SUGGESTION: That the first page only of the Suplicate copy of payment request letters received from the field which are stamped "Approved" at the Seat of Government be returned in those matters involving criminal, racial and security informants.

CURRENT PRACTICE: Section 108-J2 of the Manual of Instructions states when requesting authority (Re Informants) to expend an additional sum aggregating \$200 on authority of the SAC, the field is to submit an original and two copies of letter containing requests. If authority is granted, a copy of the letter will be stamped "Approved" at the Bureau and returned to the field. SYNOPSIS:

Due to success of Toplev Program which was instituted (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the Security Informant Program was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance would be contacted to obtain additional informants in the Party. The primary purpose of the program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants and such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation who are willing to be developed as informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. In addition, these interviews crystallize the status of security subjects as to attitude and dangerousness and also cause considerable disruption and confusion within the CP itself. April and May, 1956, this program of approaching active communists was combined with our General Interview Program of contacting security subjects and the resultant current program now embodies contacts not only with active communists but other subversive individuals, the purpose of the interviews being to obtain potential informant material. Since the inception of the program in 1951, 5,042 active communists have been contacted and 20,037 other individuals have been contacted since the extension of the program in 1956. As a result, we have obtained 1800 sources, potential security informants, and informants. Through continued use of this program, Cour informant coverage will be extended and disruption a in the CP will continue and any expansion of Party or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

RECOMMENDATION:

Since program has proved to be worthwhile, it is recommended it be continued under our present policies and procedures and the continuance of the program again be considered in six months.

DETAILS:

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of this program and a recommendation that the program be continued.

1. Origin.

Due to the success of the Toplev Program instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the SIP was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance in the CP were contacted to obtain additional informants in the CP.

2. Purpose

The primary purpose of instant program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants. Such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation, if willing to be developed as CP informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. Another factor to be considered in conducting interviews under the SIP is the disruption and confusion such interviews have caused within the CP itself.

3. Scope

In 1952, Agents in 23 field offices were given specialized training (this included 14 offices trained for Toplev interviews). In 1954, the SIP was further extended through the medium of special training sessions whereby additional Agents were trained in all continental offices to make approaches to active communists. In April and May, 1956, our program of approaching active communists was combined with the general interview program of contacting security subjects of all types and the resultant program is known generally as the SIP.

4. Tie-in with Other Programs

This program is handled as a special project. It is noted, however, it is similar to the Toplev Program which deals with the interviews of top-level and hard-core communists whereas the SIP deals with interviews of persons of lesser importance.

5. Case Load

As of 12/1/59, a total of 5,042 active communists and 20,037 other individuals were contacted under the SIP. All continental offices, except 28, submit monthly progress letters showing interviews conducted. The 28 offices have conducted all logical interviews with persons suitable for informant development and are required to submit a six-month progress letter.

6. Magnitude

The provisions and instructions formulated in connection with the SIP govern the interviews of persons considered for security informant development in all continental offices.

7. Weaknesses

There are no known weaknesses in the SIP.

8. Administrative Control

All continental offices (with the exception of 28) must submit monthly progress letters. The 28 offices must submit progress letters every six months.

Through analysis of progress letters an accurate evaluation of the effectiveness of the SIP can be made. Close supervision and control is possible and any weaknesses are immediately corrected by issuance of necessary instructions to the office involved.

9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions pertaining to the SIP are contained in Section 87 D of the Manual of Instructions and have been reviewed and have been found to be adequate.

10. Over-all Value

The over-all value of the SIP is clearly emphasized by the fact that 1,800 sources, PSIs, and informants have been developed through this program. Through the continued use of the SIP the Bureau's security informant coverage will be extended, confusion in the CP will continue, and any expansion of or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

11. Contemplated Action

It is contemplated the development of security informants will be continued through the SIP. It will be closely supervised, followed, and afforded tight administrative control.

The Domestic Intelligence Division concurs with the recommendation and observations of SAC Carl E. Hennrich that the recommendation of SA not be adopted.

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of this program and the recommendation that the program be continued.

1. Origin

As an outgrowth of the first Judith Coplon trial during 1949 at Washington, D. C., steps were taken to re-evaluate procedures then in use for the justification and approval of technical installations, mail covers, and trash covers in both domestic intelligence and general investigative matters. At the same time a complete analysis was made of the confidential informant coverage in both security and criminal fields throughout the Bureau in order to delete worthless ones and to secure accurate figures covering active and productive informants. In accordance with the Director's request and in order to assure the prompt, monthly submission of such data to the Bureau, SAC Letter #12 dated 2-7-50 instructed each office to submit to the Bureau by 2-15-50 and by the fifteenth of each month thereafter, information regarding the total number of technical and microphone installations, the total number of mail and trash covers, and the number of confidential informants broken down into three categories covering national defense, general investigative, and atomic energy matters. (Separate classification for atomic energy informants not required after 3-20-51).

2. Purpose

This program was instituted to provide a monthly record of the total number of informant sources as described under item one above. After receipt of these letters from the field, a memorandum is prepared by the 25th of each month for the Director's information, showing the breakdown of informant and similar coverage by office and summarizing the over-all picture.

3. Scope

This is an active program in all field divisions of the Bureau. It entails the submission of a letter every month by each field office and the preparation of a memorandum each month by the Security Informants - Special Records Desk, Internal Security Section. After Bureau supervision of security and criminal informants was designated

separately during 1950 to the Domestic Intelligence Division and the Investigative Division respectively, instructions were issued the field in No Number SAC Letter dated 3-20-51 to henceforth include only the total number of security informants and potential security informants in monthly letters. However, the summary memorandum prepared by the Security Informants - Special Records Desk, Internal Security Section, has always included statistics concerning the number of criminal informants and potential criminal informants for the Director*s information. Since 3-51 these figures have been furnished separately each month by the Investigative Division for inclusion in afore-mentioned memorandum. Effective with the memorandum submitted in March, 1959, the number of racial informants and potential racial informants are also included in the summary memorandum.

4. Tie-in with other Programs

This program is the medium through which the Bureau is kept advised on a monthly basis of the over-all accomplishments by the field in the entire field of live informants and other types of coverage.

5. Case Load

Each field office maintains a control file for instructions and other communications relating to the program.

6. Magnitude

The program receives close personal supervision of the Supervisor-in-Charge and in order that it be maintained properly approximately 5% of the time of one clerical employee is utilized.

7. Past or Present Weaknesses

Analysis of this program has not disclosed any weaknesses existing at the present time.

8. Administrative Controls

The field is required under this program to submit their letters to reach the Bureau by the 15th of each month. This is watched closely and if a letter is not received promptly the particular office involved is requested by airtel to submit its figures immediately.

9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

The last change relative to this program was issued in No Number SAC Letter #56-A dated 1-16-56. Review of outstanding instructions disclosed they are adequate.

10. Over-all Value

The primary purpose of this program is to provide a current picture, on a month-to-month basis, of the total number of existing informant sources in both security and general investigative matters throughout the Bureau. It affords at a glance the progress each office is making in its coverage, and the summary of all statistics furnished by the field immediately gives the Bureau-wide picture for each component category. It also brings to the attention of the SAC each month the total coverage of various types in his office.

11. Contemplated Action

No action is currently contemplated to either expand or curtail this program.

The are the two cases which the "Washington Post" commented upon editorially on 12/14/59 supporting the Civil Rights Commission's hearing procedures in that it was necessary that the Commission protect their confidential informants from reprisals by segregationists.

Reference is madel to sac Letter 59-43 (C) wherein we requested suggestions and observations to strengthen the Bureau's Records Management Program.

By letter dated 10-2-59, the SAC, San Francisco, points out that often a copy of a lengthy informant report is designated for the file of a subject and actually only one pertinent point relating to the subject is included in the report, i.e., his attendance at a meeting, new address, new employment, etc. SAC suggests that the agents handling informants be permitted to utilize a special pre-printed memorandum form which will require only a short entry of the pertinent information. The SAC points out that with multilith equipment, it would be a simple matter to prepare pre-printed forms for each productive informant.

RECORDS BRANCH OBSERVATIONS:

This suggestion has merit from a records management standpoint in that it would eliminate the placing of a complete informant report in each subject matter file when only a small portion of the report may relate to the subject of the file. The observations of the Domestic Intelligence Division and the Training and Inspection Division should be secured prior to final consideration of this suggestion.

RECONNENDATION:

That the observations of the Domestic Intelligence Division and the Training and Inspection Division be secured prior to final consideration of this suggestion.

SAC, San Francisco, suggests that Agents handling informants be permitted to utilize special pre-printed memorandum form which will require only a short entry of pertinent information for channelization to the pertinent file. This would obviate the necessity of channelizing a complete copy of a lengthy informant report which would contain only one pertinent point relating to the subject included in the report; i.e., his attendance at a meeting, new address, new employment, et cetera.

Section 107 G of the Manual of Instructions, requires that all information furnished by informants must be promptly reviewed, recorded, indexed, evaluated, and channelized. Instructions also state that Form FD-306 may be used in lieu of a channelizing memorandum if desired. SAC, San Francisco, does not mention Form FD-306 and it is believed this Form can be used for the purpose indicated. FD-306 contains space to record the manner and date when a report is received, date of activity, date of report, and considerable blank space for remarks. There is no reason why under "Remarks" a short excerpt of the pertinent data relating to a subject may not be included and the form channelized to the appropriate file. There does not appear to be any need for a pre-printed memorandum form as suggested by the SAC and Form FD-306 appears adequate.

In view of the above Domestic Intelligence Division does not recommend that this suggestion be adopted.

EVALUATION OF PROGRAM

This memorandum summarizes review and evaluation of this program and contains recommendation that program be continued.

1. ORIGIN

Bulet 8-7-58 instructed each continental field division, except Bulet 8-7-58 instructed each continental field division, except San Francisco and Los Angeles, to submit detailed survey of Communist Party (CP) organization within its territory setting forth organizational structure, identities of all officers and functionaries from club to district level, identities of each individual CP member, and current informant coverage. Copies of this letter were not directed to San Francisco or Los Angeles inasmuch as they had submitted current information of this type. Replies from the various field offices were thoroughly analyzed and results reflected over-all informant coverage to be good. Certain divisions had areas where additional coverage was needed and instant program has been carried on to emphasize to the field the instant program has been carried on to emphasize to the field the necessity of expanding security informant coverage to cover these weak areas.

2. **PURPOSE**

The primary objective of this program has been to pinpoint areas in the field where informant coverage of the Party needs strengthening. It affords a means whereby the Seat of Government can direct concentrated, intensive efforts in those offices where this need for coverage is most urgent, and assures continuous attention to make certain the desired coverage is effected as rapidly as possible.

3. SCOPE

As delinquencies in this respect are overcome in an office, that office is dropped from this program. At present, the program is in effect in the nine following offices:

Each of the above offices has been separately instructed to take immediate steps to obtain additional coverage within those areas needing particular attention.

4. TIE-IN WITH OTHER PROGRAMS

This particular program ties in with our other programs whereby we are endeavoring to ascertain and identify membership of the CP and to determine the financial operations and apparatus of the CP, USA. An important adjunct of this intensified program, of course, is the development of additional informants who are in the position of producing valuable intelligence information on individual communists which is of great value to the Security Index Program.

5. CASE LOAD

1 - - -

Each field office maintains a control file for instructions and other communications relating to the program.

6. MAGNITUDE

Each individual office which is being followed under this program is closely supervised by the appropriate supervisor of the Security Informant - Special Records Desk.

7. PAST OR PRESENT WEAKNESSES

An analysis and re-evaluation of the program have not disclosed any weaknesses at the present time.

8. ADMINISTRATIVE CONTROL

Each of the nine offices presently being followed under this program is receiving close attention on a periodic basis by the appropriate supervisor. For example, the Seattle Office has excellent coverage except for one area, and under this program Seattle is required to furnish a quarterly letter showing what progress has been made and Memorandum for Mr. Belmont RE: SECURITY INFORMANT COVERAGE 66-2542-3

what steps are being contemplated to effect proper coverage of this area. Similarly, the New York Office is being followed regularly for the same purpose in connection with several specific sections of county organizations covered by that division. As each office reports its progress, the results are carefully analyzed and any necessary instructions and directions are transmitted to the field by the supervisor to make certain this program receives continuing attention.

9. ADEQUACY AND CURRENTNESS OF INSTRUCTIONS

Review of instructions which have been given to each of the field offices under the program discloses that they are adequate. and current.

10. OVER-ALL VALUE

The primary purpose of this program is to pinpoint for the field those areas of security informant coverage which need strengthening. In addition, the field has been instructed to take steps to develop additional coverage in those particular areas which will result in obtaining more informants in the security field.

11. CONTEMPLATED ACTION

No action is currently contemplated to expand this program.

RECOMMENDATION:

This program serves a definite purpose in guiding the field toward strengthening areas of weak informant coverage, and it is recommended that the program be continued, with further evaluation to be made again in six months.

### DETAILS

BACKGROUND: San Juan requested Bureau approval UACB to type the block stamp on a stencil when sufficient memoranda are needed to prepare one in connection with channelization of information received from security informants and sources. The date used in the block stamp would be the date the typing was completed. It was pointed out that this procedure would obviate the need for a clerical employee to date stamp the numerous channelization memoranda. It was felt by the Trai ning and Inspection Division that this procedure might be helpful to all offices and a letter dated 1/26/60, was sent to Los Angeles, New York, Chicago, Detroit and Atlanta for their views. The results are set out below.

#### RESULTS OF SURVEY:

ATLANTA: Feels that the procedure would be helpful to all offices.

CHICAGO: Suggestion has definite merit and is recommended favorably. Will obviate need for subsequent individual date stamping of numerous channelization memoranda. Has used a comparable procedure for some time. Memoranda are run off by multilithing rather than mimeographing. Chicago has ascertained that multilith company markets "duplimat stamp pad ink." For some time Chicago has used such stamp pad ink in a regular stamp pad and has used a regular date stamp machine in stamping the date stamp upon the multilith material before it is duplicated. The special ink thus date stamped is fully reproduced when the material is run off.

Chicago also advised that the date when typing was completed would be satisfactory as the date of the block stamp. Chicago requested consideration be given to advising the field of the "duplimat stamp pad ink" for use in connection with multilithing of material.

DETROIT: Has been using this procedure for some time; however, the stenographer has been leaving the day of the month off of the mat and the clerical employee operating the multilith machine has been inserting the date just prior to running the mat off. There would be no objections to having the block stamp show the date typing was completed. Detroit has found this procedure to be most satisfactory in saving a considerable amount of

clerical time in handling channelization memoranda and believes it is a technique which could be used throughout the field.

LOS ANGELES: Has been using the procedure for many years and has found its most helpful and time saving. The date the typing was completed as used in the block stamp has proved satisfactory to the Los Angeles Division.

NEW YORK: New York has never used this procedure. It has experienced difficulty when other offices have used this procedure and sent a copy of the memorandum prepared with the block stamp thereon to the New York office. New York employees have to cross out block stamp and insert another one; sometimes there is no room for the New York block stamp. Another problem is that some offices will have the supervisor intial the stencil in the block stamp so that it makes it ready for filing; therefore, when it arrives in New York it creates confusion. New York recommends that favorable consideration be given to procedure with following restrictions:

- 1. That it not be permitted on an intraoffice memorandum sent interoffice.
- 2. That the supervisor not be permitted to initial the stencil in the block stamp as the Agent to whom the case is assigned is entitled to see the correspondence.
- 3. That a block stamp be obtained which would cut the stencil and the block stamp be placed on the stencil by the mimeographer.

New York sees no objections to using date typing was completed for the block stamp date.

OBSERVATIONS AND CONCLUSION: From the comments of the above offices, it is felt that the procedure is a time saying one and that it would be of assistance to all offices. It is felt that the block stamp should not appear on copies being sent to other field offices. It is recommended that an SAC letter be sent to the field advising all offices of this procedure.

No action is being taken concerning New York's suggestion that the supervisor not be permitted to initial the stencil in the block stamp as the Agent to whom the case is assigned is entitled to see the correspondence. It is felt that this matter of initialing the stencil should be governed by the particular circumstances involved and should be handled by the field offices

The Chicago Office has for some time utilized a comparable procedure in connection with the date stamping of numerous channelizing memoranda which are run off by multilithing rather than mimeographing.

With regard to multilith material, Chicago Office ascertained that multilith company markets "duplimat stamp pad ink." For some time Chicago has used such stamp pad ink in a regular stamp pad and has used a regular date stamp machine in stamping the date stamp upon the multilith material before it is duplicated. The special ink thus date stamped on the material is fully reproduced when the material is run off.

This has proven a definite time saver in eliminating the necessity of individually block stamping the voluminous material after it has been reproduced. It is realized that this procedure could not be used on mimeographed reproduction. However, the typing of date stamp data on the stencil as suggested would serve a similar purpose and save appreciable clerical time.

The Detroit Office has for some time utilized the technique of typing the blockstamp on multilith mats when channelization memoranda were being prepared. The stenographer has been leaving the day of the month off of the mat and the clerical employee operating, the multilith machine has been inserting the date just prior to running the mat off.

A review of this matter reflects that there is currently no substantial delay between the time that the mat is originally typed and run off. Therefore, there would be no objections if it was decided that the stenographer would be allowed to completely type the blockstamp at the time she completed her typing assignment.

The Detroit Office has found this to be most satisfactory in saving a considerable amount of clerical time in handling channelization memoranda. It is our observation that this technique could be utilized throughout the field. I have also been advised that there is stamp pad ink available which will reproduce when applied to a multilith mat. Therefore, the possibility exist that multilith mats could be blockstamped at the time they were approved and thus save time for the stenographer.

ReBulet 1/26/60 concerning San Juan Office suggestion re typing the date stamp on a stencil when sufficient memoranda are needed to prepare one in connection with channelization of information received from security informants and sources.

I have caused a review of this suggestion and obtained the opinions of the various clerical and supervisory personnel in this office. It is felt that the basic idea of the block stamp would be helpful if certain restrictions were placed on its usage and if it were possible to obtain a block stamp which would make an appropriate cut on the stencil not requiring that it be typed.

Although the procedure suggested by the San Juan Office has never been used by the New York Office, several offices have used that procedure for sometime, thus permitting this office to intelligently comment on its merit. The NYO clerical employees have found the system confusing, when utilized by other offices in connection with the transmittal to the NYO of Ropies of channelizing memoranda which are intra-office. In other words, an agent in the XYZ office will prepare a memorandum to his own SAC and designate a copy to the New York Office. He has the stencil block stamped. Upon arrival in the New York Office, there is then a block stamp of another office contained thereon requiring the clerical employees to cross out that block stamp and insert another one.

Another problem is that some offices will have the supervisor initial the stencil in the block stamp so that it makes it ready for filing. Again upon arrival in the New York Office it creates additional confusion in that from all appearances, without a further check, it is ready for filing. Another objection of the New York Office has been that other offices have utilized all remaining space for their block stamp leaving no space for the New York block stamp. The Bureau will note in the sample copy transmitted to the New York Office that the only remaining space for the New York block stamp is in the center or upper part of the channelizing memorandum. To place a block stamp on the center or upper portion of the memorandum is in our opinion undesirable. We have had instances where the only place on the memorandum.

In conclusion, the NYO recommends that favorable consideration be given to the suggestion of the San Juan Office if the Bureau places certain restrictions, namely:

- 1. That it not be permitted on an intra-office memorandum sent inter-office.
- 2. That the supervisor not be permitted to initial the stencil in the block stamp as the agent to whom the case is assigned is entitled to see the correspondence.

Supervisor L. Linton has suggested through the Tele. Room, Espionage Section Streamlining Committee that the substantive character be placed on all security informant mail in order that the substantive desk will receive this type mail prior to same being forwarded to the security informant supervisors for their handling.

#### EXISTING PROCEDURE:

Symbol number and other informant mail does not include a substantive character to protect the security of the informants. As a practical matter, some agents prepare informant mail including a persubstantive character. As a result, there is a lack of uniformity and some mail is routed to the substantive desk prior to the security informant desk, while, at the same time, much highly significant substantive information, furnished under informant captions is routed to the security informant desk, prior to the substantive desk, with the result that the substantive desk experiences some delay and the informant desk must route to the substantive supervisor a volume of mail which should more properly be automatically routed to the substantive desk. It is realized that the security of our informants is of great importance. It is not felt, however, that the omission of substantive or country character from this type of mail provides a degree of security commensurate with delay and lack of uniformity of handling to rule out possible change.

The Files and Communications Division presently routes mail according to the first character shown under the subject. Symbol number mail is routed to the Internal Security Section. It is believed that the addition of the substantive character or country will enable clerical employees of the Files and Communications Division to route all security informant mail to the substantive desk and then to the Internal Security Section. #### COMMENTS OF INTERNAL SECURITY SECTION:

There is no objection to adding a substantive character on informant mail to assist in routing such mail to the appropriate substantive desk where there is a particular foreign country involved. Since the Espionage and Nationalities Intelligence Sections are primarily responsible for approving and handling informants being utilized in those Sections, this may facilitate their operations. This could be accomplished by adding the appropriate country involved to the caption. For example, John Doe, PSI-Nicaragua, and NY 000-S, Cuba. Informants who are being approved and handled by the Internal Security Section and which relate to domestic communist activity and other domestic security matters such as the CPUSA, POC, NOI, NPPR, will not have any particular substantive character and will continue to be designated in the following manner: Jane Doe, PSI; NY 00-S. The latter type of communication is of primary concern to the Security Informant Desk in the Internal Security Section and is handled by that Desk.

Informant mail which is the primary concern of Sections other than the Internal Security Section does contain information on occasion which must be noted by the Security Informant Desk. 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

(K) INFORMANTS AND SOURCES, CHANNELIZATION OF INFORMATION RECEIVED FROM -- When a stencil is prepared to channelize information received from informants and sources to various files in the field affice, the block stamp may be typed on the stencil. In such instances, the date to be used in the block stamp is the date the typing was completed.

For the information of those offices having multilith equipment, the Chicago Office has advised that the multilith company markets "duplimat stamp pad ink." Chicago has used such stamp pad ink in a regular stamp pad and has used a regular block-stamp machine in stamping the block stamp upon the multilith material before it is duplicated. The special ink thus block stamped on the material is fully reproduced when the material is run off. This special ink cannot be used for mimeographed reproduction.

If used, the above procedure should be confined to copies for use within your own office.

Suggestions similar to the current one date back to September, 1952. Latest consideration given at the Internal Security - Espionage Conference which was held on June 9 - 10/1960. The Conference recommended and it was approved for the Chicago and San Francisco Offices to destroy copies of channelizing memoranda on a 6-month basis. If it is determined to be feasible to destroy copies of such memoranda on a field-wide basis, appropriate instructions will be issued by the Domestic Intelligence Division. In view of this, it is not possible to advise SA Manning whether his suggestion is being adopted.

In either case a copy of the channelizing memorandum is placed in the case file of those subjects who were present at a meeting or concerning whom other pertinent information 1s reported. Security informant From time to time reports are/prepared on a particular subject and Current practice or tule (include manual citation as well as facts) The current Bureau practice is to retain in the file of the subject the copies of the channelizing memoranda containing information concerning the subject which has been furnished by an informant. Advantages of suggestion and annual savings (include basis for estimate).
It is felt that the adoption of this suggestion throughout the Bureau will result in substantial saving in space required for filing purposes. As an example, it is noted that during 1959 one informant of the New Haven Office submitted thirty-one reports which were disseminated to various files of this office. A total of approximately 600 serials were routed to different files as a result of information furnished by this informant. If the above suggestion is adopted, in this one instance, the 600 serials could be destroyed resulting in the saving of space of approximately five to six average volumes. when this is done the Agent preparing the report reviews the case file on the subject. The file frequently contains numerous serials in the form of channelizing memoranda. Pertinent information is extracted and summarized for inclusion in the report. In accordance with Bureau practice the cover page of the report will reflect the location of the original document which contains the information which has now been included in the report. At this point the information from the informant is located in three places in our files:

- (1) Sub-file of the informant
- (2) The copy of the channelizing memorandum routed to the case file of the subject
- (3) The report prepared concerning the subject.

It is noted that the document containing the original information from the informant is never destroyed and is, therefore, always available for reference. The location of the information from an informant, which is included in a report, is set forth in the cover page of the report as a particular serial in the sub-file of the informant. The continued retention of the serials in the case file of the subject which contain the same information is, therefore, unnecessary.

It is recommended that in the future when a report is prepared that the consolidation memorandum include, in addition to other pertinent information, an instruction that copies of serials in the file, which are channelizing memoranda containing information which has been set forth in the report, be destroyed.

## DISADVANTAGES OF SUGGESTION CONTINUED

present Bureau practice of inserting a charge out slip to indicate the destruction of these particular serials would continue to be followed. It is pointed out, however, that considerable saving in space will still be effected since most channelizing memoranda consist of several pages and frequently a number of them are filed in numerical sequence, which will permit the recording of the destruction of several serials on one charge out slip.

amount of filing space saved would be of sufficient volume to warrant the clerical time involved in pulling the channelizing memoranda from the files and inserting the charge-outs. (Note that procedure would not entail extra pulling of file - as file would be on Chief Clerk's desk for serializing and filing the investigative report and correlation memorandum.) Considering the rather large volume of channelizing memoranda which we have in this office, and assuming that other offices with equal or greater number of security cases have a proportionate large volume of channelizing memoranda, it is believed that the suggested procedure would save a sufficient volume of filing space to warrant the expenditure of the clerical time involved. The suggestion seems to have merit and it is recommended that it be given careful consideration.

SECURITY INFORMANTS PROGRAM SUBJECT:

As the result of our conference on security informants in April and May of 1956, SAC Letter 56-34- dated 6-18-56 set forth changes in policy and procedures which, among other things, permits the SAC in certain instances to approve interviews with individuals to determine whether such persons have any informant potential. This program has saved considerable correspondence between the field and the Bureau and has accelerated our informant program. If such individual is cooperative, Bureau authority must then be obtained to develop the subject as an informant. The authority in the SAC does not apply, however, to delicate situations or to those individuals employed in the newspaper field, education field and the like.

The following is a tabulation summarizing the results of this program for month of May, the previous month of April, and the grant total from the inception of this program.

optional-form no, 114. united states govi DATE: June 27, 1960 Mr. Parsons JUN'E SECURITY SUBJECT: CONFIDENTIAL INFORMANT AND SIMILAR TYPES OF COVERAGE This is a monthly memorandum setting forth the total of the Bureau's confidential informants and trash and mail covers as set forth in the attached pages. *Technical surveillances are only utilized when necessary and are discontinued when they are no longer productive. Their number varies and as of this date we are operating 79 technical surveillances and two are in the process of being installed making a total of 81. All but one are being used on security investigations. Forty-seven microphone surveillances are presently installed and all but seven are concerned with security investigations. During May, 1960, 20 security informants were added and 21 were deleted making a total of 1,046 security informants. Potential security informants during the same period decreased from 486 to 472. During May, 1960, 41 criminal informants were added while 62 criminal informants were deleted. This changes the number of approved criminal informants from 2,664 to 2,643. Also, during May, 1960, the number of potential criminal informants changed from 7,278 to 7,066. During May, 1960, three racial informants were added while four were deleted. This produced a net figure of 77 approved racial informants. Also, during the month, six new potential racial informants were added while ten were deleted leaving a total of 45. As of June 1, 1960, the field was operating 69 trash covers. As of June 27, 1960, the Bureau had in operation a total of 86 mail covers. Of this number two are maintained in criminal fugitive cases. CUBAN MATTERS SOURCES AND INFORMANTS

During recent months a number of individuals, including both Cuban and U. S. nationals, have voluntarily contacted Bureau to furnish information regarding the Cuban situation and, in some instances, to volunteer their services on a continuing basis as sources or informants. A number of such M W individuals have indicated plans to visit Cuba and have offered to secure information on behalf of the Bureau during such travel. Others have reported connections with Cuban officials or pro-Castro followers in the U. S. and have expressed a willingness to obtain data of interest to the FBI through such N contacts.

We have secured considerable worthwhile information as a result of such voluntary contacts and we have, in some'? cases, been able to develop the person involved into a source or informant of continuing value. There is no question but that the majority of such individuals are genuinely concerned about conditions in Cuba and are sincere in their desire to assist the FBI. Nevertheless, such contacts should be handled with the utmost circumspection and discretion. The Castro regime is known to be interested in penetrating the FBI, through fake defections or otherwise. Moreover, as the record clearly shows, the Cuban Government has frequently sought to provoke incidents to support its anti-U. S. campaign and would obviously welcome the opportunity to embarrass the FBI or other U.S. investigative agencies. Under these circumstances it can be expected that Cuban intelligence services will seek to put individuals in touch with the Bureau who are actually working for the Castro regime.

The field should be continually on the alert for such efforts to "plant" informants or sources with the FBI and should exercise caution in dealing with persons who volunteer actively to assist the Bureau until their reliability has been clearly established.

The following observations are set forth as guides in the handling of contacts of this type and should be closely adhered to in the absence of compelling reasons which would justify other actions:

- (1) During initial contact, any information volunteered should be accepted and, if logical, the individual should be asked to expand on the data furnished. The FBI's investigative jurisdiction should be generally indicated; however, the interviewing agents should be careful not to disclose any specific areas of FBI interest and interviewing agents should avoid giving the impression that we have an investigative interest in activities in Suba or even in Suban activities within the U.S. other than activities indicating possible violations of laws within our jurisdiction.
- (2) During initial contact, particular efforts should be made to explore the individual's motives and to determine the underlying basis for his offer of assistance. This should normally be done in a tactful manner and it is not desired that the interviewing agents antagonize the person involved by open suspicion of his motives. At the same time, however, the individual's expressed motive for contacting the FBI should not be simply accepted at face value, and questioning should be conducted in such a manner as to indicate possible discrepancies in the avowed motive or reveal possible hidden reasons.
- (3) No commitments should be made to the individual in question nor should any steps be taken during initial interview to direct or control his activities. Although appreciation should be expressed for the information furnished and no statements made which would discourage the individual from furnishing additional data, no active encouragement should be given to the individual to undertake any assignment on behalf of the Bureau. This is particularly true in a case of those individuals who are planning to visit Cuba. It should be clearly indicated to such individuals that Bureau has no desire to have the source engage in any activities while in Cuba on our behalf.
- (4) Immediately following the initial interview, a thorough inquiry should be undertaken concerning the source's background along the lines of a potential security informant investigation. During this investigation, stress should be placed

on verifying the source's claimed motives and any contacts the source might have with Cuban officials or pro-Castro adherents should be explored in detail.

- (5) The Bureau should be advised promptly following the initial interview of such persons and such notification should include the field's appraisal of the individual's motives, his potential for future development and what investigative action is planned concerning the source's background and activities.
- (6) Following a thorough investigation, the field should submit results of its inquiries to the Bureau together with its recommendations for possible future utilization of the individual involved as a source in Cuban matters.

These instructions are in no way intended to discourage the field from taking advantage of voluntary contacts to secure information of interest concerning the Cuban situation and, at the same time, considering the potential future usefulness of such contacts as sources or informants. This letter is intended simply as a reminder of the risks involved in an uncritical acceptance of information volunteered by individuals with whose backgrounds we are not familiar and as a caution that the development of such sources should be approached not only with enthusiasm but also with a proper degree of skepticism.

EVALUATION OF PROGRAM

Due to success of Toplev Program which was instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the Security Informant Program was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance would be contacted to obtain additional informants in the Party. The primary purpose of the program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants and such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation who are willing to be developed as informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. In addition, these interviews crystallize the status of security subjects as to attitude and dangerousness and also cause considerable disruption and confusion within the CP itself. April and May, 1956, this program of approaching active communists was combined with our General Interview Program of contacting security subjects and the resultant current program now embodies contacts not only with active communists but other subversive individuals, the purpose of the interviews being to obtain potential informant material. the inception of the program in 1951, 5,414 active communists have been contacted and 21,137 other individuals have been contacted since the extension of the program in 1956. As a result, we have obtained 1,920 sources, potential security informants, and informants. Through continued use of this program, our informant coverage will be extended and disruption in the CP will continue and any expansion of Party or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Since program has proved to be worthwhile, it is recommended it be continued under our present policies and procedures and the continuance of the program again be considered in six months.

#### DETAILS:

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of this program and a recommendation that the program be continued.

#### 1. Origin

Due to the success of the Toplev Program instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the SIP was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance in the CP were contacted to obtain additional informants in the CP.

#### 2. Purpose

The primary purpose of instant program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants. Such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation, if willing to be developed as CP informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. Another factor to be considered in conducting interviews under the SIP is the disruption and confusion such interviews have caused within the CP itself.

## 3. Scope

In 1952, Agents in 23 field offices were given specialized training (this included 14 offices trained for Toplev interviews). In 1954, the SIP was further extended through the medium of special training sessions whereby additional Agents were trained in all continental offices to make approaches to active communists. In April and May, 1956, our program of approaching active communists was combined with the general interview program of contacting security subjects of all types and the resultant program is known generally as the SIP.

## 4. Tie-in with Other Programs

This program is handled as a special project. It is noted, however, it is similar to the Toplev Program which deals with the interviews of top-level and hard-core communists whereas the SIP deals with interviews of persons of lesser importance.

#### 5. Case Load

As of 7-12-60, a total of 5,414 active communists and 21,137 other individuals were contacted under the SIP. All continental offices, except 29, submit monthly progress letters showing interviews conducted. The 29 offices have conducted all logical interviews with persons suitable for informant development and are required to submit a six-month progress letter.

## 6. Magnitude

The provisions and instructions formulated in connection with the SIP govern the interviews of persons considered for security informant development in all continental offices.

#### 7. Weaknesses

There are no known weaknesses in the SIP.

#### 8. Administrative Control

All continental offices (with the exception of 29) must submit monthly progress letters. The 29 offices must submit progress letters every six months.

Through analysis of progress letters an accurate evaluation of the effectiveness of the SIP can be made. Close supervision and control is possible and any weaknesses are immediately corrected by issuance of necessary instructions to the office involved.

## 9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions pertaining to the SIP are contained in Section 87 D of the Manual of Instructions and have been reviewed and have been found to be adequate.

#### 10. Over-all Value

The over-all value of the SIP is clearly emphasized by the fact that 1,920 sources, PSIs, and informants have been developed through this program. Through the continued use of the SIP the Bureau's security informant coverage will be extended, confusion in the CP will continue, and any expansion of or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

### 11. Contemplated Action.

It is contemplated the development of security informants will be continued through the SIP. It will be closely supervised, followed, and afforded tight administrative control.

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of this program and the recommendation that the program be continued.

#### 1. Origin

As an outgrowth of the first Judith Coplon trial during 1949 at Washington, D. C., steps were taken to re-evaluate procedures then in use for the justification and approval of technical installations, mail covers, and trash covers in both domestic intelligence and general investigative matters. At the same time a complete analysis was made of the confidential informant coverage in both security and criminal fields throughout the Bureau in order to delete worthless ones and to secure accurate figures covering active and productive informants. In accordance with the Director's request and in order to assure the prompt, monthly submission of such data to the Bureau, SAC Letter #12 dated 2-7-50 instructed each office to submit to the Bureau by 2-15-50 and by the fifteenth of each month thereafter, information regarding the total number of technical and microphone installations, the total number of mail and trash covers, and the number of confidential informants broken down into three categories covering national defense, general investigative, and atomic energy matters. (Separate classification for atomic energy informants not required after 3-20-51).

## 2. Purpose

This program was instituted to provide a monthly record of the total number of informant sources as described under item one above. After receipt of these letters from the field, a memorandum is prepared by the 25th of each month for the Director's information, showing the breakdown of informant and similar coverage by office and summarizing the over-all picture.

## 3. Scope

This is an active program in all field divisions of the Bureau. It entails the submission of a letter every month by each field office and the preparation of a memorandum each month by the

Security Informants - Special Records Desk, Internal Security Section. After Bureau supervision of security and criminal informants was designated separately during 1950 to the Domestic Intelligence Division and the Investigative Division respectively, instructions were issued the field in No Number SAC Letter dated 3-20-51 to henceforth include only the total number of security informants and potential security informants in monthly letters. ## 6. Magnitude

The program receives close personal supervision of the Supervisor-in-Charge and in order that it be maintained properly approximately 5% of the time of one clerical employee is utilized.

## 7. Past or Present Weaknesses

Analysis of this program has not disclosed any weaknesses existing at the present time.

It also brings to the attention of the SAC each month the total coverage of various types in his office. 11. #### 5. CASE LOAD

Each field office maintains a control file for instructions and other communications relating to the program.

### 6. MAGNITUDE

LABOR-MANAGELENT REPORTING AND DISCLOSURE ACT OF 1959 -SECURITY AATER

The Labor-Management Reporting and Disclosure Act of 1959 prohibits persons who have been members of the Communist Party (CP) within five years from holding office or employment with a labor organization or a group or association of employers dealing with any lebor organization, except in a clerical or custodial capacity, and from acting as labor relations consultants. It also prohibits any labor organization or officer thereof from knowingly permitting any such person to assume or hold any such position. Investigations have been instituted by this Bureau on all individuals known to be in apparent violation of this provision of this law.

In connection with our investigation of communist infiltration of labor unions, we are utilizing confidential informants who are members of the CP and hold positions covered by the law. These informants not only provide information on CP activity but also communist infiltration in unions. The Department is requested to advise what, if any, action by the FBI is necessary in view of the informants! Cr membership and their positions in unions coming within the purview of the Labor-Hansgement Reporting and Disclosure Act of 1959.

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

Training and Inspection Division has requested Domestic Intelligence Division comments on above suggestion by Tampa Office, that Forms FD 238 and 209 be revised.

After considering this suggestion the Committee feels that the changes are not warranted.

The suggestion is that Form FD 238 (Security Informants Review Sheet), a copy of which is enclosed, be revised to include blocks for Criminal Informant (Racial) and Potential Criminal Informant (Racial), pointing out that the form is used in connection with such informants.

It is also suggested that such blocks be added for Security Sources of Information and Security Confidential Sources. With regard to Form FD 209, the suggestion is that similar blocks be placed on that Form. (Copy of FD 209 is also enclosed) In making the suggestion, it is pointed out that when these forms are used for racial informants, information must be written in on the form and that revision of the forms would obviate this and make the forms more uniform.

FD 238 was designed to provide ready access to a number of items of information concerning active security informants, potential informants and confidential sources. It is kept as the top document in the individual field office file. FD 209 is used in the field as an alternative to a memorandum, recording contacts with 66-25-42-3 informants or potential informants.

NOT RECORDED In coming to the conclusion about streessuggestion being not worthy of adoption, the Committee has considered that there are only approximately 120 informants and potential informants in the racial field confined to 15 offices, principally in the South, as against a total of approximately 10,000 security and criminal informants and potential informants throughout the field. The st number of cases in which the racial designation would be helpful does not appear to warrant changing the forms to accommodate only those relatively few cases. For example, as of August 1, 1960, the Tampa Office had only 4 racial informants and 5 potential informants The Committee feels that, for the relatively in the racial field. small number of cases involved, it will be much more Eprol to write (In) or type in, the necessary racial designation when either these forms is to be used.

FD-238 is used by field as top serial in informant file to record various pertinent items of information. FD-209 is used by field to record contacts with informants.

While these forms are used for all types of informants and now contain blocks for criminal and security informants and potential informants, it is noted that informants and potential informants in the racial field constitute less than 2% of the total informants and potential informants utilized by the Bureau in all fields. It is further noted that less than 20 field offices have racial informants and/or potential informants. Since the proposed changes would thus benefit only a few offices and would not be widely used in the field it is recommended that they not be adopted.

In accordance with instructions set forth in reBulet, 9/19/58, this letter is furnished to advise of Pittsburgh's efforts concerning the development of potential security informants (PSIs) within the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP).

It is noted that the Pittsburgh Office continues to afford intensified coverage of the activities of HERBERT KRANSDORF, Organizer, CPWP, and ALEX STEINBERG, CPWP member, through technical and physical surveillances. Sources have furnished information indicating that KRANSDORF during the past few months has contacted several individuals (former members of CPWP and CP sympathizers) in an attempt to reactivate the CP in this area but, by his own admission, he has received a cool reception from several of these individuals. In August, KRANSDORF, while in contact with GUS HALL, General Secretary, CP, USA, indicated that he had two groups, one negro and one white, with three members each operating in the Pittsburgh area. The activities of KRANSDORF and STEINBERG are being followed closely in order to identify their contacts and evaluate them for possible development as PSIs.

As previously reported, four cases have been opened on contacts noted during surveillances of KRANSDORF. Two of these cases concern security subjects who have moved into Pittsburgh from other divisions and their cases are being investigated leading toward possible interviews with them. The other two cases in this category have been developed to the point where they are presently being utilized as neighborhood sources concerning KRANSDORF.

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SOBJECT/NEW ORLEANS CONFERENCE ON DEVELOPMENT AND HANDLING OF SECURITY AND RACIAL INFORMANTS

At the recent informant conference held in New Orleans, representatives of the field recommended that the Bureau's current policy relating to racial informants be changed to eliminate the "probationary period" in the development of such informants. (After extensive background investigation is conducted Bureau authority is obtained to contact an individual under consideration for development as a racial informant during a probationary period to receive information volunteered and to critically evaluate his stability and reliability. During this period no affirmative steps may be taken to direct his activities, such authority being withheld until the SAC certifies as to the individual's stability and reliability.)

The "probationary period" was established in November, 1959, as an added safeguard to prevent emotionally unstable individuals from becoming informants in the highly sensitive and explosive racial field. The need for such an added safeguard was pointed up by the case of former Potential Security Informant (PSI) testified in Domestic Relations Court in a child custody case that he had served as an Agent for the FBI. actually served as a PSI from At that time the Director noted that in view of background it appeared our procedures

in developing such informants required re-evaluation. Establishment of the "probationary period" as an added safeguard in developing such informants was approved by the Director and the Executive Conference.

The recommendation of representatives of the field that the probationary period be eliminated has been fully considered and there appears to be no reason to change our present policy.

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(B) SECURITY INFORMANTS -- A series of five two-day conferences in the field on the developing and handling of security informants was recently completed. These conferences were held in the Chicago, Los Angeles, New Orleans, Philadelphia and New York Offices, with 107 selected Special Agents from all offices except Anchorage, Honolulu and San Juan participating. The results of these conferences are set forth herein containing changes in procedure effective immediately. These changes were recommended by the conferences.

# USE OF CURRENT INFORMANT TO OBTAIN ADDITIONAL HIGH-LEVEL COVERAGE IN THE COMMUNIST PARTY (CP) USA

In order to insure continuation of high-level informant coverage in the CPUSA, all offices having informants on a district level or higher should consider utilizing one or more of such informants to bring along new informants in the Party. This will be accomplished through the cooperation of the high-level informant who will be told that he will be contacted by another informant. The new informant will not know the individual he is contacting is an FBI informant. The high-level informant will then introduce the new informant to Party functionaries, et cetera, eventually working him into Through this plan the CP leadership will top Party activity. grow to trust the new informant and in a relatively short time we should be able to continue our high-level coverage in the event anything should happen to our current top. informant. Until that time we will also have the services of the new informant who will be assisting the high-level informant in the Party. This plan has been informally discussed with several top-level informants who have stated it can be accomplished without jeopardizing their positions. Bureau authority should be obtained before discussing this plan with any informant and details of any proposed operation should be set forth in a letter to the Bureau with appropriate recommendations.

## LONG-RANGE PROGRAM TO DEVELOP HIGH-LEVEL INFORMANT COVERAGE

We have live informant coverage on high levels in the CPUSA at the present time, but we should plan now for the future when our present informants through unforeseen circumstances may no longer be able to furnish the assistance which they are now rendering. Under our current programs we are developing as informants individuals who are active or inactive

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CP members or other subversive individuals. Since we are planning for the future, we should consider selecting as potential informants individuals who possess the qualifications for future leadership and pick such prospects not so much from the ranks of the CP or related subversive activity, but from the college and post-graduate levels. Since the majority of communist activity is concentrated in large metropolitan areas such as New York City, that office should begin a careful selection of college students or recent graduates of colleges in New York having active student organizations made up of individuals of radical tendencies. Selection of prospects should be based on above-average intelligence and qualities of leadership which would permit them to advance to the top of the CPUSA. A very limited number of potentials will be involved in this project and each cooperative individual will be thoroughly checked. Payments will be made commensurate with the individual's potential and compensation will be increased as he progresses in the Party. On a long-range basis such an individual will achieve a top position in the The New York Office is instructed to open a control file for this project and begin selecting individuals who should be considered under this plan. Each prospect should be investigated in accordance with Section 107 of the Manual of Instructions, and the Bureau will consider in each case whether approval should be given to attempt development under this long-range plan.

#### YOUTH PROGRAM OF THE CPUSA-

At the 17th National Convention of the CPUSA held in New York City December 12-14, 1959, the CPUSA set up a program which was designed to produce a communist youth organization in the United States. The Party implemented this program by naming Daniel Mortimer Rubin as National Secretary for Youth, and Rubin has been touring a large part of the United States in order to complete the organization of a communist youth group. This organization will encompass all classes of young people, including college students. The Party hopes that in addition to other groups it will eventually have communist youth groups on college campuses.

All offices were alerted to this program by letter of June 21, 1960, entitled "CPUSA, Youth Matters, Internal Security - C" and to the necessity to have complete coverage of CP activity in youth matters. The Party is expected shortly to establish this youth organization, and we must be ready for this eventuality. If you have not already done so, alert

Consideration should be given to making contacts with cooperative officials of institutions of learning so that we may become aware of the emergence on campuses of groups dominated by the CP. In addition, through a review of campus publications information may be elicited concerning the formation of communist youth groups on campuses. The Party is keenly aware of the need to develop an effective program among youth, and you should be alert to develop and maintain the necessary informant coverage of this activity.

#### TOPLEV PROGRAM

Through this program of contacting high-level communists as potential informants it has been possible to obtain the services of many excellent informants. By contacting carefully selected subjects and utilizing new specific approaches, additional informants can be developed which would insure continuation of high-level coverage of the CPUSA. By separate communication all 14 Toplev offices are being instructed to conduct an analysis of subjects previously approached and select individuals for reinterview at this time by utilizing specific new approaches.

#### COUNTERINTELLIGENCE PROGRAM.

Any office where there is any degree of concentration of communists (although not a regular participant in the Program) should consider the possible application of counterintelligence techniques specifically aimed at causing disruption or disillusionment inside Party circles. Bureau approval must be obtained before any action can be taken. All proposals must be carefully evaluated prior to submission so it can clearly be stated that the action recommended will not embarrass the Bureau or jeopardize informants, sources of information or special investigative techniques. Communications in this regard should be captioned "Communist Party, USA, Counterintelligence Program, Internal Security - C," Bureau file 100-3-104.

#### CONTROL - INTERVIEW OF FORMER INFORMANTS BY SAC

Strict control over informants is absolutely necessary to prevent embarrassment to the Bureau and jeopardizing our informant program. In order to minimize situations which could arise after discontinuance of informants, whenever the contacting Agent feels a discontinued informant could cause embarrassment to the Bureau arrangements should be made to have the former informant come to the field office where he will be personally met by the SAC. At that time he should be impressed with the fact that his services were appreciated and were of considerable assistance to the national defense of the country, and he will be reminded that he signed an agreement when he was active as an informant to maintain his relation with the Bureau on a confidential The SAC will stress the necessity for the informant to maintain this confidence. This procedure should be placed in effect immediately.

#### COMMUNIST PARTY, USA, UNDERGROUND OPERATIONS

CP leaders have discussed the possibility of the Party going underground in the event the forthcoming Supreme Court decision on the Internal Security Act of 1950 requires the CPUSA to register with the Attorney General. leaders feel the decision may be against the Party and it will have to go underground. Betty Gannett, member of the National Committee and educational director of the New York State CP, has been instructed to formulate a plan which could be used to establish an underground apparatus. All offices were advised by letter of November 2, 1960, to be alert for all activities of the Party throughout the country in this connection and efforts should be concentrated on developing sources and informants among individuals on the fringe of communist activity as such persons were used to great advantage by the Party when it went underground in the 1950s. Efforts should be made to obtain the actual blueprint which the Party will follow if it goes underground. Current informants should be alert for any discussion of this matter in the Party and be ready to place themselves in positions whereby they can provide information regarding the development of any underground activity.

# MONOGRAPHS AND "THROWAWAYS"

The Agents who attended all five conferences were unanimous in their statements that the material being sent

- (5) That our Counterintelligence Program, which is causing disruption and disillusionment inside the CPUSA, be extended wherever possible with due care to insure full security of this delicate operation.
- (6) As a control measure we consider where necessary bringing former informants to the field office and have the SAC impress on the former informant the necessity to maintain his relation with the Bureau on a confidential basis.

Baumgardh SUBJECT: SECURITY INFORMANT PROGRAM (SIP) EVALUATION OF PROGRAM Due to success of Toplev Program which was instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the Security CInformant Program was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance would be contacted to obtain additional informants in the Party. The primary purpose of the program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants and such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation who are willing to be developed as informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. In addition, these interviews crystallize the status of security subjects as to attitude and dangerousness and also cause considerable disruption and confusion within the CP itself. In April and May, 1956, this program of approaching active communists was combined with our General Interview Program of contacting security subjects and the resultant current program now embodies contacts not only with active communists but other subversive individuals, the purpose of the interviews being to obtain potential informant material. the inception of the program in 1951, 5,767 active communists have been contacted and 22,311 other individuals have been contacted since the extension of the program in 1956. Purpose The primary purpose of instant program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants. Such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation, if willing to be developed as CP informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. #### 5. Case Load

As of 1-11-61, a total of 5,767 active communists and 22,311 other individuals were contacted under the SIP. All continental offices, expect 30, submit monthly progress letters showing interviews conducted. The 30 offices have conducted all logical interviews with persons suitable for informant development and are required to submit a sixmonth progress letter.

# 6. Magnitude

The provisions and instructions formulated in connection with the SIP govern the interviews of persons considered for security informant development in all continental offices.

# 7. Weaknesses

There are no known weaknesses in the SIP.

# 8. Administrative Control

All continental offices (with the exception of 30) must submit monthly progress letters. The 30 offices must submit progress letters every six months.

Through analysis of progress letters an accurate evaluation of the effectiveness of the SIP can be made. Close supervision and control is possible and any weaknesses are immediately corrected by issuance of necessary instructions to the office involved.

Copies of this letter were not directed to San Francisco or Los Angeles inasmuch as they had submitted current information of this type. This particular program ties in with our other programs whereby we are endeavoring to ascertain and identify membership of the CP and to determine the financial operations and apparatus of the CP, USA. An important adjunct of this intensified program, of course, is the development of additional informants who are in the position of producing valuable intelligence information on individual communists which is of great value to the Security Index Program.

#### 5. CASE LOAD

Each field office maintain a control file for instructions and other communications relating to the program.

# 6. MAGNITUDE

As each office reports its progress, the results are carefully analyzed and any necessary instructions and directions are transmitted to the field by the supervisor to make certain this program receives continuing attention. 

(E)-3 STREAMLINING PROCEDURES - CHANNELIZING MEMORANDA -- Numerous channelizing memoranda, particularly in large offices operating a large number of live informants, are presenting an increasingly critical space problem and demands for extra file cabinets.

In June, 1960, the Chicago and San Francisco Offices were authorized to destroy channelizing memoranda following submission of reports in security cases on an experimental basis to determine the feasibility of adopting this practice throughout the field. SECURITY INFORMANTS - GEN'A

Based upon the favorable results obtained in these offices, particularly in savings in file space and streamlining of case files, the Bureau is authorizing the destruction of these channelizing memoranda following submission of reports in both individual and organizational security cases.

In devising procedures for the handling of this matter you should be guided by the following:

- (1) The current procedure with regard to filing the original informant report, the filing of the master channelizing memoranda in the informant file and the serializing of channelizing memoranda in the substantive case files will be continued as at present.
- The Agent, at the time he dictates the report, will prepare a memorandum listing the channelizing memoranda to be destroyed by serial or serial scope and requesting the Chief Clerk's Office to destroy. The memorandum should indicate that pertinent information contained in the serials to be destroyed was incorporated in the report. It will not be necessary to set forth in this destruction memorandum the file and serial number of original informant reports or master channelizing memoranda as this information will be listed in the cover pages to the report. In the case of multiple volumes, the destruction memorandum should be prepared by the Agent in sufficient numbers so that one copy will appear in each volume of the multiple volume file being stripped.
- (3) Prior to destruction, the Agent's recommendations with respect thereto are to be reviewed and approved by the Supervisor at the time he reviews and approves the report.
- (4) Following destruction of the channelizing memoranda the Chief Clerk will so note on the memorandum. Thereafter, the memorandum will be filed in the case file as a permanent record of the serials destroyed.

(5) Technical and microphone surveillance channelizing memoranda may be destroyed without the necessity of identifying in the cover pages of the report the exact location in the office files of the original information. The use of an asterisk identifies the source and the original information can be readily located.

The channelizing memorandum should not be destroyed in the following instances:

- (1) When the original information is not contained elsewhere in your office.
- (2) Do not destroy serial one of a file regardless of its nature.
- (3) Do not destroy any serial containing indexing. It would appear that if indexing was necessary to channelizing memoranda, such indexing would only be done in the main case file as set forth in the title of the communication.
- (4) Do not destroy serial showing "action" information. For example, opening, closing, posting, or instructions given by a Supervisor to an Agent concerning the case.

The destruction of these channelizing memoranda should be subject to close supervisory control by you to insure that all pertinent information contained in these memoranda is reported in the investigative report.

Memos containing only a portion of the requirements, such as the results of file reviews, or a credit check, will not suffice for posting purposes.

Form FD-306, "Cover Sheet for Informant Report or Material," is used as a cover sheet which is filed on top of an informant report or similar material and indicates necessary identifying data. is prepared on bond paper, and on Mimeograph paper and preprinted masters for reproducing processes. A copy of the form on bond paper is enclosed.

In response to the Bureau's request to review the FD- forms in the FBI Form Book for the annual forms survey, the Charlotte Office, by letter 2/14/61 (66-3482-5480), proposes that Form FD-306 be preprinted on manifold paper (thin white paper). Comments of five field offices were solicited. The San Francisco Office indicates that it does not use FD-306 for channelizing memoranda. The Philadelphia Office advises it prepares only one copy of FD-306 and recommends no changes in the present types of papers used. The Atlanta, Chicago, and New York Offices are in favor of having FD-306 on manifold for occasions on which the desired number of copies does not exceed the number of legible copies which can be prepared through one run on the typewriter, thereby eliminating or at least reducing the preparation of additional copies by means of the Mimeography or preprinted masters. The Atlanta and Chicago Offices also indicate manifold paper requires less filing space. It is to be noted that at the time that FD-306 was devised favorable consideration was not given to printing FD-306 on manifold for the reason that the quality of manifold is not sufficiently durable to withstand the excessive handling which the form receives, both before and after it is filed. Three official Suggestions in the past to print FD-306 on manifold have been disapproved. Training and Inspection Division is of the opinion that present reproducing processes available for FD-306 are adequate, and the form should not! be made available in manifold paper. If you approve, proposal of Charlotte Office will not be adopted. 66-2542-3 四

In response to your inquiry, I can advise that individuals who have in the past furnished information to the FBI on a confidential basis and are no longer serving in this capacity are not under the control or direction of the FBI. I am sure you can understand, and agree, that the FBI cannot be held responsible for any statements made or articles written by them.

While the menace of communism is indeed serious, I feel it is necessary for all of us to confront this threat in a calm, realistic rational and law-abiding manner. The label of "communist" is too often indiscriminately attached to those whose views differ from the majority. Those whose lives are not lived according to what one segment of society might decree the "norm" are too frequently challenged as "Reds." If we are to effectively combat this cyll conspiracy, it is imperative that all citizens of this Nation endeavor to exhibit in more positive ways the value and superiority of our form of government over any foreign ideology.

I. is used and by implication involves the authority of the U.S. Department of Justice in their disruptive activities.

Re SAC Letters 56-34, 56-56 and Bulet 4-6-59 to all offices concerning progress letters submitted monthly on this program.

Offices receiving copies of this letter should submit progress letters on a quarterly basis by the tenth of June, September, December and March of each year in the present form. You should continue to set forth an analysis of your progress, the number of Agents contributing to the program, the approximate amount of time being spent on the program and the total number of interviews and reinterviews conducted with active communists and other individuals.

Even though it will no longer be necessary to furnish this information monthly, it will be incumbent on all offices to continue to utilize this important program to the fullest extent to make certain we obtain potential informants who can furnish necessary coverage on communist and related matters.

SECURITY INFORMANTS PROGRAM

The Security Informant Program was inaugurated in September, 1952, as a means of approaching active communists to obtain potential informants. In 1956 it was combined with our general interview program of security subjects, and as a result, approaches are now being made under the Program not only to active communists but also to former communists and individuals with subversive backgrounds who appear to have informant potential. Twenty-three offices submit monthly progress letters containing a tabulation of the results of the Program for the current month, and as a streamlining measure, it is suggested that this report be submitted quarterly. The other 32 offices submit this information on a semiannual basis as they only conduct interviews under this Program from time to time and the report is only necessary on an infrequent basis.

The progress letters will continue to receive close supervision and any weakness or lack of interest on the part of an office will be immediately corrected by issuance of necessary instructions to the office involved to make certain that this affective means of obtaining potential informants is continuously and thoroughly explored. If this change is approved, the monthly memorandum now prepared on the basis of these monthly letters will be submitted quarterly in the future.

### ACTION:

In line with the above, there is attached an appropriate letter to the 23 offices involved (original on Plastiplate) setting forth these new instructions. We will still follow each office closely to make certain that full attention is given to this vital Program in order that we may continue to obtain potential informants who can furnish necessary coverage in communist and related matters.

#### Section 107I, 1, a (M of I) Section 26A, 5 (Handbook)

This section deals with the assignment by the field of permanent symbol numbers to informants. For additional clarity an instruction that no symbol can be reissued to another informant, which instruction now appears under Section 1070, M of I, is being deleted from that section and inserted under the above-captioned sections of the Manual and the Handbook.

#### Section 1071, d and e (M of I)

Current instructions allow for the designation to an informant of both a cover name and a cover number. Due to the increasing number of informants and symbols assigned, it is felt the use of a cover number can lead to confusion. Therefore, it is recommended that the instruction, as it pertains to cover numbers, be deleted.

#### Section 107J, 1, (M of I)

This same reference to the phrase "cover number" is being deleted from this section which pertains to the indexing of names and aliases of informants.

#### Section 107N, 3, b, (10) (M of I) Section 26A, 8, b (Handbook)

This section relates to the proper headings for items covered in justification letters. (Item 10) is headed "Informant's Potential for Advancement." It is felt this caption is too general and it is recommended that the heading "Steps Being Taken to Advance Informant" be substituted.

#### Section 107N, 4 (M of I) Section 26A, 8, d (Handbook)

Instructions in these sections relate to the four-month submission of evaluation letters concerning informants not being paid on Bureau authority. These letters call for the recommendation of

the SAC regarding continuance of the informant. Because it will save an answering communication from the Bureau in some instances, it is recommended that the phrase "UACB" be included in SAC's recommendation in these evaluation letters.

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Current Practice or Rule:

Section 107 J of the Manual of Instructions, page fourteen, item #1, concerning indexing procedures on security informants, states as follows:

"True names and aliases of all informants, as well as the cover name or number assigned to them for informants' use in submitting their statements, but not their permanent Bureau symbol numbers, shall be indexed in the general office indices in the same manner as any other name."

Section 108 of the Manual, Sub-section G, item #7, relating to indexing of criminal informants, states as follows:

"Index names of criminal informants in the general field office indices in the same manner as any other name. If the informant is one with whom contact is restricted, where he is a paid informant, the indices card in the general field office index shall not contain the informant's field office file number but merely the words 'See SAC'."

#### Recommended Change

It is noted in reading these sections that with regard to paid criminal informants, the indices card in the general field office indices does not contain the informant's field office file number but merely refers to seeing the SAC. On the other hand, the instructions relating to indexing of permanently symbolized Bureau security informants, requires that they be indexed in the general office indices in the same manner as any other name.

It is felt that under current indexing rules a higher degree of security is given to criminal informants than to security informants by virtue of the fact that index cards on security informants contain both their name and file number, although they do not contain the Bureau symbol number. It is felt that the rule relating to indexing of criminal information affords criminal informants more security, and it is recommended that consideration be given to standardizing the instructions relative to indexing of both types of informants along the lines contained in Section 108, Sub-section G, item #7 of the Manual of Instructions.

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SUGGESTION: That provisions of the Manual of Instructions regarding the indexing of security informants be changed for the sake of uniformity and to provide the same security regarding the identity of security informants as is provided concerning the identity of criminal informants.

PRESENT PROCEDURE: Section 107 J, 1, page 14 of the Manual of Instructions concerning the indexing of security informants provides that true names and aliases of all informants, as well as the cover name assigned to them for informants' use in submitting their statements but not their permanent Bureau symbol numbers, shall be indexed in the general office indices in the same manner as any other name.

Section 108 G, 7, page 5, regarding criminal informants, provides that their names be indexed in the general indices in the same manner as any other name but if the informant is one with whom contact is restricted or he is a paid informant, the index card should not contain his field office file number but merely the words "See SAC."

OBSERVATIONS: The General Investigative Division, which handles racial informants, commented that, although these informants are considered criminal informants they are handled under the rules relating to security informants. They felt that even though the file number appears on the index cards, adequate security is provided since all pending files of racial and security informants are maintained under lock and key under the personal supervision of the field office official or supervisor charged with Am responsibility for the security and racial informant indices. Therefore the files are not available except to those who should have access to them. They felt that such a special A notation as "See SAC" not only would flag such cards as important or unusual to someon@! reviewing indices but also would require additional clerical work to remove such notation from a card when the informant no longer belongs in the category which needed the Sopy special notation. #### MEMORANDUM MALONE TO MOHR RE: SUGGESTION #661-61

The Special Investigative Division, noting that the only difference in handling criminal informant index cards and racial and security informant index cards in the field was that the criminal informant cards had the words "See SAC" in place of the file number which appeared on the cards of the other two types, recommended that the words "See SAC" be dropped and the appropriate file number be used in all cases. They felt that this would achieve uniformity in the indexing of all three types of informants and would not affect the security of criminal informants so long as good judgment and tight control continued to be exercised in handling the informant files.

The Training and Inspection Division agrees that the use of the notation "See SAC" on the index cards for criminal informants should be replaced by the appropriate file number as is now the case with security and racial informants. Further, it is felt that while this change is the antithesis of that proposed by the suggester, she should receive credit since her suggestion initiated the action which resulted in the modification and since uniformity in the preparation of the index cards for the three categories of informants will be achieved.

Addendum of FCW: jam General Investigative Division

It is noted that although racial informants are considered in the criminal informant category, files and indexing relative to racial informants are handled in accordance with the provisions of Section 107, Manual of Instructions, relating to security informants. It is believed that adequate security is provided for racial informants even though their file number appears on cards in the general indices. The security is provided in that all pending files on racial and security informants are maintained under lock and key under the personal supervision of the Field Office official or Supervisor maintaining the security and racial informant indices. (See Sections 107M Number 9 and 108M Number 4, Manual of Instructions.) Thus the files on these informants are not available except to those who should reasonably have access to them. In addition the index card for racial and security informants contains no special notation such as "See SAC" which would arouse the curiosity of anyone observing the card. By not having such a notation, it is unnecessary to go back and remove same from the index card when the individual involved no longer fits in the category of informant which requires such a notation.

The General Investigative Division does not feel that any change is necessary.

ADDENDUM: Domestic Intelligence Division, 6-15-61, MJR: had RE: Suggestion No. 661-61

A careful consideration of the suggestion indicates that very little, if any, additional security would be provided regarding the identities of security informants if the notation "See SAC" was used on index cards rather than a file number. For instance, while the file number on an index card may indicate that the subject is a security informant, substitution of the notation "See SAC" would denote that the subject is in a special category, such as that of a security informant. Furthermore, in view of a large number of security informants who are paid and with whom contacts are restricted to certain Agents, if this suggested procedure of indexing was adopted it could conceivably lessen the security afforded criminal informants whose special category makes it necessary that their index cards contain the notation "See SAC."

While the adoption of the suggestion would bring b7D about a uniformity in the rules relative to indexing of... criminal and security informants, there would actually occur less uniformity in the indexing of security informants since there would be two types of indexing involved. One would be where the file number would be used and the other where the notation "See SAC" would be necessary. This would require clerical personnel in the Chief Clerk's Office to make a determination whether the file number should beincluded or whether the notation "See SAC" should be used. This would cause additional work in the Chief Clerk's Office. Furthermore, the use of the suggested procedure would require reindexing of the cards whenever an informant is no longer in the category requiring the use of the notation "See SAC."

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

- (1) In view of the above observations that little or no additional security would be afforded security informants by using the notation "See SAC" on index cards and the fact that there would be less uniformity in indexing those cards with the resultant additional work involved, the Domestic Intelligence Division recommends that the suggestion not be adopted.

The suggestion submitted by the Chicago Office recommends that security and racial indexing conform to the rules of criminal informant indexing in the field so that there will be uniformity and additional security.

Security and racial informant desks do not concur with this suggestion. The only difference in the handling of criminal informant index cards in the field, as distinguished from the security and racial index cards, is that instead of the file number criminal index cards have the words "See SAC"; whereas, the other two index cards have the field office file number thereon.

For the sake of uniformity throughout the field, the Special Investigative Division recommends that the words "See SAC" no longer be placed on criminal informant index cards and that in lieu thereof, the field insert the appropriate file number. so doing, there will be uniformity of the three different informant index cards. This recommended change will in no way affect the security of the criminal informants so long as good judgment and tight control continues to be exercised by the field in the handling of the informant files. about Single

EVALUATION OF PROGRAM

Due to success of Toplev Program which was instituted in 1951. (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the Security Informant Program was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance would be contacted to obtain additional informants in the Party. The primary purpose of the program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants and such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation who are willing to be developed as informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. In addition, these interviews crystallize the status of security subjects as to attitude and dangerousness and also cause considerable disruption and confusion within the CP itself. In April and May, 1956, this program of approaching active communists was combined with our General Interview Program of contacting security subjects and the resultant current program now embodies contacts not only with active communists but other subversive individuals, the purpose of the interviews being to obtain potential informant material. Since the inception of the program in 1951, 6,128 active communists have been contacted and 23,430 other individuals have been contacted since the extension of the program in 1956. As a result, we have obtained 2,168 sources, potential security informants, and informants. Through continued use of this program, our informant coverage will be extended and disruption in the CP will continue and any expansion of Party or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

#### DETAILS:

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of the program and a recommendation that the program be continued.

#### 1. Origin

Due to the success of the Toplev Program instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the SIP was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance in the CP were contacted to obtain additional informants in the CP.

#### 2. Purpose

The primary purpose of instant program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants. Such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value. Another factor to be considered in conducting interviews under the SIP is the disruption and confusion such interviews have caused within the CP itself.

#### 3. Scope

In 1952, Agents in 23 field offices were given specialized training (this included 14 offices trained for Toplev interviews). In 1954, the SIP was further extended through the medium of special training sessions whereby additional Agents were trained in all continental offices to make approaches to active communists. In April and May, 1956, our program of approaching active communists was combined with the general interview program of contacting security subjects of all types and the resultant program is known generally as the SIP.

### 4. Tie-in with Other Programs

This program is handled as a special project. It is noted, however, it is similar to the Toplev Program which deals with the interviews of top-level and hard-core communists whereas the SIP deals with interviews of persons of lesser importance.

#### 5. Case Load

As of 7-1-61, a total of 6,128 active communists and 23,430 other individuals were contacted under the SIP. All continental offices, except 32, submit quarterly progress letters showing interviews conducted. The 32 offices have conducted all logical interviews with persons suitable for informant development and are required to submit a sixmonth progress letter.

#### 6. Magnitude

The provisions and instructions formulated in connection with the SIP govern the interviews of persons considered for security informant development in all continental offices.

#### 7. Weaknesses

There are no known weaknesses in the SIP.

#### 8. Administrative Control

All continental offices (with the exception of 32) must submit quarterly progress letters. The 32 offices must submit progress letters every six months.

Through analysis of progress letters an accurate evaluation of the effectiveness of the SIP can be made. Close supervision and control is possible and any weaknesses are immediately corrected by issuance of necessary instructions to the office involved.

#### 9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions pertaining to the SIP are contained in Section 87 D of the Manual of Instructions and have been reviewed and have been found to be adequate.

#### 10. Over-all Value

The over-all value of the SIP is clearly emphasized by the fact that 2,168 sources, PSIs, and informants have been developed through this program. Through the continued use of the SIP the Bureau's security informant coverage will be extended, confusion in the CP will continue, and any expansion of or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

#### 11. Contemplated Action

It is contemplated the development of security informants will be continued through the SIP. It will be closely supervised, followed, and afforded tight administrative control.

During SAC Marlin W. Johnson's recent 2-day conference at the Bureau, he discussed the matter further with the interested divisions, making the following observations (copy enclosed):

FD-237 and FD-238 do not show the needed information on the form itself, but refer to certain serials giving background information; should the Informant Clerk have the sole responsibility of reviewing the file to obtain this information, there is a greater possibility of error as this employee might overlook some change listed on another serial; in addition, it is a waste of clerical time as the Agent already knows the correct address, etc.; this information might also be set out in other types of correspondence rather than being listed on Form FD-209; each change would be listed on a different FD-209 and, in Security Cases, this form is not used until subject is approved by the Bureau.

- 2. With respect to Item 2, SAC Johnson indicates there would be no duplication of effort as the needed information must in some manner be passed from the Agent to the Informant Clerk. If the form is not used, the headings must be written out in longhand on a routing slip which obviously takes additional time.
- 3. Referring to Item 3, the proposed form would travel through the office in the perforated messenger envelopes or be personally carried by the Agent to the Informant Clerk, thus affording the very same security which is afforded other confidential material both at the Seat of Government and WFO.
- 4. In regard to Item 4, the important factor is making the information available to the Informant Clerk promptly, uniformly, and accurately. The Manual sets out the information desired, but does not indicate instructions as to the manner in which the information is to reach the Informant Clerk.

In addition, SAC Johnson points out that proposed form indicates a date of contact for sources of information only. It is necessary to recontact these sources on occasion to insure accuracy of information and to post any changes. The index card itself should not be furnished to the Agent as it is a permanent record. Using proposed form, the Chief Clerk's Office can list the necessary information on the form and give the form to the Agent who can indicate the contact and note any changes to be made on the source card. In the interest of efficiency, WFO is very desirous for approval of proposed form.

In view of the supplemental information furnished by SAC Johnson, the three aforementioned divisions have reconsidered their previous opinions and now recommend that the form be approved for use by WFO. The Forms Management Desk of this division concurs. If you approve, the enclosed letter has been prepared to be sent to WFO, and the Forms Management Desk will take the necessary steps to have the form printed for WFO.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That proposed form be authorized for WFO.

2. That enclosed letter be forwarded to WFO.

3. That Forms Management Desk arrange to have the form printed.

(D) CONFIDENTIAL VOUCHERS - SECURITY INFORMANTS - CRIMINAL INFORMANTS -- In the audit of confidential vouchers it has been noted that a substantial number contain errors which either require a suspension or the return of the voucher to the field office for correction. In order to keep to a minimum the number of errors in confidential vouchers, the following items are set forth for your guidance:

#### RECEIPTS

- 1. Receipts for payments to informants should be obtained in all instances if possible. In the event a receipt cannot be obtained for a particular payment, complete circumstances should be set forth on the blue slip at the time reimbursement is claimed.
- 2. Receipts reflecting payment to informant should clearly reflect the date of payment, purpose, that is, whether for services or expenses or both and the amount for each. The period covered should be shown when the informant is paid on a period basis and the name of the Special Agent from whom the money was received. The receipt must be signed by the informant receiving the money and should not be witnessed by another Agent.
- 3. If necessary to make corrections on the receipts, such corrections must be initialed by the informant and not the Agent.

#### BLUE SLIPS

- 1. Each blue slip prepared in connection with payments to informants should reflect date of payment, Bureau case title, date of the authorization under which the payment was made, period covered and purpose of payment.
- 2. The first blue slips submitted in connection with a payment to an informant who has previously been used by another field division should reflect the identity of the other field division when known.
- 3. Vouchers and blue slips in the name of either the SAC or the ASAC must be signed by him personally. The name appearing on the voucher and the name appearing on the blue slip must always be in agreement. The

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signature of the payee on the voucher must be in agreement with the typed name of the payee as reflected on the face of the voucher.

The above should be called to the attention of all employees of your office who have occasion to make payments to confidential informants or sources as well as those employees who handle the preparation of confidential vouchers.

As you are aware, upon request the Bureau must make available to the Federal courts receipts covering payments to informants who are used as witnesses. In view of this, it is imperative that receipts be submitted in good order. Unless immediate adherence to the Bureau's regulations concerning the preparation and execution of receipts is effected, it will be necessary to take administrative action against those employees who do not comply with these instructions.

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of this program and a recommendation that the program be continued.

#### 1. ORIGIN

Bulet 8-7-58 instructed each continental field division, except San Francisco and Los Angeles, to submit detailed survey of CP organization within its territory setting forth organizational structure, identities of all officers and functionaries from club to district level, identities of each individual CP member, and current informant coverage. Copies of this letter were not directed to San Francisco or Los Angeles inasmuch as they had submitted current information of this type. Replies from the various field offices were thoroughly analyzed and results reflected over-all informant coverage to be good. Certain divisions had areas where additional coverage was needed and instant program has been carried on to emphasize to the field the necessity of expanding security informant coverage to cover these weak areas.

#### 2. PURPOSE

The primary objective of this program has been to pinpoint areas in the field where informant coverage of the Party needs strengthening. It affords a means whereby the Seat of Government can direct concentrated, intensive efforts in those offices where this need for coverage is most urgent, and assures continuous attention to make certain the desired coverage is effected as rapidly as possible.

#### 3. SCOPE

Each of the above offices has been separately instructed to take immediate steps to obtain additional coverage within those areas needing particular attention.

#### 4. TIE-IN WITH OTHER PROGRAMS

This particular program ties in with our other programs whereby we are endeavoring to ascertain and identify membership of the CP and to determine the financial operations and apparatus of the CP, USA. An important adjunct of this intensified program, of course, is the development of additional informants who are in the position of producing valuable intelligence information on individual communists which is of great value to the Security Index Program.

#### 5. CASE LOAD

Each field office maintain a control file for instructions and other communications relating to the program.

#### 6. MAGNITUDE

Each individual office which is being followed under this program is closely supervised by the appropriate supervisor of the Security Informant - Special Records Desk.

#### 7. PAST OR PRESENT WEAKNESSES

An analysis and re-evaluation of the program have not disclosed any weaknesses at the present time.

#### 8. ADMINISTRATIVE CONTROL

Each of the eight offices presently being followed under this program is receiving close attention on a periodic basis by the appropriate supervisor. As each office reports its progress, the results are carefully analyzed and any necessary instructions and directions are transmitted to the field by the supervisor to make certain this program receives continuing attention. #### 9. ADEOUACY AND CURRENTNESS OF INSTRUCTIONS

Review of instructions which have been given to each of the field offices under the program discloses that they are adequate and current.

The primary purpose of this program is to pinpoint for the field those areas of security informant coverage which need strengthening. In addition, the field has been instructed to take steps to develop additional coverage in those particular areas which will result in obtaining more informants in the security field.

#### 11. CONTEMPLATED ACTION

As each office develops the necessary coverage, it will be dropped from the program. At the same time we will remain alert for any additional areas in the field which may become weak and place such offices under the program to make certain those weaknesses are eliminated and the necessary coverage is obtained.

SUBJECT: LONG-RANGE SECURITY INFORMANT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

O SECURITY TOUTORMANTS - general

NY airtel 7-28-61 daptioned "Solo, IS-C" stated that "NY 694-S in connection with his activities in a "secret service school" in Moscow, and in discussions with the Soviet "Petrov," was advised by "Petrov" that NY 694-S should consider finding a young person who someday can succeed you." NY 694-S advised "Petrov" that he had considered this matter, that he had it definitely in mind and that he was "looking around." NY 694-S will take no action in this regard without specific Bureau instructions.

We have anticipated the possibility of augmenting the coverage provided by NY 694-S and CG 5824-S on the highest levels of the CPUSA. This matter was thoroughly explored during our security informant conferences in October, 1960, and specific programs were set in motion. One plan involves the utilization of our present informants to bring along other informants in Party activity. new informant will not know that the individual who is working him into top Party activity is also an FBI informant. Through this plan, the CP leadership will grow to trust the new informant, and in a relatively short time we should be able to continue our high-level coverage in the event anything should happen to our current top informant. In addition to this plan, we are also carefully screening as potential informants individuals who possess the qualifications for future leadership and we are choosing such prospects from the college and postgraduate levels in large metropolitan areas having active student organizations made up of individuals of radical tendencies. Also, we are continuing to utilize our Toplev Program as a means of approaching hard-core, active communists to determine if they would be willing to cooperate and continue in the Party on a high level for the Bureau.

The suggestion that "Petrov" made to NY 694-S to consider finding someone who could succeed the informant is exactly what the Bureau has had in mind and we are proceeding carefully in this direction to develop an individual or individuals who can be worked into this delicate high-level operation involving the innermost councils of the Communist Party, Soviet Union and Communist Party, USA. We must not jeopardize our present coverage, however, and we will make certain that any individual who is considered for involvement in this closely guarded network is carefully screened.

SECURITY INFORMANTS PROGRAM

General

As the result of our conferences on security informants in April and May of 1956, SAC Letter 56-34 dated 6-18-56 set forth changes in policy and procedures which, among other things, permits the SAC in certain instances to approve interviews with individuals to determine whether such persons have any informant potential. program has saved considerable correspondence between the field and the Bureau and has accelerated our informant program. If such individual is cooperative, Bureau authority must then be obtained to develop the subject as an informant. The authority in the SAC Letter does not apply, however, to delicate situations or to those individuals employed in the newspaper field, educational field and the like.

The field has been submitting progress letters monthly under this program but, effective 4-14-61, letters are now being furnished to the Bureau by the field on a quarterly basis in June, September, December and March. The following is a tabulation summarizing the results of this program for the three months ending 5-31-61, the previous three months and the grand total from the inception of this program.

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Volume IV, Section 107N, Pages 18 and 19, sets forth the data required in requesting Bureau authority to pay informants on a continuing basis. This justification is used every four months for each paid Security Informant and is also used, where applicable, in connection with Potential Security Informants, Panel Sources and Sources of Information.

Based on the frequency of use of such justification, it is believed that a form which would include all required data would be of material value. Included in this memo is a suggested form which would appear to encompass the essential points required in a justification letter. It is recognized, however, that the writer may not be conversant with administrative problems which may exist at the Seat of Government and certain revisions may be necessary.

It is noted that similar types of forms are already in use, namely FD-142, Recommendation for Installation of Technical or Microphone Surveillance and FD-143, Recommendation for Justification for Continuation of Technical or Microphone Surveillance.

The suggested space allotment on the submitted form is based on a review of approximately 25 recent justification letters picked from the files of this office. This selection did include many of the most active informants in this division. In the event space allotment is insufficient to record all desired data under any given topic, it can be

supplemented by the addition of a continuation page such as is now done in preparation of Fd-142 and Fd-143.

The manner of approval of this justification by the Bureau would remain the same by the use of an onion skin first page to be stamped for return to the submitting field office.

The advantages of the use of a form would:

- 1) Create absolute uniformity throughout the entire field.
- 2) Insure the coverage of all points required.
- 3) Simplify the preparation of dictation.
- 4) Save Agent dictation time.
- Save stenographic time both in taking and transcribing dictation. In this connection it is pointed out that printed headings would also eliminate correction of any typographical errors which may be required at time of typing.

As of August, 1961, the San Francisco Office had 70 paid and unpaid Security Informants which required submission of justification letters each four months. In addition there were another 37 Bureau approved Potential Security Informants, Panel Sources and Sources of Information for a total of 107 matters in which a four months justification letter is used.

It is estimated that, at a minimum, a prepared form such as attached would save 10 minutes Agent dictation time per letter and 15 minutes stenographic time to take and transscribe this dictation. Time saved in actual preparation of dictation cannot be estimated and therefore is not included. Based on letters being submitted every four months, or three times yearly, this form would save a minimum of 582 hours of Agent time and 86 3/4 hours of stenographic time in the San Francisco Office alone. Reducing this to more workable figures

this amounts approximately 12 weeks of Agent time and 21 weeks of stenographic time. Based on Agent pay of GS 13, it amounts to an approximate savings in this office of \$300 per year and on a basis of stenographic pay of GS 4, an additional \$175 per year. These figures, if applied to the New York, Chicago and Los Angeles offices would be increased greatly and when projected throughout the field would result in a savings of several thousand dollars yearly.

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#### PROPOSED CHANGES IN MANUAL OF INSTRUCTIONS VOLUME IV

Section 107N, Page 20, Item 5, of the Manual of Instructions should be amended to read as follows:

.5. Receipts When payments are made to anyone for information or assistance on security matters, either on the SAC's authority or prior Bureau approval, receipts must be obtained in every instance in which it is possible to do so. In the event a receipt cannot be obtained for a particular payment, complete circumstances should be set forth on the blue slip at the time reimbursement is claimed.

Section 107N, Page 20. Items 5c and 5d. of the Manual of Instructions should be added to read as follows:

c. Receipts are not to be witnessed by another Agent. If necessary to make corrections on the receipts, such corrections must be initialed by the informant and not by the

Agent.

Section 107N, Page 20, Item 5c, of the Manual of Instructions should be changed to Item 5e.

Section 108J, Page 10, Item 12a, of the Manual of Instructions should be amended to read as follows:

Receipts for payments to informants and sources should be obtained in every instance where possible to do so. In the event a receipt cannot be obtained for a particular payment, complete circumstances should be set forth on the blue slip at the time reimbursement is claimed. Receipts should be self-sufficient so that, if it is necessary to introduce receipts in evidence during course of a trial, receipts will not relate to other documents or files.

Section 108J, Page 10, Items 12c and 12d, of the Manual of Instructions should be added to read as follows:

Receipts are not to be witnessed by another Agent.

If necessary to make corrections on the receipts, such

corrections must be initialed by the informant and not by the Agent.

Section 108J, Page 10, Item 12c, of the Manual of Instructions should be changed to Item 12e.

During this session, Gus Hall, CP General Secretary, pointed out the difficulties now facing the CP will bring defections and casualties among the membership and will probably result in the reactivation of stool pigeons and undercover enemies. Discussions among NEC members stressed that each club in each district should be specifically examined to ascertain the character and quality of its membership. Where any dubious member is: found, steps should be taken to detach, isolate or quietly drop such person. In that connection, Hall stated that this should be done if the slightest doubt arose concerning anyone. There is no question but that the CP will tighten its security measures to the utmost. In order to prevent our losing any sources as a result of this program, we should immediately instruct those offices in whose divisions Party membership exists to alert their Party informants concerning these plans of the Party. Section 107, Manual of Instructions, sets out in detail the procedure an informant should follow in the event suspicion is directed against him and these offices should be instructed to make certain each informant is aware of this procedure. At the same time, Party informants should be encouraged, if possible, to seize upon any such situation which develops to strengthen and promote their own positions within the CP. The Bureau should be promptly advised when any information is received that a particular informant is under suspicion. Letters received in this respect should set out the circumstances involved. the steps being taken by informant to combat the allegations against him and the recommendation of the office handling the informant regarding future action to be taken in each particular case.
