Although President Eisenhower has been under severe and ever-increasing attack in Washington on the issues of foreign policy and Presidential leadership, his image as a leader and peacemaker remains unshaken in the Middle West.

Most lay voters continue to trust his judgement imlicitly in matters military and international. The big question in the coming election is, can be use this image to turn the tide of the congressional battles?

The odds are against it for several reasons.

- 1. History-Despite landslide victories in 1952 and 1956, he was unable to make the voters believe the Republican party and Ike are one and the same.
- 2. The Democratic Party Image. Although the voters "like Ike", the Democrats still retain the image of the wisest handlers of domestic policy. In a congressional race this factor counts heavily against the Republicans.
- 3. Unemployment -- In areas of high unemployment there exists, as usual, the angry "belly" vote which inevitably strikes out at the Administration.

The people seem to want a "National Government" rather than singular devotion to one political party. They trust the President to keep the peace, the Democrats to keep them from going hungry.

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An Untarnished Image

President Widely Popular Midwest, But Can He Swing Votes to G. O. P.?

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 13— The contrast between the need of Washington and the need of the people outside the capital is startling. At no time since President Eisenhower entered the White House has he been under more severe attack in Washington on the issues of foreign policy and Presidential

News Analysis leadership, but one hears very little criticism or even discussions of these issues in the area between the

area between the Appalachians and the Rockies. All the recent Washington dispatches about the President's willingness to let Secretary of State Dulles risk war in the Formosa Strait have clearly had little or no effect out here on the President's stature. He is still immensely popular and when you ask the voters how he stands today compared with any of the Democratic leaders, most people seem to regard it as a silly question.

Strange Coalition Seen

Quemoy and Matsu have created a strange political coalition. It is the internationalist intellectuals and the die-hard isolationists, long at odds over foreign policy questions, who are now complaining about the Administration's policy in the Far East. The rest, comprising a great majority, seem to be going along.

As a matter of fact, such criticism as there is, outside the ranks of the intellectuals and isolationists, seems to suggest that the President has been a little wobbly on the Chinese Communists.

"He was tough on them at the beginning and then seemed to pull back," a retired workman in Parkersburg, W. Va., complained last week.

A railroad switchman here in Salt Lake made the same point along with many others here this morning. "The President said these islands were important and he should stick to it," the railroader remarked.

Image Is Still Strong

The image of Eisenhower the great soldier, the good and genial man of peace, the "man who knows what's going on," is still extremely strong. He is telling the people what they want to hear. They want peace. They want to talk tough to the Communists, and they want to play this role with a little interruption to their daily lives and pocketbooks as possible, and this is exactly what most people seem to think the President is providing.

This is the one big question mark in the Congressional election still in progress. There little doubt that, as moment, the December 1.

on the farms they have managed to identify themselves more clearly with the personal economic interests of the voters. But can the President dramatize his popularity in the last three weeks of the campaign and convince the voters that his peace role requires a Republican Congress?

Success Is Doubted

Most of the experts in the Plains States do not think he can, any more than he could in 1954 or even in 1956, when he won by 10,000,000 votes and lost both the House and Senate. All the polls certainly suggest a nation-wide Democratic trend.

These polls and soundings, however, have been taken before the voters have paid much attention to the election. A great many people questioned by reporters now on political scouting trips confess that they do not even know who is running.

When they are asked about politics, many of them say they have been so preoccupied with family and community problems that they haven't had time to think about the election. This, of course, is not true in the areas of high unemployment. Where there is economic trouble, as in West Virginia in the mines, or in some areas of Wisconsin on the farms, the Democrats have powerful support, and this is the President's primary problem as he goes to the country this week.

Cooperative Government

The voters look to him for a solution of the foreign policy problems, but look to the Democrats for the solution of economic problems. In this sense, there seems to be a desire in the country for a kind of National Government; not for a divided Government of squabbling politicians but for a cooperative Government led by a

popular President and a Democratic Congress.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson was here in his home state this week-end preaching the Republican doctrine of local and state responsibility and exhorting the populace to stop looking to Washington for a solution of all their economic ills.

These exhortations seem, however, to be picking up very few Republican votes. It is only when the Republican orators talk about Eisenhower the peacemaker—a theme that produces cynical laughter in Washington—that the voters out here seem impressed.



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
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On June 15, 1950, Mr. James B. Reston was a witness before a Subcommittee of the Committee on Foreign Relations, United States Senate, appointed to investigate whether there were employees in the State Department disloyal to the United States. The questioning of Reston centered around methods and contacts he used in obtaining news from the officials of the State Department.

At that time, Reston stated that his position was Diplomatic Correspondent of the "New York Times" Washington Bureau. He said his job was not to report primarily the spot and news announcements out of the State Department, but it was a job of primarily explanatory reporting. He attempted to explain the background of some particular announcements that might have been made by the Department of State. He also stated his job was to contact persons who knew most about the area or the problem that happened to be news at the time. person would explain, to the extent of his ability and with the limitations placed upon him by his own job. what the facts in the situation were but not for attribution to the Department of State. He also advised it was his opinion that responsible journalists deserved more cooperation on the part of the Department whose policy depends upon the consent of people if there is to be an effective foreign policy in a democracy.

In answer to questions concerning use of classified material and misuse of information given in confidence to newspapermen, Reston stated that in his opinion only a small percentage was misused. He did state that there were many so-called "scoop artists" who were making a living by trying to convey ideas that "you cannot get truth by reading the press but if you listen to me on Sunday night everything will be all right." Because of this, Reston said, there is a tendency for those people to trade upon the good relations built up over the/years by the responsible officials and responsible journalists. He finally stated that he felt public interest requires an interchange of background information by the officials and the public despite the risk of occasional misuse of information, which he believed to be very small. In Whittaker Chambers' book, "Witness" (pages 647-648), Chambers states that when Reston was asked by John Foster Dulles for his opinion of Alger Hiss as a possible candidate for President of Carnegie Endowment, Reston stated Hiss would be a very good choice.

The November 13, 1953, edition of the "New York Times" carried an article by James Reston entitled, "All Lose in White (Harry Dexter) Case." This article carries a subtitle of "Brownell and Truman and Misenhower and Congress and U.S. Discredited." article is quoted in part as follows: "Herbert Brownell, the Attorney General, is on the spot not because he made the facts public, but because of the imputations he put on the facts. As a result, confidence in the objectivity of the highest law enforcement officer in the nation has been impaired -- Former President Truman lost because he was still praising Mr. White's services to the nation long after serious charges had been made against him by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and sent to the White House -- Predident Eisenhower's position was impaired because by his own testimony he authorized Mr. Brownell to proceed with the case before he knew anything about it -- Similarly Congress lost prestige because one of its members, Harold Velde, subpoensed former President Truman and Associate Justice Tom Clark without even checking with other members of his own committee." The article continues in a critical nature concerning both the Democratic and Republican administrations. (101-4053-129)

The January 16, 1953, issue of "Counterattack," accuses the "New York Times" of giving aid to Stalin. It states that a British professor, Dr. George E. G. Catlin, described a list of questions given to Stalin for answers just before Christmas by "New York Times" diplomatic correspondent, James Reston, as "journalistic bumbling." Professor Catlin suggested that the State Department give guidance to the press in order to prevent more "boners" on such matters. With reference to this matter, the "Daily

Worker," an east coast communist newspaper which suspended publication on Jenuary 13, 1958, for April 2, 1953, contains a notice revealing that the New York State Communist Party put out a folder featuring a picture of the late Joseph Stalin and the late President Roosevelt, together with Stalin's Christmas Eve reply to James Reston. (100-3-4-7222 p 126)

According to an article appearing in the "Editor and Publisher" of March 15, 1958, the "New York Times" column "Random Notes" March 10, 1958, is quoted in part as follows: "The administration practice of having gumshoes shadow reporters to detect their sources for delicate news stories continues unabated here (Washington)." --- "It has become standard practice when the administration is particularly annoyed at seeing one of its secrets in print to force underlings to sign affidavits swearing they did not leak the story. In some cases telephones are tapped both within and without the Government -- " The article contained a reply from James C. Hagerty as,"It's certainly news to me: I just den't believe it -- there is nothing like that down James R. Reston, Times Bureau Chief is quoted as saying, "It's obvious to us that Jim Hagerty knows very little about what has been going on around here for the last fifteen years. If he did he wouldn't be 'surprised.' The Democrats did it and these fellows (the Republicans) are doing it."

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As Pegler Sees It:

Reporting the News Vs. Slanted Views

By WESTBROOK PEGLER

IMMY RESTON, the statesman-reporter of the New York Times Washington office, writes that reporters ought to be "discreet" when President Kennedy is engaged in an underground war all over the world.

What is the guy talking about, anyway?

PEGLER

This is a whiff of the same as that his boss, Arthur Hays Suzberger, used to bloviate in orations at Columbia University advocating "objective" journalism out of one ear and "interpretive" stuff from the other. When you tell the truth you are objective. When you slant it according to your bigotries or politics, you are interpreting.

But a reporter always should just get the facts, write them and let the publishers decide how much the public intelligence can cope

with. We should not concern ourselves, we inkstained wretches, whether something we write will be news to Moscow, or something the Kremlin got from the State Department weeks ago. I feel justified in assuming that with all the spies there have been in bur government since Roosevelt moved in in 1933, the odds are that Moscow had it long before I got it.

This is intended to seem a little flippant and worldly, but I hope you will detect a faint note of sorrow. Because it is no laughing matter that Kennedy is doing buck-jumps over leakage of information to Cuba and that the chief Times fellow in the Washington Bureau is perhaps giving us the nix out of the same office which drenches us with all that Matthews copy about the noble, democratic nature of Fidel Castro:

Our Ambassador's Briefing

On Aug. 30, 1960, Earl E. T. Smith, who had lately been our Ambassador in Havana, testified before a subcommittee of the Judiciary that when he was appointed in 1957 he went to the State Department and got his "briefing" from Herbert Matthews of the New York Times, who eulogized Castro as a Robin Hood. Smith agreed that Batista ran a crooked government but remarked that 1957, under Batista, was the best economic year in Cuba's history. Yet "yarious agendies" of the United States directly and early reflect to give throw Batista and raise castro to power. Until then, Castro had been just another bandit in the mountains with a handful of followers who terrorized the peasants. After the Matthews' articles, which likened Castro to Lincoln, he was able to get followers and funds in Cuba and the United States and much of the American press pictured him as a Robin Hood."

After all that, last November, Lester Markel, the Bunday editor of the Times, wrote a circular letter to a lot of newspaper publishers on behalf of a committee of editors trying to raise a kitty to bring about better relations in the world" by improving the flow of news between nations. Currently, Markel wrote, there were distortions and the United States was badly represented in the Communist areas, in the uncommitted areas and "even among our allies."

Insisted Castro Wasn't Red

As lately as last December, Matthews, in a lecture at Yale, abused the United States for an unfriendly attitude toward Castro and insisted still that Castro was not a Communist.

Well, the place to look for danger is not in the hearts of great heroic patriots like Major General Edwin A. Walker, who was relieved of his command of the 24th Infantry Division in Germany for approving some principles of the John Birch Society. The place to look is in the Pentagon where Major Peress was promoted notwithstanding Senator Joe McCarthy's expose and the general who promoted him was himself promoted by Ike's connivance after Ike had joined a whole pack of broadcasters, journalists and miscellany in abusing Joe.

President Kennedy was no novice when, to propitiate Eleanor Roosevelt in his 1960 campaign, he repudiated McCarthy, long in his grave, who had been good enough to help elect him to the Senate in 1952.

situation were but not for attribution to the Department of State. He also advised it was his opinion that responsible journalists deserved more cooperation on the part of the Department whose policy depends upon the consent of people if there is to be an effective foreign policy in a democracy.

In answer to questions concerning use of classified material and misuse of information given in confidence to newspapermen, Reston stated that in his opinion only a small percentage was misused. He did state that there were many so-called "scoop artists" who were making a living by trying to convey ideas that "you cannot get truth by reading the press but if you listen to me on Sunday night everything will be all right." Because of this, Reston said, there is a tendency for those people to trade upon the good relations built up over the years by the responsible officials and responsible journalists. He finally stated that he felt public interest requires an interchange of background information by the officials and the public despite the risk of occasional misuse of information, which he believed to be very small.

In Whittaker Chambers' book, "Witness" (pages 647-648), Chambers states that when Reston was asked by John Foster Dulles for his opinion of Alger Hiss as a possible candidate for President of Carnegie Endowment, Reston stated Hiss would be a very good choice.

For your additional information, there is enclosed a copy of a memorandum dated April-22, 1960, entitled "Summit Conference, Paris, France, 1960 - Miscellaneous-Information Concerning," which contains information concerning James B. Reston.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7—Things are going to be different around here. President-elect Nixon is going to wire democracy for sound. He is going to have official listening posts, which will record the grumbles of "the forgotten Americans." He is thinking of announcing and introducing his Cabinet on nationwide television, and he has already asked the 80,000 people in Who's Who to pass on the names of people who can help him run the country.

This obviously opens up some interesting possibilities. Mr. Nixon, was already looks a lot like Ed Sunivan on television, should make a good master of ceremonies at TV Cabinet meetings. 
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

Reston was a witness before a Subcommittee of the Committee on Foreign Relations, United States Senate, appointed to investigate whether there were employees in the State Department disloyal to the United States. The questioning of Reston centered around methods and contacts he used in obtaining news from the officials of the State Department.

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

At that time, Reston advised it was his opinion that responsible journalists deserved more cooperation on the part of the Department whose policy depends upon the "consent of people" if there was to be an effective foreign policy in a democracy. He further stated that he felt public interest required an interchange of background information by the officials and the public despite the risk of occasional misuse of information, which he believed to be slight.

In Whittaker Chambers' book, "Witness" (pages 647-648), Chambers stated that when Reston was asked by John Foster Dulles for his opinion of Alger Hiss as a possible candidate for President of the Carnegie Endowment, Reston stated Hiss would be a very good choice.

The January 16, 1953, issue of "Counterattack," a publication self-described as opposing communism, accused "The New York Times" of giving aid to Joseph Stalin. It stated that a British professor, Dr. George Catlin, had commented that the giving of a list of questions to Stalin for answers just before Christmas, as James Reston had done, was "journalistic bumbling." Catlin suggested that the State Department give guidance to the press in order to prevent more boners on such matters. With reference to that matter, it is noted that "The Daily Worker," a former east coast communist newspaper which has suspended publication, published a notice in its April 2, 1953, issue announcing that the Communist Party had prepared a folder featuring a photograph of the late Joseph Stalin and the late President Franklin Rossevelt, together with Stalin's Christmas Eve reply to Reston.

The March 15, 1958, issue of "Editor and Publisher" contained an article setting out a statement by James Reston to the effect that the Democrats had followed the practice of having "gumshoes shadow reporters to detect their sources" for delicate news stories and that the Republicans were also doing it.

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At the request of the then Attorney General Robert Kennedy, the FBI launched an extensive investigation in July, 1962, concerning a leak of highly classified information, which classified information was published by "The New York Times" on July 26, 1962, in an article by Hanson Baldwin entitled "Soviet Missiles Protected In 'Hardened' Positions." During this investigation, Reston contacted the Deputy Attorney General in Washington to complain that an employee of the local office of "The New York Times" had been interviewed by FBI Agents at her home, rather than at the newspaper's office. In August, 1962, Reston contacted McGeorge Bundy, Special Assistant to the President, and was advised by Mr. Bundy that he was unable to comment concerning the investigation. Reston also advised Treasury Secretary C. Douglas Dillon that he felt there was excessive use of the FBI and intimated that some very high Government official should have personally taken the matter up with Hanson Baldwin.

The December 18, 1961, issue of "Newsweek" magazine contained an article entitled "The Columnists JFK Reads Every Morning." This contained background information concerning Reston and identified him as being one of three newspaper columnists upon whom President Kennedy "concentrated most intently." (62-5-19102)

During September, 1967, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that the name of James Barrett Reston appeared on a list of American correspondents who were in attendance at the First Conference of the Organization of Latin American Solidarity (OLAS). At its First Conference in Havana, Cuba, in August, 1967, OLAS announced its goals as the promotion of guerrilla warfare and revolution in Latin America; support of the Negro "revolution" in the United States; and creation of a continent-wide organization with its seat in Havana. I called the Attorney General and advised him I had checked both matters he had inquired about earlier today and we, of course, have never tapped Alsop's phone and have had no surveillance on

I further advised him that Mr. DeLeach told he that Moyers told him Alsop came in to see Moyers yesterday. The Attorney General said this was the reason for his phone call. I advised him that Alsop said he was going to write a column if we didn't take it off right away. I said as far as I am concerned Alsop can write anything he pleases. The Attorney General said bette we get to that, what he is trying to do now is make sure nobody did. I said it is entirely possible the Defense Department or the Comptroller General's office did. I further stated we could very readily check his (Alsop's) phone and find out but fewculdn't do that for him.

As to ______, I said there was no investigation by us but it is entirely possible another agency did.

The Attorney General said the thing that occurred to him is that Alsop believes this because he said something over the phone which he said to nobody else and, therefore, his phone must have been tapped, but it is possible Alsop tailed on a phone that was tapped and it was not his phone. I said that is possible; that it is entirely possible these other Government agencies are tagging phones.

The Attorney General said the President talifed Applying about that and he told the President he was contemplating that no taps be authorized by anyone except himself - but he has not discussed this with all the other department heads - so he would have a central central. I told him I secommended that had under Tom Clark. He said the President thought was a good than. glad to do that. He said McNamara is perfectly agreeable to this and McNamara thinks it is not possible in Defense without his or Vance's approval but that is not his (the Attorney General's) impression. I said it is not mine. He said he told the President he had absolutely no question about the Bureau in this regard but could not speak for the other agencies.

I stated that, if an agent should get out of line, he would be fired right away; that they understand that very clearly; that when we have requests from the field that we ture down, we don't even send them around to kim; that we try to keep them fourn to 50 or 50 for the entire country in esplonage and kidnaping cases. He remarked that kidnapings are very rare. I explained that, where the life of an individual or the life of the Nation is threatened, I think it warranted. I said that three years ago, we had about 100 and now have gotten it down to about 50 or so and the field is very mensitive to the fact that they will not be approved here unless it is something very vital; and I think this would be the only way to do it.

The Attorney General said also he would like to set up some similar procedure on microphone installations; that he really cught to be informed in this regard, not be told after but be told prior. I stated I am perfectly willing to have that done; that I see so objection. The Attorney General said he does not think it is right to put a responsibility like that on the Bureau; if anything comes out, he have in take responsibility and so he might just as well take the responsibility.

I related that there are four categories: the so-called mail covers and they have been discontinued; the so-called trash covers and we have one in Mami on a Cuban who is working for the Castro element; the other two categories are in so-called phone covers and in the microphone covers. I said we still have some microphone covers though not in large numbers; that they are largely limited to espionage and Cosa Nostra activities; but I would start right away on the microphones the way we follow on the telephones.

The Attorney General Indicated he wanted to discuss this with the in detail but not on the phone; that he thought on the taps we might have an system where the authorization would run for a specific time, six months of something; that as it is now he has no idea when they are taken off or Memorandum for Messrs.
