During the Internal Security - Espionage Conference on U September 28 and 29, 1964, recognizing a continuing need for confidential informants, the conference took cognizance of the fact that many individuals are in position to furnish valuable information of security interest who do not meet the current criteria to permit their use as informants or as possible witnesses in any prosecutive undertaking. The conferees felt the Bureau is being deprived of valuable information which could be secured from people of this type. Information from such individuals would be wide in scope and would relate generally to race riots, prevention of riots, communism, espionage activities, Ku Klux Klan activities, hate groups, bombing, church burnings, and the like. These persons would not be suitable as witnesses because of unfavorable characteristics such as extensive criminal records, excessive indebtedness, emotional quirks, abnormal sexual practices, poor employment records, illiteracy, and personal physical defects. The participants at the conference felt that intelligence from such persons as these could result in our developing other individuals as important witnesses who could furnish pertinent evidence otherwise unobtainable.

Memorandum October 5, 1964, containing the deliberations of the conference pointed out that occasionally a situation develops where an individual described as above who does not meet our requirements as a confidential informant is in a unique position to furnish very valuable information which cannot be secured elsewhere. The conference recommendation was approved that whenever such an individual is in a strategic position to obtain information of such value that we utilize his services to solve a bombing or an espionage case or other related vital security cases. It was agreed that each such case will be carefully weighed on its individual merits and, if the potential informant is approved, he will be given the closest supervision and control from the Seat of Government.

This would also possibly result in exposing key informanta as once the espionage subject is so alerted, he could then very likely deduce the source of our information which would materially hamper our over-all counterespinese program. In fact, the Domestic Intelligence Division has indicated that such experience might well place some of any valuable informants' lives in jeopardy, particularly those, who are Soviet citizens. Based on the memorandum of the Domestic Intelligence Division of 6/30/64 Mr. Tolson stated, "I think O.K. not to disseminate data on these 16," and the Director said, "O.K." 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

Due to success of Toplev Program which was instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party(CP) functionaries), the Security Informant Program was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance would be contacted to obtain additional informants in The primary purpose of the program is to develop persons the Party. currently active in the CP into Bureau informants and such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation who are willing to be developed as informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. In addition, these interviews crystallize the status of security subjects as to attitude and dangerousness and also cause considerable disruption and confusion within the CP itself. In April and May, 1956, this program of approaching active communists was combined with our General Interview Program of contacting security subjects and the resultant current program now embodies contacts not only with active communists but other subversive individuals, the purpose of the interviews being to obtain potential informant material. Since the inception of the program in 1952, 8,092 active communists have been contacted and 29,097 other individuals have been contacted since the extension of the program in 1956. As a result, we have obtained 2833 sources, potential security informants, and informants. Through continued use of this program, our informant coverage will be extended and disruption in the CP will continue and any expansion of Party or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

RECOMMENDATION:

Since program has proved to be worthwhile, it is recommended it be continued under our present policies and procedures and the continuance of the program again be considered in one year.

Memorandum for Mr. Sullivan RE: SECURITY INFORMANT PROGRAM (SIP) 66-2542-3

DETAILS:

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of the program and a recommendation that the program be continued.

1. Origin

Due to the success of the Toplev Program instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the SIP was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance in the CP were contacted to obtain additional informants in the CP.

2. Purpose

The primary purpose of instant program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants. Such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value. Another factor to be considered in conducting interviews under the SIP is the disruption and confusion such interviews have caused within the CP itself.

3. Scope

In 1952, Agents in 23 field offices were given specialized training (this included 14 offices trained for Toplev interviews). In 1954, the SIP was further extended through the medium of special training sessions whereby additional Agents were trained in all continental offices to make approaches to active communists. In April and May, 1956, our program of approaching active communists was combined with the general interview program of contacting security subjects of all types and the resultant program is known generally as the SIP.

4. Tie-in with Other Programs

This program is handled as a special project. It is noted, however, it is similar to the Toplev Program which deals with the interviews of top-level and hard-core communists whereas the SIP deals with interviews of persons of lesser importance.

Memorandum for Mr. Sullivan RE: SECURITY INFORMANT PROGRAM (SIP) 66-2542-3

5. Case Load

As of 9/1/64, a total of 8,092 active communists and 29,097 other individuals were contacted under the SIP. All continental offices, except 32, submit quarterly progress letters showing interviews conducted. The 32 offices have conducted all logical interviews with persons suitable for informant development and are required to submit a sixmonth progress letter.

6. Magnitude

The provisions and instructions formulated in connection with the SIP govern the interviews of persons considered for security informant development in all continental offices.

7. Weaknesses

There are no known weaknesses in the SIP.

8. Administrative Control

All continental offices (with the exception of 32) must submit quarterly progress letters. The 32 offices must submit progress letters every six months. Through analysis of progress letters an accurate evaluation of the effectiveness of the SIP can be made. Close supervision and control is possible and any weaknesses are immediately corrected by issuance of necessary instructions to the office involved.

Instructions pertaining to the SIP are contained in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions and have been reviewed and have been found to be adequate.

10. Over-all Value

The over-all value of the SIP is clearly emphasized by the fact that 2,833 sources, PSIs, and informants have been developed through this program. Through the continued use of the SIP the Bureau's security informant coverage will be extended, confusion in the CP will continue, and any expansion of or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

11. Contemplated Action

It is contemplated the development of security informants will be continued through the SIP. It will be closely supervised, followed, and afforded tight administrative control.

Since this program serves a definite purpose in guiding the field toward strengthening areas of weak informant coverage, it is recommended that it be continued with further evaluation again in 1 year.

1. ORIGIN

Bulet 8/7/58 instructed each continental field division, except San Francisco and Los Angeles, to submit detailed survey of CP organization within its territory, setting forth organizational structure, identities of all officers and functionaries from club to district level, identities of each individual CP member, and current informant coverage. Copies of this letter were not directed to San Francisco or Los Angeles inasmuch as they had submitted current information of this type. Replies from the various field offices were thoroughly analyzed and results reflected over-all informant coverage to be good. Certain divisions had areas where additional coverage was needed and instant program has been carried on to emphasize to the field the necessity of expanding security informant coverage to cover these weak areas.

2. PURPOSE

The primary objective of this program has been to pinpoint areas in the field where informant coverage of the Party needs strengthening. It affords a means whereby the Seat of Government can direct concentrated, intensive efforts in those offices where this need for coverage is most urgent and assures continuous attention to make certain the desired coverage is effected as rapidly as possible.

3. SCOPE

As delinquencies in this respect are overcome in an office, that office is dropped from this program. At present, the program is in effect in the 6 following offices:

Detroit	Pittsburgh
Milwaukee	Springfield
New York	Washington

Each of the above offices has been separately instructed to take immediate steps to obtain additional coverage within those areas needing particular attention.

4. TIE-IN WITH OTHER PROGRAMS

This particular program ties in with our other programs whereby we are endeavoring to ascertain and identify membership of the CP and to determine the financial operations and apparatus of the CPUSA. An important adjunct of this intensified program, of course, is the development of additional informants who are in the position of producing valuable intelligence information on individual communists which is of great value to the Security Index Program. 5. CASE LOAD

Each field office maintains a control file for instructions and other communications relating to the program.

6. MAGNITUDE

Each individual office which is being followed under this program is closely supervised by the appropriate Supervisor of the Security Informant - Special Records Desk.

7. PAST OR PRESENT WEAKNESSES

An analysis and re-evaluation of the program have not disclosed any weaknesses at the present time.

8. ADMINISTRATIVE CONTROL

Each of the 6 offices presently being followed under this program is receiving close attention on a periodic basis by the appropriate Supervisor. As each office reports its progress, the results are carefully analyzed and any necessary instructions and directions are transmitted to the field by the Supervisor to make certain this program receives continuing attention.

9. ADEQUACY AND CURRENTNESS OF INSTRUCTIONS

Review of instructions which have been given to each of the field offices under the program discloses that they are adequate and current.

10. OVER-ALL VALUE

The primary purpose of this program is to pinpoint for the field those areas of security informant coverage which need strengthening. In addition, the field has been instructed to take steps to develop additional coverage in those particular areas which will result in obtaining more informants in the security field.

11. CONTEMPLATED ACTION

As each office develops the necessary coverage, it will be dropped from the program. At the same time, we will remain alert for any additional areas in the field which may become weak and place such offices under the program to make certain those weaknesses are eliminated and the necessary coverage is obtained.

Among the items discussed at the Criminal Intelligence Field Conferences, which were concluded last week, were matters relating to live informant programs presently in existence.

The various field divisions expressed interest in, and a desire for, authorization to pay informants on SAC authority up to It was felt by all concerned that such an increase from would facilitate the handling of informants, eliminate considerable paperwork and yet would not materially increase the cost of our informant operations, since the SACs would still have to justify all payments to informants. This procedure is presently being utilized in racial informant matters and the field would like to see it expanded to criminal informant situations.

Agents attending the conferences indicated that certain differences of approach necessitated by the different purposes sought in development of racial, criminal and security informants have resulted in differing deadlines for the submission of information required by the Bureau. For example, the letter of evaluation furnished to the Bureau on each approved symbol number informant for the purpose of considering whether his assistance makes him worthy of retention as an informant is submitted on a three-month basis in the case of top echelon informants, on a four-month basis in the case of security informants and on a six-month basis with respect to regular criminal informants. It was suggested, where possible, that these requirements/be unified.

confidential sources (Section 107, Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, page three) defines a confidential source as an individual who on a confidential basis furnishes information available to him through his present position. Manual then goes on to give as example of confidential source "bankers, telephone company employees, <u>American employees</u> of foreign official establishments, and employees of United Nations <u>Secretariat</u>."

It is suggested that the phrase underlined above bedeleted from this manual provision.

We are presently making concerted efforts to obtain informants at diplomatic establishments at various foreign countries and it is believed that this type of individual qualifies as a potential security informant in most instances rather than merely as a confidential source. Usually, an employee of a foreign official establishment or of the United Nations Secretariat, whether an American citizen or not, is closely associated with foreign officials and is in position to secure information of interest concerning intelligence or espionage activities in the U. S. Moreover, such individuals normally would be making an affirmative effort through their associations to actively obtain and furnish current information to the Bureau. These are the criteria for a potential security informant.

In addition, we definitely desire to exercise close supervision of such individuals and it is, therefore, felt that they should be handled as potential security informants rather than confidential sources. Justification requirements relative to potential security informants are stricter than for confidential sources.

PROPOSED CHANGE IN MANUAL OF INSTRUCTIONS

Section 107, Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, page three, should be amended to read as follows:

4. Confidential source

An individual who on a confidential basis furnishes information available to him through his present position. Examples would be: bankers, telephone company employees, <u>American employees of foreign</u> official establishments, and employees of the <u>United Nations Secretariat</u>. These individuals make no concerted effort on behalf of the Bureau but merely obtain and furnish information readily available to them.

The underlined portion of the above paragraph should be deleted. The remainder of this paragraph as it appears in the manual should remain unchanged, except that the word "and" should be inserted in line three between "bankers" and Ttelephone."

The Special Investigative Division advised the form as proposed would not pertain to work involving criminal informants.

「ここの」の Domestic Intelligence Division noted that a comparison of the information to be placed on the proposed form with the format of Form FD-306 (Cover Sheet for Informant Report or Material, copy attached), which is a Bureau form currently approved for use in connection with handling reports from informants in the field office. shows that the same information in the proposed form is provided for on the FD-306. This division could see no necessity for the proposed form since the FD-306 could be used for this purpose.

Training Division agrees with the Domestic Intelligence Division that a new form is not warranted for use by Chicago. The Manual of Instructions provides for use of Form FD-306 in connection with handling information furnished by informants if desired. It appears Chicago may not be using this form but preparing memoranda when preparing this type of information for channelizing purposes.




informants on a monthly basis and this has presented a problem in identifying and flagging reportable statistics for the informant clerk or coordinator who must abstract this information for the monthly progress letter. In this connection SAC Letter #65-44 (D), dated 8-17-65 emphasized the necessity for field offices to prepare accurate and complete monthly progress letters and requested all offices to re-examine administrative procedures for accumulating and reporting statistics.

Normally when an informant reports information which results in a statistic either a memorandum to the informant file or the FD-209 will be prepared containing this information after it has been verified. By simply adding an appropriate flagging device to the FD-209 the employee responsible for abstracting the information will be reminded to look for the pertinent information in the contents of the FD-209 and the employee preparing the form will be reminded to include statistical information which should be reported. To accomplish this it is only necessary to add a block marked "Statistic", following the two blocks marked "Negative" and "Positive" under "Purpose and results of contact" on the FD-209. This would be checked by the employee preparing the form when a statistic was included in the contents of

the memorandum. This should not interfere with the purpose of the form, which is also utilized for security and racial informants, and it would have widespread application inasmuch as the Criminal Informant Program has over 10,000 pending cases which would be affected. It would further clarify the type of positive information furnished by the informant inasmuch as the employee preparing the form would check both the "Positive" block and the "Statistic" block if statistics were included in the contents and only the "Positive" block if there was only intelligence information to report.

Form FD-209, with suggested block added in red, is attached for consideration.

RECOMMENDATION:

That Form FD-209 be modified as outlined herein. If approved it will not be necessary to issue special instructions to the field since the addition of this block to the form is self-explanatory.

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ADDENDUM OF THE TRAINING DIVISION

In view of comments of Special Investigative Division, Training Division agrees the idea should be adopted and the form should be revised at the next printing. The matter was discussed with Domestic Intelligence Division which had no objection to the proposed revision.

Advantages of suggestion and annual savings

In view of the growth of the Criminal Informant Program in recent years, as well as the constantly increasing statistical accomplishments of informants, it is felt that an additional block denoting a statistical accomplishment on the FD-209 would result in a savings of at least five hours per month of informant clerk time, and insure greater accuracy of extracting and reporting of statistical accomplishments of informants and PCIs.

Under the present system, with only "Negative" and "Positive" blocks, an informant can furnish positive information which is not a statistical accomplishment, and it is necessary for the informant clerk or coordinator, prior to the submission of the monthly letter, to review the entire and sometime lengthy FD-209s, of every pending CI and PCI file, for the sole purpose of assuring that statistical accomplishments were not overlooked at the time these FD-209s were initially read. This additional block will assure speedy and accurate extraction of statistical accomplishments from informant files.

A conservative estimate of savings which would be effected, if adopted field-wide, would be This conservative figure was arrived at, using the hourly rate of ______per hour for a GS-4 clerk. At a savings of five hours per month times ______ is a savings of ______ per month, or ______per year. Projecting this to 55 field divisions, one will arrive at the figure of It is realized, of course, that the larger offices would effect even greater savings, in view of the additional clerical personnel used in connection with their informant program.

Recommendations and comments of Division Head

I feel this suggestion has considerable merit. One of the difficulties encountered by this Division in the Informant Program has been the tabulation of all statistics contributed by informants. I feel this one addition to the contact form will greatly facilitate the administrative handling of the program.

NOTE: Suggests all field offices use a method as set forth below for the preparation of copies of information received orally from informants. The Agent who handles the informant accepts the oral information and dictates it in appropriate form. The report is typed on bond paper, carbon paper is inserted between the bond paper and a Multilith master, resulting in the preparation of an original document, plus a Multilith master simultaneously. The master may then be used in the preparation of appropriate number of channelizing memoranda for various files involved.

It should be noted these copies are destroyed when they are incorporated into a report. Due to the observations set forth in letter and in the note to the SAC, the Training Division recommends this idea not be adopted.

Bulet 8/7/58 instructed each continental field division, except San Francisco and Los Angeles, to submit detailed survey of **CP** organization within its territory, setting forth organizational structure, identities of all officers and functionaries from club to district level, identities of each individual CP member, and current informant coverage. Copies of this letter were not directed to San Francisco or Los Angeles inasmuch as they had submitted current information of this type. Replies from the various field offices were thoroughly analyzed and results reflected over-all informant coverage to be good. Certain divisions had areas where additional coverage was needed and instant program has been carried on to emphasize to the field the necessity of expanding security informant coverage to cover these weak areas.

2. PURPOSE

The primary objective of this program has been to pinpoint areas in the field where informant coverage of the Party needs strengthening. It affords a means whereby the Seat of Government can direct concentrated, intensive efforts in those offices where this need for coverage is most urgent and assures continuous attention to make certain the desired coverage is effected as rapidly as possible.

3. SCOPE

As delinquencies in this respect are overcome in an office, that office is dropped from this program. At present, the program is in effect in the 4 following offices:

Each of the above offices has been separately instructed to take immediate steps to obtain additional coverage within those areas needing particular attention.

4. TIE-IN WITH OTHER PROGRAMS

This particular program ties in with our other programs whereby we are endeavoring to ascertain and identify membership of the CP and to determine the financial operations and apparatus of the CPUSA. An important adjunct of this intensified program, of course, is the development of additional informants who are in the position of producing valuable intelligence information on individual communists which is of great value to the Security Index Program.

5. CASE LOAD

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Each field office maintains a control file for instructions and other communications relating to the program.

6. MAGNITUDE

Each individual office which is being followed under this program is closely supervised by the appropriate Supervisor of the Security Informant - Special Records Desk.

7. PAST OR PRESENT WEAKNESSES

An analysis and re-evaluation of the program have not disclosed any weaknesses at the present time.

8. ADMINISTRATIVE CONTROL

Each of the 4 offices presently being followed under this program is receiving close attention on a periodic basis by the appropriate Supervisor. As each office reports its progress, the results are carefully analyzed and any necessary instructions and directions are transmitted to the field by the Supervisor to make certain this program receives continuing attention.

9. ADEQUACY AND CURRENTNESS OF INSTRUCTIONS

Review of instructions which have been given to each of the field offices under the program discloses that they are adequate and current.

10. OVER-ALL VALUE

The primary purpose of this program is to pinpoint for the field those areas of security informant coverage which need strengthening. In addition, the field has been instructed to take steps to develop additional coverage in those particular areas which will result in obtaining more informants in the security field.

11. CONTEMPLATED ACTION

As each office develops the necessary coverage, it will be dropped from the program. At the same time, we will remain alert for any additional areas in the field which may become weak and place such offices under the program to make certain those weaknesses are eliminated and the necessary coverage is obtained.

Due to success of Toplev Program which was instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the Security Informant Program was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance would be contacted to obtain additional informants in The primary purpose of the program is to develop persons the Party. currently active in the CP into Bureau informants and such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value whereas persons with no CP affiliation who are willing to be developed as informants, require considerable time before they can produce information of value. In addition, these interviews crystallize the status of security subjects as to attitude and dangerousness and also cause considerable disruption and confusion within the CP itself. In April and May, 1956, this program of approaching active communists was combined with our General Interview Program of contacting security subjects and the resultant current program now embodies contacts not only with active communists but other subversive individuals, the purpose of the interviews being to obtain potential informant material. Since the inception of the program in 1952, 8,323 active communists have been contacted and 30,373 other individuals have been contacted since the extension of the program in 1956. As a result, we have obtained 3,117 sources, potential security informants, and informants. Through continued use of this program, our informant coverage will be extended and disruption in the CP will continue and any expansion of Party or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

RECOMMENDATION:

Since program has proved to be worthwhile, it is recommended it be continued under our present policies and procedures and the continuance of the program again be considered in one year.

DETAILS:

This memorandum contains the results of a complete review and evaluation of the program and a recommendation that the program be continued.

1. Origin

Due to the success of the Toplev Program instituted in 1951 (interviews of top-level Communist Party (CP) functionaries), the SIP was instituted in 1952 whereby persons of lesser importance in the CP were contacted to obtain additional informants in the CP.

2. <u>Purpose</u>

The primary purpose of instant program is to develop persons currently active in the CP into Bureau informants. Such individuals, if developed while still in the CP, can immediately produce current information of value. Another factor to be considered in conducting interviews under the SIP is the disruption and confusion such interviews have caused within the CP itself.

3. Scope

In 1952, Agents in 23 field offices were given specialized training (this included 14 offices trained for Toplev interviews). In 1954, the SIP was further extended through the medium of special training sessions whereby additional Agents were trained in all continental offices to make approaches to active communists. In April and May, 1956, our program of approaching active communists was combined with the general interview program of contacting security subjects of all types and the resultant program is known generally as the SIP.

4. <u>Tie-in with Other Programs</u>

This program is handled as a special project. It is noted, however, it is similar to the Toplev Program which deals with the interviews of top-level and hard-core communists whereas the SIP deals with interviews of persons of lesser importance.

5. Case Load

As of 9/1/65, a total of 8,323 active communists and 30,373 other individuals were contacted under the SIP. All continental offices, except 34, submit quarterly progress letters showing interviews conducted. The 34 offices have conducted all logical interviews with persons suitable for informant development and are required to submit a sixmonth progress letter.

6. Magnitude

The provisions and instructions formulated in connection with the SIP govern the interviews of persons considered for security informant development in all continental offices.

7. Weaknesses

There are no known weaknesses in the SIP.

8. Administrative Control

All continental offices (with the exception of 34) must submit quarterly progress letters. The 34 offices must submit progress letters every six months. Through analysis of progress letters an accurate evaluation of the effectiveness of the SIP can be made. Close supervision and control is possible and any weaknesses are immediately corrected by issuance of necessary instructions to the office involved.

9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions pertaining to the SIP are contained in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions and have been reviewed and have been found to be adequate.

10. Over-all Value

The over-all value of the SIP is clearly emphasized by the fact that 3,117 sources, PSIs, and informants have been developed through this program. Through the continued use of the SIP the Bureau's security informant coverage will be extended, confusion in the CP will continue, and any expansion of or new CP activity will be promptly detected.

11. Contemplated Action

It is contemplated the development of security informants will be continued through the SIP. It will be closely supervised, followed, and afforded tight administrative control.

The outbreak of rebel activity and the possibility of a communist takeover in the Dominican Republic beginning in April, 1965, placed demands upon the Bureau to provide reliable information concerning individuals and organizations in the Dominican field upon which the White House and agencies of the Government could base policy decisions. The success of the Bureau in responding to this challenging assignment was largely due to the fact that we already had a strong repository of qualified informants active in the Dominican field. Prior to the assassination of former Dominican dictator Trujillo, there was a large exile movement active in this country composed of refugees whose activities required the attention of this Bureau and our investigative activities provided us with security informants and potential security informants who fit the current Manual definitions, text of which is attached.

The current political and social turmoil in Central and South America and the efforts of Communist China and the Soviet Union to destroy Ņ the influence of the United States and enhance their own standing have 3 raised a very real fear of a communist takeover in other Latin American countries similar to the one which occurred in Cuba. The White House and 2 other Government agencies are looking to the Bureau more now than ever íc, before to develop the same positive, high quality, intelligence information in other areas of the Latin American field that we have in the Dominican COP. area. This new responsibility requires us to take a fresh look at the type of sources we are to develop. To provide us the necessary foreign intelligence data we must go beyond the Manual definition of "individuals" who are members or attend meetings of a subversive organization or who -

engage in espionage or intelligence activities in the United States on behalf of a foreign principal," but must seek to develop individuals including exiles participating in activities of exile groups, which while not directed by or on behalf of a foreign principal, are of such nature as to require the Bureau to be cognizant of their activities. We must also develop individuals engaged in export-import businesses, involved in gathering news for foreign language news media and similar individuals who do not meet the current criteria set forth in the Manual for a security informant or potential security informant. While we need confidential sources in this field and are endeavoring to develop such, we cannot rely solely upon the occasional and passive services provided by confidential sources but must have individuals whom we can guide, direct and administer as security informants.

We are currently identifying, developing and administering individuals who are in a position to act as security informants and who do obtain information on our behalf in the intelligence field and we wish to encourage the further development of these individuals in order to cope with our broadened responsibilities. Currently, because of the wording of the Manual, there is sometimes a lack of understanding on the part of the field as to whether or not a valuable individual in a position to assist the Bureau should be regarded as a confidential source or actively developed as a security informant. By clarifying and broadening the Manual definition we will encourage the field to develop such individuals to the maximum of their capability and benefit to the Bureau and insure that these individuals are properly controlled.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the attached proposed change in the Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, Section 107A, 1 & 2 be made.

2. Potential security informant

Individual in a position to become active in a subversive organization or espionage or intelligence activities in the U.S. on behalf of foreign principal or can become closely associated therewith, or is in a position to secure pertinent foreign intelligence data, and is making affirmative effort through associations or contacts so that he can be in a position actively to obtain and furnish current information to Euroau.

(2) Agents generally dictate this data at the outset, followed by information furnished by the informant and results of contact with informant; thus, in transcribing, a stenographer can complete the FD-209 in the order in which it was dictated, rather than having to interrupt typing results of contact in order to complete general data at the bottom of the page as now required in the present FD-209.

(3) Elimination of lines appearing under section "Titles On Which Contacted" allows for more flexibility in typing, where a great many titles and file numbers are listed; and in any instance, where only one or two are listed, economizes in space used for this section. It has been the experience of this office that the spaces between these lines do not conform with the automatic spacing on all typewriters, thus making it necessary for the stenographer to interrupt the smooth flow of typing to adjust the machine to these lines manually with resultant waste of time.

(4) By placing the words "Negative" and "Positive" at the top of the FD-209, as well as the data boxes which appear at the bottom of the form, the stenographer would now be able to insert the words "Results of Contact" immediately following the titles and file numbers and continue with the narrative of information without typing over the words "Negative" and "Positive," thus making the form more legible and saving typing space. In addition, this will allow the stenographer to end the typing on this page at a point which would leave sufficient room to list all copies of files to which the FD-209 should be disseminated. 


The October 11, 1965, Criminal Informant survey which was submitted by the Inspector, recommended that a committee be inaugurated comprised of members of the Security, Racial, Top Echelon and Criminal Informant Desks. The Inspector recommended that these meetings be held monthly.

My memorandum, December 9, 1965, outlined the results of the December 6, 1965, conference of members of the above-mentioned Informant Desks. On January 27, 1966, another conference was held with Mr. M. J. Rozamus representing the Security Informant Desk, Mr. J. G. Deegan representing the Racial Informant Desk, Mr. John E. Kelly, Jr., representing the Top Echelon Informant Desk and Mr. A. B. Fipp representing the Criminal Informant Desk.

Considerable discussion was held regarding the use of the automatic data processing equipment (ADP). This subject was discussed in the previous meeting and progress was to be taken up in January. Mr. Kelly advised that known identified members of La Cosa Nostra are now being placed on the ADP equipment. This will be a continuing and constantly expanding program until such time as all La Cosa Nostra members are identified. Mr. Deegan advised that consideration was given to the use of the ADP equipment in the past and it was discussed with a representative of the Voucher Section; however, it was decided at that time it would not be justified. Mr. Rozamus and Mr. Deegan stated that a careful study is being made to determine if ADP equipment can be of value in the operations of the respective desks. Fipp pointed out that all statistical accomplishments of Criminal Informants In addition, the case load, number of are recorded on ADP equipment. CIs and PCIs and Criminal Informant delinquency for every field office are placed on the ADP equipmend monthly, so that comparisons and evaluations can be drawn between various field offices. 166-2

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The Inspector recommended that this committee consider the advisability of having the field record the number of contacts and cooperation items furnished by other agencies to the field. Members of this committee recommend that this type of bookkeeping on the part of all field offices not be approved inasmuch as what value could be attached to it would be far outweighed by the efforts and time that would be taken up to maintain it.

Monthly meetings will continue and any technique or idea developed will immediately be brought to your attention. Any item of interest to all informant units that occurs between monthly meetings, will be brought to the attention of each unit as quickly as possible.

SUGGESTION: A schedule is attached to the background material which SA proposes be used in all offices where Security Informants have money withheld for income tax purposes from money paid them for services. This schedule can be utilized on an individual basis and one copy attached to the tax return submitted by the informant and the copy prepared by the agent accountant inasmuch as it summarizes the informant's total income as known to the Bureau for the current tax year. It also reflects the final adjustment to the informant's tax account. This schedule could also be used as a summary schedule which when complete will tie in with the tax account maintained as part of the confidential fund.

CURRENT PRACTICE: Suggester states this practice started at Newark as a result of money withheld from Security Informants for tax purposes during the calendar year 1965.

ADVANTAGES: This system would establish a uniform policy throughout the field and minimize the time necessary to handle these matters.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC Bachman, Newark, felt the idea merited Bureau's consideration.

Administrative Division advised use of such a form did not involve the work of the Voucher-Statistical Section and it could see no particular advantage to the idea.

Domestic Intelligence Division states that inasmuch as this is principally an accounting matter it had no objection to its adoption if the proposed form is satisfactory with the Administrative Division. While neither of these divisions seem to have a definite objection to the proposed form, Training Division can see no particular benefits to be derived from its

use. Once the income tax form is completed, all of the information set forth on the worksheet (proposed form) is available and it will take more time to set forth these figures in another location. If the Newark Office desires to use this item, there appears no objection to this action. However, there appears to be no need to extend this system to all offices and thereby cause additional work. In Top Echelon group, there are a comparatively small number of informants and that unit is familiar with these individuals. This type of data placed on machines would not appear to be of any appreciable value at this time. Security and racial informants are readily known and appropriate one chosen for a given activity. In addition, this equipment is being used to capacity at the present time and to place another program on it would possibly require overtime work and would cost at least several thousand dollars per month. It was noted that in some instances when a potential criminal informant or a criminal informant reaches a point where his continuation is not warranted due to lack of productivity concerning criminal matters, he may have potential for coverage of organizations such as the Nation of Islam. It was pointed out that several top informants in newly formed subversive organizations, such as the Revolutionary Action Movement, were first undertaken for development in the racial field.

A discussion was held concerning problems faced in connection with name check requests or inquiries received from other agencies involving informants. It was noted that the field offices should make every effort to guide informants away from situations which may make them of interest to outside agencies; however, if this cannot be avoided, each inquiry has to be handled on an individual basis and every feasible effort made to fully protect the informant status of individuals involved.

Memorandum dated February 4, 1966, captioned "Criminal Informant Program; Fugitive Section" from A. B. Eddy to Mr. Gale outlined the results of the January 27, 1966, conference. On February 28, 1966, another conference was held with Mr. M. J. Rozamus representing the Security Informant Desk, Mr. J. G. Deegan representing the Racial Informant Desk, Mr. John E. Kelly, Jr., representing the Top Echelon Informant Desk and Mr. A. B. Fipp representing the Criminal Informant Desk.

Discussion was held regarding the recognition of Special Agents who have contributed materially in the informant development field. All of the above representatives advised that the policy of their respective desks is to be ever alert to appropriately recognize accomplishments in this field and to encourage the Special Agents in Charge to submit their recommendations for Agent personnel when deemed appropriate. It is the belief of the above representatives that the Bureau's program of recognition for Agents who have contributed materially to the informant program, is one of the best methods devised to generate continuing interest of the Agent personnel in the informant program.

Discussion was also held concerning the utilization of Security and criminal informants in order to stay on top of the racial situation in the various parts of the United States. It was pointed out that all field offices have been instructed in the past, to utilize all types of informants not only in times of racial disturbances but to have them alert in order that they will furnish information indicating possible outbreaks of racial violence. The field is required to submit a weekly airtel captioned "Racial Riots" in which they keep the Bureau advised as to the steps they are taking to implement the program of assigning all logical informants to determine advance information concerning outbreaks of racial violence. Mr. Rozamus pointed out that in connection with the Los Angeles riots the field utilized Nation of Islam informants (security informants) to obtain information for the Bureau concerning the situation in Los Angeles.

It was pointed out to the class that under present Bureau policy, the Bureau desired to maintain closer control over payments to informants and it was not expected that this policy would be changed.

Mr. Rozamus advised that in connection with the travel of security informants, the field is again being reminded that in order to preclude possible suspicion being directed to an informant, appropriate arrangements should be made to insure that informant's trips, are handled in a 66-2542-3manner fitting his financial status.

Mr. Deegan stated that the Racial Informant Desk prepared an SAC Letter instructing the field to insure that Agents handling top level racial informants are alert for any situations which may drastically change an informant's status, thus affecting the Bureau's Klan coverage.

It was unanimously decided that these meetings had been very constructive and definitely worthwhile. At the same time it is felt that it does not appear necessary to schedule future meetings on a monthly basis, as the representatives of the four informant units can assemble whenever problems arise requiring mutual discussion.

ADVANTAGES: Mr. McConnell advises this arrangement would require handling only one form and the FD-209 could be eliminated. By having a statement preprinted on the form concerning the reliability of the informant, this would be a reminder that this information is needed. He states that each time information is channelized, the reliability of the source of information is always present. Time spent in reviewing other files to ascertain the reliability of an informant furnishing information would be eliminated.

SAC McGovern, Birmingham Office, recommended the **OBSERVATIONS:** proposed form be adopted.

ALKON X Domestic Intelligence Division noted that Form FD-209 is used primarily to record administrative data relating to the handling of an informant whereas Form FD-306 is used to control and channelize information supplied. Inasmuch as these two forms were designed for specific and different functions in the administrative handling of informant files, this division felt that any attempt to combine them would tend to defeat and/or confuse the purpose of each and recommended against adoption.

Special Investigative Division advised the FD-306 is used only for security and racial informant matters for transmitting into appropriate files written reports submitted by the security and racial informants. FD-306 is not used by criminal informants. FD-209 is a form memorandum used by Agents handling informants for the purpose of recording the dates that informants were contacted and the results thereof. To combine these forms would possibly create confusion on the part of all Agents handling criminal informants since none of the provisions on the FD-306 would be applicable in their criminal informant work.

From the observations made by the two interested divisions, it is apparent the combination of these two forms is neither desirable nor appropriate. Training Division feels the formats of both forms should remain as they are at the present time.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the suggestion not be adopted. On approval, no further action is necessary with regard to the suggester as he has been thanked by prior letter.





The importance of security informants to the Bureau and in turn to the security of the United States demands that we continue to exercise every effort and means to develop and maintain adequate informant coverage of the Communist Party and other subversive organizations. There is still a great need for additional security informant coverage in all phases of our investigative activity in the internal security field. This should be stressed to all Special Agents in Charge at this time .

thère have been expanded communist activities in general and widespread demonstrations throughout the country involving subversive elements. Although we have made appreciable

progress in our coverage of subversive activities, it being noted that 16 security informants were placed in the Communist Party during the first six months of this year against 15

during the 12 months of 1965, additional informants are needed if we are to have necessary coverage of subversive activities.

RECOMMENDATION:

Each office will be expected to fully explore this infrequent opportunity and pursue all avenues to accomplish the desired results.

While it is recognized that this "national membership and dues control period" is, in effect, a national registration for the Party, it is very probable that Party leaders will go beyond the bounds of registering current members and recent recruits and endeavor to persuade former Party members to reactivate their membership. You should, therefore, take this opportunity to contact appropriate current non-Party member informants and former informants, alerting them to the probability that contact by the Party is forthcoming. Advise them that in the event they are contacted for registration, they should thereafter immediately contact your office in order that you may offer necessary guidance and assistance.

Under the Security Informant Program, which was instituted to develop informants through interview of Communist Party members, 23 field offices submit quarterly progress letters and the remainder semiannual letters. As a streamlining measure, we are recommending that the submission of the letters be discontinued.

ORIGIN AND OPERATION OF PROGRAM:

Due to the success of the Toplev Program (interviews of Communist Party functionaries), instituted in 1951, the Security Informant Program was established in 1952, whereby persons of lesser importance in the Party were to be interviewed. In 1956 the program was extended to include interviews with security subjects of all types. As noted above, 23 field offices submit quarterly progress letters and the remainder semiannual letters.

These letters set forth: (1) The number of active communists contacted; (2) Number of other individuals contacted; and (3) The number of sources, potential security informants, and security informants developed. Also, these letters set forth an analysis of progress being made to obtain coverage. Upon receipt at the Bureau, the information is evaluated to determine where weaknesses exist in connection with security informant coverage.

OBSERVATIONS:

A resevaluation of the program with the thought in mind of streamlining our procedures discloses that submission of the quarterly and semiannual letters in captioned case can be discontinued without adversely affecting our development of security informants. We will continue to closely follow security informant development of each field office through other reports being submitted on periodic basis. Discontinuance of the submission of such letters requires no change in Bureau manuals, 3 - 400 RECOMMENDATION:

> Captioned program has been utilized since 1958 to direct intensive efforts by particular field offices where security informant coverage is most urgently needed. Recommendation is being made that this program be continued.

PURPOSE AND SCOPE:

The primary objective of this program has been to pinpoint areas in the field where security informant coverage of the Communist Party is most urgently needed. Currently, New York and Washington Field Offices are being directed specifically under the program. Furthermore, this program ties in with other specific efforts in certain field offices to develop special coverage of the Party, such as high-level informants which currently involves the Chicago, New York, Los Angeles, and San Francisco Offices.

Since the inception of this program, we have had as many as 15 field offices operating under the program. While some offices were removed, others were added. We will remain alert for any additional areas in the field which should require specific attention for development of security informants and thereafter place such offices under this program.

RECOMMENDATION:

Since this program serves a definite purpose in guiding the field toward strengthening areas where informant coverage is needed, it is recommended that it be continued with further reevaluation in one year.



During recent contacts with security informants to determine their willingness to be interviewed by Departmental Attorneys and to testify in prosecutions under the amended Internal Security Act of 1950, some informants indicated they did not wish to be interviewed or to testify except in the event of a national emergency for fear of physical harm, social and business reprisals, and other reasons of a personal nature. Despite the fact that they realize they may be needed as witnesses in the future, some informants are reluctant to face that fact and an SAC Letter is being transmitted to the field reiterating previous instructions that the contacting Agents must psychologically prepare the informants to the fact that they may at some future date be called upon for interviews by Departmental Attorneys and to render a contribution to their Government by testifying to the information they have furnished.

ACTION:

Attached for approval is an appropriate SAC Letter pointing out that it is incumbent upon the Bureau to provide witnesses whenever the Department initiates prosecution. '. Manual changes are not necessary as this information reiterates data currently in the Manual.

(E) SECURITY_INFORMANTS - CONTROL -- The Department has recently submitted to the Bureau a number of requests concerning the availability of certain security informants for interview by Departmental Attorneys and possible testimony in prosecutions under the amended Internal Security Act of 1950. It has come to my attention that in many cases security informants have shown considerable reluctance to be interviewed or to testify, except in the event of a national emergency, for fear of physical harm, social and business reprisals, and other personal reasons. Inasmuch as the interviews with Departmental Attorneys will be conducted with full precautions to protect the security of the informants, I fully expect that all informants will be available for interviews.

I wish to reiterate existing instructions that it is the responsibility of the Special Agents handling security informants to condition them to the fact that someday the knowledge they possess may be needed as evidence in court or at another hearing to assist our Government in combating the evils of subversion. The Bureau has always stressed the necessity for all Special Agents handling security informants to psychologically prepare the informants for the fact they may, at some future date, be called upon to render a most important contribution to their Government by testifying to the information they have furnished.

The proper indoctrination of informants in this regard is absolutely essential, since it is incumbent upon the Bureau to make informants available for interview whenever the Department initiates prosecution in security cases. If following an interview of an informant the Department feels that the testimony of the informant is absolutely essential to a successful prosecution, it will be permissible for you to make appropriate recommendations regarding the effect which the release of the particular informant involved would have on the security coverage in your territory. However, it must be borne in mind that the ultimate decision as to the release of an informant will be made by the Attorney General in the best interest of the national security. As a general rule, all of our security informants are considered available for interview by Departmental Attorneys and for testimony if needed. Only a very few are furnishing information of such a highly sensitive and important nature as to preclude their use.

The Bureau is attempting to locate one or more persons preferably of Italian extraction who have a very good command of the Italian language or at least the ability to learn it in a relatively short period of time. These individuals should also have some connection with the CP, USA; have some possible usefulness to the Italian CP; and have a reason for traveling to Italy or at least abroad.

These persons should be selected from former as well as current informants and the area of college students about to graduate or graduate students interested in travel should not be overlooked.



The suggestor points out that since this Form is used exclusively as a letter from the Director, FBI, preprinting these words would save stenographic time in typing. The Domestic Intelligence Division feels that the suggestor's recommendation has merit. SUGGESTION: That racial and security informant files be posted on the original Form FD-306 (Cover Sheet for Informant Report or Material) from the subfile.

CURRENT PRACTICE: states the Manual of Rules and Regulations, II, 3, 19, reads: Memoranda for the SAC showing contacts with informants or potentials under the informant program should be posted to the proper informant file. SAC Letter 68-20 advised: FD-209 (Memorandum for Recording Contacts with Criminal, Security, and Racial Informants) may be used to channelize observations of racial conditions in ghetto areas where the situation is described as calm by placing a copy of the FD-209 in the informant's Sub-A file.

Heretofore, the Jackson Office has used the FD-209 for posting \leq purposes in racial and security informant files where the FD-306 is used in reporting informant information. The FD-209 is used in order to prevent placing a copy of the FD-306 in the administrative file so that the file may be posted and to prevent duplicating the FD-306.

ADVANTAGES: The suggester advises that posting from the FD-306 would save approximately 12 hours of clerical time per month in preparing the FD-209 for posting, depending on the number of informant files to be posted. This procedure would eliminate preparing and serializing of the FD-209 into the administrative file.

DISADVANTAGES: The posting would be in the subfile whereas the background would be in the administrative file.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC Moore, Jackson Office, said this sounded like a practical idea.

Domestic Intelligence Division noted that Form FD-209 is used by the field to record both negative and positive contacts with informants and is posted by the field and filed in the administrative section of the informant file. The details of the positive contacts are set forth in the investigative section of the informant file and the FD-306 is used as a channelizing memorandum. If the suggester's proposed were adopted, there would be a breakdown in the separation of administrative and investigative data of informant files, inasmuch as posting (an administrative procedure) would be handled both from the investigative and administrative section of the file. In addition, FD-209s would have to continue to be used because situations do occur when contacts for the period of time covered by the FD-209 may all be negative and there would be no need for the FD-306. Further, in connection with the FD-209, this form is in many situations made out in longhand by the Agent. This division felt the estimate of the saving of time of clerical personnel is excessive. In view of these observations and in order to maintain uniformity in the administrative handling of informant files, the Domestic Intelligence Division opposed adoption.

Training Division agrees with the above views that our present procedures in effect for posting in these cases should be retained.
