaiser Engineers, Dow Chemical, Union Carbide as doing large business with the Atomic Energy Commission, and simultaneously doing business with his own privately owned shipping companies.

Significantly, two of these companies, Kaiser and Utah Construction, showed the pattern of business links McCone has kept

with his old associates and war profiteers. McCone was president and a partner with Henry Kaiser and associates in running the California Shipbuilding Co. during the war when they rolled an investment of \$100,000 into an overall profit of \$44 million.

Later, when he was Under Secretary of the Air Force, McCone gave his old partner a quickie Flying Boxcar contract at three times the cost the Air Force was paying Fairchild. Incidentally, Senate hearings conducted by the late Senator Styles Bridges, of New Hampshire, showed that Kaiser and his subsidiaries got a total of \$219,011,919 in Gov-ernment RFC loans; received \$6,568 million in Government contracts, and got approximately half a billion dollars in quickie tax writcoffs.

BIG AEC CONTRACTORS

Kaiser has also been one of the biggest contractors with the Atomic Energy Commission including the period when Kaiser's old partner, John McCone, was AEC Chairman.

The company which operates under the all-inclusive name of Utah Construction Co. is also part-owned by Kaiser and actually, is a big seller of uranium to the AEC through its subsidiary, Lucky Mc Uranium Corp.

Union Carbide is one of the biggest contractors with the Atomic Energy Commission. It not only sells uranium to the AEC, but operates AEC Plants at Oak Ridge, Tenn., and Paducah, Ky. Both Union Carbide and the Kaiser interests benefited from "underdeveloped countries." This obviously "underdeveloped countries." played into the hands of established Ameri-can companies such as Union Carbide and Kaiser.

Yet McCone, before he became Chairman of the AEC in 1958, admitted that his personally owned shipping line, Joshua Hendy, handled "intercoastal and coastwise transportation of chemicals, transports products for Union Carbide, Dow Chemical, Standard Oil of New Jersey, Standard Oil of California, and others."

"I have some business relationships with Kaiser," he also testified, "inasmuch as a jointly owned company, 25 percent of which is owned by Hendy and 50 percent by Kaiser Aluminum, has a long-range contract to transport Kalser's bauxite."

"Would your firm continue to deal with these firms in the atomic energy field, such as Union Carbide?" asked Senator CLINT ANDER-SON Of New Mexico.

"Yes, I would expect they would con-tinue," replied the future AEC Chairman. "Union Carbide is a large customer: of

Hendy's" ANDERSON reminded him. "Yes, they are," McCone agreed.

ADAMS GIVES HIS OK

However, he insisted that placing the stock of his shipping companies in trust with the Bank of California, in which he is also a stockholder, cleared him of any conflict of interest. This left him, however, with the profits which would accrue from the contracts his shipping companies made from Union cabide, Kaiser, and the other firms which dir business with the AEC of which he was Chairman. In other words, while was AEC Chairman, his shipping comhe panies would benefit from business with AEC contractors.

On the basis of this, Sherman Adams, that great judge of conflict of interest, OK'd the arrangement; and the Senate, diverted by the Sherman Adams-Goldfine headlines, also OK'd it and confirmed McCone as AEC Chairman.

However, now that McCone is coming up for another, even more important, post, head of Central Intelligence, the Senate might take time to review the record and study the law.

The conflict-of-interest law gives no choice either to McCone or to the Senate.

McCone said he had done "A great deal of soul-searching" and had concluded be could handle the AEC Chairmanship without any favoritism. However, the AEC law does not permit a man to search his soul and make the decision. The law makes the decision for him. It gives no alternatives other than get out of any conflict with private business interests.

"No member of the commission," it reads, "shall engage in any business, vocation, or . employment other than that of serving as a, member of the commission.'

The law was passed not to be rationalized after soul-searching, but to make sure that men like McCone did not serve on this powerful commission with the power to make tremendous profits for certain companies, unless they gave up their stock in the com-panies which benefited. This McCone did not do, and in an early column, one significant result affecting McCone's private shipping line will be reported.

Mr. MORSE. Mr. President, I say to my administration: Take a look at it. I want to know what the answers to it are. If those charges cannot be supported with facts, I want to know it. If the charges can be supported with facts, I do not see how I could possibly vote in favor of confirmation of the nomination.

Mr. President. I have taken the time to discuss the nomination in the entire framework of CIA power because I do not believe the two can be separated. I ask my administration to take another look at the question of whether this is the time for Congress to pass legislation setting up what frequently has been described as a congressional watchdog committee, with authority to find out, in behalf of the American peoplewhich I believe is a constitutional obligation of the Congress-the facts about the CIA operations the world around.

THE MURFLED FACTS The difficulty at the moment is that the facts have been obscured in a torrent of emo-tional arguments over Kederal aid leading to Federal control of the classrooms; over the constitutionality of giving Federal funds to parochial schools; over racial integration in the public schools, and over State and local rights.

These are the things that have dominated the news of the education debate for years. By the time the story of the President's education bills gets out over the news wires into most local communities it is usually a

into most local communities it is usually a report of conflict between Republican versus Democrat, North versus South, public versus parochial schools, Federal versus State or local control. 

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at his request. On arrival in his office, the Attorney General had with him CIA Director McCone. He said that McCone had taken up with him a matter relating to the FBI, which he would like to have Mr. McCone relate to me. I interrupted to say that while I was generally familiar with the matter I believed Mr. McCone had in mind, I would be happy to listen to anything that McCone wanted to say.

McCone then related the same story he previously told Belmont with reference to matters advanced by CIA before the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board. It is recalled that we had been contacted by CIA and told that McCone had advocated across the board technical coverage of diplomatic establishments in the United States and the adoption of Russian tactics in compromising foreign diplomats. McCone contended that Belmont had falsely assumed that McCone had advanced these ideas.

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McCone was told that there wasn't any false assumption; that ranking officials of his organization had told us this was what McCone had done. Using the same tactic he did with Belmont last week, McCone tried to divorce himself from responsibility for CIA and contended that Belmont should have taken this up with him personally, since they saw each other weekly at the United States Intelligence Board Meetings. I again told McCone we were entitled to rely on statements made by ranking officials of CIA.

McCone passed this by and took up the letters we had sent the Attorney General and O'Donnell at the White House, which he said did not reflect his personal position or what he had actually presented to the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board. I again told McCone

the letters reflected what his officials had told us were the facts and stood on that basis. McCone consistently referred to these letters as "Belmont's letters," which I corrected by saying that the letters were official communications from the FBI.

As obviously this discussion wasn't getting anywhere, the Attorney General interrupted to say he thought it would be best if these matters could be worked out without having to involve either him or the President.

McCone said that while his discussion with Belmont had been a heated one, nevertheless something constructive was coming out of it. He noted that he had raised with Belmont the need for CIA to know what technical coverage the FBI had in the diplomatic field; that CIA should be able to suggest to the FBI certain technical coverage predicated upon information being developed abroad by CIA; and that to assist in proper evaluation the FBI would identify certain information as having come from technical sources. I told Mr. McCone it was my understanding that some matters of this type had been raised and these were being considered.

This terminated the conversation.


It is noted that the Attorney General had had McCone over to his office for lunch, and it would appear that McCone used this opportunity to try and sell his views to the Attorney General.

The Director has agreed to see John A. McCone, Director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) at 3:30 p.m., Monday, October 12, 1964. The appointment was made at the request of John McCone whose desires to see the Director were transmitted S through our Liaison Agent. This request was contained in a memo from Mr. Brennan to Assistant Director Sullivan dated 10-8-64, wherein it was indicated that McCone undoubtedly wanted to see the Director regarding information received from Anatoliy Golitzyn, a Soviet KGB defector. McCone had a lengthy meeting with Golitzyn on 10-3-64 The Director has requested a short memo on Golitzyn and this is being handled by the Domestic Intelligence Division. In Brennan's memo of 10-8-64, it was further pointed out that as an incidental matter McCone might make a passing reference to the fact that CIA. officials, including McCone, were allegedly alarmed when McCone's testimony before the Warren Commission was recently publicized by Jerry O'Leary of "The Evening Star." The CIA had received a report from an unidentified source that the FBI had furnished the Director's and McCone's testimony to O'Leary. It is noted that the Agency has not brought this matter up for any official discussion with our Liaison Agent. There are a number of references in Bufiles to John A. McCone and set forth below is a brief resume of information from our main files concerning him. dadle pr (m)

INFORMATION IN BUFILES:

Applicant type investigations were conducted concerning McCone in 1947-1948, 1950-1951, 1954, 1958 and in 1961, the Kennedy Administration requested the investigation of McCone be brought up to date. No derogatory information was developed as a result of these investigations as to McCone's loyalty or character. Information was developed, however, that McCone allegedly showed favoritism or personal interest in awarding a 190 million dollar aircraft contract in 1957 to the Kaiser-Frazer Corporation. The allegation was refuted by prominent individuals in possession of knowledge concerning this. Allegations that McCone was involved in the illegal or unethical purchase of surplus vessels from the U. S. Government were also refuted during the investigation, K

Gordon Gray, Special Assistant to the President during the Eisenhower Administration, advised on 8-16-60, confidentially, that McCone was reportedly "easy" with the press. He had received information that McCone had associated in the past with Walter Lippman, Joseph Alsop, and was acquainted with Arthur Krock of "The New York Times."

McCone's contacts with the Bureau have not been extensive; however, Bufiles indicate a cordial relationship has existed. In January, 1962, the Senate confirmed McCone as Director of the CIA. On 8-31-62, the Director congratulated McCone on his marriage to Mrs. Paul Pigott, widow of a Seattle industrialist.

By letter dated 1-31-63, the Director thanked McCone for his letter enclosing citations presented by the President to the members of the Intelligence Committee for their performance during the Cuban Crisis/ g_{1}

A memo from Mr. Evans to Mr. Belmont of 5-20-63 set forth a meeting in the Attorney General's Office where Evans and McCone were present and which concerned matters advanced by the CIA before the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board. McCone had advocated across-the-board technical coverage of diplomatic establishments in the United States and adoption of Russian tactics in compromising foreign diplomats. McCone claimed that Mr. Belmont has falsely assumed that McCone had advanced these ideas. The Director noted on this memo "I regret observing that for years CIA has not played clean with us and under McCone it is even worse. I hope some of our people who have been pro-CIA will ultimately re alize it." As the Director has indicated, there have been some instances in our files of "double dealing" on the part of CIA such as the situation regarding Lee Harvey Oswald's activities in Mexico City wherein McCone allegedly informed Congressman Ford that CIA had uncovered a plot in Mexico City indicating that Lee Harvey Oswald had received \$6, 500° to Assassinate President Kennedy.

TI43285 The President asked me to see him at approximately 7:00 p.m. last night. While in his office he brought up several subjects of interest.

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HERION IS UNOLASSII

The President first discussed the special inquiry investigation on George Joseph Feldman. Feldman contributed heavily to the campaign. Speaker John McCormack is pressuring the President heavily to make Feldman the Ambassador to Australia. Feldman and John McCone of CIA are close personal friends. Our investigation on Feldman reflected that he was somewhat of a weakling, his wife was a nymphomaniac and most certainly, mostly due to his wife and her promiscuous ways, Feldman would not be a good Ambassador.

The President told me that John McCone had become very incensed over the FBI's investigative report. The President had shown McCone our report. McCone claims that the FBI interviewed "biased" individuals. He told the President that Mrs. Feldman is not sexually promiscuous.

The President asked that I take the investigative report back to FBI 8 Headquarters and examine it carefully to see if additional investigation might be conducted which might clear this matter up. I told the President that we, of course, would do this, however, in our minds there was no question as to Mrs. Feldman's COPY activities. I told the President that the record was very clear in this regard. He admitted this might be true but stated he had to _do > something in order to shut McCone up. He stated also he had to present a very good case to Speaker McCormack. 101-17

The next topic of conversation concerned the leak of information regarding Kermit Gordon, Director of the Bureau of the Budget, being madein Secretary of the Treasury. I told the President that the Director wanted me to show him, in strict confidence, a copy of a letterhead memorandum from the Treasury Department to Wauhillow MeHay, a Scripps-Howard reporter currently assigned to the Washington "Daily News". " I told the President this Treasury Department memorandum had been found by a close contact, and source of the FBI's in the desk of Miss McHay at the "Daily News." The President eagerly grabbed the memorandum exhibited to him and stated he would take care of the matter from then on. He put this memorandum in his desk drawer. The sealer S. 19

We next discussed the special inquiry investigation and report concerning I told the President that he had asked me to personally hold this report until he called me to discuss the matter. The President next mentioned the possibility of bringing in Don Wilson, Deputy Director of the United States Information Agency. He stated that he had particularly noted in conferences that Wilson was very objective in his statements and did not try to go overboard in conversation. The President gave the opinion that Wilson might make a very good assistant to George Reedy. He added that there was only one drawback, that being the fact that Wilson was reported to be a close friend of Bobby Kennedy's. The President stated he did not want Wilson in the capacity as Assistant Secretary if the report concerning his relationship with Kennedy is true. He asked me if I knew Wilson. I told him I did, that Wilson was formerly with Life Magazine and that the FBI had had some slight disagreement with him in the past. I told the President that I knew it to be a fact that Wilson had been close to Bobby Kennedy. The President asked that we give him an immediate name check on Wilson.

The President stated that he definitely wanted to find a replacement for Secretary Dillon of the Treasury Department without further delay. He stated that he was thinking seriously about David Rockefeller of the Chase National Bank in New York. He asked me if I knew anything about Rockefeller. I told him I did not, that the Director might undoubtedly know him or know of him. The President asked that a name check be made on Rockefeller immediately and that the results be personally furnished to him. I told him this would be done.

The President asked me if I had anything on my mind. I replied in the negative but stated that the Director had mentioned to me the opinion that the President had done a very excellent job before the Congress last Monday night. The President replied that he had done the best he could, however, the proposed legislation might result in lengthy debate. I told the President that he might want to give consideration to not using contact lenses when appearing on television. I indicated that the image projected made it look as if his eyes were almost closed. He said that Lady Bird had mentioned this and he thought that she had gotten her coaching from Edgar." He stated he would think about it. The President then walked with me to Marvin Watson's office where a short conversation of no consequence ensued.

ACTION:

(1) The Special Inquiry Section of the Special Investigative Division should carefully examine the report on George Joseph Feldman to ascertain if any further investigation can be conducted which will prove or disprove the allegations of Mrs. Feldman being promiscuous in sex relations with men other than her husband.

At the outset it should be noted that the investigation peterred to by Mr. McCone was the third investigation conducted regarding In 1958 an Atomic Energy Act - Applicant investigation was Neldman. conducted and this investigation was brought up to date in 1962 as a Special Inquiry prior to the time he became a member of the Communications Satellite Corporation, Washington, D. C. The 1958 and 1962 investigations were compiled in a summary which was forwarded to the White House October 22, 1962, showing that a total of 62 individuals had been interviewed. These investigations were entirely favorable. The results of the last Special Inquiry investigation were forwarded to the white House February 8 and 18, 1965, and during this investigation 33 **ANGINAL COPY** individuals were interviewed. Five of these 33 individuals furnished substantial derogatory information regarding Feldman and his wife.

OBSERVATIONS:

It is recognized, of course, that John Mogore mannot be told that we know that he told the President that we interviewed "biased" individuals and confronted with the fact that he has furnished the President completely erroneous information. The same thing could be accomplished, however, if Bureau Liaison could interview McCone and advise him that during three prior investigations a total of 95 individuals were interviewed and that despite this additional





John Sherman Cooper - former United States Senator from Kentucky, currently serving as counsol with the law firm of Covington and Burling, Washington, D. C. Gordon Llewellyn Allott - former United States Senator from Colorado John Alex McCone former Director of the Central Intelligence Agency (1961-1965)

No prior investigation has been conducted by the Bureau concerning Senator Allott.

At the request of The White House, we conducted an applicant-type investigation concerning Senator Cooper in 1954. The investigation was favorable. In 1947 a favorable applicanttype investigation was conducted concerning Mr. McCone, and this investigation has been brought up to date on four subsequent occasions, the latest boing in 1961. The White House is in possession of the results of the investigations concerning these individuals. The Bureau has had cordial relations with Senators Cooper and Allott and Mr. McCone in the past. (77-65481, 161-1709, 77-40957)

ACTION: The requested investigations have been ordered separately to the field. The respective SACs have been instructed to advise Senators Cooper and Allott and Mr. McCone the Bureau has been requested to conduct the investigation, but not to indicate the request emanated from The White House. The field has also been instructed to conduct no neighborhood investigation without prior Bureau approval. You will be advised of any pertinent developments.

Some people may wonder why I have been writing so, much about John tragic failure at the Bay McCone, now up for Senate confirmation as head Rusk informed a seminar of Central Intelligence. of editors in Washington They may wonder whether I have a personal grudge against McCone. The fact is I have nothing against McCone personally, don't believe I've ever. met him.

Dut the most important person molding U.S. toreign policy, next to the President, is probably the head of Central Intelligence. The public doesn't realling this, but it's true.

The head of CIA can depose kings or presidents, foment revolution, take us close to war. Furthermore, he doesn't have to report to Congress, or even to the General Accounting Office for the money he spends.

His power results from . two facts:

1 - He can use money. and agents to subvert and undermine a foreign gov-: ernment and nobody in Congress knows about it.


2 — He reports to the President. And the man who reports the facts on a foreign situation to be a certain way has the power to make decisions.

McCone Accustomed to Hard Assignments

Taking on challenging jobs is nothing new to John A. <u>McCone</u>, who was asked Thursday by Gov. Brown to head an investigation of Los Angeles^{*} riots.

The white-haired, driving 63-year-old industrialist who headed both a shipbuilding company and an aircraft engineering center in World War II, has served four Presidents on special assignments.

McCone told reporters who met him at International Airport after a flight from Washington that he had been notified of his latest job by telephone call.

'Anything to Help'

I told him (Gov. Brown) that I would do anything I could to help thim and my community."

His words were reminiscent of his reply in September, 1961, when President John F. Kennedy appointed him as director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

McCone, a Republican who supported Vice President Richard M. Nixon's bid for the Presidency and who had served as head of the Atomic Energy Commission under President Lisenhower, said he was heat at first. But when asked to take the job, he answered simply, "I will do my best." A native of San Francisco, McCone was graduated from the University of California's College of Engineering in 1922. But the voung college graduate dida't look for a white collar job. He went to work as a riveter and boilermaker in Los Angeles.

He advanced to plant superintendent and later, after a merger, became executive vice president and director - of Consolidated Steel Corp.

Became Shipbuilder

Later he headed the Bechtel — McCone Corp., which modified Army Air Force bombers during the war, and the California Shipbuilding Corp. The latter company built 467 ships worth \$1 billion.

His first federal service was on the Air Policy Commission. Later he was, appointed Air Force under secretary during the administration of President Harry S Truman.

McCone resigned as CIA director early this year, but offered to stay on until President Johnson could pick a successor. He had hoped to retire to his San Marino home, but now he has a new job.

McCone Volgd In as Director of HT&T Corp.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -John A. McCone, former director of the Central Intelligence Agency, has been elected to the board of directors of International Telephone & Telegraph Corp., it was announced Sunday.

McCone was named in 1961 to head the CIA. He resigned the post last April to resume his former business activities as a director of the Western Bank Corp., United California Bank, Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Co. and Standard Oil Co. of California.

He also served as chairman of a commission named by California Gov. Brown that investigated the Los Angeles riot of last August.



An overwhelming present-day reality prevents this comfortable escape from the perplexing and expensive responsibilities of world leadership. That reality is that the power equation in this awesome nuclear age permits no subscription for United States leadership of the free world.

Hand of Destiny

The responsibility that is now ours has been thrust upon us by the hand of destiny, We did not seek it. It became evident some 20 years ago that international communism was determined to destroy all vestige of liberty and, under Kremlin direction, was moving aggressively into every political and power vacuum throughout the world. The United Today this equation rests in an States and the United States alone possessed the determination, the

To measure the success of our

view the world as it was in the years after the war and as it is today. We must view this world from Washington and then we must view it as seen by the international Communist . . .

We have exercised leadership with skill and determination and with thoughtful consideration of the interests of others. Today, after two decades of effort and untold billions of dollars, our position in the eyes of the world is growing ever stronger, and the position of international communism is growing ever weaker.

Problems Forbidding

Some will chanenge this suatement. It is true that our problems are forbidding, but it is characteristic of the human condition for a man: to feel that his problems, whether in government, in business, or in private life, are more serious than the other fellow's.

Our burdens and troubles in the world outside the United States are manifold. The agony of Vietnam; and disappointments in our relationships with the French and with President De Gaulle; the difficulties : with Latin America; and with Cuba and the Dominican Republic; the troubles of Pakistan and India are but a few. Some view these problems as evidence of failure of a policy that has been followed consistently by four Presidents and both . parties.

Finally, the fact that we must w

maintain, at very great expense, a nuclear arsenal of vast proportions to insure our security and that of the free world is likewise interpreted by some as a demonstration of. failure of foreign policy.

However formidable these problems, we can measure the success of our foreign policy only if we swing the telescope around and now look at the world from the viewpoint of the other side and compare Moscow's problems with our own. Where does international communism stand after these years of Soviet efforts towards world domination?

International communism as a carcfully contributed monolithic struct

ture has collapsed. The Eastern European satellites, once bound irretrievably to Moscow, are now insisting upon the right to follow an independent course in political as well as economic matters. They have successfully extracted one concession after another. The result is that the once tightly knit, centrally controlled organization of Eastern European satellites is now little more than a federation of states, joined together in a rather loose alliance. The fractures within this alliance deepen each day ...

I am not now forecasting a return of the ballot box in the Eastern European countries. What I am emphasizing is that they are no longer threads in the expanding web of a centrally directed monolithic world Communist movement.

In the Middle East, in Africa, and in Latin America, grandiose plans for political domination from the central source, Moscow, have, for the most part, come to naught as one country after another has turned toward an independent non-conforming role. How frequently a stinging blow is dealt to the Soviet plan! Niegria, Ghana, Algeria and Indonesia are but a few of the countries in revolt against Communist domination. Add to this two other great and growing problems bearing down on the Soviet's grand plan.

First, there is the matter of internal pressure generated by the Russian people for necessities and luxuwies of life comparable to those enjoyed in the West. . . This demand is forcing Soviet leadership to reappraise its national programs and priorities. It must now devote an everincreasing proportion of precious resources and scarce manpower to the needs of the consumer and a lesser percentage to the military establishment and to the strategy for world

And second, there are the grave differences with their Chinese meighbor, 700 million strong... and potentially dangerous over every mile of their -6,000-mile commonborder...

I am not here forecasting the end of the Marxist philosophy. Communism is established in many places, and in some areas it will continue to grow until the perception of the individual rejects it. China, now espousing a most antagonistic policy, flourishes momentarily on Marxism. The aggressive policies their leaders now embrace, if continued, represent a serious long-range threat to the entire world ...

But my point is that international communism as a monolithic structure, centrally directed and designed to control the world by persuasion, by subversion or by conquest, has failed. I have viewed at close range the conflicting issues and ambitions within the Communist movement. It is my observation, that the differences are so great, the fractures so deep that the monolithic structure of the movement cannot be revived. Since this is central to the success of their objectives - for without a cohesive international Communist structure the objective of world domination is beyond grasp-I say with confidence that the ebb and flow of international affairs is running in favor of the principles we chilrate.

So without belaboring the issues of foreign policy or attempting to discuss in detail the problems confronting the United States in today's difficult world, I draw two general <u>conclusions</u>.

First, our efforts of the past 20 years, trying and costly, have been more rewarding than we may now realize. At the very least, we have led the rest of the free world back from the brink of disaster to a position of strength and dignity. But, in reality, we have done much more. People throughout the world are reaching, as never before, for the right of self-determination and for the sacred principles of freedom and human dignity.

Second, our task is not yet complete. We, as the strongest nation in the world..., must continue to provide security to our friends and serve as an example and an inspiration to all, most particularly the developing nations that are now groping for a way of life.

To inspire this fast-evolving world and provide the example to follow, we must conduct ourselves as a nation and a society that is dynamic in its internal affairs and resolute in its determination to serve the interests and the safety of all of its citizens.

We shall not succeed in this vital role. ... if the ills, which today are undernaining the structure of our society, are permitted to continue to spread and to grow as a cancer spread through human tizzue

if anything has become clear to me in the course of my recent experience with international and domestic situations, it is that there is an interrelationship between the way we conduct ourselves at home and our standing and influence abroad and this interrelationship has begun to shape our fate as a nation. This then is my answer to the statement; often advanced, that the .growing problems within our country, most particularly those in the larger urban centers, are being unnecessarily exaggerated and that, this exaggeration and the solutions offered by government are purely for political purpose. I do not wish to discount the force of politics in our " every day life; nor do I fail to recognize the hand of politics in many of these matters. Nevertheless, we cannot dismiss the seriousness of the "crises in our cities" as being the product of crude politics.

On the contrary, I am convinced that the consequences of rapid and radical change within our country; of an ever-expanding population; of f the growing numbers of Negroes and other minorities as well: of movement of countless throngs from rural to urban centers; of mechanization with its serious effect on the unskilled; . . . have produced problems so vast and so serious that they cannot be exaggerated. And the solutions are so important that they cannot be dismissed as political expediency. Gnawing Problems

Nor am Limpressed with the argument that the solutions to these growing problems, whether in the field of education of training or ur ban renewal, of trainsportation, of the pollution of our rivers and beaches and the air we breathe are all so vast as to be hopelessly beyond private resources and, therefore, must either go unattended or be taken over by government.

I am convinced . . . that these great gnawing problems, cannot be left unattended. They must be solved if we are to survive as a nation and they must be solved locally. If our state and our city is to continue as the nation's garden spot.

I am equally convinced from experience with 🐇 not one administration but 🛒 with four that: these grieat problems will be tackled and will be solved. The choice before us then is whether we, as leaders of this community, will take in

hand problems that presently confront us and find the solution for them. Or, whether, in the alternative, we shall elect to abdicate our. responsibility to Washington—and stand idly by as our city is transformed by others into a city that we, will have great difficulty recognizing as our own in the future.

Knowing my city . . . I assume we shall close with these problems ourselves. Where do we start?

First, we mobilize the brains and the vast energy of the private sector of our community—the businessmen and labor leaders; the educators and the churchmen; the spokesmen for civic groups and for the minorities as well

Specialists in every field I have mentioned must focus their special knowledge and talent on the great problems that confront us.

From all of these we can expect a clear definition of the need—and the direction of the essential developments called for to meet that need.

We must face the problem and seek the solution without regard to individual interest or selfish motive. And then we must insist that the political powers, regardless of where or who they are, serve us in implementing our plans and programs. We insist that they not impose their plans, their programs, upon us.


Provider of Resources

Many problems can be solved within the resources of the private sector. Others are obviously so vast as to require government finance. But all plans for the solution of all problems must be designed by you, as the leaders of your community. For in the final analysis you, as the taxpayer, are the provider of all resources available to meet the growing issues of your city.

President Eisenhower in his recent book, "Waging Peace," when reviewing the gnawing problems of our society today, suggests that every person ask of himself, "Am I doing my duty as a citizen? Am I doing my part?"

ing my part?" And, then, in his appeal for action by the citizens of our country, supported by the vast resources of government — resources indeed which are provided by the citizens themselves—President Eisenhower states: "This is part of the unfinished business of our nation. To fail to meet these internal challenges successfully is to weaken ourselves at home and to distort the true meaning of America abroad."

'Skill Center' Equally disregarded is the Opportunities Industrialization Center (OIC). initiated by a Negro group and financed by a \$450,000 Ford Foundation grant to train those who remain jobless. Paralleling this pioneering private effort is a new "skill center" of the state Department of Employment in Watts which will train over 3,500 workers in the next three years.

These constructive programs are providing an opportunity for the Negro, if he so desires, to receive job training and to find employment. As Roy Wilkins, the long-time executive secretary of the NAACP, has said, the white community must put action above cuches" but at the same time the Negro must "shoulder his responsibilities" and not "go limp."

port to be "telling it like it is," it tends to spark the very explosion they say they wish to avoid.

There are no instant solutions or magic cures for the problems of Watts. Years of patient, diligent, expensive endeavor will be necessary, and even then the problems will yield only if there is determined participation by all elements of the community. The ultimate measure of success will not be so much what is done for the residents of Watts, but rather what is done by them with the assistance of the remainder of me community.

The shallowness, of Mr. Schulberg's thesis stands out in his approach to the problem of medical. care in Watts. He pleads for a decent hospital in the Watts area, criticizing the literary quality but not the substance of the commission's recommendation of a first-class hospital. Thus did the McCone Commission summarize a year of action and inaction in dealing with the basic causes of last August's violence.

Its report points to progress, however limited, in every major area of discontent among the disadvantaged—education, employment, law enforcement, health, welfare, transportation, housing and urban development.

"Perhaps the most encouraging single development since the publication of our report," noted Chairman John McCone, "has been the emergence of community efforts to improve conditions in the area and prevent a recurrence of strife."

At the same time, the commission emphasized the mammoth task that remains and cited specific failures at governmental levels during the past 12 months.

One of the most disappointing has been the Board of Supervisors' response to the deplorable lack of adequate hospital facilities in South Central Los Angeles.

Existing hospitals, warned the McCone Commission's original report, are "grossly inadequate," as it urged construction of a n e w c o u n t y facility. The supervisors, however, took the easy way out by placing a \$12.3 million hospital bond issue on the June ballot, although the difficulty of achieving the necessary 2/3 vote of approval must have been evident to every member.

As expected, the hospital bonds failed, but by a surprisingly narrow margin. Some 62.5% of the voters expressed approval. Thereupon the board pledged to find some other way to build the critically needed hospital. Money for plans and additional land purchase was placed in the 1966-67 county budget.

This week, however, three supervisors compounded the board's earlier error by abruptly halting all expenditures for the hospital project. Supervisors Warren Dorn and Ernest Debs said they were absent when the majority of the board voted planning funds. If so, they should have read the minutes of the meetings they miccod

In contrast, on the same day the supervisors met, it was reported that some 12,-000 Negroes have been placed in jobs during the past year. More than 2,000 business firms participated in the effort directly or indirectly, said H. C. McClellan, president of the Management Council for Merit Employment, Training and Research.

In praising the "spectacular job" done by the council and the State Employment Service, the McCone Commission called attention to the much larger number of those who are untrained or unprepared for any kind of job. To meet this problem, a dozen training programs are planned or in progress, with an anticipated participation of more than 16,000 persons.

Success of such attacks on the root causes of discontent is the surest guarantee that violence will not return. For as Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach told a Senate subcommittee Wednesday, riots are really caused by the "agitators named disease and despair, joblessness and hopelessness, rat-infested housing and 1 on g-impacted cynicism."

The State WATTS: Commission Issues Second Report SUNAUE 21 1966 The McCone Commission which

The McCone Commission which investigated last August's rioting in the Negro district of Los Angeles came up with a second report for Gov. Brown last week. It said that "significant progress has been made in all but a few of the recommendations" made by the commission in its original report last December.

Chairman John A. AlcCone said: "We are encouraged but not fatts fied." The governor agreed that there was no cause for anyone to feel complacent, but said he was heartened by progress in the Negro community and cited the Watts Summer Festival and other events which indicate changes for the better.

Pleasing to the commission were s "impressive" gains in employment and job-training in the district; most disappointing was insufficient improvement in schooling.

The commission said that "perhaps the most encouraging" single development was the burgeoning drive of the community to help itself and prevent recurrence of strife. It pointed out that the efforts of many citizens and prompt police work combined to control an outbreak on Mar. 15 which took two lives.

Literacy Program

In deploring the lag in schooling, the report said the commission's specific recommendations for an emergency program to increase, literacy were not "fulfilled." Also:

"A sharp reduction in (school) class size and concentration of experienced personnel in schools in poverty areas has not been accomplished—even on a pilot basis.

"Despite substantial aid from federal and state agencies, piecemeal efforts to implement new programs have not been effective in meeting the unique educational needs of the culturally disadvantaged . . ."

It pointed out that a proposal to reduce double school sessions by transporting 2160 children from erowded elementary schools to schools with empty seats was defeated by the Los Angeles School Board by a vote of 4 to 3.

The report cited strides in employment—an estimated 10,000 residents of the district finding jobs through the State Employment Service and through private industry. It said a "spectacular job" had been done by the state agency and by the Management Council for Merit Employment Training and Research, headed by H. C. McClellan. While praising law enforcement agencies for "new and promising" gains in better relations with "minority communities," the commission declared that its "concept of 'inspector general' that it recommended," is not in operation." The inspector general has been appointed, the report conceded, but he has not been properly staffed "with officers and civilian personnel" and has been unable to investigate civilian complaints outside of the police chain of command,

- McCone also told Gov. Brown: "We continue to doubt whether the police commission, which meets once a week with compensation fixed at \$10 per meeting," is "fully responding to the opportunity and the responsibility" in the city's charter.

Simultaneously with issuance of the second McCone report, the Negro community took an action which indicates better relations with the police. The Temporary Alliance of Local Organizations, a community group which set up the Community Alert Patrol to check up on police, ended operation of the patrol, at least temporarily at midnight last Wednesday. The TALO had formed the patrol three months ago to observe and record instances of "poor police procedures."

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McCone Urges All-Out Aid to Needy Pupils

A costly and revolutionary educational program at every grade level must be undertaken to break. "the cycle of failure" a mong disadvantaged children and prevent future racial strife. John A. McCone said Thursday might [SEP 16 1555

McCone, chairman of the McCone Commission which investigated causes of last year's Watts riot and former chief of the Central Intelligence Agency, addressed 800 persons attending Loyola University's seventh annual Citizenship Day dinner at the Beverly Hilton.

He called for the antipoverty program's Head Start project to be implemented on a permanent basis under the city school to system. The project provides special classes for pre-school children of disadvantaged families.

'Dramatic Change'

He also proposed "much 'smaller classes" and "the best of the teachers" to effect "a dramatic change in our traditional pattern" to raise the low scholastic achievement of minority group children.

These two "costly emergency measures" will provide a permanent solution, from which solutions to all the other racial problems will emerge, McCone said. Without this approach, he warned, the Watts riot could be "but a curtainraiser—a warning of deeper trouble to come."

McCone said Los Angeles has achieved "reasonable success" in providing jobs and job training for the disadvantaged. The antipoverty program here has been "free from the troubles which have beset other cities" for which he lauded the leaders of "this v ast constructive program."

At the dinner, Marine Col, Michael R. Yunck, who was recently wounded in Vietnam, was presented the university's Loyalty Medallion.

Special UC Probe Is Unnecessary

When Gov.-elect Ronald Reagan first announced plans for a blue ribbon commission to investigate the University of California there were widespread fears that the inquiry would degenerate into a witch-hunt on the Berkeley campus.

Former CIA chief John McCone, whom Reagan proposed to appoint chairman of the commission then set forth ground rules under which he would accept the assignment. His statement allayed some, though not all, of the fears that IIC might be damaged by a "profile." NUV 3 U 1900

Lt. Gov.-elect Robert H. Finch declared recently that the commission will look into the whole structure of the university in a broad-gauge, high level examination which would include examination of the financial structure of the institution.

His words were heartening, particularly since it must be assumed that he spoke out only after consulting with Reagan.

Nonetheless the statement points to the basic fallacy involved in creation of such a commission.

The Joint Legislative Committee on Higher Education has already embarked on an in-depth study covering both the university and state colleges. Of necessity that examination will include the problem of state support. Thus the commission inquiry would be, at least in part, duplicative. McCone has said that any investigation he might conduct would be under the direction of the Board of Regents of the university. A spokesman for Reagan has indicated that the commission would report to the regents not to the governor.

The legislative c o m m i t t e e findings, however, would likewise be available to the regents as well as to the governor and the Legislature.

Under the state constitution, the Board of Regents is an autonomous body subject only to logiclative control over its budget, its compliance with endowments and the security of its funds.

Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh, who heads the joint legislative committee, is an ex-officio member of the board. So, when they assume office, will be Reagan and Finch. Thus they will be able to keep tab on the situation.

To create a special commission would set a dangerous precedent which would seem to run directly counter to the plain intent of the constitution. This is particularly so when a legislative body is already exercising its proper investigatory function.

Under the circumstances The Times suggests that the blue ribbon commission proposal be held in abeyance, while the joint legislative group goes about its rightful business.

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"No Shortcuts Found," McCone Tells Critics

: Industrialist John A. Mc-Cone, chairman of the commission which reported on reasons for south Los Angeles rioting more than a year ago, responded to criticism of that report Friday by saying the commission found "no shortcuts and no easy answers."

Replying to complaints by several participants in a two-day leadership seminar at USC — some of them commission consultants — that the blue rib-, bon group selected by Gov. Brown had treated complex sociological problems "superficially," M c C o n e said in a letter to the seminar: $\sqrt{-2}$

"By confining our recommendations to practical programs, great progress has been made in our community in the pastyear, and this must not be overlooked."

His letter, read to the "McCone Report Revisited" conference on the USC c a m p u s by commission counsel Thomas Sheridan, also noted that most of the suggestions advanced for more drastic solutions to the problems of Negroes here had been considered by the commission.

No practical way was found, McCone wrote, "to implement certain of the ideological approaches suggested ..."

McCone also sent along a copy of a speech he delivered on Wednesday in New York in which he expressed the view that lack of jobs and special schooling are "at the root of most complaints."

McCone held that private industry is ready to engage in training and employment of Ncgroes and said he believed this is a "preferable alternative to the make-work programs so often suggested and always dependent on large and uncertain government appropriations."

Friday was supposed to be the day the seminar, sponsored by USC's School of Public Administration, turned from criti-

Conservative Pins Down Facts of Negro Problem

In this country, the word "conservative" has been strangely debased, to stand for crackpot Texas millionaires, hot-eyed Birch Society members and southern racists.

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But in the normal political lexicon, conservative is still an honorable word, meaning a practical, national-minded man who holds to the old ways while being willing, maybe a bit grudgingly, to support great innovations when the national interest demands them. In this sense, former CIA Director John A. McCone is an outstanding American conservative —a big businessman, cautious yet public-spirited, never given to visionary nonsense, but always ready to face facts

The fact that McCone is this sort of man is of real current importance because of a speech he made the other day to the Advertising Council. Most people, who do not know the facts that McCone has studied and faced, will think it a very radical speech. THE DIG 0.0 4000

The Advertising Council's invitation to McCone grew out of his chairmanship of the investigative c o m m i s s i o n appointed after the Watts riots two summers ago. His subject was the Negro problem and what to do about it. He sternly warned his hearers that unless. something adequate was done pretty quickly, the "breach" between disadvantaged and more fortunate would "split our society irretrievably."

He had two prescriptions for a solution: more jobs and better education. Since it was the educational prescription offered by McCone that gave his remarkable speech its radical character, this is what deserves to be most carefully weighed.

He began by pointing out that the currently fashionable remedy for the failure of the schools in the Negro ghettoes—mere forcible desegregation—was bound to be a washout. Wherever tried, the combination of large numbers of heavily disadvantaged children with more fortunate children has automatically depressed school quality.

As soon as the quality of a school goes down, the parents of the more fortunate children join the white emigration to the suburbs. Thus thoughtless school desegregation without attention to school quality —has always led to the extension of the Negro ghetto, in every city in this country where it has been attempted. These are cruelly tragic facts; but they must be faced, and ' McCone faced them.



McCone therefore placed his entire emphasis on school-quality. He boldly advocated what may be called positive discrimination nothing less than a vast increase in per-child investment in education in disadvantaged neighborhoods, as compared with per-child investment in middle-class neighborhoods.

"A new and revolutionary approach must be made at every grade level," he said. "This calls for smaller—much smaller—classes to maximize effective teaching. It calls for the best teachers. (It calls for) a dramatic change in our traditional pattern of education."

And of course it will be a dramatic, indeed a radical change if New York City, for instance, begins to spend two or three times as much to educate children in Harlem as is spent per child in the middle-class parts of Queens. But that is what McCone wants, and he wants it "regardless of cost."

In his speech, he did not put a price tag on his recommendations. But in his home city, Los Angeles, he advocates a \$250 million increase in the school budget—a rise by more than a third, in fact. He is also known to have urged the able secretary of health, education and welfare, John Gardner, to launch a national school aid program, centered on disadvantaged neighborhoods, to cost no less than \$4 billion. It is time to pay attention, when one of nature's budget-balancers begins pressing for such enormous new outlays. But the difference between John McCone and other solid businessmen of the same stripe is that McCone has looked into the abyss that this country can fall into. He knows what can happen to the United States if we do not do what is needful, "regardless of cost." What can happen is quite clear. If

What can happen is quite clear. If present trends continue, large numbers of our cities will be progressively transformed into hideous reservations for the Negro poor. The vast capital investments in the center cities will be written down to 10 cents on the dollar. And worst of all, ours will become a repressive society; for the white majority cannot expect the Negro minority to accept this kind of future with passive resignation.

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
What should happen is also quite clear. We can adopt McCone's prescription forthwith, and add to it every other practical prescription that promises remedy. It is a sign of the luck of America that such a prescription has been offered by such a man as McCone. It is a sign, in fact, that the true conservatives are beginning to move. For as McCone has sardonically remarked, paraphrasing Clemenceau on war, "Thé Negro problem is far too serious a matter to be left to the liberals."

Racial Violence Could Destroy

Newark's Mayor Addonizio Says Middle-Class America Is More Interested in Luxuries Than in Saving Cities

WASHINGTON — John A. Alc-Cone, chief of the commission that investigated the 1965 Watts riot, testified Tuesday that an answer must be found to racial violence or it will destroy the country.

His warning came as Mayor Hugh J. Addonizio of Newark complained that prospering white citizens don't want to spend the tax money needed to solve the problems of the Negro ghetto.

Addonizio, whose city was ripped by the first of this summer's two major riots, declared:

major riots, declared: "Affluent Americans are gripped more by the need to buy a vacation home, a sports car for their collegebound son and a second color television set than they are with sharing their affluence with the poor."

It is "the cruelest of myths," Addonizio said, ". . . that middle-class America has an interest in saving cities."

McCone and Addonizio testified

separately at a closed session of President Johnson's National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders.

Addonizio came armed with prepared testimony which he made public. McCone issued no public statement on his commission testimony, but testified publicly later before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

The Senate committee is considering a House-passed bill that would make interstate travel with intent to incite a riot a federal crime. McCone told the senators he could see no objection to the bill, calling it "reasonable." But he added: "It is not an alternative to the positive measures that must be taken."

Another witness, Jefferson B. Fordham, dean of the University of Pennsylvania law school, assailed the bill as a "big-stick reaction" and said its passage probably would

bring more violence in the cities.

McCone gave both the presidential and congressional panels copies of a new report from his commission staff d e t a i l i n g what has been done to carry out the commission's December, 1965, recommendations for improving conditions in Watts.

The report, which McCone submitted Saturday to Gov. Reagan, will be published later this week. It contains a covering letter from McCone to Reagan, stating. "We can continue to be encouraged but far from satisfied by the progress made."

Addonizio and McCone gave conflicting appraisals of the federal cost of solving ghetto problems.

McCone told the senators, "I do not believe in pouring in money." He added that, although the total cost of dealing effectively with the problem would be greater than the amount now being spent, it would not be "as great as some think" because money can be channeled away from some antipoverty measures that are unproductive.

Although he did not pinpoint the unproductive areas, McCone expressed concern over the rise in welfare costs in Los Angeles County which, he said, have jumped 34% in two years.

In discussing causes of ghetto riots, McCone said

the white community had contributed to a "frustration and rage" a mong Negroes by holding out great expectations — first through the 1954 Supreme Court edict outlawing segregated schools and then by promises which were not fully kept because of "financial and administrative problems."

Then, he said, the white community tempted the Negroes to translate the "rage and frustration" into violence through a prevailing attitude of "tolerance toward disobedience." "There's been a leniency," he said, "in which the temptation to move has been quite great."

McCone'said unless we find a solution to the

racial problem "it is going to split our society irretrievably and destroy our country."

He suggested a threepoint program of jobs and j o b training, education and leadership, and determination and responsibility by the whole society, including Negroes.

Police Brutality, Talk Fades, M'Cone Tells Sheriff Class

John A. McCone, Tormer director of the Central Intelligence Agency, Friday told a Sheriff's Academy graduating class that "the phrase 'police brutality' is seldom heard in the community."

However, he warned that while the number of persons antagonistic to police officers is decreasing, these dissidents are becoming "more active and more violent."

McCone spoke in the Ahmanson Theater at The Music Center at the graduation of the largest group of law enforcement officers in the history of California.

Besides 186 sheriff's deputies, Sheriff Peter J. Pitchess awarded, academy certificates to 35 officers' from police departments, in Los Angeles and Orange counties, and the Marine Corps. McCone, who headed the governor's commission which investigated the 1965 riots in Los Angeles County, said some events of recent months and recent years have cast law enforcement in an uncomfortable light.

McCone said his 1965 commission opposed establishment of civilian: review boards for law enforcement agencies but did propose radical changes in internal procedures within the Police Department for handling of civilian complaints.

"I will not go into detail but merely express my gratification that these changes have been effectively implemented," he said.



Personally, he considers the character, associates, reputation, and loyalty of the appointee to be above question. He is a man of mature judgement and who has served his country skillfully in setting governmental policies. He has no reservations regarding the appointee either personally or professionally and highly endorsed him for employment in the United States Government in a position of trust and responsibility.

ROBERT P. HOLLINGSWORTH, General Manager USAEC, advised that he has known the appointee since 1958, and primarily in a professional capacity. He was closely associated with the appointee from 1958 to 1961 during the appointee's ten year tenure of service as the Chairman of the USAEC. Mr. HOLLINGS-WORTH, who was the Deputy General Manager during this period, also had some contacts with theappointee while he was Director of the CIA and had about two meetings with him on business matters during the last two years. He regards the character, associates, reputation and loyalty of the appointee to be above reproach. The following investigation was conducted by SA RICHARD T. TAYLOR, JR. on July 2, 1973:

Senator HENRY JACKSON (Washington) has known the appointee, JOHN ALEX MC CONE, on a personal and professional basis for more than ten years. He describes his former service as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency and as Commissioner of the Atomic Energy Commission as being marked by excellence and the highest degree of public service. He has traveled extensively in the company of the appointee and views his judgments with regard to political and professional matters as being reasonable and in the best interest of the United States. He has no question concerning the appointee's character, associates, reputation and loyalty. He recommends him to any post to which President NIXON may care to appoint him.

Senator WARREN G. MAGNUSON (Washington) has known the appointee on a personal and professional basis for approximately 15 years. He has no question concerning his character, associates, reputation and loyalty. He recommends him to any post to which President NIXON may care to appoint him.

On June 29, 1973, United States Senator, ALAN CRANSTON, California, advised SA MAURICE G. AUSTIN, the appointee, JOHN ALEX MC CONE is known to him and does not know of anything of a derogatory nature regarding his character, associates, loyalty and reputation and would have no objection to the appointee having a position of trust and confidence.

CHARLES J. V. MURPHY, Retired Writer, Time and Fortune Magazine, advised that he has known the appointee since 1943 and served in the U.S. Air Force with McCONE. MURPHY was a Colonel in the Air Force and the appointee was Undersecretary. Since that period of time MURPHY has regarded himself as being a close friend of the appointee's and has had little professional association with him since World War II. He said that McCONE was a very able, resourceful and competent individual who has all the qualities of an Administrator. He is intelligent and can readily make important decisions.

MURPHY related that the appointee is definitely a person of complete integrity, reputation and loyalty. He is highly regarded for his contributions in the business world and for the commendable service as Director of the CIA and as Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.

MURPHY was a friend of the appointee's first wife who died unexpectedly of heart failure in Los Angeles, California in or about 1961. McCONE later married THEILINE PIGOTT, Widow of PAUL PIGOTT who died of cancer. He said that he has high regard for both of the appointee's wives and indicated there was never any scandal with his marriages. The appointee had no children by his first marriage and had no children of his own with his second wife. He said that the appointee's second wife had several children and most of these children are grown.

MURPHY related that he could think of no one more qualified to handle a responsible and intricate Federal position than the appointee. He recommended McCONE whole heartedly in a responsible Federal position. WFO 161-9073 EWM:mrh



Joseph M. At that time Mr. McCone was President of that corporation. In 1949 the Joshua Hendy Corporation went into the shipping business, which business it carried on until 1969. He stated Hendy International Corporation was organized in the early 1960s and the ship operating contracts of Joshua Hendy Corporation were transferred to Hendy International Corporation. Joshua Hendy Corporation Was liquidated in December. 1969.

Mr. Tescher stated Mr. McCone was variously President, Chairman of the Board, and principal stockholder of Joshua Hendy Corporation and Hendy International Corporation until September, 1972, when the latter corporation became a subsidiary of Kaiser Aluminum and Chemical Corporation of Los Angeles, California. Mr. Sescher noted that the Panamar Pacific Tankers Corporation of which Mr. McCone was President in 1961 was liquidated in 1964. He stated that corporation was wholly owned by Mr. McCone.

Mr. Tescher stated that

Mr. Tescher stated Mr. McCone is the finest man he has ever met. He described his character, integrity, honesty, moral standards, business ethics, and general reputation as outstanding. He said Mr. McCone has been vitally interested in national and community affairs, has involved himself with numerous commissions and committees devoted to the public good, and has received many awards for his accomplishments. He described him as a very astute and intelligent businessman and an extremely able administrator. He recommended him without reservation for any position of trust.

Edmund G. "Pat" Brown, partner in the law firm of Ball, Hunt, Hart, Brown and Baerwitz, Eeverly Hills, California, and former Governor of California, advised he has known Mr. McCone since 1958 when he became Governor. He stated he saw him on numerous occasions from that time until 1965 when he appointed

him as head of a commission to investigate the Watts riots which occurred in Los Angeles that year. Mr. McCone die a very thorough, conscientious, and excellent job as head of the commission and he was satisfied with the results. He appointed Mr. McCone to the commission because of his reputation as a businessman and as former Diheader of the Atomic Energy Commission and the Central Intelligence Agency. He has the highest regard for Mr. McCone's character, integrity, and reputation and recommended him highly for any position of trust.

Asa V. Call, Honorary Chairman of the Board, Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company, Los Angeles, California, advised he has known Mr. McCone for thirty years as a business associate and close personal friend. He stated Mr. McCone has been a member of the Board of Directors of that corporation for at least twenty years, except during his employment with the Federal Government. He noted Mr. McCone has an extremely good reputation in the business community and his honesty and integrity are above reproach. He described his character as impeccable and stated there has never been any scandal connected with his name. He further described him as being an intelligent and extremely capable administrator and an astute businessman. He recommended him highly for any position with the Federal Government.

Lieutenant General Marshall S. Carter, United States Army, retired, Colorado Springs, Colorado, stated he has known Mr. McCone since early 1962 when he was interviewed for the job of Deputy Director of the Central Intelligence Agency. He served in that position under Mr. McCone from March, 1962, until Mr. McCone's resignation in 1965. He considers Mr. McCone to be a man of impeccable character and integrity. He stated Mr. McCone's loyalty to America is unquestioned and he knows of no unfavorable information concerning him, his family or associates. He has been involved in various corporate legal matters for Mr. McCone and

various corporations with which Mr. McCone has been associated. He stated Mr. McCone enjoys the highest reputation and is a man of unquestioned integrity. He described him as a vigorous individual who enjoys excellent health. He knows of no business activities with which Mr. McCone is associated that would conflict with any Government appointment. He recommended him highly for a position of trust.

Otto Miller, Chairman of the Board of Directors, Standard Oil Company of California, San Francisco, California, advised he has been a close friend of Mr. McCone's for over thirty years and has been engaged in business matters with him for nearly that length of time. He stated he sees Mr. McCone' at least once every month since Mr. McCone serves as a member of the Board of Directors of that company. M. He described Mr. McCone as a person who enjoys vigorous good health and who has a tremendous capacity for work. He advised he could think of no objection to an appointment of Mr. McCone to any position of trust and confidence with the Federal Government. He stated that Mr. McCone's character, morals, and loyalty are above reproach and he would recommend him most highly.

Miss Betty Bothe, Mr. McCone's personal secretary, advised she has been employed in that position since January, 1969. She was formerly secretary to the President of Hendy International Corporation and she knew Mr. McCone well for ten years prior to the time she became his secretary. She expressed the highest regard for his character, integrity, and reputation and for his business and social ethics. She stated Mr. McCone has received numerous awards for his public accomplishments. As a member of the Board of Directors of International Telephone and Telegraph. Corporation; he testified before a United States Senate committee in Washington, Dr. C., investigating the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation in 1973 and was absolved of any wrongdoing. She recommended him without reservation.

Henry M. Jackson, United States Senator from Washington, advised in Washington, D. C., that he has known Mr. McCone on a personal and professional basis for more than ten years. He described Mr. McCone's former service as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency and as Commissioner of the Atomic Energy Commission as being marked by excellence and the

highest degree of public service. He stated he has traveled extensively in Mr. McCone's company and views his judgments with regard to political and professional matters as being reasonable and in the best interests of the United States. THE INTERNATIONAL TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY AND CHILE, 1970-71

A. INTRODUCTION .

On March 21, 1972, syndicated columnist Jack Anderson wrote that the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation was involved in "a bizarre plot to stop the 1970 election of leftist Chilean President Salvador Allende." Mr. Anderson further alleged that the company was in regular contact with the Central Intelligence Agency and that the Agency participated in the plot. His allegations were based on documents he had obtained from the corporation's files.

Following the publication of the Anderson columns, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee asserted its paramount jurisdiction over "intervention abroad" and voted to investigate the allegations. At the same time, the Committee voted to establish a Subcommittee on Multinational Corporations and directed the Subcommittee to undertake a broad study of multinational corporations and their impact on American foreign policy.

The Subcommittee was asked to make the investigation of the Anderson allegations its first order of business. Further, to insure a fair and balanced investigation, the Subcommittee was asked to postpone hearings until after the 1972 Presidential election.

This, the Subcommittee's first report, covers, and is limited to, its investigation of the Anderson allegations.

In September 1972 the Subcommittee staff began an intensive investigation of the activities of the United States Government and American owned private corporations in connection with the 1970 Chilean Presidential election. The staff interviewed dozens of businessmen, present and former government officials, and present and former ITT employees. In addition, the staff requested and received numerous documents relating to the Chilean situation from ITT and other companies. These were considerably more extensive than the original documents on which the Anderson columns were based. The Subcommittee also requested access to documents from the Department of State, but this was refused. This lack of cooperation by State left an important gap in the record, as will be noted later.

The Subcommittee heard testimony from witnesses during two days of hearings in executive session and seven days of hearings in public sessions. The witnesses included ITT employees, ITT outside directors, Government witnesses, and witnesses, representing other companies and financial institutions which had interests in Chile, or which were mentioned in the documents.

B. THE HEARING RECORD.

, SYNOPSIS OF CHILEAN PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

In 1970 Chile was in the midst of a presidential election campaign. President Eduardo Frei Montalvo, Christian Democrat, had been elected president in 1964. After completion of his six-year term in 1970 he was ineligible for re-election. The three major candidates were:

(1) Dr. Salvador Allende Gossens, Socialist, candidate of the Popular Unity coalition of Communists, Socialists, Social Democrats, Radicals and dissident Christian Democrats.

(2) Jorge Alessandri Rodriguez, Independent, candidate of the right-wing National Party, a fusion of the Conservative and Liberal parties.

(3) Radomiro Tomic Romero, candidate of the ruling Christian Democrat Party.

The Popular Unity candidate, Dr. Allende, a long-time Senator and founder of the Socialist Party, making his fourth try for the presidency, campaigned for a program of extensive land reform and the rapid nationalization of basic industries, banks, and communications systems, many of which were controlled by foreign capital.

The Christian Democrat, Mr. Tomic, a former Ambassador to the United States, campaigned for a continuation of Frei's program of gradual "Chileanization" of key sectors of the economy—a sort of middle way between capitalism and full socialism.

Conservative former President Alessandri, was the only candidate to give wholehearted support to the private free enterprise system.

The results of the September 4 popular election were:

Although Dr. Allende won with a margin of 39.000 votes, no candidate had an absolute majority. In such a case, the Chilean constitution required that a joint session of Congress choose between the first and second place finishers. The Congressional election was held October 24, 1970. Salvador Allende Gossens received 153 of the 195 votes. He was sworn in one week later.

The analysis of the hearing record is in three parts: Part I, the period before September 4, 1970, the date of the Chilean popular election for president; Part II. the period between September 4 and the Congressional election of October 24, 1970; and Part III, the post-October 24 period, after Salvador Allende Gossens had been elected President of Chile.

> PART I. THE PERIOD PRECEDING THE POPULAR ELECTION OF SEPTEMBER 4, 1970

McCone and Helms-May/June 1970

The Chilean political situation was discussed at an ITT Board meeting in the spring of 1970 (Rohatyn testimony) and at the June 1970 board meeting the <u>opinion was expressed that Dr. Salvador Allende</u> Gossens, the Marxist candidate, would win the popular election. (Mc-Come testimony,)

On his own initiative, Mr. John McCone, a former Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, at the time a consultant to the Agency and a Director of ITT, held a number of conversations about Chile with Richard Helms, then CIA Director. At least two conversations took place in Langley, Virginia, and one at Mr. McCone's home in San Marino, California. (McCone testimony.) During these conversations, Mr. McCone told Helms that ITT expected Dr. Allende to win the election. He pointed out that Allende was campaigning on a platform calling for the expropriation of American business, including ITT's properties, and expressed the opinion that the American national interest, as well as business interests were involved, "because there were, as you know, several hundred million dollars of OPIC guarantees, of which approximately 100 million dollars were ITT's." (McCone testimony.)

Mr. McCone asked Mr. Helms whether the United States intended to intervene in the election to encourage the support of "one of the candidates who stood for the principles that are basic in this country." (McCone testimony.) Mr. McCone indicated that the two candidates he had in mind were Mr. Radomiro Tomic Romero, the candidate of the Christian Democratic Party and Mr. Jorge Alessandri Rodriguez, an independent and the candidate of the conservative National Party. (McCone testimony.) Incumbent Christian Democratic President Eduardo Frei Montalvo was prevented by law from succeeding himself.

Mr. Helms told Mr. McCone that the matter had been considered by the "Forty Committee," the Executive Branch interdepartmental committee; at that time chaired by Dr. Henry Kissinger, which approves CIA covert actions, and that a decision had been made that nothing of consequence should be done. (McCone testimony.) Helms indicated that some minimal effort would be mounted which "could be managed within the flexibility of their own budget" that is, without seeking additional appropriated funds. (McCone testimony.) Mr. Helms was very pessimistic about the chances of Mr. Alessandri and was of the personal opinion that Dr. Allende would win. This opinion was contrary to the official reports of the U.S. Embassy. Based upon polls commissioned or undertaken by the CIA, the Embassy was reporting that Alessandri would win a plurality with approximately 40 percent of the vote. (Korry testimony.)

McCone said that he informed Mr. Geneen of the decision by the Agency not to intervene beyond the "normal budget flexibility" in the Chilean election and that Mr. Geneen was disappointed by the news. (McCone testimony.)

Geneen and Broe—July 16, 1970

During one of the conversations, Mr. McCone suggested to Mr. Helms that someone on Helms staff contact Mr. Geneen, and this suggestion led directly to a meeting between Mr. Geneen and Mr. Broe, the Chief of the CIA's Clandestine Services (also known as the Directorate of Plans), Western Hemisphere Division, on July 16, 1970, in the Sheraton-Carlton Hotel, Washington, D.C. In response to Mr. McCone's request, Mr. Helms told Mr. Broe that Mr. Geneen, ITT's Chief Executive Officer, would be in Washington on July 16, 1970, and that he should get in touch with Geneen to arrange a meeting. (Broe testimony.) Thus it was McCone, through his suggestion to Helms, who set in motion a series of contacts between the ITT and CIA in connection with Chile. Mr. Broe was contacted by William Merriam, head of ITT's Washington office, who told him that Mr. Geneen wanted to meet late in the evening. Mr. Broe waited for Mr. Geneen in the lobby of the hotel. Mr. Merriam arrived, introduced himself and then took Mr. Broe up to Mr. Geneen's suite to wait for him. Mr. Merriam left the suite before the conversation began. (Broe testimony.) Mr. Geneen asked Mr. Broe for information on the electoral situation, the status and potential of the candidates and their parties. (Broe testimony.) Then Mr. Geneen offered to assemble an election fund for Jorge Alessandri Rodriguez, one of the Chilean candidates. Mr. Geneen said the fund would be "substantial" and that he wanted the fund controlled and channeled through the CIA. (Broe testimony.) Mr. Broe refused the offer and told Mr. Geneen that the CIA was not supporting any candidate in the Chilean election. The meeting lasted about an hour.

Mr. Geneen accepted Broe's account of the meeting as accurate, although he said he could not remember making the offer of a campaign fund. (Geneen testimony.) He testified that he made a similar offer to the CIA in 1964 and the offer was rejected by the Agency. (Geneen testimony.) Following the meeting, Mr. Geneen told Mr. Broe to contact ITT Vice President Ned Gerrity if Geneen was out of town.

Mr. Broe called Mr. Geneen on July 27th to tell him there was no change in the Chilean situation. The conversation was very brief and dealt with the progress of the candidates.

PART II. THE PERIOD BETWEEN SEPTEMBER 4 AND THE CONGRESSIONAL ELECTION OF OCTOBER 24, 1970

The Alessandri Formula

On September 4, 1970, Salvador Allende Gossens won a narrow plurality of the vote. On September 9, Mr. Alessandri announced that if elected by the Congress, he would immediately resign. This maneuver would open the way for President Frei to run again. In a two-way contest between President Frei and Dr. Allende, many believed Frei would win. This plan became known as the "Alessandri formula."

The Million Dollar Offer

On September 9, 1970, the ITT Board of Directors met for its monthly meeting in New York City. Mr. Geneen expressed his concern to John McCone over the political situation in Chile. In Mr. McCone's words: "What he told me at that time was that he was prepared to put up as much as a million dollars in support of any plan that was adopted by the government for the purpose of bringing about a coalition of the opposition to Allende so that when confirmation was up, which was some months later, this coalition would be united and deprive Allende of his position." (McCone testimony.) Mr. Geneen asked Mr. McCone to support his proposal. Mr. McCone agreed and came to Washington several days later and met with Henry Kissinger, Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, and Richard Helms. He communicated to both Kissinger and Helms Mr. Geneen's offer of a \$1,000,000 fund for the purpose of assisting any government plan designed to form a coalition in the Chilean Congress to stop Allende. Dr. Kissinger, according to Mr. McCone, thanked him and said he

would hear from him. Mr. McCone did not receive a call back from Dr. Kissinger and therefore assumed no government plan had been developed. (McCone testimony.)

On September 11, 1970, at roughly the same time Mr. McCone was meeting with Dr. Kissinger and Mr. Helms, Jack Neal, the International Relations Director in the ITT Washington office, telephoned Viron P. Vaky, Dr. Kissinger's assistant for Latin American Affairs. He informed him that Mr. Geneen was willing to come to Washington to discuss his interest and that the company was willing to contribute a sum of money in seven figures. He also advised Mr. Vaky that the company was aware of Ambassador Korry's position with respect to the Alessandri formula and that he, Neal, hoped that the White House would remain neutral in the event other attempts were made to "save the situation in Chile." Mr. Neal claimed that on the following day, September 12, he delivered the same message to Assistant Secretary of State Charles Meyer. (Neal testimony.) Meyer however testified that, although he had spoken with Mr. Neal on that date he could not recall the offer of a sum of money. (Meyer testimony.)

There is little doubt that the ITT fund of "up to seven figures" was offered in support of any U.S. government plan to form a coalition in the Chilean Congress capable of stopping the election of Salvador Allende. Mr. Geneen testified that even if the plan did not block Allende's election, he hoped it would create a situation in which Allende would go slowly on the nationalization of American property in Chile. (Geneen testimony.)

During the hearings Ned Gerrity, ITT's Vice President in charge of corporate relations told the committee that the fund was offered for a constructive purpose such as housing and was designed to be a display of good will by ITT towards the Allende government. (Gerrity testimony.) But this contention strains credulity. Neal denied any knowledge of the use to which the money was to be put. (Neal testimony.) Gerrity admitted that he had never communicated any constructive purposes for use of the funds to Merriam, who gave Neal his instructions. (Gerrity testimony.) Nor could Gerrity recall whether he had ever explicitly discussed such proposals with Geneen. (Gerrity testimony.) Vaky testified that he understood the offer of funds by Neal to be in the context of blocking Allende from becoming president. (Vaky testimony.) And, in all of the documents submitted, there is no evidence of a constructive purpose for the \$1 million fund.

Finally, since the end of World War II, the U.S. provided in excess of \$1.4 billion in foreign aid funds to Chile. The idea that \$1 million for housing, technical assistance, or agriculture could have an influence on Allende, a dedicated Marxist for the past 30 years, is not credible. As Senator Case stated: "The whole body of evidence, memoranda, internal communications in the company, communications among all of you shows great disillusionment on the part of ITT with a program of aid to Chile, . . . this adds to the difficulty of believing that a relatively small amount of additional aid would be of any value." (Gerrity testimony.)

In short, Gerrity's assertion that the company intended a constructive use of the \$1 million fund has all of the earmarks of an after-

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thought. As Senator Percy put it: "The implausibility of this story is what bothers us. It just does not hang together. It does not make any kind of sense for reasonable, rational men . . . to really feel that this assistance could have an impact." (Gerrity testimony.)

Hendrix and Berrellez in Santiago

In addition to regular reports from the line officers of ITT subsidiaries, ITT receives reports from its Corporate Relations Department which go directly to company headquarters in New York. Two ex-newspaper men, Hal Hendrix and Robert Berrellez, were responsible for reporting for ITT's Corporate Relations Department on Chilcan political developments. Mr. Hendrix, who was based in New York made frequent trips around Latin America, as did Mr. Berrellez who was based in Buenos Aires. The reports filed by Messrs. Hendrix and Berrellez were among the most suggestive documents received by the Subcommittee and the background of their reports was the subject of intensive investigation.

In August 1970, Mr. Hendrix was instructed by Mr. Gerrity to make a commitment to increase the advertising of the ITT-controlled Chilean telephone company (Chiltelco) in conservative Chilean newspapers by 50%. Mr. Hendrix explained that he made the recommendation because the newspapers were losing advertisers who thought Dr. Allende would win. The advertising program was designed to bolster the newspapers to "keep their editorial voices alive." Mr. Gerrity testified that he later learned the commitment had never been honored. It was vetoed by Benjamin Holmes, Chiltelco's local manager, as being too obviously political.

The Company instructed Mr. Berrellez to make reporting on the election his number one priority. On the night of the popular election, he filed cables to New York every few hours as the votes were tabulated. On September 7, Mr. Berrellez filed his first post-election report which was based largely on an interview with Arturo Matte, Mr. Alessandri's brother-in-law and closest political adviser. Berrellez summed up the situation as follows:

(a) any attempt to implement the Alessandri formula would lead to a bloodbath; (b) prospects for successful implementation of the Alessandri formula were at best problematical; (c) "reliablest" sources in Santiago caution to proceed slowly, not to panic; (d) it would be possible to negotiate directly with Allende with respect to the company's properties; and (e) "strong outside political and economic pressures resulting in unemployment and unrest internally will certainly strengthen the hand of the left wing extremists and will convert Allende into merely a puppet of a machine dedicated to violent anti-U.S. revolution on a hemisphere scale." (Appendix II.)

During the week of September 14th, following the Washington activities of Mr. McCone and Mr. Neal, Mr. Hendrix joined Mr. Berrellez in Santiago. On September 17th, they cabled a joint report to ITT in the United States which carefully explored the chances of blocking Dr. Allende's election by the Chilean Congress. The report also contained specific recommendations for supporting Chileans working to block Dr. Allende's election.

One paragraph written by Mr. Hendrix said, "Late Tuesday night (September 15), Ambassador Edward Korry finally received a mes-

sage from State Department giving him the green light to move in the name of President Nixon." The message gave him maximum authority to do all possible—short of a Dominican Republic type action—to keep Allende from taking power." (Appendix II.)

action—to keep Allende from taking power." (Appendix II.) According to Mr. Hendrix, the source of the information was a Chilean national, described as an intimate political associate of Frei. (Hendrix testimony.) Mr. Hendrix said his informant told him that a very hard message—"muy duro"—had been received at the U.S. Embassy from a very high—"muy alto"—source. (Hendrix testimony.) The discussion took place at a coffee bar next to the presidential palace.

The Chilean source, according to Hendrix, never specifically named President Nixon or made reference to the Dominican Republic. These references, he said, were his own embellishment of what he had been told. Hendrix denied that the information on which the paragraph was based came from sources within the United States Embassy or the Central Intelligence Agency. (Hendrix testimony.)

Both Broe and Merriam testified that Mr. Merriam gave a copy of the cable to Mr. Broe and that Mr. Broe said that the report was accurate and the recommendations it contained were good.

These recommendations were the following (Appendix II):

1. We and other U.S. firms in Chile pump some advertising into *Mercurio*. (This has been started.)

2. We help with getting some propagandists working again on radio and television . . .

3. Assist in support of a "family relocation" center in Mendoza or Baires [Buenos Aires] for wives and children of key persons involved in the fight. This will involve about 50 families for a period of a month to six weeks, maybe two months.

4. Bring what pressure we can on USIS in Washington to instruct the Santiago USIS to start moving the *Mercurio* editorials around Latin America and into Europe. Up until I left they were under orders not to move anything out of Chile.

5. Urge the key European press, through our contacts there, to get the story of what disaster could fall on Chile if Allende & Co. win this country.

These are immediate suggestions and there will be others between now and October 24 as pressure mounts on Frei and the Christian Democrats.

When Ambassador Korry was questioned about the "green light message" he refused to tell the Subcommittee what his instructions from Washington were. Assistant Secretary of State Meyer also refused to say what the Ambassador's instructions were and the Department refused to furnish copies of the cables it sent to Santiago. In the face of the refusal of the State Department to cooperate, it is impossible for the Subcommittee to determine definitely whether the Ambassador in fact received a cable substantially along the lines described by Hendrix. The reluctance of the State Department to assist the Subcommittee is indicated by the correspondence published as an appendix to the hearing volumes. The latter part of the message was drafted by Mr. Berrellez and was based upon a further interview with Mr. Matte. In summing up this conversation, Mr. Berrellez noted that Mr. Matte told him "the leader we thought was missing is right there in the saddle (Frei) but he won't move unless he is provided with a constitutional threat; the threat must be provided one way or another through provocation; Matte did not mention money or other needs but at the end when it was mentioned we were, as always, ready to contribute with what was necessary, he said 'we would be advised.'"

Mr. Berrellez in his testimony attempted to explain this pledge of support as merely a polite leavetaking observation, general in nature, with no implication of political support, financial or otherwise. This explanation is belied by the context in which it was made. Mr. Berrellez had just finished a detailed discussion of the prospects of defeating Allende through the Alessandri formula, or by creating sufficient provocation, economic or otherwise, to bring about a constitutional crisis which would lead the Army to intervene and prevent Allende from being elected president. (Appendix II.)

The cable is action oriented, specific in content and openly anti-Allende. Placed in context, it would be incongruous to construe Berrellez' offer of assistance as a stylized way of saying goodbye. The Subcommittee believes it was clearly an offer to back the anti-Allende effort then underway in Chile with financial or other resources. It was a logical complement to the offer that McCone and Neal made in Washington of a \$1 million fund in support of any U.S. Government plan designed to form a coalition in the Chilean Congress to defeat Dr. Allende.

Messrs. Berrellez and Hendrix continued to file reports on the developing Chilean political situation which reflected the ardent desire to see Dr. Allende defeated. (Appendix II.)

Contacts Between the ITT Washington Office and the CIA

A copy of the September 17th cable from Messrs. Hendrix and Berrellez was sent to William Merriam, head of the ITT Washington office. The cable was discussed at a staff meeting and became the basis for staff action. Mr. Merriam called Mr. Broe and arranged to meet him for lunch at the Metropolitan Club in Washington on September 22nd. Before the luncheon, Mr. Merriam sent Broe a copy of the September 17 cable. At lunch Mr. Merriam asked Mr. Broe for his judgment of the assessment and the workability of the recommendations. Broe confirmed the validity of the political analysis and approved the recommendations.

Acting on one of the recommendations in the cable, Bernard Goodrich, an ITT public relations man, visited the office of the United States Information Agency in Washington. Mr. Goodrich testified that he told the agency ITT was supporting *El Mercurio* with increased advertising and urged them to circulate *El Mercurio* editorials more widely in Latin America. He asked them whether there was anything ITT as a private company could do that the U.S. Government could not do. When USIA officials said the company should not do anything overt which might be interpreted as intervention, Goodrich, "assured them that our people were well experienced in that field." (Appendix II.)

Broe and Gerrity-September 29, 1970-and U.S. Government Policy

Prior to September 4, 1970, the policy of the U.S. Government, according to Assistant Secretary of State Meyer, was to not interfere in the Chilean electoral process. Mr. McCone testified that Mr. Helms had informed him that-although the matter of the Chilean election had been discussed in June of 1970 at the "Forty Committee", the interdepartmental group which controls the covert operations of the CIA, nothing of consequence would be done to influence the outcome of the September 4 election.

In the aftermath of Allende's victory, however, this policy of allowing events to take their course in Chile without substantial U.S. intervention was the subject of high level review within the U.S. Government. Meyer, testified that shortly after the September 4 election, the Forty Committee, at a meeting which he attended, met for the express purpose of discussing U.S. policy in connection with Chile; but he refused to inform the Committee what precisely was said at the meeting, what decisions, if any, were taken and what instructions were communicated to Mr. Korry, the U.S. Ambassador in Chile.

Mr. Korry did testify however that immediately after Allende won a plurality in the popular election of September 4, 1970, he sent a tenpoint cable to the State Department indicating that an Allende presidency would not be in the best interests of the U.S. (Korry testimony.) Dr. Kissinger stated in an off-the-record briefing to a group of Midwestern newspaper editors in Chicago on September 16, 1970 that an Allende presidency would cause substantial problems for the United States as well as for Latin American countries bordering on Chile. (Korry testimony.) It is, accordingly, clear that both the U.S. Embassy in Santiago and high levels of the U.S. Government in Washington viewed with hostility the prospect of an Allende Government. It is within this context that Broe's visit to Mr. Gerrity of September 29, 1970 must be viewed.

On September 29th, for the first time in the course of the contacts between ITT and the United States Government, the Government took the initiative. Mr. Broe, at the instruction of CIA Director Richard Helms, called Mr. Gerrity in New York and arranged to meet him there on September 29th.

Messrs. Broe and Gerrity agreed substantially about what was said when they met. Mr. Broe proposed a plan to accelerate economic chaos in Chile as a means of putting pressure on Christian Democratic Congressmen to vote against Dr. Allende or in any event to weaken Dr. Allende's position in case he was elected. (Broe and Gerrity testimony.) As Gerrity summed it up, Broe made suggestions based on recommendations from "our representative on the scene" and analysis in Washington. The specific suggestions as recorded by Gerrity were the following:

1. Banks should not renew credits or should delay in doing so.

2. Companies should drag their feet in sending money, in making deliveries, in shipping spare parts, etc.

3. Savings and loan companies there are in trouble. If pressure were applied they would have to shut their doors, thereby creating stronger pressure.

4. We should withdraw all technical help and should not promise any technical assistance in the future. Companies in a position to do so should close their doors.

5. A list of companies was provided and "it was suggested that we approach them as indicated. I was told that of all of the companies involved ours alone had been responsive and understood the problem. The visitor added that money was not a problem." (Appendix II.)

Broe testified that the plan to create economic chaos was a "thesis" which had been developed after analysis of the points of vulnerability of the Chilean society. Following Allende's victory in the popular election, many middle class Chileans were uneasy about the future of the economy and began to withdraw their money from banks. Also, many Chileans attempted to convert their Chilean currency to foreign currencies and to get it out of the country.

The CIA's thinking was that if additional pressure were placed on the Chilean economy, the deterioration would be accelerated and Christian Democratic Congressmen who were planning to vote for Allende would be shocked into changing their minds and following the Alessandri formula.

Mr. Gerrity told Mr. Geneen that he didn't think the plan would work. Mr. Geneen then consulted McCone who also told Geneen that the plan would not work. Mr. Geneen decided not to implement it.

Mr. Meyer attempted to explain Mr. Broe's proposal to Mr. Gerrity as merely the exploration of a possible policy option. Mr. Meyer was unwilling to inform the Subcommittee of the substance of the Forty Committee meeting. The Subcommittee is, accordingly, unable to say whether Mr. Helms' instruction to Mr. Broe to contact Mr. Gerrity and make proposals to Mr. Gerrity for creating economic dislocation in Chile were a direct outcome of the Forty Committee meeting which took place shortly after Allende won a plurality in the September 4 election. It is clear, however, that Mr. Broe's proposal of concrete measures designed to create economic difficulties in Chile for the purpose of influencing Christian Democrat Congressmen to vote against Allende in the Congressional election of October 24 was in striking contrast to the pre-September 4 U.S. Government policy of allowing events in Chile to follow their natural course without substantial interference from the U.S. Government.

The contacts between ITT and the CIA continued after Mr. Broe's meeting with Mr. Gerrity. On October 6th, Mr. Broe talked to the deputy head of ITT's Washington Office, John Ryan, about the prospects of stopping Dr. Allende. Mr. Ryan testified that his memorandum of the conversation was accurate, that Mr. Broe had urged ITT to keep the pressure on, and had suggested a run on the banks. (Ryan testimony.)

Mr. Merriam met Mr. Broe for lunch on several occasions after that and when cables arrived from Santiago he called Broe and arranged to have a CIA messenger pick up copies. In exchange, Mr. Broe kept Mr. Merriam informed about the CIA assessment of the situation. Mr. Merriam passed the information along to his superiors, and at Gerrity's specific request, to Mr. McCone.

The company's thinking is reflected in Mr. Merriam's October 23 letter to Dr. Kissinger. (Merriam testimony.) The letter, and the accompanying attachment, were the outgrowth of an October 16 conversation between Mr. Neal and Ambassador Korry. The Ambassador, Mr. Neal testified, advised him to get ITT's policy suggestions about Chile to Dr. Kissinger before October 24th.

The letter and memorandum proposed that the U.S. Government take a number of measures against the Allende government. For example, it suggested that, "without informing President Allende, all U.S. aid funds already committed to Chile should be placed in the 'under review' status in order that entry of money into Chile is temporarily stopped with a view to a permanent cut off if necessary. This includes 'funds in the pipe line'—'letters of credit' or any such." (Merriam testimony.)

Mr. Merriam's letter and the attachment were distributed to Mr. Gerrity. (Merriam testimony.) The only apparent dissent in the company came from Richard Dillenbeck of the ITT Legal Department who warned that the actions proposed by the company might jeopardize the investment guarantee which covered the company's properties in Chile. (Merriam testimony.)

The letter was acknowledged by Dr. Kissinger, but, although Mr. Merriam thought the acknowledgment was more than perfunctory, there apparently was no follow-up action or conversation with Kissinger or anyone on his staff. (Merriam testimony.)

The Banks-A Diverse Reaction

Because of the references in the ITT documents to "banks in New York and California" and because the CIA suggestion to ITT was that they work to create economic chaos in Chile by causing a run on financial institutions, the Subcommittee invited testimony from the Chase Manhattan Bank, Manufacturer's Hanover Trust Company, First National City Bank, and the Bank of America. In addition, the Subcommittee staff interviewed officials of Morgan Guaranty Trust Company and Marine Midland National Bank.

All of the bank officials who testified or who were interviewed said they had not been approached by the Central Intelligence Agency, ITT, Chilean nationals or anyone else to cut back on their lending or to create economic chaos in an effort to block President Allende's election. The Subcommittee could find no evidence of involvement by American financial institutions in a plan to block President Allende's election by the Congress or in a concerted effort to weaken him by creating "financial chaos." Two of the banks, Chase Manhattan and Morgan Guaranty, cut their lines of credit because they thought Chile's economic prospects were poor. Two banks, Manufacturer's and Marine Midland, increased their outstanding loans in the period between the two elections. The Bank of America and First National City Bank carried on at existing loan levels. Thus, the financial community reaction to the Allende victory in the popular election was diverse.

Two of the large banks reported that they were approached by Chilean nationals with requests for campaign contributions to support the Alessandri candidacy and both reported turning the request down as a matter of long standing policy.

Several of the bank witnesses said that, from their perspective, creating economic chaos would have been counterproductive. The banks had large amounts outstanding in loans to the Chilean Government, as well as to Chilean businessmen. Economic chaos might have meant that the loans could not have been repaid.

A number of bank witnesses said that in order to operate in a large number of countries around the world they have adopted strict policies of non-involvement in the political affairs of the countries where they do business. The bankers said they are located in countries with widely differing forms of government and widely differing political and economic systems. Involvement in host country politics would inevitably mean impairment of their ability to function.

The bank witnesses were unanimous in the view that the policy of non-involvement in host country politics is, in the long run, the best for business.

PART III. ALLENDE IN POWER

On October 18. Alesandri withdrew from the Congressional run-off and, in the October 24 Congressional election Salvador Allende received 153 of the 195 votes cast. He was sworn in as President of Chile on November 4, 1970.

The Ad Hoc Committee on Chile

In early 1971, I.T.T. began to follow a two-track strategy with respect to the Allende government. On the one hand, at the suggestion of Ralph Mecham, the Washington representative of the Anaconda Company, Mr. Merriam invited the Washington representatives of major U.S. companies having investments in Chile to form an Ad Hoc Committee on Chile. (Merriam testimony.) There were several meetings, the first of which took place in early January, 1971, in ITT's Washington offices. Representatives of Anaconda, Kennecott, Ralston Purina, Bank of America, Pfizer Chemical, and Grace and Company attended. (Merriam testimony.)

The purpose was described in a memorandum by Mr. Ronald Raddatz, the Bank of America representative: "the thrust of the meeting was toward the application of pressure on the (U.S.) Government, wherever possible, to make it clear that a Chilean take-over would not be tolerated without serious repercussions following." "ITT," said the memo, "believes the place to apply pressure is through the office of Henry Kissinger." "That is what we have been doing for the last year or so," said Mr. Merriam. One purpose of the pressure, Mr. Merriam confirmed, was to get the U.S. Government to block loans to Chile by institutions such as the World Bank and the Inter-American Development Bank. (Merriam testimony.) President Allende had not, at the time of the meeting, taken expropriatory action against any American concern.

Nevertheless, as explained by Merriam, the purpose of denying Chile credits in January 1971 was to produce economic problems for Chile. By confronting him with economic collapse, said Mr. Merriam, Dr. Allende could be made more willing to negotiate with ITT on terms satisfactory to the company. (Merriam testimony.)

The Anaconda Corporation may have shared this hard line approach toward Dr. Allende. Mr. Mecham, in reporting on the formation of the Ad Hoc group to Jay Parkinson, Chairman of the Board of Anaconda, noted that the purpose of the group was to "keep the pressure on Kissinger." (Mecham testimony.) The Ad Hoc Committee, Mecham testified, never considered the possibility that the application of such external economic pressure on Chile could, as Mr. Berrellez had warned in his cable of September 7, 1970, backfire and lead President Allende into a more aggressively anti-American posture. (Mecham testimony.)

William Foster, then the Washington representative of Ralston Purina Company, reported to his office in St. Louis on the first meeting of the Ad Hoc group and was directed not to attend any further meetings. (Foster testimony.) Ralston Purina, was actively negotiating with the Chilean Government, saw a reasonable prospect of a satisfactory settlement and decided that participation in the Ad Hoc group, would jeopardize the negotiations. Similarly, the Bank of America participated in two meetings to gather information but did not endorse an activist program because of its belief that a "hard line" position would compromise the banks' ability to negotiate:; (Raddatz testimony.)

The Company's Stake and Negotiations

While Merriam was organizing the Ad Hoc Committee ITT was developing a strategy for negotiating with Allende. ITT's primary investment in Chile was a 70% interest in the Chilean telephone company (Chiltelco). The estimated book value of this ITT investment was placed at approximately \$153 million. The remaining 30% of Chiltelco was held by the Chilean Development Corporation (Corfo) and individual Chilean private investors. \$92.5 million of ITT's \$153 million interest in Chiltelco was covered by investment guaranty agreements administered by the Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC) which provided insurance, among other things, against expropriation.

Allende first mentioned the possibility of nationalizing Chiltelco in a campaign speech of September 2, 1970. The eventual Chilean ownership of Chiltelco was fully anticipated by ITT executives. In addition to the Chiltelco property, ITT had other lesser holdings in Chile, including two hotels, a telephone directory book service and an international cable company. The estimated book value of ITT's investments in Chile, including Chiltelco, amounted to approximately \$160 million.

On October 20, 1970, Allende invited Benjamin Holmes, the Chiltelco local manager, to meet with him. At that meeting, Allende indicated that he had not definitely decided upon a course of action with respect to Chiltelco. (Appendix II.) Hence, there was reason to believe that negotiations were possible with Allende.

ITT had successfully negotiated the sale of telephone properties to the Peruvian Government by persuading that Government that a satisfactory agreement with ITT would demonstrate that it was not inherently hostile to foreign investments. ITT persuaded the Peruvian Government that it could then argue that its decision to expropriate, without compensation, the property of the International Petroleum Company (IPC), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Exxon Corporation, was a special case and not an indication of general financial irresponsibility.

Mr. Guilfoyle summed up the strategy in a July 9, 1971 note to the ITT Board:

When Allende signs the copper legislation and formally expropriates Anaconda and Kennecott, there must be increased international resentment against the Government of Chile, and, as in the case of Peru, on their expropriation of IPC, we were able to capitalize on this and eventually arrive at a deal which allowed them to announce internationally that copper and IPC were special cases and here is an arrangement we made in a reasonable negotiation with ITT. (Appendix II.)

Through Mr. Holmes, a meeting was arranged with Dr. Allende on March 10, 1971 in Santiago, Chile, which was attended by, among others, Messrs. Guilfoyle and Francis Dunleavy of the New York Headquarters. ITT's memorandum about the meeting, prepared by Mr. Hendrix, described it as cordial. President Allende informed ITT that he had not decided whether the Government would nationalize Chiltelco or propose a joint venture with ITT. (Guilfoyle testimony.) Dunleavy told Allende that ITT was prepared to negotiate in good faith but that the day he "grabbed" the telephone company ITT would go to OPIC and invoke its investment guarantee agreement. (Guilfoyle testimony.)

On May 26, President Allende informed Mr. Guilfoyle that Chiltelco would be nationalized and that a commission to be headed by the Minister of the Interior would negotiate the terms of compensation. ITT responded that the terms of the contract required Chile to pay ITT the full book value of its interest in Chiltelco; i.e., \$153 million. The Chileans offered \$24 million for ITT's interest in Chiltelco. They also proposed valuation by international arbitration, but they insisted as well that the Government take over the management of the company pending the arbitration. Guilfoyle, however, opposed government management of the company while the arbitration was under way because he feared that the value of the property would deteriorate under Chilean Government management. This first phase of negotiations thus ended in impasse.

The October 1, 1971 Letter to Peterson

On September 29, the Chilean Government took over the management of Chiltelco, confiscating the books of the company. The government alleged that Chiltelco was deliberately allowing service to deteriorate. ITT denied the allegations.

A number of Chiltelco executives, all Chilean nationals, were arrested. The arrests were in connection with the activities of another ITT subsidiary which published telephone books.

Shortly after the intervention in Chiltelco by the Chilean Government, Mr. Merriam wrote to John Ehrlichman on the White House staff and requested a meeting for Mr. Geneen with Henry Kissinger and Peter Peterson, Assistant to the President for International Economic Affairs. A luncheon meeting was scheduled.

Because of the demands on Dr. Kissinger's time, General Haig, his deputy, joined Mr. Peterson at lunch with Mr. Geneen. Mr. Peterson testified that the luncheon meeting was brief and the discussion was a rather straightforward exposition of what had happened to the company in Chile. Mr. Peterson could not recall whether Mr. Geneen made specific suggestions but did remember Mr. Geneen saying he would send some ideas along.

Following the meeting, Mr. Geneen instructed Mr. Merriam to put ITT's suggestions in writing and forward them to Mr. Peterson. In response to the request, Merriam sent a letter to Peterson dated October 1, 1971, which had attached an 18-point action plan. Among other things the plan proposed the following specific measures to see to it that Allende would not "make it through the next six months": (Appendix III.)

Continue loan restrictions in the international banks such as those the Export/ Import Bank has already exhibited. 5

Quietly have large U.S. private banks do the same.

Confer with foreign banking sources with the same thing in mind.

Delay buying from Chile over the next six months. Use U.S. copper stockpile instead of buying from Chile. *

Bring about a scarcity of U.S. dollars in Chile.

¢

Discuss with CIA how it can assist the six-month squeeze.

Get to reliable sources within the Chilean Military. Delay fuel delivery to Navy and gasoline to Air Force. (This would have to be carefully handled, otherwise would be dangerous. However, a false delay could build up their planned dis-content against Allende, thus, bring about necessity of his removal.) Help disrupt Allende's UNCTAD plans.

It is noted that Chile's annual exports to the U.S. are valued at \$154 million (U.S. dollars). As many U.S. markets as possible should be closed to Chile. Likewise, any U.S. exports of special importance to Allende should be delayed or stopped.

Thus, one year after Broe proposed a plan to accelerate economic chaos in Chile, Merriam on behalf of the company, was proposing to the President's Assistant for International Economic Policy a similar plan to exacerbate the Chilean economic situation. (Merriam testimony.) Peterson testified that he took no action to implement the Merriam plan. (Peterson testimony.)

In accordance with the company's usual distribution procedures, the Merriam letter and 18-point plan were distributed within the company. Neither Geneen nor Gerrity evidenced any disagreement with this plan to create economic chaos in Chile so as to prevent Allende from getting through the next six months.

Publication of the Anderson Columns and the Break-Off of Negotiations

In December 1971 negotiations were resumed between the company and the Allende Government. Allende agreed to move the locus of the negotiations from Santiago to Washington where they were to be conducted on behalf of the Chilean Government by Chile's Ambassador to the United States, Orlando Letelier. Letelier and Guilfoyle were

in active negotiations, according to Guilfoyle, pursuing the possibility of international appraisal of the company's assets, as a basis for determining compensation up until March 20, when Jack Anderson, syndicated columnist, published his first column dealing with ITT's activities in connection with Chile in the fall of 1970. Guilfoyle had been scheduled to meet with Letelier a few days after the publication of the Anderson column but that meeting was cancelled and the negotiations were broken off, following the public action of the Anderson columns. (Guilfoyle testimony; Geneen testimony.)

The Board of Directors of ITT

Felix Rohatyn testified that the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, which is composed of the outside Directors including Rohatyn, was informed in April 1972, of McCone's and Geneen's 1970 offer of funds to the CIA, but had no knowledge of these fund offers at the time they were made. (Rohatyn testimony.) The Board's concern was whether the assets of ITT were likely to be depleted as a result of the actions of the management and McCone in connection with Chile. Opinion of outside counsel was obtained that the OPIC guarantees had not been jeopardized. No other investigation was undertaken as to the propriety of management's action. (Rohatyn testimony.)

C. CONCLUSIONS

In summary:

• On July 16, 1970, Geneen offered a substantial fund to the CIA to be used to support the conservative candidate Alessandri in the Chilean election of September 4, 1970. This offer was turned down, just as the CIA had rejected an offer of assistance made by ITT in connection with the 1964 Chilean election.

• In early September, 1970, McCone supported Geneen's offer of a \$1 million fund in support of any U.S. Government plan designed to form a coalition in the Chilean Congress to prevent Allende from becoming president, and, at Geneen's request, communicated this offer to Kissinger and Helms.

• On September 13, 1970, Berrellez offered support, financial or otherwise, in Santiago to the key advisor of one of the principal political figures in Chile.

• On September 23, 1970, Goodrich urged the USIA to circulate throughout Latin America the editorials of an anti-Allende Chilean newspaper.

• Throughout September and October, 1970, Merriam provided Broe with, and received in return, detailed political intelligence in connection with Chile.

• Geneen, Gerrity and McCone, considering a plan proposed to them by the CIA on September 29, 1970, to create economic chaos in Chile but rejected it because they thought it "unworkable".

• In January, 1971, before there had been expropriation of the company's property, Merriam encouraged other American companies to form an Ad-Hoc Committee on Chile for the express purpose of "pressuring Kissinger and the White House".

[©] Early in 1971 negotiations were undertaken with a view to convincing Allende that if he made a deal with ITT he could confiscate with impunity other U.S. companies in Chile. • At the end of September, 1971, when negotiations seemed to have failed, and the Chilean Government moved to take over management of Chiltelco, Merriain proposed to Peter Peterson, then Special Assistant to the President, an 18-point plan designed to insure that Allende "does not get through the next six months". Peterson never acted upon this plan.

The attitude of the company perhaps was best summed up by Gerrity when he asked, "What's wrong with taking care of No. 1?" The Subcommittee limits its comments on this statement to the observation that "No. 1" should not be allowed an undue role in determining U.S. foreign policy and the Subcommittee will conclude with specific legislative recommendations on this point."

In order to appreciate the full meaning of ITT's activities, one need only consider the reaction in this country in circumstances similar to those prevailing in Chile.

Senator Church put the issue when he posed the following hypothetical situation to Mr. McCone:

Suppose we had an election in this country and the candidate receiving the largest number of votes fails to get either a majority of the popular vote of the "electoral vote," with the result that the selection of the next President under -our Constitution falls to the House of Representatives. Suppose, further, that the candidate getting the largest number of, votes is one who has strongly favored wery restrictive policies against foreign investment, in the United States. Now we have a somewhat similar situation procedurally to that in Chile. The Congress of the United States is to make the choice of the next President. There is an interval between the popular election and the time that the Congress decides. Suppose British Petroleum, feeling that these restrictive policies will be immical to its own interests in the United States from being selected by the Congress; we are "prepared to help support or finance that plan up to seven figures."

In response to Senator Church's question as to whether that would be an appropriate political action for a British company to take under these circumstances, Mr. McCone responded: "I would personally be very distressed if the British Government or any other government attempted to influence the Congress of the United States in their responsibility to select a President." I would be even more distressed if I learned that any corporation offered to support political action on the part of a foreign government." (McCone testimony.)

In the Chilean case, the consequences of ITT's proposed intervention in the Chilean electoral process could have been particularly severe. The company executives in New York City were warned by Berrellez, their top political reporter in Santiago, that support of the so-called "Alessandri formula" would result in bloodshed and near -civil war, and that the application of external economic and political pressure would strengthen the hands of left wing extremists and convert Allende, whom Berrellez considered "a soft-lining Marxist", into an anti-American demagogue.

This is not to say that there was no reason for concern on the company's part over the fate of its investments in Chile. The company stake was large—investments of \$160 million, book value, of which approximately \$100 million was covered by OPIC investment guarantees. Allende was a dedicated Marxist, a member of the Socialist Party for 30 years. His electoral platform and public statements contemplated nationalization of Chiltelco. Whether compensation would be paid, or, if paid, whether such compensation would be adequate, was not clear from his utterances. So the company's concern was perfectly understandable.

So, too, was its desire to communicate that concern to the appropriate officials of the U.S. Government and to seek their judgment as to how the United States would view the possible eventuality of a seizure of company property without adequate compensation. It is also understandable that the company would wish to have the U.S. Government's assessment of the likelihood of an Allende victory, so that it could plan for such an eventuality in terms of negotiations, investment strategy, and corporate profitability targets.

But what is not to be condoned is that the highest officials of the ITT sought to engage the CIA in a plan covertly to manipulate the outcome of the Chilean presidential election. In so doing the company overstepped the line of acceptable corporate behavior. If ITT's actions in seeking to enlist the CIA for its purposes with respect to Chile were to be sanctioned as normal and acceptable, no country would welcome the presence of multinational corporations. Over every dispute or potential dispute between a company and a host government in connection with a corporation's investment interests, there would hang the spectre of foreign intervention. No sovereign nation would be willing to accept that possibility as the price of permitting foreign corporations to invest in its territory. The pressures which the company sought to bring to bear on the U.S. Government for CIA intervention are thus incompatible with the long-term existence of multinational corporations; they are also incompatible with the formulation of U.S. foreign policy in accordance with U.S. national, rather than private interests.

We hold no brief for President Allende's decision, in effect, to expropriate the property of U.S. owned corporations without adequate compensation. On the contrary, we condemn it. There should be no doubt in anyone's mind that this Subcommittee does not countenance the taking of the property of U.S. nationals without the payment of reasonable compensation. We consider that realistic negotiations, in good faith, over the amount of compensation to be paid for expropriated properties are essential to the maintenance of a healthy and constructive relationship between the United States and countries in which disputes arise over the property interests of U.S.-owned corporations.

The OPIC Guarantee

The Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC) had a commitment in Chile of close to \$500 million in investment guarantees against expropriation issued to American corporations with investments in that country. As previously noted, ITT's total investment in Chile amounted to a book value of \$160 million of which approximately \$100 million was covered by expropriation guarantees; thus, nearly two-thirds of ITT's total property interest in Chile was covered. Other large holders of such policies were the major U.S.-owned copper companies: Anaconda, Kennecott, and Cerro de Pasco.

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The existence of OPIC guarantees did not deter ITT from seeking to influence the U.S. Government to intervene in the Chilean elections

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so as to preserve its property interests. On the contrary, the existence of the OPIC guarantees was used by McCone in his conversations with Helms as an argument, among others, for U.S. intervention in Chile: if OPIC had to compensate the companies under the guarantees, so the argument went, the cost would ultimately be borne by the U.S. taxpayer, since OPIC lacked adequate reserves to meet these potential liabilities.

Similarly, Ambassador Korry testified that in his post-September 4 election assessment for the Department of State, in which he noted that an Allende Government would not be in the U.S. national interest, he, too, used as one reason the potential cost to the U.S. taxpayer resulting from the OPIC exposure. Thus, at least in the case of Chile, OPIC insurance became an argument for American intervention "to protect the taxpayer."

The Subcommittee believes that this effect of OPIC insurance was not foreseen at the time the program was enacted. This issue, among others, will be considered in the Subcommittee's hearings on OPIC.

U.S. Government Policy

Mr. Broe arranged to meet with Mr. Gerrity in the ITT Headquarters in New York City on September 29, 1970. At that meeting Mr. Broe proposed a plan to Mr. Gerrity designed to create or accelerate economic chaos in Chile for the purpose of putting pressure on a number of Christian Democratic Congressmen to vote against Allende. Mr. Broe met with Mr. Gerrity and made his proposal with the express approval of Helms, the Director of the CIA.

proposal as merely an exploration of the feasibility of a possible policy option in connection with Chile which, he maintained, did not in itself constituite a change in policy. This explanation of Mr. Broe's proposal is weak. Even if we were to accept Mr. Meyer's theory that Mr. Broe's proposal, was exploratory in nature, such an exploration, in and of itself, would indicate a major change in U.S. policy was under active consideration. Mr. Meyer testified that the pre-September 4 policy of the U.S. Government was to consider the popular election as an internal Chilean matter, which was to be allowed to run its course without interference from the United States. A decision actively to explore the feasibility of intervening in the Chilean electoral process so as to affect the outcome of the Chilean Congressional election of October 24, and deny Dr. Allende the presidency cannot be reconciled with this pre-September 4 policy, as stated to the Committee. On its face, Broe's proposal to Gerrity was a plan of action for specific concrete acts-stopping shipment of spare parts, cutting off credits, slowing down payments and was so understood by Gerrity.

The record of the hearings calls into question the Administration's -stated policy that it was willing to live with a "community of diversity in Latin America: we deal with governments as they are. 'Our relations depend not on their internal structures or social systems, but on acts which affect us in the inter American system." (U.S. FOREIGN POLICY FOR THE 1970'S; A REPORT TO THE CONGRESS by Richard Nixon, President of the United States, February 25, 1971, page 53.) A commitment to this policy would have been more convincingly evidenced by a willingness on the part of the State Department fully to disclose the content of the instructions which were communicated to the U.S. Embassy in Santiago.

The Forty Committee, Clandestine Operations of the CIA, and Multinational Corporations

The "Forty Committee" is the colloquial designation, taken from the serial number of the National Security Council document creating it, for the interdepartmental group within the executive branch which reviews clandestine operations of the CIA. The group is chaired by the Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, Dr. Kissinger, and its members include the Deputy Secretary of Defense, the Under Secretary of State, the Director of Central Intelligence, and usually the Attorney General.

There are questions of concern in connection with the operations of the "Forty Committee" which bear directly upon this case. With what detail are instructions of the "Forty Committee" communicated to the CIA ? Is the "Forty Committee" informed in advance of the modalities which the Agency contemplates using in carrying out an assignment? Specifically, in this case, was it informed by the CIA that in carrying out a mandate to explore means of influencing the political situation in Chile, use of U.S. companies was contemplated and specific proposals were being made to a particular corporation? Was the benefit to be potentially gained weighed against its overall negative consequences for U.S. business abroad by the "Forty Committee." Or was Helms merely given a general indication of what was desired, to be implemented as he saw fit?

It is clear from this case that there were significant adverse consequences for U.S. corporations which arose out of the decision to use ITT in the way it was used—willing as ITT may have been—and that it was not in the best interests of the U.S. business community for the CIA to attempt to use a U.S. corporation to influence the political situation in Chile.

There are further considerations which arise. Did the "Forty Committee" consider the consequences which would have ensued in the event that the plan to create or accelerate economic chaos in Chile had been successful? It had been the custom in Chile for the Congress to confirm as president the winner of a plurality in the popular election. There was ample evidence that an attempt to interfere with this custom would have lead to bloodshed, and possibly, civil war. (Appendix II.) There were also substantial doubts with respect to the capacity of the Chilean military to cope with this situation. (Appendix II.) Did the members of the "Forty Committee" adequately consider the possibility that, once having launched the U.S. down the road of covert intervention, other, more direct, measures might have become necessary to insure the desired result: stopping Allende from becoming President of Chile?

The Subcommittee thinks the time is ripe for an in-depth review by the appropriate congressional committees, of the decisionmaking process in the authorization and conduct of CIA clandestine operations.

McCone's first, major : covernment position was as President Truman's Under Secretary of the Air Force during the Korean war. He resigned as fund raiser for the California Institute of Technology in 1956 because 10:01, its scientists had backed Adlai Stevenson's proposal for a nuclear test ban-an act that McCone described as "designed to create fear in the minds of the uninformed that radioactive fallout from H-bomb tests endangers life."

Two years later, he was appointed AEC, chairman by President Eisenhower, and championed continued nuclear tests. He was also instrumental in awarding, operation of the first nuclear-powered merchant ship, the Savannah, to States Marine Co., which had a working partnership with McCone's wholly owned Joshua Hendy line. (he (also owned Panama Pacific Tankers).

During the controversy over his Senate confirmation, several senators became disturbed over his ownership of more than \$1 million of Standard Oil' Co. stock (Standard has wide interests in the Middle East through Arabian-American Oil Co.), and the fact that Standard Oil regularly charters tankers from McCone's Hendy line.

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



--- McCone Confirmed; What Next?

IT is not often that the Senate indulges in such healthy debate over a presidential appointment as it did in the case of John A. McCone, director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

When there is controversy over a President's choice for high Government post, it usually is political. Not in this case. All 12 of the votes against confirming the McCone appointment were cast by Democrats, and some of these were based on extraneous reasons.

Our impression of Mr. McCone's abilities are decidedly favorable. So the Senate's decision to approve him seems to us correct.

But we were even more impressed by the arguments made by the chief dissenter, Sen. Eugene McCarthy of Minnesota. He made an outstanding case for his principal point: That the CIA, under the present system, is under practically no surveillance at all by Congress.

As we understood him, the Senator was not necessarily opposed to the McCone appointment. He was opposed to any man holding this job without the Senate having a more complete knowledge of his detailed views on national policy—so long as Congress, or at least a responsible committee of Congress, does not have a constant review of the manner in which the CIA is operating,

"The record shows," Sen. McCarthy said, "that this agency has been a policymaking one and has had great influence on policy."

The CIA has been described as second only to the President in power and importance. Yet it operates in almost complete secrecy-not only from the public, but from Congress. It writes its own ticket. Its budget is secret-even the total. Its personnel is secret.

Now no one is proposing, certainly not Sen. McCarthy, that the CIA function in a goldfish bowl—as openly as other departments do—or should. The Senator proposed a joint committee of Congress to keep tabs on the agency, as similar committees do in other areas.

"After all," he said, "we have a representative democracy and in major decisions, whether domestic or international, some concurrence and some participation on the part of Congress have clearly been involved from the very beginning."

Our intelligence, gathered and evaluated by the CIA, is the basis for much of our foreign policy. Or should be. It is the basis for military decisions. Or should be. Congress has a heavy duty in these areas. Congress ought to know what's going on.

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
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

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

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The CIA's Role

Members of Congress are quite justified in closely questioning John <u>A. McCone</u> about his conception of his new job. As director of the Central Intelligence Agency Mr. McCone occupies a unique place in government. His agency is not subject to the normal checks of political, supervision, yet the CIA has wide discretion in highly tsensitive areas of policy.

A good part of the CIA's function is to perfect the national intelligence estimate so important to executive decision. But the CIA sometimes has been not only an instrument policy, but an original source of policy as well.

For this reason, it is reassuring that Mr. Mc. Cone, in response to questions from Sen. Eugene McCarthy, asserts that he does not regard his post as "a policy making, position." It is also a credit to Mr. McCone's good sense that he plans to decline to volunteer his views on national policy to public audiences.

To be sure, these reassurances from Mr. McCone do not resolve the question of fitting the CIA into the framework of a free society. The problem has been succinctly phrased by Harry Howe Ransom:

Whatever one's views, the existence of a secret bureaucracy poses special problems in the American system of government. Knowledge is power. Secret, knowledge is secret, power. A secret apparatus, claiming superior knowledge and operating outside the normal checkreins of American democracy, is a source of invisible government.

One approach to the dilemma is that urged by Senator McCarthy, who suggests the establishment of a joint congressional committee to exercise supervision over the CIA in somewhat the same manner as the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy operates. But the weakness of this approach is suggested by the present Joint Comwittee's history: the watchdogs can sometimes become influenced by the agency under scrutiny instead of an Influence on it. Perhaps a more effective technique is to rely on the Executive Branch to build in safeguards. Mr. Kennedy, following the Cuban debacle, took this path in relying on Gen. Maxwell Taylor to keen watch on the CIA.

The director of the CIA! Senator McCarthy has remarked, "should be more interested In finding evidence and passing objective judgment on it than attempting to polarize opinions or supporting difference." This seems a fair caveat; the hearings on Mr. McCone's appointment have served a useful function by acquainting the new CIA Director with misgivings about his job.



WHEN JOHN McCONE, Presi-dent Kennedy's choice as the new head of the more or less mysterfous Central Intelligence Agency, was before the Senate Armed Services Committee last week, Sen, Eu-gene McCarthy (D., Minn.) urged a specially intensive scrutiny of McCone's qualifications.

The Senator's reason, he said, was that Congress would have little or no supervision over McCone's operations

This is true, despite some claims that congressional appropriations committees get the low-down on, the CIA when the agency appears for funds to operate.

The Minnesota Senator-and many others in Congress favor a special foint committee of the House and Senate to oversee the CIA. This was recommended years back by the Hoover Commission, following a check by a task force freaded by Gen. Mark Clark. Since the operations of the CIA necessarily are highly secret, the joint committee was proposed as a means of assuring the taxpayers, who pay for it, that it was doing the best possible job.

IT WASN'T DOING such a job at the time of the Hoover Commission, the task force said. And since then there has been no check, independent, of the Administration; to find out how much it has improved, if any What the Hoover Commission said then (1955) is as true now, or more so:

The fate of the nation well may. rest on accurate and complete intelligence data which may serve as a trustworthy guide for top-level decisions on policy and action in a troubled world."

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

New to the Field

Should a spy be an old hand or a "natural" newcomer? That question came up, and Mr. Mc-Cone said (frankly he had no experience, in intelligence and investigation work, which, considering some of the recent mishaps of the agency he will head, might be all to the good.

Mr. McCone wrote a letter taking exception to the scientists views, which he said, were obviously designed to create fear in the minds of the uninformed that radioactive fallout from Hbomb tests endangers life.

Senator McCarthy said "it had been reported" that 'Mr. McCone, a trustee of the institute. had demanded that the 10 scientists be fired". He said he did not know whether it is true or, not, but that the committee should inquire about the matter.

Senator Symington's investigations had convinced him that "there has never been a better public: servant in Washington" than Mr. McCone.



This official and others close to President Kennedy privately acknowledge that the McCone appointment has not been greeted with cheers all along the line. But (they point out that, as one put it; "there will be so a many checks and balances" on his operation of the CIA that his opponents need not worry. There will be a scientific board, through which Mc Cone's critics will have access to the President; and there also is a newly strengthened, high-level inthrdepartmental committen the oversee: CIA's major ven three.

The McCone backers con sider him a man who "has a toughness" and who "can make up his own mind," though they say he is "apt to be stubborn." Among his enthusiastic endorsers, it is reported, is Robert A. Lovett, the former Defense and State Department official on whom the President from time to time calls for advice. Another who played a role in the appointment was Sen. Anderson, He said he was consulted by the President in advance of the appointment and "I did everything I could to get him (McCone) to take it." Anderson's view of Mc-Cone is that "he is persuaded strongly that the Russians are not up to any good, that they are deceiving us. He believes they were cheating on the test ban though I don't. McCone is not a neutral; he is against the Russians."

THIS thard-line approach by McCone is no secret. Immediately on taking over the AEC chairmanship, he did his best to persuade Secrei tary of State John Foster Dulles not to agree to a test ban moratorium, but without success. He later fell in line publicly with the test ban treaty talks, but it was evdent he never really had his heart in it.

Some of McCone's opponents, including some within the Washington intelligence community who obviously do not want to be 'identified, consider this attitude a fault in a CIA boss—Not that he is "against the Russians," but that he is so dogmatic about it that they think it could color his intelligence report to the President.

McCone himself 7 no doubt would sflatly deny any such thing.

About two and a half years ago, in an interview with an Associated. Press areporter, McCone recalled that he had been Air Force Undersecretary in the Truman Administration. "In my Air Force days," he said, "I was devoted to the concept of massive retations and all still are." This was the doctrine so strongly fought by Gen. Maxwell Taylor, now President Kennedy's military adviser, who is among those who are unenthusiastic about the Mc-Cone appointment.

McCone will go to work, first alongside Dulles and then succeeding him in mid-November, under a recess appointment from the President. He will come up for S en a te confirmation next January. But it is unlikely that the Armed Services Committee, which will conduct the hearing and some of whose members control the CIA's secret budget, willraise any real objections. Despite this, the McCone

appointment: can properly, be called the most controversial of any yet made by President Kennedy to post of major importance. No one doubts McCone's long record of accomplishment in both public service and private industry. But many Administration officials will be watching to see whether he is indeed the man to run the CIA.

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
