PURPOSE:

Obtain approval to change the submission of security informant justification letters from once each four months to once each six months, and to alter existing instructions concerning information set out in the justification letter to clarify value of information furnished.

BACKGROUND:

In 1955 the field was instructed to submit justification letters to the Bureau each three months on informants to insure close supervision of the informant and control of funds expended for information. In 1956 the format of this letter was changed for clarification and refinement of contents. In 1957 the period of submission was changed for security informants from three to four months, and experience has shown no loss of control or supervision of these cases. During the past year payments to security informants dropped by 8.7 per cent despite a continuous increase in our responsibilities in the security field. It is pertinent to note the Special Agent in Charge of each office is personally accountable for approving individual expenditures for information within the authorized total amount, e.g., initial payments up to a total of [] and thereafter up to whatever the amount authorized within a specific period (normally monthly). Any expenditures over these authorized amounts have always, and would continue to require specific Bureau authority.

Along this line, the request to alter the format of information required in the justification letter is pertinent.

Under item number four the field is required to furnish "summary of information furnished and/or services rendered during pertinent period." At the present time it is not possible, without considerable research, to determine whether this information is available from other sources or is available only from the source. This factor alone radically affects the value of the information. Henceforth, the field will indicate if such data is available only from that source.

OBSERVATIONS:

Control of expenditures for information is not an issue here. It is the frequency with which these expenditures will be reviewed at the Bureau. Submission of these letters every six months would allow time saved in the field to be more productively utilized in investigative work, and at the Bureau this time would be utilized for a more in-depth analysis of the justification letters in terms of overall needs of the office and eliminating multiple coverage where it is not warranted. Requiring specific comments on information furnished that is only available through that source in justification letters would materially aid in making this analysis.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. Attached for approval is a letter to all Special Agents in Charge setting out specific instructions that:
(a) Justification letters for security informants be submitted each six months and (b) Specific identification of information available only from the informant be required in these justification letters.

On 12/16/68 a conference was held by the representatives of the four informant units at the Seat of Government. In attendance were M. J. Rozamus representing the Security Informant Desk; J. G. Deegan representing the Racial Informant Desk; J. E. Kelly, Jr., representing the Top Echelon Informant Desk; and L. A. Wagoner representing the Criminal Informant Desk.

SA Wagoner noted that occasionally a criminal informant is converted to a racial or security informant, or vice versa. He indicated when this happens the supervisor approving the newer designation should be certain to make the other units aware so as to complete the records and not have a pending matter unnecessarily.

SA Deegan discussed the continuing efforts being made to extend and broaden coverage in the racial field. He also noted the manner in which security informants can be utilized in racial matters.

SA Kelly discussed some of the problems and the importance of protecting informants at the conclusion of trial matters where their identity has been made known.

The necessity of adjusting payments to the informants on basis of type of information produced was agreed upon.

- b. Written statements submitted by informants should be placed in a separate section or subfile of the informant's file. Excerpts from the statements are to be included in the regular investigative case report when information of value is submitted. Informants should be told to submit one original statement to eliminate any temptation to the informant to maintain a copy. No copies or notes should ever be retained by the informant. When informants supply data orally, which are reduced to writing in the office, the statement should also be filed in the subsection of the file relating to the particular informant.
- c. All[symbol number informant]files, [pending and closed,] shall be maintained under [lock and key] under the personal supervision of SAC, ASAC, field supervisor, [or responsible employee designated by SAC.]
- d. The files of informants should be maintained in such a manner to insure that all information furnished by a particular informant will be immediately available. In addition, these files should be maintained in such a fashion that the identities of the cases in which an informant has furnished pertinent evidence can be forwarded immediately to the Bureau by simply referring to the file of the informant without the necessity of conducting extensive research. Place in the informant's file copies of all correspondence showing an interest by the Department in using the informant for testifying when he becomes available as a witness. If such correspondence is voluminous, summarize the information on each particular informant.

8. Payments

- a. In specific instances in which it is necessary and expedient to expend money to obtain information concerning matters or persons under investigation which is not otherwise obtainable, or to advance expense money to enable an individual to obtain such information, the SAC may approve payments of amounts up to [] and totaling no more than [] on a c.o.d. basis regardless of the number of payments.

This applies only to individuals who have never been regularly paid for services or expenses on Bureau authorization. In other words, once an individual has been paid on Bureau authorization, regardless of the amount, this authority of the SAC cannot be used.  - (5) Amount paid for services and expenses by month
(Initial justification letter should set forth amount, if any, ever paid under SAC authority.)
 - (6) Type and number of meetings attended and other activity
 - (7) Number of written and oral statements submitted (List separately.)
 - (8) Information furnished of unusual value

12. Bulky material submitted by informant

Where informant or source submits bulky material other than a statement and same pertains to a specific investigative matter, bulky material may be filed in the investigative case file, together with a copy of executed form FD-306 or a channelizing memorandum containing all applicable items set forth on form FD-306. In such a case, the original form FD-306 or channelizing memorandum should be filed in the subfile of the informant or source and the file and serial number where the bulky material is located should be noted thereon.

N. PAYMENTS TO INFORMANTS AND HANDLING MONEY RECEIVED

1. No gifts to informants

- a. Gifts should not be given to informants since such actions might be misconstrued.
- b. Relationship between Agents and informants shall be maintained on a businesslike basis.

O SECURITY INFORMANTS - GENERAL

In accordance with previous instructions a conference was held on 4/2/69 in connection with captioned matter. In attendance at this conference were E. P. Grigalus representing the Security Informant Unit; J. G. Deegan representing the Racial and Klan Informant Unit; J. E. Kelly, Jr., representing the Top Echelon Informant Unit; and L. A. Wagoner and A. B. Fipp representing the Criminal Informant Unit.

It was brought to the attention of the above-mentioned personnel that beginning May 12, 1969, a two-week criminal informant specialized in-service school would commence and that all members present would have assignments to lecture before this class. It was requested that current examples of the development of difficult informants and the handling of productive informants be used if at all possible in these lectures.

Streamlining facts and operations were discussed relative to each unit and SA Fipp noted that a suggestion made by the Criminal Informant Unit was just approved allowing the field to eliminate certification in all of their informant letters relative to the availability to travel on the part of informants. In addition, an SAC Letter was just approved emanating from the Criminal Informant Unit reiterating to the field the absolute necessity of each SAC to insure that all letters to the Bureau requesting authority to make payments to criminal informants clearly reflect the value of information or services, thus fully justifying any payments made.

The fiasco at the White House by an Intelligence informant was worse yet. H" In view of this it is recommended the attached letter to all Special Agents in Charge be approved.

The attached letter to all Special Agents in Charge sets out that instructions be reiterated to informants that they do not disclose their identities voluntarily. In addition, it further instructs that all informants must be given tight supervision and control to insure that incidents do not occur wherein their loose talk or actions could be damaging to Bureau operations.

Security informant BRADYGAN

This is to recommend that the attached letter to all continental field offices be approved reiterating the instructions that racial informants be given tight supervision to insure that the informants do not disclose their identities voluntarily.

Recently a New Orleans racial informant was arrested along with over 150 other individuals as a result of a shooting incident in Detroit, Michigan, involving police officers and individuals attending the convention of the Republic of New Africa. This informant feared for his life and, therefore, advised a Detroit Police Department officer that he was assisting the FBI. The Director noted "I am getting more and more concerned about talkativeness of our informants. We must exercise greater control over them. H."

There are standing instructions that racial informants should maintain the confidential nature of their relationship with the Bureau; however, in view of the Director's comments and incident described above, it is believed these instructions should be reiterated.

RECOMMENDATION:

That attached letter to all continental field offices be approved instructing the field offices in accordance with the above.

This is in response to Mr. L. M. Walters' request for data concerning the total number of security informants and potential security informants (PSIs) and the number of those providing coverage of the New Left.

Currently there are 1,168 security informants and 675 PSIs. Of the 1,168 security informants and 675 PSIs, 999 security informants and 601 PSIs, respectively, provide coverage of the following: Communist Party, USA (CP,USA), splinter groups of the CP,USA, the Socialist Workers Party, Minutemen, border activities, nationality organizations, and espionage and similar matters.

The remainder 169 security informants and 74 PSIs provide coverage of the New Left. This consists of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) which has approximately 235 chapters and 8,000 members, 110 other similar organizations, and about 100 underground newspapers. In addition, some provide coverage of anti-Vietnam War and antidraft organizations which consist of above 250. These protest organizations have in the past mobilized up to 125,000 people for demonstration. Since 1965 approximately 375,000 people have participated in 17 national demonstrations led by protest groups.

Our informant coverage is extremely thin and non-existent in many areas of our investigative responsibility.

REPORTING OF INCOME BY INFORMANTS

Individuals who furnish information to this Bureau are paid for value received and are not in any sense Federal employees. Each informant thoroughly understands his position in this regard and operates as an independent contractor. Since informants are not Federal employees, no deductions are made from sums paid to them under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act. At the same time, all informants who receive compensation are advised to consider such sums as income in completing any required income tax form. It is brought to the attention of all informants that they must complete a special schedule in filing Federal income tax returns applicable to self-employed individuals who are not included within the provisions of the Federal Insurance Contributions Act.

Our informants are anxious to comply with all provisions of the Federal income tax laws, but there is a question of security involved in that they must file under their true names and addresses. There is always the possibility that their true identity may thus become known and, of course, their value to this Bureau as informant will cease.

On the other hand, the use of a fictitious name and address in completing these forms may be a violation of the Fraud Statutes.

You are requested to consider this matter and advise how these returns should be filed to prevent the identification of the informant without violating any Federal laws or regulations of the Internal Revenue Bureau

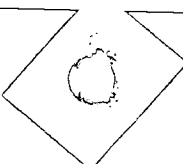
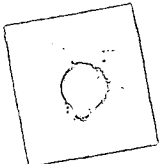

The Communist Party, USA, in its propaganda places great stress on the inner democracy which allegedly prevails within its own organization. Article IV of the Party's Constitution, which deals with the "rights and duties of members," also pays lip service to this myth.

Section 1 of Article IV provides that every Party member in good standing

"has not only the right but the responsibility to participate in the making of its policies and in the election of its leading committees in the manner provided for in this Constitution."

This is further implemented by Section 7 of Article IV which provides that all Party members in good standing "have the right to be nominated and elected to all offices or committees."

The current issue of Political Affairs (June, 1954) contains an article entitled "Leadership Quality and the Draft-Program Perspectives" by Claude Lightfoot, an alternate member of the National Committee, Communist Party, USA. This article effectively refutes these claims of inner Party democracy and publicly admits that the Communist Party, USA, has been consistently violating its own Constitution.

After commenting on some of the current failures of the present leaders of the Communist Party, USA, Lightfoot states that the Party's leadership should be developed

"upon the foundation of long-range political perspective... rather than a single act of promotion..."

and calls for

"a radical break with the tendency of revolving-door leadership in cadre promotion."

It is significant that nowhere in the Party's Constitution is any provision made for the "promotion" of its members to Party office. The Party's Constitution provides only for their "election."

Lightfoot's article also admits that, in many instances, the various Communist Party districts have no voice whatever in choosing their local leaders, and that this situation has existed almost since the Communist Party, USA, was organized in 1919.

"There are districts which, after twenty or thirty years of existence, have had a local force as district organizer for only a brief period."

As if these admissions of the autocratic nature of the Party were not sufficiently damning, Lightfoot goes even further and acknowledges that, in many cases, the Communist Party leader who "is sent in to assist the local comrades" is completely unknown to the Party members in the area.

"... There are far too many situations where a leader is sent into an area of work and the membership is put in a position where their only criteria for judging the proposal is confidence in the leading committee which submitted it."

This information should be brought to the attention of all agents in your office who are assigned to the development of additional security informants. All the quotations from Political Affairs were taken from page 40 of the June, 1954, issue and in all cases the emphasis was added.

The June, 1954, issue of Political Affairs carries an article by Claude Lightfoot, an alternate member of the National Committee, Communist Party, USA, which effectively disproves any Communist claims that the Communist Party, USA, is operated on a democratic basis, with the officers elected by the members.

The attached letter to the offices in which the captioned programs are in effect calls attention to the admissions contained in Lightfoot's article which prove that the Communist Party, USA, frequently violates its own Constitution.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the attached yellow copy of this letter be approved and returned to the Central Research Unit where the duplimat is being retained. The duplimat will then be dated and arrangements made for its reproduction and transmittal to the field.

SECURITY INFORMATION - GENERAL

Reference my memorandum, captioned as above, dated June 18, 1969.

Conference unanimously recommended streamlining procedures in the program for development of selected contacts (Deseco) to reduce paper work and conserve manpower.

Deseco program develops individuals on a highly selective basis and places them in contact with Soviet-bloc officials to penetrate their intelligence activities. Development procedures currently require

- (1) check of field office indices, local credit and criminal records;
- (2) "sounding-out" interview on SAC authority in 14 offices, and Bureau authority to other offices, to assess individual's willingness and potential to cooperate;
- (3) investigation to determine individual's background, personal history, and reliability;
- (4) results of "sounding-out" interview and background investigation submitted to Bureau with request for authority to recontact for further assessment of potential and availability and advise him of our desire for him to develop relationship with Soviet-bloc official.

In cases where individual has declined active cooperation during recontact, all investigative effort was wasted.

IN STEP 2

Propose in "sounding-out" interview, we resolve if subject is ready, willing, and able to assist Bureau, by advising him we desire his participation in confidential activity to protect the internal security of the United States, which may require his time and effort beyond his normal occupational endeavors. Statement would not divulge specific plan to contact Soviet-bloc official, but would strengthen assurance he will actively cooperate and insure background investigation to be conducted by our Agents is necessary and worthwhile.

Propose also that Step 4, recontact of individual, be on a UACB basis, cutting paper work without sacrificing supervision and quality of investigation, all other procedures to remain the same.

If you approve, attached are proposed SAC Letter and appropriate change of Manual of Instructions.

 (INTERNAL SECURITY - NATIONALISTIC TENDENCY)

In Section 105K, page 34, paragraph (e) should read as follows:

(e) For all offices, if during the "sounding-out" interview the Dosoko subject clearly exhibits a willingness and potential to cooperate with the Bureau, he should be informed of our desire to have him participate in confidential activity in support of the Bureau's responsibility for the protection of the internal security of the United States. Subject should clearly understand this may require his time and effort beyond his normal occupational endeavors. If the initial interview is favorable, submit results and request the Bureau to review its files if not already done. At the same time, an investigation should be instituted to determine the individual's background, including personal history, integrity, and reliability. The extent of this investigation will depend upon the circumstances of individual cases but must be sufficient to clearly establish that the individual is the type of person who can be operated successfully by the Bureau. At the completion of this investigation, the results thereof and a summary of the initial interview and file reviews should be furnished to the Bureau, advising on a UACB basis that subject will be recontacted to further assess his potential and availability.

During this second interview, the person selected will be specifically informed of our desire to have him develop a relationship with a Soviet-bloc official. If after being informed of the purpose of his cooperation he is still agreeable to cooperate, and you feel he possesses the attributes necessary for a successful double agent or informant, submit the results of the second interview to the Bureau. Advise, on a UACB basis, that the person under consideration will be considered a PSI and that steps will be taken to develop him as an informant or double agent. For your guidance a PSI should be designated an informant, or double agent, when he is in contact with an official and is furnishing information of value.

Section 107D, item 1, Manual of Instructions, instructs field to submit results of background investigation in same numerical sequence as set forth in Section 107C, Manual of Instructions, and to request authority for designation as Bureau-approved PSI. This communication should also include a physical description. Seat of Government will review investigation and, with approval of division head, advise field of decision and if authorization is being given instruct field in communication to advise subject of information contained in Section 107D, item 2.

Advantages: (continued)

Bureau on confidential basis, all of which heretofore has been included in Bureau's letter to field authorizing designation. If subject is affiliated with labor union or educational institution, field will also report that it has informed subject that Bureau is not interested in employer-employee relationship of labor union or administrative functions of educational institution as case may be.

Suggester recommends that field offices be authorized to submit designation of an individual as a Bureau-approved Potential Security Informant (PSI) where no request for payment is involved on a UACB basis and to include in its letter that PSI will be instructed in accordance with provisions in Section 107 D, Item 2, Manual of Instructions. (Briefly this Section requires that field after individual has been approved as PSI make clear to him that his assistance is voluntary; that he cannot consider himself a Bureau employee; and that his cooperation is confidential. If PSI is connected with labor union he is to be informed Bureau not interested in employer - employee relationship and if connected with institution of learning be handled in accordance with current regulations concerning investigations on campuses.)

The present procedure is for field to submit certain required information concerning individual's background and to submit request for Bureau authority to designate him as PSI. Bureau, following review of investigation conducted and check of Bureau files, specifically advises field of its decision and if authorized, has field instruct PSI in accordance with Section 107 D, Item 2, mentioned above.

Suggester feels that the adoption of his suggestion would eliminate need for Bureau to send reply to the field. He indicates that the final approval for such PSIs would lie with the Division head.

If the above suggestion is adopted, conceivably all requests for PSI approval where no request for payment is involved could be approved at the level of Bureau Supervisor or Division head. This would be unsatisfactory since in cases of PSIs involving students, diplomatic personnel, etc., the approval of Bureau officials outside this Division is required prior to their designation as PSIs.

In addition, since field could submit requests on UACB basis field could be utilizing an individual as a PSI even before the Bureau had an opportunity to check its indices.

The adoption of this suggestion would tend to relax control over the development of informants at a time when tight control is necessary.

In view of the foregoing, this Division recommends that the suggestion not be adopted.

In order to conquer the problem posed by subversives and racial extremists dedicated to the destruction of this country we are operating a highly effective system of live informants who keep us abreast of their activities. Informants are reporting on individuals who are involved in conspiracies with foreign subversive elements and are engaged in fomenting riots and disturbances in cities and on college campuses across the nation, as well as participating in arsons, bombings, and murders. The intelligence data needed to combat this problem is furnished on a continuing basis by informants. In June, 1969, a security informant received first-hand information from the Soviets that they are advocating increased activities of peace movements throughout the world. A New York security informant continues to meet clandestinely with his Soviet contact to exchange messages and to receive money for financing subversion in the United States. A racial informant has reported upon the strategy of the North Vietnamese Delegation in connection with the Paris Peace Talks. Racial informants have also reported on international revolutionary activities formulated abroad. The absolute need for informants on college campuses is evidenced by the fact that the New Left and black extremists were responsible for over 200 disturbances and damages in excess of \$2,500,000 on 140 college campuses during the 1968-69 academic year. Information furnished by the informants have prevented serious acts of racial violence, prevented murders, contained rioting and have resulted in the arrest of numerous extremists. Specifically, racial informants have accounted for the arrest of 149 individuals in the last three months as well as the recovery of items valued in excess of \$56,047.90, including caches of arms, weapons, and explosives. Voluminous examples of the above are set forth in the details which follows.

High-level Information Regarding
National and International
Communist Activities

During the past six months our top informants in the Communist Party, USA, (CPUSA), CG 5824-S* and NY 694-S*, have continued to provide highest level coverage not only of the CPUSA but of the international communist movement as well. CG 5824-S* traveled on Solo Missions 31 and 32 during this period. By letters dated 6/13/69 and 8/25/69 Department of State indicated that data developed by this source was "extremely valuable, very enlightening, and useful." CG 5824-S* is currently abroad on Solo Mission 33 accompanying Gus Hall, General Secretary, CPUSA, on a visit to Hanoi, North Vietnam, to attend the funeral of the late Ho Chi-Minh. In addition, in August, 1969, CG 5824-S* developed information concerning the Sino-Soviet dispute which was considered extremely important by the intelligence community since it substantiated information previously received from other sources regarding Soviet intentions. During this period NY 694-S* has continued to meet clandestinely with his Soviet contact to exchange messages and has received \$550,000 of the Party's \$1,500,000 subsidy for 1969 from the Soviets.

World Peace Council in East Berlin, 6/21-23/69

[redacted] attended the World Peace Council in East Berlin, Germany, 6/21-23/69. The report included first-hand information on position of Soviet delegation who advocated increased activity by peace movements throughout the world, calling for specific actions on July 4th, July 20th (Anniversary of Geneva Accords), and August 6th (Anniversary of Hiroshima bombing). Informant also reported remarks of North Vietnamese

Ambassador relating to position and possibility of progress at Paris Peace talks. This information was disseminated by teletype to the White House, State Department, and other agencies to which it was of considerable value.

National Anti-War Conference
in Cleveland 7/4,5/69

[redacted] attended the National Anti-War Conference held in Cleveland, Ohio, 7/4,5/69. The report submitted by this informant gave a detailed accounting of the plans made for future activities as well as the positions taken by New Left Key Activists and other various personages in the anti-war movement. This conference set in motion the organizing for demonstrations at the Summer White House in San Clemente, California, in August, 1969; demonstrations and possible confrontations in Chicago in October, 1969, during trial of the eight individuals indicted for their activities at time of Democratic National Convention; massive demonstrations in Washington, D. C., in November, 1969; and other activities including a "moratorium on business as usual," calling for a strike of students. This information was of extreme importance at all levels of government, and was appropriately disseminated.

for a Democratic Society (SDS)

[redacted] is a most valuable informant involved in the SDS, a militant, anarchist, revolutionary organization headquartered in Chicago. This informant has sufficient access to SDS national headquarters to provide and has provided the Bureau with exceptional information concerning the various factions within SDS, their objectives, and future plans for disruptive activities. [redacted] has attended [redacted] meetings [redacted] This informant is making very promising progress.

Informant Causes SDS Summer Work-In
Project to Fail

[redacted] is a student at Toledo University, Toledo, Ohio. During this summer he was one of over 40 SDS members who became involved in an SDS Summer Work-In project in the State of Ohio, primarily Columbus. The SDS members involved in this project were subjects of numerous arrests by the Columbus Police Department because of the very valuable information furnished by this informant and he was most instrumental in causing this project, designed to cause disruption and disorders in Columbus, to fail.

For Chicago to Start 9/24/69

Demonstrations protesting the trials of individuals for their activities during the Democratic National Convention, Chicago, Illinois.

The SDS, the Black Panther Party (BPP), the New Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, and other protest groups have sent out a call for a massive demonstration to be held in Chicago, Illinois, during the trials of eight individuals for their activities during the Democratic National Convention. The trials are to start 9/24/69.

A split over the nature of the demonstration has occurred between SDS and other participating organizations. Current information indicates the demonstrations will start on October 8 with SDS attempting to organize a militant confrontation with authorities. The New Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (NMC) plans its action later in the month but with a more peaceful format.

This situation is potentially explosive since it has both New Left and racial overtones.

The following sources have furnished particularly valuable information with respect to this planned demonstration:

[redacted] a student at Portland State College, Portland, Oregon, who is a member of SDS; [redacted] is a member of the Black United Front (BUF) of Washington, D. C., and the Washington Mobilization Committee, which is a branch of the NMC. b7D

Demonstrations Scheduled for
Washington, D. C., in November, 1969

The NMC is sponsoring a massive anti-war demonstration in Washington, D. C., on 11/15/69. Recently the BUF, Washington, D. C., demanded that the NMC make a payment to the BUF of \$25,000. This payment would be made for BUF's cooperation during the demonstration. This demand has caused extreme problems for NMC as it does not have the funds to make the payment. BUF has remained adamant and stated its demands are not negotiable. It is essential that we follow the conflict between these two groups and if possible take such action as might be possible to so discourage NMC that it will cancel this demonstration.

The Danger of Campus Violence, Steps
Towards its Solution and Effectiveness

As of June, 1968, there were 2,489 institutions of higher learning in the U.S., of which more than 1,000 are 4-year accredited colleges and universities. There are over 7,000,000 college students. The Educational Testing Center estimates 2% of students are wreckers who aim to "radicalize" the campuses.

From September, 1968, through May, 1969, demonstrations have occurred on over 200 college campuses throughout the U.S. Over 30 can be called serious. In some instances schools have closed. Over 2,300 arrests have been made and damages to facilities have exceeded \$2,500,000.

Our informant coverage in colleges and universities is on a very select basis and of the 2,489 such institutions in the U.S., we have informant coverage in an extremely small percentage of them. Our policy is to develop coverage only where there is potential dangerousness and we can prevent or curtail injury to persons and damage to property by keeping forewarned of campus violence and, of course, detect subversion.

Through our informant coverage we have on several occasions been able to warn appropriate authorities of planned violence and they have then succeeded in taking action which greatly curtailed both injury and property damage.

During the 1968-69 academic year what can be considered as major student disturbances occurred at such colleges as University of California at Berkeley, City College of New York, and Stanford University. During these periods of unrest, informants furnished invaluable information regarding the activities and planning of student disruptionists. Among the informants so employed were:

In view of continuing need for economy in operating costs and recognizing possibility of effecting savings through re-examination of our Security Informant Program, the attached SAC Letter should go forward requiring each Special Agent in Charge to conduct a detailed analysis of his informant program with a view of retrenchment, refinement and/or elimination of duplication.

In 1967 we directed Legat, Mexico City to review his informant program to determine if savings could be effected through refinement. Emphasis was placed on quality rather than quantity and it was found that a number of informants were furnishing primarily corroborative data, which, although desirable while establishing reliability and integrity of other sources, could be cutback without curtailment of effectiveness of overall coverage. Legat, Mexico made cutbacks resulting in projected annual savings of more than [redacted]

In 1968, using the same basic approach, refinement of our Border Coverage (BOCOV) program resulted in projected annual savings of more than [redacted]. Comparison of results achieved under the refined informant operations with those prior thereto has shown there has been no significant loss of coverage.

General
Detailed analysis of the Bureau's whole security informant program throughout the field could result in comparative savings through cutbacks and refinement, without curtailment of efficient operations. The field is in the best position to make an on-the-scene analysis of individual informant situations and submit appropriate recommendations which could result in savings. Naturally, any resulting reduction in overall informant statistics must be taken into account during future field inspections. It will also be necessary, however, that the field inspectors continue to make certain that cutting back nonessential informant coverage does not result in a letdown on the part of individual Special Agents in the continuing search for well qualified, productive informants.

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SUGGESTION

It is suggested that an informant card file be established and made available to all Special Agents at all times in each Division Headquarters City and all Resident Agency cities in which more than six Agents are assigned. This card file would not contain the names of the CI or PCI but would only reflect the 137 file number and the case agent. Each file would contain information relative to informants in the one city or metropolitan area only. Information concerning the informants would be filed behind index tabs indicating the "specialty" of the informant, such as Negro, Prostitute, Salvage Operator, Greek, Homosexual, Con Man, etc.; and location of residence and activities by general areas such as northwest portion of city. The index tabs in each file would vary depending upon the particular city in which the file was maintained and the informants in the file.

Current practice or rule (Include manual citation as well as facts)

No procedure is currently outlined in the Manual of Rules and Regulations which makes the services and knowledge of all informants available for use of all Special Agents in all investigative matters.

Advantages of suggestion and annual savings (Include basis for estimate)

1. It would fully utilize the knowledge of all informants in all FBI investigative matters rather than just in the matters under investigation by the informant case agent. Numerous cases have occurred in the past where Bureau fugitives were sought for a considerable period of time but were apprehended immediately upon receipt of information from an informant who could have provided the information earlier if aware of the fugitive status of the subject.
2. Potential Criminal Informants could be developed into Criminal Informants or closed more rapidly due to the numerous investigative matters upon which they could be questioned in a short period of time.

Disadvantages of suggestion

An initial disadvantage would be the time and printing costs required to put this system into effect. However, once the system is established, paperwork and manhours required would be an absolute minimum.

At the time an informant was opened the case agent would determine the manner in which the informant could most logically furnish information and have the informant indexed accordingly. This could be accomplished by the case agent completing a 3" x 5" card or form in legible hand printing with a copy for each area in which the informant was to be indexed. The number of index cards on each informant would vary from two to any number, depending upon the particular informant. Enclosure One is a sample form which could be printed for this purpose, possibly with carbon paper preinserted as with the currently used assignment cards.

A copy of the index card would be filed in the informant file. FD-237, Criminal Informant Review Sheet, could be amended to reflect the filing of the index card in the file and also to reflect the fact that the index cards were removed when the file was closed. In the event the index cards were not removed, the mistake would be noticed and corrected upon receipt of the next request for an informant contact.

Special Agents working cases would then have the full advantage of the knowledge of every informant in the metropolitan area in which he was conducting investigation. Upon receiving an investigative matter he could quickly review the Informant Index File and determine the 137 file numbers of all informants who could logically furnish information relative to his particular investigation. He would then send a lead to the informant case agent. This could be done in legible hand printing on a form with two copies to the 137 file. Enclosure Two is a sample form which could be utilized for this purpose. A notation would be made in the investigative case file on the top serial when this form was sent to the informant file, such as: FD-1234 to 137-1234 and 137-5678 on 12/12/70.

Upon completion of the informant contact the informant case agent would record the information provided by the informant or a negative contact on the bottom of the request form in legible hand printing and send the original back to the investigative case file with the duplicate to the informant file to record the informant contact.

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ADVANTAGES: (continued from page 1)

3. Security, racial and criminal informant could be utilized in all matters which are investigated by the FBI, rather than only in one particular area, such as security as in the case of security informants. Of course, all contacts would be at the discretion of the informant case agent.
4. A conservative estimate of the value of the annual savings due to the resulting reduction in investigative manhours would be b7E
5. This program could be particularly valuable in Organized Crime investigations where all informants are questioned concerning specific individuals under investigation.

An example of this could be information provided by a prostitute concerning hijacking activities on the part of an individual under investigation when it was not even known by the FBI that the prostitute was acquainted with this individual.

The following is an evaluation of the results of our efforts to control tightly and with great selectivity the use of informants and sources on the campuses of educational institutions.

Dem.
SAC letter 69-55, dated 9/26/69, and captioned "Security and Racial Informants" instructed each Special Agent in Charge to submit a quarterly letter regarding each student or teacher authorized for contact as a potential informant, informant or panel source in security and racial matters. The letter was to contain sufficient information to justify the continued utilization of the sources.

An analysis of the results of this survey shows the following figures for Bureau-approved informants and sources on campus: Security Informants - 78, Potential Security Informants - 68, Confidential Sources - 47, Panel Sources - 11, Racial Informants and Sources - 53. These figures represent a total of 257 students and teachers authorized. The field in each instance, except for two discontinuances by Las Vegas Office, indicated these sources represent the bare essentials necessary for adequate coverage in fulfilling the Bureau's responsibilities and that any further discontinuances would seriously impair this coverage. During the current academic year campuses have been plagued with the actions of militant New Left extremists. For example: in excess of 300 campus demonstrations have taken place during which 400 arrests have been made; 42 sit-ins have occurred; 14 demonstrators and 50 officers injured; 22 cases of arson and 3 cases of bombing reported; and approximately one and one-half million dollars in damages to campus facilities have been inflicted during these incidents.

SAC Burns, Oklahoma City, the Domestic Intelligence and Special Investigative Divisions all opposed adoption. SAC Burns advised the procedure would be difficult to administer and that a memorandum to all Agents requesting contact with logical informants accomplishes the same end. Domestic Intelligence Division noted present rules regarding security informants, potential security informants and confidential sources provide that an office may maintain an "Agents' Informative Index" which is maintained by SAC, ASAC or Security Supervisor consistent with maximum security and which is available to all Special Agents. Special Investigative Division advised rules relating to criminal informant matters indicate that an index is to be maintained in each office but not in resident agencies. This type of index would appear sufficient.

This card file would not contain the names of the Confidential Informant (CI) or Potential Confidential Informant (PCI) but would only reflect the 137 file number and the case Agent. Each file would contain information relative to informants in the one city or metropolitan area only. Information concerning the informants would be filed behind the index tabs indicating the "speciality" of the informant, such as Negro, Prostitute, Salvage Operator, Greek, Homosexual, Con Man, etc.; and location of residence and activities by general areas such as, north-west portion of city. The index tabs in each file would vary depending upon the particular city in which the file was maintained and the informants in the file. At the time an informant was developed, the case Agent would determine the manner in which the informant could most logically furnish information and have the informant indexed accordingly. This could be accomplished by the case Agent completing a three- by five-inch card or form in legible hand printing with a copy for each area in which the informant was to be indexed. The number of index cards on each informant would vary from two to any number, depending upon the particular informant. Enclosure One attached to the background material is a sample form which could be printed for this purpose possibly with preinserted carbon as is currently used in assignment cards.

A copy of the index card would be filed in the informant file. FD-237, Criminal Informant Review Sheet, could be amended to reflect the filing of the index card in the file and also to reflect the fact that the index cards were removed when the file was closed. In the event the index cards were ^{not} removed, the mistake would be noticed and corrected upon receipt of the next request for an informant contact.

Special Agents working cases would then have the full advantage of the knowledge of every informant in the metropolitan area in which he was conducting investigation. Upon receiving an investigative matter, he could quickly review the Informant Index File and determine the 137 file numbers of all informants who could logically furnish information relative to his particular investigation. He would then send a lead to the informant case Agent and this could be done in legible hand printing on a form with two copies to the 137 file. Enclosure Two attached to the background material is a sample form which could be used for this purpose. A notation would be made in the investigative case file on the top serial when this form was sent to the informant file, such as: FD-1234 to 137-1234 and 137-5678 on 12/12/70.

Upon completion of the informant contact, the informant case Agent would record the information provided by the informant or a negative contact on the bottom of the request form in legible hand printing and send the original back to the investigative case file with the duplicate to the informant file to record the informant contact.

CURRENT PRACTICE: The suggester states no procedure is currently outlined in the Manual of Rules and Regulations which makes the services and knowledge of all informants available for use of all Special Agents in all investigative matters.

ADVANTAGES: (1) SA [REDACTED] states the procedure would fully utilize the knowledge of all informants in all FBI investigative matters rather than just in the matters under investigation by the informant case Agent. Numerous cases have occurred in the past where Bureau fugitives were sought for a considerable period of time but were apprehended immediately upon receipt of information from an informant who could have provided the information earlier if aware of the fugitive status of the subject. (2) PCIs could be developed into CIs or closed more rapidly due to the numerous investigative matters upon which

they could be questioned in a short period of time. (3) Security, racial and criminal informants could be used in all matters which are investigated by the FBI, rather than only in one particular area, such as security investigations in the case of security informants. Of course, all contacts would be at the discretion of the informant case Agent. (4) A conservative estimate of the value of the annual saving due to the resulting reduction in investigative man-hours would be [redacted] (5) This program could be particularly valuable in organized crime investigations where all informants are questioned concerning specific individuals under investigation.

DISADVANTAGES: SA [redacted] notes an initial disadvantage would be the time and printing costs required to put this system into effect. However, once it is established, paper work and man-hours required would be an absolute minimum.

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OBSERVATIONS: SAC Burns, Oklahoma City, did not recommend adoption pointing out the procedure would be difficult to administer. A memorandum to all Agents requesting contact with logical informants accomplishes the same end.

The Domestic Intelligence Division stated present regulations with respect to security informants, potential security informants and confidential sources, provide that an office may maintain an "Agents' Informative Index," which is to be maintained by the SAC, ASAC or Security Supervisor in a manner consistent with maximum security and which is available to all Special Agents. This index is set up by geographical location within a division and behind each geographical location appears a guide card indicating the type information informant is capable of furnishing, e.g., Communist Party, Racial, Polish Activity. This Division was of the opinion the existing rules now adequately provide for the establishment of an informant index as proposed and

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that it is the decision of each office as to whether such an index is to be maintained. For security reasons, it did not consider it desirable to provide such an index for resident agencies regardless of the number of personnel assigned.

Special Investigative Division advised the Manual of Instructions, relating to CI matters, indicates that a CI index is to be maintained in each field office but not in resident agencies. The type of information an informant can provide, his location, employment, et cetera, is available on these cards. This Division agreed with the SAC, Oklahoma City, and recommended idea not be adopted.

Due to the views expressed by all interested parties to this idea, the Training Division agrees the procedure as set forth should not be approved.

The census of population and housing will begin April 1, 1970, on which occasion information will be elicited concerning the identity of employer, employment site, nature of business, occupation, and whether employment is by private enterprise or Government agency.

Our informants understand they are not Bureau employees and that their confidential relationship with the FBI must be kept in strict confidence at all times. Therefore, we should instruct all informants to answer the inquiries of census enumerators taking care not to disclose their confidential relationship with the FBI.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the attached letter to all field offices be approved in accordance with the above. No manual or handbook changes are necessary.

needs in the informant field and could be so advised during the new Agents' training and at that time be requested to furnish names of individuals known to them as possibly having informant potential.

Special Investigative Division stated same idea was previously considered and rejected. It was pointed out that new Agents directly out of college or law school would not have the type of contacts or background to assist the FBI in the criminal informant field. It was also noted that those new Agents who might have had previous experience with another law enforcement agency would undoubtedly have had limited experience in a position which would have afforded association with potential informants. This Division felt the compilation of any list of potential informants or confidential sources by first office Agents from their home areas would not be warranted since it would be purely a speculative judgment on the part of the new Agents.

Inspection Division stated it did not agree. If a new Agent could turn over a potential informant in his home area, he should certainly do so. It is very unlikely, however, that our Agents would have had many contacts of this sort and a formal program as proposed would only add to red tape.

Training Division also opposes adoption. Development of good informants is the result of personal relationship built up between Agent and informant and is done for personal reasons, despite monetary considerations. If this were placed in the Manual as a rule, Agents would be furnishing names just to comply and we would receive hundreds of names of no value which would use valuable investigative time. Former law enforcement officers who enter the FBI might give the names of some of their previous informants who, upon approach by the FBI, might report such contact to local law enforcement agency they are serving and cause bad relations between the FBI and that agency for trying to "steal" their sources.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising him of this fact. He has been thanked by prior letter.

Infiltration of Radical Groups Will Continue, Chief Pledges

Berkeley Police Chief Bruce Baker said yesterday radical groups here advocating revolution can expect to undergo attempts at infiltration by undercover police.

And the south campus area police foot patrol will continue, he told merchants and city officials at a special Chamber of Commerce meeting yesterday.

He said recent disclosure that a BPD undercover agent who had worked within three University of California campus radical organizations was exposed is no deterrent to plans for continued information-gathering.

At a meeting called on behalf of the merchants and owners of about 100 shops and stores affected by vandalism here Monday, Chief Baker covered a variety of police issues and observations. Among them:

- "We're fighting a guerrilla-type action" and if the military guidelines of 11 men to every guerrilla were really implemented "we would need 50,000 police in Berkeley."

- There were "no specific orders not to shoot" during Monday's riot, but the intradepartmental regulations on use of firearms were enforced that day as they always are.

- Among the reasons for not using tear gas Monday were the hour involved (about 5 p.m., when pedestrian and automotive traffic are at their peak in the south campus area), rain and gusty winds and "a command decision to be very cautious in the use of gas."

- Alameda County sheriff's deputies are not eager to come to this city because of the treatment some of them received but would do so under "mutual aid."

(Twelve Alameda County sheriff's deputies have been indicted and arraigned on charges of violations of civil rights during last May's "People's Park" riots.)

- "Mutual aid" was in fact invoked, but

Recommendation is being made that a proposed letter, which is enclosed, be sent to all Special Agents in Charge. It instructs that every feasible effort be made to obtain essential informant coverage of militant New Left activities taking place off campus.

Until recently, New Left groups have been primarily campus based. They are now becoming more and more involved in off-campus activities and their leaders are advocating terroristic actions such as sabotage and assassinations. In view of their propensity to violate the law, informant coverage is urgently needed. Much of the coverage will be available only from individuals who are students.

(We have only one of this age)

Recently a 19-year-old student furnished valuable information concerning the initial plans of the Worker Student Alliance and its subsequent participating in a strike against General Electric. In view of his potential to provide urgently needed coverage of militant activities by student groups off campus, recommendation was made and approved that he be developed as a security informant for off-campus coverage. In that connection, the memorandum in his case noted that instructions issued to all Special Agents in Charge under date of 9/26/69 specified that no student under age of 21 should be developed as a campus security or racial informant except in highly unusual circumstances but that in his case he was to be used off campus.

We must expand coverage in order to keep abreast of plans for violence by these groups and to develop potential witnesses where there is a violation of the law. Therefore, in the event any student volunteers information concerning plans for violence by a New Left group, the field office should promptly submit its recommendation to the Bureau for continued contact with the student even though he may be under the age of 21. Also, whenever information is received concerning possible

This sets forth our analysis of an evaluation made 4/1/70 by field offices concerning each student and teacher being used as an informant or source.

SAC Letter 69-55 of 9/26/69, captioned "Security and Racial Informants," instructed every office to submit a cover letter analyzing coverage being afforded by campus sources together with a letter justifying continuation of each student and teacher authorized by the Bureau for use as an informant or source. An analysis of the 4/1/70 survey shows that a total of 205 students and teachers are being utilized as informants or sources. This is a decrease of 52 since an analysis was made of the 1/1/70 quarterly survey. The field has indicated in each instance that these informants and sources are providing essential coverage of New Left and racial activities.

During the past several years, violent demonstrations have erupted on college campuses throughout the United States. Coverage provided by students and teachers used as informants and sources has been invaluable and in many instances not available through other sources. In view of the sensitive area in which these individuals operate, great selectivity and tight control are necessary. Field offices have been alerted to this fact, particularly through the above SAC Letter. We will continue to make certain that a tight control is maintained.

Reference SAC Letter 70-12(A) dated 3/10/70, which advised the field of the Departmental analysis on the possible effect of Swanner v. U. S., a recent decision by the United States District Court for the Middle District of Alabama. In that case the government was held liable under the Federal Tort Claims Act for damages resulting when the home of a "special employee" of the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division of the Internal Revenue Service was bombed. Liability was based on the theory that after being notified of a threat to the special employee, the government failed to use reasonable care to protect him. The Department pointed out that "Federal investigative agencies are advised to take this decision into consideration when dealing with special employees, informers, and government witnesses."

Established procedures provide that protection of government witnesses is the responsibility of the U. S. Marshal. (Manual of Rules and Regulations, Part II, Section 8Q, p. 28.) Under the Swanner rationale, an informant would be entitled to the same protection as would a witness, however, the Manual provisions do not extend the Marshal's responsibility to an informant prior to the time he becomes a Department witness.

If an informant is threatened, the decision to afford protection should be made on a case by-case basis. In some situations where it is imperative that the informant's identity not be disclosed, it will be necessary for the Bureau to provide the requisite protection. In other cases, where the identity of the informant has become known, then a request directed to cooperative local authorities for protection may be in order. Consequently, it is recommended that the Manual of Rules and Regulations be amended to require the field office receiving information concerning a threat against an informant to immediately advise the Bureau so that a decision as to protection may be made. If the threat is against a government witness, the U. S. Marshal will be advised.

It is noted that this case was previously before the U. S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit on Swanner's appeal from an adverse ruling at the first trial. The Fifth Circuit, while agreeing with the trial court on the government's duty to protect Swanner, remanded the case for a new trial holding that to prove the government's negligence was the proximate cause of the injury required only a preponderance of the evidence rather than a somewhat higher standard imposed at the first trial. Swanner v. U. S., 406 F.2d 716 (1969). Assistant United States Attorney Ray Acton of the Northern District of Alabama (who is handling the case even though it was tried in the Middle District of Alabama) advised the Birmingham Division on 3/20/70, that notice of appeal will be filed before 3/26/70, although no final determination has yet been made on requesting a review by the Fifth Circuit.

The status of this case will be followed closely with Birmingham and the Department and if the effect of Swanner is changed as a result of consideration by the appellate courts, the field will be advised.





THE MANUAL OF RULES AND REGULATIONS

Part II, Section 8Q, Item 1, page 28, of the Manual of Rules and Regulations should be amended as follows:

Q. THREATS AGAINST INFORMANTS OR WITNESSES -
PROTECTION AND MAINTENANCE OF INFORMANTS
AND WITNESSES.

1. Under the Federal Tort Claims Act, the government may be held liable for damages or injuries to an informant or government witness when the government had knowledge of a threat to harm such person and failed to use reasonable care in providing protection. Upon receipt of information of a threat against an informant, immediately advise the Bureau of any action taken and furnish sufficient detail to permit a decision on protection of such informant to be made. When the threat concerns a government witness, immediately advise the U. S. Marshal who has the responsibility of affording protection.

This is in response to the Director's inquiry as to the nature of the services military intelligence can provide in connection with the development of sources on campus.

The military intelligence services have many active duty personnel who are attending college as part of their duties. The identities of these individuals could be made available to us with the purpose in mind of utilizing their services as campus sources. Also, the identities of intelligence personnel of various services who are due for discharge and intend to attend college could be furnished to us. With this information, we could consider the development of some of these personnel. However, if we were to utilize active duty personnel, it is noted that an agreement would have to be reached concerning restrictions set forth in the Delimitations Agreement relating to the jurisdiction of the FBI, and, also, the question of control of active duty personnel would undoubtedly create some problems. In the event we were to use former intelligence personnel, this could be done on an individual basis, as needs warrant, in accordance with current Bureau procedures, since these latter individuals are not on active military duty and hence would be under our complete control.

The above is an increase of [] from the amount spent in June, 1970. During this period 488 new informants were developed. We are now operating 562 informants in the black extremist field, 5,929 in ghetto areas and 450 in Klan and white hate groups. The total number of racial informants being operated is 6,837.

Examples of the information furnished by our informants are as follows: Ghetto informants of the Knoxville Division furnished information regarding black extremists contacting white merchants and asking for donations for underprivileged children and when these merchants refused to donate their stores were fire bombed. A Los Angeles racial informant was invited to travel to Cuba with the Third Venceremos Brigade and possibly travel to North Korea with a Communist Party member from Los Angeles. A New York informant furnished identities of black extremists who were scheduled to depart the United States for Al Fatah camps in Middle East for possible guerilla training.

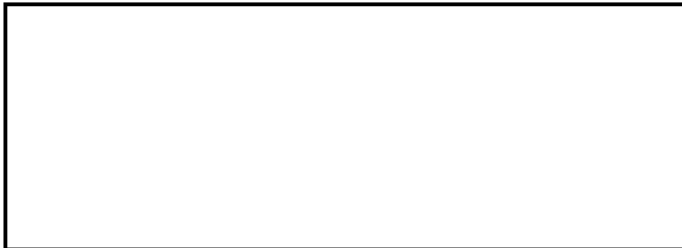

The NYO besides carefully reviewing the YLP organ "Palante", for the identities of YLP members, monitors the YLP weekly radio program, "Palante" as well as known appearances of the organization's members on other TV and radio programs.

The NYO will continue diligent efforts to effectively penetrate or develop quality informants within the YLP who can afford the Bureau day to day information on the organization. A number of YLP members are now under active investigation and most, exclusive of the leadership, prior to recommending for inclusion in the Security Index, will be interviewed to determine their informant potential.

(B) RACIAL AND SECURITY INFORMANTS -- I am again calling to your attention instructions previously issued concerning the need for strict control of racial and security informants as well as the continuing need for quality informants.

The necessity for in-depth quality informants in the racial and security field is more imperative than ever under present conditions in view of the upsurge in violence. I will not tolerate complacency or backsliding in informant coverage.

There must be close control and supervision of informants as well as the Special Agents handling these informants in this extremely sensitive field. As you are well aware, embarrassment brought about by the activities of an informant in the racial or security field could endanger our entire intelligence gathering operation. Accordingly, you must insure that these matters are given the supervision that is required and you must also insure that all payments to informants are made on a C.O.D. basis and full value is received for each payment made.

I expect quality informants to be developed in these extremist groups at a regular rate and that these informants furnish the necessary intelligence information in order that we can fulfill our obligations.

SUGGESTION: When racial, security and criminal informants are terminated, in the event these informants are reinstated, SAC authority be granted to pay these individuals in the amount of immediately regardless of the amount of money which has been paid to the informants previously. b7E

CURRENT PRACTICE: The suggester states the Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, Section 130H, I, instructs that prior Bureau authority must be obtained to make any additional payment to an individual who has received payments totaling b7E

ADVANTAGES: SA feels, if the informant could be paid immediately under SAC authority, without regard to the amount of money previously expended, this would facilitate immediate payment to the informant. Many times informants are in need of immediate cash funds and cannot wait two weeks or more for correspondence from the field office to the Bureau.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC Bachman, Newark Office, recommended present policy be retained so that the Bureau rather than the SAC will have control over this matter.

Administrative Division states the present regulation has been in effect for years and has served as an excellent control over our confidential expenditures to informants. This Division did not know how many times circumstances have existed whereby informants were in immediate need for cash in the past, but it felt there have been relatively few, and in those cases if conditions should warrant, the field could telephonically contact the Bureau for the necessary authorization. This procedure has been used in certain instances. There are instances where confidential informants are reinstated and the Bureau would need to make the decision regarding any further use of a particular informant and to establish the amount of any future payments commensurate with the value of services to be rendered. Furthermore, since the Bureau

[redacted] requires the field to obtain Bureau authority for payments to active informants once the [redacted] SAC authority has been exhausted, there has not been presented here sufficient justification to make a change in the regulations to accommodate discontinued informant who may be reinstated. Since the main reason to limit SAC authority on confidential payments is to enable the Bureau to have control over our confidential expenditures, this Division felt the idea should not be adopted.

b7E

Domestic Intelligence Division felt the suggestion had merit. It advised there did not appear to be any reason why SAC authority could not be reinstated should the informant be reactivated at a later date. Such a procedure would afford the Agent handling the informant funds to pay him for information furnished and services rendered. Bureau authority for the payment of services and expenses on a continuing basis could then be obtained at a later date. This is a practical approach in handling this situation and would provide the Agent a necessary degree of latitude in handling his informant.

Special Investigative Division stated the idea has merit with regard to reinstated informants; however, the number of such cases is extremely small and the advantage of changing our present procedure would provide us little if any benefits. This would be particularly true since the SAC could circumvent requesting Bureau authority to expend additional sums of [redacted] by merely closing an informant's case ^{b7E} and subsequently reopening it and thereby be allowed to expend the additional money.

Due to the views of the Administrative and Special Investigative Divisions, the Training Division agrees our present procedure should remain in effect at this time.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising him of this fact. His idea has been acknowledged by prior letter.

Security Informants - General

This sets forth our analysis of an evaluation made 12/1/70 by field offices concerning each student and teacher being used as an informant or source.

July

SAC Letter 69-55 of 9/26/69 captioned "Security and Racial Informants," instructed each office to submit a letter analyzing coverage being afforded by campus sources together with a letter justifying continuation of each student and teacher authorized by the Bureau for use as an informant or source. An analysis of 12/1/70 survey shows that a total of 316 students and teachers are being utilized as informants or sources. This is an increase of 114 since an analysis made 7/1/70. The field has indicated in each instance that these informants and sources are providing essential and needed coverage of New Left and racial activities.

Coverage provided by students and teachers used as informants and sources has been invaluable in connection with demonstrations on campus and destruction of campus facilities. In view of the sensitive area in which these individuals operate great selectivity and tight control are necessary. Field offices have been alerted to this fact and we will continue to make certain that a tight control is maintained.

Attached proposed SAC letter recommends communications in security informant and source matters contain precise character designations to facilitate and expedite the routing of mail.

Expeditious handling of security informant and confidential source matters is vital to continued efficient operations in this important area of our work. Current reorganization of the Domestic Intelligence Division has brought about revised handling of security informants by the Internal Security and New Left Sections. Basic change is the discontinuance of the Security Informant Desk, which administratively processed all security-type informants, to a system whereby individual informants and sources will in the future be processed by the substantive desk to which they are most closely related. For example, all informants reporting on the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), will be processed and supervised by supervisors handling CPUSA substantive matters; all informants reporting primarily on Socialist Workers Party (SWP) will be processed by supervisor handling that organization. The new procedure makes it imperative that a precise character be included in captions of communications in security informant and source matters. Such action will insure an orderly, efficient flow of mail to appropriate Sections.

SYNOPSIS

SA Wiltgen proposes in all informant files when they have been closed and must be reopened that the old pink Informant Review Sheets, FD-237 for Criminal Informants and FD-238 for Security Informants, respectively, be serialized into the file for background information and a new FD-237 or FD-238, as appropriate, be made for current, up-to-date data. This would replace the old form as the top unserialized document in the file.

Domestic Intelligence, Special Investigative and Training Divisions can see no benefits to be realized from the proposed procedure. If the old form is serialized, it will soon become buried completely in the file. Manual provisions definitely state these forms must remain unserialized at top of files to act as a Table of Contents. The proper procedure to be used when a file must be reopened is to leave the pink sheet in the file and add any new information to it. Of course if the form has become mutilated during the intervening time, a new form would be prepared from the old one and the new information added to it.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising him of this fact. His idea has been acknowledged by prior letter.

DETAILS

SUGGESTION: In instances where Potential Criminal Informant (PCI), Criminal Informant (CI), Security Informant (SI) or Potential Security Informant (PSI) files have been closed but must be reopened that the original pink sheet, Form FD-237 for CIs and FD-238 for SIs be serialized in the file and a new unserialized FD-237 or FD-238 be placed in the file for current information.

CURRENT PRACTICE: The suggester states there are no manual instructions relating to the use of these forms; however, printed instructions on the bottom of each reads as follows: "No Serial Number; Keep on top of other serials in file."

ADVANTAGES: SA Wiltgen states this procedure will provide the following advantages: (1) It would provide a permanent record of information regarding informants. (2) It would be a continuous chronological history of informants. (3) It would provide a convenient and ready reference for Agent handling informant to refer to prior information affecting informant.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC Rogge, Honolulu, advised this idea was discussed with the suggester as a result of several closed informant cases being reopened. This appears to be a logical and beneficial procedure and he recommended it be approved.

The Domestic Intelligence Division stated the advantages presented by the suggestion are also obtained by merely keeping the original pink sheet on top of the file and adding new information to it as is the present practice. If the original pink sheet were serialized into the file, it could be buried under other serials and no longer serve as the ready reference for which it was designed. This Division opposed adoption.

Special Investigative Division pointed out that Section 108F, 9, page 4a Volume IV, Manual of Instructions (containing all administrative details and instructions relating to the handling of CI Program) specifically instructs the field that the use of Form FD-237 has been approved in CI and PCI files and that it is to be used in the nature of a Table of Contents or as an Index to show where in the file particular data can be found pertaining to the informant. This manual provision

also instructs that Form FD-237 be kept as the top document in the pertinent informant file and is not to be serialized. By leaving the existing FD-237 as top document in the file, there is no need to create a second such form when file is reopened as proposed. This was confirmed by a check with Washington Field, Alexandria and Chicago Offices. This Division accordingly recommended against approval.

Training Division agrees and can see no advantages to the proposed procedure. The informant review sheet serves as a Table of Contents of the information contained in each informant file. If a file is reopened, the original informant review sheet should be continued to be filed as a "top serial" and all new information posted thereon. In the event the old form is mutilated, a new form would then be prepared and the data on the old form transferred thereon. There is no need for the proposed procedure.

PURPOSE:

To recommend SAC Letter be sent reiterating Bureau instructions that necessary precautions be taken with security informants to insure they do not obtain or report information concerning defense plans and/or strategy of individuals involved in New Left activities and who are subjects of criminal proceedings.

BACKGROUND:

Many individuals involved in New Left activities have been or may become involved in violations of local and Federal laws. We recently referred to the Department information concerning an informant who had established contacts with attorneys and other individuals associated with People's Law Office, a Chicago-based organization which is considered to be a contact point for the Weatherman underground. Department's advice was requested as to possible utilization of this informant to obtain information concerning the underground and location of missing Weatherman, recognizing that he might inadvertently learn of defense plans and/or strategy of New Left individuals who are subjects of criminal proceedings.

The Internal Security Division of the Department has concluded the informant may be used to obtain information concerning Weatherman underground and location of its missing members. He is to be instructed that should the occasion arise where he is present in conversation between an attorney and an individual under criminal indictment he should immediately leave. If unable to do so, he is not to report substance of any such conversation to the FBI. Additionally, informant is also to be instructed not to engage in or report substance of a conversation with a criminal defendant dealing with the offense for which defendant is under indictment.

RE: SECURITY INFORMANTS

OBSERVATIONS:

Section 107 of the Manual of Instructions concerning security informants notes that security informants are not to be involved in preparation of defense of subversive-type individuals. If this is unavoidable, information concerning these matters is not to be reported. In view of Department's decision in this matter and numerous involvements of New Leftists in criminal violations, it is believed that these instructions should be reiterated to the field at this time. Chicago has been advised separately of Department's decision concerning informant in contact with People's Law Office attorneys. Appropriate Manual and Handbook changes will be handled separately.

Furthermore, to avoid possible attacks on the credibility of security informants who are utilized as witnesses in Government proceedings, we are also advising field that they are to make no promises to these informants concerning payment of funds as to relocation or subsistence. Such arrangements are to be made between informants who are no longer being utilized by us and local United States Attorneys or the Department, thus avoiding any incidents which would place us in a compromising position.

Cotter to Brennan memorandum dated 5/24/71 (attached) furnished, at the Director's request, the definition of a Panel Source, Potential Security Informant (PSI), and Security Informant (SI). As indicated, a Panel Source is an individual not involved in a subversive group but who will attend its public gatherings in behalf of the FBI for intelligence purposes or as a potential witness. The Director noted, "This is really a Panel Informant." Regarding all of these the Director further noted, "I assume any one of the above may be paid by FBI for services rendered."

As a matter of fact, the Director's observation is correct. While the difference is perhaps semantic, we have distinguished between sources and informants for better administrative handling. Informants or potential informants are those whom we desire to penetrate the innermost sanctum of an organization or group being investigated. The sources, on the other hand, are individuals who by virtue of position can furnish desired information, or in the case of Panel Sources, can be called upon to get information or evidence which could be introduced in court without exposing or surfacing a valuable informant. Even though we might pay a Panel Source for efforts made to obtain information, for administrative purposes we, nevertheless, list him as a source.

The Director's assumption that Panel Sources, PSIs, and SIs may be paid by the FBI for services rendered is absolutely right, although none can be paid except on a c.o.d. basis and their production is closely scrutinized.

Pursuant to the Director's inquiry, there is set forth hereafter a definition of the following sources and informants:

1. Panel Source. A panel source is an individual not involved in a subversive group but who will attend its public gatherings in behalf of the FBI for intelligence purposes or as a potential witness. *This is really a Panel Informant.*

2. Potential Security Informant (PSI). A PSI is an individual in position to become active in or closely connected with a subversive organization or in intelligence activities and is making affirmative effort to obtain and furnish current information to the Bureau regarding such subversive organizations or intelligence activities.

3. Security Informant (SI). *General* An SI is an individual who is actively engaged in obtaining and furnishing current information on security or intelligence matters exclusively for the Bureau whose identity must be protected. Such person should be a member or attend meetings of subversive organizations or be in such position relative to subversive organizations that he is able to provide current intelligence information of value. An SI may also be an individual furnishing information concerning foreign intelligence operations and this individual may be a double agent or a defector-in-place.

It is to be noted that in connection with current Bureau instructions following the burglary of the Media, Pennsylvania, Resident Agency identity of all panel sources, potential security informants, and security informants are now protected by symbol numbers. The primary distinction between a potential security informant and a security informant is in the degree of activity engaged in coupled with quality and quantity of current information being produced exclusively for the Bureau.

SUGGESTION: That Forms FD-237 and FD-238 (Criminal and Security Informant Review Sheets) be revised at next printing to include a space for listing serial numbers of any communications indicating payments being made by other offices. (Samples of proposed revised forms are attached.)

CURRENT PRACTICE: A list of offices who have paid informant is included on Form FD-221a (Request for Funds for Payment to Informant) and FD-37 (Explanation of Charge for Information (Blue Slip)) according to the suggester. FD-37 is forwarded to Bureau along with informants' and Agents' receipts. The only summarizing source of this information is the FD-221a. Each time an Agent prepares a request to pay, he must conduct a file review; in some cases, an extensive file review covering many volumes, in order to ascertain if informants have been paid by any other offices.

ADVANTAGES: [Redacted] feels time would be saved in preparing the FD-221a if a ready source of information existed summarizing information regarding payments by other offices.

OBSERVATIONS: Domestic Intelligence Division advised it had no objection to the revision of these sheets and stated having this item on the review sheets might be of aid in some instances.

Special Investigative Division advised that where criminal informants are concerned, the frequency of payments to our informants by other offices did not happen often enough to warrant a change in the form at this time. There simply are very few occasions in which this is done between offices.

Due to the very, very few instances wherein this item would be used on either of the forms involved, Training Division opposes adoption. It is felt cost for revising, stocking and shipping this material to the field is not warranted.

SYNOPSIS

Suggests that credit bureau checks be discontinued on Potential Criminal Informants, Potential Security Informants, Ghetto and Racial Informants, and any other type of informant unless a special reason exists in a special case.

General

Domestic Intelligence Division agreed with the idea. Special Investigative Division advised that information regarding former addresses or employment is helpful in handling Potential Criminal Informants and this can be obtained from credit bureaus. In the event the informant has furnished such information, a credit bureau check would not be necessary so it was felt idea should not be adopted but that it should be left to the discretion of the developing Agent as to the need for such a check. Office of Legal Counsel advised the Fair Credit Reporting Act limitations on obtaining consumer reports precludes continuation of credit checks for consumer credit data on informants but a bureau may still provide information of value in assessing stability and potential value of an informant. The statute (Section 609) requiring disclosure of inquiries does not include mere identifying data available under Section 608 and the Department has been requested to give an opinion on this part of the law but it has not been received to date. It was recommended that credit checks be continued where identifying data would be of value. Due to these views, Training Division feels idea should not be adopted at this time bearing in mind that a change may be needed in the future based on information furnished by the Department.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising him of this fact. His idea has been acknowledged by prior letter.

DETAILS

SUGGESTION: That credit bureau checks be discontinued on Potential Criminal Informants (PCIs), Potential Security Informants (PSIs), Ghetto and Racial Informants, and any other type of informant unless special reason exists in a particular case.

CURRENT PRACTICE: The suggester states the FBI Handbook for Special Agents, Part I, Page 17A, 2d, provides for checks of local credit.

ADVANTAGES: SA Gunn advised the Fair Credit Reporting Act, which is now Title 6, Section 601 through 622, Public Law 91-508, provides new guidelines to credit bureaus including regulations pertaining to disclosure to Government agencies. Since the only information now available is former addresses and employment, there should be no necessity to check credit bureau files in informant cases unless this specific information is needed. This Act also makes the credit file on an individual available to the individual including identity of recipients of credit reports. Accordingly, any individual can now determine that the FBI has checked his credit. In the case of an informant, he could misinterpret the reason and disrupt his relationship. The suggester states that annual savings could be realized where fees are paid by the Bureau for credit checks but this amount is not known.

OBSERVATIONS: Domestic Intelligence Division agreed with the idea feeling that current regulations regarding credit reporting make it extremely difficult to justify credit checks. This Division felt the lack of a credit check would not substantially affect the background investigations on our informants.

The Special Investigative Division stated that during the course of developing a potential criminal informant, the Agent should know former resident addresses and former employments of the individual being placed under development as an informant because in some instances this information would reflect a former type of employment, for example, that would cause us to cease developing him (such as, a former member of some organization that may not have the best interests of the FBI at heart). Credit checks would not be necessary on those individuals under development as informants when the Agent has secured former addresses and former employments from the informant or another source. This Division recommended the idea not be approved and that it be left to the discretion of the developing Agent as to whether it is necessary to check the credit bureau for purposes of securing the desired information on the potential informant.



The Office of Legal Counsel advises the Fair Credit Reporting Act limitations on obtaining consumer reports precludes continuation of credit checks for consumer credit data on informants. The credit bureau may still provide information which could be very useful in assessing the stability and potential value of an informant. Such data as previous residences and employment could be significant for these purposes. It is not clear that the subject (including informants) of a credit inquiry must be advised that requests had been made concerning him when the inquiry is limited to identifying information. The statute (Section 609) requiring disclosure of inquiries does not include mere identifying information available under Section 608. This specific issue has been raised with the Department by letter to the Deputy Attorney General, dated 5/10/71, and the opinion has not been received as yet. The Office of Legal Counsel recommended that credit checks be continued in regard to any informant or potential informant where it appears that identifying information would be of value. It should be understood that such credit checks are now limited to obtaining names, addresses, former addresses, places of employment or former places of employment.

Due to the views of the Office of Legal Counsel, Training Division agrees the idea should not be adopted at this time bearing in mind that a change may be needed in the future based on the opinion furnished by the Department.



ADDENDUM: (6/1/71)

The Training Division rightly points out that a change in this matter may be needed in the future, based on information furnished by the Department. In view of this, I see no reason why we should be dragging our feet at this time and shrinking from making a positive decision. Additionally, I think the recommendation made by SA [redacted] of the Houston Office makes good sense and would result in some streamlining at the very least.

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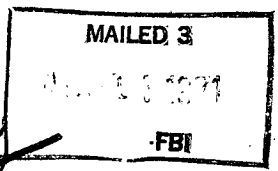

Recommendation being made that we resume practice of increasing payments to informants when fully justified and on a highly selective basis based primarily on increased productivity in each instance.

On 8/17/71 Mr. Tolson instructed that no further increases in payments to informants be approved pending clarification of the President's economic freeze on salaries and expenditures. In line with this instruction and with the President's message of 8/15/71 tightening economic controls, the field was advised on 8/19/71 that there were to be no increases in payments to informants and sources for a 90-day period. The implementation of this instruction was vigorously supervised at the Bureau. In addition to the moratorium on increased payments, the field was instructed to decrease payments to informants by a minimum of five percent, which was successfully accomplished. On 11/15/71 the 90-day economic freeze was terminated by Presidential authority.

Development of and ever-continuing production from informants is the most effective means whereby the Bureau produces vital intelligence. Payments to informants frequently are the motivating factor for their cooperation and a firm means of exerting control over them. Informants are paid solely on the basis of the value of information produced. They are paid on a strictly "cash on delivery" basis and not paid when they fail to produce. Extensive, continuous efforts are made to obtain quality informants and to advance them at every opportunity to improve the flow of vital data which is the lifeblood of the Bureau's operations. As the informants advance in stature and prestige, they spend longer periods of time obtaining information for us. It is a natural reaction

that informants expect to be compensated for their increased efforts and productivity. Failure to adequately compensate these informants for increased productivity could seriously impair the Bureau's goal of obtaining increased coverage and high quality informants.

RECOMMENDATION:

Accordingly, it is recommended that increases to informants be authorized on a selective basis where there is valid justification such as specific increase in productivity or exceptionally valuable data is developed.

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SUGGESTION In line with recent Bureau instructions regarding the security of resident agencies and the protection of the identities of informants, it is suggested informants be allowed to sign the receipts for expenses and/or services rendered with their code names. It is noted that regular U.S. Mail Services are utilized in forwarding these receipts from the respective divisions to SOG. There is a definite security risk involved in this method. To prevent the unwarranted interception of these receipts, the same security measures should be afforded them as is afforded the initial informant background letter to the Bureau, which is now conveyed by coded nitel. Informants are provided unique code names and symbol numbers. It is felt that a combination of either or both of these devices should be sufficient identification.

Current practice or rule (include manual citation as well as facts)
See Addendum. *Security informants - gen.*

Advantages of suggestion and annual savings (include basis for estimate)
The prevention of the disclosure of the identity of informants should the receipts fall into the wrong hands, either by accident or by design. No estimate can be made as to the annual savings which would result if the suggestion is accepted. Extreme embarrassment to the U.S. Government, and particularly to the FBI, could be averted should such an incident as described above occur.

Disadvantages of suggestion
It is possible additional time and effort could be expended in setting up a system such as described above. Upon completion of the new system, however, no disadvantages are foreseen.

Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, Section 107 L, part 5 states receipts should clearly show:

- (1) Date on which payment is made
- (2) Period for which made when informant is paid on period basis
- (3) Total amount paid broken down into separate amounts for services or expenses where pertinent
- (4) Name of Agent making payment
- (5) Signature of person receiving payment

In practice, the actual name of the informant is used in signing the receipt. This would tend to positively identify the informant should the receipt fall into the wrong hands, either by accident or design.

A positive method of identity for an informant payment receipt which could be used is as follows:

The informant signs the receipt with his (her) code name. The agent making the payment would then affix, in the lower right corner of the receipt, the informant's symbol number. In such a fashion, the informant would be positively identified by the use of his (her) unique code name and symbol number. Having the agent making the payment affix the symbol number to the receipt after the informant signs his (her) code name, precludes the informant knowing his (her) confidential symbol number.

Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, Section 107 L, part 5d states:

If necessary to make corrections on receipts, they must be initialed by informant and not by Agent.

It is felt such a procedure as outlined above is not in violation to instructions set forth in MOI, Vol. IV, Sec. 107 L, part 5d as the addition of the symbol number by the agent is not a correction, but an addendum.

(B) SECURITY INFORMANTS AND SOURCES - FBI FORM BOOK --
Under present procedure, the field submits an annual report on security informants and sources advising which are paid regularly under Bureau authority. This report lists subversive organizations, approximate membership and coverage. The field also submits each quarter a letter setting forth informant and source coverage on college campuses.

General
A new form incorporating the above which is self-explanatory is being prepared showing data which the Bureau desires be submitted quarterly by secure teletype (nitel) to replace these communications. This quarterly communication will be submitted by the 10th of January, April, July and October. This does not affect the submission of quarterly reports concerning the New Left Movement and the monthly report showing informants added and deleted.

Other self-explanatory forms are being prepared which will require information be furnished on a monthly basis by secure teletype concerning the number of informants, statistical accomplishments and security informant accomplishments. All offices east of the Mississippi will submit the monthly letter by the 3rd of the month and all other offices will submit the monthly letter by the 7th of the month. These new procedures will not apply to extremist, white hate groups or espionage matters.

Teletype submissions of the required data must be keyed to corresponding items on the forms so that it can be recognized without the necessity for setting out headings or extraneous data. The new forms will be supplied under separate cover.

Manual changes are forthcoming.

As a follow-up to discussions between this office and officers of the 66th Military Intelligence Group, the latter Group has now advised as follows by confidential letter.

The Countersubversion Section of the Group is now utilizing a number of military personnel as sources to obtain information which is not readily available to Military Intelligence Special Agents. These sources have been given low-level training in methods to be used in attempting to gather information of use to the Military Intelligence. They are not paid except for occasional reimbursement of expenses and, therefore, their motivation is regarded as being one of patriotism and a desire to cooperate with Military Intelligence. In some instances these sources have spent their free time in responding to requests made of them by Military Intelligence.

The sources are generally first term enlistees in their early 20's and for the most part their military service will terminate with their current enlistment and they will return to civilian life and their services, therefore will have to be discontinued.

The Group commented that these sources might prove of value to the Bureau in civilian life and requested our comments delineating the extent of our interest in them.

Although not specifically spelled out in the Group's letter, it is known that the sources referred to are utilized in the military community and among civilian groups targeting

against military primarily in matters dealing with dissidents among Armed Forces personnel and new left type of activities including those related to racial matters.

We believe that the Bureau would find this type of information most useful in its efforts to develop productive sources in this field. I have, therefore, advised the Group that we are definitely interested in being informed regarding such sources and at an appropriate time prior to their departure from military service I have suggested that the Group furnish us full information on the source including his proposed U.S. residence and their evaluation of him. I have also suggested that in their debriefing of the source, they check to determine whether he would be agreeable to a subsequent approach by the Bureau and if he is, to indicate that he might be so approached by the FBI without making any definite commitment.

When such information is received we contemplate reporting it under the individual caption of the person involved with appropriate copies for the area of proposed residence in the United States.

To obtain approval for new procedures to be used by field to provide comprehensive data concerning security informant and source coverage of subversive organizations as well as statistical accomplishments.

Under current procedure the field is required to submit an annual report on security informants and sources showing coverage furnished. The report lists subversive organizations, addresses, character of cases and informant coverage. In addition, each quarter a letter is submitted setting forth informant and source coverage on college campuses. The proposed new procedures would eliminate need for the above communications. Data to be furnished in the new procedures will require new forms (enclosed) to be furnished to each field office as a guide to show what information is to be submitted by secure teletype. While the forms themselves will not be submitted to the Bureau, data thereon will be keyed numerically in secure teletype. The forms will show the number of security informants, potential security informants, confidential sources and panel sources at the beginning and end of each month; number of Agents assigned exclusively to informant and source development; money paid for services and expenses under SAC authority and statistical accomplishments, including subjects located and arrested as well as merchandise recovered on Federal, state and local levels. The above information will be submitted monthly.

Information concerning subversive organizations including those on college campuses, the location, the number of members and symbol number identities of member informants providing coverage will also be submitted. The identity of individuals or groups who have participated in or are active in planning acts of violence would be set out showing informant

In those instances where no member informant coverage of an organization exists, the field will be required to give reason therefor, advise of action being taken to develop coverage and when established coverage is anticipated. This information will be submitted on a quarterly basis. The data will enable careful following of security informant coverage.

The Security Informant Unit, Domestic Intelligence Division, will be responsible for coordination of this program. The Voucher-Statistical Section, Administrative Division, will make a statistical compilation of incoming data and the substantive sections involved will be responsible for evaluation and necessary action. The information requested in these procedures is similar to that being presently furnished by the field in extremist informant matters, which procedure was approved in April, 1970.

ADVANTAGES: SA Stec feels this procedure would serve to expand the use of [Redacted] The entry of these numbers would permit field offices to easily determine whether informants are clandestinely contacting subjects and organizations currently undergoing FBI scrutiny. The entry would serve to quickly verify whether informants are telephonically communicating with certain subjects and organizations as directed by the exigencies of some Bureau investigations. Investigative time may be saved by thus verifying the veracity of informants in the use of their telephones.

OBSERVATIONS: Special Investigative Division recommended idea be approved for use only on a selective basis, depending on the nature of the informant and his assignments.

Domestic Intelligence Division felt the procedure should be implemented on a restricted basis, such as inclusion of extremist and probationary extremist informants to verify their veracity while not including ghetto informants. This Division felt placement of telephone numbers of all security informants in [Redacted] on a blanket basis would be clearly unwarranted in light of cost and productivity factors. Selective usage of this procedure concerning certain of these informants, when need is clearly suggested, was recommended.

In addition to entering the telephone numbers for current informants, it would be necessary that [redacted] be constantly updated and modified to account for changes in existing numbers, additions of numbers for new informants, and deletions of numbers for those informants which are discontinued. The preparation of additions, changes and deletions will require additional Agent time in the field. The value of a suggestion arbitrarily requiring entry of telephone numbers of an entire group of individuals should be carefully weighed against the results to be derived therefrom. For instance, as of 2/29/72 there were 10, 714 potential criminal informants (PCIs). The advisability of such a large number of telephone numbers entered into the [redacted] is questionable when the rate of turnover of PCIs and value of information furnished by the majority of these individuals is considered.

Training Division agrees with the Computer Systems Division. From the views of the other divisions, one could not determine the number of telephone numbers which would be entered or an approximate cost for this procedure. There may be a few instances at the present time when the field enters numbers for informants since offices may do so should they feel a need for same; however, it is felt a blanket rule for any group or the use of a system based on a selective basis will eventually mean that practically all of these telephone numbers for all informants and potential informants would be entered in the [redacted]

SUBJECT: SECURITY INFORMANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During the month of April, 1972, the field operated 1,232 security informants, 927 potential security informants, 711 confidential sources and 139 panel sources. The total number of security informants and sources being operated is 3,009. The number of informants and sources increased by a total of 39 over the previous month.

Examples of significant accomplishments during this period are as follows:

An Atlanta informant was elevated to [redacted] of the Atlanta Chapter of the anarchistic Students for a Democratic Society (SDS). As a result this informant has the responsibility to coordinate all the SDS contacts in the Southeastern section of the United States, thus making her more valuable to the Bureau.

A Jackson informant attended the National SDS Convention. As a result informant received information of proposed demonstrations and picketing for the forthcoming National Democratic and Republican Conventions, thus putting us in a better position to afford needed coverage of these conventions.

A Miami informant identified the individuals responsible for the bombing of the Cuban Trade Commission in Montreal, Canada. Also another Miami informant who was recruited and trained by Cuban Intelligence Service (CIS) for espionage activity in the United States was doubled and agreed to work for the FBI against the CIS.

Not only do our security informants provide information in their normal area involving subversive activities, some of them also furnish information in the criminal field leading to arrests and merchandise recovered.

SUBJECT: SECURITY INFORMANTS ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During the month of March, 1972, the field operated 1,233 security informants, 917 potential security informants, 684 confidential sources and 136 panel sources. The total number of security informants and sources being operated is 2,970.

Examples of significant accomplishments during this period are as follows:

A New York informant provided complete plans of a revolutionary-oriented women's group to disrupt the luncheon of the National Women's Republican Club by releasing live rats during the course of the luncheon. The luncheon was attended by such notable persons as Mrs. Patricia Nixon and Mrs. Spiro Agnew. The information was disseminated to the New York City Police Department and as result, instead of the anticipated pandemonium their plans were completely thwarted. Another New York informant identified an individual who harbored the Armstrong brothers in Canada. These brothers were responsible for the bombing of a building at the University of Wisconsin which caused extensive damage and the death of one innocent person.

A Sacramento informant furnished complete details concerning a planned demonstration against Mrs. Patricia Nixon when she was to appear in Sacramento. This information was furnished to Secret Service and local authorities and with all the plans of the group they were able to prevent the demonstrators from embarrassing the wife of the President of the United States.

A San Francisco informant developed information regarding an underground railroad being organized to help escaped prisoners and others fleeing the law to Mexico.

Another San Francisco informant furnished information that the Revolutionary Union members are presently being requested to purchase weapons when joining the Revolutionary Union which advocates the overthrow of the United States.

Not only do our security informants provide information in their normal area involving subversive activities, some of them also furnish extremely valuable information in the criminal field leading to arrests and merchandise recovered.

For example, a Los Angeles informant provided information which was furnished the Homicide Division, Los Angeles Police Department, which led to the arrest of two adults and several juveniles for a murder of a high school student in Hollywood, California. A Portland informant provided information leading to recovery of \$4,251 taken from a local oil company.

In addition, our security informants furnished information which was responsible for the arrest of 17 individuals on both local and federal charges, four of whom were FBI fugitives.

The Fair Credit Reporting Act, which is now Title 6, Section 601, through 622, provides new guidelines to credit bureaus including regulations pertaining to disclosure to Governmental agencies. As the only information now available is former addresses and employment there should be no necessity to check credit bureau files in informant cases unless this specific information is needed.
This Act also makes the credit file on an individual available to the individual including identity of recipients of credit reports. Accordingly, any individual can now determine that the FBI has checked his credit. In the case of an informant, he could misinterpret the reason and disrupt his relationship.

Disadvantages of suggestion
Annual savings would be effected where fees are paid by the Bureau for credit checks. The amount of savings is not known.

PURPOSE:

Security Informants

To recommend that each office be instructed to develop new initiatives and programs in the development of sources to penetrate extremist groups including communes and their underground newspapers.

BACKGROUND:

By airtel 3/12/70 to all offices captioned "SDS (Weatherman), IS - SDS," the field was informed of the growing terroristic acts of extremist groups and the need to develop new informants to report on these organizations. On 5/13/70 an airtel was sent to all offices captioned "New Left Movement - Violence, IS - Miscellaneous (Weatherman)" which established a procedure whereby each office was to submit an airtel to the Bureau by the first of each month outlining five categories including the following information: (1) identities and location of communes or organizations under investigation that adhere to Weatherman ideology, (2) number of cases opened during month on individuals under categories previously mentioned, (3) total number of cases on these individuals presently under investigation, (4) informant coverage used against specific communes and organizations that fall within defined categories, and (5) brief summary of New Left-oriented violence occurring in area during preceding month and action taken.

The recent terroristic acts by these groups indicate a need for new and imaginative steps in the development of its sources to be included in Item 4 of the monthly airtel outlined above.

Accordingly, each field office is being advised to initiate a program to develop these needed sources and to incorporate this information in their monthly airtel to enable the Bureau to carefully evaluate the field's progress and advise offices of the successful programs implemented by some of the field offices.

It is felt that the current method of submitting FD-221 (Request for Informant Payment), FD-37 (Blue Slip), and informant's receipt for payment, to the Bureau from the Field Office is executed in a manner that places unnecessary security risks on the informants.

647

Forms FD-221 and FD-221a (long form) are prepared by the case agent as a request for payment for services and expenses. The FD-221 sets forth the informant's symbol number, amount paid, cases reported on, date paid, informant's true name, and the fact that the payment was made by the FBI. The receipt contains the contact agent's name, the amount paid, and the informant's signature of either his true name or his code name. The information from the FD-221 and other information taken from the FD-221a is then transposed onto the (cont. on page 2)

Current practice or rule (include manual citation as well as facts)
FD-221 and FD-37 contain informant's true name, symbol number, and case file titles of cases on which informant furnished information. Receipt contains informant's true name or code name in his own handwriting.

Advantages of suggestion and annual savings (include basis for estimate) MOI, IV, 107D & L (Security Informants) and 108J (Criminal Informants).
General

The informant's true name would not be contained on any communication which travels through the mails, thereby eliminating the possibility of the source's being compromised through lost or stolen mail. Actual annual savings would be impossible to estimate because no loss would occur until an informant is compromised, at which time the expense of replacing the informant (or informants) would be great, and the loss of prestige would be irreplaceable.

SUGGESTION (cont.)

Blue Slip for transmittal to the Bureau. The Blue Slip, FD-221, and the receipt are then packaged with identical forms for other informants and submitted to the Bureau by Registered Mail. Should these forms fall into the wrong hands, whether through theft or loss of the mail, all of the informants concerned would undoubtedly be compromised.

This method of sending the informant's true name through the mails negates the purpose of submitting the initial background data to the Bureau by secure teletype. Whereas this background data is submitted by secure teletype only once, the payment forms are submitted through the mails on numerous occasions.

It is felt that this situation could be alleviated with only minor changes in the present system being used. The use of the source's code name on the FD-221, Blue Slip, and the receipt for payment, in lieu of his true name as current procedure prescribes, would completely disguise the source's true identity, even if the forms are lost, misplaced, or stolen. If legal factors require that the source sign all receipts with his true name, then the receipt could be retained at the field office and the SAC could certify that a receipt was received.

The financial savings that could be realized through this change would be impossible to determine. Should a group of informants be compromised through the loss of these forms, the financial loss could be mammoth, considering the extreme expense that would be necessitated by the Bureau in an attempt to obtain informant-type information without the use of informants.

Although the Bureau has apparently experienced no loss of these forms in the past, a single incident could cause irreparable damage to the informant program and the Bureau, and all precautions should be taken to reduce this possibility.

Security

Captioned employee has suggested that the present policy of recording the informant's true name on Form FD-221 (Request for Informant Payment), Form FD-37 (Blue Slip) and the informant receipt for payment be changed. He suggests a code name be assigned to each informant which would be used on these documents in lieu of the true name, thus protecting the identity of the informant should they fall into the wrong hands through theft or loss in mail.

General

This suggestion has been made several times previously and has been turned down each time by the Bureau for these reasons:

(1) Adopting this suggestion would require the assigning of code names to all informants including potential security informants. This would be an expensive and complicated task since cross references would have to be maintained both at Headquarters and in the field.

(2) At the present time the symbol number and the true name (code name for a small number of highly sensitive informants) are included on individual documents transmitted which provide a double check as to the identity of the informant. Occasionally it is found that the wrong name or symbol number is used but we are protected from error since we will not record or file the information until we have agreement in both items. Using code names universally could increase substantially the likelihood of duplication and could be a problem should the receipts later be introduced into court.

(3) While code names are used for some informants because of the high security risk involved or at the request of the informant, using the true name is much more desirable in those cases where receipts have to be introduced into court.

(4) Retention of receipt with true names in the field could cause serious problems when receipts were needed for trial. Speed is often of the essence. Further, there would be no centralized control assuring that the receipts were in proper form or indeed were in existence at all.

(5) All records at Headquarters have always been maintained by true name. Thousands of records are involved and it would be a mammoth task to convert and reorganize them by code names.

It is to be noted that all items reflecting confidential payments to informants are transmitted to Headquarters by registered mail, return receipt requested, and are in two envelopes addressed to the Assistant Director, Computer Systems Division and are not opened until they reach the Voucher Unit.

While theoretically mail containing Blue Slip or related information could be lost or stolen the likelihood is negligible. The system described above has been in effect for many years and we have experienced no loss. Even if a loss occurred it would not be compromising in most instances. The background data which is presently furnished by secure teletype is not included on the Blue Slip information. Reports containing complete lists of informants which are required to be forwarded monthly are transmitted by secure teletype. Highly sensitive informants have already been assigned code names.

RECOMMENDATION:

That this suggestion not be adopted. Training Division agrees with foregoing views and appropriate letter to the suggester is attached for approval.

During the month of June, 1972, the field operated 1,245 security informants, 943 potential security informants, 726 confidential sources and 133 panel sources. The total number of security informants and sources being operated is 3,047. The number of informants and sources being operated increased by a total of 43 over the previous month.

Examples of significant accomplishments during this period are as follows:

A Buffalo informant was responsible for the recovery of two 1972 automobiles obtained fraudulently by a security subject using a stolen credit card. Recovery valued \$5,500.

An Indianapolis informant provided information to the FBI which was furnished to the Indianapolis, Indiana, Police Department. This information led to the arrest of 11 subjects and the recovery of stolen automobile parts and other goods valued at \$125,000.

A New Haven informant reported a plan to disrupt an address of Vice President Agnew to the graduating class of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, New London, Connecticut. This information was promptly furnished to the Secret Service and Connecticut State Police.

Philadelphia informants advised of plans by Vietnam Veterans Against the War to embarrass Acting Director Gray of the FBI during a Fourth of July speech. Information enabled Philadelphia Police Department to act quickly in neutralizing participants. *REG-66 66-2547-1472*

During the month of July, 1972, the field operated 1,241 security informants, 945 potential security informants, 736 confidential sources and 129 panel sources. The total number of security informants and sources being operated is 3,051. The number of informants and sources being operated increased by a total of four over the previous month.

Examples of significant accomplishments during this period are as follows:

The Chicago Office placed two potential security informants into the local Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), the youth group of the communist Socialist Workers Party. This accomplishment tripled the coverage in the YSA.

A Cleveland informant provided travel plans of Gus Hall and Jarvis Tyner, top Communist Party (CP) functionaries. As result of his close relationship with Tyner informant was able to obtain information concerning the CP platform program.

A Houston informant currently is engaged in possible purchase by Irish Republican Army (IRA) in New York of automatic weapons from source in Houston. It is anticipated that this gun buying operation, if successful, would neutralize a major IRA gun buying operation in the U.S.

An Indianapolis informant returned from a three-week tour to Russia under the auspices of the National Council of Soviet-American Friendship, a communist-front organization. Informant submitted a detailed report of the activities of those attending and was able to obtain photographs of all from the U.S.

During the month of August, 1972, the field operated 1,243 security informants, 944 potential security informants, 736 confidential sources and 133 panel sources. The total number of security informants and sources being operated is 3,056. The number of informants and sources being operated increased by a total of five over the previous month.

Examples of significant accomplishments during this period are as follows:

A Houston informant is currently engaged in possible sale of weapons to representatives of the Irish Republican Army at New York which matter is being closely followed.

A Miami source furnished information and photographs of non-delegate protestors at the recent Republican National Convention. This source also furnished photographs of an individual who burned an American flag at the Convention site and a desecration of flag case was instituted.

During the Republican National Convention 68 informants afforded coverage for this Bureau concerning subversive activities and potential violence. The overall coverage was excellent and provided timely information for the White House and interested law enforcement agencies.

Not only do our security informants provide information in their normal area involving subversive activities, some of them also furnish information in the criminal field leading to arrests and merchandise recovered. For example, a Milwaukee informant furnished information leading to the arrest of a bank robber and recovery of \$3,700. Also a Houston informant has furnished information which appears to be leading to the identification of a large car theft ring. In addition, our security informants furnished information which was responsible for the arrest of two other individuals.

Under current procedure the field is required to submit a monthly report (FD-451, FD-451a) which sets out the number of security informants and sources, accomplishments and other statistical data specifically excluding black extremist, white hate and espionage informants and sources.

Recently a streamlining procedure was adopted which required the field to submit various other statistics involving security informants (FD-439) on a quarterly basis instead of monthly. This form included the number of espionage informants. As a result of this change the Bureau does not have ready accessibility to the number of all security informants and sources on a monthly basis in particular espionage informants. Accordingly, form FD-451 is being revised to include espionage informants, thus making the number of all security informants and sources readily accessible.

OBSERVATIONS: Domestic Intelligence Division believed the idea should be approved.

Special Investigative Division stated the deletion of the ballot boxes on the top, right side of the FD-209; namely, the symbol designations - TE, CI, PCI, PSI, etc. could be readily deleted from this form since the informant's symbol number is given plus whatever type of informant he or she may be. With respect to deleting the "Personal Data" item, this Division was opposed to this action since the Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, Section 108, I, 8, states the informant's identity must be concealed at all times. In this regard, any and all personal data placed on the FD-209 should be placed on the original only; namely, the one that is filed in the informant's file and any descriptive data should


not be disseminated into substantive files. This Division stated it is known that the Inspector, when reviewing criminal informant files, checks on the indoctrination given to all employees in order to see that the identity or other descriptive data identifying the informant is not routed to substantive files, thereby possibly exposing the informant. The placing of personal data as to the informant on the original FD-209 provides valuable background information at a later date should the informant be reassigned to another Agent. This Division, therefore, recommended only the first portion of the suggestion be approved.

Due to the foregoing views of the Special Investigative Division, Training Division feels that only the first portion of the idea should be approved.

RECOMMENDATIONS: (1) That the suggestion as modified to delete the items at the top of the FD-209 only be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising her of this fact.

SUGGESTION: To preclude repetition on the Extremist or Security Informant Progress/Justification Letter, Form FD-401, which is submitted semiannually to the Bureau, it was suggested that certain items be preprinted on the form. This would necessitate only a check mark to denote these items have received attention instead of having to type the statements in question with each submission (a sample of the proposed amended format is attached to original suggestion).

OBSERVATIONS: Domestic Intelligence Division advised that, under existing instructions, the information to which the suggester has reference is furnished to the Bureau during the initial stages of the informant's development. There are no rules requiring that this information is to be furnished to the Bureau on a continuing semiannual basis and, for our purposes such action would be superfluous and unnecessary. This division recommended the suggestion not be adopted.

Training Division agrees. As noted by Domestic Intelligence Division most of this data is reported during initial stages of development and, although some, such as change of address or employment, must be reported later as necessary, these data must be reported by Nitel and not on the FD-401. About the only item pertinent among the items suggester has noted in her proposed revisions is the advice to informant that payments must be reported for income tax purposes. It is not believed the amount of typing saved by preprinting this on the form is sufficient to warrant revising the form.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted and the suggester be so advised in attached letter.

To advise, at Mr. Gray's request, results of a review of Bureau's policy of informing outsiders of Bureau's connection with a publicly exposed informant.

Periodically a security informant is utilized as a witness in Bureau cases before Congressional committees, Government hearing boards or the like, which utilization results in his public exposure. When this occurs the informant's services as such are discontinued. Also on occasion due to the public testimony the informant is the subject of considerable publicity. An informant may be approached by writers, reporters and the radio and TV media intent on further publicizing his undercover activities. Inevitably inquiries, both official and private, are made of the Bureau requesting confirmation that the individual was, in fact, a Bureau informant. When such an inquiry is received be it by another agency, a Congressman or by a private citizen with a legitimate interest, the Bureau has no alternative but to reply in the affirmative. Not to admit that a publicly exposed informant was utilized by the Bureau would not be exercising good logical judgement. Accordingly, the current policy is that when a Bureau informant has been publicly exposed, official or legitimate inquiries are answered by stating that the informant was never a Bureau employee, but did assist this Bureau by furnishing information on a confidential basis during a specified period and that he was compensated for his services if that were the fact. No additional information is furnished. This policy does not apply to informants who have not been exposed although discontinued.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Bureau's policy of furnishing limited information in answer to official inquiries as set out above be continued.
