The First Lady

IT WAS SUGGESTED to me that I read an article on Jacqueline Kennedy, wife of the President, which appeared in "Esquire." This I did. And as I read it, written by Norman Mailer, I thought that I could not have been as brutal toward Eleanor Roosevelt in the days of the "New Deal" as this Mailer is toward Jacqueline Kennedy, whose bread he ate. I do not know Norman Mailer and bear him neither malice nor good-will.

I read the piece in "Esquire" and wondered why we subject our Presidents' wives to the kind of nonsense which we call human interest. It seems that, having received a letter from Mrs. Kennedy, Norman Mailer felt like writing to her to say:

"... that while I was now engaged in certain difficulties of writing about the present, I hoped one day when work was done to do a biography of the Marquis de Sade and the 'odd strange honor of the man.'"

He knew he was being wicked like a school-boy who writes a dirty word, for he says further in this piece:

"Now sociology has few virtues, but one of them is sanity. In writing such a letter to Mrs. Kennedy I was losing my sociology. The Cath-

olic wife of a Catholic candidate for President was not likely to find de Sade as familiar as a tea cozy. I received no reply. I had smashed the limits of such letter-writing. In politics a break in sociology is as clean as a break in etiquette."

This article drools on and on in a similar vein of slight ridicule and colossal impudence, all done to give the impression of ridicule, as, for instance:

"SINCE Jackie Kennedy was not visible during that time, there was an opportunity to listen to her voice. It produced a small continuing shock. At first, before the picture emerged from the set, I thought I was turned to the wrong station, because the voice was a quiet parody of the sort of voice one hears on the radio late at night, dropped softly into the ear by girls who sell soft mattresses, depilatories, or creams to brighten the skin."

After all, a person's voice is what it is. I never heard Norman Mailer's voice but whatever the Lord gave him, baritone or tenor, soprano or bass, it is what it is and he can thank the good Lord that he does not suffer from cerebral palsy or some such thing.

My good friend, Westbrook Pegler, could take me apart more competently than I can, for Pegler is a surgeon who knows how to cut vanity out of the human heart and bring the concealed down to their proper level.

At such a sport, I, alas, am an amateur. Nevertheless, I wonder why everyone with a typewriter, bought or borrowed, feels privileged to pillory a woman who happens, by the accidents of marriage, to be wife to a President or Governor, or even a Congressman. Marriage, being a sacrament, means that one takes the other for better or for worse, and surely the wife of a politician has a tough time.

SHE IS cut off from privacy, which is a woman's dearest prerogative and she becomes a prey to everyone who needs to sell an article to a magazine or who wants to cut a phrase. It is not customary in these days to respect human beings for what they are. Rather, we live in an era when there is joy in seeing a fat man slip on a banana peel.

George Sokolsky in his column 6-29-62 criticizes Norman Mailer for writing an "Esquire" magazine article on Jacqueline Kennedy which he states drools on and on in a "vein of slight ridicule and colossal impudence." The Director requested a memorandum on Mailer. *B.C.*

Mailer, 39, resides New York City and is in Section A of the Reserve Index. He is author of the novel "The Naked and the Dead," a best seller. In November, 1960, he received much notoriety for the stabbing of his wife for which he received a three-year suspended sentence. Mailer has been characterized as an "off-beat crusader for peace." In March, 1960, he appeared on a radio panel show and admitted being a "leftist." He charged the FBI with being a secret police organization and said it should be abolished. On a television show on 8-8-61 he said that no one is happier than the FBI to see communism and Castro succeed in Cuba since it gives the FBI something to do.

Louis Budenz, former managing editor of the "Daily Worker," who broke with the Communist Party in 1945, advised on 6-30-50 that Mailer was a concealed communist and that until at least 1945 he was closely connected with the Communist Party. During the period 1948-1950 subject was a member of a citizens committee to elect Simon W. Gerson, communist and American Labor Party candidate, to the City Council of New York City; was active in the campaign of Henry Wallace, Progressive Party candidate for President in 1948; and was a sponsor of the Freedom Crusade of the Civil Rights Congress to be held in Washington, D. C., the day after the trial of the communist leaders opened in Federal court in New York City. The "Daily Worker" issue of 3-28-49 reported that Mailer made the statement, "So long as there is capitalism, there is going to be war." Mailer received an invitation to attend a reception to be held on 7-22-53 at the Polish Consulate in New York City but the source did not know whether he attended it. In 1956 Mailer was listed as a member of the National Committee of the Kutcher Civil Rights Committee, which had been organized to fight the dismissal on loyalty charges of James Kutcher, a legless veteran, from his position with the Veterans Administration. *ENCLOSURE*

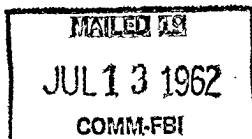

FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE (FPCC)

The April 6, 1960, edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contains a full page advertisement captioned, "What Is Really Happening in Cuba," placed by the FPCC. This advertisement announced the formation of the FPCC in New York City, listed various sponsors of the Committee and declared the FPCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press on Cuban affairs. U

"The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1961, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on January 10, 1961, Dr. CHARLES A. SANTOS-BUCH identified himself as one of the organizers of the FPCC. Also, Dr. SANTOS-BUCH identified ROBERT TABER as a co-organizer of the FPCC and said TABER drafted the aforementioned FPCC advertisement. Dr. SANTOS-BUCH further testified that he and TABER obtained \$3,500 from the Cuban Government through the son of Cuba's Foreign Minister, which funds, along with about \$1,100 collected from supporters of the FPCC, paid for the cost of aforementioned advertisement in "The New York Times". U

On October 3, 1960, a source advised that the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) in New York had become active in the FPCC, and that SWP members, in a recent FPCC election, had been able to remove several Communist Party members who were on the Executive Board of the FPCC and gain control of the organization. This source asserted that the SWP members believed that they had achieved a great influence in the course of the Cuban revolution through their control of the FPCC. X

On February 10, 1961, a second source advised that PHIL BART, National Organizational Secretary and member of the National Committee, CP, USA, had reportedly stated recently that the FPCC had been captured by the Trotskyites, but that the CP had not given up in the FPCC. U

The SWP and the CP, USA, have been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. U

24, 1952. [redacted] was unable to furnish any further
information concerning travel by the subject.

Norman Mailer resides at 142 Columbia Heights,
Brooklyn, New York, and is a self-employed writer from his
residence.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable
information in the past, advised on June 30, 1950, that Norman
Mailer was a "concealed" Communist. The source stated that
a "concealed" Communist is one who does not want himself known
as a Communist and would deny membership in the Party.

A second confidential source, who has furnished
reliable information in the past, advised on April 5, 1960,
that Norman Mailer, author of "The Naked and the Dead"
apparently is known by many individuals within the Communist
Party (CP). The informant reported that from general
conversations with individuals within the CP, it may be assumed
that Mailer at the present time is anti-Communist and that
apparently CP members do not like him personally or approve
of his writing. According to the source, Communists have
indicated that his writing is considered "disruptive" in
nature.

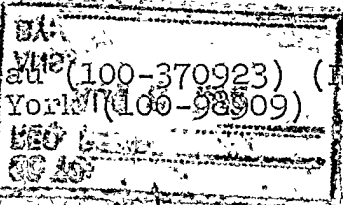

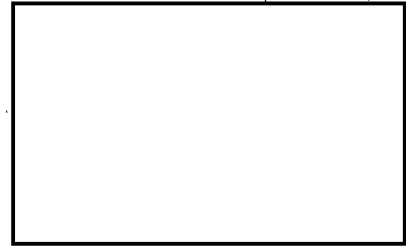

The "New York Times", a daily newspaper published in New York City, in an article on May 13, 1962, reflected that NORMAN MAILER confirmed on May 17, 1962, that he and Lady JEAN CAMPBELL, 33 year old daughter of Britain's Duke of Argyle, had been secretly married. The bride first mentioned the marriage in a column she wrote for the "London Evening Standard" a newspaper owned by her grandfather. England, N.Y.

Mr. MAILER said he and Lady JEAN had been married "for some time", and plan to live in Brooklyn. MAILER declined to give the exact date or place of the wedding.

C. Status of Health

The "New York Post" edition of November 22, 1960, page 1, carried an article concerning the subject's arrest for stabbing his wife at their residence on November 21, 1960. In the article it was noted that the New York City Police Department quoted the subject's wife as saying that her husband had "homicidal tendencies", and that his family had been trying to induce him to see a psychiatrist. It is noted that NORMAN MAILER authored a novel entitled "The Naked and the Dead", and that the name NORMAN MAILER appeared as a sponsor in a full page advertisement by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FCCC) which appeared in the "New York Times" on April 6, 1960.

A characterization of the FCCC is included in the appendix attached hereto.

On June 20, 1962, [redacted] Adjudication Branch, USDS, advised SA [redacted] that the files of her office contain no record of MAILER having applied for or having received approval for validation of travel to Cuba.

On July 31, 1962, [redacted] Court of General Sessions, 100 Centre Street, New York City, advised that he knows of no contemplated travel by the subject in the near future. COMMITTEE TO AID THE MONROE DEFENDANTS

A source advised on May 10, 1962, that the Committee to Aid the Monroe Defendants (CAMD) was formed during September, 1961, by the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) in New York City. The SWP originally proposed the formation of this committee during discussions with various left-wing and liberal tendencies and offered a sum of money to initiate activities. U

Source advised that the SWP, however, was unsuccessful in forming a committee of various tendencies and proceeded to organize the CAMD and promote its activities under the domination and control of the SWP. U

Source advised that the aims of the CAMD are to afford financial support and counsel for ROBERT F. WILLIAMS and four other defendants who were involved in a racial incident on August 27, 1961, at Monroe, North Carolina. The SWP hopes to dramatize this incident nationally and internationally through the CAMD and thus attract individuals to the SWP aims and principles by playing a leading role in the integration struggle. U

The organization and impetus of CAMD activities throughout the various parts of the United States such as obtaining sponsors and the raising of funds, are the results of the efforts of various SWP branches. U

Source advised that the headquarters of the CAMD are located in Suite 117, 141 Broadway, New York, New York, however, all CAMD office work is actually carried on at SWP headquarters, 116 University Place, New York City. U

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. U

FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE

The April 6, 1960, edition of "The New York Times" newspaper contains a full page advertisement captioned "What Is Really Happening In Cuba," placed by the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC). This advertisement announced the formation of the FPCC in New York City and declared the FPCC intended to promulgate "the truth about revolutionary Cuba" to neutralize the distorted American press. U

"The New York Times" edition of January 11, 1961, reported that at a hearing conducted before the United States Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on January 10, 1961, Dr. CHARLES A. SANTOS-BUCH identified himself and ROBERT TABER as organizers of the FPCC. He also testified he and TABER obtained funds from the Cuban Government which were applied toward the cost of the afore-mentioned advertisement. U

On October 3, 1960, a source advised that the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) in New York had become active in the FPCC, and that SWP members, in an FPCC election, had been able to remove several Communist Party (CP) members who were on the Executive Board of the FPCC and gain control of the organization. U

A second source advised that an announcement from National Headquarters of the SWP was made on September 24, 1961, to the effect RICHARD GIBSON had fired the secretary in the FPCC headquarters and was trying to break the SWP influence in the FPCC. U

Column 2, page 8, of the February 22, 1962, edition of "The New York Times" contains an article captioned, "CASTRO Backer Resigns," which announced that ROBERT TABER had resigned as Executive Secretary of the FPCC and as President of the Institute for the Improvement of Inter-American Relations, Incorporated, which had organized the FPCC in April, 1960. U

On May 17, 1962, a third source advised that National Headquarters of the FPCC is located in Room 329 at 799 Broadway, New York City, and that the FPCC is operating under the direction of RICHARD GIBSON, Acting National Executive Secretary of the FPCC. U

The SWP and the CPUSA have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Norman "The New York Times" of 6-2-63, carried an article concerning a lecture by Mailer at Carnegie Hall on 5-31-63, in which Mailer was critical of the Bureau. This article, written by Brian O'Doherty, not identifiable in Bufiles, treats Mailer's comments in a caustic manner, stating that since Mailer had become famous through his novel, "The Naked and the Dead," he has spent his time "putting himself on display."

The article states that Mailer, in commenting on various aspects of the national scene, bemoaned the lack of a "hero in government and the F.B.I. and the implacable facelessness of capitalism and communism." He also made the comment that "The F.B.I. has done more damage to America than the Communist Party." The article contains no additional pertinent reference to the FBI.

The writer pokes fun at Mailer throughout the article and rather effectively blunts the sharp edge of Mailer's criticism against the FBI.

Mailer, a well-known author in his early 40's, is probably best known for his post World War II best seller, "The Naked and the Dead." He was described by Louis Budenz as an adherent of the Communist Party and as being closely associated with the Party until 1945. Investigation conducted as a result of this information disclosed that Mailer has been active in various communist fronts since the late 1940's.

13 JUN 12 1963

Mailer, a New York City resident, received a great deal of notoriety in early 1961 when he stabbed his wife after a party. He was committed to Bellevue on that occasion for observation and his condition was described as acute paranoia with homicidal-suicidal tendencies. Mailer subsequently received a suspended sentence for stabbing his wife and was placed on probation for a period of three years. He is currently listed on the Reserve Index.

On 3-20-60, Mailer made extremely critical statements concerning the FBI during his appearance on a Chicago television program. He claimed that the FBI was a secret police organization and should be abolished. During this program he admitted to being a "leftist" but denied Communist Party membership. Mailer was also critical of the FBI on 8-8-61, while appearing on a New York City television program as a guest panelist. He stated in substance that the FBI liked to tell people what to do and that we were happy to see communism and Castro succeed in Cuba since that gave us something to do. He also implied that communism was no longer a menace in the United States. Both these television appearances were made the subjects of memoranda submitted by the Crime Records Division.

Carnegie Hall Audience Listens To Norman Mailer's Thoughts

By BRIAN O'DOHERTY

Norman Mailer, having achieved early immortality with a novel, "The Naked and the Dead," is filling out the rest of his earthbound interval by putting himself on display.

At Carnegie Hall Friday night he gave an audience his ideas and opinions on matters so diverse as Premier Fidel Castro, Premier Khrushchev, fallout shelters, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the American myth. He focused repeatedly on President Kennedy. Throughout the evening he made repeated reference to back issues of Esquire, The Village Voice and a philosophy he called "political existentialism."

Dressed in a crumpled navy blue suit, smoking incessantly and sweating, Mr. Mailer began the evening by rejecting his publicity. A last-minute press release said the trustees of Carnegie Hall were using a clause in the contract with Richard Fulton, the impresario of the evening, to insure that "Mailer must not be vulgar."

"Mailer," it added, "must not use profanity. Mailer must not be disturbing."

The release also said Carnegie Hall Friday night for the York-detective to enforce the agreement.

Scorning such attention-getting devices, Mr. Mailer said, "I was the last to see the publicity release—I was in a fury." He directed a question to the wings: "Is the Burns detective guard in the house?"

He wasn't, so Mr. Mailer called for a policeman with whom he could "discuss the ground rules of the evening."

Speaking rapidly, with silences abruptly inserted, Mr. Mailer reflected, "I must be a masochist or something, because I'm enjoying this." One of his audience muttered: "I think we're the masochists. I paid \$4.50."

For 20 minutes Mr. Mailer bewailed the lack of the existential hero in government and the F.B.I. and the implacable facelessness of capitalism and communism. He performed what must be the dialectic trick of the year by presenting himself as a Nietzschean liberal.

He hooked his audience—a

collection of individuals that refused to become a crowd—with this comment: "The F.B.I. has done more damage to America than the Communist party." And in a description of President Kennedy he painted a neat self-portrait:

"He is not provocative nor predictably dull. He is not entertaining, he is always potentially of interest."

"Experiment in Terror," a movie produced by Columbia Pictures, Inc., was originally serialized as a story in a leading reputable magazine. It was written by former Special Agent Gordon Gordon and his wife. Columbia Pictures first contracted for the story to be done as a movie and then came to us for cooperation. We refused cooperation in view of the exploitation of the FBI by the Gordons and because of the abrupt manner in which Sam Briskin, head of Columbia Pictures, talked to our SAC in Los Angeles when our SAC, following Bureau instructions, told Briskin that we would be unable to cooperate with him. We gave no assistance whatsoever but did not object once the movie had been put into production. The Director told former Attorney General William P. Rogers that the FBI's name should not be used in advertising the movie and that there should be no exploitation whatsoever of the FBI's reputation in promoting the film. Following this the head of the advertising department of Columbia Pictures wrote a memorandum to the firm's field service representative containing instructions along these lines.

The November, 1962, issue of "Esquire" contains a review of "Experiment in Terror" written by Dwight MacDonald. He does not like the movie. This is of no concern to us except MacDonald takes the occasion to viciously criticize the FBI. He says for example, "Mr. Ford (Glenn Ford--the star), is supposed to be an FBI Agent...but he and his superiors are even greater bunglers than the real article...it has been clear to me for a long time that J. Edgar Hoover is as adept at public relations as he and his G-men are inept at actual detective work. They have the most primitive notion, for example, of The Communist Menace, judging from my contacts with them in the Forties...." MacDonald then goes on to describe contacts he had with Agents in the 1940s and says, "FBI Agents of this touchingly amateur kind, I imagine, were responsible for allowing Dr. Soblen to jump bail and leave the country."

A security matter investigation of Dwight MacDonald was instituted in April, 1944, predicated on censorship reports that MacDonald was in correspondence with one Victor Serge in Mexico City concerning the possible creation of a new international socialist group. MacDonald was born March 24, 1906, at New York City,

and was educated at Yale University. He joined the Socialist Workers Party, a Trotskyite group, in about 1937 or 1938 and reportedly left this group in April, 1940. He later became identified with the Workers Party which he left in 1941. He has authored articles which have been published by the Socialist Workers Party in New York City and by the Pioneer Publishing Company, the Socialist Workers Party press.

During the 1940s MacDonald edited a bimonthly magazine, "Politics," which was pacifist in nature and which, in the winter of 1948, contained a vicious attack on the Director and the Bureau from a self-styled anarchist who received a five-year sentence in 1945 as a draft dodger. MacDonald has also been associated with the magazine, "New Yorker."

In January, 1958, MacDonald addressed a forum of the Young Socialist League in New York, at which he gave a literary analysis of "Mass Culture versus High Culture." The name, Dwight MacDonald, appeared on a letter to the editor of the New York Times in February, 1960, appealing for the release from prison of Morton Sobell. [MacDonald was reportedly present at a board meeting of the New York Committee to Secure Justice for Morton Sobell in April, 1960.] He spoke at a similar meeting in New York in May, 1960, at which time he said that Sobell may have been guilty but that his sentence was too severe.

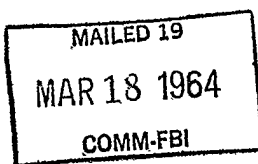

The worst mental attitude: attention to mental hygiene; the worst humor inevitably is clean humor (cleanliness prefers, after all, a voyage into the realm of wit), and so the one virtue nobody can support is patriotism without wit. God bless Vice President Johnson, Governor Barnett. The only certain activity to which I can in good conscience object is an informal White House supper to which one is not welcome. Alas, the nearest I come to the White House is the whites of the Secret Service eye to eye.

BACKGROUND:

Captioned individual's introduction to his "The Presidential Papers" appears in the Summer, 1963, issue of "Dissent." According to a footnote, the book is to be published by Putnam this September. Mailer styles himself as a "special self-appointed Presidential advisor" and states that his book will contain a discussion of "all the topics a President ought to consider and rarely does, and some of all the topics he considers every day, but rarely in a fashion which is fresh." One of Mailer's complaints, in the introduction, is that the President has a wealth of statistical information at his fingertips, such as "the number of FBI men in the American Communist Party," but he is guilty of doing nothing to remedy "a total and depressing lack of attention for that vast heart of political matter which is utterly resistant to categorization, calculation, or statistic." He avers that no President "can save America from a descent into totalitarianism without shifting the mind of the American politician to existential styles of political thought." Mailer states one must read his book for an explanation of "existential styles of political thought;" however, he will give a clue to its definition. He then states that it has long been his thesis that the FBI has done more damage to America than the American Communist Party, through putting a sense of inhibition into the popular arts and the popular mind. He alleges this has happened because of the lack of an heroic man as its leader. Mailer claims the FBI has a leader, but not a hero and alleges the Director is a man who embodies his time but is not superior to it. He cites Franklin D. Roosevelt as a hero of his description and lists as merely leaders, Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover and Dwight Eisenhower. The gist of his remarks concerning the FBI is that the organization would prosper with an heroic leader, and it would deserve to prosper because existential politics is rooted in the concept of the hero who enriches whatever corner of the world he finds himself by using his imagination, strength, timing, wit and bravery.

Mailer, a New York City resident, received a great deal of notoriety in early 1961 when he stabbed his wife after a party. He was committed to Bellevue on that occasion for observation and his condition was described as acute paranoia with homicidal-suicidal tendencies. Mailer subsequently received a suspended sentence for stabbing his wife and was placed on probation for a period of three years.

On 3-20-60, Mailer made extremely critical statements concerning the FBI during his appearance on a Chicago television program. He claimed that the FBI was a secret police organization and should be abolished. During this program he admitted to being a "leftist" but denied Communist Party membership. Mailer was also critical of the FBI on 8-8-61, while appearing on a New York City television program as a guest panelist. He stated in substance that the FBI liked to tell people what to do and that we were happy to see communism and Castro succeed in Cuba since that gave us something to do.

During a lecture in Carnegie Hall on 5-31-63, Mailer stated, "The FBI has done more damage to America than the Communist Party." During a lecture in Carnegie Hall on 5-31-63 Mailer stated, "The FBI has done more damage to America than the Communist Party." A critical account of Mailer's lecture appeared in "The New York Times" on 6-2-63 in which he was described as a person who has "put himself on display" after writing a successful novel.

Theodore Roethke is listed in "Who's Who" as the winner of a Pulitzer award for poetry in 1953. He was also awarded the Tietjens prize in 1947 and the Levinson prize in 1951. He won the Edna St. Vincent Millay award in 1959 and the Bollingen prize for poetry in 1958. His office, as of 1963, was listed as the University of Washington, Seattle. There are only limited references concerning Roethke in Bureau files. During the course of an applicant investigation in 1949 a University of Washington official advised that Roethke was a brilliant professor and near genius. The official stated, however, that he had become mentally defective and at one time was placed in a local sanitarium for the insane. In 1949 he called in person at the Seattle Office and it was obvious to the receptionist that he was mentally unbalanced.

During the course of an applicant investigation in 1949 it was determined that Roethke was an ardent pacifist.

A source advised on October 10, 1961, that the Committee to Aid the Monroe Defendants (CAMD) was formed during September, 1961, by the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) in New York City.

Source advised on May 6, 1964, that the aims of the CAMD were to afford financial support and counsel for ROBERT F. WILLIAMS and four other defendants who were involved in a racial incident on August 27, 1961, at Monroe, North Carolina. The SWP hoped to dramatize this incident nationally and internationally through the CAMD and thus attract individuals to the SWP aims and principles by playing a leading role in the integration struggle. The CAMD was also active in promoting the philosophy of utilizing counter-violence to achieve integration as espoused by WILLIAMS.

According to the source, the organization and impetus of CAMD activities throughout the various parts of the United States, such as obtaining sponsors and the raising of funds, were the results of the efforts of various SWP branches.

The March 23, 1964, issue of "The Militant," a weekly SWP newspaper, stated the CAMD suspended activities. This article related that this action was taken following the rejection of this committee by the defendants just prior to the trial held February 18-28, 1964, at Monroe, North Carolina, which resulted in the conviction of all of the defendants, except ROBERT F. WILLIAMS.

ROBERT F. WILLIAMS has fled the United States and is reportedly residing in Cuba.

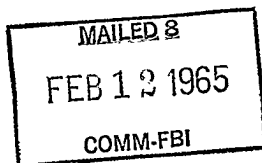

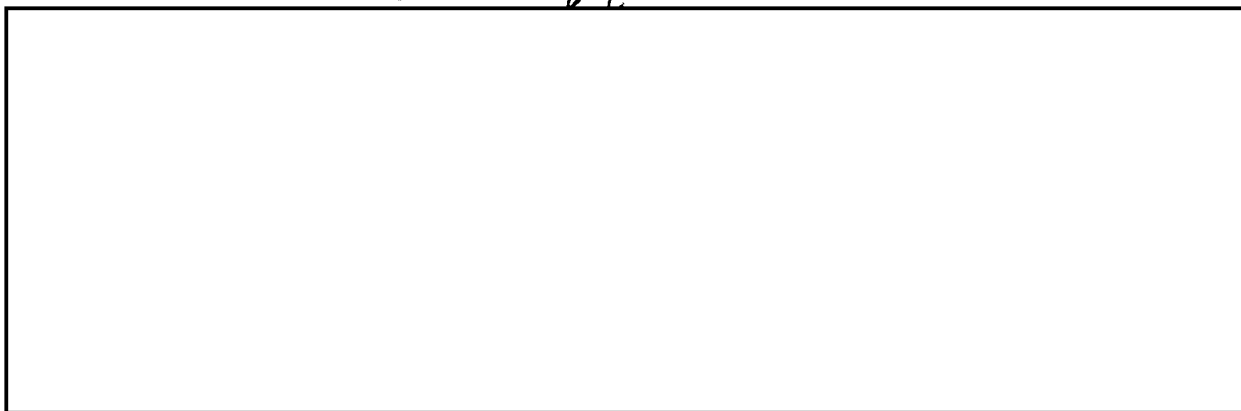

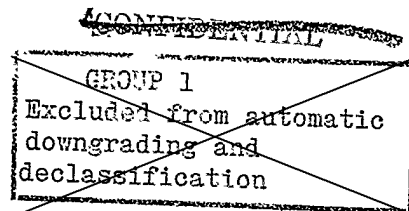

An article in the April 22, 1966 issue of the Mainichi Daily News, an English language newspaper published in Tokyo, Japan, stated that an anti-Vietnam war group announced that it will invite United States novelist Norman Mailer to a Japan-United States citizens conference to be held in Tokyo from August 13-15, 1966. The Federation of Citizens and Cultural Organizations for Peace in Vietnam which is sponsoring the conference will conduct a demonstration march and a mass rally against the Vietnam war to coincide with the conference. A federation spokesman said the conference is aimed at reinforcing the international solidarity for peace drive.

Subversive Background

On June 30, 1950, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Norman Mailer was a "concealed" Communist. The source further stated that a "concealed" Communist was one who does not want himself to be known as a Communist and who would deny membership in the Communist Party (CP).

On April 6, 1960, a second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Norman Mailer, author of "The Naked and the Dead" apparently was known by many individuals in the CP. This source further advised that from general conversation with individuals in the CP, it was assumed that Mailer was anti-communist and that

apparently CP members did not like him personally or approve of his writing. According to this source, the Communists have indicated that Mailer's writing was considered "disruptive" in nature.

He resides at 142 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, New York, and is a self-employed writer from residence. Passport Number F 584770 was issued to Mailer on April 19, 1965, at New York, New York.

Per reBulet, the NYO was requested to obtain copies of public source material indicating that the subject, NAT HENTOFF (Bufile 100-359477) and [redacted] (Bufile 105-104779) and five others travelled to Cuba in connection with the Latin American Solidarity Conference (LASO) July 31-August 10, 1967. This lead was set forth as result of a similar request from the USDS by memo dated 10/18/67, incidental to a possible revocation of passport proceedings against these individuals.

The NYO reviewed the case files on all three of the NY subjects for information indicating presence at (or intention to visit) the LASO conference, with negative results. Newspaper clippings pertaining to these subjects maintained in individual "sub" files also failed to disclose any mention of attendance at the LASO conference.

On 12/7 and 8/67, respectively, the "morgue" files of the "New York Daily News" and the "New York Times" were reviewed. Although several articles were available concerning the Conference, none of the NY subjects in whom the Bureau has an interest, were mentioned.

It was noted, however, that the 8/2/67 issue of the "New York Times" contains an article regarding the Conference wherein

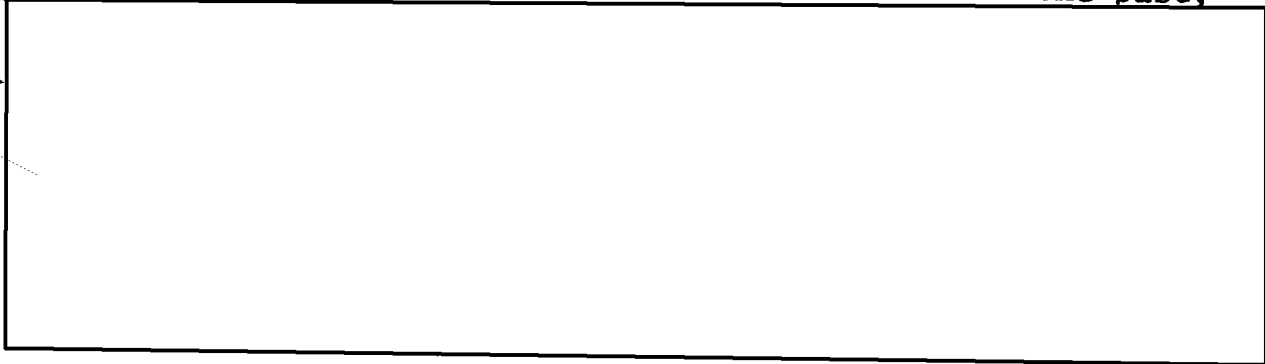

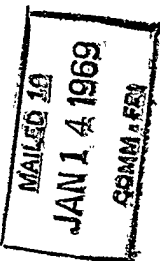

BOOKS: How the Chicago Violence Reads in Books

RIGHTS IN CONFLICT: The Chicago Police Riot. The official report to the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence, Daniel Walker, director. Published independently but simultaneously in paperback by Signet Books (95 cents), Bantam Books (\$1), Award Books (\$1.25). In hardcover by Dutton (\$5.95), Grosset & Dunlap (\$5.95).

MIAMI AND THE SIEGE OF CHICAGO. By Norman Mailer. World. 257 pages. \$5.95. Signet Paperback. 223 pages. 95 cents.

"Police were everywhere. Seldom could a seat of democracy have been so well protected from its democrats." The scene is Bonn, Germany, described by John Le Carre in "A Small Town in Germany," but it could well have been said of Chicago last August. "Democracy is an indulgence granted by the privileged," Le Carre acutely observes. In Chicago last summer it was decided that the privilege would be abrogated during the Democratic National Convention in order that the wheels of party politics could turn more smoothly if no less ponderously.

The riots that ensued were remarkable in several of their aspects, not the least of which is that not only were some of them seen almost at the moment they were taking place but also that they have since been written about by uncommonly diverse historians. The riots appealed to professional newspaper reporters and to individuals ordinarily identified either with fiction or with self-exploration. They were the subject of an intensive inquiry called for by the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence. They were also the subject of a book, "Chicago Eye-witness," by a candidate

for the vice presidency, Mark Lane, running on the Gregory ticket. And finally they were added material for Norman Mailer in his composite account of the Miami and Chicago conventions. Mailer has long been known as novelist, essayist and polemicist—those who, like myself, thought his book about the march on the Pentagon his best work will undoubtedly rank his book on the conventions and the Chicago riots high among his achievements.

The Walker Report

The longest and most detailed book on the subject is "Rights in Conflict," a report submitted by Daniel Walker, director of the Chicago study team, to the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence. It is a compilation of information gathered by 90 full investigators between September 27 and November 18. That it is profusely illustrated is somewhat ironical, as it was the Chicago Police Department's plan to smash and confiscate as many cameras as possible. It is not published by the Government Printing Office

but by a large number of competing private publishers, all rushing into print with identical books, hoping, probably correctly, that the story of the Chicago riots is best-seller enough to be sliced in a half dozen pieces. The GPO was disinclined to publish the work

obscurities of the Chicago visitors and of the police—obscurities which clearly could not be omitted if an accurate and disinterested account of the riots was to be had. The GPO's experience as publisher of history has been limited largely to the Congressional Record, in which the makers of history are also its historians, with an unprecedented opportunity to remake the part they played yesterday to con-

form today more closely to the heart's desire. A congressman is witty enough if he has staircase wit; unlike the rest of us he has the Congressional Record to publish not what he said but what he wished he had said.

There are many opinions about what happened in Dallas. In general there are always discrepancies in the accounts of sudden events that arouse strong emotions. But however various the reactions to the Chicago riots expressed by Esquire magazine's stable of long-hair writers, Genet,

Southern, and Ginsburg, by Mailer, by Lane, and by the official report, it is interesting to note that there is little contradictory evidence presented—really none at all of any importance. For once witnesses and investigators agree.

Crowd of Yuppies

The demonstrators were not an organized group or even mutually sympathetic individuals. "The crowd included Yuppies come to 'do their thing,' youngsters working for a political candidate, professional people with dissenting political views, anarchists and determined revolutionaries, motorcycle gangs, black activists, young thugs, police and Secret Service undercover agents." Not all the police, on the other hand, or even a majority of the police, were inflamed, sadistic monsters running down demonstrator and innocent bystander alike. (Who was it who said:) "There were no innocent bystanders in Chicago. If you

were a bystander you weren't innocent.")

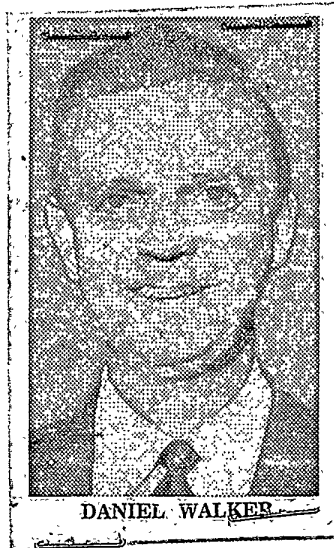
The incredible and horrifying truth is that such gangsterism existed at all. The report quotes an inspector from the Los Angeles Police Department, in Chicago as an official observer: "There is no question that many officers acted without restraint and exerted force beyond that necessary under the circumstances. The leadership at the point of conflict did little to prevent such conduct and the direct control of officers by first-line supervisors was virtually nonexistent."

"It was the clearing of the demonstrators from Lincoln Park that led directly to the violence: symbolically, it expressed the city's opposition to the protesters; literally, it forced the protesters into confrontation with police in Old Town and the adjacent neighborhoods." A Washingtonian imagines in reading the report that the situation was not dissimilar from what might have

happened here if the inhabitants of Resurrection City had been forcibly thrown out of the Mall and then beaten as vagrants on Constitution Avenue.

Walker's "Report" and Lane's "Chicago Eyewitness" are both well written and convincing. Both show a few signs of having been put together at breakneck speed—the wonder is that evidence of haste is so slight. Mailer's book is more colorful, quite naturally more consciously stylistic, more bitter.

All publishers of the "Report" make it possible for the interested reader to heed Mayor Daley's request to read the entire document before passing judgement—they print the text in extenso. Many readers, I suspect, will find the brutality recounted in detail necessary in a factual document but excessive in a book designed for enjoyment. You can skip many pages without distorting the picture. That this is so is one of the sad truths about the Chicago riots.

The Author

Mailer is a well known author in his middle 40's and is probably best known for his post World War II best seller "The Naked and the Dead." He is currently listed on "Section A" of the Reserve Index of the New York Office and is a self-admitted "leftist." He has been highly critical of this Bureau and U. S. Government policies. He was described by Louis Budenz as an adherent of the Communist Party and as being closely associated with the Party until 1945. Investigation conducted as a result of this information disclosed that Mailer has been active in various communist fronts since the late 1940's. He received a great deal of notoriety in early 1951 when he stabbed his wife after a party. He was committed to Bellevue Hospital, New York City, on that occasion for observation and his condition was described as acute paranoia with homicidal-suicidal tendencies.

Mailer was arrested for disorderly conduct in the 10/21/67 antiwar march on the Pentagon. During the Democratic National Convention, he was one of several speakers on 8/28/68 in Grant Park, Chicago, Illinois.

FBI and Mr. Hoover Mentioned

References to the FBI or Mr. Hoover appear as follows in captioned book:

Page 107: With reference to President Johnson's ability to comprehend the higher game of what Mailer called "international politics-is-property," Mailer declared him about as well-equipped as William F. Buckley, Eleanor Roosevelt, Barry Goldwater, George Patton, J. Edgar Hoover, Ronald Reagan, and Averill Harriman. "Politics-is-property" was defined by Mailer as never giving something away for nothing.

Page 122: Mailer quoted Senator McCarthy as having stated, in a session at the Democratic Convention: "They say I was impersonal. I want you to know that I am the only candidate who said he would get rid of J. Edgar Hoover and that is a person."

Page 130: In an interview with Senator McCarthy, Mailer told the Senator that he would have made "a perfect chief for the F.B.I.," to which McCarthy allegedly replied: "Of course, you're absolutely right."

Party when Nixon emphasized the need to return to individual human effort; however, this section of the book ends with Mailer being indecisive about Nixon, not knowing whether he was ready to like the candidate or detested him for his "resolutely non-poetic binary system, his computer's brain, did not know if the candidate were real as a man, or whole as a machine, lonely in his sad eminence or megalomaniacal, humble enough to feel the real wounds of the country or sufficiently narcissistic to dream the tyrant's dream."

Mailer expresses his belief that President Johnson, using Mayor Daly as his instrument, deliberately plotted to crack his Party in two because that Party had been willing to let him go. He claimed that President Johnson completely controlled the Democratic Convention, although he never appeared there in person to speak, and intimated that the police brutality exhibited during the demonstrations was at the President's express command.

Mailer chastises himself throughout the second section of the book for not joining the demonstrators during the first days of the convention. Although he knows he belongs with them, he rationalizes that he cannot afford to be injured or jailed because he has a book to write and must cover the Convention; however, he is haunted by the fact that the real reason may be that he is afraid. When he finally spoke at a meeting of the demonstrators on August 28, 1968, after fortifying himself with several drinks, he was so pleased with himself that he felt there was no rank in any Army suitable for him below the level of General. He stated, "It was something to discover the secret source of the river of one's own good guts or lack of them. And booze was no bad canoe."

Before allying himself with the demonstrators, Mailer was watching the conflict between the police and the demonstrators from the 19th floor window of his hotel. He stated he could then understand how Mussolini's son-in-law had been able to find the bombs he dropped from his airplane beautiful as they burst because as he watched the clubbing, gassing, and chaos below him he felt a sense of calm and beauty. He stated it was as if the war had finally begun, and this, therefore, was a great and solemn moment.

Mailer vacillates greatly in his thinking, making this book difficult to read and impossible at times to comprehend. While he calls himself a revolutionary and states he belongs in England, where one's radicalism might never be tested, he loathes the thought of living anywhere but in America where he has been allowed to write and earn a good income. At the same time, he calls the Yippies and like groups his "troops" and his "children."

PURPOSE:

To furnish background data concerning Norman Mailer whose book, "Miami and the Siege of Chicago," was reviewed in the 1/5/69 issue of the Washington "Sunday Star." The Director stated, "Let me have memo on Mailer."

Mailer is a well known author in his middle 40's and is probably best known for his post World War II best seller "The Naked and the Dead." He is currently listed on "Section A" of the Reserve Index of the New York Office and is a self-admitted "Leftist." He has been highly critical of this Bureau and U. S. Government policies. He was described by Louis Budenz as an adherent of the Communist Party and as being closely associated with the Party until 1945. Investigation conducted as a result of this information disclosed that Mailer has been active in various communist fronts since the late 1940's. He received a great deal of notoriety in early 1961 when he stabbed his wife after a party. He was committed to Bellevue Hospital, New York City, on that occasion for observation and his condition was described as acute paranoia with homicidal - suicidal tendencies.

Mailer was arrested for disorderly conduct in the 10/21/67 antiwar march on the Pentagon. During the Democratic National Convention, he was one of several speakers on 8/28/68 in Grant Park, Chicago, Illinois.

The nature of this pretext was that of an attempt to locate subject's residence through an unknown individual in the vicinity of subject's residence.

It is noted that NY letters to Bureau dated 12/11/67, 1/16/68, and 3/12/58, reflected considerable research in an effort to verify subject's travel to Cuba (mentioned in the details of this report); however, this information could not be verified.

Consideration was given to upgrading subject from the RI-A to the Security Index. It is felt that subject warrants retention on the RI-A. This decision was reached mainly because there is no evidence of subject's membership or allegiance to any subversive organizations. Further, by subject's own admission he is a "left conservative".

Where organizations are mentioned in the details of this report and no characterization appears in the appendix section, no Bureau approved characterization was available.

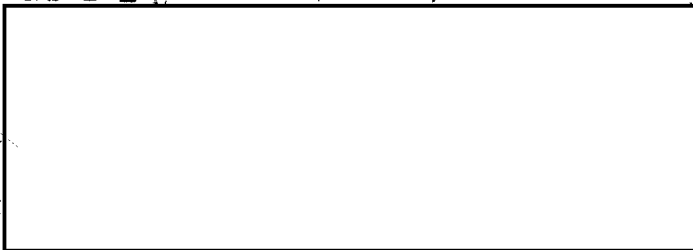

B. Other Business Interests

The "New York Times", late city edition of August 21, 1968, Page 29, reflects that the Strauss Broadcasting Group, which operates radio station WMCA, had purchased a share of the "Village Voice" from NORMAN MAILER, the author, one of the weekly newspaper's five owners. It was related that MAILER sold five of his 20 shares to the above group. It was also pointed out that MAILER founded the "Village Voice" in 1955, with other individuals. It was stated that the author has periodically criticized the paper and only recently began writing articles for it. It was also pointed out that MAILER's 20 per cent (now 15 per cent) ownership had no effect on the policy of the paper. U

"Newsweek" magazine's issue of December 9, 1968, in an article entitled, "Flying High With Mailer", on page 84, reflects that MAILER has been engaged in making several movies including "Maidstone", "Wild 90", and "Beyond The Law". U

An article in the final edition of the "New York Post" of February 11, 1967, Page 26, captioned, "Norman Mailer, Playwright", reflects that MAILER was then married to actress BEVERLY BENTLEY and that they have two sons. Federal Prisoners at Occoquan, Virginia, as of December 28, 1968, reflected that NORMAN MAILER, a male of 142 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, New York, born January 31, 1923, was arrested at 4:15 PM, October 21, 1967, for "broke through line at north side of Pentagon". Disposition was reflected as:

\$50.00 fine, 30 days, 25 days suspended for one year on appeal.

"The RAM" of Fordham University, October 27, 1967, reported the anti-war march on the Pentagon the previous Saturday and stated that the novelist, NORMAN MAILER, was arrested for crossing a picket line near the Pentagon.

The "New York Post", February 27, 1968, Page 21, states that Federal Court Judge, OREN LEWIS, rejected NORMAN MAILER's appeal for a 30-day sentence, 25 days of which were suspended and \$50.00 fine. This article continued by stating that MAILER was freed on a \$50.00 bond and that his conviction would be appealed to the Fourth Circuit, United States Court of Appeals.

The "New York Post", final edition, May 4, 1968, Page 47, reflects that NORMAN MAILER undertakes too chronically the massive October, 1967 march on the Pentagon, the historic confrontation by a battery of anti-war groups on the nerve center of United States military operations in a book entitled, "The Armies of The Night", by NORMAN MAILER, New American Library, 288 Bates, \$5.95.

II. MISCELLANEOUS

NY T-2 advised on February 2, 1967, that [redacted] at a meeting of the East Side Tenants Council, 23 Second Avenue, New York, New York, on February 1, 1967, mentioned that NORMAN MAILER, the author, had attended [redacted] wedding reception the previous Saturday.

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NY T-3 advised during November, 1967, that [redacted] was then a member of the [redacted] Communist Party (CP).

NY T-4 advised that this rally was held for the benefit of Doctor SPOCK and the other four individuals who were recently indicted by the federal government for promoting draft resistance among young men. NY T-4 stated that some 1,500 persons took part in this rally. U

NY T-5 on January 15, 1968, advised that at the above rally a huge sign was displayed on stage which read as follows: "To any young men who will not, because of conscience, serve as a soldier in this criminal war, I council draft refusal, I will aid and abet him, and make his welfare my concern until this war ends. January, 1968." U

NY T-5 stated that at the bottom of this sign was space for signatures for those in the audience who felt that they could, in all good conscience, afix their signatures to it. U

The "New York Times", January 31, 1968, Page 2, reflects that, "Because they believe American involvement in Vietnam is morally wrong", 488 writers and editors announced "yesterday" through a full page ad that they would not pay the proposed ten per cent income tax sur charge or any other war-designated tax increase. Listed as signers of this ad which appeared in the "New York Post", January 30, 1968, Page 51, was the name NORMAN MAILER. U

On February 6, 1968, officials of the United States Department of Justice met with a five-man delegation of clergy and laymen regarding opposition to the war in Vietnam and the draft. At the conclusion of this meeting a huge scroll was left signed by individuals including NORMAN MAILER, 142 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn, New York, with the indication that MAILER had made a \$5.00 donation. This scroll stated, "To any U

"young man, who will not because of conscience, serve as a soldier in this criminal war, I council draft refusal, January, 1968". U

The above information was made available by JOHN R. MC DONOUGH, Assistant Deputy, Attorney General, United States Department of Justice, who advised that the above meeting took place in the Andretta Room of the Justice Building. U

On March 12, 1968, [REDACTED] New York City Police Department (NYCPD), Bureau of Special Services, advised that a benefit performance sponsored by the Legal Defense Fund for Artistic Freedom (LDFAF) was held at Town Hall, New York, New York, on the evening of March 12, 1968. This performance was staged to raise money to establish a defense fund for artistic freedom. Among those in attendance was NORMAN MAILER, well-known author, and LE ROI JONES, Negro playwright and author, who had recently been convicted in Newark, New Jersey, for carrying a concealed weapon during the Newark, New Jersey summer riots of 1967. 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NY T-7 advised on March 13, 1968, that some \$800.00 was raised through this benefit and although it was stated that this was for the benefit of the LDFAF, it would actually be used to underwrite the expense of an appeal by LE ROI JONES relating to his recent conviction in New Jersey. NY T-8 on March 13, 1968, corroborated subject's attendance at the above benefit. U

The "New York Times", April 24, 1968, Page 95, Column 3, reported that some 200 book lovers made their bids for peace "last night" at a literary auction sponsored by the Fifth Avenue Peace Parade Committee held at 2 West 64th Street, New York, New York. It was stated that the proceeds were to pay U

for the weekend's demonstration against the war in Vietnam. It was further reflected that NORMAN MAILER contributed a sketch which brought \$32.50. U

The "Village Voice", May 30, 1968, Page 1, in an article entitled, "On The Steps of A Zeitgeist" by JACK NEWFIELD. It was stated that "last Friday" at 6:30 PM, NORMAN MAILER arrived at an apartment on East 87th Street for a fund raising party for the Columbia University student strikers. U

The article continued, "While Mailer, the rebel, drank burlaps, an SDS kid named Steve made a plea for an immediate \$3400.00 as a down payment for a co-op loft on Wooster Street into which the SDS National office could move". U

This article also reflected that MAILER ended up giving the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) \$100.00 in cash and a loan of \$900.00 against the receipts of a benefit showing of his first film "Wild 90". U

As he left the above function, MAILER was quoted as saying, "I do not agree with SDS. I gave them the money because they are an active principle. They are taking chances and they just may be right. I have some sympathies with them, but not intimate agreement. I'm not a left (ist), I'm a left conservative." U

A characterization of SDS appears in the appendix attached hereto. U

An article in "Newsweek" magazine's issue of December 9, 1968, reflected that NORMAN MAILER covered both political conventions in Miami and Chicago as a reporter for Harper's magazine, and within four weeks turned out 70,000 words. U

NY T-9 advised on September 5, 1968, that during the Democratic National Convention in Chicago, Illinois, a rally was held in Lincoln Park on August 28, 1968, by more than 5,000 demonstrators. NY T-9 advised that they consisted of representatives from the Youth Against War and Fascism, Students for a Democratic Society, WEB Du Bois Club of America and the National Mobilization Committee Against the War in Vietnam. U

NY T-9 also advised that there was also a small number of people representing the Anarchists and Communists distinguished by the red flag of Communism and the black flag of Anarchy. U

NY T-9 added that NORMAN MAILER was a speaker at the rally and stated that he would not be arrested, but saluted the courage of the demonstrators. Another speaker emphasized non-violence as a workable protest. U

"WIN", 5 Beekman Street, New York, New York, published by the War Resisters League in cooperation with the New York Workshop on Non-Violence, issue of January 15, 1969, contains a review of NORMAN MAILER's writings by PAUL ENCIMER. In this article in commenting on the Chicago Convention, ENCIMER pointed out that MAILER could not afford to be arrested because he had a job to do for Harper's magazine and although he had not intended to, MAILER spoke before the kids at Grant Park and was well received. The writer also stated that MAILER attempted to organize a march of delegates to the Amphitheater which did not come off, but instead got into a fight with a delegate who yelled an obscenity at one of the people in his group. U

For a characterization of the Youth Against War and Fascism and the WEB Du Bois Club of America see the appendix attached hereto. U

NY T-10 advised that at a Chicago Socialist Workers Party Executive Committee meeting on November 4, 1968, at 302 South Canal Street, Chicago, Illinois, it was announced that one NORMAN MAILER and another individual would be featured at a student mobilization committee national fund raising benefit in Chicago, Illinois, during the first week of December, 1968. The Socialist Workers Party has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. U

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam, and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us". At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes", the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some Communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of July 24, 1968, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

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W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates were told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself. U

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19 - 21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time, the name W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. U

The second source advised in September, 1966, that Mike Zagarell, CP, USA Youth Director, stated that in Negro communities the Party still supported the plan to build "left" socialist centers and to solidify the Party base through the DCA. This source also advised in September, 1966, that Daniel Rubin, CP, USA National Organizational Secretary, stated the Party believes the DCA should have a working class outlook and be a mass organization favorable to socialism, socialist countries and Marxism, and in April, 1967, Gus Hall, CP, USA, General Secretary, indicated that the DCA primary emphasis should be on developing mass resistance to the draft. U

A third source advised in September, 1967, that Jarvis Tyner was elected Chairman of the DCA on September 10, 1967, near the conclusion of the Third National Convention of the DCA held in New York, New York, from September 8-10, 1967. U

This is a four page article dealing with the "increasing use of police spies and undercover agents" which author Lundy feels "may have put us on the way to America's first experience with 'political police.'" He states that in the conspiracy trial of the Chicago 8, the government is relying almost entirely on evidence gathered by police undercover agents. He says that Louis Salsberg, a newspaper photographer who, "The New York Times" stated, "had become a regular fixture at radical gatherings in New York City," revealed that he had been a paid informer of the FBI since 1967. Author Lundy stated that Herbert Philbrick, the FBI's best-known undercover operative, produced "I Led Three Lives," which was a best seller during the 1950's. He discusses police informers and pertinent Supreme Court decisions such as the Hoffa case. On page 631 he says application of the Fourth Amendment to secret agents who move into political groups would not ban their use elsewhere.

At the bottom of page 631 author refers to former SA Turner and quotes Turner at the top of page 632 on the types of intelligence squads found in police agencies. Lundy completes his article by quoting Norman Mailer who stated "the infiltration of political groups by police secret agents had become, in 1963, a chronic joke." But the author feels that in a country which continues to pride itself on unfettered political exchange, it is not a very funny joke.

BUTLER:

Nothing on author Joseph R. Lundy. References on Congressman Abner J. Mikva (D) of Illinois show he has had the support of Communist Party in past because of his "liberal" views regarding racial equality and civil liberties. At one time he was a member of the National Lawyers Guild, a cited communist front organization. As a newly elected Congressman, Inspector [redacted] saw Congressman Mikva on 1-31-69. Mikva was most cordial and he greatly appreciated having a Bureau representative contact him. He said he admired the Director, was interested in perfecting stringent gun control laws and had studied Director's views on this subject. (94-64216-1, 2)

Mr. WILLIAM G. SIMON, former SAC, called the office 7/5/73, with the following information.

Mr. SIMON stated that he had a call from LLOYD SHEARER, editor of "Parade" Magazine. SHEARER wanted to know if SIMON was, in fact, SAC of the Los Angeles Office in 1962. SIMON told him he was. SHEARER then stated that NORMAN MAILER has written a book on the life of MARILYN MONROE which is going to carry a price list of \$20.00 per copy and hopefully, be on the Book-of-The-Month within a few months. There is an allegation in the book to the effect that in 1962, FBI Agents in Los Angeles went to the telephone company in Santa Monica, California, and removed a "paper tape" of MARILYN's calls, some of which were presumably calls to the White House or White House Staff on the night of her death. Mr. SHEARER said there was some further suggestion that the FBI was either providing her some protection or providing the White House Staff with some protection.

SHEARER asked Mr. SIMON if he knew anything about this and Mr. SIMON told SHEARER that he had absolutely no recollection of any such events. SHEARER asked if he, SIMON, should not have known about this if he was Agent in Charge and SIMON reiterated that he should have known about such activity but that he had no recollection of any such events.

Mr. SIMON stated that SHEARER did not press the issue further and he does not know how far SHEARER intends to carry his inquiry but he wanted this office and the Bureau to know of SHEARER's inquiry and of this reference to the FBI in the forthcoming book if it had not already been brought to the Bureau's attention.

Mr. SIMON stated that he was being very truthful with SHEARER and he did not have any recollection of any such events or any such allegations occurring in 1962 or associated with MARILYN MONROE's death.

A number of individuals in the Los Angeles Office recall hearing stories and gossip outside the Bureau at the time of MARILYN MONROE's death to the effect that she had made some calls to BOBBY KENNEDY shortly before her death, but that discreet inquiry in this office and a review of our indices revealed no confirming facts and certainly no indication of any Bureau involvement as alleged by MAILER.

In view of MAILER's alleged allegation concerning the FBI, the Bureau may desire to explore what avenues might possibly be utilized which would result in the allegation being removed from MAILER's book.

To advise of speculation concerning FBI complicity in the death of Marilyn Monroe propounded by author Norman Mailer in his soon-to-be-published biography of the deceased actress.

"Marilyn," a 270-page biography (New York; Grosset and Dunlap,) priced at \$19.95, is scheduled for publication on 8/1/73. It reportedly has a first American printing of 285,000 copies and is the August selection of the Book-of-the-Month Club.

Following Miss Monroe's death by drug overdose in 1962, there was a spate of rumors, originating on the West Coast, alleging she was having an affair with the then Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, and that her death was in some way related to this and/or was the result of a plot revolving around some of her associates who allegedly had past Communist Party affiliations or sympathies. These rumors were embellished upon at that time in various sensational-type gossip magazines and in a short book published in July, 1964, entitled "The Strange Death of Marilyn Monroe" by Frank A. Capell. These allegations were branded false and no factual support existed for them.

Mailer, in his new book, has repeated some of these same rumors and has given them a bizarre twist.

As to whether Miss Monroe took her own life, Mailer answers "possibly" - and then suggests other possibilities. One of these is the suggestion that the FBI, CIA or the Mafia found it of interest that Robert Kennedy, brother of the President John Kennedy, was reputed to be having an affair with the movie star. Mailer suggests that "right-wing" FBI and CIA Agents had a "huge motivation" to murder Marilyn Monroe in order to embarrass the Kennedy family,

claiming the FBI and CIA were furious with the Kennedys because following the Bay of Pigs invasion President Kennedy was moving to limit the power of these agencies.

Mailer has admitted in recent press interviews concerning his book that he has no evidence to support his theory and that it is based on his "writer's instinct" and on speculation.

A second allegation purportedly contained in the book was recently brought to the attention of the Los Angeles Office by Lloyd Shearer, editor of Parade Magazine. This allegation is that in 1962, FBI Agents in Los Angeles went to the telephone company in Santa Monica, California, and removed a "paper tape" of Marilyn Monroe's telephone calls, some of which according to Mailer, were presumably to the White House or White House staff on the night of her death.

This is false and neither the files of the Los Angeles Office nor FBI Headquarters indicate the existence of any such tapes. This again appears to be a variation of a spurious charge contained in Capell's 1964 book in which he alleged that such tapes were in the custody of the Los Angeles Police Department.

Norman Mailer is an eccentric but well-known author, who in the past has won a Pulitzer Prize and a National Book Award. He is the author of "The Naked and the Dead," "The Deer Park," "An American Dream," "Cannibals and Christians," "The Armies of the Night," and "Miami and the Siege of Chicago."

He admits to little or no research concerning his speculation about Marilyn Monroe's death. He states his motive in writing the book is his dire need for money. He admits having no evidence to support his theory of FBI or CIA involvement and uses it to sensationalize his book and to gain publicity. Mailer has even coined a new word which describes some of his speculative writing in "Marilyn." The "factoid" he defines as "an event which has no existence other than it has appeared in print."

A review in Time Magazine on 7/16/73, a Mike Wallace television interview, a 7/22/73 New York Times book review by Pauline Kael, and a Washington Post article dated 7/20/73 by Stephen Isaacs, are all critical of Mailer for his unsubstantiated theorizing and for engaging in "yellow" journalism.
