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BLACK PANTHER PARTY FOR SELF-DEFENSE (BPPSD)

A source advised that the Black Panther Party For Self-Defense (BPPSD) was formed by HUEY PERCY NEWTON, Minister of Defense, and BOBBY GEORGE SEALE, Chairman, in Oakland, California, in December, 1966, as a militant black nationalist political organization to combat "police brutality," to unite militant black youth, to determine the destiny of black communities, and to educate black people in African history. The political philosophy of the organization was taken from the writings of MAO TSE-TUNG of Communist China and black militant writers.

The official BPPSD publication "The Black Panther - Black Community News Service" indicates the leadership of the BPPSD advocates the use of guns and guerilla tactics in the violent revolutionary program to end oppression and to oppose the drafting of black men to fight in Vietnam.

A second source advised that in early 1967, SEALE, NEWTON, and their associates carried carbine rifles and holatered pistols in plain view on the streets of Cakland and elsewhere while on "defense patrols."

BOBBY GEORGE SEALE was one of the persons arrested by the Sacramento, California Police Department on May 2, 1967, when members of the BPPSD invaded the California State Legislative Assembly in Sacramento while in session, carrying loaded guns to protest restrictions on the carrying of guns.

A Grand Jury of Alameda County, California, Oakland, California, on November 13, 1967, indicted HUEY PERCY NEWTON on charge of murder of an Oakland, California police officer on October 28, 1967, in Oakland, California.

The first source advised that the headquarters office of the BPPSD at 5624 Grove Street, Oakland, California, is closed and that no membership meetings have been held since August, 1967.

The November 4, 1967, issue of "The Sun Reporter," a San Francisco, California Negro community newspaper, states that a HUEY PERCY NEWTON defense fund has been established and that the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and the Congress on Racial Equality (CORE) through the national offices have pledged their complete and continuous support to the defense of HUEY PERCY NEWTON.

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

SAVIO later spent a year in England and then returned to Berkeley. He was devied resimission to the University. At present he is reported to be running for election to the California State Legislature.

The PEACE AND FREEDOM PARTY is a third party which is qualified on the ballot in California this year. Basically, it embraces the Stop the Draft movement and Get out of Vietnam movement.





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

In the vicinity of 15th and Clay Streets. Oakland, California, at about 5:30 a.m., three persons were observed near the doorway of the Induction Center. No other activity noted. Around 6:00 a.m., the crowd had grown to approximately 50 individuals standing idlely talking near the door of the Induction Center. By 6:30 a.m. the crowd had grown to approximately 500 people. Standing on both sides of Clay Street, the Oakland Police Department was advising them to stay on the sidewalks. At 6:45 a.m. it appeared that approximately 1,000 persons were in the vicinity of 15th and Clay Streets and at about this time a stake truck arrived with loud speaking system and microphone which was parked or Clay Street across from the doorway of the Induction Center. Several individuals were noticed in this talk and the following spoke on the microphone to the crowd:

ROBERT MANDELL
MARIO SAVIO
Reverand JOH! H. BROWN
MCRGAN SPECTOR
REESE ERLICH
Professor FRANKLIN of Palo Alto

One individual believed to be Velsa, of Eamparts Magazine, took the part of cheer leader and periodically would chant into the ricrophone "Fell no, we won't go. Hell no, nobody goes." This would produce chanting in unison from the crowd. The speakers all followed the same format; namely, stop the var in Viet Nam, stop racism in America, and the American Var Machine and so forth. Also noticed in the truck was BILL MANDEL, father of POBETT, and MIKE SMITH. At approximately 7:25 a.m. MCRGAN SPECTOR announced on the loud speaker that the group should now move to the Court Pouse where they would hold a rally in support of FUEY MENTOH, currently being held in the Alameda County Jail, charged with killing


an Oakland police officer. The second truck left the area and was followed by the crowd marching behind, heading towards the Alameda County Court House near Lake Merritt.


On Fast 14th Street between Broadway and Franklin Streets, the second truck was stopped by the police and the microphone was removed. It was apparent that two arrests were made at this time by the Oakland Police Department. The crowd moved on down East 14th Street and gathered in front of the County Court House, blocking the street in that vicinity. After about 15 minutes, the police cleared the streets, moving the people away from the Court House to the park near the old museum on the shores of Lake Merritt.

It appeared at this time that the crowd consisted of about 500 to 600 people and a couple of speakers aftempted to arouse interest in holding a rally. Fowever, the crowd showed little enthusiasm.

At about 9:15 a.m. the crowd was asked to go back to the Induction Center at 15th and Clay Streets. During the confrontation between the police and the crowd, a small number of arrests were made. At approximately 9:30 a.m. the crowd began to straggle down East 14th back to the Induction Center area.

or three small scuffles occurred resulting in a small number of additional arrests by the Cakland Police Department. After the crowd arrived in the vicinity of the Induction Center, it now appeared to be approximately 200 in number. They gathered on the corners of 15th and Clay and proceeded to walk around the intersection, at times blocking automobile traffic. This activity produced a couple more arrests. At approximately 11:15 a.m. most of the demonstrators had left the area straggeling away in twos or threes. A review of Savio's file has been completed at the Bureau and the following observations are noted bearing on your investigation of the subject.

No information was located in Bufiles to indicate that your investigation has been directed toward fully developing the subject's This should be done and a close surveillance instituted in order to develop information regarding his

From information developed, to date, it would appear that the subject may be moving away from those New Left groups which have demonstrated their revolutionary bent and may be moving toward a more politically stable posture, as revealed in his current candidacy on the Peace and Freedom ticket. It may well be that the subject

is maturing politically and may no longer be classified as a Key Activist. However, the coming political campaign in California may serve to answer this question. You should, therefore, closely follow his speeches and writings during this campaign with a view toward resolving this question.

request for authority to make such checks should be made to the Bureau prior to conducting this phase of your investigation.

Relet instructed that a survey be made of the informant coverage available to you on the subject. Such a survey has not been received. You should, therefore, carefully review this investigation to determine the live, day-to-day informant coverage you have available. You should advise the Bureau of the results of this review of your coverage along with a frank evaluation, and your plans for its improvement, if needed.

Despite Savio's past activities, no recommendation has been received from you to include him on the Agitator Index. You should promptly consider the subject in this regard.

Some Key Activists, have traveled extensively both nationally and abroad, in the past. You should remain alert to this in order that you might promptly advise the Bureau of any travel planned by the subject. Information developed is to be furnished the Bureau and interested offices in a form suitable for dissemination.

In evaluating this case, you should bear in mind that one of the prime objectives should be to neutralize him in the new left movement. The Bureau will entertain recommendations of a counterintelligence nature to accomplish this end. You should, therefore, promptly

furnish the Bureau with your suggestions as to how this might be accomplished. Take no positive action, however, in this regard without specific Bureau approval.

"We must take from the rich to help the poor," Savio, former spokesmen for the 1964-65 Free Speech Movement at the University of California, said.




Re Bureau letter 5/10/68 requesting that offices submit to the Bureau by 6/1/68 an analysis of potential counterintelligence action for use against the new left organizations and key activists.

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The San Francisco Office presently has three individuals, MARIO ROBERT SAVIO.

who have been designated as key activists by the Bureau. As the Bureau commented in a letter to San Francisco dated 5/17/68 concerning MARIO ROBERT SAVIO, it would appear SAVIO may be moving away from the new left group and may be moving toward a more stable posture as revealed in his current candidacy on a Peace and Freedom Party (PFP) ticket. Further, it may be SAVIO is maturing politically and may no longer be classified as a key activist. San Francisco agrees with the Bureau concerning SAVIO and this office does not feel SAVIO should be continued as a key activist. A specific letter, including more detail, will be submitted in the near future in the SAVIO case.





It should be noted the above three San Francisco key activists, as the Bureau has been advised in the past, are not members of any known subversive organizations such as the CP, SWP, et cetera. They are independent free thinkers and do not appear to be answerable to any one person or any group or organization.

For the Bureau's information, the news reporting media, including radio and television, seem to utilize controversy, sensationalism, nudity, and sex in their productions which do expose to the public scrutiny the activities of the people involved in the new left. Host of the individuals seem to enjoy this attention and the more notorious press they get the better they like it.

The habits and living conditions of these individuals are clearly known to most of the residents in this area through the wide-spread attention they get in the local press. They are not embarrassed by this coverage and, in fact, they seem to enjoy it and thrive on it. It is not believed that as far as the San Francisco area is concerned any action concerning immorality on the part of the new left should be dealt with. has noted many of the underground newspapers that deal so much As the Bureau with the new left contain stories that deal with sensationalism and the use of drugs. They are highly critical of the actions of police and public officials. It is the opinion of this office that further publicity given to this segment of our population acts as an advertisement for them and possibly attracts new people and perhaps young people to experimenting in this type of life. Therefore, San Francisco will be most circumspect in recommending any counterintelligence activities along these lines. SF 100-60968

The counterintelligence activities that have been undertaken by this office in the past have been for the most part directed against subversives who are organized such as in the CP, CP fronts, et cetera. The new left, at least in this area, seems to be rather a disorganized federation of many types of groups and there is really no one main group or individual that the counterintelligence program can be directed against. As noted earlier in this letter the three key activists in this area do not belong to any organization. The only thing the three activists have in common is association with the new PFP which is a duality constituted political party on the California ballot.

To give the Bureau a specific example of the difficulty involved in slowing down the public appearances of some of the leaders as the Bureau was advised on 5/9/68 MARIO SAVIO was invited by an employee of the Department of Housing and his appearance was approved by of the Department of Housing, to address all of the interns who are new employees in the U. S. Department of Housing at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, 5/15/68. SAVIO planned to talk about the Black Panther Party and its alliance with the PFP. Here is a situation where a prominent and important government official sanctions the appearance of SAVIO in the same building in which the FBI is located, the Mederal Building in San Francisco. It is probable in this case that even if the FBI had told SAVIO'S background he would have some ahead and let SAVIO appear

There are eight Special Agents who will participate in the new counterintelligence program currently attending In Service. Upon their return further discussions will be had with them concerning any ideas that may have been brought forth in the In Service class which may be useful in the disruption of the new left.

San Francisco will carefully continue to analyze the situation of the new left and be alert for any possible tactics that could be used in its disruption. San Francisco would appreciate receiving any suggestions that have been received by the Bureau from other offices that might be utilized in this area.

He said one solution to the prob lem is to average the incomes of all the people and redistribute it. Savio said under that plan families would get a \$6,000 yearly income. This contrasts he said with people who now have incomes as low as \$1,500. "We must get over the feeling that it harms a man to get something for nothing," said Savio. "We have gotten the idea but our parents haven't yet."

Much useless spending is going on in the U.S., said Savio. He defined useless spending, "like buying a three cup brassiere . . . totally useless."

Defense spending is one of the assissa items Savio noted. He said that the Cold War has been in invention of the Admidstration to increase government spending and allow the government to have control over the ecenomy. The space race, according to Savio, was an invention of President John F. Hennedy to fulfill the same purpose.

Savio said the money saved by cutting out useless spending could be used in the ghetto and other poor areas, to revive them and give the people decent living quarters.

Savio felt that Senator Robert Kennedy's plan to provide tax incentives to companies which invested in poor areas and employed the people who lived there would not be satisfactory. He felt the tax burden would fall on the middle class, which is already rebelling against high taxes. He also felt that the presence of a white owned company in the ghettos would cause riots.

Effective immediately, the Bureau is instituting a Counterintelligence Program directed against the New Left movement and its Key Activists. All offices are instructed to immediately open an active control file, captioned as above, and to assign responsibility for this program to an experienced and imaginative Special Agent who is well versed in investigation of the New Left and its membership.

The purpose of this program is to expose, disrupt, and otherwise neutralize the activities of the various New Left organizations, their leadership and adherents. It is imperative that the activities of these groups be followed on a continuous basis so we may take advantage of all opportunities for counterintelligence and also inspire action in instances where circumstances warrant. The devious maneuvers and duplicity of these activists must be exposed to public scrutiny through the cooperation of reliable news media sources, both locally and at the Seat of Government. We must frustrate every effort of these groups and individuals to consolidate their forces or to recruit new or . youthful adherents. In every instance, consideration should be given to disrupting the organized activity of these groups and no opportunity should be missed to capitalize upon organizational and personal conflicts of their leadership.

On or before June 1, 1968, all offices are instructed to submit to the Bureau a detailed analysis of potential counterintelligence action against New Left organizations and Key Activists within their respective territories. Specific recommendations should be included for any logical immediate counterintelligence action. Recommendations submitted under this program must include all necessary facts to enable the Bureau to intelligently pass upon the feasibility of the proposed action. In instances where a reliable and cooperative news media representative or other

source outside the Bureau is to be contacted or utilized in connection with a proposed counterintelligence operation, it will be incumbent upon the recommending office to furnish assurances the source will not reveal the Bureau's interest or betray our confidence.

Offices which have investigative responsibility for Key Activists should specifically comment in the initial letter to the Bureau regarding these individuals. As these offices are aware, these individuals have been identified as the moving forces behind the New Left.

No counterintelligence action may be initiated by the field without specific Bureau authorization.

Commencing July 1, 1968, and every three months thereafter, each participating office should submit to the Bureau a status letter covering the prior 3-month period, including comments under the following captions.

- 1) Potential Counterintelligence Action
- 2) Pending Counterintelligence Action
- 3) Tangible Results

If necessary, a fourth caption "Miscellaneous" may be utilized for additional comments.

Recommendations for counterintelligence action should not be included in the 90-day status letters to the Bureau, but should be submitted individually by separate letter.

All Special Agent personnel responsible for the investigation of the New Left and the Key Activists should be alerted to our counterintelligence plans relating to these groups. Counterintelligence action directed at these groups is intended to complement and stimulate our accelerated intelligence investigations. Each investigative Agent has a responsibility to call to the attention of the counterintelligence coordinator suggestions and possibilities for implementing the program. You are cautioned

that the nature of this new endeavor is such that under no circumstances should the existence of the program be made known outside the Bureau and appropriate within-office security should be afforded this sensitive operation.



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



In keeping with the Bureau's request that SAVIO's day-to-day activities be determined, all logical live informants in the East Bay region have been alerted to furnish any and all information coming to their attention regarding SAVIO's activities.

In addition to the live informant coverage periodic spot surveillances are made at the SAVIO residence and this has been done during February, March, April, May and June without producing any positive results of any consequence.

The Bureau's referenced letter dated 5/17/68 also points out that no recommendation has been received to include SAVIO on the Agitator Index. After a review of SAVIO's case and particularly his recent activities which involve primarily his pursuit of a political office in a legally constituted political party in the State of California, it does not appear that he qualifies for the Agitator Index. Therefore, no recommendation is being made in this regard.

The Bureau's referenced letter dated 5/17/68 points out that "the Subject may be moving away from those new left groups which have demonstrated their revolutionary bent and may be moving toward a more politically stable posture as revealed in his current candidacy on the Peace and Freedom Party ticket. It may well be that the Subject is maturing politically and may no longer be classified as a Key Activist".

A review of SAVIO's speeches as set out in referenced report during his recent political campaign indicates that SAVIO continues to be "an angry young man" opposed to many of the U. S. Government's policies, however, he gave no indication of an affiliation with any basic revolutionary group such as the CP, SWP, PLP, or even the new left oriented SDS. It appears that SAVIO's only bent toward a revolutionary type group at this time is his apparent sanction of the Black Panther Party.

It is also noted that SAVIO received less than two per cent of a total vote cast for State Senator in the 11th District of the State of California of 216,047, SAVIO receiving only 4,292. Since SAVIO's defeat, he has apparently had difficulty in obtaining employment

SAVIO has not traveled outside of the U. S. since he took a vacation tour in Mexico in May, 1967.

In view of the above, it would appear that SAVIO does not currently qualify as a Key Activist and should be removed from this particular classification.

The PFP was qualified by the State of California as a legally established political party to place candidates on the ballot in the 1968 California elections.


As set out previously in this report, SAVIO was a candidate for State Senate, 11th District, State of California, on the PFP ticket.

A rally sponsored by the PFP and Stop the Draft Week was held on the Sproul Hall Plaza steps, University of California (UC), Berkeley, at noon on April 8, 1968. The rally was to be a memorium to the late MARTIN LUTHER KING. MARIO SAVIO was the main speaker and stated that there would be a march following the rally to the Oakland Alameda County Court House. SAVIO stated that the marchers would not have to go through the ghetto since "they already know what it's all about". SAVIO stated "now is not the time to mourn, but the time to change". He asked the crowd to remember JOE HULL (a man allegedly executed on Talse murder charges) who said, "Don't mourn me. Organize." SAVIO participated in the march following the rally of about 5,000 persons who paraded from Berkeley to the Alameda County Court House.

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

MARIO SAVIO and BETTINA APTHEKER KURZWEIL, publicly announced member of the Communist Party (CP), were two panels speakers on a broadcast over a local radio station in Berkeley, California, on February 7, 1968. The panel discussed the "University Governance Report" which the panelists branded as an effort to get around student demands for a change of policy on university campuses. SAVIO stated that the report should have said "we need socialism" and then should have given instructions for instituting the program. SAVIO suggested, however, that "you can't do it one country at a time and likewise you can't do it one campus at a time", presumably referring to his stated "need for socialism."

"Daily Californian" newspaper, UC, Berkeley, 2/8/68

The April 1, 1968 edition of the Daily Californian, a daily newspaper published at UC, Berkeley, contained an article which indicated that a rally billed to be in support of the National Liberation Front (NLF) of South Vietnam was to be held the evening of April 1, 1968, at UC. The article indicated the rally was supported by the Tri-Continental Student Committee (Tri-Con).





Tri-Continental Progressive Students Committee, also known as Tri-Continental Student Committee

The July 29, 1966 issue of the "Berkeley Barb", a weekly newspaper published at Berkeley, California, quoted a spokesman for the Tri-Continental Progressive Students Committee as saying in an interview that this new organization was aimed toward solidarity among students at Berkeley from Africa, Asia and Latin America and that the organization supported National Liberation movements wherever they occur.

On April 23, 1968, a demonstration was held to protest the military draft and induction of men into the Armed Forces at 15th and Clay Streets, Oakland Induction Center. Approximately 1,000 persons were in the vicinity of 15th and Clay Streets at about 6:45 a.m. on April 23, 1968, to hear speakers attack the military draft, one of whom was MARIO SAVIO.



Mario Savio well-known student

Savio said in the richest nation ists policies, but society itself. of the world, America, one half of all people have an income less than average. He also stated that 350,000 people die of starvation in the U.S. each year.

He said one solution to the problem is to average the incomes of all the people and redistribute it. Savio said under that plan families wcu¹3 get a \$6,000 yearly income. This contrasts he said with people of who now have incomes as low as \$1,500. "We must get over the feeling that it harms a man to get something for nothing," said Savio. "We have gotten the idea but our parents haven't yet."

Much useless spending is going on in the U.S., said Savio. He defined useless spending, "like buying a these cup brassiere . . . totally useless."

Defense spending is one of the useless items Savio noted. He said that the Cold War has been in in-

vention of the Administration to increase government spending and allow the government to have control over the ecenomy. The space race, according to Savio, was an invention of President John F. Hennedy to fulfill the same purpose.

Savio said the money saved by cutting out useless spending could be used in the ghetto and other poor are is to revive them and give the people decent living quarters.

Savio felt that Senator Robert Kennedy's plan to provide tax incentives to companies which invested in poor areas and employed the people who lived there would not be satisfactory. He felt the tax burden would fall on the middle class, which is already rebelling against high taxes. He also felt that the presence of a white owned company in the ghettos-weeld cause riots.

"If the liberals don't get the job done," said Savio, "then the con-

servatives will fly around like vultures, shooting looters and demonstrators." BLACK PANTHER PARTY, aka Black Panther Party for Self Defense

A source advised that the Black Panther Party for Self Defense (BPPSD) was formed by HUEY PERCY NEWTON, Minister of Defense, and BOBBY GEORGE SEALE, Chairman, in December, 1966, as a militant black nationalist political organization to combat police brutality, to unite militant black youth, and to determine the destiny of black communities. The political philosophy was taken from writings of Chairman MAO Tse-tung of Communist China and black militant writers.

In March, 1968, the name of the organization was changed to Black Panther Party (BPP).


The official BPP publication, "The Black Panther Party - Black Community News Service," states that the BPP advocates use of guns and guerrilla tactics in their violent revolutionary program to end oppression of black people.

On February 17, 1962, ELDRILGE CLEAVER, Minister of Information, announced merger of the BPP and Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and bestowed title of Minister of Justice, BPP, upon H. RAP BROUN, Chairman of SNCC.

SNCC is a militant Negro organization which preaches black supremacy.

NEWTON, aforementioned, is incarcerated in the Alameda County Jail, Oakland, California, awaiting trial on charge of murder of an Oakland police officer.

This leaflet, a copy of which is attached, states in part as follows:

"We, citizens of Montreal concerned about this immoral war, are taking the initiative to convene a conference, representative of all those in the western hemisphere who are striving to end the war which the U.S. is waging against the people in Vietnam.

"We see the conference as a means of extending a wide campaign of public enlightenment through the western hemisphere, bringing home to the widest sections of people the moral iniquity and racist character of the war being waged by the U. S...."

"The conference we visualize would draw on the extensive experience of the peoples of the Americas in developing pressure against the war, and in rendering assistance to the people of Vietnam.";

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

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

We, citizens of Montreal concerned about this immoral war, are taking the initiative to convene a conference, representative of all those in the Western Hemisphere who who are striving to end the war which the United States is waging against the people of Vietnam. The conference will work for peace on a basis which will establish the unqualified right of the Vietnamese people to determine their own destiny free from all foreign interference

We propose that this conference be held in Montreal at a place to be announced, on October 12, 13, and 14, 1968.

We believe a basis of minimum agreement is a clear demand upon the United States government to totally and unconditionally stop the bombing of North Vietnam, and enter into inno-diate negotiations with the National Liberation Front of South Vietnam for the withdrawal of United States and other foreign troops so that the Vietnamese people may settle their national affairs in conditions of non-interference and independence.

The participants in the conference brought together to seek this objective will work out together their plans of action for its realization.

Therefore, we citizens of the United States welcome this call from our Canadian friends and join with them in working for this conference.




The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, describes the Peace Action Council (PAC) as, "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

On July 22, 1966, a source reported that the PAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council (GLAPAC), was formed during the early summer of 1966, for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California from July 4 to July 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the PAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

This source was recontacted on May 8, 1968, and reported that the PAC continues to operate under the same basic concept.

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APPENDIX

COMMUNIST INFILTRATION OF THE FIRST UNITARIAN CHURCH OF LOS ANGELES

A source advised on May 8, 1968, that the premises of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West 8th Street, Los Angeles, California, have been utilized for meetings by Communist Party members and sympathizers over a period of years. Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Fellowship for Social Justice, formerly known as the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, Page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities".

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

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APPENDIX

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us". At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes", the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national head-quarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

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NATIONAL COMMITTEE TO ABOUTSH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications", issued Pecember 1, 1961, by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Page 115, contains the following citation regarding the National Committee to Abolish the Un-American Activities Committee (NCAUAC);

"Gited as a 'new organization' set up in the summer of 1950 to leed and direct the Communist Farty's 'Operation Applition' campaign. Seven of the national leaders of this group have been identified as communists.

"(Committee on Un-American Actavities, House Report 1278 on the Truth About the Film 'Operation Abolition', Part 1, Occober 3, 1961, Page 5)"

A source has advised that the NUADAU changed its name on March 3, 1962, to include the word "House" in its name, thereby becoming known as the National Conmittee to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee (NUABURO). A national meeting of this organization was held in Charago, Illinois, on April 27 and 28, 1963.

A second source advised on May 1, 1908, that as of that date the NCANUAC continued to function with headquarters at 555 World Sestern Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

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WOMEN FOR LEGISLATIVE ACTION

A source advised on May 1, 1963, that the Women for Legislative Action was formed in 1952, claiming to be an independent organization dedicated to non-partisan participation in legislative and civic activities. Its position in favoring or opposing legislation usually parallels the position of the Communist Party and related groups. It also supports legislation to abolish the House Committee on Un-American Activities. Membership in the Women for Legislative Action does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

Another source advised on May 8, 1968, that the Women for Legislative Action continues to be active in the Los Angeles area.

COMMUNIST INFILTRATION OF THE
WOMEN STRIKE FOR PEACE,
Also Known As
Women's International Strike for Peace

A source advised on May 27, 1968, that the Women Strike for Peace (WSP) in the Southern California area began its operations in the late fall of 1961, as an affiliate of the national organization formed that year in Washington, D. C. It is a peace oriented women's organization which is opposed to the present American foreign policy in Vietnam. It has also sought legislation which would bring about the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities. In addition to conducting numerous letter writing campaigns which concern current United States civil rights and foreign policy problems, WSP locally has become quite active in draft counseling and draft leafleting. Counseling, in the form of providing information concerning alternatives to the draft, and distributing leaflets providing this information have taken place on an increasingly consistent pace. Much of the leafleting takes place adjacent to high school campuses and in shopping centers. WSP feels that these methods of opposing United States intervention in Vietnam have been quite effective and more effective than frequent participation in demonstrations protesting the war in Vietnam.

The same source stated that WSP is a non-membership organization and has no officers. The organization is open to women of all political opinions who are interested in world peace. It makes no effort to exclude from its activities members of, or persons sympathetic to, the Communist Party and related groups.

The guiding force behind the Southern California WSP groups is MARY CLARKE. A second source advised in July, 1955, that



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



The danger of fascism great (as it is now) when this latent, largely unconscious, but pervasive authoritarianism threatens to become the overt theme of social life. This can happen if a significant minority at the bottom, discovers a way to see out of the otherwise closed box, and then opts for real satisfactions instead of fictions. This throws the whole. precarious system into great danger, since everyone higher up must then face the utter emplihess of years of pretend life. The temptations for men of all socili classes—all social classes—to close ranks against the insurgents may then be overwhelmingeven though all-this fantasy really only benefits the upper CONFIDENTIAL

classes. For every man is infected deep in his soul by the prevailing, authoritarian ideology.

In America two substantial groups have found windows by which to see out of this hierarchy. First, the blacks, and evermore, other non-anglo minorities at the bottom of the ladder, who never achieved significant status any way. Second, we post-industrial whites, whom technological evolution has now taken quite beyond the division of labor itself, and therefore beyond the relevance of the whole hierarchy.

But for most Americans. the hierarchy of status is still the standard of personal worth." We niggers, white and black, are challenging that standard. we are spitting on it, and trampling it. In the great rush to suppress our rebellion these old nien of the old order may, in significant numbers, cross over the line from daily, endurable

neurosis to psychotic madness. That is what fascism would be in the United States.

People's Park Rally Sproul Hall (area) University of California Berkeley, California June 26, 1969

At the above described rally, four (4) speakers spoke relative to conditions regarding the People's Park controversy in Berkeley. Among the speakers were FRANK BARDACKE, MARIO SAVIO, and TOM HAYDEN. HAYDEN called for a strong unification of efforts and commitment with regard to the general movement and specifically with regards to the "rights of the people to the park" and said that the people must be "the rock upon which fascism is shattered".

SAVIO, to the question of the People's Park and the movement in general, characterized the present generation members making up the New Left as persons being disposed to communism; to wit, he said, "we are natural communists".

FRANK BARDACKE discussed generally a number of circumstances surrounding the People's Park issue and discussed summer work projects and a "free store" in Berkeley. He also disclosed a lease by the People's Park Committee members from the City of Berkeley of a block of "Savo Island" at D erby Street. BARDACKE announced the fact that the movement was taking on a creative aspect in an effort to prove to the establishment that members of the movement were capable of creativity and said that we ought to work in order to reinforce the general attitude which pervaded the People's Park activities. BARDACKE announced that there would be a march through the streets of Berkeley to the Savo Island project and a weekend's work would be in store in an attempt to make the premises habitable by July 1, 1969..

BERKELEY — Mario Sa-vio, fiery leader of the 1961 Free Speech Movement that is considered the granddaddy of the student protest movement, will return to the University of California as a student this fall.

U.C. administrators confirmed yesterday that Savio, 27 and a father, has been admitted as an undergraduate in biological science.

He last attended U.C. in 1935 as a physics and philoso phy student.

Savio dropped out of U.C. after leading the confrontation that ended with 770 arrests. He served four months in jail for his part in the successful effort to liberalize the campus restrictions on political activi-

In 1966 he was arrested during a demonstration against Navy recruiters on campus. University officials said that he has not been involved in any campus infractions since then.

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Mario Savio Will Return To UC Campus This Fall

Officials at the University of California here announced yesterday that Savio, once turned down for re-admission, has been granted it this time.

Savio. 28, who earned such appelations as "firebrand" and "charismatic" as a leader of the FSM, has not been a student at UC since 1964-65, although he has been back in Berkeley for some time.

"Mr. Savio has provided clear evidence of serious interest in pursuing academic studies at the University," said a vice chancellor who declined to be quied by name

"His record in recent years made it clear he had acted in ways consistent wit hhis suitability as a student" the vice chancellor said.

The readmission of Savio, who lives with his wife and children at 1607 Ninth St., is believed to have the knowledge and approval of Berkeley Chancellor Roger W. Heyns, who is in Michigan recuperating from a mild heart attack.

SAVIO, WHO became known around the globe as the oft-arrested demonstrator and leader of this nation's first majorcampus uprising, will study biological sciences, beginning in the fall quarter which opens in October.


Savio, who seems subdued and withdrawn in comparison with the figure he cut during the FSM, said it will take two years to complete his undergraduate studies.

In America two substantial groups have found windows by which to see out of this hierarchy. First, the blacks, and evermore, other non-anglo minorities at the bottom of the ladder, who never achieved significant status anyway. Second, we post-industrial whites, whom technological evolution has now taken quite beyond the division of labor itself, and therefore beyond the relevance of the whole hierarchy.

But for most Americans, the hierarchy of status is still the standard of personal worth. We niggers, white and black, are challenging that standard, imore accurate statement might we are spitting on it, and trampling it. In the great rush to suppress our rebellion these old nien of the old order may, in significant numbers, cross over the line from daily, endurable neurosis to psychotic madness.

That is what fascism would be in the United States.

We of the first post-industrial generation are natural communists. For us property is not a thing to keep men apart and at war, but rather a medium through which men can come together to play-a People's te a communal age of fellowship and cooperation. The future is ours as a matter of course, and thanks to the hard if uncomprehending labor of our parents. We were born to build the Cooperative Commonwelath upon the wreckage of This classriddenbarbarism.

There might be no future. The immediate task before us is the prevention, or failing that, the defeat of fascism. How this is to be accomplished—if it can be accomplished—is something we will have to learn together in the coming months and years? We must hope, but cannot expect, that all of us here today will live to see the full birth of our own proper age, when we can take up the means of leisure, without preparing to battic the police.

Note: After the rally it was pointed out to me that "postscarcity capitalism" is perhaps more correct designation than "post-industrial capitalism." As I understand it, a go something like this:

This occurred in the United States under capitalism; but also in Soviet Russia, under the leadership of an anticapitalist, industrializing elite.

But now that industrialization Park. The Aquarian Age will has gone so far, in the United States anyway, that a whole generation has grown up in circumstances of material affluence. the motiviation for continuing to submit to the external compulsion of industrialization no longer exists. Thus, although this is at best post-scarcity capitalism, we are truly post-industrial men, who unlike-our workingclass parents, have an increas-

ingly conscious interest in the Only one thing could go wrong, elimination of all but desirable work. Our consciousness has even exceeded the marxist touchstone: "From each according to his abilities . . . " We would rather say (and with our present technolgy this is now practical): From potentially each according to his desire, to each according to his need.

> Such a consciousness clarly marks more than merely the transition to another phase (the post-scarcity phase) of industrial society: it represents a shift in value so profound as to take us quite beyond the togime of the bosses and the bossed altogether.



Mario Savio and his wife, Suzanne, filed as candidates for mayor of Berkeley yesterday.

The two submitted candidacy papers on the last day of filing for the April 6 city election.

Both Savio and his wife declined to comment on their candidacy, but said a further statement will be released within the week. They also refused to say why both are running.

Savio, an undergraduate in biology here, has largely shunned the political spotlight since he led

the 1964 Free Speech Movement. However, he was arrested in a confrontation with police in the Student Union in 1966, and has been seen on many demonstration picket lines during the last five years.

In 1968, he ran for State Senate on the Peace and Freedom party ticket. However, he did almost no campaigning and drew few votes.

Savio and his wife complete a mammoth field of 14 mayoral candidates and over 50 city council aspirants.

Also Runs In Record Field

Former Free Speech Movement leader Mario Savio and his wife both filed for mayor yesterday as a deadline on the heated April 6 city elections race officially closed with a record-setting 75-man field seeking nine elective offices.

The double entry of the Savios was the major shocker in a last-minute run on the office of City Clerk Edythe Campbell as candidates raced to beat the Jan. 28 deadline which by an unexpected lega! switch had cut the filing period by two weeks.

Savio, the charismatic lead er of the disruptive FSM o: the University of California

said last night:

"No more than one of us wil run. We're not sure which one but it will be no more that one." He referred to his wife. the former Suzanne Goldberg. who was also active in the FSM in 1964-65.

THE ENTRANCE of the Savios and one other candidate and the failure of one who had earlier taken out papers makes the mayor race a 12man affair at this point.

Candidates may still pull out of any of their races until Feb.

At yesterday's deadline time, 74 persons of the 84 who had taken out filing papers returned them. The number includes 43 candidates for the four city council positions, 15 for the three school board positions and five for auditor.

Ex-City Councilman Dan Dewey, who had taken out papers for a school board post, did not return them.

OTHERWISE, a field of several new aspirants expanded the field of unknown or previously undeclared candidates. These included two avowed

members of the Mexican-American-oriented "La Raza Unida" party, Victor Acosta and Carmen Alegria.

In the meantime, the likelihood that at least some of the avowedly radical candidates seeking endorsement by the leftist April Coalition would eventually pull out loomed. A coalition spokesman said last night that one youthful would-be AC endorsee, Pat Cassin, had already resolved not to run.

The Berkeley "Left," including the Black Caucus, remained undecided as to the position to take on mayoral candidate Warren Widener, due to the latter's opposition to the police partition Charter Amendment.

BOTH LEFT factions are still planning nominating sessions to pick candidates (see companion story.)

One Berkeley Community (OBC), the bipartisan Democratic-Republican c i t i ze n group formed to defeat the charter amendment, planned to renew its debate on whether to attempt to support a "moderate" s l a te of candidates Monday night.

The two-year-old Concerned Berkeley Citizens (CBC) plans support a "moderate" slate and will continue discussions on this Tuesday.

The Berkeley (Democratic) Caucus, once the major political force in Berkeley, was reliably reported still undecided as to its role and possible endorsements in what is observable as Berkeley's most complicated city election.

THE CAUCUS has had several meetings involving several score meetings at which such items as Caucus support or non-support of a slate, and relations with other groups, have been discussed.

Major contenders in the mayor race are still Vice Mayor Wilmont Sweeney, who has been endorsed by both OBC and CBC; Councilman Warren Widener, originally the presumptive endorsee of the radical groups but expected to gather a portion of the liberal Democratic vote; and Councilmen John K. DeBonis and Borden Price, both Republicans and particularly attractive to avowed moderates, Re-

publicans, conservatives and various independents.

The Trotskyist Communist Socialist Workers Party (SWP) has a slate entered for mayor, three city council posts and one school board seat.

OTHERWISE, the great bulk of the 42-man city council field and 15-man school board field is essentially running as "unaligned independents" although many of them are waiting for slates to develop.

Four persons are seeking to wrest the auditorship from veteran incumbent Myrna I. Ashley.

Among new faces in city council races at deadline time yesterday were:

JON POGGI, 31, who labels himself "a liberal on some things and a radical on others." The self-employed sculptor and former automobile mechanic said he has been in Berkeley eight years and that "I've participated in all the demonstrations both as a demonstrator and sometimes as a planner.' He said he currently is "independent."

rently is "independent."

GENE C. JOHNSON, 29, director of Project Upgrade, Inc., a non-profit minority contracting group, who says he is an "aggressive liberal" who will not make position statements until next week after he has had a chance to talk with other people.

MARGOT DASHIELL, a propolice partition Charter Amendment Black Caucus member and sociology instructor who is seeking the Black Caucus endorsement.

VICTOR ACOSTA, 34, La Raza Unida Party, is in favor of the police partition Charter Amendment as well as "community control of all institution within the community." Defining himself as a "nationalist," he said he helped develop Latin - American studies at Oakland's Merritt College.


CARMEN ALEGRIA, 26, La Raza Unida Party, who says she is "primarily concerned with community control of the schools."

She wants "free breakfast and lunches, full program of adult education, free textbooks, use of all school facilities 24 hours a day by community groups for whatever they deem necessary, free child care 24 hours a day and bilingual programs in all schools."

Savios Tell of Canceled Race

To the Icebox:

We filed nominating petitions for mayor after Warren Widener announced that he would not support the Community Control of Police amendment. We hoped that the possibility of a serious candidacy to his left would encourage Widener to adopt the position of the left community rather than take its support for granted and ignore it. Unfortunately, Mr. Widener, probably to assure himself the support of white liberal Democrats, has chosen to oppose both the April Coalition and his own former supporters in the Black Caucus.

For personal and political reasons we have decided not to continue in the mayoral race, but instead to devote our efforts to the campaign to pass the Community Control charter amendment.

We feel that the police amendment is the most important issue of the election. It gives neighborhoods elective power over the local people who will establish police policy. Folicemen will live in the neighborhoods they patrol. They will know the people and the people will know them. This is an essential reform at a time when there is increasing hatred a gulf of values — between police and the people they should serve.

Although this measure is not ideal, it is workable. It provides us an opportunity to deal effectively with the current police crisis in which citizens are being beaten and killed by the police for crimes they are only suspected of having committed; and in which police are being killed as victims of the hate and desperation the people feel.

We urge Berkeley citizens to vote for the candidates of the April Coalition and the Berkeley Black Caucus. These candidates support the Community Control of Police charter amendment.





Her parents were listed as Charles Morris Goldberg, born January 3, 1909, in St. Louis, Missouri, and Nettie Spritzer, born June 6, 1912, in New York, New York. Suzanne Savio stated she was married May 23, 1965, to Mario Robert Savio.

The Free Speech Movement (FSM) was an organization formed at UCB by a group of students and others to protest UC rules and regulations pertaining particularly to recruitment of members, solicitation of funds and distribution of literature for "off-campus" type political organizations. The FSM gained national recognition beginning in September, 1964, when a group of several thousand captured a police vehicle on the UC campus with a prisoner inside the automobile on October 2, 1964. Demonstrations then continued almost daily until a massive sit-in took place in the administration building at UCB on December 2 and 3, 1964, which resulted in the arrest of about 780 persons. Most of these individuals have been convicted in Berkeley Municipal Court of trespassing and resisting arrest.

Mario Savio was the leading spokesman and leader of the FSM and his wife, Suzanne Goldberg, was extremely active

-To the potential opponents of the stahis quo, the police seemed to be saying, "Don't get too far out-of-line or you'll be

To the broader community, another message was given: The police are strong enough to protect ordinary, law-abiding citizens from the irrational violence of criminal terrorists. In short, "Stick with us and we'll take care of you."

That second message, however, has been strangely contradicted by events. The anti-SLA hysteria had not begun with the shooting of Oakland's black school superintendent. Marcus Foster arguably an ordinary, law-abiding citizen. It was the political kidnaping of the

Without it, any we endorsing the ac-lious of the SLA, we must face squarely the fact that the police can be counted on "to protect and to serve" only the wealthy and powerful, Unfortunately, this reaclusion is strengthened by the location of the shootout in a poor community of blacks. A natural question arises: Would the police have endangered lives and destroyed property so recklessly if the SLA suspects had been caught hiding in Beverly Hills

In their total rejection of reason and moderation-in choosing brutal and exressive methods—the police have gone far beyond their proper functions as protec-tors and servants of the public. Instead, they played the roles of judge, jury and executioner. Is this not the very essence of a police state?

Once the potential for a police state exists-once the police machinery has been created and is poised for action-then few explicit orders regarding methods need be given. All that is necessary is simply to unleash special police forces, such as L.A.'s "swat squad," and to promote a general atmosphere that sanctions their

special activities. Given the mere existence, in major U.S. cities, of these highly developed, wellfunded, paramilitary police machines, then the means exist to restrict, to sabotage, to intimidate and, bluntly, to destroy all of us who are working for needed and

What they were really looking for was another theatrical gesture that would win more headlines. With Patricia Hearst's conversion and subsequent public role in a bank robbery, they found it. The robbery, and the shooting of two innocent bystanders, were not revolutionary gestures, but they sure made news.

And wasn't that the central theme of the SLA's activities all along? From the murder of Oakland School Supt. Marcus Fos-ter to the Los Angeles gun battle, their activities had only the most tenuous link to any political reality, but they showed ge-

nius for publicity.

As "activists," they turned us all into a: passive audience. We watched and wondered where they would strike next. But; they left no revolutionary message, no "movement" behind them. Being at the center of the stage was everything for the group; working for some goal bigger than themselves meant nothing.

It is an unhappy distinction for Berke-ley that all the white SLA members seem to have developed their so-called revolutionary consciousness here. One 'cannot, but ask what there is about these surroundings that made them fortile ground for the emergence of terrorists.

Were the SLA members legitimate heirs to the "movement" of the late 1960s? Certainly they derived their rhetoric from it, and there was an element of theatricality in student demonstrations all along, a desire to be in the news that the SLA took to an extreme. Dack in the fold of vis dent demonstrators always knocked off at 6 p.m. to go see themselves on TV.)

But the SLA members joined the "movement" when it was already dying. According to their biographies, most of them came to radicalism late, when the high hopes of the '60s had already been dashed.

What they found left over from it in Berkeley was a sense that all the values of the rest of American society had been subjected to a devastating cidlique and found wanting. There is a consensus here, subscribed to by almost all the most vocal members of the under-30 population, that America is racist, sexist, economically exploitative, imperialist and polluting.

This consensus is almost meaningless though, because up one has much interest in figuring out what these terms implythey are assumed to be self-explanatory-and what should be done to change the had conditions they describe. No new set of common values has developed to take the place of the "middle American" values that everyone declares are bankrupt. From the little we know about the lives"

of those SLA members who passed through Berkeley on their way to the shootout, they found Berkeley's lack of standards fascinating, Coming from midthe class backgrounds, they were power-billy attracted to new sets of political and

They became involved in alternative, life-styles and in protest at a time when the meaning of protest and the nature of the injustices under attack had become extremely achilous. Every widely accepted value was an injustice, and every sort

of action a protest.

In this no-man's-land of unreal rhetoric, their eventual commitment to terrorism had as little-or as much-justification as anybody else's commitment. If streaking is a valid form of protest, why not mur-

In the absence of any criterion of meanhad one thing going for it—it made the news. So did streaking. Since they "sucnews, 50 ma streaking, Since they succeeded, by this standard, where other forms of protest failed, both participants and onlookers decided they must have

some sort of significance.

That the SLA's actions were self-destructive for those involved and ultimate ly meaningless for everyone else is not enough to prove them "wrong" in all parts of Berkeley these days. They pursued headlines with a daring that—we hope no one else will be ready to emulate. That will be enough to make them heroes to some—given the present state of values in this community.

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
