Intelligence Division believed this was primarily a matter for the field to decide since, basically, the issue is whether or not the field will still be able to N intelligently prepare reports and letterhead memoranda (LHM) with this streamlined tive number of offices handling security work be made before a final decision was made use of Forms FD-306. It was proposed and approved that a survey of a representaconcerning this matter. The survey has now been completed. Indianapolis and Jacksonville Offices recommended adoption since the proposed procedure would save time in reviewing files for the preparation of reports or LHMs and it would save a substantial amount of space in filing. It was pointed out that Agents preparing channelizing memoranda must use discretion in evaluating them when an informant's statement should be channelized and when the subject's name should be merely listed, however, in view of the numerous meetings which are held of an insignificant nature and in consideration of other factors the idea has merit. 66-2542-3 While New York believed this was an opportune time to take such action it recommended the present Form FD-306 be substantially revised so that it would contain enough information to serve as a basis for a report or LHM. Buffalo and San Francisco were definitely opposed to the idea. The following reasons for retention of our current procedures were given:

- (1) The current system, in addition to providing a numerical count of activities attended by the subject, also permits the case Agent to determine from the informant report the scope of activities which the subject attended. This permits an evaluation of the subject's knowledge of, indoctrination in, and/or adherence to the basic tenets of the organization, which is an essential element of the substantive case investigation.
- (2) Since intelligence information, in addition to information of potential prosecutive value, is an objective of securitytype investigations, informant reports provide such information relating to individuals under investigation. This would include, for example, current employment, residence, possible travel, possible participation in public activities and functions of the organization. Such information could refer to individuals present but not actively participating in a meeting, and could conceivably even relate to individuals not present at the meeting. Under the proposed system, this data would not be available to the substantive case Agent. It would indeed require the case Agent to review original informant reports for such information with a resultant expenditure of Agent time. The alternative to the proposed system/meet the foregoing objection would be exceptions to the proposed system which would undoubtedly prove cumbersome in their implementation.
- (3) Manual of Instructions, Section 87, G, 8, c, (2), page 44, states that repetitious and cumulative items may be limited to a representative number of each item set forth fully documented. It does not appear the proposed system would permit such full documentation without review of the original informant report.

- (4) Under the current system, the substantive case Agent, in reviewing the channelized memoranda, has in many cases the opportunity of reviewing matters relating to the entire organization, and thus viewing the overall perspective as it relates to his own cases.
- (5) The saving of filing shelf space would be for a relatively short time, since channelizing memoranda are, for the most part, routinely destroyed upon the preparation of the appropriate report or LHM. San Francisco added that should the Bureau decide to approve such a plan that it should be done on a permissive rather than a mandatory basis.

Due to the foregoing observations, Training Division is of the opinion we should not tamper with our present system which has been working well for both the security and extremist cases.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the suggestion not be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising him of this action. The idea was acknowledged by prior communication.

ADVANTAGES: Suggester states the informant file would always be complete and all serials would be immediately available to supervisors and investigative personnel. Regarding the security aspect, all material on pending informants would be afforded maximum security and there would be no need of maintaining a closed file on the same informant. OBSERVATIONS: Intelligence Division opposed adoption noting that Form FD-238 (Security Informant Review Sheet) is used by the field in connection with the han dling and developing of security informants and sources. Generally, this form is a check off sheet showing the serial location of all information required in the investigation, hards and developing security informants and sources. The FD-238 must be the top serial of X the file at all times. To put it elsewhere would defeat the purpose of the form which is a valuable aid, not only to the case Agent, field supervisor and Inspection Staff, but to anyone who must review the file. In view of the above, FD-238 should not be made a serial nor buried in the file. It was noted the serial numbers from the old-file could simply be entered on the pink sheet of the new informant file, if desired. Z OCT 2 1973 Special Investigative Division stated Section 108, Manual of Instructions provides that the pink sheet (FD-237) should always remain on top of all serials and is not to be given a serial number. This pink sheet acts as an index or reminder to the Agents developing the informant that certain things must be secured during the informant's devel opment, such as photograph, identification record, description, etc. It is not used for the purpose of indexing all information in the informant's file. with the idea since to comply with it, the informant file would be completely purged of all serials and placed in the new file with the pink sheet serving as serial one. Current procedures, when transferring an individual from that of a security informant to a criminal informant or vice versa, would be to establish a new pink sheet in the new informant file and abstract any pertinent information from the original file and place it into the new file. This Division opposed adoption.

Chief Clerk's Desk, Training Division, believes this procedure should not be made mandatory throughout the field. Certain investigative personnel would prefer to have the individual informant files retain their original identity. It would appear that all pertinent background data would be incorporated into a summary memorandum requesting individual be approved as an informant in a different category. This would establish another exception which would only cause additional confusion in working with files and serials. It should be noted that under current procedures files are not consolidated to the extent that all material on one subject would be incorporated into one file regardless of the number of cases the subject is involved in. It is believed this idea should not be approved.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising her of this fact.

SECURITY MATTER

The purpose of this memorandum is to obtain authority to discontinue the use of teletypes (nitels) in submitting extremist and security informant status reports and to revert to the use of the FD-405 and FD-451 forms designed for this purpose.

In April, 1971, in the wake of the Media incident involving the theft of Bureau records, we discontinued the sending of the FD-405 forms through the mail. This additional security was taken in view of the fact that from information developed it was anticipated that additional efforts might be made to steal FBI documents. Subsequently, the security informant status program was instituted and the FD-451 forms were also sent to Headquarters by teletype.

The FD-405 and FD-451 forms are designed to advise on a timely basis information regarding the extremist and security informant programs in each field division and includes the number of informants being utilized, summary of significant information developed, and identities of organizations against which we are targeting our informants. These forms do not

identify any individual informant or contain information which could lead to the informant's identity. It is now believed that we should discontinue the use of teletypes (six to nine pages per office per month) and revert to the utilization of these forms, which will be forwarded to Headquarters via registered mail. This in no way will diminish the security afforded this information in the field since these forms will be maintained in Headquarters City and will not be disseminated to the resident agencies. The only area where these forms could possibly be stolen would be while in the mail. It has not been our experience that any problems are being encountered in connection with registered mail being forwarded from field offices to Headquarters. In reality, we forward on a daily basis via registered mail all types of confidential information requiring complete security, including top secret.

The savings of money and manpower would be enormous since the current procedure requires that the field must first complete these forms, convert this information then to a teletype, cut a teletype tape in the field for transmitting the teletype to Headquarters, and upon receipt at Headquarters, the information from the teletype must then be converted back to these forms. The information as received in the teletypes is meaningless until converted back to the forms.

It is believed that we can revert to the utilization of these forms without diminishing our security in connection with the information furnished in the FD-405 and FD-451 forms.

Similar proposals have been considered in past and not adopted. When evaluated, it was pointed out by the Computer Systems Division that it has always been the Bureau's position that we should not use a printed stock-type receipt to document payments made to informants inasmuch as it cannot be determined in advance that receipts would not at a later date be subpoenzed for court cases. The use of a printed receipt would have a tendency to convey to court that such payments are routine whereas receipts not of a uniform nature would have a greater tendency to impress the court that such payments were not scheduled in advance and not merely a routine transaction. Considering the volume of payments made to confidential informants, we have experienced very little difficulty with receipts which are prepared by each Agent at time payment is made to individual informant. It was felt we should maintain position of not permitting printed receipts for general use throughout the field in making payments of this nature. Due to these observations, Training Division recommends current idea not be approved.



Date and place of birth should be on form since it is a review sheet and a reviewer should not have to refer to the description of informant elsewhere in file. With regard to "Selective Service Check," these records are still obtainable and Manual of Instructions, Section 107C, still requires this check. Suggester's statement that check no longer required is inaccurate. It is true youths are no longer (currently) drafted but they are required to register for Selective Service. Training Division notes Form FD-238 is currently under revision to include item, "Date Approved and Serial No. " (sample attached). Form has not been printed to date due to supply on hand; therefore, it is recommended no further action be taken regarding this matter.

CURRENT PRACTICE: Suggester states a new Agent is supervised for the first two weeks in the field by an experienced Agent who at the end of the two weeks submits an analysis of the new Agent's work performance to the SAC noting whether additional training is necessary or certifying that the new Agent can work independently. **b**6 notes that Special Agents spend approximately 85% of the time ADVANTAGES: SA on the street conducting interviews. Their supervisors essentially administer the communications which the Agents generate as a result of these interviews It can thus be said that field supervisors do not actually supervise their subordinates 85% of the time. After a new Agent is observed for two weeks in the field by an experienced Agent, his ability or lack of ability to conduct interviews and develop informants is never evaluated for the remainder of his career. The advantage of this idea is to assure Agents of more realistic supervision of that area of their work in which they spend the vast majority of their time and to allow supervisors to learn and to correct the weaknesses of the Agents under their supervision in an area where the supervisor presently has no personal knowledge. This proposal is in the nature of a procedural NOT RECORDED improvement rather than a financial saving. OBSERVATIONS: SAC Beane, San Juan, stated existing Bureau instructions requires: supervisory personnel to engage in on-the-scene supervision as required. This facet of the supervisory responsibility is checked during each annual inspection. It is his opinion that every Agent below grade GS-13 does not require a mandatory on-the-scene analysis of the Agent's interviewing techniques. 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supervisor should attend to that responsibility. The SAC was opposed to initiating a mandatory requirement as described by the suggester.

Intelligence Division noted that interview technique is a highly personalized and individual investigative procedure. Although experience will enable an investigator to refine and polish his technique, it does not follow that a field supervisor necessarily because of his position has the ability, experience or personality to provide guidance or a correct assessment of the technique. Also, for a field supervisor to periodically accompany an investigator for this purpose could adversely affect the investigator's performance and thus adversely affect the objective of the interview. A more proper measure to improve interviewing ability of individual investigators would appear to be to assign those deficient in this area to conduct joint interviews with fellow investigators who have demonstrated proven ability or finesse in this area. As a practica matter, a field supervisor will assign a proven interviewer to assist the less-experience investigator in instances of delicate interviews. In addition, the less-experienced investigator will seek out a more experienced fellow investigator to assist him as necessary in instances of a complicated or sensitive interview. This Division opposed adoption.

General Investigative Division opposed approval due to the duties presently imposed on supervisory personnel in the various field offices. To initiate a mandatory requirement that a supervisor personally accompany each Agent on his squad below GS-13 every six months would not only increase his workload, but would remove him from his supervisory duties. It would appear a supervisor, in reviewing the investigation conducted by the Agents on his squad, would be able to ascertain those who need assistance in conducting interviews and contacts with informants.

Special Investigative Division opposed the idea noting that our training programs are specifically designed to teach our investigative personnel how to conduct interviews. This Division also pointed out the facts mentioned by the General Investigative Division. At present, our rules require that supervisory personnel, including SACs and ASACs, afford on-the-scene supervision in major cases. The current procedures appear to be entirely adequate.

Inspection Division did not agree with the proposed procedure since a field supervisor from reviewing correspondence prepared by a particular Agent, following the Agent's informant development progress and in day-to-day contacts with his squad members should be able to pretty well assess a particular Agent's performance. If the supervisor is not satisfied with an Agent's work, he can perform on-the-scene evaluation in the nature of that set forth in the proposal.

The period of payment is available to Agents from the FD-221a in informant's file. This change would make uniform reporting of informant payments on FD-401, FD-37, and FD-221a which is not the case at present. OBSERVATIONS: Intelligence Division recommended adoption of this idea but allowing more space below each column than is allowed on the attached example. As a general rule, the field when executing Form FD-401 has been setting out the amounts paid for services and expenses on a monthly basis. This monthly basis generally ran one month from the effective date. On occasion when payment dates alone were listed, it would appear that an overpayment was made, however, when checking with the Computer Systems Division, it was determined there was no overpayment because the field listed the month of the payment and not the period for which made. When a blue slip (FD-37) of a field office is sent to Headquarters for reimbursement of funds, that form clearly specifies the period for which payments were made and the amounts are then checked against the authorizations by the Computer Systems Division, which is responsible for the record keeping of confidential expenditures. The implementation of this proposal would result in uniform reporting by the field, readily allow the detection of overpayments and would make for a better record-keeping system. This idea was coordinated with the Computer Systems Division and it concurs in the recommendation for adoption of this suggestion.

Computer Systems Division is in complete agreement with the suggestion.

Due to the foregoing views, Training Division has no objection to revising Form FD-401 as proposed but leaving more space under the categories being added.

RECOMMENDATIONS: (1) That the suggestion be adopted and the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising her of this fact.



They concern using our computers for use in breaking down the location of our employees by police precinct; including the police precinct on Form FD-385 which is used in connection with the Criminal Intelligence Program; and, preparing a format on each and every potential security informant and security informant as well as criminal and potential criminal informants in addition to other identifying data. GENERAL Computer Systems Division advised these ideas are technically feasible; however, it is not certain exactly what SA Mulroy had in mind concerning the net results. If the other divisions concur, it was believed a meeting between a Computer Systems Division representative and a NY representative should be scheduled. With respect to Criminal Intelligence Program, Special Investigative Division had no objection to the procedure but felt that a manual system would be less costly and more efficient providing a daily up-to-date record system, thus eliminating a possible two-month lag in a monthly computer printout. RECOMMENDATIONS: (1) That a knowledgeable representative of the Computer Systems
Division travel to NYC to determine the feasibility of
utilizing ADP to implement these ideas bearing in mind the question of whether the end
results visualized by the NYO can be obtained within the time span needed.

(2) Following the above evaluation, a memorandum with recommendations be submitted by the Computer Systems Division to the Suggestion Desk, Training Division.

(3) That the attached letter be forwarded to the suggester advising him of the study to be made.

DETAILS

SUGGESTION 193-75: The police precinct in which an employee resides be indicated in the lower, right-hand corner of Form FD-310 (sample attached).

CURRENT PRACTICE: The information currently required on the above-mentioned form is stored in the computer for use of Payroll Unit.

ADVANTAGES: Suggester states this would provide breakdowns of employees into the various police precincts, and so enable individuals concerned with Buplar and personnel matters to have monthly run-offs by precinct of all Bureau employees in the field office territory. It would also provide a breakdown of employees which would be available at all times to assist in various investigative operations which would occur from time to time. The principal advantage is the full use of source data, which is already stored in the computer system, in order that a true overhead or administrative function could be turned into an actual investigative aid for the field office and implementation of metropolitan RA plan.

OBSERVATIONS: Computer Systems Division advised this is technically feasible; however, it is difficult to determine exactly what SA Mulroy has in mind concerning the net results. A format of a listing recommended by the Data Processing Section might possibly coincide with the suggester's thoughts on this subject. Format is as follows:

Computer Systems Division advised sing the results to be obtained are not clear that it would be preferable that a meeting between a Computer Systems Division representative and SA Mulroy take place prior to any implementation of the suggestions submitted by him.

SUGGESTION 194-75: That space be provided on Form FD-385 (Criminal Intelligence Program), sample attached, for inclusion of the police precinct in which the subject resides. The police precinct together with residence, business and hangouts of all hoodlums would be placed in the computer system for use in Criminal Intelligence matters.

CURRENT PRACTICE: Suggester states NYO, after a review of the data which has been furnished on the current FD-385, has received ADP breakdowns of La Cosa Nostra (LCN) in the NY territory as follows:

Family Affiliation - Showing Bufile, name and rank of individual, status, and the source for individual's family affiliation.

Illegal Activity - Showing Bufile, name of individual and family affiliation.

Legitimate Enterprise - Showing Bufile, name of individual and family affiliation.

Year of Birth - Showing Bufile, name of individual and family affiliation.

Place of Birth - Same.

ADVANTAGES: SA Mulroy states from the above data and from a review of FD-385, it is possible to determine such items as the number of soldiers in ICN which were born in Naples and who happens to be between five feet eight inches and five feet nine inches tall and the fact that their complexions may be swarthy or olive. This data is of little or no assistance to the investigative function for individuals working in the Criminal Intelligence Program. Due to the number of ICN and hoodlum figures active in the large metropolitan area, it would be a distinct investigative aid to have the breakdown by police precinct of the organized criminal figures. By breaking the NYO into metropolitan resident agencies (RAs), it will be necessary to accumulate data by territory as an effective tool in the investigation of organized crime. This is not to be considered a suggestion for NYO only, but also for the Chicago area. The city of Chicago is divided

into approximately 41 police precincts. The remaining 58 digits of a two-position addition, with the present system, could be used for the large suburban area around Chicago. Other field offices would derive the same benefit.

OBSERVATIONS: Computer Systems Division gave the same comments as those for the first idea; however, it set forth a format of a listing which might be used for this purpose as follows:

Special Investigative Division stated Form FD-385 is used under the Criminal Intelligence Program to correlate background information on individual La Cosa Nostra members for recording in, and future retrieval from, the Bureau's ADP equipment This Division had no objection to the idea if the Computer Systems Division is willing to furnish the technological program for such an idea. It should be pointed out, however, the Special Investigative Division does feel that a manual system would be less costly and more efficient providing a daily up-to-date record system, thus eliminating a possible two-month lag in a monthly computer printout. Furthermore, the amount of revisions necessary for hoodlum fluctuations in residences, businesses, and hangouts should also be borne in mind.

SUGGESTION 195-75: Proposes a format be prepared on each and every criminal, as well as security informant, and potential criminal informant in the field, not only as to name or symbol, residence, business address, area of activity, but the breakdown of this data by police precinct. Also included would be the particular field in which the informant is in a position to furnish information. This data should be broken down by police precinct rather than any other system now in use in a particular field office.

CURRENT PRACTICE: SA Mulroy advises this manual breakdown is left to the discretion of field offices and, in fact, in the NYO, it is by arbitrary zones

having no relation whatsoever to police boundaries or, in fact, other legally constituted boundaries, such as Congressional, Senatorial, or postal.

ADVANTAGES: Suggester believes this data stored in the computer would be available and could be used as an investigative tool, and not just merely for the storage of source data. Further, bank robberies, kidnapings, hijackings and other investigative matters are handled out of particular police precincts. Liaison as a matter of practice is maintained with these particular precincts and in a number of cases, it is most important to know the informants which are not only working or living in the particular precinct in which a crime is involved, but also the informants in a position to furnish information on activity in the particular precinct.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC Mooney, NYO, recommended adoption and recommended that initia implementation be done on individuals in the Criminal Top Echelon group.

Computer Systems Division advised this was technically feasible with the other comments which pertained to the first suggestion and set out a format for this purpose as follows:

Special Investigative Division believes this idea has certain inherent draw-backs. The most important being that dealing with security. An orline connection with the computer banks here at FBIHQ, for example, is not recommended since it has been shown over the years that such systems do not guarantee protection against leaks, either intentional or otherwise, involving personnel employed by the commercial firms transmitting the communications. On the other hand, concern about security of the mails led to the rule that data which might reveal an informant's identity must be sent by secure teletype. Therefore, the material being transmitted both to and from the computer banks would have to be forwarded by a courier system of some sort.

It should also be borne in mind that the stenographic staff in the NYO and the programming staff in the Computer Systems Division would have access to a complete listing of all NY informants during the preparation of this material and that, once issued as a printout, this material would be readily available in a compact package. For these reasons, Special Investigative Division believes the anticipated advantages to be derived from this proposal would not compensate for the security factors involved. In the event, the committee named to study possible automation of the NYO approves the installation of a local mini-computer, then it would appear the NYO could handle the requested program without any serious threat to the security of its informants. It was recommended the idea not be approved in its present form but that consideration be given to implementing it in the event NYO is assigned a mini-computer at some time in the future.

Intelligence Division noted that with respect to use of potential security informants and security informants in this manner, it felt the idea has merit; however, it should only apply to those large offices which have a need for such application. Small offices with relatively small case loads would have no real need nor would they necessarily have police precinct breakdowns within cities. If approved, the suggestion should be expanded to include potential extremist informants and extremist informants, and in the interest of security no names of informants should be used. Only symbol numbers and limited background information (age, area of residence, employment, etc.) as well as area of activity and police precinct breakdown, should be included. Case file number and perhaps name of case Agent and/or contacting Agent should also be included. An information bank similar to that proposed is similar to one operated by Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) for their own purposes. It is called Human Source Intelligence Information Management System (HIMS) and is a newly developed system including computer files detailing resources, collection tasks, evaluation of reporting, source capabilities and profiles of past source reporting. You can dial into it (if cleared and hooked up) and get information you need or get task assigned to the logical source or sources. According to DIA, the system appears to work quite well but is just getting started at this time.

Due to the foregoing views of the interested divisions regarding these three proposals. Training Division is of the opinion that no further action should be taken until these procedures have been thoroughly evaluated by a knowledgeable representative of the Computer Systems Division.

laws, but desires to protect the identities of their
informants.

A careful review of the legislative history of Sections 851-857 of Title 50, U.S. Code, indicates the primary purpose of the enacting legislation was aimed at uncovering the potential agent by making his knowledge of espionage or sabotage a matter of public record and by so doing, possibly preventing his becoming, at some later date, an agent engaged in subversive activities for a foreign principal. Consideration was given at the time of enactment to avoiding the possibility of offending friendly foreign governments. The statute was directed at the potential espionage, counterespionage and sabotage agent and not at the internal security-type informants of a friendly country such as Canada.

We have advised the through their Liaison office that this Bureau is not soliciting from them the identities of informants who travel to this country in a nonoperational status where such travel is solely for the source's personal business or pleasure. If the presence of these informants in the United States otherwise becomes known, and it appears a determination concerning registration must be made, appropriate action will be taken to have the individual registered unless a written determination is made that such registration would not be in the interest of national security. We will, however, continue to coordinate

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with the the control of their informants on official trips to the United States and make appropriate determinations concerning registration. Departmental guidance will be solicited in individual cases of an unusual nature.

It was recommended the form be revised to eliminate the subheadings "SI" and "PSI" and to place the subheadings "OA" and "IA" in their place. It was also recommended the subheading "DA" be retained inasmuch as double agent statistics continue to be maintained. Due to these views, an amended sample of Form 5-80 is attached for approval. On approval, this letter will serve as the authority for the Forms Management Desk, Training Division, to take appropriate action.

A problem in encountered with regard to the memorandum concerning loss of a criminal informant. While Milwaukee attributes the loss to the fact that informant availed himself of the Privacy Act (PA) provisions, his services were discontinued at the direction of the Bureau after source had requested information in FBI files.

Bureau letter 8/5/75 pointed out that since informant was confined in the --- Penitentiary he should be discontinued but also made reference to Bureau letter 7/23/75 to informant concerning material in FBI records pertaining to his PA request.

It is difficult, therefore, to expand on data concerning that informant in view of circumstances as noted above. It may be that the memorandum may not be applicable in regard to captioned matter.

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT SPECIAL PROBLEMS

During the fall of 1975, an agreement was reached among a radical subversive group in a north central state to submit, as a group, a request to the FBI for information concerning each individual. Included in this group was an active FBI informant. Disclosure of information concerning said informant when received as a whole by all individuals concerned would undoubtedly disclose the identity of informant by default. Disclosure would be apparent inasmuch as, while reports and/or other disseminable communications are prepared on individuals of investigative interest, no such reports or disseminable communications are prepared concerning informants. Rather than suffer the consequences of disclosure, informant severed relations with the group. Net result was the loss of a very valuable and productive FBI informant.

INFORMANTS AND SOURCES AND
ASSETS IN THE HEWS MEDIA

To advise of the use of newsmen and individuals connected with the radio and TV media as informants, sources, and assets in connection with the Bureau's investigative activities.

In late 1973, allegations appeared in the press that the Nixon Administration used journalists as paid political spies during the 1968 and 1972 Presidential campaigns. use of political spies was widely criticized by the press. In view of the widespread publicity, the Intelligence Division conducted a review to determine the extent of the use of security and extremist informants and sources in the newspaper field. This review revealed that some 48 reporters, free-Tance journalists, correspondents for trade publications, editors, owners, etc., were either informants or sources. Of this number five were authorized by the Bureau to be/paid for services and/or reimbursed for expenses. Only two were staff writers for a major American newspaper, neither of whom waste It is noted that most of these individuals were either editors, owners, and/or reporters of foreign newspapers, small newspapers, or were sports editors or the like. This information appeared in memorandum of R. L. Shackelford to Mr. W. R. Wannall, dated 12/12/73, captioned "Use of Newsmen as Security and Extremist Informants and Sources." REC-52 66-2542-

A current review was conducted to bring this subject matter up to date which was broadened to include individuals connected with the radio and TV media as well as the newspaper media. This review revealed that there are currently 60 individuals connected with the news media. They are designated as follows:

The Miscellaneous positions are either moderators, owners, newscasters, Bureau chiefs, etc. It is noted that many of these 60 individuals are engaged in more than one area in the news media such as reporter-photographer, correspondent-announcer, owner-editor or the like. Many are also privately employed outside the media.

Thirty five of the total 60 are connected with the foreign news media such as in the Russian, Polish, Cuban, Chinese, etc. fields. Eleven of the 60 are paid under Bureau authority ranging from up to to per month for b7E services and from up to per month for expenses.

The Intelligence Division is constantly aware of the sensitivity of utilizing any individual's services connected with the newspaper field or other communications media. Prior to the utilization of any individual in the news media, careful consideration is given in each instance after an investigation of the individual. This investigation stresses stability, reliability and integrity.

Memorandum to Mr. T. W. Leavitt Re: Use of Security and Extremist Informants and Sources and Assets in the News Media

The use of informants and sources in this media is essential to the Bureau's operations. These individuals are guided and directed to furnish information only on matters within the FBI's jurisdiction. At no time are their services requested as political spies or for any matter not within the Bureau's jurisdiction. Our policy is a sound policy based upon good judgment always using selectivity accompanied by a justification for the need of such services.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this memorandum is to recommend that the handling of all security and extremist informants be transferred from the General Investigative Division (Division 6) to the Special Investigative Division (Division 9) in accordance with the recommendation made by the Informant Review Task Force.

SYNOPSIS:

In connection with the transfer of all domestic security work from the Intelligence Division (Division 5) to Division 6, the Director established an Informant Review Task Force to evaluate our policies and procedures regarding our present informant programs.

By memorandum R. J. Gallagher to Mr. J. B. Adams dated 9/13/76, recommendations were made regarding the reorganization of the domestic security work transferred from Division 5 to Division 6. This recommended reorganization took into consideration the fact that the Informant Review Task Force has recommended that all informant programs formerly handled in the two Sections in Division handling domestic security matters, be transferred to Division 9. This would place all informant programs in one Section in Division 9 with the exception of the Foreign Counterintelligence Asset Program which would remain in Division 5.,

DETAILS:

At a press conference in Washington, D. C. on 8/11/76, the Director announced the establishment of a separate review group (Informant Review Task Force) to devote its entire effort to totally reevaluating our policies and procedures in regard to our present program of criminal and security informants.

Effective 8/18/76, all work and personnel involved within the Internal Security Branch of Division 5, consisting of the IS-1 and IS-2 Sections and a portion of the CI-3 Section, were transferred to Division 6. This included the Extremist Informant Unit in the IS-1 Section and the Security Informant Unit in the IS-2 Section.

Memorandum to Mr. J. B. Adams
Re: Domestic Security and Extremist Informant Programs

The Informant Review Task Force has recommended that all informant matters formerly handled in the Internal Security Branch as mentioned above, be transferred to Division 9 where they will be handled in one Section in connection with criminal informant matters.

This transfer will encompass the two Units formerly handling extremist and security informants along with confidential sources, which were a part of the overall domestic security work transferred to Division 6.

The Informant Review Task Force has concluded that it will be in the best interest of the Bureau if all informant programs except the Foreign Counterintelligence Assets were handled in one Section of Division 9.

This transfer has been discussed with Assistant Director F. C. Fehl of Division 9 and Assistant Director R. J. Gallagher of Division 6, both of whom are in favor of this transfer.

The Agents and clerical employees formerly assigned to the two Units handling extremist and security informants in Division 6 will be available where needed for transfer to Division 9 or where appropriate to other Divisions.

The disposition of these individuals will be the subject matter of additional memoranda when the total needs have been assessed.

ADDENDUM PLANNING AND INSPECTION DIVISION RIH/imt 9/23/76

While Planning and Inspection Division agrees that the Special Investigative Division (SID) appears to be the logical division to handle all informant programs with the exception of FCI Assets, the Informant Review Task Force has not yet made a recommendation as to the degree of FBIHQ informant supervision needed nor the location of an informant unit at FBIHQ. Contact with a representative number of Informant Review Task Force members, based upon this memorandum, indicated they interposed no objection to the location of the informant unit in SID. Degree of FBIHQ informant supervision will be covered at the next Informant Review Task Force meeting.



ADDENDUM: INTELLIGENCE DIVISION 7/5/78

This suggestion recommends that we discontinue preparation of FD-209s reporting results of solely negative contacts with FCI assets, and calls for utilization of a form to be maintained behind the FD-238 pink sheet to record the dates of these negative contacts. This suggestion is identical to that of SA Lewis P. Jones, Savannah Division, dated 12/14/77, who included with his suggestion an example of the proposed new form.

In response to that suggestion, INTD pointed out that in the FCI field, FD-209s include only dates of contacts, file numbers, and personal information and data regarding the asset, and are normally completed by the handling agent in very minimal time. Further, since it is not necessary to submit an FD-209 for each contact, but only each forty-five day period, the "134" main files usually contain a limited number of the FD-209s. Thus, the current practice involves only minimal costs in terms of clerical filing time and paper costs. It is also noted that if the suggestion is approved, it would be necessary for the agents to complete some type of a memorandum to the file to at least indicate the nature of the matters being discussed with the asset, even if no positive results are obtained.

INTO is of the opinion the reasons set forth in opposition to the original suggestion remain valid.

NOTE: Suggests, in lieu of submission of FD-209 in Informative Asset (IA) cases when contact is negative and purely liaison in nature, a notation only be made in the file. Concerning the notation, it would be suggested that a form be devised to be maintained directly behind the FD-238 (Pink Sheet). The form should have a column for date of contact, method of contact, i.e., telephonic or personally, and a column for the initials only of the contacting agent. The recording of contact could be accomplished by all agent personnel by merely submitting a routing slip setting forth date of contact, method and agent's initials to the confidential clerk who in turn would record this information on the new form. 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

In order to provide SIOC personnel with instructions previously provided to INTD personnel, the following instructions are set forth for all incoming asset teletypes. These instructions were provided orally to Mr. ROBIN C. BROWN, Unit Chief, SIOC on 2/28/91.

- Informational Assets (IA) a); the original and one copy of all IA asset teletypes are to be provided to the CI-3F Unit, INTD.
  - teletypes are to be provided to the appropriate operational unit in INTD or for counterterrorism assets, the appropriate Criminal Investigative Division (CID) operational unit in the Counterterrorism (CT) Section.


