♦ On 11/1/93, a representative from the Violent Crimes Unit (VCU), Violent Crimes and Major Offenders Section, Criminal Investigative Division (CID), prepared a packet of documents received to date in this matter for review by WMFO.
♦ On 11/1/93, a representative from the VCU contacted WMFO SSA and scheduled a meeting between representatives of the Violent Crimes Unit, SSA and the WMFO case Agent on 11/2/93.
♦ On 11/1/93, a representative from the VC <u>U met with</u>
FBIHQ Office of Liaison and International Affairs SSA
(State Department liaison) and SSA
to discuss DOJ's request that the FBI review documents from the State Department Passport Office (DOS) and the pertaining to "Finders." It is noted
that the DOJ requested that an FBI Agent "review relevant
documents firsthand, from the relevant intelligence agencies, as opposed to having to rely on the agency's summaries or review"
During a meeting at DOJ with Section Chief Bergasser and DOJ Attorney on 10/28/93, it was pointed out that a written request from the FBI or DOJ would be required before any
records could be obtained from DOS for review by the
FBI. During that meeting, Mr. Bergasser requested that the FBI
prepare a communication to DOS and let him review it
before it was sent to those agencies.


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PRELIMINARY INQUIRY - ALLEGATIONS OF ORGANIZED CHILD ABUSE BY A GROUP KNOWN AS "FINDERS"

♦ On 10/28/93, a representative of the Violent Crimes Unit met with George Bergasser, Section Chief, and Attorney Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, Department of Justice. Bergasser noted that DOJ had received a three-ring binder from Special Agent U.S. Customs Service (USCS). This binder contains USCS briefing material on "Finders." They requested that the FBI contact USCS to obtain a copy of the material contained in the three ring binder.
Bergasser noted that in 1987, in Stuart, Florida, a
Bergasser noted that during October 1993,



♦ On 10/28/93, an FBIHQ indices search revealed a reference to "Finders" in FBIHQ file 7-HQ-20191. On 10/29/93, a review of this file indicated that FBI, Jacksonville (Jacksonville file 7-1248) and FBI, WMFO (WMFO file 7-1685) had conducted investigation resulting from an arrest of two individuals in Tallahassee, Florida in 1987.

File review of 7-HQ-20191 indicated that a joint investigation, conducted by the MPD and WMFO, lead to the identification and interview of the mothers of the six children, two of the fathers, and several other key members of the "finders" group. On 2/18/87, WMFO presented the results of their investigation to Assistant United States Attorney United States Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia, Washington, D.C., who declined prosection for violation of title 18, U.S. Code, Section 1201 (kidnaping) and 2251 (sexual exploitation of children). WMFO SA was the WMFO case agent in this matter.

♦ On 10/29/93 the information obtained at DOJ was discussed with WMFO SSA and Miami SSRA West Palm Beach RA, and a teletype was prepared designating WMFO as Office of Origin in this matter.

The mothers were all aware that the children had been taken to Florida on a trip, they were familiar with and thoroughly trusted the men in whose care the children had been placed, and all insisted the children were well cared for.

On 2/18/87, The United States Attorneys Office, WDC, declined prosection in this matter for the violation of USC, Title 18, Sections 1201 and 1251.

In February, 1991, U.S. Customs "integrated" their Child Pornography and Protection Unit into the Smuggling Investigations Division, Office of Investigative Programs. At the time, Customs stated that "these changes have in no way affected the manner in which child pornography investigations are being conducted by our field offices or the support that our headquarters staff provides."

I asked Customs to provide me with arrests, convictions and employee-hours spent on child pornography and protection. Customs own numbers show a dramatic and inexcusable decline.

As you can see, since the Unit's heyday in 1990, arrests and conviction have been nearly halved, and employee-hours have been reduced to barely cne-fourth of previous levels!!

Therefore, I am introducing a Concurrent Resolution calling on Customs to reestablish its Child Pornography and Protection Unit, and to equal or exceed its 1990 efforts.



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THE TUNELS FOUND AT THE MCMARTIN PESCHOOL A PRELIMINARY REPORT

45 foot tunnel

- . 9 foot wide subterranean entrance found under west wall of the "Dog" room (Classroom 4, Ray Buckey's classroom).
 - Avocado tree roots cut on both sides of the entrance.
 - Disney bag, "Copyright 1982," found 4-1/2 feet below the classroom floor and 3" to 6" in from entrance and under foundation, Classroom 4.
- Tunnel proceeded south, then east 45 feet through Classrooms 4 and 3, and north, then east 10 feet within Classroom 4.
 - Tunnels were 30" wide, 44" to 46" deep, with top of the tunne 30" under the classroom floor.
 - The footing between Classrooms 3 and 4 was arched where the tunnel passed underneath and 12" shorter in depth at this location than same footing 12 feet to then north.
 - Four large, upright containers were found in the tunnel under the arch, obviously hand placed.
- A 9 foot wide chamber was found along the tunnel under Classroom 4. Top of chamber and top of sections of the tunnel had layers of plywood covered with tar paper which had apparently been supported by cinder blocks and 2" x 2" and 2" x 4" wooden posts found underneath.
- . Tunnel features made it evident that tunnel was hand dug.

• 7 foot tunnel extending into the triplex next door

- Tunnel extended from the bathrooms off the office and Classroom 1 to the front yard of the triplex next door. Front yard concealed from street by three-car garage.
- Children described entrance and exiting tunnel in triplex yard exactly where tunnel and exit were found.
- . 1 39" x 41" area under a hole cut in this neighbor's bathroom floor had been excavated and subsequently filled.

Other significant facts

- A small, white plastic plate with three pentagrams hand drawn on top of light green paint was found by the archaeologists in the stratified dirt in the play yard.
 - Per historical archaeologist, pentagrams were hand drawn by an adult and not part of the manufacturer's design.
- . Many other artifacts found, whose analyses will be released upon completion of tests.
- No doorknobs were on Classroom 3 door, only a dead bolt lock.
- Each classroom had on and off light switch labeled 'Fire Alarm." System did not connect to fire station but was used as an alert within the school.
- More than 2000 artifacts were found under the school floor, including over 100 animal bones.

Thank you for your letter dated September 13, 1991, expressing your concerns regarding the U.S. Customs Service Child. Pornography Program.

The Child Protection Act of 1984 clearly defined the agency jurisdiction in this typically multidisciplined area of enforcement. The U.S. Postal Inspection Service has jurisdiction pertaining to the use of the U.S. mail to transport child pernography, the Federal Eureau of Investigation (FEI) has jurisdiction over the interstate transportation of child pernography, and the U.S. Customs Service has jurisdiction over the international distribution of child pernography. The statute has created a close working relationship between the agencies at the field office and Headquarters level. The point of this is that the statute has permitted a clear definition of responsibility for the respective agencies.

Enforcement experienced a massive reorganization. This reorganization caused the Child Pornography and Protection Unit to be integrated into the Smuggling Investigations Division. The Child Pornography and Protection Unit was a part of the General Smuggling Branch which was a part of the Smuggling Investigations Division. All Units, Branches, and Sections were eliminated during the recent reorganization. The child pornography program is now headed by the National Child Pornography Program Hanager, . "a Senior" Special, Agent assigned to the Smuggling Investigations Division, Office of Investigative Programs, at Headquarters. These changes have in no way affected the manner in which child pornography investigations are being conducted by its field offices or the support that the Headquarters staff provides to these field offices. The primary functions of the Unit remain the same, that is to coordinate investigations within the U.S. Customs Service and between the U.S. Customs Service and other agencies, as well as collect, analyze, and disseminate child pornography data.

Headquarters has established and still maintains working relationships with the Department of Justice through the Child Exploitation and Obscanity Section, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, the FBI, the U.S. Postal Service, and various Military Investigation Commands. The Office of Enforcement also continues to work in conjunction with the Customs Office of Inspection and Control in seeking out and discovering new and unique methods of smuggling child pornography into the United States from other countries.

The aggressive approach that the U.S. Customs Service has demonstrated in conducting child pernography investigations within its jurisdictional area, has had an impact on both the violators and the distributors, and the methods of smuggling used by these individuals. The U.S. Customs Service will continue to target and investigate the importation of child pernography as aggressively as we have in the past. The ultimate effect is the enhancement on our part to prevent the sexual exploitation and abuse of children.

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
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

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

ntil February 1987, the Finders were invisible to all but a few friends, relatives, neighbors, police, and intelligence buffs. The Finders liked it like that. Even those familiar with the group of 20 adults and six children had different notions of what the members were up to. The Finders liked that, too. The more disparate the images, the more invisible the group became. It's camouflage theory: If your foe can't discern your edges, you make a poor target. Friends-of the Finders described them as '60s throwbacks who lived communally, Friends of the Finders described them as '60s throwbacks who lived communally, ascribed to Eastern philosophies, played elaborate games using the globe as their board, and raised their children creatively. Relatives branded them a cult and charged that they were pawns of their leader, Marion Pettie Jr., a.k.a...the Game Caller, the Student; the Stroller. Shortly before 5 o'clock that afternoon a woman who lived next to Myers Park in Tallahassee, Florida, called police to report an odd sight: a man dressed in a coat and tie playing in the park with six unkempt children. When two patrol cars arrived at Myers Park the officers found two well-dressed men and six kids: alongside a foulsmelling, blue Dodge van with Virginia plates. The kids, between the ages of 2 and 7,

Had Holwell and Ammerman told the police they were from a D.C.-based communal group, had they explained they were on a camping trip, had they reached in the glove compartment and forked over the letters-of-consent from the children's mothers, had they not acted so evasive and weird, they well might have been thanked for their time and left alone. But there are too many what-ifs in the Finders saga, too many chapters that could have been the last one."

Instead, what happened is this: Holwell and Ammerman were arrested on misde meanor child-abuse charges. Within a day the national news rocket took off, fueled with the worst kind of off-the-record innuendo, misleading court documents, and wide-eyed pronouncements from officials working the case. If you believed the reports, Holwell and Ammerman were satanic D.C. cultists that swiped children from their parents, sexually abused them, and peddled kiddy porn across the globe.

The Washington Post ran Page One stories three days in a row. Washington TV stations dispatched reporters to Tallahassee to broadcast live remotes. The Miami Herald quoted parents of Finders wondering if the group was going to pull a mass sticide, a la Jonestown. The staid New York Times reported that "some have described [the Finders] as a bizarre cult of devil worshipers." Everyone got in on the act. There were stories broadcast by Rita Braver, Conaie Chung, Larry King, CNN, even the BBC.

The Law pulled out all the stops, too. The Tallahassee and D.C. Police hooked up with the FBI, the U.S. Customs Service, Interpol, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (an FBI-like unit), and police in Virginia, San Francisco, and New York.

Holwell and Ammerman sat in stir at Tallahassee's Leon County Jail and the state of Florida held the children in protective custody. Meanwhile, police raided Finders' homes in D.C. and Virginia, investigating everything from the men's sexual habits to their finances.

The only trouble was, they hadn't broken any laws. After six weeks in jail, the charges against the men were dropped. And though the state kept some of the child-

ren from their mothers for months, eventually all of them were returned. For one week in

A year-and-a-half later, the Finders have quietly gone back to their own business. But some questions have yet to fade. How did the case get so whacked out of proportion? Why did it continue, week after week?

the Tallahassee Police Department responded to my Freedom of Information Act request by turning over most of their Finders files. Their cooperation was most of their Finders files. Their cooperation was remarkable. The Washington Metropolitan Police Department, on the other hand, which searched two D.C. Finders, dwellings, refused to anxier any questions for this article. Officer Judy Suchocki, one of the arresting officers, guides her patrol car between stands of oaks to a patch of dirt at Tallahassee's Myers Park. As her headlights illuminate webs of Spanish moss hanging from the trees, she tells the story of the arrest.

Suchocki had responded to a Code 13P, suspicious persons, and arrived as the back-up to the first officer on the scene, Tony Mashburn, Mashburn questioned Holwell and Ammerman; Suchocki interviewed the four boys and two girls in the Dodge van.

They were scared of us, which is not unusual for kids," says Suchocki.

"My first impression was that they were dirty, but I would not say that they were unusually dirty for kids," she says. "The van smelled like urine and there were blankets all over the back. They definitely were sleeping

in the van. I asked the kids where they were from, why they were here, where they were going. Mary was the one who was talking. She was real talkative."


Mary, 7, said they were from Washington and she recited their Glover Park address and phone number. She gave all the kids' names and their ages: Max Livingston, 6; Benjamin Franklin, 4; Honey Bee, 3; John Paul Pope, her brother, 2; and B.B., 2. They didn't go to school, though they had been taught how to read and how to play games. One of the two men was her daddy, Mary said, but they hadn't seen their mommies since before Christmas—which the Finders don't celebrate. She explained that they have lots of mommies and daddies and that the adults do what the Game Caller says. Right now, they were being "weaned" from their mommies and just "going different places," sleeping in campgrounds.

"I was worried about the kids being kidnapped," says Suchocki. "For her to tell me they were being weaned was odd."

After questioning the kids for 20 minutes, Suchocki compared notes with Mashburn. Ammerman and Holwell had told Mashburn they were D.C. teachers en route to Mexico where they were going to start a school for brilliant children. The kids' parents, they said, were back in Washington. Then Ammerman became evasive, refusing to claim any of the kids as his own, and Holwell clammed up entirely.

"I'm not sure what's going on," Mashburn told Suchocki. They radioed their higher-

Waiting for their supervisor to arrive, Suchocki continued her interview with the kids. The Game Caller was a big fat man who sat on a pedestal and threw pennies at them, Mary said. Suchocki began to think the kids had been brainwashed.

Mary recounted 2 recent trip to a coin-op laundry: They hadn't put enough soap in the machine and some of the clothes didn't come clean. They said they received food in reward for work, lived on a diet of raw vegetables and fruit, and hadn't eaten since morning. As they talked, Mary took oranges and bananas from a box in the van and peeled them for the other

"Stuff like that made me wonder if the men were taking care of the kids properly—even if they weren't being kidnapped," says Such-

Florida child-abuse laws make it a misdemeanor to deprive children of food, clothing, shelter, or medical care or to cause them men-tal injury. On arrival, Suchocki and Mashburn's supervisor decided, if nothing else, these laws had been broken and he told the officers to arrest the men.

Suchocki didn't put up any argument.

"There was no way I was going to let these men continue with the kids if I could help it," she says. "Can you imagine how I would have

A few teenagers hanging out in the park no-ticed the commotion and fetched their home video camera to tape the arrest. Holwell was hoisted by his limbs, put in a patrol car with Ammerman, and driven to the station. Such-

ocki drove the kids over in the van.

Ammerman, who had a valid driver's license, was booked under his name and also r an alias, Kenny Rogers. Holwell had no ID and was booked as John Doe, with the a.k.a.'s Michael James Houlihan and James

"The children were extremely hungry when they got to the police department," offices Mashburn wrote in his three-page report. "The children appeared as if they hadn't bathed in several days and most of them didn't have on any underwear. .. The children's clothing were extremely fifthy and they had on mismatched socks."

Investigator Cheryl Weigand of the Sex Crimes and Juvenile Unit "Miranda-ed" Hol-well and Ammerman in a holding cell and atwell and Ammerman m a notting cell and se-tempted to interview them. Instead of answer-ing Weigand's questions, Ammerman asked about the charges while Holwell laid on the cell's floor with his eyes shut tight, jerking his body. "Holwell was doing the frog," says Wei-gand, who was appointed the case's lead in-vestigator.

"If they had said who they were, given us a number where we could have contacted the mothers, I'm not saying the situation wouldn't have concerned us—it might still have been a little hard for us so understand—but it would have lifted a large cloud," Weigand says. "We had six children, and we didn't know who their mothers were.

Weigand ushered the kids through the second of the many interviews they would en-

Mary said the Game Caller's name was Marion Pettie. She said he forbade the children from entering the Glover Park house and that he lived on the roof. While on the road, she explained, they wrote to Pettie on a modernequipped computer—a TRS-80 laptop—and then he would tell them what to do.

Mary told her they were "different."

Different indeed. One of the boys peed on
the rug in Weigand's office. Other kids soiled their pants. Six-year-old Max Livingston, she noted, had a poor understanding of time. He didn't seem to recognize a stapler, a typewrit-er, and other common office objects. Weigand led the kids back to the van to get some food and one of the 2-year-olds are eight bananas

"These children were not properly taken care of," says Weigand, who bails from New York. "Being a police officer is very much a learned behavior. You see one incident and "say 'what if?' We see hundreds and hundreds and we learn what is reasonable for a parent to do and what is not reasonable."

Weigand spoke with one of the girls about sexual abuse. "[S]he became very evasive," Weigand wrote in her report. "She denied any 'bad touches,' or any inappropriate behavior by the adults. [She] became very fidgety, and wanted to end the interview." Later, two of the kids described a game in

which they ripped off an adult's clothes. Ap-parently, the kids only tore off a man's jacket and then rummaged through his pockets for change. They told Weigand about another game where women walked around naked. "Both children felt that this was very funny," wrote Weigand, "and went along with the concept of it being a game."

The police fingerprinted the children and

took their mug shots after agents from Flori-da's Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS) arrived to place the kids in

protective custody.

Investigator Weigand phoned the D.C. Metropolitan Police Department and explained the situation, giving them the Glover Park phone number and address Mary had memorized. D.C. Police reported back to Weigand, saying they had reached an answering machine with a "weird" message on it, some kind of biblical passage. D.C. said it was going to send a cruiser by the house. Tallahassee didn't hear from D.C. until the next day.

s Finders travel the country and the world, they communicate with fellow members via electronic mailboxes, such as MCI Mail. No matter where they are they can receive or transmit a message with a Touch Tone phone, a computer, a modern,

and the mailbox password.

The day after Tallahassee Police arrested Ammerman and Holwell, a Finder named SS (Stuart Silverstone-they typically use their initials when corresponding) sent a "priority" report to BM (Bob Meyer).

The sequence of events started here when I returned to W St [the Glover Park home] last night around 10pm to a waiting Metropolitan Police Officer Smith of the 2nd District HQ," SS's report reads. Officer Smith told SS that three kids were found in Tallahassee living in a van and that police thought one of the mothers lived at this address.

"The ofer asked my name, which I gave, + whether this was a school, No, and that was about it," wrote SS. "I offered to make some calls to try + locate the mother?

SS checked the interesting machine and listened to a message left by the D.C. Police A. Lev minutes later the phone page it was an official from Poorda's HRS explaining that they had not lead and that the invente court would be fielding a custody, hearing the next morning. He ested me if I know where the mothers were, + I said I would try to find our. He asked if this was a school, + I said No, it was a private residence. He would not tell me more, such as the names of the men

being held + charges."
On Thursday, the day after the arrest, the juvenile court granted HRS temporary custo-dy of the children. The criminal court set bond of \$100,000 each for the misdemeanor child-abuse charges leveled against Ammer-man and Holwell. SS called Investigator Weigand, using the name Steve Learner, and told her he was trying to help put the mothers in touch with her. Weigand explained the particulars of the case. Would the mothers get their kids if they showed up? he asked. Not necessarily, Weigand said.

"It was a very routine sort of investigation," says Officer Scott Hunt, who was the Tallahassee Police Department spokesman at the

Hunt phoned the press Wednesday night and briefed them, but on Thursday the only mention of the arrest was in a small story in the local paper, the Tallahassee Democrat. "Child abuse cases were not that unusual,"

says Hunt.
That changed before the close of Thursday when D.C. Police realized Ammerman and Holwell were members of the Finders:

Their [D.C. Police] response was Holy shit! We've been looking at these freaks,' says Hunt.

Tallahassee Investigator Cheryl Weigand spoke to Detective Jim Bradley of the Washington Metropolitan Police Intelligence Unit that day. In her report she wrote, 'He asked this investigator if I thought there was a possibility there may be more children at either of the locations [the Glover Park home the women and children resided in or a Northeast warehouse that the men called home]. This investigator stated that may be true, but I did

any specific child that I knew of there. He stated that he was going to get search warrants on both locations, and try to serve them later this date."

Det. Bradley filed an affidavit for the search warrants at the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia on Thursday afternoon explaining that he was looking for evidence of kidnapping, a federal crime, or any related offenses described in the affidavit.

"Prior to February 5th, 1987 your affiant, Detective James E. Bradley, Jr. received in-formation from a confidential source of information," wrote Bradley. "This source stated that a group of subjects calling themselves the Finders, A [sic] cult, were conducting 'brainwashing' techniques at the above described two locations in Dist of Columbia. The source stated that members of the 'cult' attempted on numerous occassions [sic] to introduce it into the 'cult' by promising financial rewards and sexual gratification. The source stated that 'children are used in 'rituals' by the members of the 'cult'. The source stated that it never personally observed the children being abused but that it had had conversations with grandparents of the children who feared for the safety of the children. .

"The source further stated that during the latter part of December 1986 it personally had conversations with one of the 'cult' members, identified as Allen Schoen, wanted it to 'explore' Satanism with members of the 'cult'.

Judge Jean Dwyer approved the warrants shortly after 4 p.m.

Bradley's affidavit became the fount of much of the sensational reporting that followed. Ex-Finder Paula Arico, mothe Mary and John Paul Pope and formerly Hol-well's wife, says Bradley's "confidential well's wite, says Bradley's "confidential source" is a woman who had a brief affair with a group member. Two independent sources confirmed this.

In the affidavit, Bradley summarized what

learned from Tallahassee Police and wrote, "Lastly, the source in this investigation told your affiant that the information concerning this 'cult' is kept in computers stored at the addresses listed in this affidavit.

In what appears to be an addendum, Bradley added this zinger in slightly larger type.

'On December 15, 1986 Detective Bradley responded to the area of Glover Park in the rear of the 3900 Block of W Street, N.W. Det. Bradley observed a clearing approximately seventy yards behind the house and several stumps surrounding the open area. Several round stones had been gathered near the circle, this practice is sometimes used in Satanic rituals, and evidence that several persons had gathered in the clearing recently. The rear of the residence is covered from the siley by heavy bamboo growth, save a small entrance to the rear yard. In the rear yeard [sic] was a small very ornate gravestone propped up against the support pillar for the porch."

Like other members of the Metropolitan Po-lice, Det. Bradley did not return phone calls and did not reply to a written request for an interview.

To a school of journalists circling a story, an affidavit like this one—packed with sex, child abuse, the occult, and cultism—is fresh blood. Affidavits are court documents, and journalists can quote from them without fearing a li-bel suit. Whether the police have their facts straight doesn't matter—an affidavit tells a journalist what the police think they know.

If that wasn't enough to chum the waters, sexual abuse got tossed in. An HRS esseworker told Investigator Weigand and at least one other Tallahassee officer that two of the children were "confirmed cases of sexual abuse," even though the physician who conducted sexual exams on the children for HRS had not confirmed sexual abuse.

The doctor's dictation, transcribed the day after the exam, cautiously describes possible

sexual abuse of one boy and one girl.
"This is a distinctly abnormal hymenal pat-tern compatible with either digital or attempted penile penetration," he said of the girl.
"The absence of supperficial [sic] abrasions revealed by tolluidine [sic] blue would argue revened by followine [ssc] once would argue against any recent trauma (in the last 35 days)." Of the boy, he stated, "Thi degree of anal sphincter larity should prompt questioning in the area of anal dignil practication. sodomy, although it is not diagnostic of

Thursday evening, D.C. news stations broadcast their first Finders stories and Friday's Washington Post ran a small story in

On Friday, Weigand, another Tallahassee investigator, and an FBI agent tried to interview the men at Leon County Jail, where they were kept in isolation. To the investigators' surprise, when they arrived at the jail they bumped into Doug Ammerman's brother,

David told the officers Doug had visited their parents in Gainesville a few weeks before the arrest with a boy he claimed was his. Doug Ammerman had told his parents he was heading for Miami.

Though David said he hadn't seen his brother in three or four years, the year before he had written Doug a letter. David showed the investigators the reply. It wasn't from Doug. It was from Stuart Silverstoneand printed on the letterhead of Gung-Ho Traders, 1307 Fourth Street NE, the address of the Finders' warehouse. Silverstone's letter said Doug had left for China with a Dr., Gung-Ho just before the postman delivered David's letter. David Ammerman also showed investigators a letter addressed to their mother

signed by "The Three Wives of Gung Ho.".

The letter reads, "This is to testify that your son Douglas, aka Earnest Angel, I Betterson, Danny Proper, Kenny Rogers is a true master of the art of fucking. The shape of his cock is unique and he is truly an artist at using it to give us the most pleasure. The depth! The width! The heights! No other man touches us in this way.

"His hands have magic as they stroke our slender limbs and moist pussies. Words cannot describe the tender passion that Douglas brings to our orgizatic pleasures....".

"Oh Mrs. Ammerman, we cannot thank you enough for having raised such a great

you enough for having raised such a great stud just hink if he had never left home, we'd lever laye known the exstasy of his through pastern refused to speak with the investigators or his visining brother. Howelf, however, follered some "basic information" and asked about the children. Had they been seen, by a doctor? Was anything found? Where were they? The investigators told him Where were they? The investigators told him the kids were in protective custody and not in need of immediate medical attention.

Friday was also the day that reporters from the Post and local TV stations got their hands on the affidavit, just in time to photograph and videotape the raid of the Finders' ware-

At a press conference in Tallahassee, Scott Hunt revealed that "physical examinations

showed sexual abuse to one of the children."

The Washington TV stations went wild.
Take WUSA-TV, for example, D.C.'s CBS affiliate. They broadcast the arrest footage shot by the teens. Bob Strickland appeared live from Tallahassee. Me-lo-dra-ma-tic Mike Buchanan, citing police sources, reported that the Finders had "worldwide connections," used "sex and children to obtain power and money," and had two bank accounts with over \$100,000 in each one. The Glover Park residence was "a breeding house where wom-en exercise great control." The children in custody were "like shells, zombie-like."

In the searches of the Finders' two D.C. addresses, police recovered computers, data disks, software, diaries, and other personal papers. Police also seized photos they said showed children taking part in animal blood-letting ceremonies. One photo supposedly showed a child in chains.

"Officials Describe 'Cult Rituals' in Child Abuse Case," one Post story was headlined.
"Customs officials said they were looking into whether a child pornography operation was being conducted," the article said. Adding to the intrigue, Post reporters noted that photos of naked children were "visible through a bag carried from the warehouse" during the raid. (In TV footage of the raid, one of the article's

authors can be seen scribbling madly as she peers through a jam-packed plastic bag a cop hauls away.)

The Miami Herald's Page One story quoted Officer Scott Hunt, "It is our belief these kids were not kidnapped but that their parents gave them away, because one of the rites of passage into this saturic organization is that you have to give up your rights to your child-ren, and that the leaders of this organization can do what they want to with your children."

In the Tallahassee Democrat's Page One story, Hunt was quoted, "As far as we're concerned, this goes from coast to coast and from Canada to Mexico....There is no doubt in our mind that this will have at least national, if not international, repercussions."

The FBI had joined the case to look into the "transportation of children across state lines for immoral purposes or kidnapping." U.S. Customs was contributing its satanism and pornography expertise. Interpol was investi-

gating a tip about Holwell.

The Tallahassee Police Department was awash in the media flood. "I had 75 reporters waiting for me in the lobby," says Hunt. "We logged 450 telephone calls to me in two days. They were bringing in overtime people to help take messages." Hundreds of calls were from parents claiming the children. Canvassing the nation for the kids' parents were the National Center for Exploited Children, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Child Find, Children's Clearing House, the National Child Safety Council, and the National Association of Missing Children. Aside from a bomb threat phoned to the house holding the kids, they were physically safe as could be.

Sauntsy night, three days after the arrest, by the Finders went public with their stary and R. Gardner Terrett. 20 CPA formerly with the Insernal Revenue Service, and a memor to D.G. and Jallahassee Police, the result with FBI, HRS, the juvenile court judge, the FBI, Dan Rather, and the Washington Post. With a stab at wit and humor, the Finders' trade-mark, Terrell headed the memo "SUBJECT: Investigative Leads."

"This memo is respectfully offered in the hope that it will clear up some misunderstanding concerning the current 'missing children' case receiving so much media coverage," he wrote. Terrell explained that in early January, Ammerman, a landscape gardener, and Stanley Berns, an architect, had taken the seven children to Berea, Kentucky, to help the Rev. Jim Wyker build a retirement community called New Hope. Terrell gave the name and phone number of a Berea couple who helped are for the kids during their visit, and said the plan had been to enroll them in the couple's Montesorri school while the community was being built.

ras being built.

Because the Rev. Wyker was not ready to break ground for New Hope, wrote Terrell, the men took the children on a vacation/ camping trip to the warmer climate of Florida with the full applause and approval of the children's mothers." Terrell wrote that he drove to Florida with Holwell, computer programmers Christian Herbst and Thomas R. Van Deusen, and Robert M. Meyer. Herbst, moted Terrell, has a Harvard M.A., while Meyer "is a Princeton and Oxford M.A." "When we were satisfied that the six child-

ren [were] safely in the hands of five capable adults, Mr. Meyer and I left Florida." On the day of the arrest. Holwell and Ammerman took the kids to the park while the three other men looked for "accommodations."
"The mothers had fully authorized these

men, in writing, to care for their children and expressed full confidence in them," wrote Terrell, referring to the authorization letters in van's glove compartment. "All of the mothers are now in San Francisco working in business offices, earning money to help pay for 'New Hope.' To who claimed he owned the raided Glover Park home and the Northeast warehouse, closed by saying he considered the ar-rests and raids "mistakes." Not violations of civil liberties. Not a humiliating pain in the ass. Not a wholly unnecessary bureaucratic fuck-up. Mistakes, that's all. His memo included his phone number and an offer to help in any way he could.

Reporters and police never poked a hole in Terrell's even-toned and cordial letter. From Berea, Kentucky, the Rev. Jim Wyker confirmed that the men and children had stayed with him for a week in January. The 86-year-old retired non-denominational minister was a rock-solid source. He told the Louisville Courier-Tournal he met the Finders at a "meeting of commune proponents" a few years before. That past November, he told them about his New Hope plans, and January 9 they popped in to help. "The only thing we discussed was the land and the building and children's cen-ter," he said. "I'm not trying to uphold the Kids."

The Sunday Washington Post ran two Page One stories on the Finders, one headlined "Cult Member Defends 2 Men in Child Abuse Case."

"We are all in a state right now where we are afraid. We've been made almost dysfunc-tional by the reports," Terrell told the Post in what the paper called a lengthy telephone in-terview. Terrell described the "bloodletting ritual" as the slaughter of two goats kept on farm in Virginia. The goats had been killed for food, he said, and the kids had watched the slaughter as an educational experience.

The Post's conversation with Terrell came shortly after police raided five Finders' properties in two small Virginia towns near Old Rag Mountain, Etlan and Nethers. Again, the Post satisfied the readers' longing to peer behind the curtain—no matter what might be there. "The door of one cabin was open yesterday, revealing large amounts of food, clothing, sleeping bags, books and pemphlets from

Monday was also the day Tallahassee got first wind of Marion Pettie's whereabouts.

Lt. Lee Hart of the Culpeper (Virginia) Police Department informed Tallahassee that he had a contact with the Finders. Hart said this contact told him Pettie put out the word for members to flee and hide, and Pettie would probably go to Andrews Air Force Base and catch a military plane flight to China. This was plausible: Pettie, a retired Air Force massergeant, had the right to free, stand-by military transport,

Monday also saw a visit to the Washington, D.C., Field Office of the FBI by one of the Finders mothers and the three men from the

An FBI report of the interviews gives the impression that Herbst, Van Deusen, and Meyer had remained calm until they read the newspaper accounts on Friday morning, February 6th. "They realized they were being portrayed as child abusers and satanists. rightened, the three decided to return to WDC and figure out what to do."

In Monday's Washington Post, Terrell explained the men's silence and passivity ("'Finders' Member Labels Arrests 'All a Big Mistake." "). Shortly before the Tallahassee arrests they had been stopped by police in Marion County, Florida, and that incident com-bined with 10 years of being hassled by D.C. cops convinced the men that it would be better to deal with a judge than unreasonable po-

Another Finders mother called the Tallahassee Police Monday and asked whether the mothers would be arrested if they came to claim their kids. "We couldn't give the moth-ers the guarantee that they wouldn't be arrested," says Lt. Van Meter. The mother agreed


That night, Terrell invited reporters into the Finders' warehouse for an interview. Sitting with his back to the cameras, a Ronald Reagan mask covering the hind part of his head, he explained that the mothers hadn't come forward because they were waiting out the

Terrell also told reporters that he was "play-

Tallahassee Police spokesman Hunt was flabbergasted. "Why are we doing this jousting in the media? I believe Mr. Terrell could go a long way in clearing this case if he produces the mothers of these children as he says he can," he told the Tallahassee Democrat on

"Up till that point, people said the of police department did some pretty dumb things," recalls Investigator Rick Huffman, who inherited the case from Weigand when she left for vacation. "Then there's this clown on TV saving all these stopid things. People started saying that's too stupid to be any kind of a cult. In Tallahassee, it turned out that this whole thing was being perceived as a joke."

Though Weigand believed the case was wrapped up Tuesday, she still wondered why the mothers had not hightailed it down to Tal-

On Sunday, a college student and part-time Tallainssee Police Department employee brought to Tollice a TRS-80 computer hefound. Files on the computer included a report from the three men Terrell mentioned in his memo, Herbst, Van Deusen, and Mey-

This trio had left Holwell and Ammerman at 10 a.m. Wednesday morning. "They were dressed in suits and ties, the van had been cleaned up; and the kids had been dressed in clean clothes, they had a large amount of produce with them, and the kids had a breakfast buffet before they left," the confiscated report reads. Holwell and Ammerman were supposed to link up with the men via their elec-tronic mailbox. Until they read SS's report the next morning, the three men had no idea where Holwell and Ammerman had gone. SS's report didn't send them into a panic though: One spent the day earning a few dol-lars helping "a cripple," while the other two researched an article about desktop publishing at Tallahassee's Florida State University li-

Other files in the TRS-80 included a report from a member working in Hong Kong and a short note from MDP, Marion D. Pettie, to the "Kids Game." Dated 5 a.m. Tuesday morning, it reads, "If authoritarians approach again, say that you are on the way to Mexico to start a school and that you are authorized

by the mothers to do this.

n Monday, Day 6 of the Finders Crisis, Washington Metropolitan Police began to slink away from the case.

The day before, D.C. Detectives Jim Bradley and Eric Witzig had interrogated the kids in Tallahassee. Bradley, who had requested the D.C. search warrants, said his visit to Tallahassee was prompted by three separate ac-counts of the Glover Park house's basement. Exactly what he was looking for in Tallahassee escaped Investigator Weigand, who wrote in her report for that day, "He indicated that there may have been a hole dug in the walls or the floor of the basement, for unknown reasons." Judging from the Tallahassee re-ports, the D.C. detectives trip to Florida was a waste. They didn't learn much more than Mary could count to 10 in Chinese.

The chief in D.C. sent up a hoe and a cry in the beginning," says Tallahassee's Lt. Van Meter, "and then when his guys didn't come up with anything, he backed away."

x, confusion, small-mindedness, fear, the press, and the enigmatic Finders kept jolting the Finders case back to life. HRS recruited Chicago psychologist Dr. Nahman Greenberg to tackle the question of sexual abuse. Known for his sex-abuse work in the Manhattan Beach, California, preschool case, Greenberg held a series of interviews with the kids. His conclusion: the evidence was inconclusive.


The tangle of law-enforcement outfits work-

ing the case continued to confuse everyone.
"A couple of officers in D.C. used our arrest as an excuse to go into the warehouse," says a Tallahassee officer who asked for anonymity. "They were obsessed with this group and wanted access."

Larry Kahaner, a D.C. journalist and author of the current book, Cults That Kill, spoke with police about the Finders while researching his book. (The Finders are not mentioned in his book, nor does he classify them as a cult that kills.)

"Finders were operating here for 25 years," says Kahaner, "and as far as I know, law enforcement had nothing on them. I think that was a very embarrassing thing. Not that they got caught with their pants down-but they were at least half-way down."

Investigator Huffman is the only Tallahass officer who squarely discussed problems in his own department with me. He says the agres-ing officers did high! You teally have to

"Our chief of police wasn't here," says Huffman. "He's very progressive and has the ability to think in new ways. But I had to deal with the deputy chief. He had already written the group off.

"Tallahassee is very conservative. Anything not Southern Baptist is fearful to people. In this conservative environment, it looked like the mothers were unfit. We believe that kids should get three meals, clean clothes, and be put to bed at a decent hour. In this area, women are the primary caretakers. Mr. Meggs was elected by this same conservative group, Walker says.

Meggs did have "very deep feelings" about this case, Walker allows. "When you have such deep feelings about what you think is right and wrong, it does slow things up. A legal decision is not the same as a moral deci-

Willie Meggs, who displays a Holy Bible in his office, says he thinks the case went on so long because Holwell and Ammerman refused to cooperate. "The defendants acted like horse's tails," he says. "They were all secretive. If blame has to be placed anywhere it

ought to be placed on these people."

Meggs says his office wanted to be "absolutely sure" of the kids' safety. "We weren't just willing to let them go to these women who claimed to be their mothers."

Meggs' office repeatedly offered plea bar-gains in the Holwell and Ammerman cases. "We didn't have anything," Meggs says, point blank... "When it all boiled down, when you

Nearly everyone who tangoed with the Finders affair slagged the media—including the media-and blamed them for protracting the cases. Some attacks were, of course, "kill the messenger." Others whipped reporters for all the right reasons. Some were more in-trospective complaints. Others lamented the

trospective complaints. Others lamented the constraints of late-20th century journalism, where it's the McMedium, not the message.

"This became a big story because the press made it a big deal," Scott Hunt says. Hunt, who took flak for announcing sexual abuse and satanism in the case, is red in the face now. "How do you think I got this information? By osmosis? Somebody told me."

One report that especially irks Hunt was originated by WUSA and rebroadcast by the Tallahassee CBS affiliate. "They prefaced the story, "Fact: Tallahassee Police Department has botched this investigation," says Hunt. The local station invited Hunt to the studio to rebut.

"I went live on the air and called the D.C. affiliate a bunch of liars," he says with satisfaction. "I didn't bare any horses. I let the CBS affiliate have it right between the eyes."
Rick Huffman doesn't let Hunt or others in

Rick Hullman doesn't let Hunt or others in his department off so easily. Part of the problem, he says, is that the Tallahassee Police Department wasn't used to national attention. "We had Connie Chung call us up," fie remembers. "Our old PIO [public information officer—Hunt] is flapping his gills all over the decartment."

If the doctor said we had semen stairs on the girl, they should have asked, Well, did you find a little? A lot? Where did you find it? If it was inside the va-

gina it would be different than on the foot.
"I just think we jumped to conclusions."

The ordinarily toothless Post ombudsman, Joseph Latin, was critical of his paper's Finders coverage. He chomped into his colleagues. "The news stories were laced with unnamed sources; innuendo abounded," he wrote. "Facts were in short supply, but space in The

In the Washington Journalism Review's Finders critique, the news director of WRCTV was asked if his reporters were too quick to trust the authorities. "Well, they're initially, your source," he said, "and as long as you report it as such you're reporting a news story... I mean, we're not an investigative agency. We're journalists... Maybe police did jump the gan, I don't know. These things tend to look very different in hindsight.

Getting facts straight is tough, as I sho in a piece of Finders press criticism I w

for City Paper, I incorrectly reported that the men faced sexual abuse charges, I incurrectly stated their bond, and I incorrectly said they were arrested February 5. And I only faced a

Tallahassee Democrat reporter Jan Pudlow. who did some of the best reporting on the group and stuck with it long after the pack had gone home, says the Finders have to. shoulder some of the blame for the media's

"If you're looking at the media's responsibility to capture the truth about these people. I've got to admit I've got a little bit of bitterness lingering because these people did not make it easy for reporters to tell the truth about them," says Pudlow. "You know what they call wit and humor? I was part of their wit and humor. The wit is being deceitful and downright lying and what they call humor

isn't real filmny.
"I've been in the business about 10 years and I realize that when you interview some-body, everybody uses a little manipulation. We all know that. But I have never been so blatantly manipulated as by this group."

Pudlow, the first reporter to interview the mothers when they came to Tallahassee, says, "If the Finders told me today that they were coordinating the second coming of Christ and there was Jesus at their right hand I still wouldn't want to get a quote from them.

"Hello," the message began, "This is the so-called Finders calling for Jon Cohen on Saturday at 8:30 in the evening. Sorry we didn't get through to you. Maybe we'll get together lat-

I called them back at the warehouse to see about an interview. I got a rhyming message that went something like this:

On July 19, I left another mes warehouse answering machine. Later that day, Kristin Knauth, whose son Ben Franklin was held in Tallahassee, called me back.

"Two people are in Atlanta covering the convention, two are in Japan, and one had to go to San Francisco on an emergency," Knauth said. "Can we meet later?" On July 26, I called the warehouse yet again

and asked for Steve Usdin.

Bob Meyer answered and said Usdin wasn't there. Since Meyer was the first person I spoke with a month before, I asked him what it was going to take to arrange an interview.

"Is there a time that's best for you?" he I told him my schedule and he assured me he'd do what he could.

Two days later, Kristin Knauch called me. We have an information gift for you,

Knauth said. She invited me to pick it up at the Glover Park house

"Can we meet for an interview?" I asked.
"After you read this, you'll probably have

more questions," she said.
When I arrived at the Glover Park house,

When I strived at the Gover Park house, Knauth led me to a lounge that has a world map covering one wall and made me a cup of tea. She was kind enough, striking me as more nervous than zombie-like. She reminded me of an actress doing an improvisation who was trying a little too hard to maintain a char-I was nervous, too. In all fairness, I was

also in character and trying hard to maintain it. From my readings and dealings with group members, I knew that she intended to inter-view me as I intended to interview her. My goal was to regulate what I said, not to blather on to ease the tension.

I took out, a stack of papers from a package she handed me, my information gift. The first page cracked me up:

Enclosed are some information gifts. I am planning to do an in-depth study of Jon Cohen, his associates and his relatives. How do you suggest I go about

I told Knauth I didn't think they needed my help to do an in-depth study of me, in-depth studies being their speciality. I quickly flipped through the other papers as we chatted. Along with what are essentially book reports, there was a smattering of electronic mail dispatches from members working in Japan, at the Democratic National Convention in Atlanta, and San Francisco. A blurb in one of the group memos caught my eye:

memos caught my eye:
"On participatory journalism: I have heard
it mentioned in conjunction with 'New Journalism' of the Tom Wolfe/Hunter Thompson
vairety [sic] where the journalist becomes an
actor in the drama he or she is reporting on.
But what the student means by it is hard to say—maybe one tenet is Mao's 'No investiga-tion, no right to speak' so I'll quit guessing." Knauth proceeded to win the upper hand in

the interview game, offering no information yet still getting me to talk. Before I left, I told her I was running out of time and if they wanted to speak with me it would have to be sooner rather than later. She said Usdin would be the best one to speak with me and that he'd be back from San Francisco in a few days.

"He's welcome to call me at home," I said

at the door.
"You already gave him the number?" she asked coyly.
"No," a said, "But he has it."

"I'm here because our elected leader for the day asked me to come down here," Usdin

Many people have suggested that the whole arrest was a game call. The point of all this fun and games: Every game call yields knowledge, which members bring to the Student, Marion Pettie, so he can call better and better games. 3 -

It's hard to lead a game-playing life-in this society, at least-without raising eyebrows

While the Florida fraces exposed the Finders to the highest degree of scrutiny, it was not the first time outsiders had tried to under-

stand the group and its motives.

After Marion Pettie retired from the Air Force as a master sergeant in 1956, he returned to the Culpeper area, his home town. One of Pettie's sons told the Washington Post that during the '60s his father spent his days at the library near Pettie Farm, the family's 90-acre property by Old Rag Mountain, and became "a student of the world." In the late '60s early '70s. Pettie Farm was known for its free organic meals and philosophical pow-wows on the front porch. Pettie's son told the Post that his father began a new life around 1971 when he started a commune with his followers in the Glover Park house.

Today, members look much more yuppie than hippie, a turnabout that started in the early '80s. Though they have changed with the times, they still don't blend in.

They've turned heads in rural Culpeper, where they often show up at town meetings in business suits. John Davies, a Culpeper attorney who represented a former group member in a divorce proceeding five years ago, says they never say anything but always take notes.

"From my perspective, they can have a significant impact on a community like Culpe-per," says Davies. "I think part of their goal is taking control of the local government." As evidence, Davies says he knows of a stock-broker running for local office with whom they tried to invest \$25,000. And they're al-

ways researching townspeople.

The Finders have combed local real estate titles to see who owns what and how much they owe, says Davies. He's also noticed Finders men walking down the street in coats and ties and making notes on every house

Davies says he thinks there's an old-fashioned motivation behind their game playing: Dollars. "Basically, they're doing collectively what an individual investor would do," he

In Washington, several people have posited that the Finders gather information because

Daniel Brandt, who has put together a databank of intelligence citations he sells as spy-BASE, says he first met Steve Usdin and Jeff Ubois, another group member, in the summer of '84. They approached me 'cause they saw I was doing this database," says Brandt. 'I had posted a note about it in an extremely ob-Usdin and Ubois claimed they represented

an outfit called Information Bank and they gave Brandt software in exchange for informa-tion. "They were very well-informed about counterspying," says Brandt. He met with them several times over the next year, visiting

the warehouse twice.

"They kept pumping me for information and I got suspicious," says Brandt; Brandt grew more suspicious, when his friends told him odd tales about their dealings with the Information Bank. Realizing the depth of the Information Bank's knowledge of the left, he sent out a three-page memo to progressive groups around D.C.

Dated November 10, 1986, the memo is headed "A Summary of What is Known About Some Very Strange People Who use Computers and Seek Out Progressives so That They can ask a lot of Suspicious Questions. In addition to Information Bank, Brandt wrote, members said they were from Global Press Review, Hong Kong Business Today, and The Seekers. Members also approached Lou Wolf, a co-editor of Covert Action Infor-mation Bulletin, and he helped Brandt check

There are several characteristics that lend themselves to the interpretation that this is an information-gathering front for a cult of some sort," Brandt wrote in his summary, noting that members may not be told the purpose behind their missions. "The guise of computer consulting is an ideal method of spying on the Left," he concluded. "It would take about twenty seconds to copy an entire mailing list from a hard disk onto a floppy."

"If it's a game, it's pretty bizarre," says Brandt, who hasn't heard from the group in a few years. "It seems like there must be some

sort of impetus behind it."

More than a year before the Tallahassee case, Rep. Robert Kastenmeier (D-Wis.) looked into the group at the behest of a con-stituent whose son had joined. Kastenmeier says he had a hunch that they were intelligence linked, but when he took it to the House Intelligence Committee he couldn't get verification. Kastenmeier's office did learn

"I don't think you have to read anything deep and dark into this," says Kalaner. "The interesting part about the Finders is that they like to play games with law enforcement age That's their shik. As you'll notice in Tallahassee, they did indeed embarass them.

None of the Tallahassee Police I spoke knew anything about the Finders working for an intelligence operation. But they all had a similar response to Investigator Cheryl Wei-gand's: "Nothing they are involved with would surprise me."

aula Arico nearly spits up her food laughing when I tell her people suggest the Finders may be spooks.

Arico and I are eating at a restaurant in Talhance and I are eating at resemble in the labassee. She resettled here after the juvenile court finally deemed her fit to raise Mary and John Paul. "That's their model, to pretend they're CIA," says Arico, who was in the group for 8 years and now works at a bookkeeper for a progressive construction compa-"Wouldn't it be an exciting life?"

This is one of the few times in our many talks that Paula calls the group "they."
Though she left the Finders more than a year ago, it's still "we this" and "we that." She also still speaks lovingly-no, adoringly-

Pettie.
"The rest of us are just dead between the

ears compared to him," says Arico.

Arico has a theory for why the Finders gather megabytes of information. "We want to be the best at everything, and you can't be the best in anything if you don't have information about what the best is," she says. "So getting your information-gathering skills together is the first thing you have to do.

But why compile a giant Who's Who?" I

ask.
"It's a mystery why things are of interest to
Pettie, but he's not able to call complete games if he doesn't have complete informa-

"You don't know what game Pettie has in mind to call tomorrow. He already has it in mind. He's got next year's game in mind based on the information you're bringing him

right now.".
Talk like this sounds like slavish devotion. prainvisting, cult. But ultimately the latels are stupid. If any group defies a latel it's the Prinders, "They're constantly changing, renventing themselves, drafting new "Constitutions," setting new rules—RTGIAD.

Paula Arico has lived the godgame. best thing about it for me is that I lived and worked with my best friends for eight years," Arico says. "It's hard to have that. And in a situation where everyone was committed to working it out. If you've ever had that oneon-one relationship with another person where there's that long-term level of commitment, I had that with 20 people."

"You really trusted 20 people?" I ask.
"For the time that I did," she replies. "I got
my eyes opened pretty quickly in about three weeks of February in 1987. But up until then, yeah, I had implicit trust, because we were all committed to Pettie's dream. His dream was our dream.

On the day of the arrest, Paula Arico was working temp jobs in San Francisco, sharing an apartment with a single mother not in the group. It was part of a "women's game" that had been underway since December 1986, and Arico was having a blast. For a long time, the women had wanted the men to do more childrearing and it was finally happening. She was sure Mary and John Paul were in good hands.

"I can't describe the feeling for those kids," says Arico. "They were the future of the tribe. We are all fucked up. No amount of game playing has managed to straighten us out. Some people have been in the group for 20 years and are still fucked up. It's the new generation that's going to bring the new age in." She notes that she doesn't think people in the group are any more fucked up than non-

Arico didn't get wind something was wrong until Friday morning. "I was getting ready to



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

Then the mothers—Said, Arico, Knauth, Judy Evans, and Pat Livingston—began hearing news reports. "By Friday afternoon we were all in a tizzy," says Arico. They finally contacted Pettie is Southern California and planned a group meeting in San Francisco for Saturday night.

I ask why they didn't call the Tallahassee Police in the interim. "We had to make a group decision," she says.

Pettie arrived at duck and, as is their custom, the women massaged him to help him think. They carried out a traditional Finders meeting, each person speaking their mind, going round and round in a circle. Since the police had seized the computers from their D.C. homes; one of the group's concerns was how to stay in touch. But the kids were Topic

A. "This wasn't the first time that things had not gone right with the kids' game and we were all just really upset about that, that nobody had learned their lessons any other

times," she says.

Pettie's advice: Your home is in D.C., not Tallahassee. Go-back to D.C. and let your. presence be known.

They took his advice."

Back in D.C. Sunday night, the womenthe alleged satan-worshipping-kidnapping-brainwashed pornographers—were greeted by reporters camped on their porches.

Pettie's game call was to let the FBI call the

game. The possibility of kidnapping, the bureau said, took precedence over the misde-meanor child abuse charges. One agent advised they immediately head to Florida and hire a good attorney.

When the mothers called Scott Hunt at the Tallahassee. Police Department on Monday evening they couldn't get through.

"Carolyn's on the phone saying she's B.B.'s mother and she's met by snorts and giggles," recalls Arico. "She's the 200th caller claiming these beautiful children." They finally spoke to Tallahassee Police, but Hunt still told the media they had yet to hear from the mothers. "I'll never forgive him for that," says Arico.

After finishing their last FBI interview on Wednesday, the women hit the road for Tallahassee. By Friday, they were sitting in their lawyer's office.

"You haven't lived until you've been em-ployed by the Finders," says the attorney hired to represent them, Paula Walborsky. They elect a new leader each day. I could be hired or fired two or three times in 24 hours.

But I really got sucked in. I loved it. There were great, scry Constitutional issues."

Constitutional issues didn't come into play for weeks, though. It took until the next Thursday, in fact, for Walborsky to set up a

court-sanctioned, one-hour meeting between the mother and kids

The mother-and-child reunion took place at a park where a dozen HRS officials showed up to watch. "We would not leave," says Arico. "We told them that they would have to physically take the children away from us. We were not going to get up and walk away from our children.

our children.

"John Paul is in my arms and he's saying,
'But I want to go home with you.' And I'm
saying, 'Well, I want you to go home with
me, too.' I just sat there with him crying my eyeballs out, and he's crying his eyeballs out, and they came and took him away from me."

During the next few weeks, the Finders settled into the media saddle and displayed what may be their finest wit and humor of the affair. But it ultimately drove Arico and two

other mothers from the group.

A memo attributed to "M.D. Pettie" delivered to the Tallahassee Democrat said he was resigning as leader of the Finders—a position he said he didn't know he held. "I thought I was just a consultant on Wit and Humor," the memo said. "If I ever was the leader, I hereby resign to devote myself full-time to Zen Walking."
The Finders also started publishing a news-

letter, The Daily Finder, in which they announced that they were all moving to Tallahassee. "The Finders are always looking for signs and symbols," they wrote. "Since February 4, Florida has been sending signals that they want to keep some Finders members, so now the rest are coming."

Another issue of *The Daily Finder*, "Come to Tallahassee," invited friends to come join the drama and featured the song, "Old Talla-

Well I came to Tallahassee In a van so full of glee They put me in the jailhouse With a chain upon my knee

You get the idea.

Before the trial, Ammerman and Holwell spoke freely with Walborsky, who was assist-ed by several Finders men. "They all had handlebar mustaches and dressed alike," Walborsky says

sent them to FSU library to get me books for the case to explain their philosophy. They came back with books on psychology, India, American Indians, Samoan tribes,

Chinese philosophy."

Juvenile court was packed with on-lookers

and media on the first day of the custody batthe Witnesses Holwell and Ammerman showed up in prison garb and shackles. "Talk about a circus," says Walborsky. "We could have sold tickets."

Right before the hearing, Walborsky learned that the Finders men she had been working with had left town and were replaced by Steve Usdin. She also got the news that Pettie had put a gag order on Ammerman and Holwell and that she was going to be fired.

"I said ocooh-kay. The First Amendment issues haven't even been argued and they stand up and fire me," she says.

In court Steve Usdin delivered a proclama-tion from Pettie. Our interests and the state's interests are the same, he said, so we don't need counsel.

"Some people practice law 20 or 30 years and never get fired on television," Walborsky

Pettie's strategy of nonresistance split the mothers. Knauth and Livingston gave Wal-borsky the boot, as instructed, while Arico, Evans, and Said retained her.

Arico describes the behind-the-scenes drama of that morning.

Livingston had called Pettie. "She begged him to tell her what to do," says Arico. "He

said, 'Fire your attorney.' If you called him and begged him and he told you to do it, you can't say no. She was in agony. She really loves her son and she knew what would happen the way I knew what would happen if I fired my attorney—it wouldn't be in the best interest of the children."


Arico understood Pettie's logic. If you're in a confrontational situation, in some ways, you're creating it. Do what Gandhi and Ammerman and Holwell and others have done when attacked: Don't fight.

On another level there were the teachings of Lao Tzu. Planning. Strategy. Tactics. Loyalty. "Those ideas are really the crux of the group," says Arico, "and they are what keep the group functioning at the high level that it does." Pettie wanted them to go before the judge and tell him in unison that he could end all this right now, he could be the game caller. "Think if you were a judge, and there were five women in your courtroom, and in all of your experiences with them you knew that they really loved their kids and were trying to do the right things," says Arico. "That's the position Pettie wanted the judge put in."

Arico couldn't accept Pettie's advice. "The group told me to choose between Pettie and

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In Search of the **FINDERS**

The hearing lasted until Wednesday, Walborsky hammered on the constitutional issues and appealed to the judge's experience. "This is a judge who has seen thousands of juvenile cases," Walborsky says. "I told him if the walls could talk they would cry. This wasn't the real thing. Essentially that's what he said in the end. He praised the efforts to raise the kids correctly. He was only concerned about their educations."

John Paul, B.B., and Honeybee, the three youngest children, were returned to their mothers—Arico, Said, and Evans. The judge didn't free the older three because he wanted their mothers to demonstrate that they would adequately educate them.

Arico agreed to cross every t and dot every i, and after two exonths of state supervision, she was given full custody of Mary. Livings-ton and Knauth's children were put in foster homes, but the state finally relinquished custody to the mothers that August,

Hours after the March 18 juvenile case ended, the Finders announced to the press that they had disbanded. It wasn't true, of course. But it did signal the end of Arico, Said, and

Evans' membership in the group.

Arico cites many personal reasons for leaving the group that have little to do with the Florida incident. A few years before, she says, "I saw the writing on the wall, but I didn't

She spoke with attorneys about suing the authorities and decided there were too many obstacles. "I would have had to put my children into therapy immediately to prove that

they had bein traumatized. As far as I'm conmed, whatever trauma there was, they've basically gotten over it now." Another hurdle would be proving wrongful intent. "Everything they did was within the limits of the law," she says.

Arico's final analysis of what went wrong:
"You just can't have a highly disciplined lifestyle and have kids. You just can't. It just doesn't work.'

Make no mistake, though. She loved being a Finder. "It's a very magnetic situation," she says. "But the mystery's gone now, the whole mystique that nobody knew what we really did."

CIA tied to cult accused of abuse

Justice probes links to Finders

By Paul M. Rodriguez

A Justice Department special task force is investigating whether the CIA used a cult called the Finders as a front organization to provide computer training to intelligence agents in the 1980s.

The task force is also trying to determine whether the CIA — in an effort to hide any links with the Finders — impeded local law enforcement probes of the Washington-area communal group for child abuse in

"The central question being asked is: Did the CIA have an association with this group and did it try to shut down their [state and local officials'] investigations of child abuse for purposes of protecting one or more of its operations?" said a senior federal law enforcement official familiar with the probe.

A senior CIA official yesterday denied that the agency was involved with the Finders or tried to impede police probes of the cult.

"Most days we expect our share of unusual questions, but this one is clear off the wall," a CIA spokesman told The Washington Times.

"Any claim that we obstructed justice in this case is nuts," the spokesman said.

"In fact," he said, reading from a prepared statement, "we cooperated with law enforcement authorities when questions arose in 1987."

A Washington computer-training company that employed Finders members said it trained CIA personnel, but the firm's president denied it was owned by the Finders. He said he was unaware of any use of the training for covert activities.

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Justice Department officials have declined to discuss what, if anything, their probe has uncovered. "We are still in the review process," a senior official said.

The Finders, a group that has dwindled from about 40 members to fewer than a dozen, made front-page

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news in February 1987 when two of its members were arrested in Tallahassee, Fla., on charges of child abuse.

The case received close media scrutiny partly because of accusations that the group was involved in satanic rituals, but the charges were dismissed by a Florida judge.

The Justice Department formed the task force in mid-November after several members of Congress received copies of previously confidential U.S. Customs Service records suggesting a cover-up in the Finders case to protect the CIA.

The Times has obtained these customs records and documents from both federal and local law enforcement agencies and the intelligence community that chronicle the investigation of the Finders.

One of the key documents that have prompted the Justice Department and members of Congress to question what happened six years ago is a report dated April 13, 1987, that was written by a junior Customs Service agent who was on the original team that raided Finders property in Washington and Virginia.

"The investigation into the activity of the Finders had become a CIA internal matter. ... [The Metropolitan Police Department] report has been classified Secret and not available for review," the agent wrote in his memo to superiors.

"I was advised that the FBI had withdrawn from the investigation several weeks prior and that the FBI Foreign Counter Intelligence Division had directed MPD not to advise the FBI Washington Field Office of anything that had transpired," the

memo says. "No further information will be available. No further action will be

taken."

Other Customs Service documents and records from the FBI and Metropolitan Police provide indications that the CIA had links to the Finders or at least to some of the group's members.

A Metropolitan Police document dated Feb. 19, 1987, quotes a CIA agent as confirming that his agency was sending its personnel to "a Finders Corp., Future Enterprises, for training in computer operations.

And a later Customs Service report says that the CIA "admitted to owning the Finders organization as a front for a domestic computer

training operation but that it had gone bad.

A senior Customs Service official confirmed the content of the memos and said the agency "only had a small role in the case."

A CIA official who asked not to be named confirmed that the agency had sent personnel for computer training to a company called Future Enterprises Inc.

But he cautioned, "I'm not sure if that was a Finders organization" as suggested by the Metropolitan Police and Customs Service reports.

Joseph Marinich, the president of Future Enterprises Inc., said he once had a contract to train CIA emplovees in computers.

But he denied that he or his firm had any involvement with the Finders or acted as a front company for the cult on behalf of the CIA. "I'm shocked and appalled that our company's name exists in any" law enforcement files.

Mr. Marinich said that when the news reoprts on the Finders broke in February 1987, he discovered that his tax accountant, R. Gardner Terrell, was a member of the group.

"It was a total surprise to us," and Mr. Terrell's employment was

ended, Mr. Marinich said. Mr. Terrell, who left the Finders a

few years ago and no longer lives in the Washington area, could not be reached. But a friend confirmed that he worked for Future Enterprises while a member of the Find-

Current and former members of the group said Mr. Terrell's work for Future Enterprises was separate from the group's other activities.

Current members of the Finders said they did not have any interest i Future Enterprises and denie working for the CIA or any other intelligence organization.

"I guess you could say we're odd," said Steve Usdin, a free-lance writer associated with the Finders. "But we're not criminal."

Through a glass, very darkly

Cops, spies and a very odd investigation

he case is almost seven years old now, but matters surrounding a mysterious group known as the Finders keep growing curiouser and

In early February 1987, an anonymous tipster in Tallahassee, Fla., made a phone call to police. Two "welldressed men" seemed to be "supervising" six disheveled and hungry children in a local park, the caller said. The cops went after the case like bloodhounds at least at first. The two men were identified as members of the Finders. They were charged with child abuse in Florida. In Washington, D.C., police and U.S. Customs Service agents raided a duplex apartment building and a warehouse connected to the group. Among the evidence seized: detailed instructions on obtaining children for unknown purposes and several photographs of nude children. According to a Customs Service memorandum obtained by U.S. News, one photo appeared "to accent the child's genitals."

The more the police learned about the Finders, the more bizarre they seemed. There were suggestions of child abuse, Satanism, dealing in pornography and ritualistic animal slaughter.

None of the allegations was ever proved, however. The child abuse charges against the two men in Tallahassee were dropped; all six of the children were eventually returned to their mothers, though in the case of two, conditions were attached by a court. In Washington, D.C., police began backing away from the Finders investigation. The group's practices, the police said, were eccentric - not illegal.

Questions. Today, things appear to have changed yet again. The Justice Department has begun a new investigation into the Finders and into the group's activities. It is also reviewing the 1987 investigation into the group to determine whether that probe was closed improperly. Justice officials will not elaborate, except to say the investigation is "ongoing" and that it involves "unresolved matters" in relation to the Finders.

One of the unresolved questions in-

volves allegations that the Finders are somehow linked to the Central Intelligence Agency. Customs Service documents reveal that in 1987, when Customs agents sought to examine the evidence gathered by Washington, D.C., police, they were told that the Finders investigation "had become a CIA internal matter." The police report on the case had

been classified secret. Even now, Tallahassee police complain about the handling of the Finders investigation by D.C. police. "They dropped this case," one Tallahassee investigator says, "like a hot rock." D.C. police will not comment on the matter. As for the CIA, ranking officials describe allegations about links between the intelligence agency and the Finders as "hogwash" - perhaps the result of a simple mix-up with D.C. police. The only connection, according to the CIA: A firm that provided computer training to CIA officers also employed several members of the Finders.

The many unanswered questions about the Finders case now have Democratic Rep. Charlie Rose of North Carolina, chairman of the House Administration Committee, and Florida's Rep. Tom Lewis, a Republican, more than a little exercised. "Could our own government have something to do with this Finders organization and turned their backs on these children? That's what all the evidence points to," says Lewis. "And there's a lot of evidence. I can tell you this: We've got a lot of people scrambling, and that wouldn't be happening if there was nothing here.

Perhaps. But the Finders say there is nothing there - at least nothing illegal. The Finders have never been involved in child abuse, pornography. Satanism, animal slaughter or anything of the kind, says the group's leader, Marion David

Pettie. Pettie, too, says the group has never been connected to the CIA. In an interview with U.S. News, Pettie described the Finders as a communal, holistic-living and learning arrangement. The group numbers some 20 members, Pettie says; they do freelance journalism, research and "competitor intelligence" for a variety of mostly foreign clients. The Finders work for no foreign governments, Pettie says. Their duplex, in a residential Northwest Washington neighborhood, is decorated with global maps and bulletin boards. Residents of Culpeper, Va., 90 minutes from Washington, say the Finders have operated an office there, too, from time to time. That office contained computer terminals and clocks reflecting different time zones around the world.

CIA officials say they referred all matters concerning the Finders and the police investigation to the FBI's Foreign Counterintelligence Division. FBI officials will not comment. Law enforcement sources say some of the Finders are listed in the FBI's classified counterintelligence files.

None of this fazes Pettie. He says the CIA's interest in the Finders may stem from the fact that his late wife once worked for the agency and that his son worked for a CIA proprietary firm, Air America. Overall, says Pettie, "we're a zero security threat. When you don't do much of anything, and you don't explain, people start rumors about you." To judge from the latest case, some of the rumors can last an awfully long time.



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

The following excerpts include information contained in an undated memorandum from Acting Chief George C. Burgasser to Acting Assistant Attorney General John C. Keeney, Criminal Division, Department of Justice, Washington, D.C. and information obtained from the records of the Washington Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), and the U.S. Customs Service (USCS). These excerpts provide the details of this investigation and are the basis of the Department of Justice's request that the FBI conduct a preliminary investigation to determine if more comprehensive investigation is warranted.

On February 4, 1987, the Tallahassee Police Department (TPD), Tallahassee, Florida, responded to a complaint that a well-dressed white male was seen in a park with several unkempt children. The TPD spoke with the adult male who told them that he was a Washington, D.C., school teacher who together with another adult male was in the process of taking the children to Mexico. The purpose of the trip was to set up a school for brilliant children in Mexico. The male refused to provide additional information about the children, and the second male refused to provide any information about himself. The Police arrested the two men after they determined that the children seemed neglected and the two men could not provide sufficient information as to their legal custody of the children. The two men were subsequently identified as

The TPD contacted U.S. Customs (USC) and continued their investigation by attempting to ascertain whether a van in which the two men and children were travelling could provide any additional leads as to the identities of the men or children. On February 5, 1987, a U.S Customs Special Agent (USCSA) in Tallahassee, Florida, called USC Headquarters (USCHQ) asking if they could assist in contacting an appropriate local police agency to coordinate a child abuse investigation with the TPD. Additionally, several names, addresses, and a vehicle identification number were checked through the USC child pornography database, as there was some suspicion of the two males being involved in supplying children for the production of child pornography. The computer checks by USC were negative.

Subsequently, USCHQ, Washington, D.C., contacted Metropolitan Police Department (MPD), and determined that they were interested in the information, and that search warrants were being considered for two addresses in the District of Columbia. MPD invited the USC to observe the execution of the search warrants in the event that evidence of USC violations was recovered. Search warrants were prepared by the United States Attorney's Office, District of Columbia, for both the warehouse and residence. A USCSA participated in the execution of the search warrant at the 3918/3920 W Street address, where he claims to have seen the following:

After the subjects were arrested TPD obtained information from the children that they were from the Washington, D. C. area. TPD and FBI Jacksonville contacted the Youth Services Division in Washington, D. C. in an effort to further

identify the children. The FBI got involved in the investigation at this time due to the possibility that the children had been kidnaped. The vehicle registration records for a van the men had in their possession when arrested reflected that it was registered to a A joint investigation by the Washington Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation lead to the identification and interview of the mothers of the six children in question, two of the fathers, and several other key members of the "finders" group. All persons interviewed claimed their group consisted of an alternate communal type life style made up of intellectuals who have chosen to live the way The mothers were all aware that the children had been taken to Florida on a trip, they were familiar with and thoroughly trusted the men in whose care the children had been placed, and all insisted the children were well cared for. On 2/18/87, The United States Attorneys Office, WDC, declined prosection in this matter for the violation of USC, Title 18, Sections 1201 and 1251. Subjects were released from the custody of the TPD on 3/17/87, and all charges against them were dropped. 



Hours after the court ruling, Robert G. Terrell, also known as Genghis K. Plato, said his secretive organization's experiment with "group work" had failed and is being dismantled after 17 years.

"This is farewell from The Finders. We're breaking up," Terrell said. "You won't be hearing from The Finders again until Hong Kong is being run by the Chinese and the Panama Canal is being managed by the Panamanians in other words, at least until the year 2000."

"I can assure you arrangements have been made for the protection of the children's interest," HRS spokeswoman Connie Ruggles said. She refused to elaborate.

Fordham also said he expected to resolve the fate of the two men, members of the Finders communal organization, arrested for child abuse while watching over the children by Monday. Fordham suggested that the two men Doug Ammerman and Michael Holwell might agree to plead guilty to lesser charges of child neglect.

Holwell and Ammerman were arrested in a Tallahassee park Feb. 4 when they could not explain to police the dirty appearance of the children, or say who or where the children's parents were.

Both men were charged with one count of child abuse. Holwell was also charged with one count of resisting arrest without violence.

Holwell originally identified himself as Michael Houlihan, but was indicted as Holwell. Prosecutor C.L. Fordham said Holwell has refused to answer questions since his arrest and frequently goes "into a trance" when questioned.

Public defender Michael Minerva told Reynolds his clients are the center of a national controversy simply because they have an unusual lifestyle. But Fordham countered that the unusual case is far from settled.

"We've had a lot of roadblocks in this investigation," Fordham said.

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"There are still so many unanswered questions. It may all turn out to be really innocuous, but at this point I'm just not comfortable saying this is all we're going to have. We don't feel we have enough of a picture to let them waltz out of here."

on the alleged satanic link. Police also said it was unclear whether initial reports that least one of the children had been sexually abused could be substantiated.

Meanwile, other law enforcement agencies came up with evidence of plenty of odd doings, but no illegality.

Finally, district Police Chief Maurice Turner, whose detectives had been investigating the group since December, said the commune members pose "- threat to themselves more than anything else."

The children, ages 2 to 7 and giving such names as Honey Bee, John Paul Pope and Benjamin Franklin, have remained in foster homes since the men were arrested. The men still face child abuse charges and the parents a custody battle over the children.

They are waiting out what has evolved into a bizarre fairytale whose chapters include white-robed men at a goat-slaying ceremony in Virginia with youngsters holding goat fetuses.

A Finders spokesman, who met with reporters while wearing a Ronald Reagan mask over the back of his head, said the investigation, from the outset, was a mixup.

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"Reasonable people ... will realize a mistake has been made and it was blown way out of proportion and that it's gone much too far," said Robert Terrell.

Asked how he would characterize the Finders, Terrell said, "We are on the cutting edge of the wit and humor movement."

Reports of satanism surfaced when police seized pictures taken of a ceremony held on what appeared to be the Etlan, Va., farm. A goat's head, iskins and a scrapbook titled "The Execution of Henrietta and Igor" were proposed confiscated.

Some pictures showed three men wearing white robes dismembering two

3I agents have contacted the parents of six children found in a park two men linked to the mysterious Finders organization, but interviews revealed no illegal activity by the parents, authorities said.

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"We have, uncovered nothing that would point to a illegal activity" by the parents, Sheppard said, but he declined to discuss the interviews.

Tallahassee police ended daily briefings on the arrest last week of two who were found in a city park with six young children described by ice as filthy and covered with insect bites and scratches.

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The men, who gave their names as Doug Ammerman and Michael Houlihan, were linked to the Finders, a Washington-based group police originally characterized as a satanic cult. Police subsequently backed off that description and now refer to the Finders simply as an organization.

Parents of the children being held in Florida talked publicly in Washington about the ordeal and their lifestyle on Wednesday.

"We are perfectly good people," said one mother, who appeared on CBS but refused to give her name. "Granted, we have an alternative lifestyle. We're different from Mr. and Mrs. America next door. But we love our children and we're trying to lead a healthy, happy life. And to have this incredible barrage of attention and negativity toward us is really an awful feeling.

Ammerman and Houlihan were arraigned Wednesday on one count each of misdemeanor child abuse charges. Houlihan also was arraigned on a single count of resisting arrest without violence.

Leon County Judge George Reynolds III refused to reduce the \$100,000 bond set for the two men, but did not immediately set a trial date.

The children were turned over to the state Department of Health and abilitative Services and are being interviewed by a child psychiatrist.

count of child abuse not the six counts police earlier said had been filed. Neither man would speak with reporters.

State authorities indicated they were unsure the children had been abused at all.

Dr. Nauman Greenberg of Chicago, hired by the state Health and Rehabilitative Services Department, spent four hours with the children Tuesday.

Greenberg said the children seemed troubled but that he was not immediately sure whether the problem was caused by the children's upbringing or by their current circumstances.

The children, taken a week ago, will remain in state custody at least until Feb. 26, when state officials will go before a judge to recommend what should be done with the youngsters.

"Some of their problems were the kind you might see in children who had been institutionalized," Greenberg said. "The real casual contact they would have with adults reminded me of young children who had been on a latric ward for a long, long time."

The children seemed physically healthy but showed signs of being Press (return) to continue...->

The state took custody of the children last Wednesday when police arrested Ammerman and Homihan watching over the difference youngsters in a city park.

The men were being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

Health officials could not confirm statements made by Tallahassee police that two of the children were sexually abused.

John Award, the department administrator, said a doctor's report found a possibility of sexual abuse but no conclusive evidence.

"Our information does not substantiate that or unsubstantiate that," Awad said. "We are still in the process of looking at that, but we have come to no definitive conclusions."

In a related development, police in Etlan, Va., said they found no evidence of criminal activity in a search of a farm owned by Finders leader Marion Pettie and a house owned by his apparent sons, George and David Pettie.

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Virginia police spokesman Charles Vaughan said officers seized "a computer, software, a couple of goatskins, a goat head and some papers and various documents, writing and cards."

The \$100,000 bond for two Finders group members facing misdemeanor child abuse charges is justified by the mystery surrounding the case and six children found with the men, the prosecutor said Wednesday.

The men, who have given their names as Doug Ammerman and Michael Houlihan, were arraigned on one count each of child abuse. Houlihan also was arraigned for a single misdemeanor count of resisting arrest without violence.

Public defender Michael Minerva asked Leon County Judge George Reynolds III to reduce their bond, but Reynolds said a special hearing is required on that issue.

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"It may be an unusually high bond, but it's an unusual case," said state attorney C.L. Fordham. "The bond is based more on the questions than

lives of six children, " the prosecutor said.

Reynolds' entered pas of innocent for both men and said they would receive a jury trial. The men will remain in the Leon County Jail pending a trial. No court date was set.

Houlihan and Ammerman were arrested Feb. 4 after they were spotted in a city park with six children described by police as filthy and covered with insect bites and scratches. The men have since been linked to the Finders, a Washington, D.C., group police originally called a satanic cult. Police later backed off that description and now refer to the Finders simply as an organization.

Houlihan has given several names to investigators and he was arraigned as "Michael Holwell."

Houlihan appeared before Reynolds dressed in jail-issue blue pants and shirt, white socks, sandals and leg shackles. He seemed nervous, often Press (return) to continue...->

hesitating before answering questions and speaking in clipped, strained sentences.

Scott Hunt, Tallahassee police spokesman, said Tuesday both men had been charged with six counts of child abuse, but Fordham said papers sent by police listed only the single child abuse charge, plus the resisting charge against Houlihan.

Fordham said each charge is for the abuse of all six children, rather than a single count for abuse of a specific child. The men face up to one vear in jail and up to a \$1,000 fine on each count.

Authorities say "The Finders" is a mysterious cult based in the Washington area that may have ties to satanism. Washington police have found pictures of the children in ceremonies involving the bloodletting of animals.

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The authenticity of the letter and its claims could not be confirmed and Washington police said they had not yet formally received a copy.

Two police detectives from Washington arrived in Tallahassee Sunday to question the children and possibly talk to the suspects, who are charged with aggravated child abuse and resisting arrest without violence. They are being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond each.

Hunt said his office received about 450 calls from reporters between rsday and Sunday and took about 50 more by noon Monday. Calls about the LLESS (return) to continue...->

children multiplied after pictures of the youngsters, supplied by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, were published in newspapers and televised.

Hunt said authorities released the pictures in hopes of finding relatives, even though it meant public exposure of sexually abused children. He noted authorities have not said which of the children had been sexually abused, and added the pictures resulted in many new leads.

Hunt said authorities also are investigating a possible Finders presence in Gainesville, Fla., but could offer no specifics.

"We believe there was a Gainesville connection, either they've traveled to there, they've stayed there or were planning to go, exactly what the connection was we don't know," Hunt said.

Hunt said two Washington police investigators were still in Tallahassee, but had not yet spoken to the children. He said Tallahassee police would concentrate on determining the children's identity, including checking all calls from potential relatives.

Hunt said the FBI would handle the investigation of a memo delivered ing the weekend to Washington police from Robert Gardner Terrell, the ss (return) to continue...->

Finders member who owns the two buildings raided by police. In the memo,

Terrell told CBS aff iate WUSA-TV the group new abused children.

Police also believe the two men gave false names. A check of the Virginia license plate on their van showed it belonged to a man matching Houlihan's description, but with a different name, Hunt said.

The men initially told police they were taking the youths to Mexico to begin a school for "brilliant" children. When they could not explain the c'ildren's condition or name their parents, Hunt said, the men refused to 3s (return) to continue...->

A Washington Post report Saturday quotes police sources as saying some of the items seized from the two district locations showed pictures of children engaged in what appeared to be "cult rituals."

U.S. Customs Service officials, called in to aid in the investigation, said the material seized includes photos showing children involved in bloodletting ceremonies of animals and one photograph of a child in chains.

Customs officials said they were investigating whether a child pornography operation was being conducted.

The Finders are the remains of a popular 1960s hippie refuge that evolved into a satanist group dedicated to communalism and to studying the ress (return) to continue...->

_.cure, according to court documents.

The leader of the group is Marion Pettie, a retired military man, according to U.S. District Court documents in Washington.

In addition to the Washington locations, the group is also linked to a farm in Etlan, Va.

FBI agents and Virginia State police Friday night were expected to get search warrants for two cabins on the farm allegedly used by the group to forcibly separate children from their parents who were members of the cult.

to another location and place them under guard.

A half dozen threats were received Thursday evening at the police department and the foster home where two of the children were being kept, police spokesman Scott Hunt said. The location of that foster home had been ret and Hunt said he did not know how the caller got the phone number.

At the request of the FBI, Hunt refused to elaborate on the calls. But he said the calls dealt with the children's safety.

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Hunt also refused to discuss the measures taken to protect the children. He said tapes of the calls to the police station were being evaluated, and that police did not know if the calls came from a "local crackpot" or were tied to "The Finders."

"You never underestimate the power of somebody who wants to do damage to young children," Hunt said. "That we have had threats has put us on alert."

The six children, ages 2 to 6, are in the custody of state health officials following the arrest of their two adult companions Wednesday. State health officials, police and the FBI are all attempting to determine the children's real names and relatives.

The two men, who identified themselves as Michael Houlihan and Douglas Ammerman, were arrested after they were seen in a park with the six filthy, poorly dressed children. Both are being held on \$100,000 bond.

Police said one of the children, a 6-year-old girl, had been sexually sed. The two men and the youngsters have been linked to "The Finders," a ..., sterious cult in Washington D.C. Police suspect the children were turned over to the cult as part of their parents' initiation.

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Virginia State Police and Madison County, Va., sheriff's officers served five search warrants early Saturday in the area of the Pettie Farm, a 90-acre property near the Shenandoah National Park. Owner Marion Pettie is reported to be the founder of "The Finders."

Evidence was seized and would be analyzed, but, "no obvious new evidence of criminal activity was found," Virginia State Police Lt. J.P. Henries said.

The Washington Post reported a police search of a Washington warehouse linked to the group turned up large numbers of photographs, slides, and photographic contact sheets. Some of the photos, the Post reported, were of children, some of them nude.

The Post cited police sources who said some of the pictures were of children engaged in what appeared to be "cult rituals." U.S. Customs officials said the confiscated material included pictures of children involved in bloodletting ceremonies of animals and there was one photograph of a child in chains.

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Officials Weigh Future of Finders' Children

Two Members Plead Not Guilty to Misdemeanor Neglect Charges in Florida

As police wind down their investigations of the Washington-based Finders commune, the process begins to determine the future of the six children found unkempt and hungry in a van with two Finders members in Florida last week—a process that experts said yesterday is likely to be long and complex.

The children, who range in age from 2 to 7, will remain in emergency shelters until a March 9 hearing at which child advocates will argue that the youngsters should be declared dependents of the state, said Connie Ruggles, spokeswoman for the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services in Tallahassee.

While Florida law requires that the state try to reunite families, the state's neglect law may prevent that. And cases in other states provide precedent for dramatic state intervention in child-rearing by religious or communal groups.

The two Finders members found with the children, Douglas Ammerman, 27, and Michael Holwell, 23, pleaded not guilty yesterday to a misdemeanor charge of child neglect in Tallahassee.

Prosecutor C.L. Fordham told Leon County Judge George Reynolds III that the \$100,000 bond set for each of the two Finders members is justified by the mystery surrounding the case. Reynolds appointed a public defender to represent the men, who previously said they had a private attorney. Ammerman and Holwell have refused to answer questions.

The Finders, a secretive group of about 20 people who lived communally, generally refuse to talk about the group to outsiders. Their leader, Marion Pettie, advocates a philosophy of "falling limp," both physically and mentally, in the face of opposition. During his arrest last week, Holwell pretended to faint and had to be carried to a police car, police said.

The Finders' failure to seek custody of the children has puzzled Florida authorities. While spokesmen for the group in Washington say the mothers want their children back, no one from the Finders has contacted state officials, Ruggles said.

"We don't even know who the parents are," she said.

But a spokeswoman for the group said last night that the five mothers were already on their way to Tallahassee to reclaim their children.

"They waited to finish the FBI interviews first before they went to Tallahassee," said Diane Sherwood, who said the women were in San Francisco Feb. 4 when the men were arrested.

"The mothers wanted to go right to Tallahassee, their first instinct was to go right for the children . . . [but] the FBI was asking them to come to Washington, so it seemed like the thing to do. We thought there'd be papers here, a subpoena or something. We didn't really know where to go first."

Sherwood said the mothers were not aware of the arrests until two days later. A Finders spokesman said previously that communication among group members had been fragmented by police seizures here of sophisticated computer hookups and long-distance telephone numbers.

A Finders member reached at the group's warehouse yesterday said the "father of record" of each child is not necessarily that child's biological father.

"We don't consider fatherhood to be a healthy concept," said the man, who spoke on condition that he not be named. "We're all fathers of all the kids and any man who has a good relationship with the child is the father."

Sherwood ridiculed the accusations of abuse. "A hundred thousand dollars bond for a misdemeanor? What were the charges—dirty faces and mismatched clothes? . . . If

there was a mistake in judgment, it was a mistake in judgment; it's not child abuse."

Nevertheless, Sherwood said, the mothers felt that if they had been left in charge of the children, there would have been no allegations of abuse.

Despite the Finders' unorthodox child-rearing philosophy, Ruggles said "an alternative life style is not automatically neglect. But if the parents come forward and object to state custody, we would investigate the home situation."

Under Florida's neglect law, children can be taken by the state if the parents deprive children—or "allow children to be deprived"—of food, clothing, shelter or medical treatment. The Finders say children should be weaned from their mothers and reared by the group with lit-

Te adult supervision.

Similar cases have pitted governments against groups with unusual beliefs. In 1984, police and welfare authorities in Vermont raided the Kingdom Community Church and Pounded up 112 children after an investigation found that children were sometimes whipped with branches or rods for crying, daydreaming or fibbing. Criminal abuse tharges were eventually dropped and prosecutors are now seeking a ruling on whether church members must send their children to school. said Vermont Attorney General Jeff Amestoy.

In another case, involving a radical New York commune called the Fourth Wall Repertory Company, member Marice Pappo said commune leaders took her infant from her because she and the child had grown too attached. Harold Mayerson, Pappo's lawyer in a custody suit, said the group denied children their right to bond with parents. But Martin Stolar, attorney for Pappo's husband, said the state "has to be very careful about what it determines is a fit environment."

Some psychiatrists argue for state protection of children living in cults and cult-like settings. David Halperin, a psychiatry professor at Mount Sinai Medical School in New York City, said members of some such groups often profess to take tare of their children, but in fact ignore them.

"Within these groups, the parents tend to focus on their own state of being and children tend to be seen as an impediment," he said. "A group cannot relate to a child the same way a parent can relate to a

child."

This is not the first time the Finders' child rearing has attracted government attention. A grandmother of one of the children now in Florida said her grandson and other Finders' children have been sheltered by the District twice in recent years. In October 1985, D.C. police picked up two children they found wandering "cold and hungry" near the group's warehouse, the grandmother said. A D.C. government source confirmed that the children were held "for several days" before being released.

One year earlier, District police detained a Finders member who refused to leave the house where she lived with her mother, the grand-mother said. That woman's child also was placed in a city shelter

temporarily.

Finders spokesman Robert Gardher Terrell confirmed both incitients, explaining that Finders children are allowed to roam freely in the country but are supervised in the city.

No evidence found of wrongdoing by 'Finders' group

Police in Virginia and the District said yesterday they have uncovered no evidence of satanic practices, cult rituals, child pornography or any other criminal wrongdoing associated with the communal group known as the Finders.

The statements by police appear to clear the Finders of several allegations that were raised against the group in a Metropolitan Police affidavit filed Thursday in support of two search warrants.

The warrants were served and two properties owned by the Finders in the District were searched Thursday. Papers, passports, computers, photographs, computer software, tapes, film and a telephoneanswering machine belonging to the group were seized by police.

The seizures followed the arrest Wednesday in Tallahassee, Fla., of two male members of the group on charges of felony child abuse. The six children, ranging in age from 2 to 7 years old, were reportedly dirty and hungry when they were found by Florida police. They now are in foster care.

"At this point, the Metropolitan Police Department has not found any materials among the seized documents or records that would initially corroborate allegations made by an informant that the organization is a cult and that its activities involve satanic rituals," said police Chief Maurice T. Turner Jr. at an afternoon press conference.

A Virginia State Police spokesman said yesterday that officers had found no evidence of any criminal activity among the materials seized at rural Madison County properties owned by Finders member G. Marion Pettie.

"My information at this point is that there isn't anything [criminal]," Charles Vaughan, a State Police spokesman, said yesterday. Police were continuing to sift through the material taken from the rural properties where Finders members are known to have lived, he said.

Meanwhile, Tallahassee Police spokesman Scott Hunt said yesterday that "more than one" of the Finders children taken into custody last week "showed evidence of sexual abuse," but that police had no evidence linking the alleged sexual abuse to the men in custody. Mr. Hunt declined to elaborate.

The two men, identified as Douglas Ammerman, 27, and James Michael Holwell, also known as Michael Houlihan, 23, are being held in jail in lieu of posting \$100,000 bonds each on the child abuse charges. No hearing dates have been set for either man, he said.

Tallahassee police had not confirmed the identities of the children or any of the claims made by hundreds of people who have called in the past few days saying they were related to the children, Mr. Hunt said.

Lef FBI spokeswoman Sue Schnitzer said yesterday the bureau is continuing to investigate whether any federal crimes were committed in relation to the six children taken into custody in Florida, but refused to discuss further details of the probe.

Ms. Schnitzer did say the FBI, like Florida police, had received hundreds of calls on Friday from people claiming to be relatives of the children. The FBI had not determined whether anyone was in fact related to them, she said.

Chief Turner said police began surveillance of two Finders' residences — a warehouse in the 1300 block of Fourth Street NE and an apartment building in the 3900 block of W Street NW — in December after receiving a tip from an anonymous source that satanic rituals were being practiced by group members and children were being abused.

He defended the police investigation and the subsequent seizures of property owned by the Finders, saying it was justified by the seriousness of the allegations made against the group.

"We were investigating to find if

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there was child abuse of abuse," Chief Turner said. "We will continue to do that until we assure

ourselves that is not the case.

Metropolitan Police Inspector David Faison, head of the department's intelligence division, said seized pictures that showed children watching the slaughtering of animals on a Madison County, Va., farm were not part of a satanic ritual or pornography. He also said police have found no pictures in the Finders' residences that would be considered pornographic.

David Hoover, a spokesman for the U.S. Customs Service, said yesterday his agency was called into the investigation of the Finders by Metropolitan Police because it was suspected that some of the material confiscated during Thursday's raids might be pornographic. Customs agents have expertise in child pornography investigations, Mr. Hoover

said.

Mr. Hoover said he understood that Metropolitan Police had not finished analyzing the material seized in last week's raids. Customs agents could not complete their own probe until the District police did, Mr. Hoover said.

"There has been an awful lot of material seized. It's going to take a number of days to sift through this. I think it would be premature to think we're (Customs) out of it [the investigation)," Mr. Hoover said.

"The lifestyle of the so-called Finders organization may differ from the societal norm, but so far the Metropolitan Police Department has not uncovered any evidence of criminal wrongdoing by members of the group," Chief Turner said. "However, we are still involved in an extensive and detailed review process of the documents and records seized."

Chief Turner said he does not consider the Finders a threat to society or a dangerous group. He said three or four members of the Finders have agreed to grant interviews to investigators and that police were seeking the assistance of other Finders members.

Yesterday afternoon R. Gardner Terrell, a senior member of the Finders, said in an interview at the Finders' Northeast Washington warehouse that he was "exhilarated" at "the good news we're not a satanic

in an interview with reporter Mr. Terrell wore a plastic Ronald Reagan mask on the back of his head and said he had been chosen to be the "leader" of the Finders for yesterday. He also denied that the seven child members of the Finders have ever been abused by the 21 adult group members.

Mr. Terrell denied the six children recovered in Tallahassee were abused in any way by the two men taken into custody. He said in the hierarchy of the Finders, children are first, women are second and men are third.

"These children always had food available," he said. "The children were not hungry. There was food in the van [used to transport the children that was recovered by police]."

Mr. Terrell said the mothers of the six children were in the District yesterday and had talked to police.

He also explained why police found photos of children watching animals being slaughtered. The Finders bought two goats last spring and kept them through the summer, he said. As winter approached, the animals were slaughtered in front of the children and other Finders members as a "learning experience."

"We butchered them and ate them, like you would on any farm. We did it when the children were present and thought it would be a good learning experience."

A tour of the Finders' warehouse yesterday afternoon revealed rooms that resembled the average college dormitory room. Most of the rooms in two second-story lofts contained blankets, pillows, cushions, televisions, radios, magazines, books and newspapers. On the first level was an extensive library, with hundreds of books, magazines and newspapers. Also on the first floor was a hot tub room, a meeting room, a living room and a kitchen.

"We're just a group of people who like to practice the art of living," Mr. Terrell said. "We look at the past and the future. We try to live a zesty and adventurous life. We're on the cutting edge of the wit and humor movement.

Mr. Terrell said the Finders' first priority is to get their children back in their custody. But according to a Florida social services official, it may be some time before the group can regain their children.

On Sunday, Merrill Moody, a district administrator for Florida's Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, said Florida and District officials, along with a behavioral psychologist from the FBI. will conduct videotaped interviews with each of the children to try to clarify their identities, and determine how they have been cared for in the past.

The interviews will be conducted by one person, while the others watch from behind two-way mir-

rors, Mr. Moody said.

Under Florida's child dependency laws, the six youngsters can continue to be held in protective custody for an indefinite time pending an investigation by the state and D.C. Child and Family Service Administration officials into their background, Mr. Moody said.

Even if guardians do come forward, the state cannot release the children into their custody without a court order, he said. A court order cannot be obtained until the probe into the children's background in the District is complete, he said.

"Until we know they have a safe and healthy environment to return to, they will remain in our custody." Mr. Moody said.

Cult Member Defends 2

in Child Abuse Case

A man identifying himself as a member of the group that includes the two men arrested in Florida last week on child abuse charges came forward last night to identify the children with whom the men were found and to defend the men against the charges.

In a printed statement and a telephone interview, Robert Gardner Terrell, 50, who said he owned the Washington house said to be a base for the Finders, the group to which the two belong, gave detailed explanations for the group's practices and activities, which have been characterized as unusual or bizarre.

Asserting that the six children found in Tallahassee with the men had been formally placed in the care of at least one of the men by the the children had been abused or neglected. Tallahassee police said six disheveled and hungry children were found in a downtown park with the men.

Affidavits filed in U.S. District Court here in support of search warrants executed last week at a Northwest duplex and a Northeast warehouse owned by Terrell described "satanism" and "rituals" associated with the "cult."

"We are all in a state right now where we are afraid. We've been made almost dysfunctional by the reports," Terrell said in a lengthy telephone interview last night. He said he released the statement to police and news organizations "to establish some kind of credibility that we are rational people, not devil worshipers or child molesters."

"Certainly anything we've done is based on the desire for the children to have the richest life they could have," Terrell continued. "Children always come first in our organiza-

Terrell's statement was delivered last night to The Washington Post only hours after police seized materials at five rural Virginia locations as part of an expanding investigation touched off by the arrests of the two men in Tallahassee on Wednesday.

In addition, authorities were searching throughout the Southeast yesterday for a van believed to bel carrying associates of the two men. Law enforcement officials were also sifting through mountains of materials previously seized in raids on Washington locations linked to the group.

In his typed statement, Terrell, a private accountant and former employe of the Internal Revenue Service, said two men and six children from the group left Washington early last month for Berea, Ky., where they were to work on a retirement community. After finding that the site was not ready for ground-breaking, the men took the children on a vacation and camping trip to Florida with the children's mothers' approval, he said.

Other men went to Florida to help care for the children, and three had left for the day to look for accommodations when two of the men were arrested, the statement said.

"I consider that the authorities have mistakenly incarcerated these men and children," Terrell said in the statement, which he said he circulated last night "in the hope that it will clear up some misunderstanding...."

Of the six children taken into custody by authorities Wednesday, when the investigation began, one shawed signs of sexual abuse, Tallakessee police said, but none provided a full account of what was believed to be their journey from Washington to Florida.

In response to the suggestion of sexual abuse, the man who identified himself as Terrell said last night that it might have occurred after the children were taken from those assigned to care for them. It "might have happened after she was out of our control," he said. He said the children were healthy and well nourished.

Police said they received several calls from grandparents and other relatives claiming some of the children. One Washington area man told the FBI he was on his way to Tallahassee to claim his grandson. But police said they will not release any of the children without a court order.

The discovery of the children and the arrest of the two men led D.C. authorities to search a Northeast Washington warehouse and a Glover Park apartment building where several Finders members lived. yesterday D.C. police sifted through extensive computer records and color slides and photographic contact sheets removed by authorities.

U.S. Customs agents who saw some of the photos Friday said they appeared to involve sexual activities between adults and children, according to Customs spokesman David Hoover. "We're not saying that it's pornography, but it has all the earmarks," Hoover said.

However, D.C. police sources characterized the pictures as "ritualistic" and not pornographic. One police source said that the photos were "no more pornographic than what you find in the average home." They said the pictures of naked children were innocent, but there were some showing children in "ritualistic" ceremonies including the bloodletting of animals.

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In the telephone interview late last night, Terrell described the so-called bloodletting as the slaughter of two goats kept on a farm in Virginia "for the kids to play with."

e end of the summer, he said, members decided it would be nucle humane to slaughter and eat the animals rather than to let them starve in-their pen.

He said the slaughter was intended as an educational experience. "I don't see why it's so bizarre," he added, "but it's been seized on by the authorities."

Based on interviews and on items seized in the raids, law enforcement sources said that the group does not appear to be engaged in the child pornography industry or in kidnap-

ing and said they do not fully understand the group.

"These people are not into hurting the children physically," said one law enforcement source. "They're into molding them mentally."

Among the items seized in the Friday raids were computerized messages concerning what the group called the proper "programming" of the children, and how they are "demagnetized," the law enforcement source said.


Other items seized included fincial records indicating that the group has substantial assets, including bank accounts, the source said.

Other seized documents include files showing the organization has researched numerous industries, such as the fast food industry, and papers suggesting that the group operates a wide network of corporations, the source said.

Other files seized showed that some members of the group have worked in low-level jobs in the federal and District governments, the source said.

In Etlan, Va., about 100 miles southwest of Washington, state police said they found "several items of evidentiary nature" after yesterday's 2:30 a.m. search of properties reportedly owned by Marion Pettie, leader of the Finders.

Virginia and Madison County authorities would not describe what they found at two farms, one near

Etlan and the other a few miles away in a hamlet called Nethers. A house and at least three cabins on the land were unoccupied, and police said much of the property appeared not to have been inhabited for some time.

The door of one cabin was open yesterday, revealing large amounts of food, clothing, sleeping bags, books and pamphlets from groups such as the World Future Society. A plastic bag containing hundreds of neckties and several pairs of panty hose were on the floor, along with boxes of diapers.

In the woods outside the cabin, badly weathered tents and sleeping bags were scattered on the ground next to a swing set made of rope and milk cases. Neighbors in the remote farming community have said they routinely saw as many as several dozen people, including large groups of children, riding to the farms and hiking and camping in the nude during the summer. Some neighbors spoke highly of Pettie, saying he traveled often and was often helpful to local residents.

Meanwhile, the FBI and Tallahas-

nesses said was with the blue van that police said the two vans may have been in radio contact. Witnesses told police that the white van was occupied by two well-dressed men and two children. It has not been seen since.

Law enforcement agencies throughout the Southeast United States were asked yesterday to look for the white van, and Tallahassee police said they were examining leads reported by Miami and Gainesville, Fla., police.

Miami police searching computer intelligence files reported two vehicles, a white 1985 Dodge with Virginia tags and a white 1982 Dodge van with Virginia tags. Gainesville police reported a sighting two days ago of an older model—late '60s or '70s—green Chevy Suburban or Chevy International van occupied by several well dressed men and several

children. Hunt would not comment further on the sightings.

Hunt said police do not know when the two men and six children in the blue van left the Washington area or how long they had been on the road. One of the youngsters told police that the children last saw their parents in Washington around Christmas and that while traveling they had been camping out in tents at campgrounds. Police said they found no bedding or camping equipment in the van. The van was heavy with the smell of unwashed clothes and rotting fruit and vegetables, police said.

The two men arrested Wednesday, identified as Douglas Ammerman, 27, and James Michael Holwell or Michael Houlihan, 23, have been charged with aggravated child abuse and resisting arrest without violence, both misdemeanors in Florida. They were each being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

Houlihan is the father of one of the children and stepfather of another, according to police and former members of the Finders. Houlihan told police late Friday that he wanted to talk to a detective, but when police sent an investigator, Houlihan had changed his mind, police said. Police said that this could

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be another of the games that the Finders are said to play.

Authorities said they have not interviewed the children since they were found Wednesday. Lt. Michael Langston said last night that social workers are awaiting the arrival of counselors from the FBI. No timetable has been set for the interview, which will be videotaped.

Meanwhile, District police theorize that members of the commune were tipped off to the impending raid on their Washington bases when Tallahassee police called the W Street house sometime Wednesday, seeking information about the children. "That alerted them to what was going on," a District police source said. "That's why we didn't find anything anywhere."

Former members of the group said the Finders routinely practiced leaving their house on short notice.

In his printed statement, Terrell said that Ammerman was one of the two men who originally left Washington with the six children. He listed in the statement names for all six children, and identified their mothers. At least five of the women have been identified by other sources as members of the Finders.

Terrell said that Ammerman and another man took the children to Florida and that afterward, Michael Holwell, also known as Michael Houlihan, and four other men, including Terrell himself, went to Florida to care for the children.

Terrell said that he and another man left Florida after being satisfied that the children were well cared for.

He said the children's mothers are in San Francisco, "working in business offices" to earn money to help pay for the Kentucky project.

Identifying himself as the owner of both the Glover Park apartment building and the Northeast Washington warehouse used by the Finders, Terrell said he could not return home because he feared that based on news reports "the police would arrest me."

Officials Describe 'Cult Rituals' in Child Abuse Case

Photos of Youngsters Seized At D.C. Warehouse, Probers Say

Authorities investigating the alleged abuse of six children found with two men in a Tallahassee, Fla., park discovered materials yesterday in the Washington area that they say points to a 1960s-style commune called the Finders, described in a court document as a "cult" that allegedly conducted "brainwashing" and used children "in rituals."

D.C. police, who searched a Northeast Washington warehouse linked to the group, removed large plastic bags filled with color slides, photographs and photographic contact sheets. Some photos visible through a bag carried from the warehouse at 1307 Fourth St. NE were wallet-sized pictures of children, similar to school photos, and some were of naked children.

D.C. police sources said some of the items seized yesterday showed pictures of children engaged in what appeared to be "cult rituals." Officials of the U.S. Customs Service, called in to aid in the investigation, said that the material seized yesterday includes photos showing children involved in bloodletting ceremonies of animals and one photograph of a child in chains. Customs officials said they were looking into whether a child pornography operation was being conducted.

According to court documents, computers and software were seized from the warehouse, from a Glover Park apartment building and from a van that was recovered in Tallahassee along with the children.

Yesterday's disclosures about the mysterious group grew out of an investigation that was set in motion Wednesday by an anonymous call to Tallahassee police about two "well-dressed men" who were "supervising" six disheveled children in a neighborhood park. The men were arrested and charged with child abuse, according to Tallahassee police.

Their links to the D.C. area have led authorities into a far-reaching investigation that includes the Finders—a group of about 40 people

that court documents allege is led by a man named Marion Pettie and their various homes, including the duplex apartment building in Glover Park, the Northeast Washington warehouse and a 90-acre farm in rural Madison County, Va.

Tallahassee police, who arrested and charged men identified as Douglas E. Ammerman and Michael Houlihan with child abuse, contacted D.C. police Thursday in an attempt to establish the identities of the children. They learned that D.C. police had heard of the Finders group, according to Tallahassee police spokesman Scott Hunt.

No other member of the group had been located last night, police sources said.

According to U.S. District Court records in Washington, a confidential police source had previously told authorities that the Finders were "a cult" that conducted "brainwashing" techniques at the warehouse and the Glover Park duplex at 3918-20 W St. NW. This source told of being recruited by the Finders with promises of "financial reward and sexual gratification" and of being invited by one member to explore "satanism" with them, according to the documents.

According to the affidavit, the source told authorities that children were-used in "rituals" by the members, and though the source had never witnessed abuse of the children, the source said the children's grandparents feared for their safety.

On Dec. 15, a D.C. police detective observed a clearing in the rear of the 3900 block of W Street NW where "several round stones had been gathered" near a circle, as well as evidence that people had gathered there, according to the document, which stated that "this practice is sometimes used in satanic rituals." Armed with that information and the report from Tallahassee police of the allegedly abused children, D.C. police sought search warrants for the Glover Park residence and the warehouse.

Meanwhile, authorities in Florida attempted to learn more about the six small children—described by a police spokesman as "hungry and . . . pretty pathetic"—who had set the investigation in motion.

The children, identified in a court document only by the first names of Honeybee, John, Franklin, BeeBee, Max and Mary, were described as "dirty, unkempt, hungry, disturbed and agitated." They had been living in the rear of the van for some time, the document said.

Yesterday, police spokesman Hunt said one of the children, a 6-year-old girl, "showed signs of sexual abuse," but that an examination by a local doctor showed none of the children as being ill.

Five of the children were uncommunicative, according to police, and none seemed to recognize objects such as typewriters and staplers.

However, the oldest was able to give investigators some information. She said that the two men "were their teachers," according to Hunt. She was not sure where they had been recently or where they were going. But until recently, they had been living in the District in "a house with other children and adults." They lived mainly on a diet of raw fruit and vegetables, she said.

The girl told the police that while they were in the District, the children received instruction from "a man they called a Game Caller or a Game Leader," according to Hunt.

According to the D.C. court document, a Tallahassee police investigator identified this man as Marion Pettie, who the confidential police source "also identified as the Stroller, leader of this 'cult.'

The children have been placed in emergency shelters in Tallahassee, according to Merrill Moody of the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. He said officials were trying to identify them.

Neighbors of the W Street house last night identified the photographs of two of the children as residents of the house.

Before their arrests in the park, Ammerman and Houlihan had told police that they were teachers from Washington "transporting these children to Mexico and a school for brilliant children," according to Hunt. When police asked the men where the children's mothers were, "they said they were being weaned from their mothers."

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Yesterday, U.S. Attorney Joseph E. diGenova said that authorities were investigating "the crime of kidnaping" but that the investigation "is not limited to that as the evidence evolves."

George Wisnowsky, spokesman for the FBI in Jacksonville, said the FBI was "checking the transportation of children across state lines for immoral purposes or kidnaping."

Authorities in Florida, who searched the van, found 20 floppy computer discs and a device Hunt said could be used to hook into a computer in another location by telephone. He said D.C. police have obtained evidence that a computer linked to the group received a call from Tallahassee late this week.

Meanwhile, authorities in Washington were busy searching the warehouse and the Glover Park residence, side-by-side brick apartment buildings that, according to neighbors, stood out in the neighborhood because of a hot tub and satellite dish on the roof. Only women and children lived there, though men visited regularly, according to neighbors.

One woman from the neighborhood said the children from the house were "easy to spot because they were so dirty," adding that adults with them "seemed not to care." She said the group from the house reminded her of "lettover hippies."

But another neighbor, college professor John Matthews, who said he had lived at 3918 W St. for a short time while looking for an apartment, said the residents were "a close-knit group" of feminists who liked to help people and were not a cult. "The neighborhood talks about them because of their life style," Matthews said.

The Fourth Street warehouse, which authorities said also was used as a residence, had windows that were boarded shut. One wall was covered with a huge map of the world, lit by floodlights. Upstairs, mattresses were flung on the floors of various rooms.

Finders Group Has Roots In Popular '60s Hippie Refuge

The Finders—about 40 people who lived in a Glover Park house, a Northeast Washington warehouse and a farm in rural Virginia—are what remains of a popular 1960s hippie refuge that evolved into a society dedicated to communalism and to studying the future, according to court documents, experts on cults and law enforcement officials.

A fragmentary sketch of the Finders emerged yesterday as investigators, cult experts, neighbors and social workers scrambled to figure out whether children of group members were mistreated and who the Finders are.

Wherever outsiders had contact with the Finders, they considered the group odd. There was talk of houses segregated by sex, children separated from their parents, vans that came and went, and a mysterious guru who called himself the Stroller and fancied himself a seer and a political powerhouse.

Before yesterday, police had had little contact with the group. One complaint five years ago prompted an investigation that found no evidence of criminal activity, a District police source said. And in December, District police found an ornate tombstone and round stones gathered near a circle about 70 yards behind the Glover Park house. Such stones are often used in satanic rituals, experts said.

Neighbors have complained only rarely and then simply about the noise. And some people who visited or stayed at the commune said they met intelligent, interesting people who showed no signs of odd behavior or mistreatment of children.

As long ago as 1968, hippies and peace activists in Washington often visited Pettie Farm, a 90-acre property in Madison County, Va., near Shenandoah National Park. Four people who visited The Farm, as it was known, between 1968 and 1973 said yesterday it was a place where anyone could get an organic meal without charge, without questions. They recalled a leader in his forties, a charismatic and wealthy man named Marion Pettie.

About five years ago, neighbors of the farm said, the hippie followers of Pettie were replaced by men in business suits and women in professional clothes.

Pettie and his followers to had a house at 3920 W St. NW Glover Park, where members of the group lived until recent weeks, neighbors said. The house consists of two attached red brick buildings, each with four apartments.

There, female members of the Finders lived with children in apartments with no locks on the doors. The group occasionally distributed fliers offering shared rooms for as little as \$5 a night.

"I noticed the children often went without clothes in the summer," said Gerald Salzman, a neighbor. "I thought it was cute and natural." Still, Salzman said he once called police to tell them about a child who was screaming for more than an

Another neighbor, who asked not to be identified, said she once asked the mother of a 6- or 7-year-old child who lived in the Finders house why the girl didn't go to school. "She said that [the child] was taught at home," the neighbor said.

George Pettie, son of Marion Pettie, said that the group is like an extended family largely made up of people who have dropped out of professional careers and are under his father's sway.

"The binder is they have a father now, and they get to play fun games," said George Pettie, who owns a Northern Virginia home inspection business and said he hasn't talked to his father in two years. "They're the kids, and they're obedient. They like to do what the father says to do."

George Pettie said that he doesn't know of any group members practicing satanism or abusing children. But he said the lives of the children is unpleasant because group members rear them collectively. Frequently, Marion Pettie, now 66, would assign a follower to a

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"game" or "adventure" overseas or in another city, and the group member would not see his children for months.

George Pettie said the group engaged in "constant baby sitting ... I wouldn't want to be a child there, without a reliable day-in-day-out parent figure." He said of the children found in the van in Florida, "I bet you a buck, you'll find their biological mothers live at W Street, and if they're not there now, they're off on some adventure."

Marion Pettie continually sent his followers on what he called "adventures" to teach them about themselves, his son said. If someone had some character weakness, the leader would send him or her away to, say, Hawaii to work, then return to describe his lesson to other members.

The members support themselves in temporary office jobs in Washington, George Pettie said.

He described his father as charismatic and perceptive, having "a keen sense of what people need that they don't even know themselves."

Marion Pettie retired from the Air Force in 1956 as a master sergeant, and has done little formal work since then, his son said. In the 1960s, he was a "student of the world" who would spend the whole day in the library near the family farm, said his son. Then around 1971 he gathered his followers in the W Street house.

"That was the beginning of a new life for him," George Pettie said. "They found in their communal life style a more adventurous life."

Marion Pettie has long had a consuming interest in the future, and futurism is a major component of the group's philosophy, according to cult experts. Originally he based his teachings on Carlos Castaneda's popular 1960s chronicles of mystic self-exploration, a precursor of the New Age movement of the 1970s.

Edwin Morse, a Wisconsin psychologist who works with cult members, said he has tracked the Finders for five years, interviewing several members. He said the members are well-educated, secretive people who have "no clear parental kind of responsibility as we know, it," instead sharing responsibility for the children. He said most of the children who lived with the group were born to members.

In the summer, neighbors saw as many as a dozen children at the Madison County farm. "There was always hollering and screaming going on," said Wilma Richards: "They were always hollering about Momma and Daddy. One time I heard one say 'I want milk.' Another person said, 'Shut up, you ain't gonna get it.'"

Another neighbor of the farm said he spoke to an 11-year-old boy, who said the children didn't go to, school because no adults told them to.

"They always talked '60s jargon, 'Do your own thing' stuff," the man said. He said members of the Finders appeared to hold jobs in computer businesses.

The group split its membership by sex some time ago, leaving the women to live in the Glover Park house while the men moved into the warehouse at 1307 Fourth St. NE, McArthur said.

Cult experts said the past few years they have seen increased interest among such groups in satanism and witchcraft. The circle of stone District police reported finding behind the Glover Park house in December is typical of witchcraft ceremonies, said Richard Stephens a sociology professor at George Washington University.

Officials delve into mystery of found children

Police in Tallahassee and Washington, D.C., late Thursday were still trying to determine the identities of six children found with two men in Myers Park on Wednesday afternoon, authorities said.

The men, identified as Michael Houlihan, 28, and Douglas Edward Ammerman, 27, both of Washington, were charged with child abuse and were being held in the Leon County Jail on \$100,000 bond each, Tallahassee police spokesman Scott Hunt and jail officials said...

The children were in the custody of the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services.

Police got an anonymous call late Wednesday afternoon about two well-dressed men standing in Myers. Park with six unkempt children, Hunt said.

When police arrived they found the men standing near a foul-smelling blue Dodge van with Virginia license plates. The children, ages 2 to 6, were playing on the playground, Hunt said.

Houlihan and Ammerman told Officer Tony Mashburn that they were the youngsters' teachers and were taking them to Mexico to establish a school for "brilliant children." Hunt said. They responded evasively when Mashburn asked them other questions, Hunt added.

Authorities said the children - a 6-year-old boy and girl, a 4-year-old boy, two 2-year-old boys and a 3year-old girl - were filthy. Insect bites and scratches covered their bodies, most were not wearing underwear and they looked as though they had not bathed in days, Hunt said. Officer Judy Suchocki tried to talk with the children but only one, the 6-year-old girl, was very responsive, Hunt said.

The girl told Suchocki that she and one of the 2year-old boys were the children of Houlihan. The girl . also told Suchocki that they all used to live together in a house in Washington, but that they had been traveling for a while.

Both Houlihan and Ammerman denied having any blood relationship to any of the children, Hunt said.

Because police have not been able to determine any legal or blood ties between the men and the children, Ammerman and Houlihan were charged with child abuse instead of child neglect, Lt. Colon Benton said.

None of the children knew where they were supposed to be going, only that they had stopped at "different places," and slept in the van and in tents in campgrounds along the way. The girl also told Suchocki that none of them have seen their mothers since before Christmas and that they were being "weaned" from them, Hunt said.

The children also said they didn't go to school but were taught by Houlihan and Ammerman. Benton said the children seemed unfamiliar with common office equipment such as telephones and staplers.

According to police, the children said they were hungry and had not eaten since Wednesday morning. But the children said they had to work for their food by doing such tasks as cleaning the van. Even then, they were given raw fruits and vegetables to eat as "rewards," Hunt said.

Police said they found a Washington telephone number inside the van. When investigators called it, they got a recording that quoted Scriptures and had other religious

messages, Hunt said.

Detectives from the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington are conducting an investigation there to determine whether or not the children and the men were ever in the nation's capital, Metro police spokesman Capt. William White III said. Police there are also trying to determine whether the men were involved in any criminal activities, White said. He declined, however, to give any further details.
"We are still in the very early

stages of the investigation," White

said Thursday night.


But Hunt said Washington authorities have verified an address thought to be where the children and the two men were living. Local police were planning to send photographs and fingerprints of the children to Washington for tracking.

HRS officials took custody of the children Wednesday night and put them in an emergency shelter, said Debra Ervin, HRS administra-

tive-services director.

On Thursday, the six children were examined by a child-protection team to determine whether they have been abused or neglected, Ervin said. Results of the exams were not immediately available.



An investigation begun last year into the mysterious Finders communal group, linked to six disheveled children found in Florida, failed to substantiate allegations of child abuse, District of Columbia police said Monday.

Police Chief Maurice Turner Jr. said an anonymous informant's allegations that the Finders are "a cult and that its activities involve Satanic rituals" were not borne out by police stakeouts in December or by evidence seized at two Finders' homes last week.

Turner said "we want to assure ourselves" that the children were not abused: "We have not assured ourselves at this point in time," he said at a news conference:

"The lifestyle of the so-called Finders organization may differ from the societal norm," but no evidence of criminal wrongdoing has been uncovered, he said.

The children, ranging in age from 2 to 7, remained in temporary shelters in Tallahassee, Fla. The two men who had custody of the children when they were discovered last Wednesday are under arrest on child abuse charges.

Police in Tallahassee have said that more than one of the children showed signs of sexual abuse. They did not elaborate.

Tallahassee police spokesman Scott Hunt said Washington detectives, who traveled to Florida to interview the children, were assisting in trying to identify the children.

The FBI, the U.S. Customs Service and police in Virginia also were assisting with the investigation.

"They're doing fine," Hunt said of the children. "They're been fed well, they're been clothed well and they're eating and sleeping."

Turner said that the mothers of the children still had not come forward and that police had not yet identified them.

A spokesman for the Finders group, Robert Gardner Terrell, said Monday that the children's mothers "are here in Washington. There already have been conversations" with police. He spoke at a small news conference at the group's warehouse, sitting with his back to cameras with a Ronald Reagan mask on the back of his head.

Terrell said the organization's first priority is getting the children back.

"It's a relief and I'm exhilarated to hear we are not a Satanic cult," said Terrell. "However, we are still involved in an extensive and detailed review process of the documents and records seized."

A District police investigation begun in December into allegations of child abuse and satanic rituals involving the Finders, a group linked to six ragtag children found last week in Florida, has produced evidence that the practices of the group were odd but not criminal, D.C. Police Chief Maurice T. Turner Jr. said yesterday.

"The life style of the so-called Finders organization may differ from the societal norm, but so far the Metropolitan Police Department has not uncovered any evidence of criminal wrongdoing by members of the group," Turner said at a news conference. He added, however, that documents and records seized last week are still being reviewed.

But even as police in the District softened their statements about the Finders group, the FBI and police in Virginia and Florida widened their investigation into the activities of the Washington-based commune of 20 to 40 adults and seven children.

Two of the six children, whom police said they found dirty and hungry in a Tallahassee park with two well-dressed men, showed indications of possible sexual abuse, according to an affidavit filed in Madison County, Va., where the group has two farms.

The men, Douglas E. Ammerman, 27, and James Michael Holwell, 23, who gave police the name Michael Houlihan, were arrested and charged with six counts each of child abuse. Florida authorities said yesterday that the two men, who are in jail in lieu of \$ 100,000 cash bond, have refused to talk with police.

Meanwhile, FBI agents in Washington yesterday interviewed Kristin Knauth, a woman associated with the group. She is said to be the mother of Benjamin Franklin Knauth, 4, one of the children found in Florida. Kristin Knauth could not be reached for comment yesterday.

Chief Turner said the D.C. investigation began in mid-December after an unnamed informant alleged that children were being physically and sexually abused at the group's house and that the group engaged in satanic activities.

He said those allegations have not been substantiated by police surveillance or by review of materials seized at the group's properties last week, nor has examination of those materials substantiated allegations of child pornography. No children have been at the Finders' residence since the investigation began,

Turner said. He said that as yet police "have not assured" themselves that children in the group have not been abused.

In an interview, Robert Gardner Terrell, a key member of the group, said that the children have been traveling in Virginia, Kentucky and Florida since before Christmas with men in the group while their mothers were in San Francisco on "an earning and learning adventure." He said a seventh child, an infant, has been in Boulder, Colo.

"We've received hundreds and hundreds of calls about the children," Tallahassee police spokesman Scott Hunt said yesterday. "They're doing fine now. They're well fed and they're clothed and they're in shelter."

Virginia state police said yesterday that they found goat skins and a goat's head in their search of the Finders' rural lands over the weekend. Spokesman Charles Vaughan said police also found computer equipment and documents, but he did not comment on the significance of the material.

In an affidavit supporting the search, Virginia authorities included photographs showing three white-robed Finders men and several children dismembering two goats. The photographs were in a scrapbook titled "The Execution of Henrietta and Igor." In one picture, a crying child looked at a decapitated goat. Another photo was captioned, "Ben finds Henrietta's Womb." Three pictures showed children playing with goat Fetuses.

Carl Shapley, a Washington educator who said he worked closely with Finders leader Marion Pettie during the past year, said the group's ceremonies involved the slaughter of goats, but he warned against associating such activities with satanism or pagan rites.

"They believe in games and this was just good fun, a very Alice-in-Wonderland kind of fun, dressing up in white robes or whatever," he said.

Even as Shapley and others rose to defend the Finders, calling them an odd but entirely benign group of intellectual explorers and social adventurers, former members of the group came forward to relate tales of being harassed by the Finders.

A lawyer in Culpeper, Va., said the Finders sent him profane letters and slashed his car's tires when he represented a former member in a divorce case three years ago. John Davies, the lawyer, said the harassment stopped only after he obtained a court order prohibiting members of the group from contacting him.

Local police officials announced here today that six children found last week in Florida had apparently not been kidnapped and that there was no evidence to show that the secretive group that has been raising them is a cult involved in child abuse.

The statement from the Metropolitan Police Department conflicted with accounts from the police in Tallahassee, Fla., where the children were found, unwashed and hungry, last week. Officials there said this morning that at least two of the children had signs of sexual abuse.

But late today, the Police Chief in Washington, Maurice T. Turner Jr., said at a news conference that there was no evidence of criminal activity by the communal group known as The Finders. However, he said the investigation would continue.

Two Men Were Arrested

Chief Turner's announcement was another confusing twist in the investigation that began last Wednesday when the children and two men were found in a Tallahassee park. According to the Tallahassee police, the children could not identify themselves and said the two men were teachers. The men were arrested and charged with child abuse.

Law-enforcement officials suggested that Chief Turner was attempting to end recent speculation that the group was involved in satanic rituals at a Washington home.

After the children were found last week, the police searched the home and a warehouse in the northwest section of Washington, and seized photographs and documents that one source in Florida originally said were ''consistent with a satanic cult.''

Statements by Finders Spokesman

The Washington police said that the children, two girls and four boys who ranged in age from 2 to 7 years, were apparently the offspring of members of the finders, which the police said was a secretive group in which the sexes are separated and children are raised communally. Acknowledging that the group's practices were unusual, the officials said it had not engaged in criminal

practices.

Robert Gardner Terrell, a spokesman for the Finders, said his group had cooperated with the police and that the mothers of the children had spoken with the authorities, according to an Associated Press report.

Mr. Terrell, who appeared at a news conference wearing a mask bearing President Reagan's image, said the organization's first priority was getting the children back.

"We've been in constant contact with the authorities," he said. "It hasn't been on the basis of interrogation. It's been in terms of cooperation. Sooner or later we knew people in Tallahassee would recognize their mistake."

Photographs of Goats

Officials confirmed that photographs found in buildings used by the Finders showed children watching goats being slaughtered. But they indicated that the activity was not illegal, nor did it suggest pornography.

''There was apparently the killing of goats and some type of blood,'' Chief Turner said, adding that it appeared the children did not participate in the killing. Other police officials suggested that the goats were actually butchered for meat, not for some sort of satanic animal sacrifice.

''A photograph can paint 1,001 pictures,'' Chief Turner said.

''The life style of the so-called Finders organization may differ from the societal norm,'' he added, ''but so far, the Metropolitan Police Department has not uncovered any evidence of criminal wrongdoing by members of the group.

''At this point the Metropolitan Police Department has not found any materials among the seized documents or records that would initially corroborate allegations made by an informant that the organization is a cult and that its activities involve satamic rituals.

Documents Being Reviewed

''However, we are still involved in an extensive and detailed review process of the documents and records seized.'' he added.

Asked if the group was dangerous, Chief Turner replied: ''I don't really believe so. If they are a danger, from what I an see, they would be a danger to themselves.''

Chief Turner said he had no evidence that any of the children had been molested and referred questions about physical abuse to the Florida officials.

Officials say the Finders apparently is a remnant of a 1940's counterculture movement created by Marion Pettie, a charismatic leader who urged his followers to study a doctrine that stressed self-exploration and futurism.

Children Allowed to Travel

''Apparently it's an organization that started in the late 60's,'' Chief Turner said. ''If you went back to that point in time there were a lot of communes and a lot of hippies, and I think it was a way of life for them. From that way of life it has escalated to what we have today as the Finders.''

Members of the group, the police said, apparently permitted their children to travel to Florida for a time while they remained behind to work.

The two men arrested in the case were identified as Douglas Ammerman, 27 years old, and James M. Holwell 23. They were charged with aggravated child neglect, a misdemeanor, and held on \$100,000 bond.

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Finders Say They Fear For Children

Five Women Seek Custody of Minors

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Feb. 14— Five women who belong to the Finders group and described themselves as the mothers of six children now in Florida state custody said today they fear the children have been traumatized by their separation from the group, and they vowed to fight to win back the chil-

"I'm very concerned that the experience of being picked up by police, being interviewed by strangers, being cared for by stangers has been a very traumatic experience from the start for all the children," said Judith Evans, 31. She said her 3-year-old daughter Honey Bee "does not look happy in the media pictures I've seen. My major objective is to get all our children back."

The children were taken into state custody Feb. 4 after police here found them in a park with two members of the Finders group, a mysterious Washington area commune. The men, Douglas E. Ammerman, 27, and Michael Holwell, 23, each were charged with one count of child abuse. Authorities described the children as unkempt and hungry.

The women said they were in San Francisco at the time of the incident and that they immediately began taking steps to return. Authorities have said the women's struggle to regain custody of the children could

be a protracted one.
"We started the processes as soon as we heard. It's been a very long process," said Pat Livingstone, mother of 6-year-old Max, one of the children taken into custody.

"If the FBI had said we're bad guys, everybody else would have, too. Now that they've said we're good guys, other authorities are saying they'll have to consider our case in turn," Livingstone said.

District of Columbia Protective ervices officials have twice taken ustody of some of the Finders chilren, once in 1984 after some were llegedly found wandering cold and' ungry near the group's Northeast rarehouse, and a year later, after' ne of the mothers refused to leave er family's home, according to the randmother of one of the children, Finders spokesman and a governnent official.

Finders Get 6 Children

Temporary Custody Granted to Mothers

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Feb. 27-The mothers of six children found at a city playground with two men belonging to a Washington-based communal group called the Finders have been awarded temporary custody of the children until a court hearing next week.

Leon County Judge Victor Cawthon ruled in a closed hearing today that the four boys and two girls found Feb. 4 could stay here with women Finders members who identified themselves as their mothers until a final custody hearing Friday. Until then, the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services is to exercise formal custody of the children.

The children, ranging in age from 2 to 7, were taken into protective custody when their two adult male companions were arrested on child neglect charges.

County prosecutor C.L. Fordham objected to today's ruling, arguing that it was "premature at this point to give the children back to the mothers because of the many lingering questions of impact of [the Finders' life style on the children."

Fordham said he was not yet sure if he would object during the Friday hearing to giving the mothers full

Connie Ruggles, spokeswoman for the social services agency, said state law prohibited her from commenting, and Paula Walborsky, attorney for the women, did not return a call to the Associated Press.

Meanwhile, the two men arrested Feb. 4 remained jailed on child neglect charges. Douglas Ammerman, 27, and James Holwell, 23, are being held in lieu of \$10,000 bail each on one count of child neglect. Trials are scheduled for March 30 and 31.

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D.C. Police: Finders Odd, Not Criminal

FBI, Virginia and Florida Expand Probes

A District police investigation begun in December into allegations of child abuse and satanic rituals involving the Finders, a group linked to six ragtag children found last week in Florida, has produced evidence that the practices of the group were odd but not criminal, D.C. Police Chief Maurice T. Turner Jr. said yesterday.

"The life style of the so-called Finders organization may differ from the societal norm, but so far the Metropolitan Police Department has not uncovered any evidence of criminal wrongdoing by members of the group," Turner said at a news conference. He added, however, that documents and records seized last week are still being reviewed.

But even as police in the District softened their statements about the Finders group, the FBI and police in Virginia and Florida widened their investigation into the activities of the Washington-based commune of 20 to 40 adults and seven children.

Two of the six children, whom police said they found dirty and hungry in a Tallahassee park with two well-dressed men, showed indications of possible sexual abuse, according to an affidavit filed in Madison County, Va., where the group has two farms.

The men, Douglas E. Ammerman, 27, and James Michael Holwell, 23, who gave police the name Michael Houlihan, were arrested and charged with six counts each of child abuse. Florida authorities said yesterday that the two men, who are in jail in lieu of \$100,000 cash bond, have refused to talk with police.



Inquiry Spreads on 6 Children and Cult

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 - Police officials here said today that six dishev-eled children found in Tallahassee, Fla., might be the offspring of mempers of a little-known cult, but the offiials said they had not ruled out the

possibility of kidnapping.
Capt. William White 3d, a spokesman for the District of Columbia Police Department, said, "At this point, it apparents to the partment of the point bears that those children are the children of members of this group." He was referring to members of a cult known as the Finders, who have occupied at least two buildings here.

The children, two girls and four boys to 6 years old, were discovered in a Tallahassee playground on Thursday. Two men, Douglas Edward Zimmer-man, 27 years old, and Michael Houlihan, 28, were arrested in the case and harged with child abuse.

Subsequently, the police here obtained warrants to search a house in Northwest Washington and a warehouse in Northeast Washington, both believed to have been occupied by the Finders. Captain White said they had seized boxes of records, documents and computer programs.

Detectives in the investigation said the review would require the weekend at least. The detectives said they had begun to doubt that child pornography was involved but that they had seen evidence that children were involved in rituals. They declined to comment on reports that the Finders were worshipers of the devil.

Pet Food Spoon Wins An Invention Contest

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP) — A 6-year-old Oklahoma girl has come up with a solution to a problem that has vexed some pet owners for years: how to feed a cat or dog without having to wash the messy spoon afterward.

The solution devised by the girl, Suzanna Goodin, was to shape a pet cracker into an edible spoon that could be broken up into the pet's food after serving.

Her "edible pet food server" won her a grand prize today in an inven-tion contest sponsored by The Weekly Reader, a school publication. More than 200,000 children participated in the contest.

Suzanna, a first-grader from Hydro, Okla., was cited for the best idea submitted by children in kindergarten through the fourth grade.

In neighboring Virgina, the authorities said they had completed their part in the investigation by searching five places in Madison County where members of the group were said to have occupied farms and homes.

Lieut. J. P. Henries of the Madison County Sheriff's Office said, "No obvious new evidence of criminal activity was found."

The Federal Bureau of Investigation has also been called into the case. Police officials here suggested that whatever legal action might arise from the case would be in Federal rather than in local courts because it appeared that the children had been transported across state lines in possible violation of Federal laws.

Captain White said said that the district police had been unable to identify the children or their parents. "We're trying to find the parents," he said.

Captain White said that people who might be related to the children were also being sought but he declined to give details.

The Police Department spokesman said that no further arrests were expected. "At this stage," he said, "we have not uncovered anything that would cause us to anticipate arrests, at least not in the near future."

With an air of frustration perhaps reflecting the bafflement of the police department, however, he added, "No one knows what tomorrow holds.

Police officials also raised the question of whether children other than the șix found in Florida might be involved in the case.

Their daily ration of food consisted of oranges, bananas and raw potatoes, they told the police.

Based on information provided by the children, they were tentatively identified as Mary Houlihan, 7 years old; Max Livingstone, 6; Honeybee Evans, 3; Benjamin Franklin, 3; John Paul Pope Houlihan, 2, and B.B., a 2-year-old boy.

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2 Held in Child' Abuse Linked to Satanic Cult

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (P)—Two men arrested after being seen in a park with six children dressed in tatters were held Friday on child abuse charges, and police said the men may be part of an international satanic cult whose members give up their children.

Some of the children told police they had not seen their parents since before Christmas.

"They evidently have come from such sheltered existences that they had no concept of what a telephone was, or TV or anything like that," said Scott Hunt, a spokesman for the Tallahassee Police Department.

The children, ages 2 to 6, may have been given up by their parents so the parents could join a satanic cult in Washington, D.C., authorities in Florida said.

Police Tipped Off

Police were alerted Wednesday by anonymous callers concerned because the men were dressed in coats and ties while the children, unwashed and insect-bitten, were playing in tattered clothes at Myers Park, a downtown playground.

Upon questioning after their arrest Wednesday, the men said the children were being "weaned" from their mothers in Washington. They said they were taking the children to Mexico to start a school for brilliant children. They denied any blood relationship with the children and refused to answer other questions.

"We don't know what we've got. All we have is six children, and we don't know where they came from," Hunt said.

The oldest child said the children had never been to school. They had been traveling for several days or weeks, she said, although she did not know where they had been.

Medical exams showed that one child had been sexually abused, Hunt said.

Police identified the men as Douglas Edward Ammerman, 27, and Michael Houlihan, 28, and said they were believed to be from the Washington area. The two were charged Thursday with one count of child abuse. They appeared in court Friday and were jailed on \$100,000 bail each.

2 Men Arrested Traveling in Van With 6 Children

Two men believed to have Washingtonarea ties who were traveling with six hungry and disheveled children in a van with Virginia license plates were arrested in Tallahassee, Fla., and charged with child abuse, police in the Florida capital reported last night.

D.C. police, armed with search warrants, seized documents and records from two locations in the city last night as part of the investigation of the incident, which involves six children—two girls and four boys—whose ages range from 2 to 6. The children have not identified themselves.

Based on information obtained from Tallahassee authorities, a D.C. police spokesman told a news conference last night that "the children are in doubt as to who they are."

However, D.C. police said last night that no children of the ages listed are listed as missing from the District.

Police in Tallahassee said the two men, picked up in a city park there Wednesday, carried homemade identification cards that listed them as Doug Ammerman and Michael Houlihan.

Little other information was available about the men. Tallahassee police Lt. George Creamer said the two have refused to talk to police. They were ordered held under \$100,000 bond each after a hearing vesterday.

An Associated Press report said that no record of the Virginia tags on the van could be found.

In addition to being unable to identify themselves, the children apparently were See CHILDREN, B9, Col. 3

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D.C. Property, Move to Florida,

A member of the Finders has announced the communal group is selling its Washington properties, which include two apartment buildings and a warehouse, and moving to Tallahassee, Fla., where authorities are holding two men linked to the group.



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Mothers Win Custody of 3

Older Children in Finders Case Remain in Fla. Care

A Florida judge yesterday awarded full custody of three children, found last month in a van in a Tallahassee park to their mothers, who are members of the Washington-based Finders commune, but ruled that three older children should remain under state supervision.

Only hours later, one of the Finders' leaders released a statement saying the futurist group was dissolving, possibly as a result of the custody battle.

Ruling after four days of testimony, Leon County Circuit Judge Victor Cawthon rejected a state motion that the three children, aged 2 and 3, should be declared "dependent" because they had been "abused, neglected, or abandoned" by their parents, according to a lawyer for three of the women.

Cawthon ruled that the three others, aged 4 to 7, were dependent, primarily because their education was being neglected, but he allowed two of them to remain temporarily with their mothers in Tallahassee.

The sixth child, whose mother has not stayed in Tallahassee to seek his return, remains in foster care. Cawthon said he would make a final ruling on arrangements for the three dependent children at a hearing March 23.

The decisions, announced in a closed court session, were disclosed by Paula Walborsky, who represented three of the mothers at the hearing, and confirmed by Cawthon in a telephone interview.

"I'm absolutely delighted with the outcome," Walborsky said. "The court found there was no abuse or abandonment.

Fla. Judge Sends 2 Finders Children To Foster Homes

A Florida judge has declared two children of members of the Finders commune to be dependents of the state. Judge Victor Cawthon last week ordered two children who grew up in the Washington-based Finders group placed in foster homes.

The judge's ruling was the final act in the state's attempt to sort through the affairs of the secretive group that found itself the subject of intense public scrutiny in February, when police in Tallahassee received an anonymous phone call about two well-dressed men and six disheveled children in a local park.

Within hours, police in Florida, Virginia and the District, joined by the FBI and even Interpol, were on the case. Authorities raided the Finders' homes, confiscated records and photographs, and publicly speculated whether the group was involved in satanism, child abuse or pornography. While none of the more lurid possibilities was confirmed, the Finders proved to be an avowedly private and elusive group of about 20 people, many of whom had lived together since the late 1960s.

Public interest in the Finders quickly centered on their unusual child-rearing philosophy, in which youngsters were raised communally and were left largely to their own devices.

The two Finders in Florida with children of other group members were held in jail for six weeks, then released when a judge dismissed child abuse charges. In March, another judge returned four of the children to their mothers, who had retained a Florida lawyer.

But at the direction of Marion Pettie, the group's founder and intellectual leader, two mothers, Kristin Knauth and Pat Livingston, refused to hire a lawyer, argue for the return of their children or even remain in Florida.

They said Pettie told them that since the court had the best interests of the children in mind, they should not participate in the judicial process, according to Paula Walborsky, a Tallahassee lawyer who represented the other Finders mothers.

"Those children should have been returned to their mothers, but they didn't go through the system," Walborsky said. "The state felt these mothers had abandoned their children when they returned to Washington. I saw them with their children, and I know all these women love their children."

Connie Ruggles, spokeswoman for the Florida Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services; confirmed that the two children, Ben Knauth, 4, and Max Livingston, 6, are in foster homes. She said their cases will be reviewed every six months. "The judge felt circumstances

were not right to reunite them with their family," Ruggles said.

Cawthon had closed the hearing to the public, as is his option in Leon County.

Walborsky said the state presented no evidence that the children were abused or neglected, and the judge declared the children wards of the state for "educational reasons." Ruggles declined to comment on the hearing.

George Wisnovsky of the Jacksonville FBI office said the agency "is no longer investigating the Finders."

The Finders, who announced the dissolution of their group in March, are still together and living in California, according to several people who were in contact with them in Florida. Neither Walborsky nor Ruggles has spoken to group members in recent weeks.

Two Finders Released; Charges Dropped

Two members of a Washingtonbased communal group known as the Finders, arrested last month on child abuse charges in Florida, were released from jail yesterday after the charges were dismissed.

Douglas Edward Ammerman, 27, and James Michael Holwell, 23, were released after a Leon County Circuit Court hearing. A move for dismissal of the charges on the grounds of insufficient evidence had been filed by their counsel, authorities said.

Ammerman and Holwell were arrested Feb. 4 in Tallahassee after police there received an anonymous telephone call reporting that two "well-dressed men" were "supervis-ing" six disheveled and hungry children in a local park, Tallahassee police said at the time.

Each man was charged with one count of misdemeanor child abuse, and the children, ages 2 to 7, whose

arrest. He said police testimony indicated that Holwell "just seemed to have fainted" at the time of the arrest and that there was no way of telling if Holwell had faked the fainting spell.

Because Holwell showed "no active resistance," the prosecution could not press the charge, Fordham said.

Last week Leon County Circuit Court Judge Victor Cawthon awarded custody of three of the youngest children to the mothers. Two of the other children were declared dependent but were allowed to remain with their mothers in Tallahassee, and another child, whose mother was not present for the custody hearing; remains in foster care.

mothers were members of the Finders, were examined for signs of abuse and remanded to the custody of the state of Florida. Holwell was also charged with resisting arrest without violence.

The investigation involved D.C. police, who raided a Northeast warehouse owned by the Finders, as well as Virginia and federal authorities. Initially, there were widespread reports of possible involvement by group members in child pornography and satanic rituals. Authorities later said that these reports were unfounded and were attributable in part to confusion over the group members' unusual life style. Members said recently the Finders are disbanding.

Michael Minerva, the assistant public defender who represented Ammerman and Holwell, said he made the motion to dismiss the case "on the grounds that there was not sufficient evidence" to try it. Judge George Reynolds agreed.
