THE RUBBER STAMP FILE

With the seemingly unnumbered methods used by the writers of anonymous letters, the rubber stamp and dated stamp have entered the field of conveying the unhealthy thoughts of character assassins to citizens, causing sorrow, worry, and even death.

In connection with various investigations conducted by the field divisions of the Bureau with respect to cases in which extortion letters have been written by rubber or dater stamp technique, it was felt desirable to establish a file conducive to identification of the manufacturers of these mechanical products. In 1937 to this end manufacturers of these implements throughout the country were contacted and the attempt was made to appropriate a collection of stamp impressions in order that the source of rubber stamp impressions appearing on extortion letters from time to time might be more readily ascertained. As a result of investigation along these lines it became apparent that the majority of layer companies were equipped to manufacture rubber stamps to order; but they did not, as a rule, stock the rubber stamps manufactured by themselves. Most of the layer establishments carried an incomplete line of the products of some one of the relatively few manufacturing companies, and the collection of rubber stamp impressions from the various companies listed would obviously result in much duplication. In addition, the cost of supplying a complete set of impressions from a single company was found, in some instances, to run as high as one thousand dollars. Accordingly, efforts were bent toward securing catalogues from rubber stamp manufacturers showing the principal styles and sizes of the rubber type supplied by them. A type style, might originate with any one of three principal sources or industries: namely, the engraver, the type founder, or the rubber stamp manufacturer. The principal engraving company, the Wiebking Engraving Company, 113 Newport Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, has approximately two thousand styles and sizes of type available. The principal type founding company, the American Type Founders Corporation, Elizabeth, New Jersey, has approximately five or six thousand different type styles and sizes.

Upon the basis of such a catalogued collection, investigations

having for their purpose the discovery of the source of rubber stamp printing proceed along the following lines.

1. All catalogues maintained in the Laboratory are carefully searched for the style and size of type involved in the investigation.

2. In the event of failure to locate the type in one of the catalogues available, contact would then be made with a representative of the Government Printing Office, in an effort to identify the style and size of type. In addition to the possible eliciting of information relative to the source of such type, this procedure would permit the accurate description of the type in subsequent investigative action.

3. A representative of the Trade Magazine, "Marking Devices", or a representative of the Marking Devices Association in Chicago, Illinois, is next contacted for information relative to the probable sources of such type.

4. Individual companies whose names have been obtained as a result of the above three steps would then be contacted by specific location of type, style, and size involved, and for information relative to its distribution.

Preliminary test cards are available in the files of the Bureau, consisting of 8 X 8 pieces of white cardboard on which have been glued specimens showing particular sizes and shapes of letters of different office printing outfits and toy printing outfits, together with the name of the company handling same. By way of illustration, among the outfits represented is a "Mickey Mouse" printing set and a "Benjamin Franklin" printing set. Dater rubber stamp impressions appear on an 8 X 8 card representing six of the larger rubber stamp distributing houses of the United States. These impressions in most instances show the Gothic as well as the Roman type print.

The preliminary test card method in many instances is sufficient in itself to afford the information sought.

The Fulton, Benjamin Franklin, and Prentice Rubber Stamp Set, costing about \$.25 apiece are, by their very inexpensiveness and availability in five and ten cent stores and department stores, apt to be used by individuals intent on using this device in preparing a rubber stamp extortion note.

On examining specimens that have been created by the rubber stamp, one must take into consideration and be extremely careful of the variance in the stamped impression of the characters. It was found, through actual research, that the capital letter "A" of a certain printing outfit stamped two hundred and fifty times showed the following information: that the serifs on the legs of the A were visible in one hundred and seventy-eight instances and that, in the remaining impressions, the right leg of the A, from the

cross bar down, was either missing or badly blurred. Two hundred and fifty subsequent impressions were taken of the same letter A and in one hundred and fifty-five instances the bottom serif showed. There were sixty two times when the right leg was partially missing. The impressions of various other letters were made and the result of similar experiments showed general corresponding tendencies of uneven impressions. Namely, the letters of rubber stamp outfits do not show a consistency in the evenness of their print. This may be due to uneven alignment of letters in the form holder, uneven application of pressure by the operator, and the movement of letters in the form holder when each impression is made. These manifestations, on the other hand, may not be due to any one of these factors, but rather may be evolved from a combination of even two or more of these factors. With this thought in mind, it is deemed advisable in making an examination of rubber stamped impressions to ascertain faults which might appear in the character impressions which run consistently through the printed document. These so-called faults are usually manifested in the type impressions of the dater and rubber stamp outfits. They are caused in the making of the letters or have been subjected to some cause resulting in accident to them in their use after purchase. The outstanding fault, and one that is indicative of identity, is a space showing in a broken line of a character that appears consistently. It is quite probable that through accident a part of the character has been damaged and a segment of the line is missing. With this space taking place in the line which should be continuous, there is no cause to believe that it is due to uneven alignment of the letter in the form holder, uneven application of pressure by the operator, or movement of the letter in the form holder when the impression was made.

The rubber stamp has not been used extensively in creating the great numbers of anonymous letters that appear in the Technical Laboratory during the year for examination purposes, but, by the very fact that this simple and honorably intended and often childish device falls as easily into the hands of criminals as into our own, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has gathered the most intimate facts relevant to the manufacture of these instruments; catalogued, reassembled, and compiled such statistics, to await their practical use in deciphering certain elements of crime.

We have SOLD England an indeterminate number of military airplanes. She has paid cash. She has come and got them.

We have SOLD England, I understand, some old rifles and various shipments of ammunition. She paid cash. She came and got them.

We have SOLD England, it is hinted, some tanks, especially some tanks we wanted tested on desert battlefields.

We have SOLD England grain and sugar, iron and cotton, shoes and ships and sealing wax.

England must (under our law) pay cash.

England must (under our helpful law) come and get them.

Finally, in a moment of benign generosity, we traded England some rotting destroyers for some air and naval bases so valuable to our defense that even Mr. Churchill had difficulty justifying the deal to his Parliament.

We are going (as part of our magnificent program of "aid to England") to sell her more and more planes, if our factories will just decide to produce them fast enough.

We are going to sell England practically anything she wants—if we don't want it first—and we are going to let her use our own American ports to load her purchases into her own ships.

And Napoleon called England a nation of shopkeepers!

Oh, America, thou valiant, thou strong. Land of freedom. Eternal foe of cruelty and oppression, defender of men's minds and men's properties—of men's "rights."

What an inspiration we are to the suffering humanity of older, more benighted lands. We are opening our hearts. We are opening our order books. We are ready to sell England several useful items.

We are in the throes of a pleasant national orgy of "aid to England."

Ain't it wonderful?

Following is the full text of the radio speech delivered by Madame Pierre Casgrain in the series "Let's Face the Facts" on Sunday night, December 15:

I feel bound to admit to you, quite frankly, how much more difficult than I anticipated, has been the task of preparing this radio address, so that its presentation would convey to my listeners the message which I so earnestly desire to impress upon their minds and hearts.

Facing, as we have faced, during the last few years, a series of world events almost without parallel in history; feeling, as we have felt, the shock of these events, as their impact made the entire universe tremble; trying, as we have tried, to follow the baffling trend and intricate pattern out of which the history of this period will, at some future date, present a picture endowed with some degree of clarity, it is not easy for any one of us to find a suitable set of phrases to convey one's emotions, one's aims and desires, one's modest suggestions as to the means to be used to reach the goal we all have set for ourselves. Living as I do, as we all do, in the midst of a world in arms, I feel crushed by the consciousness of the massing of millions of men, of countless machines, on land, and sea, and in the air, making up tremendous aggregations of physical force, arrayed against each other, in as ghastly a struggle as humanity has ever witnessed.

MUST FACE FACTS

And in the months that lie before us—many would say the years—everything points to an even greater effort directed at increasing the forces facing each other in this mortal combat. To those of us who have followed, to

some extent at least, the devious trends of international politics, since the time when the Treaty of Versailles marked the official termination of what we now call, alas, the "first" world war, there have been apparent so many cross-currents, so many anomalous developments, so many obvious contradictions, that I think I state what many of us must have felt at various times, when I say that it was no easy task for us to discern *who* was our friend and *who* our foe. Oh! let's face the facts—and squarely. We of the Democracies owe our present situation, in no small part, to furtive glances at ugly symptoms, and to wishful thinking. But the facts remained—they do *still*—and they must be *faced*.

We have watched, for nearly four years, the titanic struggle between China and Japan. We were spectators, too, during the three long years of the Civil War in Spain. I don't propose to enumerate the all-too-well known and disastrous sequence of events made possible by what became known as the policy of appeasement—a policy which was terribly confusing to the minds of all sincere supporters of democratic government. To illustrate my point let me recall the last two scenes of the pre-war drama.

First there was the absorption by Hitler of democratic Czechoslovakia. Then followed his brutal attack upon Poland. And there the curtain falls, only to rise again on the tragedy we now have before our eyes—the second world war. I shall not dwell on the series of shattering scenes from Warsaw to Dunkirk. We all know the story of that nightmare. It left freedom-loving millions, the world over, dazed by the swiftness and apparently irres-

istible power of the Nazi war-machine.

With barely a pause the momentum of Hitler's mechanized hordes carried them to Paris, and France collapsed. The whole thing was like a cyclone in its intensity, but like a cyclone it cleared the air. In my humble opinion the capitulation of France marked the turning point in the struggle between freedom and vassalage, between liberty and slavery, between human dignity and bestial bondage.

Obviously it would require a volume to present a clear picture of Europe at that moment. There lay the prostrate Continent, like a broken mirror, but with one piece, Great Britain, saved from the wreckage. That piece was large enough and sound enough to reflect to the whole world the light of hope, courage and decency that still shone in the anxious eyes of freedom-loving people everywhere. So reflected, every battle won by Hitler stood out as the victory, not of people, but of Brute Force over Human Freedom.

PROGRESS OF BARBARISM

The battle of Poland, the battle of Norway, the battle of the Low Countries, the battle of France—all were milestones along the road of Barbarism—a road paved with the prostrate, mutilated bodies of countless peace-loving human beings. Victories? Yes, but for whom and for what? For brute force, for the debasement of human dignity, for Adolf Hitler in his attempt at the enslavement of mankind. Poor victories, those, soaked in the blood of innocents who cried to Heaven for retribution.

And now we are witnessing the Battle of Britain. Britain's battle, true enough, in the physical de-

Text of the address of Edwin S. Johnson, over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation national network Sunday night follows:

I have been back in Canada for two weeks. I returned here from the British Isles, where, since 1937, I have been in charge of the London bureau of the Canadian Press. I have followed the events which preceded this war and to many of them I have been an eye-witness. Three weeks before the declaration of war I was in Berlin and only six days before we went to war with Germany, I was in Rome. I have been bombed out of my home and out of my office and I have had more narrow escapes from death than I like to contemplate. I tell you this not for the purpose of giving you any exaggerated opinion about myself but to emphasize the fact that what I have to say to you tonight is the truth.

In the few days that I have been in Canada, I have been from coast to coast. Wherever I have gone I have heard it said that much of what you read in the daily newspapers and what you hear over the air is just so much propaganda. Well, there are two opinions about that. But what I would like you to know is that what I may say to you tonight is the truth and any opinions that I might venture to express are based upon the truth as far as my perception and my experience let me understand it.

Tonight, I am putting aside my official clothes as a member of the Canadian Press. I am going to talk to you as one Canadian to another and the responsibility for what I say is mine.

To anyone returning recently to this country it is obvious that you, my fellow Canadians, find it difficult to realize or even to imagine what is going on in our embattled Motherland. You try hard to do so but you can't even begin to understand how, over there, every day and every night death and a stark terror ride the skies or to sense the desolation and suffering that is occurring. You do not realize how appalling it is to see the indiscriminate slaughter of civilians—defenseless men, women and children; the destruction of their homes and of treasures which have enriched our history for centuries. I hope you never will see it there or here. But I would like you to realize it and all its terrible implications.

JUST THE BEGINNING.

This sort of thing is taking place every day in the British Isles. Yet it's just the beginning of the frightfulness we can expect from this ruthless, barbarous foe whose leader has said he never will put aside his corporal's tunic until he has smashed the British Empire and achieved world domination. World domination includes the domination of North America.

There is no doubt about what is in this man's mind. Nor is there any doubt that the one challenge to it is Britain—Britain under the brilliant and dynamic leadership of Winston Churchill. This was the challenge he spoke and it is the challenge of our Empire. "We shall never surrender." . . . "Britain will fight the menace of tyranny for years and, if necessary, alone."

Thus is the issue joined. It is a fight to a finish. A violent clash between diametrically opposed ideologies—the most stupendous struggle in history between civilization and barbarism. At the moment the advantage lies with Germany and her satellites although her junior partner in crime, Italy, is reeling badly under the relentless pounding of Britain and her gallant ally, Greece.

We shall gain nothing by bitterness and incrimination for those mistakes and those policies which permitted our Empire to lapse into such a sorry state of unpreparedness to meet this challenge. You and I as well as our leaders were to blame. And we have paid dearly for that era of blundering and incompetence. We came very close to the humiliation of defeat which France suffered. But there is reason to believe, to hope and to be confident. For when we survey the magnitude of the disaster that overwhelmed our expeditionary force in Europe, we must feel a surge of pride in the resilience of our Empire when we contemplate its recovery.

BRITAIN NEEDS HELP

In the British Isles they are no longer saying "things may not be going so well for us but we'll muddle through somehow." The grim realities of common danger have ended such complacency. Canada must end it too for the defeat of Great Britain means that we in Canada will be in the position that Great Britain is in today. And I say to you solemnly that

Great Britain cannot win unless you help her with all your might.

Britain will fight to the end. You can depend upon that. Under the spur of able, energetic leadership, the people of the British Isles have submitted to a self-imposed discipline. With sober awareness of the menace that confronts them they are marshalling the full power of their resources and energies not only in the defence of their home but of this Empire and civilization everywhere. Never were the British people more courageous. Never has it been so aptly said that "Britain awaits her hour and counts not the hours between." How true ring today the words uttered by Walter Page, United States Ambassador to the Court of St. James in 1916 when he said:

"Just when you would like to hang them for their stupidity you become aware of such noble stuff in the British people that you thank God they were your ancestors. Europe would be a bloody slave pen today but for them."

Except for activity in the air and on the sea the war today is almost a counterpart of the war a year ago. Yet, from bitter experiences we can rest assured that Hitler has not been idle and is not idle now. You can be sure that he is concocting some nefarious and dreadful scheme, the full weight of which he will unleash against us with all the fury within his power at the moment when he believes it will be successful.

WHAT WE ARE FACING

Have you ever pondered what we are facing? Do you realize that we have not yet felt the shock of the full momentum of a total war by a regimented nation of nearly 75,000,000 people, all of these people subordinating every interest to that of the state, obedient to and worshipping with fanatical faith this new-found god of theirs—the former Austrian paperhanger?

Do you realize that for years German factories have been operating full blast day and night, producing weapons of war aimed at our extermination? To attain this end they are still working. Under compulsion, the German people long ago ceased to enjoy those rights and privileges of life that the people of the British Isles are just beginning to surrender voluntarily. We in Canada and in the rest of the Empire must match the sacrifices of our fellow men

fence of her island, but at the same time a most intricate battle in a war which is not Britain's only, but the war of all free peoples against the totalitarian dictators.

War is like a monstrous plague—sometimes it brings out some hidden power of resistance in the body of a nation. The present war has done that. It has revealed the presence in democratic countries of fundamental virtues of courage and tenacity which normal times had often failed to disclose. The war has also forced Democracies to undertake a more lucid analysis of their own weaknesses. Only the timid or the blind may be shocked by this frank—if tardy—admission of negligence by the Democracies of the world. Why should any of us refuse to acknowledge the vital necessity for this "examen de conscience"? We must know the truth about ourselves and acknowledge our mistakes if we are to win this war and profit by the experience.

AFTER THE WAR—WHAT?

Winning the war is one thing, and winning the peace is another. What do we wish to salvage from the onslaught of dictatorial Germany? Surely not the meaningless brand of democracy which failed to keep us away from war—surely not the policies which brought about the invasion of Poland—surely not the false concept of liberty which led us towards a dangerous form of dictatorship—that of excessive money power? Anti-social, anti-human, anti-national procedures do not become acceptable because they bear the seal of a democratic state. But we all know that, unfortunately, these methods were too often allowed to grow and

develop in almost every Democracy of the world.

The greatest error of all would be to condemn democracy itself on these grounds. Democracy has not failed as a form of government. Basically, it is neither obsolete nor inadequate in relation to our present needs. It has not proved inferior to the dictatorial concept of the State.

The simple truth is, that WE have failed Democracy.

While enjoying all individual, and social and national liberties, we forget a principle as old as the world itself—no privilege is without a duty—no authority without an obligation—no freedom without a responsibility. It is for us to see that a distorted picture of political freedom is not permitted to obliterate from our hearts the ideals of true Democracy.

No, indeed, men have not been corrupted by Democracy, nor have they lost their courage, or their beliefs, or their sense of patriotism because they lived in free countries. Conversely, Dictatorship has not built new virtues in the hearts of men. It is not, in any way, an insurance against cowardice. The fascist Italy of Koritz is no more noble, and no happier, than the Democratic Italy of Caporetto.

Let us not seek the source of our ills or the reasons for our vulnerability in the systems we have erected, when the *real root* of it all is to be found in *ourselves*.

CANADA'S ROLE IMPORTANT

The role to be played by the Canadian people in this war will be an important factor of allied resistance. We have come to realize very clearly the threat hanging over our homes like a dark cloud. This realization has brought about a better under-

standing of our duty as individuals. In a country like ours where two great nationalities live together, it sometimes takes a crisis to revive a spirit of sincere co-operation and to silence the voice of racial sectionalism. I am happy to say that Canada has never been more united as a nation than she is today in the midst of our war effort.

This is neither the time nor the place to discuss the reasons why our country declared war on Germany. But I should like to emphasize the fact that Canadians of French origin are unanimously behind their Government in these times of labour and sacrifice. They have faith in Democracy—in a democracy that will safeguard their liberties, and respect their beliefs. And since this series has been called *Let's Face the Facts*, I invite you to face with me one vital fact with which all Canadians are concerned.

FRENCH CANADA LOYAL

My people are *loyal* to Canada—but they wish to maintain their racial integrity in the political set-up of Confederation. For the English-speaking Canadian, England is a spiritual metropolis. We, French Canadians, understand and respect this irresistible sympathy on their part for the country of Shakespeare, Byron and Shelley. We cannot deny the imperative voice of the blood in their veins, of the thoughts in their minds, of the love in their hearts. We ourselves admire England as one of the greatest nations of the world. In return, we expect our fellow-Canadians to understand our love and admiration for the land of our ancestors—unhappy France—and to realize that we ourselves suffer from her wounds. Only an observance of mutual understanding will keep

intact the solidarity of the Canadian people. This spirit of co-operation between different nationalities is one of the ideals of Democracy we have been too inclined to forget in the past.

By applying now, in Canada, the principles of a true Democracy, we will work together in perfect harmony, towards one ultimate goal—winning the war. Let us not fool ourselves. Germany will not be beaten easily. She is now making the rashest gamble ever attempted by a nation in the history of the world. The German writer Bernhardt has stated: "For us there can be only the alternative of ruin or world domination." That is why this war is going to be a long, gruelling one to a finish between the Reich and the Democracies of the world. Hitler has spun the wheel and, with panic in his heart, he is now grimly waiting for it to stop and spell his fate. He has reason to be worried. The proposed invasion of England has not materialized. The terrifying threat of Nazi total war has failed to crush our spirits and there is much doubt about the ability of the German war machine to accomplish in the future what it could not do in the first twelve

months, when it had the decisive advantage of confidence, modern equipment, and the element of surprise. London will be bombed again. Tons of explosives will be dropped on English towns. Merchant vessels will be sunk. But let us not forget that it takes more than such things to destroy a great nation, when it is not taken by surprise, or betrayed by enemies in its own midst.

WE WILL WIN WAR

There can be no doubt about it—we will win the war. It won't be a victory without tears, and sacrifices, and hardships. But it will be a profitable one if it serves only these purposes—that of bringing closer together the free nations of the world and creating in democratic countries a new realization of individual responsibility, a new spirit of unselfishness and of real Christian charity.

America is now directly threatened by Hitler's dream of conquest. It is a source of pride for all those who cherish Democracy to realize the spirit of co-operation which now unifies the peoples of this continent. Canada is part of the British Commonwealth by her statutes, her alleg-

iance, her moral bonds, her political past—but she is also part of the great federation of American Democracies. The friendly agreement made between our Prime Minister and the President of the United States at Ogdensburg, on August 17th, 1940, and the creation of a permanent joint board of defence for the safety of our two peoples represent the first steps towards a more intimate co-operation with our powerful neighbors.

The relationship between Canada and the United States is based, more than ever today, on the golden rule—and so should it well be—for we are both Democracies and this golden rule should be applied wherever and whenever there is any concern for the basic principles of the rights of men.

Canada and the allied Democracies will emerge from this gigantic struggle, all the stronger for having understood and overcome the errors of the past. Thus we will give the world the right kind of new order it needs. To accomplish this, let us put into practice the advice of a great philosopher to his students: "To act as men of thought and think as men of action."

in the Motherland for Nazi Germany enjoys a long head start. In every branch of military preparedness and striking power they are superior to us. We can only regain the lost ground through concerted effort, work and relentless determination.

The average Britisher appreciates the material and moral support that has been extended to the British Empire by the United States. But he feels—and rightly—that Americans have just as much at stake as Britain in this struggle. Therefore, he wonders why the United States has not faced the facts plainly and acknowledged this to be true. The majority of Britons believe firmly that the United States must come into this war. Not to save Britain from defeat (they have no illusions about that) but to safeguard American future and American subjects from enslavement.

BRITAIN MANS FRONT LINE

Meanwhile Britain heroically mans the front line of civilization buoyed up by the hope that a constant stream of vital supplies and skilled personnel will soon be crossing the Atlantic to provide her with those essentials which will aid her to ultimate victory. But Britain has no illusions about this either. She knows she faces the reality of new, increasing violent attacks upon her lifeline in the north Atlantic. Enemy submarines, surface raiders and long-range bombers are being sent out in strength to harass her sea-borne commerce. Food for Britain, raw materials, airplanes, ships and all the other riches pledged to her by the United States and Canada now have to face ever increasing dangers. No one in the British Isles underestimates this fact. But all are confident that the British Navy will, in the end, prove equal to the challenge.

So far with a single exception, the people of Britain, have been able to meet the threat of Germany. Our airmen have inflicted crushing defeats on the German air force in daylight raids on the British Isles. The guns of Dover have matched the German guns across the Channel, shot for shot. But there is one threat they have not been able to meet effectively. That is the night raider. But this problem is just as serious for Germany as it is for us. Whoever first solves it and prevents the secret from falling into the hands of the enemy will have gone a

long way towards winning the war.

RAIDS ARE DAMAGING

There is no sense underestimating the results of these mass attacks and indiscriminate bombings by Nazi night raiders. Britain has suffered very severe material damage and a considerable loss of life. In such ruthless and concentrated attacks it is inevitable that vital targets should have been hit and that the production of war materials should have suffered. I do not wish to imply that Britain is being beaten to her knees by those hammer blows. But it would be folly for us to minimize their significance. It would be well for Canadian industry and Canadian labor to contemplate this fact before it is too late.

One thing the Germans have not done. They have not even begun to destroy the morale of the British people. I have lived for months in the midst of this reign of terror and ghastly destruction of life and property. I can tell you honestly that the fighting spirit of the British people is stronger today than ever before and that their courage is sound to the core. The people of Britain have resigned themselves to a war of long duration with all its unpredictable hardships, untold suffering and discouraging setbacks. But I have yet to meet a person in the United Kingdom who does not believe firmly that Britain will win.

Yet, all this fine spirit, this indomitable courage of the British people will not avail them unless the aid so urgently needed is given to them in this their hour of unprecedented trial. I tell you frankly that unless this aid is given now, fully and liberally, there is a very real danger that the war may end in a stalemate. I need not tell you what that would mean—postponement of the struggle to be fought out a little later on with even greater violence and frightfulness; a further era of feverish and expensive rearmament; the menace of economic bankruptcy for the Axis and the Empire. And probably, in the end, we would see "Uncle" Joe Stalin perched securely on the European throne and wielding the sceptre of communistic dictatorship.

VICTORY OR NOTHING

It is your duty and mine—the duty of all of us to see to it that there is no possibility of a stale-

mate. It must be victory or nothing and if we sincerely want victory we must be ready to work for it, fight for it and pay for it to the very limits of our human and material resources. If you had seen London as I have seen it, bruised and battered, with dead and dying in its streets, you would be prepared to work and to fight and to pay so that this evil thing which has caused this suffering and sorrow would be destroyed forever.

This is a fight to a finish. It is and can be no other kind of a fight. There is no referee in the ring and it's no time to talk of Queensbury rules. There are among us, over there and here, high minded people who believe that chivalry, honor and fair play, should prevail. Not so long ago I recall hearing a minister of the church say, "Let us keep our escutcheon clean. If we sink to the level of the enemy we shall not be able to use the language of Christian morality when the time comes to discuss the terms of peace." When that time comes, as now, we will still be dealing with a people—the Germans—who know no honor in war and who interpret chivalry and fair play as signs of weakness and inferiority.

Against such an inhuman enemy can we in justice to our Empire and our loved ones continue to pursue the policy of turning the other cheek? Out of my bitter experience, I say to you that I think not. In the face of such ordeals and tragedies as Britons are experiencing today such an attitude must be regarded as nothing short of stupid, reckless martyrdom. As long as we adhere to it, just so long, will we allow the initiative to remain in the hands of our foes and permit them to continue the methods of the marauding gangster and vicious killer. In total warfare as I have seen it, it would be folly to sit back bravely while an unprincipled people seeks to destroy everything that is worth anything to us. We have no other duty and no other course except to marshal the full power of our strength and strike back with all we've got. That is the only kind of language the Germans understand or respect. And when the time comes to settle the terms of peace we must not lose that peace as we did against the same foe after the first Great War. Then we were all too prone to forgive and to forget. This time we must not forgive. This time we must not forget.

CANADIANS ARE ADMIRERD

From the time the first Canadians arrived in the British Isles more than a year ago until I left I was the Canadian Press war correspondent and I was attached to our overseas forces. I made five trips to that mystic port we have come to know as "Somewhere in Britain" to greet incoming contingents of our troops. I would like you to know—and the feeling is shared by the British people—that I have never seen a more enthusiastic, eager, finer body of men. One instinctively felt that every man-jack of them would bring honor to himself and to his country when the call comes for the real test. From the time that the advance guard of the First Division arrived on the other side just over a year ago, I shared their joys and hardships in camp billet, under canvas, in the open . . . watched them pass through the hard school of training . . . on the parade ground, ranges, out-on-field manoeuvres and have seen them emerge as hardy, well-disciplined troops who today rank among the most proficient and best-equipped in the United Kingdom.

When the Canadians arrived, it was generally believed they would be fighting by the side of their British comrades on the continent within a few months. But the collapse of the allied cause in France and Belgium changed all that.

Following the tragic disorganization of Britain's heroic expeditionary force, the First Canadian Division became one of the mainstays of the Motherland's defence. Almost everybody was positive Hitler would follow up his con-

tinental successes with a lightning invasion of Britain . . . Canadians moved into positions of readiness behind hastily-erected barricades and strong points ready to meet the blow. So high was their morale and the enthusiasm of our lads, who were fully aware of the gravity of the tasks imposed on them that they boasted they could hold at bay whatever force Hitler might elect to send against them.

But you know as well as I what has happened since then. Those same grand lads are still manning the Empire's front line, not only confident of being able to repel an invasion should it ever be attempted, but all set to launch an offensive of their own when the command is given.

WAITING IS TRIAL

Yet it has been this eternal waiting for something to happen that has proved such a trial to our boys. Three times selected units of the Canadian forces have actually moved off for battle . . . first, the dash to Dover last May from whence it had been proposed to dispatch our men on a relief foray to Calais and Dunkirk . . . then the stillborn expedition to Norway and, finally, the ill-fated incursion into France. Each time they returned dejected and disappointed to the same training areas.

Had it not been for the intelligence and efficient leadership of the officers who commanded units that did arrive in France, many Canadian homes today would be mourning loved ones. Instead, they're hale and hearty . . . true, they are miles away from home and probably giving vent to a bit of grumbling now and then . . . but, nevertheless, alive.

However, a good soldier never

gives thought to death—and all our boys are good soldiers. Today they are more anxious than ever to come to grips with the foe.

They are willing to tackle any assignment or go anywhere so long as they get action. For they realize that until they have attended to Hitler and his crowd once and for all, there is small prospect of getting back home . . . to the life of peace and contentment they would naturally much prefer.

In these circumstances it is inevitable there should be a certain undercurrent of boredom. Our leaders, however, are fully aware of this danger and have already taken steps to deal with it. But we over here also can do much to stimulate and cheer our boys over there. Write them often, send them parcels, papers and magazines, encourage them and help to keep them happy.

These Canadian soldiers, sailors and airmen have earned a fine reputation for themselves in the British Isles. They are liked by the British people and the British people have confidence in them. By their actions and by their words from the corps commander down to the man in the ranks they have inspired belief not only in themselves but in this country. These men of ours have made the people of the Old Country sure of their faith in Canada. In the faith that Canada, her factories safe from enemy bombs, is becoming the arsenal of the Empire. In the faith that Canada, willingly, is pouring forth her treasures of the earth and of the factory and of the home in the defence of the Empire. This faith these men of ours have given them. We must not let them down.

MARKING PROBLEMS IN DEFENSE PREPAREDNESS

WATCHWORD The watchword of our country's preparedness program is "Action"—prompt and sure action! Now, as America writes the story of defense, every agency will first fall back upon sure ground in order to avoid mistakes and delays. Then with a firm start, every means available to the promotion of speed, increased efficiencies, increased understandings, and the prevention of errors will be utilized.

NEW WAYS And new ways must be devised—new inventions, new processes, and new methods. Only the newest and most effective devices are considered adequate in "all out" measures for defense and these new ways will bring new and more exacting needs for marking.

MARKING AN ESSENTIAL SERVICE Marking is one of the most important services in the conduct of normal business and industry, and now it has assumed new and higher importance in all branches of Defense Preparation. Just as *Original Markings* upon products and containers show trade marks, brands, serial numbers, and the like; *Subsequent Markings* upon labels and containers show colors, quantities, style, and grades; and *Superposed Markings* upon letters, business and accounting forms, and documents show performance, give instructions and cautions, and give direction to paper motions, and have to do with the progress of finished product, its transportation and service, so the transportation, storing, distribution, and processing of raw materials require markings which are essential to the fabrication of the final product.

MARKING DEFINED It is difficult to define the group of markings which come within the purview of this discussion, because there is such an infinite variety of surfaces to be marked and so many variations of conditions under which marking must occur and endure.

We now mark to establish and prove ownership; to deliver and transport; to give instructions and cautions; to date, time, inspect, test, and receive; to classify, number, and assemble; to weigh, count, and evaluate; to sign, seal, note, cancel, and acknowledge; to organize and facilitate work; to decrease error and to point the finger of responsibility to the source of error when it occurs.

SURFACES ANALYZED In analyzing a marking problem, it is necessary to consider—Surface

to be Marked—smooth, rough—hard, medium, soft—absorbent, semi-absorbent, non-absorbent—glossy, dull—transparent, opaque—hot, cold—flat, concave, convex, irregular—large, small—coated, plain. Also, it may be necessary to consider the possibility of the presence of chemicals in the surface which may affect the marking ink injuriously.

MAKING THE MARK Conditions under which the Mark will be made may include implements or machines which are hand or power operated. Implements or machines may be portable, stationary—continuous, infrequent—high, medium, or slow speed—skilled or unskilled operator—while moving and under stable or unstable conditions—indoors, out of doors, climatic difficulties—operator careful, careless—position convenient, awkward.

KIND OF MARK The character of the mark itself may be, if required—permanent, transient—indelible or washable—decorative, neat, and of any color, or simple and strictly utilitarian, or it may be prominent or unobtrusive. Further, the mark, if so required, may endure through exposures to sun, rain, intense heat or cold, contraction or expansion of the marked surface, or may endure through actual wear or abrasion.

SOLUTION OF PROBLEM From the foregoing discussion it is evident then that "After Markings" involve many problems of surface, implement, marking ink, and method of application. While great progress has been made toward standardized products, it is unlikely that marking needs can ever become so stabilized that any single group of products will cover a very wide range of needs. Specific gravity, viscosity, solubility, opacity, penetration, drying speeds and durability may have to be determined with the utmost accuracy. Elements which might be injurious in some applications of inks may either have to be corrected or eliminated. Warnings may be needed in many cases and full instructions given in order to secure best results.

How necessary then, it is to have access to a scientifically trained organization, familiar through long years of experience, with the world's marking problems, and to take full advantage of their knowledge and laboratory facilities in covering new and special needs.

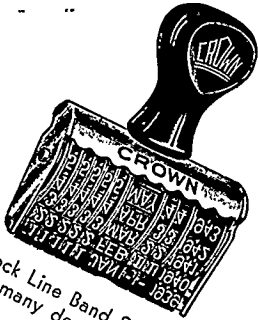

SOME EXAMPLES OF THE MARKING REQUIREMENTS OF DEFENSE PREPAREDNESS

Gas Masks—insignia and coding stamped on with an indelible, weatherproof ink.

Oil Cans—identifying marks required that would not be injured by oil.

Signal Flares—stamped with a weatherproof ink made to government specifications.

Ammunition—coding marks stamped with a special ink.

Tracing Cloth—title blocks, symbol blocks, and view captions stamped on with special ink for blue printing.

Wood and Metal Camp Properties—stamped or stenciled with a special weatherproof ink.

Waterproof Coverings—tentings, tarpaulins, bed-covers, duffle bags, canvas bags, case covers, knapsacks, wagon covers marked with a weatherproof and indelible ink.

Airplane Metal Parts—inspection marks stamped on with a special permanent metal etching ink.

Food Packages—barrels, kegs, boxes, crates, cans, jars, bottles, cartons, and paper packages marked for many purposes—including inspection stamp.

Metal Sheeting—stamped with coding marks that are temporary and later may be removed.

Office Records—letters, business and accounting forms, documents stamped to show performance, give instructions, cautions, etc., marked with penetrative erasure-proof ink.

Clothing and Equipment Records—issuance forms marked by means of special rubber type, logotypes, and dies in hand operated press, using non-smearing permanent ink.

Shipping Cases—stenciled or stamped with shipping information, contents, description, etc.

Photographic Negatives—permanently stamped with either black or silver ink.

Glass Instruments—permanently marked with special glass etching ink.

Plastics—coding and identification marks stamped permanently or temporarily.

Leather Equipment—marked to show ownership, size, origin, grade, etc.

Parachute Silk—Inspection marks stamped with special ink made up to government requirements.

Shells—special self-inkers designed for printing around the circumference of shells—using ink which can later be removed without leaving trace.

Organizing and time-saving methods throughout the Defense Preparedness program call for rubber stamp inks, ink pads, rubber stamps, date sets, movable rubber type, etc.

Every construction job, enlistment office, training station, military camp, as well as all production plants manufacturing defense products have need for these implements and inks.

Memorandum for Mr. Nathan

May 15, 1939.

Since March 17, 1939 the rubber stamp file has been undergoing a process of rehabilitation. The old and the new catalogues received from Rubber Stamp Companies have been appropriately filed in a cabinet drawer labeled the Rubber Stamp File and these catalogues have been placed in Globe-Wernicke containers, appropriately labeled with the name of the rubber stamp company that the catalogue or catalogues represent. Preliminary test cards have been made consisting of 8x8 pieces of white cardboard on which have been glued specimens showing particular sizes and shapes of letters of different office printing outfits and toy printing outfits, together with the name of the company handling same. These preliminary examination cards contain series of letters of different printing sets put out by various companies and which are about the same size and run in about the same price range per set. Among the outfits represented, by way of illustration, is the Mickey Mouse printing set and the Benjamin Franklin printing set costing about \$.25 a piece wholesale. Dater rubber stamp impressions appear on one 8x8 card representing six of the larger rubber stamp distributing houses of the United States. These impression specimens in most instances show the Gothic as well as the Roman type print, and are designated as number 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ by their manufacturers.

In the event of failure to locate a particular style of type on one of these preliminary examination cards the catalogues could be referred to and later if necessary contact would then be made with a representative of the Marking Devices Association in Chicago, Illinois. Mr. W. S. Lodge, Secretary for the Marking Devices Association has been most helpful in the past in furnishing information of a general nature relative to the organization of the rubber stamp industry and specific information relative to manufacturing concerns and companies involved in the production of rubber stamps. In this way individual companies whose names resulted from the above system would then be contacted for specific location of a type style and size involved together with information relative to its distributors.

Saturday at the laboratory staff conference Mr. Blackburn suggested that the newspaper reference file be abolished. The same subject matter has been discussed from time to time at laboratory conferences for a year and a half. The majority of document examiners have usually been in favor of abolishing the file and each time it was recommended that action be deferred for a few more months to determine whether any new uses for the file came up in the interim. No such uses for the file have occurred and it has remained quite dormant during this entire period.

Accordingly, I recommend that the maintenance of this collection, which consists of sample newspapers from some 200 of the larger cities of the United States, be abolished. If occasion should arise in the future for comparing anonymous letters made by cutting out words from newspapers it will always be relatively simple to obtain access to newspapers from the vicinity in which the anonymous letter was mailed.

the case of the rubber stamp manufacturers themselves, the type styles and sizes available numbering in the thousands, and the cost in one instance running as high as \$1,000 for a set of specimens from a single company.

In view of the above situation and the further fact that each of the rubber stamp manufacturers issues a catalogue showing the principal styles and sizes of the rubber type supplied by him, it appears impracticable to assemble a collection of rubber stamp impressions such as was originally contemplated. It is recommended, therefore, that catalogues of each of the principal manufacturers be maintained in the Laboratory in lieu of the actual rubber stamp impressions, and inasmuch as such a collection of catalogues has already been assembled in the Laboratory, no further effort will be made to obtain the actual rubber stamp impressions unless instructions indicating otherwise are received.

Upon the basis of such a catalogue collection, future investigations having for their purpose the discovery of the source of rubber stamp printing would initially proceed along the following lines:

1. All catalogues maintained in the Laboratory would first be carefully searched for the style and size of type involved in the investigation.
2. In the event of failure to locate the type in one of the catalogues available, contact would then be made with a representative of the Government Printing Office in an effort to identify the style and size of type. In addition to the possible eliciting of information relative to the source of such type, this procedure would permit the accurate description of the type in subsequent investigative action.
3. A representative of the trade magazine "Marking Devices" or a representative of the Marking Devices Association, Chicago, Illinois would next be contacted for information relative to the probable sources of such type. In this connection,

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In view of the above situation and the further fact that each of the rubber stamp manufacturers issues a catalogue showing the principal styles and sizes of the rubber type supplied by him, it appears impracticable to assemble a collection of rubber stamp impressions such as was originally contemplated. It is recommended, therefore, that catalogues of each of the principal manufacturers be maintained in the Laboratory in lieu of the actual rubber stamp impressions, and inasmuch as such a collection of catalogues has already been assembled in the Laboratory, no further effort will be made to obtain the actual rubber stamp impressions unless instructions indicating otherwise are received.

Upon the basis of such a catalogue collection, future investigations having for their purpose the discovery of the source of rubber stamp printing would initially proceed along the following lines:

1. All catalogues maintained in the Laboratory would first be carefully searched for the style and size of type involved in the investigation.
2. In the event of failure to locate the type in one of the catalogues available, contact would then be made with a representative of the Government Printing Office in an effort to identify the style and size of type. In addition to the possible eliciting of information relative to the source of such type, this procedure would permit the accurate description of the type in subsequent investigative action.
3. A representative of the trade magazine "Marking Devices" or a representative of the Marking Devices Association, Chicago, Illinois would next be contacted for information relative to the probable sources of such type. In this connection,

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4. Individual companies whose names had been obtained as a result of the above three steps would then be contacted for specific location of the type style and size involved and for information relative to its distribution.

As requested in letter from the Bureau to the Chicago Field Division, dated February 19, 1937, (~~60-615~~), the following investigation was conducted by Special Agent R. B. Graham of this division:

Mr. E. Duff and Mr. D. W. McFee, who are in charge of the Type Merchandising Department of the American Type Founders Sales Corporation, 200 Elmora Avenue, Elizabeth, New Jersey, formerly located at 300 Communipaw Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey, were interviewed. These gentlemen advised that steel type is made by approximately six manufacturing companies in the United States, and may also be obtained from foreign manufacturing companies who have sales agencies in the United States. However, lead type will answer the purpose almost as well as the steel type, and may be obtained from numerous companies, inasmuch as it may be made by any company having a monotype, linotype, or intertype machine, and there are also a great many of what are called Trade Composition Houses. These houses are usually located in cities large enough to furnish sufficient business and their business usually consists of orders from local printers who have special work to be done and need a particular kind of type to do this special work but do not have enough of such work to warrant their buying expensive steel type and for that reason they have the Trade Composition Houses make a set of lead type which can be done at a very reasonable rate and will last for a short time.

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Mr. Duff and Mr. McFee further advised agent that in order to have specimens of all styles of type in existence, it would be necessary to obtain many thousands of specimens inasmuch as their company, the American Type Founders Sales Corporation, makes approximately five or six thousand different styles of type and all other type manufacturers also have about the same quantity of type styles in addition to which there are thousands of styles of type which have not been manufactured for many years although some printers and perhaps some manufacturers still have them in stock and may use them on occasion. Also, of course, it would be necessary to obtain specimens of all of the foreign styles of type and in this regard, Mr. Duff stated that there are a large number of foreign type styles which are not sold in the United States but which may be obtained by anyone who knows anything about the type business.

Agent was advised that type is made by intertype, linotype, and monotype machines and type made by these machines can be used as a basis for making rubber stamps.

Mr. Duff and Mr. McFee stated that every type manufacturer publishes a catalogue containing samples of all of the styles of type made by that particular company. However, in most of the instances, these specimens do not consist of all of the letters of the alphabet nor are all of the type sizes included in the specimens; and according to Mr. Duff and Mr. McFee, in order to identify a particular sample of type, it is necessary that it be compared with a specimen of the same size type inasmuch as the size of the letter and the distances between various parts of the letter must be measured in order to definitely determine whether the type is identical. Agent was further advised that so far as Mr. Duff and Mr. McFee are informed, the rubber stamp manufacturers also maintain catalogues containing specimens of all of the styles of rubber type manufactured by them and they were of the opinion that probably it would be more practical to obtain samples of type from the rubber stamp manufacturers rather than from the manufacturers of steel type inasmuch as there are far fewer styles of type used by rubber stamp manufacturers than are manufactured by steel type manufacturers, and in addition to this, it is, of course, possible for the rubber stamp manufacturers to use type made by a Trade Composition House or by intertype, linotype and monotype machines.


Mr. Duff and Mr. McFee stated that to their knowledge, the largest collection of samples of types is maintained in the Government Printing Office at Washington, D. C., and they believed that a specimen

With reference to Bureau letter dated February 19, 1937, (Bureau file 80-613), Mr. J. A. Smith, 185 North Wabash Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, publisher of the magazine known as Marking Devices, advised that he has only been publishing this magazine for one year; that Mr. W. S. Lord, Secretary for the Marking Device Association, 431 South Dearborn Street, was the proper person to see regarding information concerning the manufacture of rubber stamps.

Mr. Lord upon interview stated that the Marking Device Association is national in scope having members all over the United States and Canada, the purpose of the Association being principally to promote the sale of marking devices through national advertising. The Association also edits the magazine known as marking devices. He further advised that the manufacture of rubber stamps takes in three industries, the steel type maker or engraver, type founder and the rubber stamp maker; that where a maker is to produce a large quantity of any one product as for instance a dater stamp he will undoubtedly have steel type engraved as the lead, copper or composition molds or matrices, usually furnished by the founder, can only be used a limited number of times as the edges begin to round off which results in a stamp not having well defined edges. This thus requires that a matrice be replaced after about 500 to 1000 rubber stamps have been made therefrom which requires resetting of type for the formation of the mold. Steel type can be used indefinitely to form molds from and is thus much cheaper where numerous molds of the same kind are required. The engraver is normally not an originator of type nor does he stock type but merely engraves the amount of type ordered, from furnished patterns or designs and returns the patterns with the engraved type to the person ordering the same.

Usually it is the maker of the rubber stamp, if a large concern, that originates and maintains a stock of steel type. If only a small order or a single article is to be made from rubber then the matrix is ordered direct from the founder. The principal makers of rubber stamps in the United States are the Superior Type Company, 3940 North Ravenswood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, Louis Melind and Company, 362 West Chicago Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, the Eagle Stamp Works, 162 North Franklin Street, Chicago, Illinois, William A. Force Company, Worth Street, New York City, Fulton Specialty Company, 200 Fifth Avenue, New York City, Consolidated Stamp Manufacturing Company, 47 Church Street, New York City, J. F. W. Dormon Company, Baltimore, Maryland, G. A. Pickup and Son, Cahal and Scott Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee and the R. H. Smith Company, Springfield, Massachusetts; that most all other sellers of rubber stamps buy their supply directly or indirectly from one of the above makers.

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William and Robert Wiebking, owners and operators of Wiebking Engraving Company, advised upon interview that they engrave all of the steel type used by the Eagle Stamp Company, most of the steel type used by the Hill Independent Manufacturing Company and the Superior Type Company, and some for the Fulton Specialty Company, Elizabeth, New Jersey, but that made for the Fulton Specialty Company is a duplication of a pattern furnished by such company, such as a brass type. They took Agent V. E. Criss into their shop, which they stated they did not do in other cases, and demonstrated their method of engraving. From the pattern or design furnished they cut upon a flat piece of aluminum plate about two inches wide and various lengths the outline of the letters or characters to be engraved. The outline is 8 times as large as the size of No. 2 type, 10.83 times as large as the size of No. 1½ type, etc. The outline on the aluminum plate, which is a V shaped groove about 1/32 of an inch deep, is called the original master. The original master is then used to form what is called a punch master, either by electroplating or by pressing hot lead onto the original master. This forms an inverted or as called, the punch master. The inverted master instead of being grooved has a V shaped ridge which outlines the letters. The guide which controls the operation of the engraving machine follows around the outer lower edge of the

V shaped ridge which forms the outline of the letter or character. The machine is adjusted to engrave the size of type desired, being from 00 to No. 3. They stated they have about two thousand original master patterns for type used in the making and molds for rubber stamps; that they could furnish a tracing of these on an aluminum plate similar to that used in making their masters for about \$100.00. The tracing would be a single line groove about 1/1000 of an inch deep and with the center of the groove in the original master which would be about 5/1000 of an inch less in size than the master pattern, which would be about 1/1000 less in size when reduced to the size of a No. 2 type.

Mr. J. R. Swift, Manager of the Superior Type Company, was interviewed and he advised that during the year, 1936, his company had sold approximately 23,000 chain store dater stamps without the letter X appearing thereon and about 50,000 crown dater stamps with the X appearing thereon. Mr. Swift, after observing the lettering appearing in the ransom note in the instant case, stated that he believed that the ink used by the kidnaper was of an oil base which would cause the rubber type to expand thus causing the letters to appear to be a little oversized. He stated that the Superior Type Company has about 300 type faces which may be used in about 1500 different combinations. He further stated that to obtain a supply of rubber type would be impractical in his opinion; that the same thing could be accomplished if a collection of catalogs was made which illustrated the type used by the various makers. The usual method, which is the method used by the Superior Type Company, is to use the type from which the molds are made to print the specimens which appear in the catalog thus giving the exact size and shapes. Mr. Swift stated that he does not remember any occasion where the 1½ size dater stamp was sold by them which had an inverted S thereon.

Mr. C. F. Hicks, Manager of the Chicago branch of the American Type Founders Corporation, advised that they do not make any molds which are to be used only for the production of rubber stamps; that they have about 5000 faces or styles of type, which vary in size from 3 to 17; that it would be prohibitive in cost to obtain a duplication of these.

Mr. Louis Ruffer, Manager of the Eagle Stamp Company, was interviewed and stated that the size No. 1½ dater stamp was the largest seller; that they had sold approximately 5000 of these during the year 1936 all over the United States to approximately

700 various distributors; that their daters had the letter X thereon; that he did not remember any occasion where dater stamps had been sold with the letter S inverted thereon. Mr. Ruffer also stated that their company produces and sells type band dater which has rubber type therein of the same form and size as is used in the dater stamp. He gave to Agent a sample of this rubber type which is being forwarded to the Bureau herewith.

Mr. Roy Melind, Secretary of the Louis Melind and Company, was interviewed and he stated that during the year 1936 they sold between 5000 and 10,000 $1\frac{1}{2}$ size dater stamps; that they did not sell any without the letter X appearing thereon and he does not know of any instance where they sold any which had an inverted S appearing thereon. They sell all over the United States and Canada, but do not sell to the five and ten cent stores. The names of their products are the Junior Justrite dater and the Justrite dater, which have the same size of type. Mr. Melind gave Agent Criss a Justrite dater stamp, size $1\frac{1}{2}$, which is forwarded to the Bureau with this letter.

Mr. J. T. Marks, catalog compiler for the C. H. Hanson and Company, 303 West Erie Street, was interviewed and stated that where they sell rubber stamps in any quantity they do not make the same, but make on occasions rubber stamps for a particular small order, thus using a mold which they buy from the American Type Foundry and thus they do not have any steel type; that the $1\frac{1}{2}$ dater stamp which they sell is made by the Louis Melind and Company and the letter X appears thereon and that he does not recall ever selling any of these dater stamps with an inverted S thereon.

The dater stamps sold by the Superior Type Company, the Louis Melind and Company and the Eagle Stamp Company all contain a different form of No. 2 and 5. Agent purchased a dater stamp from a Woolworth Store in Chicago on which appears the letters 2 and 5 of the form which appears in the ransom number, the letter X not appearing thereon. Agent was advised at the Woolworth Store that this dater stamp which sold for 10¢ was purchased through their New York purchasing department and they did not know the origin thereof. The same is being forwarded to the Bureau with this letter.



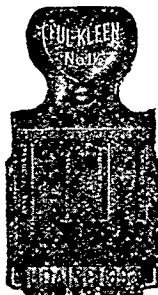

Re: Rubber Stamp Collection

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to the Bureau's letter of January 21, 1937, to the Nashville Field Division relative to the case entitled Unknown Subject; Charles Fletcher Mattson, Victim; Kidnaping, a copy of which was transmitted to your office, listing several of the larger dealers in rubber stamping materials and requesting that in connection with other investigative action being taken, the agents contacting the various companies make arrangements to secure standard impressions of the various rubber type styles manufactured by each company.

Information obtained as a result of the attempt to secure such standard specimens indicates that instead of each of the larger companies carrying its own brand of rubber stamps as a stock item, by far the majority of them carry in stock the product of one of a relatively few manufacturing companies such as the Superior Type Company, Chicago, Illinois; the various companies do, however, appear to be equipped to manufacture rubber stamps to special order, although as indicated above such items are not stocked. It further appears probable that many of the manufacturing companies obtain their type designs and standard molds from a relatively few engraving companies such as Weibking Engraving Company, Chicago, Illinois. In addition, the cost of supplying a complete set of impressions from a single company was found in some instances to run as high as \$1,000.

Accordingly, it is now proposed to discontinue at least temporarily, the effort to obtain such specimens from the retail companies and to ascertain the names of the principal manufacturers and the engraving companies with whom the various type designs and master standards originate. Upon receipt of this information, it is then believed that a comprehensive and representative set of impressions may be obtained from the more important sources, and thus avoid the duplication and wasted effort otherwise to be encountered.

In developing the new line of investigation outlined, it is desired that the Chicago Division interview representatives of the Trade Magazine "Marking Devices", 185 North Dearborn Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, as set out in the Nashville Division's report dated January 20, 1937, relative to the Mattson case, and that the result of this interview be submitted at an early date. The Chicago Division is also instructed to contact representatives of the Weibking Engraving Company, Chicago, Illinois, and to obtain both from them and from the representatives of the magazine "Marking Devices" as much information as possible relative to the organization of the rubber stamp industry as a whole throughout the United States. The Trenton Field Division will conduct a similar investigation with respect to the American Type Foundry Sales Corporation, Jersey City, New Jersey, in an effort to gain a comprehensive knowledge of the organization of

the rubber stamp industry, particularly as it pertains to the original designers and manufacturers of the standards from which rubber type and rubber stamps are prepared.

Information obtained as a result of the above outlined investigation should be submitted to the Bureau by letter form, marked for the attention of the Technical Laboratory.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILE

Re: Collection of rubber stamp specimens for Laboratory

In addition to the various reference files already maintained in the Laboratory, it is desired to establish and maintain a reference collection of rubber stamp impressions, somewhat analogous to the typewriting specimens presently on file, in order that the source of rubber stamp impressions appearing on extortion letters from time to time may be more readily ascertained.

Under date of January 24, 1937, in connection with investigation of the Mattnap case several of the field offices were requested to obtain such standard rubber stamp impressions from a number of the larger companies as listed in the Thomas' Register of American Manufacturers. As a result of the investigation conducted along this line, it became apparent that while the majority of the larger companies were equipped to manufacture rubber stamps to order, they did not as a rule stock the rubber stamps manufactured by themselves. That is, the majority of such concerns carried an incomplete line of the products of some one of a relatively few manufacturing companies, and the collection of rubber stamp impressions from the various companies listed would obviously result in a great deal of duplication and wasted effort. In addition, the cost of supplying a complete set of impressions from a single company was found in some instances to run as high as \$1,000. Accordingly, it is now proposed to discontinue, at least temporarily, the effort to obtain such specimens from the retailing companies and to ascertain the names of the principal manufacturers and the engraving companies with whom the various type designs and master standards originate. Upon receipt of this information it is then believed that a comprehensive and representative set of impressions may be obtained from the more important sources, and thus avoid the duplication and wasted effort otherwise to be encountered.

A letter to this effect is being prepared for the attention of all offices receiving the above-mentioned letter initiating the investigation.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR.

Re: Meeting of Laboratory Employees.

A meeting of the Laboratory employees was held the afternoon of March 27th, attended by Messrs. Appel, Blackburn, Conrad, Harrington, Major, Pickering, Hince, and myself.

The question of starting the collection of printed type specimens of newspapers and periodicals was discussed and it was suggested that rather than request agents in the field to undertake to make this collection, inquiry first be made at the Congressional Library and possibly other points in the city to determine whether samples of most of the largest newspapers of the country are not available where they have been first examined for clipping bureau purposes and the like. I am of the opinion this suggestion is of merit and I will have Mr. Blackburn make the inquiry. It was also suggested that after the collection was under way it might be found desirable to discuss the matter with manufacturers of printing papers, linotype machines, and the like with a view to getting better acquainted with the variations in type design.

The Pantascopic Camera for bullet photography which has been placed on the market by Kenneth A. Dawson of Cambridge, Massachusetts, was discussed. This camera takes the picture of a bullet while turning on a turn table in such a manner that the full cylindrical surface is available in a single plane. Such development has been brought to the attention of the Bureau several times, one of these cameras having been made by Peterson of the Sheriff's Office in Miami and having been worked on by several other individuals. It is similar to a camera designed several years ago by the Bureau of Standards for photographing the cylindrical surface of iron pipe. The literature put out by Dawson advertises the camera in two sizes at \$650.00 and \$950.00. It was agreed by all at the meeting that the camera is still undoubtedly in the experimental stage, this opinion being based upon examinations of photographs prepared by the camera and, therefore, that the Bureau should be rather circumspect in purchasing the equipment.

Mr. Conrad and Mr. Parsons described a method which they have been working on for obtaining the same results by photographing a bullet within a cylindrical reflected surface. Such a procedure, if it could be perfected, would be much simpler because of the elimination of moving parts and these employees were asked to expedite their experiments after which the question of obtaining the Pantascopic Camera would be again considered.

I talked with all Laboratory employees concerning the phraseology to be used in the submission of laboratory reports and emphasized the necessity of extreme caution in the choice of words used in writing up opinions, pointing out to them that Special Agents in the field and especially United States Prosecutors may often misinterpret the wording of a report or become confused with wording which to us might appear quite clear, but to the lay person rather ambiguous. Specific cases discussed in this respect were the reports submitted in the Gorrell Murder Case in Oklahoma City and reports submitted in the Riegel Case in the Charlotte district.
