MEMORANDUM FOR MR. G. G. CALLAHAN

RE: CONFIDENTIAL NATIONAL DEFENSE INFORMANTS

You will recall our recent conversation regarding the manner in which correspondence relative to paid Confidential National Defense Informants is presently filed at the Bureau and the necessity for the Confidential Informant desk to maintain running memoranda regarding each paid informant in order that complete and up-to-date information regarding their status will be immediately available to answer the inquiries which are received from Bureau supervisors.

You will recall that the suggestion was made that if the correspondence regarding each paid informant was filed in a separate file, complete information would be available without hunting through numerous files to obtain the same, which might alleviate the necessity of maintaining running memoranda regarding paid informants.

The possibility of setting up a separate file on each paid informant was discussed with W. Y. Pond of the Records Section, who advised that it would be a tremendous task, requiring a great deal of work and the utilization of considerable personnel to remove serials from the files and make a separate file on each paid informant. As an alternative, I discussed with Mr. Pond the possibility of setting up a separate file on each new paid informant so that future correspondence regarding new paid informants would be found in one file. Mr. Pond stated that this suggestion would be considered.

I subsequently discussed this procedure with Frank W. Waikart of the Records Section who advised that due to the intricate method of classifying, it would practically be an impossibility to insure that correspondence regarding new paid informants would be filed properly if new files on each informant were made up. He stated that this would necessitate that each letter regarding an informant would necessarily have to be searched and that even then he could not assure any degree of success that such correspondence would be properly classified and filed.

In view of this information, there appears to be no other alternative than to continue to maintain running memoranda regarding each paid informant as it is deemed essential in order that the Confidential Informant desk may expediently and accurately advise the various supervisors of the Bureau relative to the status and activities of each paid informant.

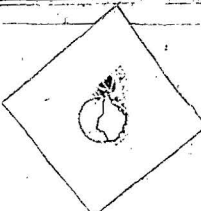

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

RE: INFORMANT COVERAGE OF
RACIAL CONDITIONS

I thought you would be interested in the attached chart reflecting the general increase in informant coverage of racial conditions in those Field Divisions wherein racial tension in the past has appeared to be the most serious. There is set forth under the date of September 15, 1943, the total number of sources of information, informants and contacts who supply information concerning racial conditions. There is then a column devoted to the total as of January 15, 1944, in the same Field Divisions. Thereafter is a column setting forth the evaluation placed by each Office on its informant coverage.

The Field appears to be very conscious of the need for development and maintenance of a good informant coverage in this matter. Almost all Offices have increased and improved the character of their informant coverage of racial conditions. As a whole the Field has developed informants who relieve them of the necessity of relying on other law enforcement or Governmental agencies for pertinent information. In addition, it has been noted in the various survey letters submitted by Field Offices reflecting their informant coverage that confidential national defense plant informants, American Legion contacts and other good sources are being utilized, as well as general confidential informants and sources of information. It should not be overlooked that Negroes have been increasingly used both as confidential informants and sources of information.

It is believed worthy of note that all Offices requested to supply a survey are alert for additional informant coverage and in a number of instances this matter has been discussed with Agents at quarterly conferences so that they may be aware at all times for the need of this type of coverage. The Field now recognizes the need for a good area or neighborhood coverage involving the location of informants in neighborhoods and sections which represent focal points of possible racial friction. This has been particularly true with regard to those Field Divisions in which large cities are located.

The coverage is implemented considerably through the use of technical sources of information concerning organizational activity. There are well over 150 technical and microphone surveillances on the

Communist Party throughout the Field. This organization is the most active and the most important to be considered in connection with exploitation of the Negro race in this country. Almost all of these technical sources provide considerable information concerning racial conditions which are one of the main interests of the Party. *(S/11)*

As a whole, it might be pointed out, informant coverage of organizational activity among Negroes is good and practically all Field Divisions have indicated their awareness of the necessity for this particular type of coverage. In most areas wherein racial conditions are the most serious there is also good cooperation between local law enforcement authorities and G-2 in this matter.

CONVERSE of this office and has been found to be in a position to furnish confidential and reliable information, therefore he is being carried in the records of this field division as a Confidential General Investigative Informant, symbol number [redacted]

[redacted] resides at [redacted] Rockdale, Illinois, no telephone, at which address he operates a tavern. He has lived at Rockdale since 1910 and was a member of the Rockdale Police Department for five years from 1915 to 1920. He was born [redacted] in Austria-Hungary. He is registered with Local Board No. 2, Will County, Joliet, Illinois.

The indices of this field division failed to reflect any information concerning [redacted]. He has no criminal record in Will County, Illinois, and the records of the Will County Credit Bureau reflect no additional information other than he has had one bill turned over for collection.

[redacted] has been contacted from time to time regarding an I.O. investigation presently pending in this office, and has been able to furnish helpful information in this regard. He is in a position to furnish general criminal information regarding the Rockdale area and personal information concerning any Slovenian activities in this area. It has been found very difficult to secure information from the Slovenian people in the Rockdale area.

[redacted] has requested that even though he was only giving general information at times and not particularly confidential information, that he be contacted only by Special Agents EDWARD E. CONVERSE or FRANCIS BUTTERWORTH, JR., and that his identity be kept confidential.

In the past she has assisted law enforcement officers in any way possible, and has advised an agent of this office that she could find out through sources of information that she has, whether or not any White Slave Traffic Act ring was operating in and around Greenville at any time.

Dr. FREDERICK C. EHERMA, United States Board of Health representative, Greenville, South Carolina, advised that this girl had until very recently been engaged in prostitution in and around Greenville, and knew practically every pimp and prostitute in that section, and could be depended upon to obtain information regarding White Slave Traffic Act activities at any time in this vicinity.

Chief of Detectives L. W. HAMMOND, Greenville, advised that [redacted] has a record for prostitution in and around Greenville, but has been a very good informant of the Police Department in connection with prostitution activities. She is not a paid informant.

RE: INFORMANT COVERAGE OF RACIAL CONDITIONS
INTERNAL SECURITY

Recently those Field Divisions in which racial tension has been prevalent submitted a survey of their informant coverage of racial conditions. A comparison of this survey with one which was submitted in August 1943 by the same Offices indicates generally there has been considerable improvement in the development and the maintenance of this type of informant coverage. As a whole all Offices submitting the survey increased and improved the character of their coverage and it was indicated that the number and the type of informants relieved many of the Field Offices from the necessity of relying on other law enforcement or Governmental agencies for current and pertinent information. Confidential plant informants and American Legion contacts had been contacted by some Offices and advised of the Bureau's interest in matters affecting racial conditions, thereby making them available as informants. This reflected that these Offices are conscious of the need for the development and maintenance of a complete informant coverage in this particular matter.

Some Offices, in comparison with the figures of other Offices, listed a large number of confidential informants, sources of information, and contacts available for use in following racial matters. These large figures indicate the possibility that the quality of informants has been overlooked in the concentration for quantity. This is not desirable since the quality of informants must always take precedence over the quantity in any Field Division. As you are aware, each Office is held strictly responsible to keep the Bureau promptly advised of all important information on racial conditions and race relationship, and if a haphazard choice of informants is made, a Field Office will not be in a position to carry out its responsibility.


From information received in various parts of the country where in the past there has been racial tension, there are possibilities of future racial outbreaks as indicated by a number of informants in entirely separate areas. Accordingly it is extremely important that all Field Divisions continue to concentrate on their development of a good coverage. This does not only mean that good confidential national defense informants should be developed, but that reliable sources of information and contacts be available at all times.

Sources of information and contacts, who, are reliable, must be made to understand the Bureau's desire to be promptly informed. Merely contacting these individuals on one or two occasions does not provide this insurance. Accordingly those who are reliable should be recontacted on subsequent occasions. Confidential plant informants and American Legion contacts should be utilized to the best possible advantage. Confidential plant informants should be able to provide pertinent information concerning actual or potential racial trouble in industrial facilities. In the past two years numerous racial clashes have arisen in plants employing both Negroes and white persons.

Prior instructions issued in this matter have included the requirement of having a good area or neighborhood coverage of those places which are focal points of possible racial disturbances. This requirement does not mean that a large number of people whose value as informants is questionable should be referred to the Bureau as part of an Office's informant coverage. The quality should precede the quantity. A number of names of proposed confidential national defense informants have in the past been submitted to the Bureau by various Field Offices. A review of their qualifications indicates a tendency by some Field Offices to designate prematurely individuals as confidential national defense informants before their ability has been demonstrated to function in this capacity. In accordance with existing Bureau instructions only those individuals who are furnishing the Bureau with information regarding national defense matters with a reasonable degree of frequency are to be listed in this category. The mere fact that individuals have displayed a cooperative attitude and expressed their willingness to furnish information in the event it comes to their attention does not justify their classification as confidential national defense informants. You should maintain frequent contact with these persons to stimulate their interest and possibly to develop them to the point where they may be properly considered as confidential national defense informants. Until such time as these persons furnish information concerning national defense matters with a reasonable degree of frequency, they should not be characterized as confidential national defense informants.

The foregoing observations and instructions are issued so that you may be alert to the problem of developing as well as improving your informant coverage of racial conditions. This is a matter of the utmost importance and accordingly you are being held strictly responsible to see that these instructions are carried out and that you are consequently in a position to furnish the Bureau promptly with pertinent information at all times.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

The Executive's Conference, with Messrs. E. A. Tamm, Tracy, Quinn Tamm, Nichols, Coffey, Hendon, Hince, Acers, Carson and Mumford present, today considered a suggestion received in a letter from SAC Pieper which he stated originated with "an Agent of his office" concerning the security of the identity of Bureau confidential informants. The letter pointed out that there has been a tremendous increase in letters between the Bureau and Field Offices in which the actual names of confidential informants appear, that these letters appear to be necessary, and it was therefore suggested that a means be adopted of identifying the informants without including their names. The letter suggests that since the informants are given a symbol number the letters refer to the informants only by symbol numbers so that the actual identity of the person will be available only to those authorized to have such information in the Field Office or at the Seat of Government.

It was the unanimous opinion of the members of the Conference that the present system affords the best security feasible; that if letters and other communications identified the informants only by symbol numbers there would be too great a danger of a typographical error, resulting in action which would cause embarrassment. Furthermore, with our present number of informants for whom symbols are designated, reference to them solely by symbol numbers in letters would cause a tremendous expenditure of time on the part of Bureau officials calling the confidential informant desk to learn the name of the informant and would necessitate the assignment of additional personnel to that desk to handle such inquiries.

If you concur with the opinion of the Conference, there is attached hereto a letter addressed to Mr. Pieper so informing him and also advising him that he should hereafter include in letters of suggestion directed to you the name of the Agent making the suggestion so that appropriate recognition can be accorded the Agent.

FILES MAINTAINED BY THE ~~CONFIDENTIAL~~
INFORMANT DESK

The Confidential Informant Desk has in the past received inquiries from various Bureau supervisors to determine whether the Bureau had any informants who could attend a specific meeting of an organization. This occurs, for example, when one field office may not feel that their informant coverage of a particular meeting will be adequate and the Bureau deems it advisable to send individuals from other offices to supplement the coverage.

The informant indices maintained by the Confidential Informant Desk are not presently set up in such a manner to most expeditiously locate an informant in an organization but rather to determine the identity of an informant from his symbol number. It is felt that it would be of additional assistance to the Bureau supervisors if an index was started and maintained by subject matter of those individuals who are in an unusual position to assist the Bureau. For example, those individuals who can qualify as expert witnesses regarding German matters; those individuals who because of their membership and position in the American Youth for Democracy can attend an important meeting of this organization any place in the country; those individuals who because of their positions as officers of the Slovak National Alliance could attend a meeting of this organization, et cetera.

It is deemed advisable to start this index as a restricted group and develop it gradually in accordance with the needs of the supervisors and the trends and activities of the various organizations. It is realized that many supervisors have knowledge of individuals, not familiar to the supervisor on the Confidential Informant Desk, who should be placed in this index in order that the greatest benefit to the Bureau and the supervisors of the Security Division may be attained. It is therefore deemed advisable to notify the supervisors of the Security Division that such an index is being started, and to request them to furnish to the Confidential Informant Desk the names of those individuals who they feel should be included therein, to explain how such will be of assistance to them, and to request their cooperation in maintaining it in a current status.

Tolson, Tracy, Rosen, Quinn Tamm, Carson, Hince, Nichols, Acers, Hendon, Clegg and Mumford in attendance, today considered a suggestion by the supervisors assigned to the Confidential Informant Section of the Security Division that a new index file be established of confidential informants and sources of information broken down according to subject matters. This suggestion contemplates that should a Bureau official or supervisor desire information concerning a particular nationalistic group, ideological group, or organizations or individuals engaged in a particular profession or business, he could refer to this index and thereby secure the names of those confidential informants or sources in a position to furnish these data. This suggestion is predicated on the fact that a number of inquiries have been received by the supervisors handling confidential informants for the names of such individuals and sources.

The members of the Conference were unanimously of the opinion that the time and effort which would be required to establish and maintain such an index at the Seat of Government would not be justified. The supervisors handling the individual ideological groups and organizations in the Security Division are fairly familiar with the more valuable informants and sources and, furthermore, it is believed it is the responsibility of the Field Office to which leads are directed to be aware of the informants and sources of information it has available.

If you concur with the opinion of the Conference, no further action will be taken in this matter at the present time.

She has received several notices to attend meetings of Branch 350 of the King County Communist Party, however, due to a rather extended illness she has not attended any meetings of this latter branch. This informant has indicated that as soon as she completely regains her health she intends to again become active as a member of Branch 350 of the King County Communist Party.

At this time the Bureau is not being requested to continue the compensation of [redacted] as a paid confidential informant. When she again becomes active in the Communist Party the Bureau will be so advised and a request will be made for authorization at that time. In the event this informant furnishes any information of value to this office in the near future she will be compensated at a rate not to exceed [redacted] per month, provided the information furnished is of value. *ELW*

Confidential Informants and Sources of Information

It is believed that the National Defense Informants, the general investigative Informants, the Source of Information file, and the Confidential Plant Informants file would serve the investigating agents in the field better were they to be listed according to their addresses in addition to the type of information that they furnish.

This file once it is established would serve a valuable purpose in re-contacting Informants who have been developed and making them feel that their services as individuals were of more importance than they feel at the present time. An agent could refer to this file when he needed to conduct a neighborhood investigation.

This Source of Information file, as well as the suggested cross-reference file, should be made available to an agent as near as the telephone especially in the larger offices. If an agent were out of the office on an investigation and should wish to know of a reliable person to contact in a particular neighborhood, it would be a simple matter for him to telephone the office and obtain this information from the clerk in charge of this file.

Indexing

The information contained in the files of the FBI is not readily available on persons holding common names. For example, in the larger offices the name of John Johnson might have fifty or seventy-five cross-references.

It is felt that this situation could be relieved to some extent if the field were to make a concerted effort through the agents that each time they review a file which contains a reference to a common name that some other identifying data be requested to be placed on the index card, such as race and the place of birth. This would entail in the original inception a great deal of work. However, after the period of a few months, the saving in agents' time when seeking a similar name on other occasions would more than out-weigh its original consumption of time.

Cross-References

It is the established practice in the Detroit Field Division on the Communist Squad to prepare a memorandum for the file indicating the cross-references which have been reviewed in the preparation of a report of either a person or an organization. By review, an agent writing the next report may eliminate those cross-references previously listed on a memorandum and report only those not given in a previous report.

This system has proven practical in this type of investigation, and it is suggested that a similar procedure be adopted for every report submitted by an agent. This memorandum not only lists those files which are pertinent but also lists files bearing reference to a similar name which is not identical with the Subject of instant investigation. However, in lengthy Communist reports, many of the "Key Figures" have seventy-five to 150 cross-references. Even though the memorandum is prepared for the file, nothing is done to change the original 3 x 5 index card in the Chief Clerk's Office to show that these cross-references have been consolidated into a report. This adds an additional burden to the Chief Clerk's Office by the fact that in preparing an index check for a second or third report it is necessary for them to list all the cross-references in longhand and then the reviewing agent checks those against his previous list of cross-references which were reported in order that he may report only those not previously reported.

Therefore, it is suggested that when a report is dictated and cross-references have been reviewed, in addition to the memorandum being prepared for the file (to serve as a double check) that a new 3 x 5 card or cards be prepared for the main indices showing all the cross-references which have been reviewed for a particular report. This could be shown in contrast by typing these reviewed file numbers in red. It would then be the Chief Clerk's duty to compare the new index cards in red with the previous index cards and delete from the old index cards those references which have been reported.

Reference is made to Bureau memorandum dated March 7, 1944, attaching proposed forms to be filled out by Agents after confidential plant informants or sources of information have been developed.

I believe the use of such forms would be desirable and should be approved. I am in favor of them for the reason that the use of the forms would help the Agent organize his material. It would also serve as a convenient check list for the Agent as to items he needs to consider. The use of the form would also make easier the review of the material by the supervisor since there would be uniformity in the sequence of recording the information. It would, of course, also save the time of both Agent and stenographer in eliminating dictation, as pointed out in the Bureau memorandum.

The Executive Conference, with Messrs. Glavin, Nichols, Ladd, Coffey, Rosen, Q. Tamm, Hendon and Mumford in attendance, today considered a suggestion submitted by Special Agent William Joseph Moran, Jr., submitted in compliance with your letter of March 25, 1944, that because of the Bureau's interest in the maritime field, a canvass be made of Bureau employees to secure the names of their close relatives serving in the Merchant Marine who could be developed and used as confidential informants.

The members of the Executive Conference in attendance were unanimously opposed to adoption of this suggestion. Various members expressed the opinions that the Agents, through their regular operations, could develop these sources with as much efficiency and reliability and, furthermore, all Agents have heretofore, on various occasions, been urged to submit the names of any persons known to them who might be of value to the Bureau as informants. It was further suggested that such a circularization to all employees, which would include distribution of a request from you to each individual clerk, might result in improper disclosure of the Bureau's interest in such a way that it might be misunderstood.

If you concur with the members of the conference, there is attached hereto for your approval a letter of acknowledgment to Special Agent Moran.

There are attached hereto two confidential memoranda dated June 6, and June 9, 1944, respectively, which were loaned to the writer by [redacted] MID. These memoranda contain information relative to the activities of meetings held by the District Executive Committee of the Illinois-Indiana Communist Political Association. [redacted] advised the writer in confidence that these reports are prepared by an individual who is a member of [redacted]. The reports are then furnished to Colonel Furbershaw, formerly the Director of Security and Intelligence of the Sixth Service Command and now retired, who furnishes them to [redacted].

[redacted] furnished the writer with the following background concerning the confidential informant. The confidential informant, according to [redacted] was a former I.W.W. who in the past was arrested for engaging in "radical activities" or distribution of "radical literature." When he was arrested, according to [redacted] Furbershaw was a prosecuting attorney in Chicago. The confidential informant was sentenced and served time for this arrest. [redacted] stated that the confidential informant one time recently made himself known to Furbershaw when he met him in a restaurant in Chicago and indicated that he held no hard feelings because of the past. Subsequently, he allegedly advised Furbershaw that he had changed his viewpoints and was definitely anti-Communist but in order to keep himself informed of the Communists' activities, had joined the Party and was a member of the Illinois-Indiana Communist District Executive Committee of the Illinois-Indiana Communist Political Association. According to [redacted] the confidential informant was approached as to making his identity known to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in order that he might report the activities directly to the FBI. [redacted] stated that the confidential informant objected to this and stated that he would only furnish information to Colonel Furbershaw and through Colonel Furbershaw to [redacted]

[redacted] pointed out that in the past when information has been received from this confidential informant, the material has been paraphrased and a paraphrase furnished to the Bureau. [redacted] stated that the Military Intelligence Division considers this informant reliable. He stated that he personally does not know the name of this confidential informant nor has he ever made any attempt to ascertain his name.

[redacted] stated that in view of the reorganization of the Military Intelligence Division he fears that these reports might not be paraphrased and furnish to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and he felt a personal obligation that the material in these reports should definitely be made available to the Bureau. He stated, however, he did not wish to furnish copies of these reports to the Bureau since in doing so, he could be violating the confidence of the confidential informant and that if copies appeared in Bureau files some time in the future, the material might be used in a manner which would bring the identity of the informant to light.

The writer advised [] that the material appearing in these reports could be handled by the Bureau in such a way so as to protect the informant and protect [] He stated that he will make available to the writer the reports received from the confidential informant as soon as received and that the writer could bring these reports to the Bureau in order that they might be reviewed by the supervisors handling such matters and returned to [] promptly. (U) b7D

It is suggested that this memorandum with the attachments be forwarded to the Internal Security Section, first, in order that the material in the attachments might be reviewed and digested; second, in order that a system might be worked out whereby the writer can make these reports available to the interested supervisor in the Internal Security Section as soon as received in order that they might be promptly handled. It is also suggested that a confidential informant symbol be designated for these reports in order that should the Bureau desire to disseminate information appearing in these reports in paraphrased form to the field, that it might be done more readily and without disclosing the source of information.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that this memorandum and attachments be forwarded to the Internal Security Section for its information and appropriate action and that the attached reports be returned to the writer promptly in order that he might in turn return them to Colonel Forney.

In acknowledgment of your letter dated July 10, 1944, the following brief information is furnished relating to the above-captioned informant.

Confidential Informant has been an informant of the Bureau for a number of years. His home is in the Saint Paul territory and he has traveled about the country from time to time in connection with race horse-pocketbook swindles. This informant is extremely valuable in that he is personally acquainted with a large number of confidence men and from time to time obtains current and reliable information concerning confidence men. This informant may be used to advantage in any confidence game case. The informant is able to obtain valuable information concerning crime conditions generally in any locality. Because the informant has operated in many places in the United States he knows how to proceed in any given territory in acquiring the information desired. The informant gets the information in his own way and through his own sources. He is thoroughly reliable.

This informant must be handled with unusual discreetness and no reference to any information he has furnished should be made to anyone outside of the Bureau under any circumstances.

The proposed trip of Confidential Informant has been temporarily postponed. You should advise the Bureau, however, if there are any situations in your territory wherein you believe an informant of the caliber previously described above could be of enough assistance to warrant the expense connected with sending him to your territory.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. D. M. LADD

RE: PROPOSED CHANGES IN SECTION 9A OF THE
MANUAL OF RULES AND REGULATIONS AND
SECTION 13 OF THE NATIONAL DEFENSE MANUAL PER-
TAINING TO CONFIDENTIAL INFORMANTS.

A careful review has been made of Section 9A of the Manual of Rules and Regulations, and Section 13 of the National Defense Manual, both of which deal with confidential informants. It is recommended that the changes which are set forth in the attached memorandums be made to bring these sections of the Manual up to date.

After each proposed change there is set forth the number and the date of the Bureau Bulletin by which the change was made. If no Bureau Bulletin is indicated, the suggested change has been made necessary as the logical result of a bulletin affecting a related instruction except in the instances discussed below.

At the present time the Bureau requires a quarterly report on Confidential Plant Informants which must specifically reflect the name and address of each industrial facility of importance to the National Defense; the number of employees, and the number of Confidential Plant Informants which have been developed by the field in each facility.

As of March 1944, the Bureau had developed approximately 71,500 plant informants in over 13,300 industrial facilities. The totals are of course increasing and it can readily be seen from these figures that the preparation of quarterly reports in their present form necessitates the expenditure of a tremendous amount of time on the part of field office personnel. In some offices where there is a high concentration of industrial facilities, the reports will exceed 50 pages in length. (u)

As you know, the Bureau no longer requires the field to submit the names and background information concerning the plant informants developed. This data is now retained in the field office files. Since this new procedure has been in effect, the supervisor of the confidential informant desk has been considering the keeping track of the requests which are made and of the necessity for having available at the Bureau the statistical data regarding the plants in which informants have been developed and the specific number in each plant. The result of this survey indicates this information

is not presently utilized sufficiently to justify the continued submission of the detailed information regarding the plants, number of employees, and number of informants developed in each plant. This decision is based upon a consideration of the time required to submit these reports as well as the space required to file them in the field offices as well as the Bureau.

However, in order that the Bureau may follow the activities of the field in connection with the development of Confidential Plant Informants, it is deemed necessary that the field be required to submit statistical data regarding this matter in accordance with the recommendations which are set forth below.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. It is recommended that the form of the present quarterly reports regarding Confidential Plant Informants in Section 13I (2) be changed to require the field to submit statistics regarding the total number of confidential plant informants developed, the number of facilities covered, and also to reflect the increase during the last quarter.

2. It is further recommended that an addition be made to Section 13K of the National Defense Manual, dealing with Bureau policy, to instruct the field to carefully explain to all National Defense Informants that any steps which they take in connection with joining any organizations must be on their own initiative and responsibility and that such cannot be sanctioned by the Bureau. The experience of incidents in the field has indicated a necessity for this requirement to be placed in the manual to insure there is no misunderstanding regarding this matter.

SUGGESTION:

Special Agent R. L. King, San Francisco, offered the suggestion that when a Communist paid informant has functioned for a period of six months and his services have proved entirely satisfactory thereafter the period of authorization be extended from three to six months and that justification for the retention of the services of the informant be furnished on a six months rather than a three months basis.

ADVANTAGES:

1. It would reduce paper work in the field.
2. A period of six months forms a better basis for judging the value of the informant than a period of three months.
3. It was pointed out that particularly in the Communist field, due to inner-party transfers and the like an informant is sometimes relatively inactive for a considerable portion of the ordinary three months period. Six months would give sufficient time to properly judge the informant's value in such situations.

DISADVANTAGES:

1. It would result in less supervision at the Seat of Government.

Reference is made to your request for information concerning the status of the filing of reports received from the above informant.

Originally, when reports of this informant were received at the Bureau, pertinent portions thereof were paraphrased, after which they were placed in the subject matter file. The original report of [REDACTED] which usually was and still is in the form of an onion skin tickler, was destroyed. This practice continued up until December, 1941. At that time the Files Section raised the issue of the handling of reports received from Confidential Informant [REDACTED]. It is pointed out that frequently these reports were received in the Files Section with no indication as to the source. As a result, the reports were filed in the various files, depending on the subject matter of the report without the same being paraphrased. It therefore became necessary, upon locating such a report in file, to have it killed and removed by the Files Section. With the rapid increase in the Security Division, and the fact that the report had to be routed to numerous individuals therein, many of these reports found their way into the Bureau file, contrary to the general accepted practice prior to that time.

On this date, this matter was discussed with Mr. Waikart of the Files Section. He advised that as a result of the above situation and the general condition that existed in so far as the filing of confidential informant reports was concerned, he had prepared several blue memoranda for Mr. Nichols, outlining in detail the conditions. He stated that to the best of his recollection the matter was discussed by Mr. Nichols with Mr. Tamm, at which time a decision concerning the filing of reports of confidential informants and particularly the reports of Confidential Informant [REDACTED] was taken up. It is also the recollection of Supervisors of this Section, who were here at the time that such a conference was held, at which time it was decided that the reports of Confidential Informant [REDACTED] could be filed in the individual Bureau files without being paraphrased on the basis of the subject matter contained in the report itself.

The files contain a memorandum from Mr. Nichols to Mr. Patterson of the Files Section dated January 2, 1942, wherein Mr. Nichols states that Mr. Tamm had advised that in connection with the handling of reports of confidential informants they no longer need be paraphrased and that they can be filed as they are received. Mr. Nichols, therein, issued instructions to the Files Section that [REDACTED] reports, as well as other confidential informant reports can be filed without being retyped or paraphrased in the absence of contrary instructions which might be issued in the future. A pencil notation on this memorandum reflects that oral instructions were issued to the Classifying, Routing and Recording Units of the Files Section on January 3, 1942, by Mr. Waikart of the Files Section in this regard.



The Bureau must continue to maintain full coverage of all national defense matters within our investigative jurisdiction, but with the progress of the war resulting in the decreased activities of some groups, it is realized the value of the information submitted by some informants will also decrease and thus their compensation must be adjusted accordingly.

You are instructed to personally review the paid National Defense Informants of your office and carefully examine the picture and trend of activities within your field division to definitely determine that all paid informants are producing information commensurate with the amount of money being paid to them and that conditions within your territory fully justify their continued use as informants.

After this review has been made, the Bureau should be promptly advised of any adjustments which you deem necessary in the stipend presently being paid to your informants. You must continue to afford this matter your personal attention to insure the Bureau is receiving a full return for the money paid to informants.

Reference is made to Bureau letter to all Special Agents in Charge, series No. 248 - 1944 dated September 21, 1944 regarding technical surveillances wherein the Bureau requested each Field Division to make a review of all technical surveillances within their respective Field Divisions.

On May 18, 1944 authority was requested to utilize a technical surveillance on the telephone of HOPE STEVENS, Negro Communist Attorney located at 209 West 125th Street, New York City. The purpose of the surveillance was to ascertain the Communist affiliations and activities of STEVENS who was an officer of the West Indies National Council, a Negro organization headed by W. A. DOMINGO, West Indian radical. This organization was believed to be Communist dominated and was attempting to unite the various islands of the West Indies under the jurisdiction of Great Britain or the United States. Both the State Department and the British Colonial Office expressed interest in the activities of this group and from time to time have contacted the Bureau regarding the possibility that the West Indies Council in New York City might be sending money and propaganda to radical groups in the West Indies, particularly the various peoples national parties there. Several prominent Communists and ex-Communists in this City appear to be active in the affairs of the WINC.

On June 28, 1944 with the permission of the Bureau a technical surveillance NY-222 was installed and the Bureau advised by teletype. A summary of the information received by this office since installation is as follows:

HOPE STEVENS appears to be very active in Negro Communist Party affairs and is in frequent contact with the following known Communists:

SUBJECT: PHILIPPINE INFORMATION

As you know, the Army is very secretly getting personnel out of the Philippines - supposedly by submarine - and upon these individuals being returned to the United States they are cautioned not to talk to anybody concerning their means or methods of escape or the circumstances. In addition, these individuals are pretty thoroughly processed and interrogated by the Army as to war operational details.

I am advised by Special Agent Doyle at New York City that there is a group of ~~X~~ Jesuit Priests resident at Madison Avenue, New York City, two of whom have just returned from the Philippine Islands by these means and they have considerable information which it is believed would be of value to us as to the present conditions in the Philippines, collaborators, and the like.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the SIS Section be authorized to instruct Special Agent Doyle to interview these Priests for such information as they may be able to offer concerning present conditions in the Philippines.

Dear Sir:

On September 20, 1944, during the course of a conference with Bishop JOHN F. O'HARA in New York City, the subject of the Philippine Islands was discussed with the Bishop by Jerome Doyle of the New York SIS office.

Bishop O'Hara introduced to Doyle, Reverend Father SCANLON and MAGNIAR, two priests of the Redemptrists Order who have just been assigned to the Immaculate Conception Church in the Bronx, New York. Bishop O'Hara advised that these two priests had recently escaped from the Philippine Islands and had just returned to New York City on September 16, 1944. They departed from the Philippine Islands in March 1944. He stated further that these two priests had never been in the custody of the Japanese but had lived in the hills with the natives ever since the outbreak of war in December 1941. The method in which they escaped is considered a military secret and these priests were not permitted even to tell Bishop O'Hara how they got out of the Philippine Islands.

Bishop O'Hara advised these two priests in Doyle's presence that they should furnish any information concerning living conditions and the like in the Philippines requested of them by Doyle. The priests advised that they could be reached at telephone number Melrose 5-7030 and they would be happy to be of assistance in any way possible.

At the same time, it was ascertained from Bishop O'Hara that the Jesuit Order maintains an office at 962 Madison Avenue, New York City, Butterfield 8-1390, known as the Jesuits Foreign Mission. This branch is in charge of Father ALEXANDER, S.J. and since the outbreak of the war, has gathered information on the Philippine Islands from a variety of sources. Bishop O'Hara explained that the Jesuit Order has had missionaries and teachers in the Philippine Islands for hundreds of years and of all the Orders of the Roman Catholic Church, this is the best advised and has the most complete coverage of the islands. At the outbreak of war in the Philippines, hundreds of members of the Jesuit Order of American birth were located in the Philippine Islands. Since that time, many have escaped from the custody of the Japanese;

others have been repatriated to the United States; and others who had never been taken prisoners by the Japanese, have been able to get back to the United States. All these clergymen have been interviewed and the information compiled has been made available to the United States Army. In addition, whenever the office of the Military Ordinate gathers information from other sources of conditions in the Philippines, this information is likewise passed on to the Jesuit Foreign Mission office.

Bishop O'Hara feels that the Jesuit office is probably the most complete source of information on the Philippines with the possible exception of certain branches of Army and Navy Military Intelligence. However, he feels that the Jesuits have some complete information on certain subjects inasmuch as the Army would not be interested in those subjects. Bishop O'Hara stated that he was certain that the Jesuit authorities would gladly make available any information to Bureau representatives relative to the Philippine Islands or, if requested, would furnish clergymen who would gladly lecture to any training classes or groups of Agents who might be interested in present conditions in the Philippine Islands.

No commitments were made by Doyle with Bishop O'Hara relative to the subject matter but he was merely thanked for his interest and advised that if the Bureau did have any interest in the Philippine Islands, that the sources already outlined would be approached.

The foregoing is being brought to the Bureau's immediate attention in view of the fact that a special training class is in session at the Sent of Government which is mainly concerned with background information on the Philippine Islands. No affirmative action will be taken by Jerome Doyle in New York City unless so advised by the Bureau.

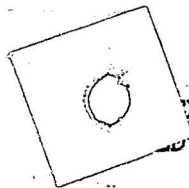

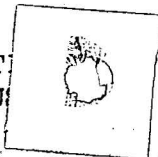

MOYER was a prominent labor leader in that area and a key figure at that time in the Communist Party. Such contributions however, were made by many persons interested in the labor movement in that area who were not members of the Communist Party. (u)

Discreet inquiries at Easton, Pennsylvania have reflected that [redacted] has a general reputation for being an active labor leader and is highly regarded as such. Because of his labor activity he has been characterized by some persons as being a radical. However, the inquiries have reflected favorably on his patriotism, reliability and integrity. (u)

[redacted] has already furnished this office with information concerning the Communist infiltration of labor groups in Easton and in particular concerning the International Fur and Leather Workers Union, as well as the Northampton County Industrial Union Council and Political Action Committee. To protect his identity you have designated him as a National Defense Informant and given him a symbol number. *u*

[redacted] has been interviewed numerous times by various Government agencies, and the Bureau is familiar with his background as furnished during these interviews. The files also reflect that orders for his deportation have been received, and in 1941, a deportation warrant was still outstanding against him. In this regard I am enclosing a copy of the report of Special Agent G. J. Starr, dated March 14, 1941 at New York, in the case entitled [redacted] with aliases, Immigration Matter" for your information. *u*

It is noted the Agents who have contacted [redacted] apparently do not know his address, and in this connection the files of the Bureau reflect that he resided at [redacted] Detroit, Michigan, in 1943. In view of the background of this individual and his apparent reluctance to fully cooperate with the Agents of your office, the Bureau does not desire to refer to him as a National Defense Informant. There will, however, be no objection to your using the symbol number to identify him in reports, but in any future communications which are necessary he should be referred to as an "Informer" and not a National Defense Informant. *u*

In regard to your statement that the cards made up on this individual in your office will not bear his name but will merely state that his identity is known to several designated Agents, the Bureau does not consider this the best arrangement for handling this matter. Section 9-A (5) of the Manual of Rules and Regulations sets out provisions for handling a situation of this kind and you should be guided accordingly. *u*

GREENWALD, and JOHN R. HEIM of this office concerning the Party at the time he was in it and individuals with whom he was in the Party. He has requested, however, that his name appear at no place in Bureau files as a source of information. In order, however, to identify information received from him the above symbol is being assigned to him. He will receive no regular compensation. *U*

In view of his attitude concerning secrecy, it has not been possible to inquire of him completely concerning his background. However, the following information is available in Detroit files. *U*

Informant has claimed that he was born in Scranton, Pennsylvania, on [redacted] while his mother stated before the American Consulate General in Vienna, Austria, that he was born on that date in Montesicz, Slovakia. *U*

[redacted] advised Army Intelligence Officers during his service with the United States Army during the present war on January 4, 1943, that he had joined the Communist Party in 1921. He stated to them that thereafter he became secretary of a unit of the Party, which at that time was underground. Later he became District Secretary of the Party in New York and was in charge of the New York District of the Party between 1931 and 1934. This informant has continued to be assigned to the Columbus Professional Club of the San Francisco County Communist Political Association. He has attended a number of meetings of this groups and has made detailed reports to this office concerning the business of these meetings. He has also identified a number of members of this club who were previously unknown to this office, and has submitted detailed descriptive data which resulted in placing several persons whose exact Communist Affiliation was not previously known. As the Bureau is aware, the membership of the Professional groups includes persons who are usually above average in the business and professional life of the Community and their identity is closely guarded. This informant has been able to supply advance information on the CPA policy with regard to the professional groups and has advised that the present trend is to strip such clubs of all except those who must keep absolutely secret their Communist membership. He has been able to inform of transfers out of his group and has supplied the names of the other groups to which the transferred members were assigned. (u)

He has continued to attend weekly luncheon meetings with [redacted] a key figure Communist in this area, and has reported the conversations which took place on those occasions. While no outstanding information has been developed from these meetings in the past pay period, it is believed that they are important and that by attending them the informant will be in position to report matters of importance when they do arise. In the past pay period he has obtained from this source, some interesting data regarding the financial contributions to the CPA locally, and has identified two members of the CPA State Finance Committee. He has also established the fact that [redacted] secured over \$40,000 in contributions in the past year for the CPA. (u)

Dear Mr. Tamm:

[redacted] formerly of Seattle now writes me that she is settled in New Orleans, her address being [redacted]. Also that she is establishing contacts and is ready and willing to cooperate, etc.

When I conferred with her in Seattle early in March she told me that she was giving some thought to moving to New Orleans in order to be with her husband who is in the Army there. She went on to explain that she was sure that she could be of value at New Orleans; that she had very good connections with the Maritime Union which she stated was invested with Communists; and went on to say in this same connection that possibly her best plan would be to sign up with the CWA at Seattle before leaving and then take a transfer if she finally decided to move. I didn't offer much comment, bearing in mind our knowledge of her past activities, etc. She has always denied to me that she was ever a member of the Party but freely admitting that the majority of her friends were Communists, adding that she herself was a rabid anti-Communist and for that reason has always been accused of being a Communist.

In any case, I believe that she can be of value down there and have prepared her for a possible call by someone from the Field Office. Or, if you wish, I can arrange to pick her up again, get her operating and then we can transfer her later.

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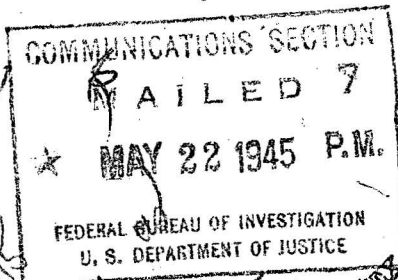

DEFENSE INFORMANTS' REPORTS

A suggestion has been made that the written reports of confidential national defense informants be placed in the administrative files relating to each specific informant who submitted a report. Excerpts from the reports, of course, when found serviceable for such purpose would be included in the regular investigative reports and submitted in the usual manner. Sometimes it is recognized that the report submitted by an informant may contain information which would be subsequently included in different reports relating to separate files in a field office. It was suggested, however, that by maintaining the original rough draft report of the informant in the specific administrative file of the informant it would be possible to make a review of such informant's files to determine his cooperativeness as well as the value of the information furnished. The further suggestion was made that the administrative files of the informant should not be consolidated with such material, but that a separate file maintained in the same folder with the administrative file would include the investigative reports submitted by the informants.

The Bureau desires to maintain uniformity to the greatest extent possible in dealing with such matters and also desires to establish a rule that would be most effective and efficient. It is not intended that the decision reached be retroactive or that material previously submitted be searched for and included in such files but, once the uniform rule is established, it would become effective as of the time the rule is promulgated. Your views, therefore, are requested as to the best methods of handling such matters.

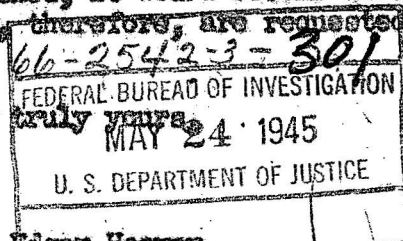

Special Agent Francis Patton of the Newark Office was recently interviewed by Supervisor E. J. Powers in connection with a report furnished to the Bureau by Patton concerning the employment of a close friend of his.

Patton advised that he has known [redacted], age [redacted] for approximately twelve years during his residence at Leesburg, Virginia. He indicated that [redacted] an American citizen, is financially independent and is connected with the family which owns the Rust Engineering Company at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and Washington, D. C. He added that the father of [redacted] died approximately four years ago, at which time he left her somewhere in the neighborhood of \$25,000 in cash.

He added that he has not seen her for approximately three years, but through mutual friends, he heard that [redacted] was employed for a period of one year, about 1942, by the [redacted]. He said that she terminated this employment about the beginning of 1943 and that it is his understanding that she then accepted employment with a Government Agency in Washington, D. C. Patton further advised that about three months ago she returned to work for the [redacted] and that reports reaching him indicated she was employed as a secretary for a [redacted]. He further indicated that [redacted] had recently told mutual acquaintances that she was attending the United Nations Conference at San Francisco in the capacity of a [redacted].

Patton further related that [redacted], as far as he knows, is a most reliable person whom he feels could be developed as a confidential informant if properly approached. He said that her present address is [redacted] Northwest, Washington, D. C., and that she will undoubtedly be residing at this address when she returns from the UNCIO.

RECOMMENDATION

As you will recall, numerous allegations have been received recently at the Bureau indicating the possibility that some of the many Chinese now entering the United States are operating in this country as Chinese intelligence agents.

Attempts are presently being made to develop informants concerning this situation in an effort to obtain specific information with regard to the operation of any [redacted].

The above individual formerly acted as a National Defense Informant for the Bureau from October, 1940 until the time he was repatriated to in May of 1942. When he left he indicated a desire to further assist the United States Government and the Bureau at some future time. As we now have some representatives in Europe, the thought occurred that [redacted], if located, could be of assistance to our representatives and, therefore, I am setting forth all the pertinent information available concerning him in the attached blind memorandum. (u)

At the time [redacted] sailed for Europe, the Bureau informed Colonel John T. Bissel of the Military Intelligence Service, G-2, Washington, D. C., of [redacted] offer to be of assistance to United States representatives in Europe as he expected to go to [redacted]. At Colonel Bissel's request, [redacted] was informed to contact a Colonel Barnwell T. Legge, the Military Attache at the United States Embassy, [redacted] at the earliest possible moment after he returned to Europe. (u)

There is no information in the files of the Bureau to indicate whether representatives of G-2 were ever able to make the contact with [redacted].

It is suggested that the Bureau may desire through its liaison representative to determine whether [redacted] ever contacted a representative of G-2 and, if so, to obtain all pertinent information regarding his present location from them. (u)

Recommendation:

It is recommended that this memorandum be referred to the Security Division for consideration regarding the possibility of contacting a representative of the Military Intelligence Service for any information available concerning [redacted] and for their further consideration of furnishing the pertinent information concerning him to the Bureau's representatives in Europe if they deem it advisable. (u)

[redacted] was born [redacted] at Ratole, Germany. He entered the United States as a temporary visitor at New York City on February 3, 1937. In October, 1940, he voluntarily offered to assist the Bureau through our New Orleans Office. At that time he was personally acquainted with [redacted] and other members of the [redacted] in New Orleans. He rendered valuable assistance and information in New Orleans and when this consulate was closed, he obtained a clerical and messenger position with the [redacted] in Washington, D. C. From August of 1941 until the staff of the [redacted] was interned at Greenbrier, he was of great aid in following and obtaining information regarding German matters.

He was interned with the [redacted] at the Greenbrier Hotel and continued to be cooperative until he was repatriated to [redacted] in May of 1942.

At that time [redacted] felt that he would go to [redacted] and he expressed a desire to assist some representative of the United States Government when he became located in Europe. The following is a description of [redacted]

Reference is made to the memorandum to Mr. Rosen from Mr. G. C. Callan dated June 8, 1945 in the above captioned matter. Reference memorandum indicated that information had been made available by the Bureau to Colonel John T. Bissell of MIS, at the time of [redacted] repatriation to [redacted].

Reference memorandum indicated that [redacted] desired to be of assistance to the United States abroad and at Colonel Bissell's request, had been informed to contact a Colonel Barnwell T. Legge, Military Attache at the United States Embassy, [redacted]. Reference memorandum indicated further that there is no information appearing in the Bureau files that [redacted] was ever contacted by American authorities abroad, and recommended that contact be made with representatives of MIS for any information concerning [redacted].

This matter has been discussed with Colonel Clark Galloway, MIS, by Special Agent S. W. Reynolds of the Liaison Section. Colonel Galloway advised that the files of MIS do not reflect that [redacted] had ever been used by MIS abroad. Colonel Galloway indicated that communications with [redacted] have been of very little value during the war. He pointed out to Mr. Reynolds that Colonel Legge, the Military Attache at Bern, has been recalled to the United States and is expected to arrive at any day.

Colonel Galloway advised Mr. Reynolds that he would discuss this matter with Colonel Legge to ascertain whether or not [redacted] ever contacted him.

This matter will be followed and you will be advised.

The following is a summary of information furnished by Confidential Informant [redacted] for the month of May 15 through June 15, 1945, inclusive. (u)

This Informant has been able to keep the Chicago Field Division advised of the activities of the Subject over the past period. The Informant ascertained that PARRY participated in a debate in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, in which WALTER DURANTE was his opponent and the subject matter treated was Russia. (u)

The Informant advises that PARRY is bitterly opposed to the recent foreign policy of Russia and has denounced Russia's relationships with Poland in particular. The Informant has been able to provide this office with information of value concerning Communist activity within various national groups, and he has been able to obtain specific information on individual cases, which is considered of value as well. (u)

It is, therefore, recommended that the services of this Informant be continued. (u)

On April 28, 1945, and several subsequent dates, Special Agent DONALD L. ALLEN, accompanied by Special Agent REX A. SKIDMORE, both of the San Francisco Field Division, interviewed [REDACTED] concerning matters pertaining to the countries of the Middle East. At the time of these interviews, [REDACTED] favorably impressed the agents as being intelligent, a shrewd businessman, well educated, apparently of good morals, and one who is intimately acquainted with the problems of the Middle East. *mc/jc*

[REDACTED] was born at Kessab, Syria, on [REDACTED] 1923, Armenian parents and it is pointed out that at this time the whole Middle East was part of the then Ottoman Empire. He was educated at the University at Tarsus, Silicia, Turkey, majoring in economics. Subsequently, he was a merchant in the Middle East and also acted as an interpreter for the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey during World War I. He acted as an interpreter in Arabia, to which country he had been deported from Turkey. [REDACTED] came to the United States in 1919, settling in New York. He attended the University of Columbia Night School, where he received a master's degree in economics. Subsequent to receiving this degree he entered the jewelry importer business in New York in 1924. Since that time he has traveled considerably both in the United States and abroad and is well acquainted in the countries visited. He came to San Francisco about twelve years ago but did not settle here until about 1937.

He stated that he does not engage in politics but that the economics and politics of the Middle East have been a "hobby" of his. He stated he was a former member of the Elks Club, presently a member of the Armenian Apostolic Church, the Armenian Benevolent Union and was a member of the Knights of Vartan, a secret Armenian Christian organization.

Having lived and worked in Turkey, Syria, Palestine and Saudi Arabia, he stated that he knows the problems, weaknesses, desires, psychology, religion and economic problems of the peoples of this section of the world, which has been verified from interviews with him.

[REDACTED] speaks, understands and reads Turkish, Armenian and English and speaks and understands, in addition, Arabic and French.

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He stated that in 1944 he acted as an interpreter for businessmen and newspapers who had occasion to contact [REDACTED] on his visit to San Francisco while he was discussing matters with the Standard Oil Company of California. He is acquainted with the leading persons from the Middle Eastern countries now living in San Francisco. He stated that the only peoples who are represented in San Francisco in any numbers are the Jews and Armenians.

Inasmuch as there is no continuous investigation of the countries of the Middle East, it is not anticipated that the services of [REDACTED] will be used regularly and he is not being designated a confidential national defense informant. However, it is anticipated that this office may contact [REDACTED] in order that we may be apprised of any pertinent developments of interest to the Bureau. It is suggested that [REDACTED] be carried as a source of information for the countries of the Middle East, indicating his proficiency in the above-mentioned foreign languages. (S/R)

In accordance with your request I have had a very careful review made of all the paid confidential informants which are presently being utilized by the Bureau. This review has been made for the purpose of determining the reliability, productivity, and desirability of continuing these informants.

I have set up a list of all paid informants according to field office and this list reflects the name of the informant, the date his services began with the date on which we started paying him and the amount which he is presently receiving. This list reflects we presently have 268 paid informants on Communist matters and we are paying them an average of a little over [] per month for the information and assistance they are rendering to the Bureau. In reviewing these informants it is noted that 217 of them are members of the Communist Political Association, many of them holding official positions with their particular branch of the Association. 9 of them are members of the American Youth for Democracy, the successor organization to the Young Communist League which is a front organization for the CPA. 13 of these informants are furnishing us with trash material from CPA or AYD headquarters. These latter informants are paid very small amounts but the information which we receive from them has been very valuable and of great assistance to the Bureau in following the activities of these organizations as it is usually in written form. The remaining 29 informants are members of other Communist front groups and are set out below:

It should be noted some of these individuals are members of more than one organization but all of the paid informants on Communist matters are members of either the CPA or Communist dominated groups except the thirteen who are furnishing us with trash material from the CPA offices.

COPIES DESTROYED In connection with the reliability, productivity, and desirability of continuing our paid informants, this has been a matter of great concern to me and I thought you would be interested in the procedure which is being followed to insure that the Bureau is at all times receiving an adequate return for the money paid to confidential informants.

In this regard the Special Agent in Charge is required to personally recommend any regular payments to be made to an informant in excess of [] per month. With this recommendation he must set forth a brief summary of the information which the informant has furnished in the past and upon which he bases his recommendation and also the nature of the information that the informant will furnish in the future. This summary is evaluated and a careful review is made of all information available in the files of the Bureau relative to the informant.

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If, after careful consideration, it is believed that the informant will be able to furnish information commensurate with the amount of compensation recommended to be paid to him, Bureau authority is granted to pay him that amount for a trial period of sixty or ninety days. The letter from the Bureau granting this authority is marked for the "Personal Attention" of the Special Agent in Charge. He is instructed to afford the informant his personal supervision and to carefully evaluate the information furnished by him to insure that the Bureau is at all times receiving an adequate return for the money paid to the informant. This letter also instructs that if at any time the information furnished is not considered commensurate with the payments authorized, that the payments should be immediately discontinued or appropriately adjusted and the Bureau promptly advised.

Two weeks prior to the expiration of the period authorized for payment by the Bureau, the Special Agent in Charge is required to submit another letter containing a brief summary of the information submitted by the informant during the past authorized period, and he is again required to personally make a recommendation regarding the amount of compensation to be given the informant in the future.

The summary of the information submitted by the Field Office is carefully analyzed by the Supervisor on the Confidential Informant desk and if there is any doubt regarding the value of the information furnished by the informant, the substantive Supervisor handling the supervision of the case in which he is furnishing information is consulted and his recommendation secured. In addition there is maintained a running memorandum on each paid confidential informant reflecting a brief summary of all information submitted by him in the past and this is available for review.

All subsequent letters by the Bureau granting authority to compensate an informant are marked for the "Personal Attention" of the Special Agent in Charge and similar instructions in regard to evaluating the information furnished by the informant and affording him careful supervision as in the initial letter of authorization are given. Any additional authority granted is usually limited to a three months' period when the Special Agent in Charge must again furnish a brief summary of the information furnished by the informant and make a further recommendation in regard to his further compensation.

Thus I feel that we have four checks on the value of the information submitted by a paid confidential informant. These are: the Agent contacting the informant, the personal recommendation of the Special Agent in Charge relative to the amount of compensation to be given the informant, the Supervisor of the case in which the informant is furnishing information, and the Supervisor on the Confidential Informant desk.

In addition to these informants, there are throughout the field 31 informants who were formerly operatives of TT-1 and under his supervision. The supervision of these informants has recently been taken over by the various field offices and I am setting forth by field office their names and the amount of money which they are presently receiving. In connection with the use of these individuals as informants the field was instructed to utilize them as informants and to supervise their activities. The majority of these are known to be very reliable, but as several of them have been taken over by the field within the last month or two, the Bureau has not had an opportunity as yet to fully determine their reliability and productivity but this matter is being followed very carefully and in the event we find any of them either unreliable or feel that their productivity is not what may be expected or desired, appropriate adjustments will be made in their compensation immediately. ~~CONFIDENTIAL~~

In regard to the informants which have been developed by the field, you can see from the above description of the method for handling them that their reliability, productivity, and the desirability of continuing their services in addition to being daily considered by the field, is carefully reviewed on an over-all basis every three months and some of them more frequently to insure the Bureau is receiving returns commensurate with the money which is being paid. Frankly, I feel that the average payment which we are making to informants of [] per month does little more than to reimburse most of them for the expenses incurred in attending meetings, purchasing literature, and furnishing us with reports on these matters. A great many of these individuals are cooperating on a purely patriotic basis and through their admiration for the Bureau.

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I wish to assure you that this matter is receiving continuous prudent supervision at the Seat of Government and every possible precaution is being taken to insure the Bureau is receiving an adequate return and to avoid any possible embarrassment through the use of these individuals as informants. At this time I recommend that each of them continue to be used and if in the future we find that there is any question either in their reliability or productivity, their services will be immediately terminated.

Reference is made to my memorandum to you dated June 19, 1945 in the above captioned matter, in which it was indicated that Special Agent S. W. Reynolds had contacted Colonel Clark Galloway of the Military Intelligence Service in order to ascertain if [REDACTED] had been used as a confidential informant by the Army. As you will recall, Colonel Galloway indicated that the files of MIS did not reflect that [REDACTED] had ever been used as a confidential informant by the Army abroad, but that Colonel Barnwell T. Legge, Military Attache at the United States Embassy, [REDACTED] was returning to the United States and would be contacted to ascertain whether or not [REDACTED] had ever contacted him or his office. *CLM*

This is to advise that Colonel Galloway has subsequently advised Mr. Reynolds that he had discussed this entire matter with Colonel Legge. He indicated that Colonel Legge stated that he has no knowledge whatsoever of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] has never contacted him or any of the officials at the Embassy in [REDACTED]. Colonel Galloway advised Mr. Reynolds that the conclusion to be drawn by this information was that [REDACTED] was never used by the Army as an informant.

[redacted] was born [redacted] at Natole, Germany. He entered the United States as a temporary visitor at New York City on February 3, 1937. In October, 1940 he voluntarily offered to assist the Bureau through the New Orleans office. At that time he was personally acquainted with [redacted] and other members of the [redacted] in New Orleans. He rendered valuable assistance and when the New Orleans Consulate was closed, he obtained a clerical and messenger position with the [redacted] in Washington, D. C. From August of 1941 until the staff of the Embassy was interned at Greenbrier, he was of great aid in following and obtaining information regarding [redacted] matters.

This informant was interned with the [redacted] at the Greenbrier Hotel and continued to assist the Bureau until he was repatriated to [redacted] in May of 1942.

At the time of his repatriation [redacted] indicated he would endeavor to go to [redacted] and he expressed a desire to assist Bureau representatives or representatives of any other United States government agency when he became located in Europe. This information was furnished to MIS in Washington but it has been determined that no contact with [redacted] was ever made by the army abroad.

[redacted] present whereabouts is unknown. This information is being furnished to you for your assistance should he eventually contact you.

A copy of this communication will be forwarded to the [redacted] and [redacted] offices because of the possibility that the informant is in [redacted] at the present time and because agents of these offices may later have occasion to visit Bern at the special request of the Bureau.

PAYMENTS TO CONFIDENTIAL INFORMANTS

Reference is made to the attached proposed letter to all SAC's dated May 2, 1945, regarding "Payments to Confidential Informants."

I feel this letter in its present form could be interpreted in several ways and therefore needs some clarification. It does not draw any distinction between payments to general investigative and National Defense informants. The Bureau has always found it necessary and prudent to deal with all general investigative informants by payments on a C.O.D. basis after the information has been obtained and verified. This is true because of their character, personal habits as itinerants and the general unreliability of the type of person who can furnish information regarding criminal matters. In most instances, a general investigative informant can furnish information regarding a particular crime but after that he has no further information of value and may not have any for a considerable period of time and, therefore, general investigative informants should continue to be dealt with on a C.O.D. basis.

It is different with a national defense informant for from them we are obtaining information of a general intelligence nature which may not be a violation of a Federal law but which we must follow and the activity he is reporting on is usually of a continuous nature. Therefore, I feel that any instructions to the field regarding payments to informants should take this distinction into consideration.

The proposed letter is also not clear in regard to the increasing of payments to regularly paid informants as it provides that an SAC may approve increased monthly payments to regularly paid informants not receiving ☐ per month by 20% of their basic salary without prior Bureau authority. The letter then continues to instruct that the Bureau must be advised so that the increases may be reviewed and confirmed by the Bureau. I would interpret this to mean that prior to making any commitments, the SAC should obtain Bureau approval and this is the present Bureau policy. If this is what the Executive Conference had in mind, it does not change existing instructions and therefore is unnecessary and would only tend to create confusion in the field.

However, if the Executive Conference intends to allow all SAC's to approve a 20% increase to all regularly paid informants not receiving over ☐ per month every six months, then I think the letter should be rephrased to give

may have some very good reason for not confirming or approving the increase. This would result in embarrassment for the field office and could easily result in the loss of the informant through a misunderstanding. Let us either give them the authority without strings or don't give it to them at all.

For your consideration relative to the advisability of giving the SAC's this blanket authority, I thought you would be greatly interested in the following comments.

Excluding our double agents, of which there are eight presently operating, only five out of 314 regularly paid informants are presently receiving amounts exceeding [] per month. Three of these are translators, one handling Japanese matters and the other two are used as consultants on German organizations and to analyze German material and propaganda in addition to their translation work. Thus, under the proposed authority, the SAC's could increase the salaries of all but five of our regularly paid informants without consulting and receiving Bureau approval. I can see that the stipulation of [] per month would tend to increase the average amount paid to informants to approximately [] per month. At the present time, the average amount paid to our informants is approximately [] per month. *ATU*

b7E

At the present time a great majority of our regularly paid informants are reporting on Communist matters. In determining the amount to be paid to such individuals, their character and background must continually be kept in mind. An individual who is willing to associate with members of the Communist Political Association, report on the activities of this organization and the individuals connected with it is in most instances not a particularly high type of person and has never had very much money. Today most of our informants have other employment from which they obtain a regular salary and the amounts we pay them are supplemental to their regular income. It has been the experience of the supervisor who has handled the informant desk for over three years that when an individual of this type gets too much extra money he becomes lazy, fails to cover and report on all the activities, and may soon even discontinue his services as an informant because he no longer needs additional money or we have to discontinue his services because he is no longer productive.

It is, therefore, necessary for the Bureau to continually guide the field in their payments to informants to avoid these pitfalls and to insure we receive information commensurate with the money paid them. I definitely feel the present instructions requiring the field to secure Bureau approval prior to increasing any payments to informants is sound and desirable in so far as the payments are concerned and also from the standpoint of the effect which it has on making the agent and the SAC give careful consideration to the information furnished by the informant and his value prior to making a recommendation to the Bureau to increase his compensation, as well as the very favorable effect and weight which such a provision would carry in any inspection which might be made of the Bureau's disbursement of its confidential fund.

The third paragraph of the letter grants authority to all SAC's to approve payments to confidential informants for information furnished in amounts not to exceed \$50 without prior Bureau approval. My interpretation of this statement would be that the SAC's can approve a specific payment on a C.O.D. basis to an informant of this amount. However, in view of the statement in the first part of paragraph three, "It has been the policy of the Bureau in the past that when payments are to be made to informants in amounts exceeding \$10 prior Bureau approval must be secured," this might be misinterpreted by the field as granting them authority to pay an individual on a regular basis at the rate of \$50 per month without prior Bureau approval. This is true because the present instructions in the National Defense Manual provide that an SAC may pay an individual on a regular basis up to per month without prior Bureau approval but that all payments on a regular basis over this amount must be specifically approved by the Bureau.

b7E

I do not think the Executive Conference intended to grant SAC's authority to make regular payments of per month to an informant without prior Bureau authority as it would be such a radical departure from the present existing instructions, which are so basically sound and have operated so effectively during this war when we have necessarily had and have to pay many national defense informants. The Director has always insisted that the Bureau carefully scrutinize all regular payments to informants to insure we receive a full return for all the money expended.

For your information in considering the amount which an SAC should be allowed to pay an informant on a regular basis without prior Bureau authority the following is submitted. At the present time nearly all of our regularly paid informants are started at a rate less than per month, most of them being started at approximately to per month for a trial period of three months. At this time 177 out of 314 regularly paid informants are paid at a rate less than per month. If you allowed SAC's to place these individuals on a regular pay roll without prior Bureau authority, you can see that we would be expending approximately per month without any consideration by the Bureau. I feel very strongly any procedure of allowing the field to make regular payments to informants exceeding per month would place the Bureau in a very vulnerable position as past experience has proven that the field definitely needs guidance in selecting the individuals to be placed on the regular pay roll. This is true because of the information which may be in the Bureau's files reflecting on the advisability of utilizing an informant which may not be in the files of the field office where the informant is presently located. There are also numerous instances where as a matter of general policy the Bureau did not feel it would be advisable to pay individuals on a regular basis either because of their particular employment or possible connection with specific groups whereby they would try to capitalize on their assistance to the Bureau.

this applies to payments on a C.O.D. basis after the information has been obtained, evaluated and verified. I feel there has been some misunderstanding relative to the amount which an SAC may pay an informant on a C.O.D. basis and this would definitely clarify the matter for the field. There is also some confusion whether an SAC may pay an informant on a C.O.D. basis from the confidential fund maintained by the office and I think it would be well to also issue definite instructions regarding this matter.

As the Executive Conference has voted that an SAC may pay an amount up to ☐ it is assumed that this may be made from the confidential fund and that such instructions should be furnished to the field.

b7E

While my views are as stated in this memorandum relative to the manner of handling payments to informants, since the Executive Conference has voted to change the present instructions and such changes have been approved by the Director, to convey these instructions to the field I am attaching a proposed letter to all SAC's dated May 9, 1945 in accordance with the provisions of the Executive Conference memorandum dated April 18, 1945.

It should be noted that I have only considered and discussed the proposed letter to all SAC's and not the letter to all Legal Attaches as the payments of informants in SIS work is handled under the direction of Mr. Ladd.

There is attached the requested SAC letter concerning the future development of confidential informants and the need for Bureau approval before a potential informant is contacted by any field office.

Before the instant letter is approved, it is felt that you may desire to afford the following observations certain consideration:

- (1) Since the request for this letter apparently had its immediate predication in the recent Los Angeles incident, (the Bureau investigation of the Communist infiltration of the UOPWA - CIO) it should be noted that the agitation activity originating with the Communists as a result of the incident was obviously calculated to bring about, at least indirectly, such a policy through pressure on the White House, the Attorney General, etc.
- (2) When an Agent of this section discussed with Mr. McInerney of the Criminal Division the proposed Bureau reply to inquiries received relative to the Los Angeles incident, Mr. McInerney pointed out that with the advent of President Truman and Attorney General Clark, there has come a marked change in the Government's attitude toward Communists. McInerney remarked that "if the White House and the Attorney General continue to receive such complaints from the Communists your appropriation will be increased." The latter remark was obviously jocose in nature, but nonetheless it was significant when applied to the instant situation.
- (3) It has been the Bureau's experience that one good informant is worth scores of investigative hours - and particularly so when the matter under consideration relates to the operations of the Communist movement in the United States.
- (4) We have an urgent need for more and better informants in order to keep ourselves currently and accurately informed on the Communist movement. The Bureau's records reflect 1,491 confidential national defense informants who are stated by the field to be reporting exclusively on Communist matters. These records also reflect

that there are only 274 paid confidential informants on Communist matters. It must be remembered that the confidential national defense informant reports on a purely voluntary basis. Altho they report with such degrees of frequency as to warrant listing them as informants, the time of the reporting and the type of report received cannot be handled with any set degree of regularity. It should also be observed that 274 paid informants on a nation/basis spreads our informant coverage rather thinly.

- (5) We have an urgent need for more and better informants in order to insure attainment of admissible evidence in the event the occasion arises - and it well may - wherein it will be necessary for the Government to inaugurate prosecutive action against the Communists. In this connection it should be remembered that altho numerous technical and microphone coverages are presently being utilized, the majority of the information accruing from such coverage is of an inadmissible character. The use of confidential informants is, without question, the best medium available to the Bureau for the attainment of competent evidence concerning the Communist Political Association, per se, individual members, statements, etc.
- (6) There is, of course, a degree of chance in the development of any confidential informant in connection with Communist matters; however, it is believed that the information developed as a result of these chances by far outweighs the few repercussions had to date, all of which have been handled without any real embarrassment to the Bureau. Further, it is felt that the procedure pursued by the Bureau in its endeavor to develop confidential informants in this field is entirely warranted and should continue since the action is designed solely to assist the Government in obtaining relevant information concerning a movement which is admittedly functioning for the purpose of effecting the overthrow of the U. S. Government.
- (7) As prepared, the letter to all SAC's states that our informant coverage on a national basis is good and that the development of new informants should not be stressed at this time. It is suggested that a better approach to the general coverage or the confidential informant situation might well be utilized. Although the Bureau over a period of years has consistently and constantly pointed out to the field the necessity of informant coverage and although coverage is generally good, there remains room for marked

improvement in this particular field.

- (8) The instruction contained in the proposed letter indicating that Bureau approval is necessary before any overture is made in the field to develop a confidential informant will place the responsibility for deciding whether the contact should be made at the Seat of Government. Regardless of how accurate our file checks are at the Seat of Government, preparatory to making such a decision it would seem that the field is closer to the situation in question and therefore in a much better position to determine whether in each given instance overtures should be made looking to the development of confidential informants.
- (9) It is my opinion that this matter could be handled in an efficient manner if the Special Agent desiring to develop a confidential informant in any particular phase of Communist activity would after a thorough check of his field office files orally discuss the various ramifications of the matter in the light of local conditions with the Special Agent in Charge or Assistant SAC before consideration is actually given to a contact. It could then be requested, because of the movement of various Communist members, that the names be checked against the Bureau indices before the actual contact is made. It is felt that such a procedure would leave the responsibility of recommending a contact with the SAC or Assistant SAC where it has always been and it will place the Seat of Government in the position of supervising the matter generally.
- (10) It is believed that a letter to all SAC's which does not go into the general confidential informant situation but which specifically instructs that before a contact is made the recommendation of the SAC be had and that the Bureau's files be checked would serve the same purpose. It is definitely felt that the development of the confidential informant program, particularly at this time, should be continued and stressed.

Reference is made to Phoenix letter to the Bureau in the case entitled [redacted] Confidential National Defense Informant [redacted] Bureau File No. 66-7542 dated July 21, 1945. Since, as is set forth in that letter, the informant has been expelled from the Communist Political Association at Phoenix, it is thought advisable to place a spot technical surveillance at the Communist Headquarters, 716-1/2 East Washington Street, Phoenix, Arizona. (u)

In connection with the contemplated installation, it will be noted that Agent Joseph B. Dickerson of this office has on numerous occasions contacted NOEL McKEEHAN, Arizona Sanitation Supply Company, 716 East Washington Street. It will be noted that the offices of this company directly adjoin those of the Communist Political Association Headquarters. The Arizona Sanitation Supply Company store is directly west of the Communist Political Association Headquarters and there is no other building adjoining the Arizona Sanitation Supply Company. (u)

An inspection of the premises at the Arizona Sanitation Supply Company reflects that the wall between this store and the Communist Political Association Headquarters is a regular six inch plastered partition wall. In the event the spot technical surveillance is authorized it is contemplated that sufficient plaster be removed from the wall in the offices of the Arizona Sanitation Supply Company to permit the installation of a contact microphone directly against the plaster wall on the Communist Political Association Headquarters side. This hole would be appropriately concealed and the concealment would be arranged so that it could be removed when a technical surveillance was desired. It is believed that the brief case detectaphone or Aurex would be satisfactory. It will be noted that no technical equipment would be left at the Arizona Sanitation Supply Company. It would only be brought into this facility when in use. (u)

It is noted that McKEEHAN is very cooperative and in the judgement of Agent Dickerson, complete secrecy in this matter is assured. During the past 18 months Mr. McKEEHAN has on numerous occasions offered the use of his store to the Phoenix Office if the same was ever needed. (u)

It is contemplated to use the technical surveillance only one or two nights each week to cover meetings and probably on Sundays from time to time when meetings may be held. It is called to the attention of the Bureau that Mr. McKEEHAN's store is not open evenings or on Sundays and he has consented to furnish the Phoenix Office with a key so that Agents may use the premises when they so desire when there are no employees at the store. (u)

It is believed that an installation in the Arizona Sanitation Supply Company rather than in Communist Political Association Headquarters would be more satisfactory both from the standpoint of security and of the evidentiary value of information obtained in this manner. (u)

In reply to Bureau letter dated July 19, 1945, we wish to advise that [REDACTED] filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy in the Southern District of New York on August 25, 1944. He filed schedules, listing as the principal asset a sum of \$40,000 which he declared was being held in trust for him by a HELEN POLK.

In testimony given before the referee, [REDACTED] stated he was married to his third wife. He admitted HELEN POLK was a girlfriend and that he had other girlfriends in addition. To one named SHEILA WILCOX he gave \$4,000 in jewelry and \$7,000 in cash. To another, ROSANNA DE FARGO, he gave a \$700 fur coat and \$1800 worth of jewelry. He also gave a Miss ERICKSON, manicurist at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, tips running as high as \$100. He testified that over a period of years he gave HELEN POLK the aforementioned \$40,000 for jewelry, clothing and living expenses.

[REDACTED] further testified that his purpose in declaring HELEN POLK the holder of \$40,000 of his money was that he hoped by accusing her of holding this money he would cause the Government to locate her, inasmuch as she had left him and he did not know her whereabouts. He said he hoped to get her to come back to him by this means. He testified that this debt was false.

When HELEN POLK was located by the trustee she refused to return to him and [REDACTED] then went before the referee and re-testified that the debt was true and she was holding the money for him.

HELEN POLK testified that he had given her certain moneys, amount unspecified, over a period of years, for her upkeep, and she felt she was entitled to the same inasmuch as she had given him several years of her life and had taken very good care of him. She denied holding any money in trust for him.

[REDACTED] admitted in testimony he was with HELEN POLK every day, 9:00 A. until 11:00 P.M., but declared he never spent the night with her. During the course of his testimony before the referee, [REDACTED] stated that he worked for the FBI for three years and his number was [REDACTED]. He said he never received any credentials and conducted his business with the FBI by telephone, as he was not allowed to go to their office.

(D) SUBMARINE ACTIVITIES - ESPIONAGE COASTAL SOURCES OF INFORMATION. -- Reference is made to Bureau Bulletin Number 8, Series 1945, issued under date of January 24, 1945, directing that all coastal offices institute a program to obtain complete coverage of the shore line and adjacent areas in order that all persons living in those vicinities would become aware of the Bureau's responsibility and interest and the necessity for reporting information indicating a possible landing by enemy agents.

Reference is made to Bureau letter dated June 27, 1945, in which authority is granted to pay the captioned informant at the rate of [redacted] per month, for three months, effective July 2, 1945. *(u)*

This informant continues to be active in the Communist Party and to furnish valuable information to the Buffalo Field Division. His wife, [redacted] who is known to the Bureau as [redacted] is still employed as a Technical Assistant at Communist Headquarters. They arrange their meetings so that at least one of them will attend practically every Communist function in the Buffalo area. *(u)*

[redacted] continues to use his automobile in connection with Communist affairs and recently has maintained a closer relationship with SAM COLEMAN, President of the Niagara Frontier Council of the Communist Party, and his wife, EDNA COLEMAN. *(u)*

Since the last letter of justification on this informant he has attended the following Communist functions. He has not submitted written reports on all of them but he has furnished valuable information on many of them and is improving in the nature of the reports that he submits. *(u)*

June 17, 1945, Sunday evening Forum, CPA, at Communist Headquarters; about thirty members present. *(u)*

June 20, 1945, Meeting of Downtown Club, CPA, at Communist Headquarters; about forty-two members present. *(u)*

June 22, 1945, CPA Class held in Communist Headquarters; about twenty-four Communists present. *(u)*

June 24, 1945, Sunday evening Communist Forum, CPA Headquarters; about twenty Communists present. *(u)*

In July, 1945, CLARA LESTER, who was at that time Organizational and Administrative Secretary of the Communist organization, advised [redacted] and [redacted] that the Party was going partially "underground". Mrs. LESTER stated that although the organization would continue to be legal she felt that the records should be maintained in a place where they would be safe. Therefore, she gave all of the Membership Lists, Mailing Lists and other data to [redacted] to be retained in their home. On July 22, 1945, when [redacted] and the other leading Communists in Buffalo were attending the first Communist State Convention in New York City, [redacted] furnished agents of the Buffalo Office with all these records. They were taken to the Buffalo Field Office, photographed, and returned the following day. Over one thousand photographs of Communist records were taken in this manner and placed in the individual files of Communist members in the Buffalo Field Office. (u)

It is requested that authority be granted to continue to reimburse this informant in an amount not exceeding [redacted] per month for a three month period, effective October 2, 1945. (u)
